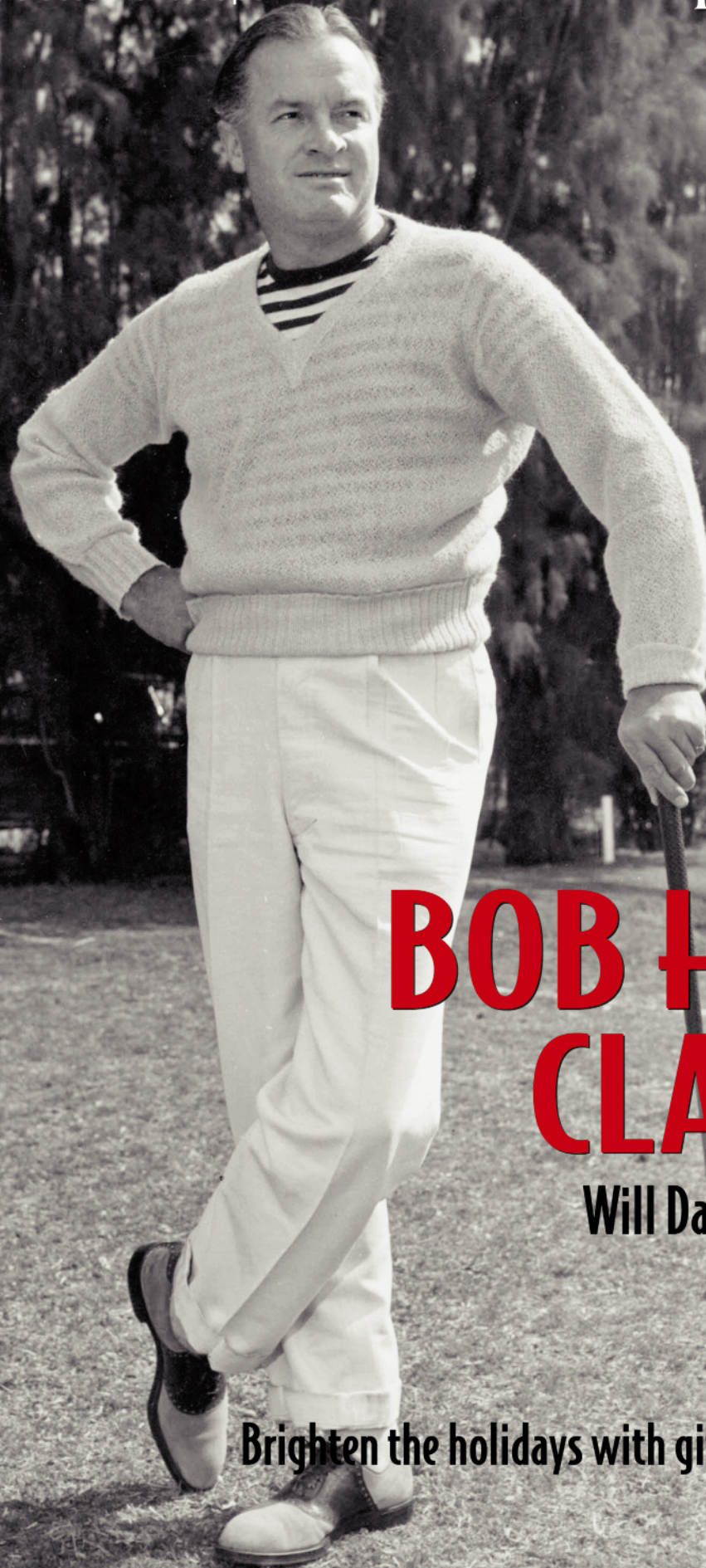

The 2011

Bob Hope Classic

Will Dazzle the Desert

*"Stories of our demise have been greatly exaggerated."
Larry O. Thiel, Tournament Chairman, Bob Hope Classic*

The statement above originally appeared in a telegram, written by Ernest Hemingway, whose death had been wrongly reported by numerous publications. While Hemingway's tone was characteristically wry and sardonic, Larry Thiel's attitude is one of pure optimism and delight.

"I feel very good about where we are right now," says Thiel, in anticipation of the 52nd Bob Hope Classic Tournament, which opens January 17, 2011. "Our continued and long-term presence in the Coachella Valley will be phenomenal."

While the Classic has earned a reputation for drawing a jaw-dropping contingent of professional athletes and celebrities to its fairways and greens, the energy that fuels the event comes from a deeper place — an unwavering dedication to the community in which the tournament takes place. Since its inception in 1960, the Classic has raised nearly \$49 million for local charities. Last year alone the event raised \$1.7 million, all of which was allocated to Coachella Valley non-profit organizations. While organizers prefer not to project future earnings (they don't set limits, and they strive only to host the best and most meaningful event that talent, passion and hard work will allow), they expect to make a similar contribution to the Valley as a result of the 2011 Tournament.

"Bob Hope's priorities were entertainment and charity," explains Thiel. "And golf was the vehicle which helped him pursue those interests."

Among the Bob Hope Classic beneficiaries, the Eisenhower Medical Center ranks first and foremost. From his initial involvement with the tournament, Bob Hope pursued an ongoing commitment to the hospital that was named for his friend and hero, Dwight D. Eisenhower. Hope wanted to create a "tournament that builds hospitals."

In addition to Eisenhower, the Classic supports between 30 and 40 other local charities, most benefitting Coachella Valley youth. By contributing to local youth organizations, the tournament helps to enhance family life in the Valley and foster a healthy and vibrant network among visitors and residents.

But the positive impact of the Bob Hope Classic extends far beyond the Valley. In January of 2011, as in years past, this beloved event will be seen in 225 countries and viewed in more than 580 million households. The benefit to the Palm Springs resort region of such massive exposure is immeasurable. In addition to stimulating the local economy by bringing a flurry of business to hotels, restaurants, retail and recreational outlets, world-class televised events like the fabled Bob Hope Classic entice countless tourists and prospective residents to visit the desert. It's become an axiom of the desert's powerful allure: if you show them, they will come.

Originally named the Palm Springs Golf Classic, the tournament emerged out of the Thunderbird Invitational, an event that was held from 1954 to 1959. The Bob Hope Classic, then and now, offers a unique format for participants, including play on four Valley courses over a five-day period. During the earliest years the tournament was played at Thunderbird Country Club and Tamarisk Country Club in Rancho Mirage, Bermuda Dunes Country Club in Bermuda Dunes and Indian Wells

Country Club, in (yes) Indian Wells. Other Tournament locations have included Eldorado Country Club, La Quinta Country Club, Indian Ridge Country Club, Classic Club in Palm Desert and, of course, the Arnold Palmer course at PGA West.

This year the action will again unfold on four of the Coachella Valley's most spectacular golf courses. SilverRock Resort, in the heart of the La Quinta Cove and surrounded by the warm embrace of the Santa Rosa Mountains, sprawls across 525 acres of some of the last available golf property in the area. The fabled La Quinta Country Club was established in 1959 and since then has been known to the golfing community — and desert lovers, in general — as the "Jewel of the Desert." The Jack Nicklaus Private Course at PGA West is often referred to as the finest player's course in the Coachella Valley. The layout offers tremendous variety and a drop-dead gorgeous setting that seduces golfers and observers alike. Finally the Palmer Private Course, also located at PGA West, was designed by the master himself with the intention of creating a course for maximum enjoyment. These courses provide the stage for the great drama of the 2011 Bob Hope Classic.

The landscape and layouts of the tournament courses are beautiful, challenging and iconic. But the people who participate in the Classic every year really infuse the event with its incomparable glamour and excitement. It's hardly a coincidence

that Arnold Palmer not only won the first Hope but also thoroughly dominated the field during the Classic's inaugural year of 1960. That year Palmer also won the U.S. Open in dramatic fashion, and catapulted into the national consciousness as "The King" of the game. Palmer went on to win the Bob Hope Classic two more times, and finished as runner-up twice in the decade following his initial victory. The nation was finally, suddenly smitten with the game of golf.

The list of Bob Hope Classic champions includes many of the great names in golf: Johnny Miller, Bruce Lietzke, Lanny Wadkins, Craig Stadler, Ed Fiori, Donnie Hammond, Jesper Parnevik, Joe Durant. In 2010, in spite of killer rains and delayed play, Bill Haas, son of Jay Haas who claimed the championship in 1988, took home the purse and the prize. This year Haas Jr. will defend his title against another roster of premiere athletes.

In addition to elite members of the PGA circuit, other great athletes and a dazzling array of celebrities have traditionally lit up the golf courses and the community during the Bob Hope Classic. The roster of Classic participants is as star-studded as the desert sky at night and includes: Frank Sinatra, Jack Benny, Sammy Davis, Jr., Dean Martin, Willie Mays, Joe Louis, Alice Cooper, Dr. Phil McGraw, Kurt Russell, Don Cheadle, Kevin Costner, Clint Eastwood, Andy Garcia, Matthew McConaughey, George Lopez, Bill Murray, Mark Wahlberg and Luke Wilson—to name just a few.

As this article goes to press, organizers of the 2011 Bob Hope Classic perch on the cusp of several significant announcements. The roster of PGA participants, the list of participating celebrities and the revelation of important new

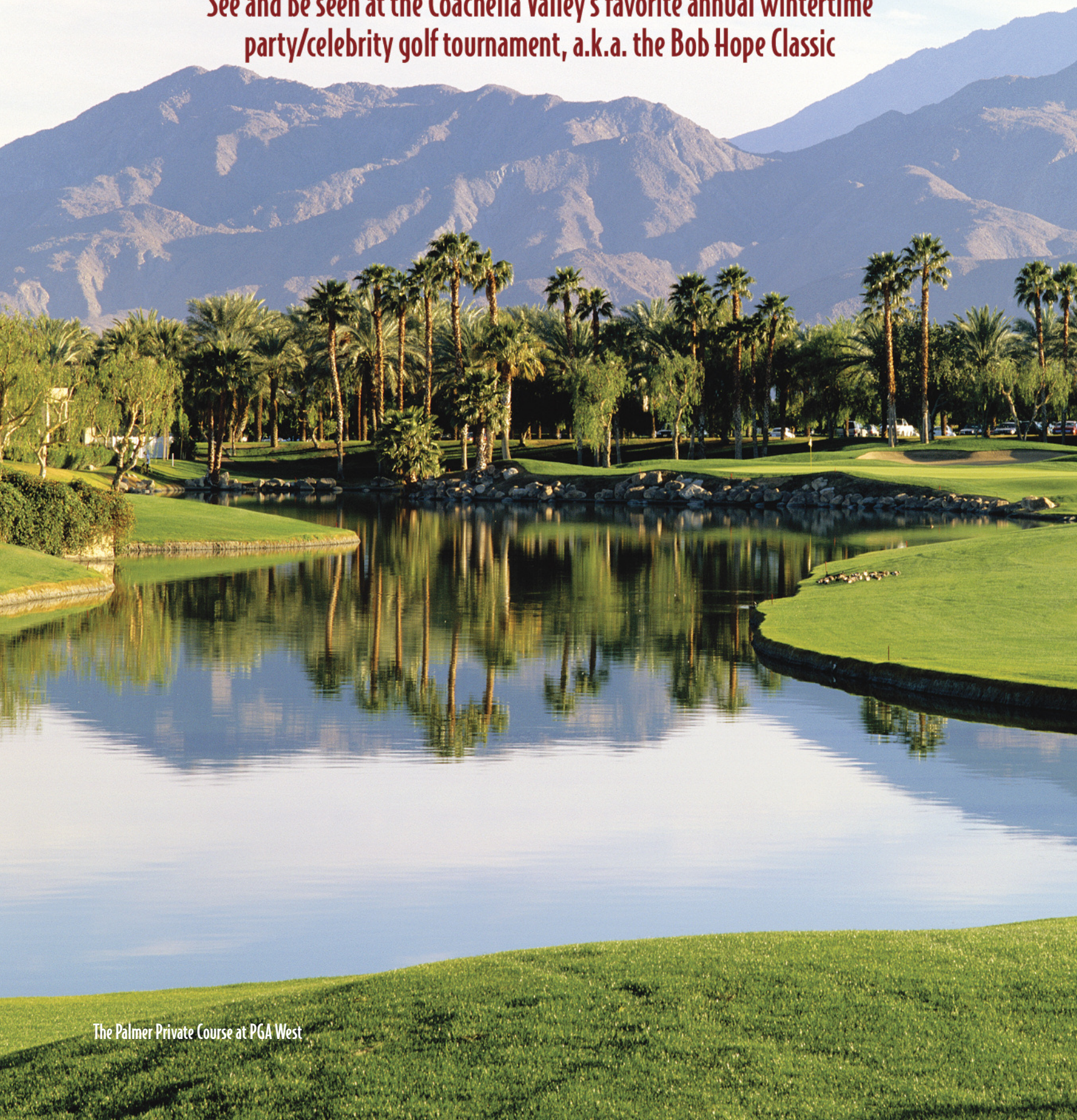

Every big city has its week of electricity. Dallas hosts the Oklahoma-Texas football game, the Boston Marathon grips that city with running fever and Los Angeles, of course, has the Academy Awards. In the Coachella Valley, while there are actually several events to choose from, the main electric event comes when the PGA Tour rolls into town for the annual Bob Hope Classic.

It makes sense, doesn't it? The Coachella Valley and golf are synonymous, and a large part of that branding package was and is the Hope itself. It follows, therefore, that the entire valley will have on its best party finery in January, as has been the tradition since the late 1950s.

The buzz that Hope week brings to the valley actually gives golf fans a bonus. As a top-tier celebrity event, fans aren't just pulling for Bubba Watson to set a new course record as he did at SilverRock; they're also pulling for television, movie and sports stars to find the fairway or hole that putt. And as the tour's only five-round celebrity pro-am, fans who make the trek to the desert get one extra day of golf and star-power for their weeklong grounds pass.

This year's event is scheduled for January 17-23. The course rotation remains the same for the second-straight year, with all the courses being contained within the city of La Quinta. The Palmer Private Course at PGA West is the de facto headquarters



for the tournament, with the main grandstands and media center. The majority of on-course retailers, bars and open-air restaurants will also be here creating their concoctions in a carnival-type atmosphere. That doesn't mean there won't be plenty of food and drink offerings at SilverRock, La Quinta Country Club and the PGA West Nicklaus Private Course; all of the courses are

prepared for throngs of thirsty, ravenous golf fans. SilverRock will also host a pre-tournament Demo Day this year, allowing fans to get hands-on experience with some of the industry's hottest equipment.

Once again this year, the Palmer Private Course will feature its "party hole," the short and picturesque par-3 No. 17. Tournament officials plan a variety of competitions that include players, celebrities and fans in an attempt to create a lively atmosphere in a cozy setting. Think TPC Scottsdale No. 16, executed with a twist of Coachella Valley cool. Celebrities, of course, play the first four days of the tournament before yielding to the pros for Sunday's final round.

This year, celebs will follow the same rotation schedule as in 2009, playing SilverRock on Wed., Jan. 19, before moving to La Quinta CC on Thursday, the Nicklaus Private Course on Friday, and the Palmer Private on Saturday. That said, longtime Hope patrons know that the best way to get close to players and celebs is to arrive early in the week to catch Tuesday's practice rounds. The Hope being what it is, often times the players and amateurs are quite loose and

accessible on Tuesday, ready to mingle with galleries or to conduct sudden-yet-brief autograph sessions.

Of course, a different type of current flows through the valley after the day's final putt has been holed. Twilight settles on the desert, the lights on the valley floor and in the hills above begin to


flicker and swizzle sticks begin to massage libations valley-wide. The choice of bars, restaurants and clubs can literally be overwhelming, particularly when the entire valley is under consideration. However, the likelihood of seeing players, celebrities or celebrity caddies (partying with the caddies is

Through the Eyes of **Two Scotsmen**

Two desert artists use different mediums to interpret what is
beautiful and distinct about the game of golf

Golf as we know it today originated from a game played on the eastern coast of Scotland in the Kingdom of Fife during the 15th century. Players would hit a pebble around a natural course of sand dunes, rabbit runs and tracks using a stick or primitive club. There are golfers who still might consider the equipment a stick or primitive club, but ask about a golf course and no two descriptions are alike.

Through the ages, golf courses have been depicted and documented on parchment and canvas, and today artist images of famous courses are still being created. Coachella Valley residents Graeme Baxter and Brian Morgan are arguably the most sought after golf course artists of our generation. Like the game itself, each of these artists was born in Scotland, and each is nationally recognized for his talent in making courses come to life within a frame. Though the subjects may be the same, the techniques the two employ are completely different.

Baxter surrounds himself with paints, brushes and canvas while Morgan prefers an assortment of cameras with just as many lenses. Regardless of their method of choice, Baxter and Morgan's presentations of golf courses are displayed in prestigious country clubs and billion-dollar company headquarters, as well as in the homes of discreet collectors, professional golfers and celebrities around the world.

Commissioned by Rolex for the 2011 Masters, Baxter has long dominated the art and collector's world of golf course landscapes and tournament images. He is the official artist for the British Open, Ryder Cup, President's Cup, U.S. Open and Masters, as well as for the PGA and European tours. He has also been the official artist for the World Golf Championships, Solheim Cup of Europe and Bob Hope Classic. His paintings hang in famous clubhouses

he truly loves. When asked to describe his life in one sentence, a huge smile appears on his face. "WOW!" he bursts with gusto.

Point and click — if only it were that easy! Meet golf-course photographer Brian Morgan, whose famous images include the photo seen around the world of Jack Nicklaus holing an eagle putt to win the 1987 Masters. So which came first for this Scottish-born lens man—golf or photography?

"I was playing golf at 12 years old, I started taking pictures at 13 and was hired as a professional wedding photographer by 15," he says.

Morgan spent several years working as a sports photographer for Scotland's largest newspaper, the *Daily Record*. Accomplished and well regarded, he photographed his first (British) Open Championship in 1965. It became his professional goal to cover only golf tournaments and courses rather than general sports.

His dream became reality after he moved to the United States in 1980. Already working for *Golf Digest* and *Golf Magazine*, he discovered he could make a



surprise that the artist's work is exported and known around the world. A painter since childhood, Baxter's masterpieces come to life with the use of oils and a special type of canvas found only in England. It is his uncanny knack for capturing a course's physical details that impresses art collectors and golfers worldwide.

"Once I find the heart of the golf course, that is where my painting is born," Baxter explains. "Detail to the actual image and the use of different colors are important to me. If there is a sailboat and the seas are calm, I won't make the seas rough and put the sails up on the boat; the painting is produced from what I see before me."

The accuracy of the detail is so important to the artist in part because he sees his work as having historical importance; it provides a reference for future generations looking back on unique venues and milestones in golf. To his great credit, his work has become a standard by which others in his field are judged.

Palm Desert, Calif., is where you'll find Baxter's U.S. showroom and the artist himself in front of his current painting. "I love Palm Desert," he says with his Scottish lilt. "It's not too big so people can get to know each other and it is famous for golf, which I enjoy playing."



Baxter lives with his wife, Lorna, and their 14-year-old daughter Amelia on a five-acre ranch in Garner Valley. "Every day we all drive down the mountain together. Amelia goes to school in Palm Desert and Lorna and I spend the day at the showroom."

Very generous to local charities, Baxter considers himself fortunate to have a career

living shooting tournaments. Having established himself in the States, he then took his portfolio to Jack Nicklaus, who had recently started a golf course design company. Nicklaus hired Morgan to shoot the just completed Shoal Creek Golf Club in Birmingham, Ala. It was a serendipitous assignment. Morgan went on to photograph the first 60 Nicklaus-designed golf courses.

Morgan's work has been seen in galleries, on billboards, tournament exhibits and on the cover of books. He says he has taken over half a million images and photographed courses in more than 60 countries. It's an astounding and impressive resume for the Palm Desert resident, now in his 60s.

"I've covered 17 Masters, 46 British Opens, and many, many other golf events on the tour. I came [to California] in the early 80s to cover the Bob Hope Classic and fell in love with the desert," he recalls.

In high demand, Morgan continues to do what he loves. "I just finished some work for Donald Trump," the photographer says. "Mar-a-Lago is amazing. Trump is a master at taking courses that aren't doing so well and making them successful once again."

The industry is changing and the days of shooting film will soon be relegated to a bygone era. These days photographers work in a digital industry, and Morgan is currently in the process of cataloging and digitalizing over 400,000 slides.

As it has throughout his career, the game of golf continues to be part of Morgan's life. He has been fortunate to be

Each year, staff members of *Desert Golf Magazine* keep their collective fingers on the pulse of the golf industry in America's desert region. We interview club managers and directors of golf; we keep tabs on improvements and changes at courses across the region; we check out new courses that open and send writers and reporters to find out what's happening at new clubs as well as longtime favorites. We talk to PGA Tour professionals about their favorite tournament courses, and interview savvy amateurs who regularly compete on the desert's championship golf courses during charity events. Many of us go out and play the courses ourselves, because there's no better way to evaluate a layout than by teeing up and experiencing it firsthand, from the first tee to the final green. With that in mind, the editors of *Desert Golf Magazine* present the 14th annual Best of the Desert, the region's Top 10 courses in three categories: Private, public and resort. Our picks are divided into three geographical areas: the deserts of California, Arizona and Nevada.

For many readers, it's the public course category that matters most. These are the courses open to all — and it's a mistake to think they are anything less than superb. Two of the courses rank No.1 for the third year running, and one, Desert Willow, Firecliff, moves from No.2 to this year's No.1 public course in the Coachella Valley. The city of Palm Desert is justifiably proud of its premier course designed by Hurdzan/Frye. The 7,056-yard layout is a true test of skills: extensive natural areas to play around, numerous water features and 100-plus bunkers—all created with protection of the environment and maximum enjoyment of players in mind. Boulder City, Nevada's Cascata is a desert beauty set into dramatic red-rock terrain. It's our pick for Nevada's No.1 public course, and no amenity is lacking. In Arizona, it's no surprise that a course in Scottsdale, Arizona's most renowned golf town, received top honors. Again. Saguaro at We-Ko-Pa is the cream of the crop, and if you have not yet played this Bill Coore/Ben Crenshaw public beauty, put it on your list.

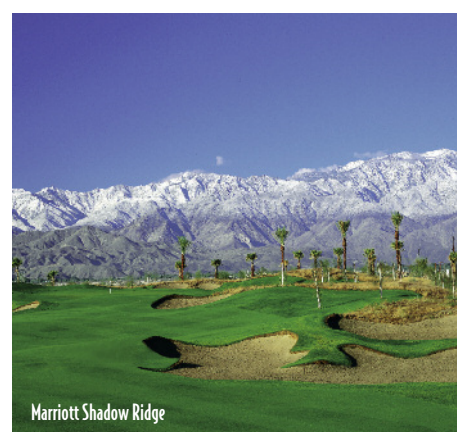

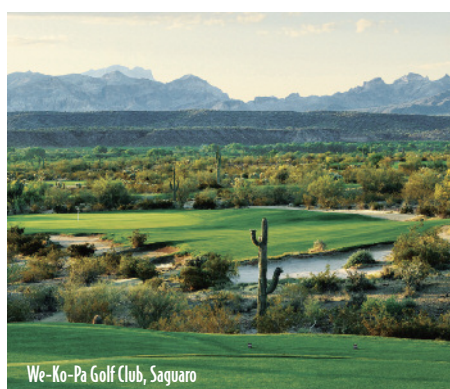

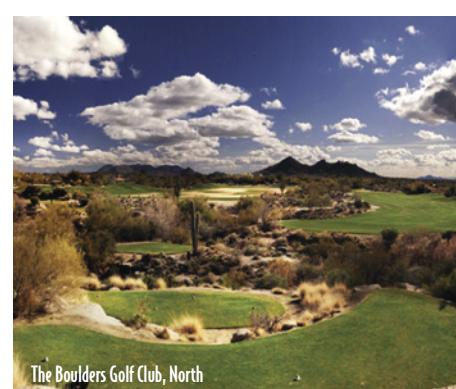

The Forgotten Fundamentals

Learn how to solve putting problems with two easy alignment adjustments

Over the years I have tried to keep my instructional facilities in California and Colorado up to date with the very latest instructional technology. Bighorn's new Learning Center complex is no different. Inside we have conglomerated the very best computer, video and motion-analysis systems in the industry in order to help golfers improve at any level or age. In using these contemporary teaching tools, I have discovered "putting's forgotten fundamentals." Become familiar with these fundamentals, make the necessary adjustments and I believe you will cure your putting woes once and for all!

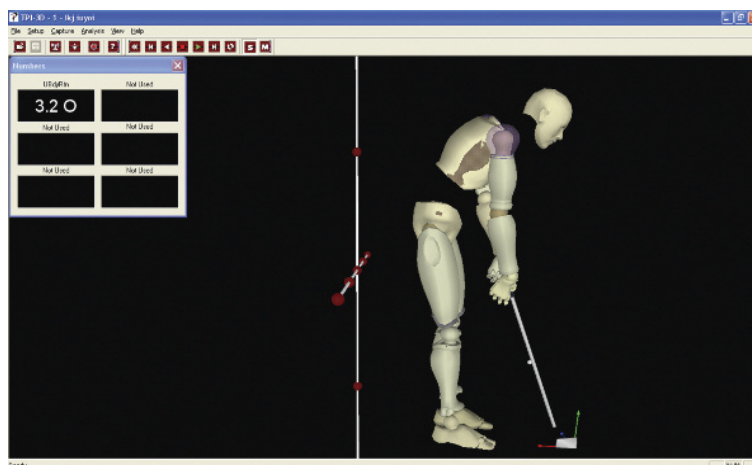


The Key for Consistent Putting Strokes – Your "Flow lines"

Research with the SAM Puttlab, once available only for Tour pros, shows that in order to have a more consistent putting stroke, your body's "flow lines" must be parallel to one another. Whenever these flow lines point in different directions, putting becomes harder than it should be. There are two factors that typically influence the interruption of flow lines.

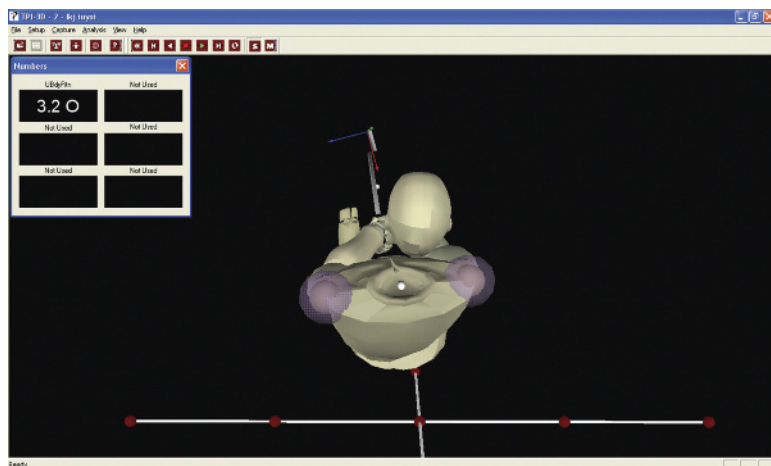
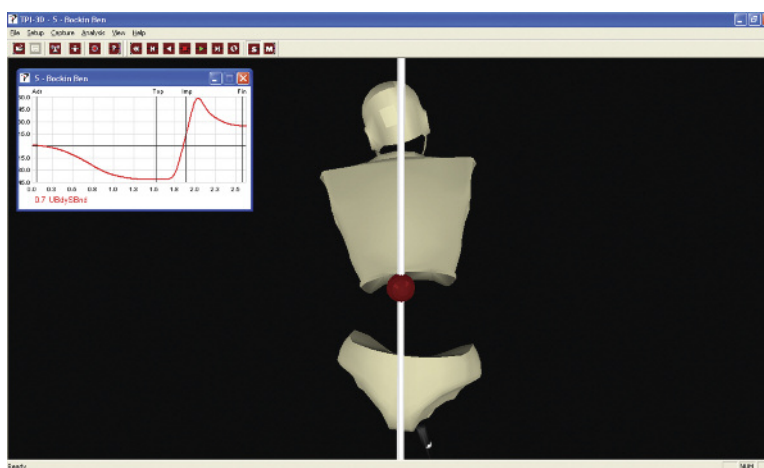
Alignment Issue Number One – The “High” Rear Forearm

Whenever you see a player whose rear forearm is too high at address, you will also see an inconsistent stroke path — one that tends to move out to in. Here’s why: The putter shaft tends to follow the actions of your shoulders, which are impacted by the high rear forearm. When your rear forearm is too high, the shoulders usually align themselves open (3.2 degrees in the above example) or point to the left of your target line (for the righthanded player.) It is this that influences the incorrect putter path.



Alignment Issue Number Two – Your Spine’s Lateral Bending

The second most common alignment issue that interrupts your body’s proper flow lines at address is the lateral bending of your spine. When your spine leans too much toward the target it tends to influence the alignment of your shoulders as well.



As your spine bends toward the target or pin, this not only opens your shoulders but also raises your right forearm.

The Solution

You must pay attention to two alignment issues at address in order to ensure that your flow lines are consistent and accurate.

1. Your spine must be centered over the top of your hip, not leaning excessively one way or the other.
2. Your feet, knees, hips, forearms and shoulders must all be parallel to your ball's target line.

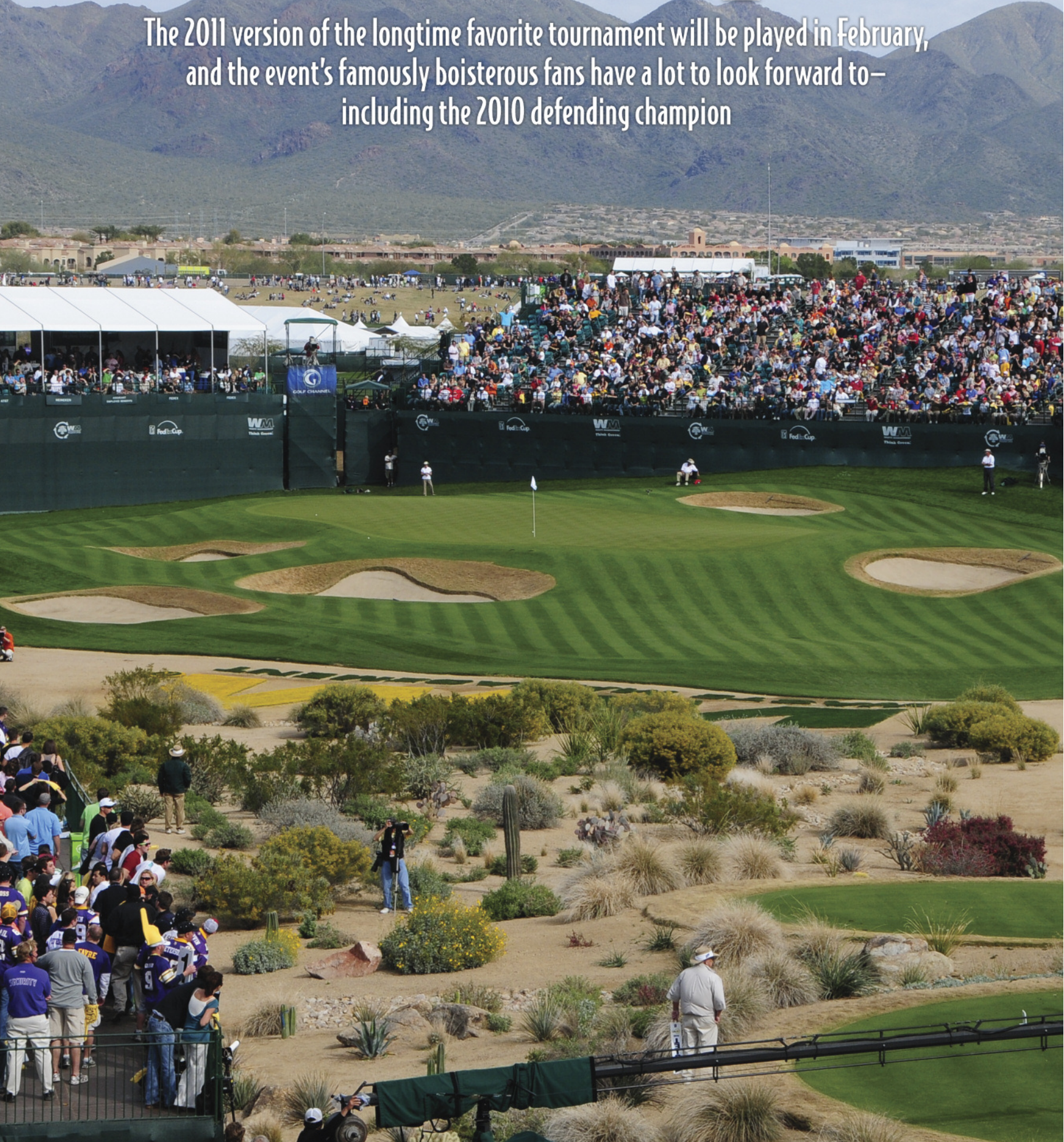
If you are putting poorly, use a friend or mirror to monitor and check these positions. I guarantee that one or both of these fundamentals are incorrect. The good news is that you can simply adjust your alignment and improve your putting dramatically.

Waste Management By Steve Trivett

Phoenix Open

The 2011 version of the longtime favorite tournament will be played in February, and the event's famously boisterous fans have a lot to look forward to—including the 2010 defending champion



The 2010 Waste Management Phoenix Open will be remembered for a lot of reasons. Like a high temperature of 56 degrees in Sunday's final round. Like the amount of rain that fell before the final round — enough for PGA Tour officials to add a local rule that allowed players to play lift-clean-and-place over the last 18 holes of the par-71, 7,216-yard TPC of Scottsdale. Like it was the first time in the 75-year history of the event that the fifth longest-running tournament on the PGA Tour was played under the Waste Management title-sponsor banner.

But most of all, it will be remembered for the final-round shootout between Hunter Mahan and Rickie Fowler, a pair of PGA Tour young guns who went to college at Oklahoma State and would

checking the face of the club, he found a crack. After conferring with rules officials, he dispatched his girlfriend to the car for a replacement that he used the rest of the day.

"Luckily the rules staff ran her out to the car and she got back with the new driver before I had to make my next tee shot," Mahan said. "Because I really didn't want to play the rest of the round hitting a 3-wood off the tee."

Mahan then took the lead for the first time when he dropped an 18-foot putt on No. 14 for birdie. But Fowler, who had almost won the Frys.com Open just a few miles down the road at Greyhawk Golf Club toward the end of 2009, still had a chance to join Mahan at the top of the leaderboard as he stood over his second shot on 15. Instead



later in 2010 be Ryder Cup teammates. When the final shots were fired, Mahan lifted the trophy as champion while Fowler, who had made a decision to lay up on his second shot to the reachable par-5 No. 15, finished one shot back.

The win would be Mahan's second since turning professional in 2003, and at the time made him the eighth current tour player to post two victories while still in his 20s, though he had won more than \$5 million over his previous two years on tour.

"I finally found a way to win again," said Mahan, whose first career victory had come at the 2007 Travelers Championship. "That was something that I haven't been able to do. So obviously it feels great because it gives me a lot of confidence in myself that I'm doing the right things in my game at the right time."

Still, it wasn't easy. Fowler went into Sunday's final round four shots behind 54-hole leader Brandt Snedeker. And he didn't move out in front until he and leader Y.E. Yang had a three-shot scoreboard swing.

Yang's drive found the water on 17, a par 4, and while he was making bogey on the drivable hole, Mahan was making eagle on the par-5 13th when his 250-yard second shot finished seven feet from the hole. He canned the eagle putt to catch Yang, who had gone eye-to-eye with Tiger Woods and didn't blink on his way to winning the 2009 PGA Championship.

Fowler carded that eagle using a driver that wasn't in his bag when the round started. Early in the round, he hadn't liked the sound the ball made when it left the face of his driver on a tee shot. Upon

of going for the green, the rookie opted to lay up and then failed to make birdie when his third shot didn't find the putting surface and he had to settle for par.

"I felt that instead of going for the green and bringing trouble into play, I would take the safe route and try to make birdie with my wedge," Fowler said. "Unfortunately, I hit a bad wedge, but I still had my chances to make birdie on 16, 17 and 18."

He didn't, missing putts of 14, 17 and 30 feet on the three greens.

And the final difference came when Mahan made birdie on the par-3 16th despite distractions from the ever boisterous crowd that has long given the tournament its nickname, The Greatest Show on Grass.

Mahan's tee shot at the par-3 found the edge of the green, and he made a 14-footer for the birdie that moved him to 16-under for the tournament.

"You still have a tournament to win, so you really can't worry about the crowd on the 16th," Mahan said. "You just kind of have to block it out, but at the same time enjoy it because you don't have that opportunity to have so many people watching you on one hole."

Mahan will arrive at the 2011 Waste Management Phoenix Open as the defending champion when it is played at TPC Scottsdale Feb. 3-6. He'll be chasing 75 years of PGA Tour history, and if history runs true, 2011 will be another one to remember.

What's better than a new club or accessory to brighten the holidays?

For the serious golfer, the fun of the holiday season depends somewhat on location and weather. Golfers in the mountains are moving downhill fast while those on flatter terrain may be getting in some late, *late* season rounds. Either way, getting or giving a golfing gift is an excellent way to keep the golf flame burning even when there's snow on the ground or the wind chill is somewhere near zero.



Drivers

Every golfer's eyes would widen if a new driver came down the chimney, and there are some highly desirable new options to consider. **Titleist** offers three 909 models (\$399). There are slight variances in shape and size, but the main differences have to do with launch angle and spin. For example, the 909DComp has high launch with low to mid spin while the 909D3 offers mid launch with low spin. Consult your golf professional or visit titleist.com for the company's fitting module to choose the driver best for your game.

Once a Titleist sister brand, **Cobra Golf** (cobragolf.com) is now part of the Puma sports empire and has new drivers in the offing. For the golfer fighting a terminal slice or wanting to hit a predictable draw, the S2 Offset Driver (\$299) has none of the awkward looks normally associated with offset woods and could be the club that keeps the ball in the fairway with more regularity; the 9-point face technology helps significantly with off-center hits.

Putters

A golfer receiving a new putter during the holiday season can take it as an inspiration or insult; either way, a new blade is an exciting gift. Two interesting choices are the newest versions of the **Wilson** (Wilson.com) 8882 (\$99) and **Cleveland Golf** (clevelandgolf.com) NCX-Ray Sigma (\$149). The 8882 is based on a classic blade design dating back several decades; its clean lines are perfect for golfers who take their putting seriously and find the new massive putter heads a bit much. Those who want the modernity will like the Cleveland with its chunky mallet design and double-bend shaft.





Irons

Two sets of irons bust the myth that only great golfers can use forged irons. Infinity Golf (infinitygolf.com) uses German-engineered CNC machines to mill its Tour Strategy TS-10 irons (\$1,200). These highly customized forged yet forgiving irons are a game-improvement option for golfers who want as much improvement as possible.

For many golfers, the combination of golf and a favorite NFL team is irresistible. **Wilson** makes golf bags for every team in a carry model (\$149) or cart model (\$199). The range of accessories for the collegiate fanatic is wider — everything from head covers to umbrellas.

A simple, effective, thoughtful and inexpensive golf gift is the **Tour Sticks** Alignment Training Aid (\$14.99), which includes two fiberglass customized alignment sticks (toursticks.com). These will help every golfer with a key fundamental: getting lined up correctly.

Global Golf Training Products has invented the Thumb Caddy (\$9.95 for one; \$19.95 for a pack of three) to help golfers develop and perfect a proper grip during practice or on the course. International Film Festival

Renowned for its star power and foreign films, screenings also tend to reflect potential Oscar nominees.

Hollywood stars and industry heavy hitters are red-carpet-ready for the Palm Springs International Film Festival, a decidedly fan-friendly conclave that utilizes every movie screen in town. Last year's attendance peaked at 130,000. This year's event will run Jan. 6-17 and is slated to include 180 new films from 70 countries — and even more fans.

Kidman, Leonardo DiCaprio, Anne Hathaway, Daniel Day Lewis, Helen Mirren, Sean Penn, Kate Winslett, Morgan Freeman, Dustin Hoffman and directors Clint Eastwood, Quentin Tarantino and Ron Howard. At press time, a preliminary list of 2011 honorees included revered actor Robert Duvall.

The festival truly is international in scope, known as America's best lineup of

Cinema 9, debuts this year as a place for movie-lovers to gather for post-screening discussions, purchase merchandise and buy event tickets.

A big fan favorite, Talking Pictures: The Contenders, returns this year. The series screens potential award-winning films followed by an onstage director interview conducted by nationally renowned film journalists and critics. Every screening in the festival features an audience question-and-answer session immediately afterward.

Proceeds from the PSIFF benefit the nonprofit Palm Springs Film Society's year-round screenings held in conjunction with local libraries and the community art museum. The film society also sponsors Student Film Day the day before the festival opens, allowing Coachella Valley students to view suitable films and meet with festival directors for Q&A sessions.

Matinees are \$10, evening showings are \$11 and there are multiple free screenings as well. Look for the Talking Pictures Six-Pack, six film-and-interview sessions for the price of five. All festival tickets are available online at PSFilmFest.org

"We're bursting at the seams with audiences," says festival director Darryl Macdonald. "We've grown 5 percent to 10 percent every year in the last eight. If we had any more theaters in town, we'd use them."

Founded in 1989 by iconic California congressman and entertainer Sonny Bono, the first festival was designed simply as a cultural tourism event. But lately it's grown into a surprisingly accurate predictor of Best Actor and Best Director award-winners, and Hollywood flocks to the Coachella Valley every January.

"Studios have taken to calling us, jockeying for position to get their stars honored in our awards ceremony," says Macdonald. "It includes the biggest lineup of star power outside the Oscars and Golden Globes."

Last year, Jeff Bridges was honored at the festival prior to his Best Actor win at the Academy Awards. Other past gala winners include actors Brad Pitt, Nicole

foreign films — and another very close representation of probable Oscar nominees. "With the Hollywood talent and our incredible lineup of international films, it sets us apart. It's our niche," says Macdonald. "It's hard to find those two things literally under one roof."

And each year brings something new. "In terms of special focus this year, we're featuring a cinematic safari through the cultures of Africa," Macdonald says.

The Out of Africa series is presented with backing from the "Red" organization, formed by U2's Bono to combat AIDS in Africa; the first Friday of the festival is designated as Paint the Town "Red" Day.

This year attendees can also look for the first annual director-focused Filmmakers Retreat at Sunnylands estate two days before the festival opens, an event focused on how to generate more independent voices and vision in film. And the Filmgoers Lounge, located at festival headquarters in the Regal Palm Springs

Ain't Life Gran!

The 2011 GranTurismo is Maserati magic crafted out of nearly a century of car-making tradition, a marvel of speed and luxury that is guaranteed to turn heads



Can you feel the cacti staring as you roll south from Palm Desert, Calif., toward the Salton Sea? A tortoise's jaw dropped when you bolted by stretching your tolerance for speed on Highway 86. You are controlling a moving miracle. Like modern day alchemists, designers have brought together the elements of speed and luxury, creating not a potion or precious metal but an engineering marvel — the 2011 Maserati GranTurismo. This juxtaposition of style and raw, rushing adrenaline will jolt even the uninterested onlooker awake.

The GranTurismo has looks that stop traffic. Woven together in the Ferrari factory, this Maserati has plenty of good genetics in its molten blood stream. The family resemblance is obvious immediately in the front end. The hood careens toward the pavement. A scowling game face is the front grill. As onlookers ogle and lust, you appreciate that the back end is more elegant and reminiscent of Maserati's luxury lineage. The silhouette sits low, poised for action.

The GranTurismo isn't just a sport coupe; it's a four-seater. Certainly, you think, that back seat is just for show and a nice place to store extra luggage. Actually, the rear seats hold surprisingly more room than you'd think as Maserati has maintained an angled design that maximizes area. Your passengers' knees may touch the seat in front of them, but this is a sports car after all.

Passengers won't mind riding in the back when they feel the softest leather on the planet used to trim out the interior of the GranTurismo. The heralded design team at Pininfarina — makers of the Ferrari 458 — spared nothing in the ergonomics and execution. Even the cup holders, you notice, have a feel that says "custom." Maserati's days of building custom coaches is highlighted here in such



a way that you know you have taken a step up from your previous vehicle. In fact, once the engine sparks to life you can't remember driving another car before this one.

As you wind along the western edge of the Salton Sea, the barrenness distracts from the comfort within. Seeming ghost towns appear and disappear in the rearview mirror like scenes from a Mad Max movie. All the while the Sea sparkles and dances oblivious to land deals gone bad and busted development planning. There's an uneasiness about it all and you decide to see what the GranTurismo can really do.

Top speed is 178 miles per hour. Self-preservation keeps you from testing the factory on that claim; however, the baritone humming in this 4.2 liter V-8 tells you there's a song to sing. With 402 horsepower at the tips of your toes, you plunge the accelerator. Immediate response presses you against the leather and...smile. That's what you want in a Maserati.

Selecting the "sport" setting on the trademarked Skyhook driving system tightens the suspension and revs the engine higher. Data from the road is feeding into the car's computer now and every bump is being damped by the electronic suspension. There is literally no delay in the gearbox. A six-speed automatic with drive-by-wire technology handles everything.

You make the turnaround at Westmorland and head up the eastern edge of the Sea. You're driving through some of the lowest elevation in the world. The fluctuating sea levels have long since pushed residents back. Cities like Bombay Beach show the ruins of neighborhoods built too close to the rising tide. The GranTurismo takes you past the hot springs and abandoned buildings acting as a kind of capsule. Road noise is muffled and you hear the ticking of the famed Maserati in-dash analog clock that harkens again to the near century of car-making tradition.



Searching the 30-megabyte hard drive for the tunes that it pulled from your mp3 player, you turn up the volume. A 12-speaker Bose stereo whisks you further away from the surreal setting outside. Chrome and wood trim catch the California sun, glistening. Maserati says you have 14 paint colors, six types of interior and numerous combinations of trim to choose from. Decisions, decisions. The convertible is also an excellent mind bender. Do you opt for the soft top that the Italians praise for having achieved near perfection in the industry?

The price tag on the convertible starts at around \$140,000 but leaves nothing out in the way of options. Trading up may be tricky as this beauty will likely be tough to find.

You've made the loop around the Salton Sea and are ready to stretch your legs on a course worthy of the ride that brought you here. The SilverRock Resort

in La Quinta, Calif., is just the place to rejuvenate. You pull the custom-created luggage set — made specifically for the GranTurismo, naturally — out of the trunk along with your golf bag. You wonder if your golf drives will be quite as good as the one you just had.

Like the GranTurismo, SilverRock is in a class of its own. It hosted the 2010 Bob Hope Classic and saw Bubba Watson scorch the course with a record 62. The 2011 tournament will come back on January 17-23. There are few contrasts as stunning as the emerald carpet that springs out of a desert golf course set against the stark natural surroundings. Beautiful in every way, the two environments co-exist, impossible though it seems. This, too, is superb custom design.

The Arnold Palmer layout stretches out over 7,500 yards with three par-5s longer than 600 yards each. You're going to have to bring the big dog and swing for the

fences you realize as you survey the scorecard. "Go big or go home," you think as you tee it up.

Going big isn't a problem — but going home might be.

This winter offers a primary color palette of grays and blacks, with splashes of reds, tans,

Motion-oriented stretch is added for full freedom of movement, and a two-piece collar design increases comfort and minimizes sag.

DKNY by Jamie Sadock (jamiesadock.com) is all about softer silhouettes and wearability. The DKNY women's long-sleeved, lightweight Noblesse shirt has it all. Made from 93-percent nylon and 7-percent spandex with moisture-wicking performance, this shirt has great lines and cute pockets on the front trimmed in white — very trendy on and off the golf course.

Don't forget the jacket! Layered wear also means comfortably adding a jacket over the layers without bulk. Introduced in 2010 to outstanding reviews, the Sunice Tornado Collection for men and women (sunice.com) features ultra-lightweight FlexVent fabric. One of golf's most waterproof stretch fabrics, FlexVent is also highly breathable. These garments come with a four-year waterproof guarantee. Among the new colors are Real Red, Camel and a fashionable Black Argyle print. Features include a waist-cinching system, in-pocket ball cleaner and full stretch back panel.

Also hot in the Sunice line is the Women's Hurricane Rosie Gore-Tex Performance Shell Jacket. Clinched at the waist and hooded, the jacket has an in-pocket ball cleaner and comes in bright white with gold embellishments that add pizzazz.

From pizzazz to cute: the DKNY by Jamie Sadock City Stretch White Jacket is stunningly designed, lightweight and lightly lined. This full zip-front jacket with silver zip pockets sits at the waist for a very flattering cut.

However you layer it, look for winter golf apparel that is lightweight, breathable and waterproof with stretch for comfort. Style? That goes without saying.

Winter Heats Up With By Françoise Rhodes

Brilliant, Bold and Edgy Baubles

We may not be able to afford the world's largest, exquisite diamonds, such as the pink beauty that just sold for more than \$46 million, but we can wear the jewelry that great jewels inspire

Winter can easily conjure up images of dull, drab and dreary, but not when it comes to this winter's jewelry trends. Designers are making bold statements with huge, colorful and unusual pieces that stand out rather than merely complement an outfit. Opulent gemstones, edgy motifs, translucent pieces and textured designs are making their way from runways to local retailers with hype and excitement.

After the dainty, classic trends of last summer, jewelers became intrigued by the large-stone look when the 24.78-

carat Fancy Intense Pink diamond was put on the market this past fall with a pre-sale estimated value of \$27 to \$38 million. It sold Nov. 17 for just over \$46 million. Last seen on the market 60 years ago when it was purchased from Harry Winston, the emerald-cut stone is mounted in a ring and is part of the Type Ila classification reserved for rare and exceptionally pure stones and represents less than 2 percent of all the world's diamonds.

Adding to the Pink diamond mania during the fall, the American Museum of Natural History in New York City put



on display one of the world's only 5-carat natural red diamonds, the Kazanjian Red. This outstanding stone, for 30 years part of a private collection, was cut from a 35-carat piece of rough unearthed in Lichtenburg, South Africa during the "diamond rush" of the 1920s.

Since the emergence of these rare diamonds, museums are bringing out their famous gems in droves for new exhibits. But leave it to the Smithsonian, which has displayed the Wittelsbach-Graff diamond and has the famous Hope diamond in its own collection, to launch its own jewelry line inspired by these massive beauties.

The "Smithsonian Institute - National Gem Gallery" recently debuted on QVC television and *QVC.com* with a line of earrings, rings and bracelets inspired by specific Smithsonian gemstones and mineral specimens. Currently prices range from \$65 to \$950. Pieces include a striking Judith Ripka blue topaz and diamond ring inspired by the 30.62-carat Blue Heart Diamond, and a turquoise ring/earring duo inspired by jewelry Napoleon gave to his second wife, Empress Marie-Louise. Set to appear in December on QVC television is a bauble based on the 45.5-carat Hope Diamond — just in time for the holidays.

If museum-inspired pieces are not your idea of bling, the hottest jewelry trend this winter season is the singular huge bauble or cluster of gemstones — faux or real — in an opulent hue creating an eye catching, dramatic look. Oversized bracelets, extra-long chandelier earrings, stunning collar necklaces and extravagant layered necklaces are creating the looks your outfits will revolve around.

Following closely is all-metal jewelry in gold, silver or copper. Different from past versions, this jewelry is mostly lightweight though large in size. It's often yellow but sometimes white. Strong motifs such as snakes, elephants, flowers, birds, bugs, leaves and coins are among the most popular designs. Hot designers include Aure'lie Bidermann, who has a gold-plated mamba snake ring; Alissa Frazer, the designer behind the Agrigento collection that features such

whimsical creations such as a Citrine Bird Necklace; and K. Amato, who offers Golden Flower Fringe Earrings.

Another trend in this winter's jewelry is fringe. Fashionable once again, fringe is finding its way onto rings, earrings, necklaces and bracelets for a beautiful, bold look.

Huge, retro-inspired rings sporting lots of color are already being worn and continue to gain momentum. Why? They look great while being very affordable.

Bangles or bracelets continue to dominate the red carpet; however, round is passé. Now it's all about square bangles with crystals, gemstones or anything that sparkles. The more bangles you wear, the more fashionable they will look. Mix thin and not-so-thin styles for easy day-to-evening wear. According to *millionlooks.com*, this innovative jewelry will stay with us for a few seasons, making buying such pieces a wise decision.

As with salon trends this season, there are no rules. Don't be afraid to mix and match to create a bold, edgy and beautiful look. In other words, become your own jewelry *fashionista*.

As for men's jewelry: We know they wear it, yet get a man to talk about it—what's hot in men's jewelry coming in the next issue.

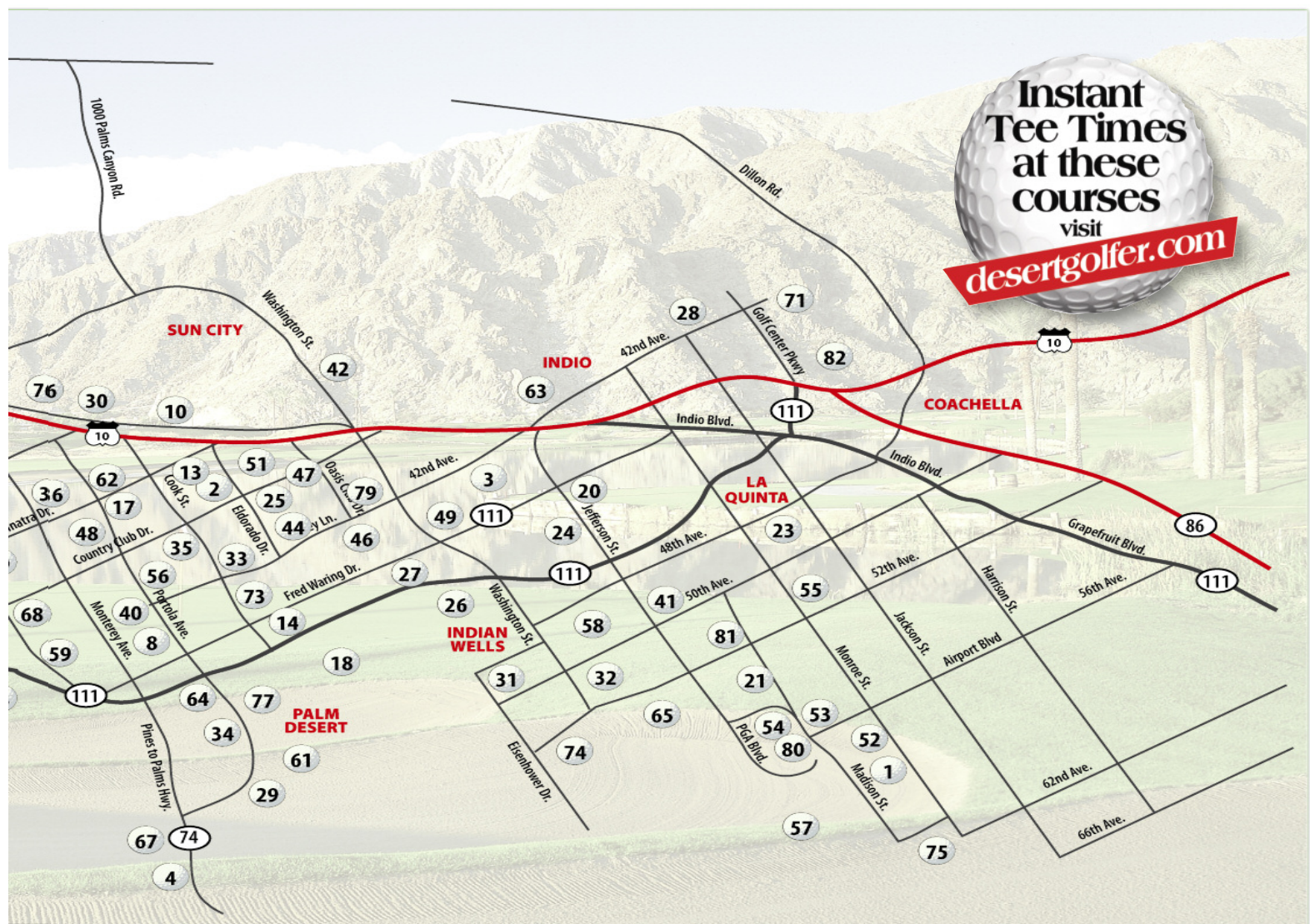
