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SHOULD YOU HIRE

A REAL ESTATE AGENT OR LAWYER

TO BUY A HOUSE?

If you're selling a house in California, then it's critical that you have a licensed real estate agent list your property on the Multiple Listing Service (MLS) so that the seller obtains the best marketing exposure; but, if you're buying a house, you might be surprised to learn that using a lawyer is often a better alternative to the normal agency relationship.

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Real estate agents owe their clients typical fiduciary duties of good faith, fair dealing and full disclosure, but these duties are fairly limited. For example, agents in California can (and often do) represent both the buyer and seller of a home, or may even have a personal interest in the transaction, as long as the proper disclosures are made. Lawyers, on the other hand, are ethically bound to avoid conflicts of interest by representing only the interests of one party, and a lawyer may not have a personal interest in the transaction. Lawyers owe their clients the highest duties of loyalty and fidelity.

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HERE'S

WHY:

Real estate agents are not authorized to practice law. This means that they can help negotiate and fill-in blanks on a form selected by the parties or act as a scrivener in recording the parties' agreement, but that's about it. Lawyers, on the other hand, are specifically trained and authorized to practice law without limitation. Moreover, lawyers owe their clients a duty of competency, including a duty of diligence that far exceeds the duties of a real estate agent. This means that lawyers are supposed to think about and anticipate potential problems in the transaction that agents often overlook (often resulting in expensive litigation), and lawyers must advise their clients accordingly.

AGENTS ARE PAID ONLY IF THE SALE IS COMPLETED

This may sound like a benefit to a homebuyer, but the fact that a real estate agent only earns a commission if the deal closes creates inherent conflict and bias in the agency relationship. The agent is obviously incentivized to make sure the transaction is completed so they can get paid, even if the closing may not be in the buyer's best interests. This conflict is even more pronounced when the agent represents both the buyer and seller in the transaction, since a buyer's interests are in direct conflict with the seller's interests—the buyer wants the lowest possible price while the seller wants the highest possible price. Recognizing this inherent conflict, some states actually prohibit such dual agency. Lawyers, on the other hand, typically charge an hourly or flat fee, such that they are unaffected by the transaction itself.



hen most people enter a room, they go unnoticed. When former PGA and Champions Tour player Jim Colbert enters the room, one can't miss the bounce in his step, the smile on his face and his signature bucket hat.

Golf was not always his game. Born in New Jersey, James Joseph Colbert earned a football scholarship to Kansas State University. But when his football career was cut short by an injury on the gridiron, he turned his focus to golf, a sport he played as a young boy. It was a good choice. He finished second in the NCAA golf championships in 1964, and after graduation turned professional in 1965.

With career earnings of over \$11 million, Colbert won eight times on the PGA Tour and 20 tournaments on the Champions Tour, including the 1993 Senior Players Championship. Looking toward the future of the game, Colbert also served 14 years on the PGA's tournament policy board, with much of the work during that time involved in creating the Tournament Players Clubs.

Soon to celebrate his 75th birthday, this husband, father, grandfather, golfer, successful businessman, former golf analyst and cancer survivor is living life to the fullest.

Dividing his time between homes in Manhattan, Kansas and Palm Desert, California, along with his high-school sweetheart, Marcia, Colbert plays regularly at BigHorn Golf Club, where he is a founding co-owner and resident. Whether it's on the course, in the Pour House or outside on the range, Colbert has a steady stream of people eager to say hello, chat for a few minutes or simply shake his hand. In return, he has a smile, a wave or a bit of conversation for everyone who acknowledges him.


As in life, Colbert hits the ground running with this interview. "I play a lot of golf when I'm in the desert. We open our season here at BigHorn with me bringing in 26 senior golf pros and we have a threeday pro-am for our members and guests. This tournament benefits the Colbert Golf Foundation for Kansas State University, where Colbert Hills Golf Course is. So I'm here for about five months and spend the rest of the time in Kansas."

When Colbert says "a lot of golf," he means you'll find him on the course four or five times a week. "I'm a four-day wonder, the fifth day I'm beat," he says with a laugh. "I only play one professional tournament a year and that's a Super Senior event on the Legends of Golf tour. I've won it with Bob Murphy twice and then once with Jim Thorpe."

As if struck by an epiphany, Colbert pauses. "Every year when I come back to the desert," he then continues, "for the first two weeks I keep saying, 'my goodness, this place is really neat.' I mean the whole valley, it just looks so good."

Noted for his help in designing Colbert Hills Golf Course at his alma mater, the question comes up about golf-course design, a natural progression for many tour

players. "Not me," Colbert exclaims. "I've been involved with over 25 golf courses, but my real business was operating golf courses. I went from one to 28 courses."

Colbert was also a golf analyst for ESPN, but he started missing playing on Tour as he watched the likes of Nicklaus, Palmer and Player compete. He was in good physical shape and felt he could contend again.

In 1991, he was eager to get back on tour. His company, Colbert Golf, Inc., was thriving to the tune of 700 full-time employees and annual gross revenues of nearly \$50 million. He decided to sell. The board bought him out and continued to run the business for a few years before selling it to American Golf.

"When I decided to sell," Colbert says, "I was worried I was getting out a few years too soon. As it played out, and we know what happened with the recession, I'd say I made the right decision."

Being back on the tour was good but it wasn't enough for Colbert. In 1995, he opened 32 golf schools in northern, coldweather locations. Instructors were certified by his old friend Jimmy Ballard, the other half of the successful Colbert Ballard Golf Academy.

Smart business sense and good friends seem to have followed Colbert throughout his life. That is certainly true of his friend of 35 years R.D. Hubbard, who organized a group to purchase BigHorn Golf Club when it was offered for sale in 1996.

Ed Allred, a close friend of both men, had joined the club and bought a couple of lots. When he bought into BigHorn as part of Hubbard's group of 13 neighbors, Colbert followed suit. Four years later, Colbert and Marcia found the perfect lot themselves, overlooking the 18th green, where they still reside today.

"Talk about a great investment," Colbert says. "It has been the best partnership I have ever had. We weren't expecting to make a bunch of money, but I made six times my investment, so it turned out to be an excellent investment." Colbert is no longer an ownership partner of the club.

Shifting the focus back to golf and Colbert's regularity on the course, the question arises, "How do Tour players feel when playing public or country club courses?" Colbert is quick to reply, "For a Tour player on a membership or public course, 67 is par."

Mention the bucket hat and Colbert stops the conversation. "There are three things I'm known for: the bucket hat, the motion of me shooting a pistol, and one thing that used to piss a lot of people off, my caddie, Willie, getting the ball out of the hole."

Explaining the first, Colbert tells a story of playing in a tournament as a teen and getting sunstroke so badly that his father had to take him to a doctor. The doctor told his father to get him the biggest hat he could find, and the rest, as they say, is history.

The pistol-shooting movement started when a cameraman, who knew Colbert, jumped out from behind the camera making that gesture after Colbert sank a long putt. Colbert returned the gesture and it became his signature movement. "I was just responding to what all my friends were doing to me," he notes with a chuckle.

As for his caddie getting the ball out of the hole, there's this story. "So many people thought I was this arrogant son of a gun. But I'll tell you what, Willie Miller, after 25 years, is still my caddie, still on my payroll and he still has insurance. He's family,"




states an animated Colbert. "When Willie first did that, Isaid to him offcamera, 'Willie what are you doing? I'll get my own ball out of the hole.' Willie replied, 'Pro, I always get the ball out of the hole. How else am I going to get on TV?"

Colbert is thrilled about the state of golf these days and all of the exciting young players. "I think the game and the world of golf are fortunate to have these guys. I mean it's hard to out-do Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer and what they did for the game, but this group of young players respect and appreciate the game. I think it is in great hands."

As numerous friends stop by the table inquiring when Colbert will be finished, there is one final question to be answered: How would you describe your life in one sentence? After a long pause Colbert replies, "The most fortunate person on earth."

Novak Dodovcand Victoria Zarenka Win at the BNP Paribas Open

The 2016 tournament provided plenty of excitement for fans

he 2016 BNP Paribas Open finals were held March 20 at the Indian Wells Tennis Garden, and featured the top-ranked players in the world in both the men and women's divisions. One showed why he is No. 1, while the other proved there's room at the top—just not enough to sit down.

Serbian Novak Djokovic, men's World No. 1, cruised past Canadian Milos Raonic 6-2, 6-0 to claim his fifth BNP Paribas Open title, while the women's World No. 1, Serena Williams, plowed her way to the final over the two weeks of the tournament only to be knocked off by the 2012 champion, Victoria Azarenka, 6-4, 6-4.

Finals Sunday was a perfect warm desert day for the singles championship matches and neither disappointed. The bottom line in the women's final was that Azarenka seemed into it while Williams did not. Williams appeared impatient to get the job done. Azarenka was tuned in to do what was necessary to win.







Williams, who didn't drop a set en route to the finals, promptly lost the first game with two double faults to fall down 0-1 in the first set, and Azarenka held serve in game two to go up 2-0. Williams cranked up the power in game three to hold serve, then hit a cross-court winner from 10 feet behind the baseline on her way to holding serve in game five, which seemed to announce her actual arrival to the match.

Azarenka, ranked No. 13, defeated only one opponent ranked inside the world's top 20 on her way to the final, but overcame two break points to hold serve in game six and take a 4-2 lead. Williams held serve in game seven. A double fault by Azarenka gave Williams a double-break point opportunity in game eight, but she eventually squandered three break points as Azarenka took a 5-3 lead.

Williams held serve in game nine, but despite the momentum she achieved in game five, it appeared she still had not found second gear. She was closed out 50-0 in game 10 as Azarenka took the first set 6-4 in 41 minutes.

There was no need for Williams to panic. After all, she'd lost the first set to Azarenka six times previously and still



won the match four times. But she seemed out of sorts while serving in game one of the second set, which she eventually lost with a double fault. Williams had three break points in game two but she failed to capitalize as Azarenka took a 2-0 lead in the set, leaving Williams 0-9 in break-point situations. Azarenka followed with another break in game three to take a 3-0 lead, putting Williams right up against the wall.

Azarenka took advantage of a penalty point against Williams for slamming her racket to the ground during the court change, holding serve and winning game four as Williams offered little resistance. On so many previous occasions, including four times against Azarenka, Williams eventually dug in to turn things around, and she did rebound to win game five to cut Azarenka's lead to 4-1.

Azarenka kept the pressure on Williams with a 50-0 hold in game six before conceding game seven, giving Azarenka an opportunity to serve for the match. But two quick double faults gave Williams a chance at a service break and she took it, cutting Azarenka's second-set lead to 5-3. Williams then made quick work of game nine to put the ball back in Azarenka's hand with a 5-4 lead serving for the championship.

Williams was finally awake and playing. She took a 40-15 lead in game 10, only to see Azarenka fight back to force deuce. Azarenka then earned match point, capitalizing on it by hitting her first serve





in. Williams returned long, giving Azarenka a 6-4, 6-4 win and moving her from World No. 13 to No. 8.

Meanwhile, in the men's division, World No. 1 Djokovic took out longtime rival Rafael Nadal in the semifinal, which left him facing Raonic, ranked No. 12 in the world, in the final. Djokovic, who had his own Serbian cheering section at the match, won the first three games of the first set. He started with a service break, won the second game after three deuce situations and took the third game 50-0 as Raonic continued to struggle.

Raonic finally got on the board by holding serve in game five; however, Djokovic easily held in game six, putting Raonic in a must-hold situation in game seven. The Canadian managed to do just that, but Djokovic again had no trouble holding in game eight to close out the set 6-2. Raonic, who required medical attention between sets, needed a good start in the second set but quickly found himself down three break points in game one, and





subsequently a break and a game down. Four serves later, Djokovic was up 2-0 in the set and in full flight. He forced another service break in game three to take the match by the scruff of the neck, and he seemed to validate his dominance in game four with a bristling backhand and a thumping forehand winner en route to going up 4-0.

Djokovic's return of serve, which was on display for all to see throughout the afternoon, saw him through another service break in game five. Minutes later, he was holding up the BNP Paribas Open trophy for the fifth time in his career, looking as though he'd barely broken a sweat despite his 1:17 on the court and the brilliant desert sun.

Both champions and runners-up declared the tournament a smashing success and vowed to return next year. The tournament's organizers and sponsors, as well as its fans, are hoping the world's No. 1 players will be taking the court on finals Sunday once again.

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The 2016 Rosie Casals & Jackie Cooper Tennis Pro-An

This year's event benefits a very special organization

ennis Hall of Famer Rosie Casals is back this year, not about to let any grass grow under her feet (even though that happens to be her favorite surface).

The second annual Rosie Casals & Jackie Cooper Tennis Pro-Am, presented by Mylan World Team Tennis (WTT), takes place at Indian Ridge County Club in Palm Desert, California, on Sunday, April 24. The event will again include local professionals and juniors who will play in a Team Tennis Pro-Am with paid amateurs.

All proceeds will benefit the new Love & Love Tennis Foundation, launched just this year by Casals and former pro-player Tory Fretz, to provide support for junior tennis.

Also new to this year's tourney is the Jackie Cooper "You're-the-Best" Award, which will be presented to Charlie Pasarell, the inaugural recipient. Pasarell is well known to tennis fans and residents of the Coachella Valley as a former awardwinning player and for his leadership in developing what is today the BNP Paribas Open in Indian Wells, California. He retired as the tournament's director in 2012, and was inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame in 2013. Pasarell was close friends with Cooper.

Casals, tennis legend and pioneer of the women's professional game, was inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame in 1996. This year's invitational is being produced Sportswoman, Inc., Casals' company, to honor the legacy of her friend and tennis pro, Jackie Cooper, who was instrumental in promoting junior tennis in the Coachella Valley.

Indian Ridge County Club serves as the host venue again this year. Billie Jean King's Mylan WTT is the presenting sponsor along with event sponsors Joan Oloff Shoes, the PGA Tour Superstore, *Desert Golf & Tennis* magazine and Marker Broadcasting (Jammin 99.5 FM, 95.9 FM The Oasis, Big 106 KPLM FM Country and Q102.3 FM Classic Rock).

The tournament will begin at 8:30 a.m. with top local pros and juniors competing together in a Team Tennis format. The teams will consist of one pro, one junior and two amateurs. Any level of tennis player is welcome to play.

A doubles shoot-out with the pros and juniors, also competing in a Team Tennis format, will be the highlight on center court, immediately following a barbeque buffet lunch and an on-court live auction.

Casals is one of the "Original 9" who paved the way for the first-ever professional Virginia Slims Circuit in 1971. She was the first winner of the Virginia Slims tournament in Houston in 1970 and a founder of the Women's Tennis Association (WTA) in 1973. She is regarded as a trailblazer in terms of demanding equal pay for women tennis players, and a catalyst to permanent social change and equality for women throughout the country.

Best known for doubles, Casals won 12 Grand Slam titles, seven Wimbledon (five with Billie Jean King), two mixed doubles with Ilie Nastase, four U.S. Open doubles titles and a U.S. Open mixed doubles. Her 112 doubles titles are second only to Martina Navratilova.


Casals makes her home in Palm Desert, California, where she has maintained a public presence for many years.

The idea for Love & Love Tennis Foundation, a non-profit 501(c) (3), emerged at last year's Pro-Am, inspired by Jackie Cooper's longtime passion for wanting to help juniors reach their potential. Cooper passed away from cancer in 2013 and left a void in the hearts of his juniors, friends and fellow pros.

The foundation also pays tribute to Cooper through the efforts of Tory Fretz, a world-class player on the Tour in the 70s, who decided that the desert needed a foundation that would support junior tennis and be more involved in the development of the game. Last year, the Casals & Cooper tournament raised \$35,000, the bulk of which was donated to various junior organizations and local grassroots programs in the Coachella Valley.

"Both Tory and I are very excited about our new foundation, and we have been busy identifying and providing financial assistance to programs that will help grow junior tennis in the desert," Casals says. "We are continuously looking at ways to bring more opportunities to kids to learn to play tennis. Through the Southern California Tennis Association and with the help of Billie Jean King, we've purchased equipment and balls to help schools participate in after-school tennis programs."

The Fretz and Cooper Junior Tennis Scholarship Program, established in 2014, helps elite junior tournament players with expenses for coaching, equipment and travel. The scholarships are provided directly to the tennis academies or to individual juniors who are nationally ranked and qualify for financial aid.

2016 National Collegiate Tennis Classic

The 37-year-old tournament celebrates the best in college tennis

or 37 years, "the Wimbledon of college tennis" has showcased the best women and men NCAA college players from around the country. And for the third consecutive year, the National Collegiate Tennis Classic (NCTC), held in January over the Martin Luther King holiday weekend, took place at Sunrise Country Club in Rancho Mirage, California.

Considered a training ground for the U.S. pro stars of tomorrow, the tournament has gained a reputation as a highly prestigious event. Former participants include the young John McEnroe at the start of his career, and the Bryan brothers, Bob and Mike, from Stanford University.

This year, NCTC tournament co-chair and president, Sandra Karvelas, and event partner and treasurer, Bob Cannon, welcomed teams from ASU, USC, UCLA, Texas A&M, Pepperdine, Stanford, the University of Illinois (after a hiatus of several years), Indiana University and the University of North Carolina, among others.

After a weekend of intense competition, Sunday's championships sparked extra excitement as ASU senior Desirae Krawczyk (No. 75), a former Palm Desert Aztec high-school student, defeated UCLA's Catherine Harrison, 6-1, 5-7, 6-3.

Krawczyk's coach, Sheila McInerney, is in her 32nd season at the helm of the ASU women's tennis program. McInerney has led the Sun Devils to 18 NCAA Sweet Sixteen appearances and eight quarterfinal appearances.

On the men's side, San Diego State University's Frederik Gelbrich from Germany captured the singles title, beating Henry Ji of USC with a 6-2, 6-3 win. SDSU's Marko Goles-Babic of Croatia and Milen Ianakiev of Germany earned the doubles title on Sunday, defeating teammates Gelbrich and Hendrick Jebens, also originally from Germany, with a final score of 6-4.

SDSU's head coach, Gene Carswell, said, "This was obviously a very successful weekend for our program. Winning both the singles and doubles titles at the NCTC was a great way to start the season."

On the evening leading into the finals, NCTC's traditional press and sponsor's reception was held at the Classic Club in Palm Desert. The recognition event was a mid-tournament mix-andmingle for players, coaches, media, friends and sponsors, including World Food and Beverage, Gen-X Energy Drinks, Wilson and Spa Med.

Guests included Coach McInerney, who represented the ASU program and players; Frankie Brennan, Stanford's associate women's coach; Sunrise Country Club's director of tennis, Ken Autrey; tournament organizers Karvelas and Cannon and other tennis notables, most of whom didn't have to compete bright and early the next morning.

Matches were structured with a 32-draw elimination format for men and women's singles. The doubles competition, consisting of 16 draws, was played with the same format. Winning players in both singles and doubles continued on to compete against other winners while the remaining players took part in daily consolation matches. Individual trophies were awarded to winners and finalists in individual men and women's as well as doubles championships.

College tennis fans may want to mark their calendars now for next year's 38th annual NCTC tournament in January.

One of the Toughest Holes in the Coachella Valley

Have you taken on the challenge of No. 15 at The Madison Club?

The great Australian and fivetime British Open Champion, Peter Thomson, once said of difficult golf holes, "Tough golf holes are like crossing a cow field. If you don't keep your wits about you, you can put your foot right in it."

What defines a tough hole? It depends on whom you ask and how many cows there are

in the field! A 20-handicap player who doesn't hit the ball that far is going to plump for a long par 5 on the grounds that it's probably going to take him three or four shots to get to the green. On a par-3 there is always a chance he might get on in regulation.

If you study an analysis of Tour players, however, you will quickly see from their averages against par that they score least well on par 3s.



Par 5s are, in fact, their favorite holes in terms of opportunities to pick up birdies and even eagles. There are few par 5s on the professional circuit that a Tour player cannot reach in two, including those over 600 yards.

That leaves us with the par 4. My nomination for one of the most difficult par 4s in California's Coachella Valley is No. 15 at The Madison Club in La Quinta. The Madison Club is one of the best courses in any desert in the western United States. Tom Fazio, one of my favorite course architects, designed it. His layouts are playable and yet they ask questions of the golfer. The Madison Club is a fine example of "think before you execute." It is a very strategic golf course that will literally beg golfers to ask themselves questions.

The 15th hole measures 493 yards from the tips. The green is absolutely enormous, but if the pin is placed on the small plateau right at the very back, this hole can play well over 520 yards, with a second shot that is slightly uphill. Before you take fright, I should note that from the members tee, the hole is about 70 yards shorter.

Although the fairway is reasonably generous, there is a long bunker on the right that will catch a wayward tee shot, and a crescent-shaped lake lying to the left of the landing area. Even the tee shot offers an element of risk and reward.

For golfers who favor the left half of the fairway and who risk going perilously close to the lake, there is a rewarding "speed slot" in which the ball will run an extra 15 to 20 yards. However, with the exception of those who drive the ball like Hogan did, very few will attempt to play for this Lilliputian-sized target. (You may remember tales of Hogan when he won the British Open at Carnoustie in 1953. The par-5 6th hole has a bunker in the middle of the fairway and out of bounds 20 yards to the left. Because it gave a better line to the green, Hogan placed the ball there on all four days!)

In the case of Madison's 15th hole, if you aim straight down the middle and tug one 10 yards left, it can be a very happy outcome.

Then the real test begins. The gargantuan raised green occupies about

12,000 square feet, which is double the size of a reasonably large putting surface. Surely that makes for an easy shot? Wrong! The green has four different levels, each containing its own challenge. That adds a huge interest and dynamic to this intriguing hole. One of the most difficult pin placements is front left, where the golfer has to negotiate quite a severe false front. A slight miss pitching into the green's false front will be rejected, and the ball will frequently be seen trundling down the hill back toward the player. I have played this hole enough times to assure you that it is an agonizing experience.

In spite of its enormous size, this green is deceptively difficult. Unless you're playing from a tee far enough forward to get home with a short iron, or your name is Dustin Johnson, it is quite an achievement to be on in two—to say nothing of on the correct plateau for that day's pin placement.

Putting from the wrong plateau can give you more than an interesting putt. In fact, there is one pin placement that lies in a valley roughly in the center of the green, whereby if you miss left and slightly short you are still putting—but your best attempt can easily finish seven feet past the hole.

This is a very difficult and even quirky golf hole, but I love it. In the golf courses that I design, I invariably put in one or even two quirky holes. They create interest and promote a few good tales in the bar at the end of the day.

Fazio has blended this hole very attractively and successfully into The Madison Club's 18-hole collection. In fact, the blend of difficult holes and those that inspire the golfer to make a par or a birdie has culminated in an exceptionally fine balance, making it one of the best desert golfcourses you will ever play.

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The Tennis World Bids Farewell to a Legend

Bud Collins played tennis, wrote about it and covered it as a TV sportscaster

f Bud Collins' story wasn't impressive enough on its own, the tributes that poured in after his passing in early March certainly were. Each heartfelt statement offered powerful testimony to a life well lived.

Arthur Worth "Bud" Collins, 86, died at his home in Brookline, Massachusetts, on March 11 after an extended bout with Parkinson's disease and dementia. It was a body blow to the world of tennis. Those in the know were aware of his situation, and were keenly aware of the hole left in the tennis landscape when he stepped away from the game he'd covered, and participated in, nearly all his life. His bubbly personality, quick wit, way with words and with a microphone—not to mention his penchant for flashy pants and snappy bow ties—were a big miss on the circuit, a void not likely to be filled soon.

As news of Collins' death began to circulate, organizations and employers affiliated with Collins and his career also began to issue statements of condolence and tribute. The United States Tennis Association (USTA) was among the first to go on record.

"The USTA is deeply saddened by the passing of legendary tennis journalist Bud Collins. Bud was larger than life, and his countless contributions to the sport helped to make it the global success that it is today," it said. "Bud was a mentor to many, and a friend to many more. Our sport was most fortunate to be associated with a man of such character and class, and we were privileged to have had the chance to honor his lasting legacy to the sport by naming the U.S. Open Media Center in his honor last year. He will be sorely missed by all of us who loved him, and by the sport he loved so dearly."

USTA chairman, Katrina Adams, released her own statement. "I am heartbroken at the news of the passing of Bud Collins, a great friend to me personally and an irreplaceable presence in the sport of tennis. Bud was truly one of a kind, and his good humor and great grace, coupled with his unmatched knowledge of our sport and his love of it, helped to make tennis more popular and more fun for fans in the U.S. and throughout the world. He was a colorful character, a true gentleman and a passionate proponent of our sport, which was most fortunate to have counted Bud as a member of its family. There will never be another quite like Bud, and I know that our entire sport, its players, and its many fans deeply mourn his passing."



The USTA was far from the only tennis and sports-journalism entity to praise Collins' life, contribution and integrity. Stan Smith, Todd Martin, Tennis Channel president Ken Solomon, and ESPN, which hired Collins after he was unceremoniously released by NBC, all released statements of praise. ESPN's statement read:

"He blazed a now well-worn path, making the transition from print to television, though Collins never left his typewriter behind. Beloved and respected by all, he was as synonymous with outlandishly colorful outfits featuring specially made pants as much as he was for the clever nicknames he coined for players."

It's difficult to summarize Collins' life and career within the confines of a prepared statement or a newspaper eulogy. Collins' journalism career, which began when he was still a graduate student at Boston University, spanned six decades. He was covering for the *Boston Globe* in 1963 when became one of the first print journalists to cross over to the television medium, commentating on local matches on Boston's public television station.

He joined CBS in 1968. His broadcasting career also featured stints at NBC and ESPN, and he contributed to

countless others. It wasn't really "Breakfast at Wimbledon" without Bud Collins. He continued to contribute to the Boston Globe until 2011, and was also the author ofseveral books, including *The Bud Collins Modern Encyclopedia of Tennis*, and *Bud Collins' History of Tennis*.

Collins didn't just write about tennis. He was the tennis coach at Brandeis University from 1959 to 1963, and together with Janet Hopps, won the U.S. Indoor Mixed Doubles championship in 1961. But it wasn't the only sport Collins is associated with. He was also a prolific boxing writer, worked the Boston Red Sox beat and also covered the Viet Nam War from the field.

The move to christen the Bud Collins Media Center at the National Tennis Center in Flushing Meadows, New York, during the 2015 U.S. Open now appears to be a well-timed and fitting tribute. When journalists come to cover the game Collins loved in the future, they'll ply their trade in the center named for him. It seems an appropriate way to honor his memory—as ifhe'll ever really be forgotten.

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
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EXECUTING DIFFICULT SHOTS

This issue's golf instruction comes from the very difficult 17th hole at the PGA West Stadium Course, nicknamed Alcatraz with good reason. I'm here with PGA West Golf Academy Instructor Sam Varner, who is demonstrating two difficult shots that a golfer could face on this challenging hole.



TEE SHOT

On shots to a green surrounded by water, I like to take the flag out of the picture and just focus on getting the ball onto the putting surface. I do this by going to a shape of shot in which I have great confidence. For me, that's hitting a draw, where the ball's flight is right to left through the air.

Since I'm going to curve the ball's flight from right to left, I align myself to the right edge of the green—my launch line. Too often I see golfers aim for the flag, not taking into consideration the curved shape of the ball's flight.

There are two keys to hitting great shots: the position of the clubface at impact and the swing path of the golf club. To play a draw, I start the club head back in the takeaway on an inside path. This takeaway path allows me to swing from the inside out as I continue into the forward swing.





Making my way through impact, my focus is on executing a solid strike with the ball. I want to feel the rotation of the club head down my initial target line, launching the ball toward the right edge of the green with draw spin.

As seen in the impact photo, I am in excellent balance as I am delivering the club head through the ball. Too often I see golfers out of balance through impact, which hinders their ability to make a solid strike on the ball.

My solid balance at impact, complemented by body rotation, allows me to then turn into a balanced finish, "holding the pose."





THE DUFNER CHIP

At this year's 2016 CareerBuilder Challenge on the PGA West Stadium Course, Jason Dufner was faced with a very difficult chip in between the rocks surrounding the formidable Alcatraz green. Dufner's incredible execution of this shot resulted in his ball hitting the flagstick for a near chip in. He went on to win the tournament in a playoff. Here is the way to execute this difficult shot.





SETUP

On a shot like this, I like to put the ball slightly back of center in my stance, with my hands ahead of the ball at address. This makes the shaft lean slightly forward and will help the clubface make contact with the ball as it descends through the ball at impact



BACKSWING

Since making clean contact with the golf ball is a high priority on this delicate shot, I'm going to execute a shortened backswing, which might only go back as far as hip high. This would be very similar to a short pitch shot, where I would be making a slight hinge in my wrist.



IMPACT

With a tight lie and the ball sitting on bare dirt, my goal is to make clean contact with the ball first and then make contact with the dirt. My impact position is very similar to my address position: hands ahead of the ball with the shaft leaning forward to create a downward strike on the ball.

hether you're a professional athlete or an amateur, peak performance is invaluable. While the common cold may take you down for a day or two, an injury can last weeks or months. In this age of boot camps and cross-fit training, injuries are ever more likely.

Buying a Home in a Golf Course Community? DO YOUR HOMEWORK!

Our expert realtor shares the questions homebuyers must ask

our decision has been made to purchase a home in a golf course community. You have a budget. You have a wish list. What else should you be concerned with before making your purchase?

As a realtor, I have developed a go-to list of important considerations and questions that I use to help clients find their dream home *and* protect their investment. Think about how these questions apply to you as a buyer.

What is your budget for a house as well as for joining a club?

Do you want a public or private golf club?

What amenities in addition to golf are important to you—tennis, fitness, outdoor recreation, social activities?

What size home do you need?

Will you live in it full-time or part-time?

Where do you want your home to be located?

Will you be leasing out the house for any part of the year?

Once you get a handle on these questions and find viable options, it's time to do the necessary research. A good realtor should be able to guide you. One thing is certain: It is essential to know that the community and golf club are financially stable.

Meet with the club manager to find out how many golf members the club currently has *and* how many are on the resign list. Ask what the full membership number is and whether membership is refundable or non-refundable. Is there a trial membership program? You also want to know what the price of membership has been over the past five years, a good indication of stability or underlying problems. Find out if there have been any assessments to the membership in the past five years.

I tell my clients that a golf membership is a luxury and if you can't afford to lose that money, it's probably not for you.

You also want to know who, exactly, owns the golf course. Ask to play the course with a member—you'd be surprised how much information you can get just by doing that. A new question that also has to be addressed these days relates to water usage. What plans do the club and HOA have in place for water usage going forward? How are mandatory water restrictions being dealt with, for example?

It's important to understand that not all communities and clubs work the same way.



You'll want to know if membership in your desired club is tied to the sale of real estate, and exactly what is expected if you purchase a home in the community. What are the monthly fees, for example, and what do they cover? Is a social membership at the club included and is it mandatory? This is a common practice in resort communities to support club facilities and if that's not of interest to you, you may decide to look at a different community. Whatever the specific circumstances, it's important that you fully understand the budgets and feel confident that the community is financially stable. In addition, be sure to ask your realtor questions, as well, including what home values have been like in the community over several years. Find out who designed the golf courses in communities of interest to you. Homes in highly regarded communities with courses designed by well-know golf-course architects tend to hold their value better in a recession and appreciate more quickly in good times.

Finally, remember that the Coachella Valley is predominantly a second-home market, which tends to compute to a buyer's market. Don't let your emotions dissuade you from doing all the necessary research and asking your realtor for his or her guidance and expertise. Having an insider's understanding of the market is invaluable.

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

Superstar Chef in the Desert

The original celebrity chef is still finessing his culinary legacy

ears before food had its own network or celebrity chefs sparked the same hyper fandom traditionally reserved for movie stars, Chef Wolfgang Puck became a household name.

The sparkly-eyed, perpetually charming and dynamic Puck arrived in Los Angeles in 1975 as a self-admitted culinary refugee from Austria, who had grown bored of his home country's food. "At the time, Austria was only known for its clunky breaded wiener schnitzel," he says. "But I had worked in France and when I saw things like beef bourguignon and snails with garlic butter, I wanted to cook like that. That was exotic and inspiring to me."

In California, he found fancy Italian and French restaurants. But what really caught his eye were the parts of Los Angeles rich with different cultures, including Little Tokyo, Koreatown and Chinatown. Looking around, he realized the global market was changing and that his nationality didn't matter; he could cook whatever struck his fancy and in newly imaginative ways. His endless culinary curiosity and a peculiar knack for being ahead of his time quickly catapulted him into the public consciousness.

He became known for inventing the new California cuisine. His Chinese chicken salad was instantly famous, elevating a traditionally average dish to star status as the "It" salad of the '90s.

Today, the name Wolfgang Puck is synonymous with the best of restaurant





hospitality and the ultimate in all aspects of artful cuisine. He has built a brand that encompasses three companies: Wolfgang Puck Fine Dining Group, Wolfgang Puck Catering and Wolfgang Puck Worldwide, Inc.

The chefs first fine-dining venture began in 1982 with the opening of Spago in Los Angeles, and has since grown to over 26 locations that span six countries including the United States, United Kingdom and Singapore. He has successfully ventured into the frozen-food market with popular items such as pizza, and is constantly exploring innovations in the future offood and how we eat.

Puck first fell in love with the desert through his catering gigs at the home of renowned late producer Jerry Weintraub. This spurred him to bring Wolfgang Puck Pizza Bar to El Paseo. Recently, it transformed into WP Kitchen + Bar, Puck's newest restaurant concept serving globally influenced fare in a family-style format. Inspired by how the acclaimed chef dines and entertains at home, the menu boasts a seasonal offering of small plates, fresh salads, pizzas and handmade pastas as well as a variety of seafood, steak and other proteins. This includes the signature and scintillating smoked-salmon pizza.

What flavors are you currently exploring in your restaurants?

I am always trying new things! For example, in my Bel Air restaurant I have a chef who is from Guatemala whom I encourage to experiment with dishes with unique Latin flavors. I had a French baker come to Spago to train my cooks to make world-class bread. I am always asking my staff to play around with what they know and to introduce their individual specialty into the menu. But first and foremost, the key has always been to start out with the freshest ingredients and to experiment from there.

Do you eat at your own restaurants often?

Yes, a recent meal at CUT, my modern steakhouse in Beverly Hills, included a New York steak, a small apple salad and the eponymous chocolate soufflé.

Is it true that patrons at any of your restaurants can order wiener schnitzel off-menu? Yes.

You have blue chip artists in your restaurants, including John Baldessari gracing the walls of CUT and Ed Ruscha at Spago. Is art important to you?

Extremely. I was close to commissioning Andy Warhol to create marketing materials for Spago before he passed away. His art almost labeled my wine bottles. My wife Gelila has an amazing eye on the current pulse of the art world. She recently took me to visit Mark Bradford's studio in L.A.

I hear Gelila is also a great cook.

She is. My kids say her Bolognese is better than mine and it is true. I think that is because mom puts a lot more love into it.

What is your embarrassing food secret, a weakness?

I am a secret junk food king, but only high quality junk food like good chocolate, caramel, coffee and hazelnut. One of my sons only asks me for chocolate by the percentage of cocoa in a bar. Can you imagine a kid asking for a 70 percent bar?

What restaurants do you eat out at in L.A. when not at your own? I enjoy Angelini Osteria and Valentino.

Who have you employed or mentored through the years that you are proud of now?

Nancy Silverton of Mozza, Hiro Sone of Ame and Terra, Mitch Rosenthal, and Lee Hetner at Spago, whose dreams and ambitions match my own.

What do you do in your spare time?

I like tennis, skiing and reading biographies of great, talented people to discover what makes them tick.

What's next for you?

I will never retire totally. Right now, I am busy with my online cooking school where home cooks will be able to watch step-by-step instructions for easy 15-minute recipes.

Dining in the Desert Our Favorite "Ah! Fare

Coachella Valley restaurants serve up creative cuisine that makes you say, "Ahhhh."



pringtime in the desert means it's time to leave the house and head out on the town for your favorite "ah! fare." We've compiled a list of four stellar places conducive to celebrating the best seasonal food in the valley. Upon arriving at **Jillian's (**74155 El Paseo, Palm Desert, 760.776.8242), you enter through magnificent wrought-iron gates into an enchanting garden. This the perfect place to relax, listening to nightly live music while enjoying a drink in front of the fireplace under a starlit sky.

Start off with a tower of fresh crab. Chunks of Dungeness meat are layered between diced avocado, sweet tomato and toasted brioche. Follow that up with the rack of Dijon herb-crusted Colorado lamb roasted and presented on a fresh rosemary-scented demi glace. If there's room, top it off with luscious blueberry cheesecake, spiked with a hint of citrus in a crisp almond crust. Those seeking lighter fare can enjoy seasonal dishes such as fresh halibut sautéed in caper sauce or the Shady Lady salad of mozzarella, slivered red onion, basil and toasted pine nuts drizzled with a balsamic vinegar and extra virgin olive oil glaze. All of these options pair well with the Blue Maggie Martini, expertly made with coconut rum, blue curacao, pineapple juice and sweet and sour.

Each summer the Trubee family, which includes proprietors June and Jay and their daughters Jillian and Mackenzie, travel to Nantucket in search of new ideas to keep their restaurant interesting. During the fishing season, Chef Trubee prepares Nantucket scallops flown in overnight. He is also responsible for the restaurant's extensive wine list. All pastas, breads and desserts are made fresh in-house daily.

Jillian's has earned many accolades, including a feature in *Gourmet* magazine and *The Wine Spectator* Award of Excellence since 1994. Open Table has included Jillian's in the Top 100 Most Romantic Restaurants in America for 2016. *jilliansfinedining.com*





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


Over at the Plaza at Point Happy, **Okura Robata Grill & Sushi Bar** (78370 Hwy 111 #150, La Quinta, 760.564.5820) is known for its chic and lounge-like atmosphere. It's a destination for a night out with friends or a date, but perfect for the whole family, too.

Executive Chef Jin Heo's specialty lies in creating dishes that are a fusion of traditional Japanese cuisine with contemporary Italian flair. For springtime, customers may enjoy hamachi carpaccio with yuzu dressing and wasabi Caesar or sunomono (cucumber) salads followed by the esteemed green tea panna cotta dessert. Okura is also well known for sushi rolls, including the James Dean and Marilyn Monroe. Waist-watching folks will love the protein roll, which is rice-less and wrapped in soy paper. Wash your meal down with a geisha girl or lychee martini.

For those seeking delectable fish, Heo offers exquisite black cod and Atlantic salmon as well as high quality sashimi. According to Heo, there is a real difference between choice and prime cuts of steak and the same can be said for fish.

An additional special feature of the menu is the robata skewer, which is cooked via the centuries-old method of grilling



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
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
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Another place to find fine fish is **Pacifica Seafood Restaurant (**73505 El Paseo, Palm Desert, 760.674.8666), a popular local's hangout for casual fine dining. Chef Luis Zamora is known for his seafood creations, such as sugar-spiced salmon with Chinese beans, mustard sauce and garlic mashed potatoes. You can start with the baked scallops on the half shell and end with Pacifica ice cream pie with macadamia nut ice cream, oreo cookie crust, chocolate sauce and whipped cream.






If you're in the mood for a touch of Europe and people watching from a patio on legendary Palm Canyon Drive, head to famous French bistro Pomme Frite (256 S Palm Canyon Dr., Palm Springs, 760.778.3727). 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

Ford takes on the World's Elite Automakers

Move over Ferrari-Ford has ripped into your territory at top speed



hen the world thinks super car, names such as Ferrari and Bugatti come to the collective mind. But Ford wants in on the action and has gone all in with the redesign of the Ford GT.

When Ford rolled the GT prototype onto the floor of the Detroit Auto Show, industry media applauded. Ford hasn't set the pace for sports-car innovation in years, but the GT has put Ford back on pace to turn the heads of an audience that wants to compete with international automakers.

Ford will only produce 250 GT's in 2017, and it will vet every owner based on such criteria as presence on social media and how often the car will see road time.

One look at the GT and you'll move mountains to get on that list. The teardrop shape puts curves and aerodynamic features in all the right places. The razor's edge bumper cuts through hearts as easily as it does the air. The monster side air intakes behind the door feed the engine all the oxygen it needs while looking great, and the mid-mounted engine is seen through the rear glass and puts the weight exactly where you want it.

It won't surprise anyone that the GT will go toe-to-toe with Ferrari. Its shape and features are similar. Lead designer Moray Callum came over to Ford from Ghia, where he worked on the Aston Martin Lagonda Vignale. The Scot was charged with revitalizing Mazda before getting pulled into work on Ford's modernization.

The GT is a sneaky powerhouse. Most cars in this class will have 10 or more cylinders with 500 horsepower. The GT gets more than 600 horses out of a twin-turbocharged V6. The 3.5 Liter Ford EcoBoost is the same engine as in the F-150—but an all-carbon frame makes the GT's payload featherweight compared to the big truck. This pairing of lightweight body and a firecracker engine has put Ford back in contention on the professional racing circuit.

The GT's seven-speed automatic transmission has a dual clutch for feather-like shifting, and the rear spoiler deploys based on driver response and speed. With bona fide supercar credentials under the hood, the GT takes the role seriously in its suspension as well. The new chassis is paired to the frame by a torsion bar and pushrod

suspension that can adjust ride height. The 20-inch wheels get custom Michelins featuring a unique compound and structure designed specifically for the Ford GT.

Though Ford has not yet released the car's top-speed numbers, you can expect something north of 200 mph. The front



canopy is slender, which reduces drag. The two-seat cockpit is made more dynamic by the addition of scissor, Lambo-style doors. This American supercar has all the features to put it on the international stage, and its recipe for its success hinges on a power-toweight ratio that is second to none.

An aluminum frame underpins the carbon-fiber body panels, and even the cockpit seats are carbon fiber and shave pounds to lower weight. Ford created a windshield out of high-tech Corning Gorilla Glass, which shaved more than 12 pounds off while increasing strength. In

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fact, to demonstrate just how strong it is, Ford engineers loaded a cannon with a 1.75-inch hail ball and fired it at 55 m.p.h. into a piece of Gorilla Glass. The result: no damage. The instrument panel is entirely digital, making it customizable for various drivers and driving conditions. The software for the GT is an upgrade as well; the car's computer is able to process 300 mb of data per second. Sport, track and wet modes allow drivers to dial in performance as well as comfort.

Ford has put its reputation on the line by entering the market for exotics. Rumors have retail at \$400,000 for the GT, which should hit roads in late 2016. If you want to be one of the 250 buyers of this headturning super car, you'll have to start your application at *Ford.com*. If you make the cut, you'll complete your purchase through an authorized GT dealer.

orn in Laguna Beach, California, known for its artistic community, nine-year-old Kristy Swanson begged her school-teacher parents to take her to Hollywood. She dreamed of becoming a movie star.

She made good on her plans. By the age of 13 she had more than 30 commercials to her credit and had been signed to her first television series, Dreamfinders, for the Disney Channel. The owner of El Paseo Jewelers has done it all

Rilliant and multifaceted, the man is a lot like his diamonds. Going strong in the diamond trade for 42 years and counting, Raju Mehta has solidified his reputation as a premier jeweler through business acumen, volumes of experience and sheer hard work. The owner of El Paseo Jewelers drives 100 miles each way every day to and from his home in Walnut, California, to bring passion and purpose to his establishment as well as to the community.

Last fall the store moved from its previous location across the street on El Paseo, doubling its space to 2,200 feet and capturing an even more visible position by occupying the space next door to Starbuck's.

Born in Palanpur, India, Mehta was indoctrinated into the family diamond business early on. After finishing high school and college, he began work at the family's diamond-cutting factory. Despite his insider status, there was no nepotism or special treatment conferred upon this young worker; he was expected to fetch coffee, tea and cigarettes for the more senior workers. Yet the experience gave him an in-depth education about every aspect of buying and selling rough diamonds. He then expanded his expertise to include polishing as well as mass production of diamonds.

In 1983, Mehta made the move to the United States, joining his brother Pravin, a diamond dealer in New York, and another brother, a jewelry manufacturer in Stamford, Connecticut. After briefly trying his hand as a travel agent, Mehta joined yet another brother, this time in Los Angeles, and, yes, also in the jewelry industry.

By 1997 the brothers were employing 200 people, successfully importing diamonds from India and selling them to retailers, wholesalers and manufacturers. In 1998 Mehta acquired his store in Palm Desert, where he discovered he was able to sell stones at a lower price by retailing directly to the public. He began to experiment selling higher quality merchandise and bigger pieces and noticed a spike in sales.


In 2007, Mehta moved his business to the desert. Sticking with the formula of higher quality and bigger pieces at favorable prices, he upgraded his entire inventory and was able to catapult his enterprise to a higher level.

Today, El Paseo Jewelers is considered an elite jeweler with great price points and outstanding customer service. Making his customers happy is of foremost importance to Mehta, who has welcomed new and returning clientele from 20 countries.

Observing Mehta in action is a testimony to his insistence on exceptional service. He has 16 closed circuit cameras positioned to capture every angle of the store. During our interview, Mehta sprang into action when he noticed a couple enter the front door. He spent close to 30 minutes personally assisting them, holding up a mirror and fixing clasps. His attentiveness resulted in their purchase of a pair of \$60,000 diamond earrings. He sweetened the deal by offering them complimentary seats in his suite at the upcoming BNP Paribas Open or at Fashion Week El Paseo shows and parties.

Support of charity is a priority for Mehta. For the past five years, he has regularly supported the two events mentioned above, as well as Desert Symphony, Women's Day at the CareerBuilder Challenge golf tournament and many others.

Although Mehta's life and work are dominated by all things diamond, he is also extremely fashion conscious. He finds time for play through such activities as attending Lakers games, reading, and playing Sudoku. He even managed to squeeze in two vacations



last year. In addition to traveling to Thailand, he and his wife, a professor of cybersecurity and Java programming language, deposited their two scholarly daughters at their respective new homes in England: the University of Essex in Colchester and Queen Mary University in London.

Mehta's deep connections within the jewelry industry help keep his store at the cutting edge. With brothers in New York and Los Angeles and nephews in India, Mehta can acquire unique gems and pieces that many sellers cannot, especially since 92 percent of cut and polished diamonds originate in India. He considers his large inventory to be a strength, which ensures prompt turnaround time for customers.

His philosophy that customer service is paramount is reflected in his careful selection of staff, including five salespersons and two jewelers. He emphasizes the personal aspect of retail as opposed to wholesale, where there is very little emotion attached. Mehta points out that he has a large patronage that simply won't go anywhere else. Many customers return time and time again, and Mehta has favorite stories, including about the 102-year-old gentleman who bought a diamond for his 83-year-old girlfriend, and the couple in their eighties who became engaged right inside the store.

Having worked with diamonds all his life, Mehta says he is partial to the stone, even though El Paseo Jewelers also has a spectacular selection of custom-designed pieces and colored gems. He considers diamonds, which have been known since antiquity as a 'stone of invincibility,' to be a lifeline.


In reflecting on his experience and his love of his trade, Mehta says, "Throughout the different stages of my life and career, I've done it all. I've worked with rough diamonds, polished diamonds and cut diamonds, with manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers. I've even sold diamonds by staying up on TV all night."

He acknowledges that times change and, as such, he's now made his foray into the world of online marketing, which he anticipates will gain momentum in the desert.

Whichever marketing medium or business plan he devises, it's clear that in the life of Raju Mehta, diamonds are forever.

Mikimoto and Hermes Harnessing the past for modern day designs



hroughout history, societal influences including war, political power, education, superstition, the discovery of metals and other raw materials, trade, transportation and even the Industrial Revolution have impacted the ways humans wear, and express themselves through, jewelry.

For the most part, the prehistoric eras and ancient civilizations of Egypt, Mesopotamia, India and China are responsible for creating the foundation for jewelry designs that adorn us in the present day and from which modern designers still draw.

MIKIMOTO

Watching the pearl divers of Ise, Japan, unloading their treasures at the shore when he was a child launched Kokichi Mikimoto's fascination with pearls. In 1893, he created the first hemispherical cultured pearl, and 12 years later he succeeded in creating completely spherical pearls that eventually allowed his business to flourish around the world.

Today, the name Mikimoto is synonymous with pearls. The Mikimoto Diamond and Akoya Cultured Pearl Stud Earrings are delicate and refined. They feature exquisite 8mm Akoya pearls (color G and clarity VS2) surrounded by pavé-set diamonds (.16 tcw) and set in 18K white gold. These radiant, handcrafted earrings close with a post back and are available for \$2,400. The slight pinwheel shape of the white-gold settings gives an illusion of movement.

For a subtler look, the Mikimoto Akoya Pearl Earrings feature petite 18K white gold hoops with a half-inch drop and grade A+ Akoya pearls, measuring 6.5mm and finished by a hinge with a snap-post closure. The pair sells for \$1,150.

The Mikimoto Pearl Necklace presents a single strand of Grade A1 cultured Akoya pearls, 7mm each and measuring 18 inches. This classic accessory is universally accepted as the one item that instantly upgrades any ensemble, perfect for a cocktail party or installation as board of directors chair. It is accented with a small M logo charm that rests at the back of the neck, near the beautifully detailed clasp. The necklace retails for \$3,750.

Another power piece on multiple levels is the Mikimoto Akoya Pearl and Diamond Pendant Necklace, with petal inspired stations harboring bright, roundcut diamonds (0.09 tcw) and surrounding the star-of-the-show pearl measuring 7.5mm (color G and clarity VS). The 18inch, handcrafted 18K white-gold necklace has a 5/8-inch pendant drop and retails for \$1,650.

The Mikimoto company has been ranked as one of the world's most respected luxury brands by *Women's Wear Daily*, and it remains the standard bearer for pearl jewelry, steeped in history and admiration.



HERMÈS

Capturing the history of a dramatically different way of life, Hermès of Paris, established in 1937, began as a harness workshop for noblemen in the Grands Boulevards quarter of Paris. In 1880 it moved to 24 Rue du Faubourg Saint-Honore, where it remains to this day. In its early days, the company catered to the elite of Europe, Russia, Asia and the Americas. Recognized by its horse-and-carriage logo and signature orange boxes developed in the 1950s, today the luxury brand is best known for its iconic silk scarves and purses, such as the Kelly and the Birkin, introduced in the 1930s, and for silk ties, a perfume line and fine jewelry, brought about in 1949-50.

The Hermès Chaine d'Ancre Enchainée is a shiny pendant of interlocking 18K rose-gold links accented with one sparkling diamond (0.04tcw) at the very bottom. The attached chain adjusts from 15.4 inches to 16.1 inches and has a price tag of \$3,500.

Staying with this motif, the Hermès Chaine d'Ancre Enchainée earrings are crafted with 18K rose gold, displaying a hoop contour with a prominent link along the front. Each has one diamond dangling at the bottom (0.07 tcw). This pair of earrings is sold for \$3,650. Hermès' integration of diamonds acknowledges the belief by the ancient Greeks -- for which Hermès was the god of travel, trade and hospitality -- that diamonds were broken pieces of stars fallen to earth, imbued with magical and protective properties. Taking the theme to the max, the Alchimie Hermès bracelet is a spectacular work of 18K rose gold adorned with 568 diamonds interspersed throughout (4.71 tcw) the simulated gold "strap" that appears to wrap around the wrist. The small version measures 1.9 inches in diameter and is priced at \$118,400.

Ratcheting the glam back down to earthly proportions, the Hermès Collier de Chien (Dog Collar, en francais) double tour bracelet in 18K rose gold gleams with 125 diamonds (.79 tcw) that appear in square stations along the surface of the bracelet as well as connecting strips for the lustrous links. The small version of this bracelet also measures 1.9 inches around and sells for \$40,900.

The Hermès Kelly ring synchronizes well with both bracelets, showcasing a single gold "strap" that seems to fasten around the finger, encrusted with 83 dazzling little diamonds (.65 tcw) set in smooth 18K rose gold and accented with a decorative gold buckle. This piece is available for \$12,700.

The Hermès Vulcain earrings introduce a more angular approach, with dangling diagonals of 18K rose gold hanging from petite chains that connect with the same miniaturized shapes resting on the earlobes. The diagonal motif is repeated again at the tip of each earring, with a sweet little diamond (.14tcw) that sways ever so gently as its owner moves about. These earrings retail for \$6,800.

We are encouraged to live for today; however, in the world of jewelry it's nice to know we can do so in the context of rich and resplendent design history.
