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

For many of us who have loved, even treasured, the star power of the tournament once known as the Bob Hope Classic, it's disappointing that after only four years, Humana is out as the title sponsor. Humana announced that it's ending its sponsorship after the 2015 event. The good news, however, is that the remaining partners—the William Clinton Foundation, The PGA Tour and Desert Classic Charities—have vowed to remain on board and are actively engaged in finding a new sponsor for the event.

Since 1960, Desert Classic Charities has contributed more than \$52.5 million to the Eisenhower Medical Center and surrounding Coachella Valley nonprofit organizations. Without this tournament, many of these extremely important charities will not survive. This isn't just about golf.

While the organizers are optimistic and have said that the 2016 event will be played no matter what, the clock is ticking. Even with an improving economy, the PGA Tour, the William Clinton Foundation and Desert Classic Charities have their work cut out for them.

The Humana Challenge isn't the first such tournament to lose its sponsor. The Kraft Nabisco, the largest ladies event in the region, which is played at Mission Hills Country Club, also lost its longtime title sponsor.

Personally, I believe that sponsors for both events made a fatal error when they opted to no longer include celebrities in the tournament fields. In the case of the Humana Challenge, this was a decision made jointly a few years ago by Humana executives and the PGA Tour. They decided that the player spots were more valuable to the tournament than the draw and excitement of the celebrities that made these tournaments such popular events. I believe that without celebrities, ticket sales will be affected, as will player spots, now at a reported \$29, 000 per spot. We hope the new sponsor or sponsors will have the economic ability to bring back the celebrities and the parties that made the Bob Hope Classic one of the greatest events in golf.

While it's sad to see Humana end its sponsorship, we at *Desert Golf & Tennis* thank Humana for its four years of tournament support and for seeing the event through an extraordinarily difficult economic time. We also thank the William Clinton Foundation for its continuing support.

On another note, in every issue of *Desert Golf & Tennis* we publish club initiation fees, monthly dues, trail fees and more. These listings are extremely popular and we take great pride in their accuracy. This season I personally contacted each and every facility to verify the published rates. We stand by the listings and thank each and every club for helping to verify our information. Should there be any changes necessary to the directory or if our information needs updating, we invite our readers to let us know so we can make the changes and maintain the highest level of accuracy.

We hope you enjoy this edition as much as we enjoyed putting it together.

ne only has to reflect back a few years to remember the time when individuals and small groups attending the Bob Hope Classic, and PGA Tour event patrons, had a basic plan. Get to the event. Get a beer. Find a group to follow and follow them for a few holes. Get another beer. Repeat.

Old-timers who stood among cigarette-puffing galleries utilizing paper periscopes can remember when bleachers came to the game, offering graduated, elevated views of the competition for the first time. As the years went by, tournament organizers realized the new century brought with it new challenges and new demands desert-style luxury. Club 17, launched two years ago, is the exclusive hospitality venue straddling the green of the par-3 17th on the Arnold Palmer Private Course at PGA West. The on-course hotspot embraces a sports bar-type atmosphere, encouraging lively participation in the action at hand. Club 17 features covered and open-air seating overlooking the 17th green, and an interior area featuring large, flat-screen TVs turned to the tournament and the other key sports events of the day. Food and beverages are available for purchase inside the club. Club membership also allows patrons to move freely between the three tournament venues with preferred parking for the entire event.



from rank-and-file patrons. But it also brought organizers almost unlimited capability of meeting those challenges in an all-out attempt to give patrons an unrivaled sports experience. Best of all, organizers found they could grow their piece of their area's total recreational receipts pie.

The Humana Challenge has kept pace with the demands, not only of individuals but corporate partners as well. And despite the fact that this year's tournament marks the final year of Humana sponsorship, fans attending the event can expect the same type of investment, entertainment opportunities and stylish seating options they've enjoyed in the past.

The tournament celebrates its 56th birthday this year and once again retains its spot as the first mainland stop on the PGA Tour's annual calendar as it returns to La Quinta, California, Jan. 19-25. The tournament will once again be contested over 72 holes, with 156 professionals competing at the Arnold Palmer Private Course at PGA West (host course), the Jack Nicklaus Private Course at PGA West and La Quinta Country Club.

For those not disposed to the tournament's ample and upscale corporate areas, there are other opportunities to take in the Tour in

An only-slightly subdued option for those seeking upscale participation is the Bob Hope Club, a luxury venue overlooking the 18th green at the Palmer course. The club offers vast mountain vistas with open-air and climate-controlled seating options. Like Club 17, the indoor areas here come replete with flat-screen TVs, dining catered by Wally's Desert Turtle (including breakfast and lunch buffets, afternoon snacks and premium bar service), valet parking at PGA West, event souvenir programs and daily pairings guides. For information on either club, visit *humanachallenge.com/tickets*. Pro-Am positions, hospitality packages and volunteer opportunities for the Humana Challenge can also be sought at *humanachallenge.com* or by calling 760.346.8184.

Club 17 will be offered in expanded form for 2015, but capacities will remain relatively small. For that reason, tournament officials are still encouraging fans to join early, citing a limited quantity of memberships available for each day of the tournament.

"We expect the enhanced and upgraded Club 17 to sell out even quicker than it did in 2014, so we encourage our fans to take



advantage of the best Club 17 deal we'll offer and secure one of the best seats in the house for the 2015 Humana Challenge," says Humana Challenge executive



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director/CEO Bob Marra. "Keep in mind that each Club 17 membership purchase supports numerous Coachella Valley charities that benefit from the tournament."

Fans in attendance should get an upclose-and-personal experience with one of the Tour's strongest early-season fields. Last year's champion, Patrick Reed, is slated to defend his title, while Rickie Fowler, Zach Johnson Webb Simpson and Keegan Bradley are also expected to return. Reed was one of the bright spots for the U.S. Ryder Cup team during the 2014 competition, coming away with a 3-0-1 record to collect 3.5 of a possible four points.

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# the Future of the Jumana Challenge **By Christine Loomis**

### The tournament's upcoming days appear far rosier than some fans think

Of all the truisms in the world, the one that brings PGA Tour tournaments to mind is this: The only constant is change. That's not necessarily a bad thing.

Tournaments come and go with different players, different purses, different venues and, more often than not these days, different sponsors. While losing a tried-and-true sponsor presents challenges for tournament organizers, it also presents opportunities. Case in point: the Humana Challenge.

Humana became the title sponsor of the much-loved Bob Hope Classic in 2012, breathing new life, energy and purpose into the tournament that had its origins in the 1960s when golf, the California desert and tournaments were all very different.

It was a joint effort that succeeded spectacularly, bringing together Humana, the Clinton Foundation, Desert Classic Charities and the PGA Tour to put a focus on health in conjunction with a golf tournament, thus reaching millions of fans with

information about the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle. At the same time, the partnership extended and celebrated the legacy of Bob Hope, whose passion for golf did much to promote and sustain the game over many years.

That partnership as it exists presently will come to an end after the 2015 edition of the tournament, when Humana steps away from title sponsorship to pursue new ventures that it believes more closely fits its corporate needs today.

That does not mean the end of the tournament, and the partnership's spirit of collaboration remains intact. Valerie Alexander, chief marketing officer at the Clinton Foundation, was quoted in a news release about the departure of Humana as saying, "Our partnership with Humana, the PGA Tour and Desert Classic Charities has been one of true collaboration, and affirms that we all can get more good things done by working together. The Clinton Foundation remains dedicated to the tournament's future success and to promoting health and wellness in the Coachella Valley, year-round, just as we have for the past four years."

So what happens when a corporation decides to end its sponsorship? After all, sponsor support is critical to the success of tournaments.

"Sponsorship provides important underpinning for a tournament's operation, fulfillment of its obligation in terms of prize money and meeting its objective to support charitable organizations," says Ty Votaw, PGA Tour executive vice president. "The vast majority of tournament host organizations are organized as 501(c)(3) nonprofits whose net proceeds go to charity."

Votaw notes that the PGA Tour has had tremendous success securing tournament sponsors, and he's optimistic about the Humana Challenge. "The PGA Tour corporate marketing department is intimately involved in the search for title sponsors and, in fact, is responsible for securing the vast majority of tournament sponsors on the PGA Tour," he says. "In the case of the Humana Challenge, the PGA Tour, in consultation with Desert Classic Charities and the Clinton Foundation, is currently in active discussions with a number of prospects to become title sponsor in 2016."

Bob Marra, executive director and CEO of the Humana Challenge, is similarly optimistic.

"We are in a great position with several prospective title sponsors very interested



in jumping onboard to partner with Desert Classic Charities, the Clinton Foundation and the PGA Tour," Marra says. "The Tour has two executives, one in New York City and one at its Florida headquarters, who work all year developing title sponsor prospect relationships; they have been working on finding the right fit for us for several months."

Marra points out that the unusual platform on which the sponsorship and tournament has been based since 2012 is a draw for potential new sponsors. "In addition to running a first-class golf tournament," he says, "we have established a unique platform that presents a very important initiative focused on improving individual and community health and wellbeing that is envied among PGA Tour events and professional sports in general. Because of our unique position, the opportunity for a title sponsor to get involved and make a statement with our tournament as the backdrop is generating a lot of attention and keen interest."

The goal is for the focus on health and wellness to remain in place. "Our first priority is to secure a title sponsor operating in the health and wellbeing space and/or involved in initiatives in its business model that highlight these important issues," Marra says.

Votaw agrees. "We believe this is a winning formula that works extremely well and is worth continuing with whomever the new title sponsor is."

While health and wellness remain a priority, no one has forgotten the legacy of Bob Hope and his longtime role as tournament host, or how combining the new focus with the storied past has been part of the success.

"In fact, the concept was so unique and effective that we won a coveted sports industry award as the 2012 Sports Event of the Year," Votaw says, "beating out the Super Bowl, the NCAA basketball Final Four and several other prestigious events."

In addition to a connection to health and wellness and, of course, money to spend supporting the tournament, Marra says he hopes the new sponsor will also have "enthusiasm for creative approaches to continuing to grow the scope and fan base of the event."

Perhaps just as important, the new sponsor must be able to fit in with the other partners and continue the spirit of cooperation and dedication that has made the Humana Challenge a success on every level. The decision as to who will ultimately take Humana's place will be made cooperatively, just as past decisions have been made. "We will work together to make sure the new title sponsor is a good fit for all of us and we'll decide together," Marra says.

While some golffans were dismayed by the news that Humana is stepping away, the event partners are upbeat. Maybe that's because this group has managed to successfully collaborate and share the work and rewards of the event, setting up a model of teamwork and cooperation all too rare in today's world. What company wouldn't want to be part of that?

Meanwhile, the 2015 Humana Challenge promises to be as exciting and successful as ever, and all parties agree that the event is here to stay. "The tournament will be played in 2016 regardless," Votaw vows, "and our expectation is that we will have a new title sponsor."

The tennis great looks back at 2014 and ahead to the coming year of championship play

To celebrate another memorable tennis season, *Desert Golf & Tennis* spoke with Tom Gorman, 12-year tennis professional, former Davis Cup captain and La Quinta Resort & Club's director of tennis. Gorman offered his thoughts on the 2014 Grand Slams, predictions for next year's major tournaments and the reason Novak Djokovic has become the top-ranked player in the world, among other things.



Few people in professional tennis have as well rounded a career as Tom Gorman. After graduating from Seattle University a twotime NCAA All-American and winning seven singles and nine doubles titles as a tennis professional, he retired in the 1980s and became a coach, leading the U.S. Women's Wightman Cup team in 1984 and the Federation Cup team in 1985.

The following year he was selected as captain of the U.S. Men's Davis Cup team, a position he held for the following eight years. Throughout that time, his team won 18 matches, an all-time U.S.



Davis Cup captain record. In 1988 and 1992, he also coached the U.S. Men's Olympic tennis teams in Seoul, Korea, and Barcelona, Spain, respectively, capturing a gold medal in Seoul as coach of the doubles team of Ken Flach and Robert Seguso.

To say the least, Gorman has been there and done that, and he has an inside perspective on professional tennis few can match. *Desert Golf& Tennis* caught up with him in late October, less than a month before France faced off against Switzerland in the Davis Cup finals.

### **AUSTRALIAN OPEN**

Date & Venue: The 102nd edition of the Australian Open was contested Jan.13-26, 2014 at Australia's Melbourne Park in Melbourne, Australia.

Results: Switzerland's Stanislas Wawrinka defeated Spain's Rafael Nadal 6-3, 6-2, 3-6, 6-3 (men's singles), while China's Li Na defeated Slovakia's Dominika Cibulková 7-6, 6-0 (women's singles).

Looking Back: "The 2014 Grand Slam season actually began in rather unusual fashion at the Australian Open," Gorman said.

"First, Stan Wawrinka won one for the underdogs, upsetting Nadal in four sets. And although Li Na won her second Grand Slam singles title in three years, she actually retired from tennis a few months later due to injuries."

Looking Ahead: "I believe Victoria Azarenka will win next year's Australian Open, as she has had great success in past Opens. Since she was injured this year, she'll be motivated to start 2015 off strongly. At the same time, the game's No. 1 player (as of October 2014), Novak Djokovic, will be motivated to win. His game has vastly improved over the last two years due to his commitment to a gluten-free diet and the trust he now has in his swing and contact point. He also maintains a positive attitude in every match he plays."

### FRENCH OPEN

**Date & Venue:** The 113th French Open was played May 25 – June 8, 2014 at Stade Roland Garros in Paris.s

**Results:** Spain's **Rafael Nadal** defeated Serbia's Novak Djokovic, 3-6, 7-5, 6-2, 6-4 (men's singles), while Russia's **Maria Sharapova** defeated Romania's Simona Halep, 6-4, 6-7, 6-4 (women's singles).

Looking Back: "On the red clay, her least favorite surface, Maria Sharapova won another Grand Slam title with a popular victory over the up-and-coming Romanian, Simona Halep, showing just how strong she can be mentally," Gorman said. "In addition, Rafael Nadal won his ninth French Open. He is simply the greatest clay player of all-time. Period."

Looking Ahead: "Simona Halep is my dark horse to win in 2015 as she has really risen up the rankings the last couple years. Next year could be her breakthrough year. Meanwhile, unless **Rafael Nadal** is sick or injured, there is no reason to think he won't defend his title."










### THE WIMBLEDON CHAMPIONSHIPS

**Date & Venue:** The 128th edition of the venerable tournament was held at All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club in London, June 23 – July 7, 2014.

**Results:** Serbia's **Novak Djokovic** defeated Switzerland's Roger Federer 6-7, 6-4, 7-6, 5-7, 6-4 (men's singles), while Czech Republic's **Petra Kvitová** defeated Canada's Eugenie Bouchard 6-3, 6-0 (women's singles). **Looking Back:** "Except for Serena, Wimbledon provided more women's parity when Petra Kvitová defeated the young and talented Eugenie Bouchard easily in straight sets," Gorman said. "The men's final was an instant classic, with Novak Djokovic defeating multi-winner Roger Federer during an incredible five-set match."

Looking Ahead: "Petra Kvitová has a great chance to defend, as she is a tall left-hander who plays the ball low—perfect for grass courts—but I can't discount Serena Williams either. And one of tennis's most consistent players, Andy Murray, will be looking to win another Wimbledon title as well, especially after recovering from back surgery this year."









### U.S. OPEN TENNIS (HAMPIONSHIPS

**Date & Venue:** The 134th U.S. Open, tennis's oldest Grand Slam event, was played Aug. 25 – Sept. 8, 2014 at USTA Billie Jean King National Tennis Center in New York City.

**Results:** Croatia's **Marin ili** defeated Japan's Kei Nishikori, 6-3, 6-3, 6-3 (men's singles), while the United States' **Serena Williams** defeated Denmark's Caroline Wozniacki 6-3, 6-3 (women's singles).

Looking Back: "At the final Grand Slam tournament of the year, Serena Williams righted herself and beat a rejuvenated Caroline Wozniacki," Gorman noted. "In the meantime, two highly unlikely men's finalists, Marin ili and Kei Nishikori, battled for the winner's prize in the men's singles, with ili eventually winning the trophy."

Looking Ahead: "I believe Serena Williams will be motivated to defend her title. She is the best female player in the world when she is playing to her full potential. Novak Djokovic will also continue his winning ways by hoisting the trophy once again. He is the best player on U.S. Open court surfaces, bar none."

### 2014 DAVIS CUP

**Date & Venue:** The final matches of the 103rd Davis Cup occurred Nov. 21-23, 2014 at Stade Pierre-Mauroy in Villeneuve d'Ascq, France. *Note: The final matches had yet to be completed when* Desert Golf & Tennis *spoke to Gorman*.

Looking Ahead: "I think the finals will be very exciting to watch, as this will be Roger Federer's first appearance in a Davis Cup final," Gorman predicted in October. "It will be interesting to see if he can add this title to his illustrious career, as he's won virtually everything else. Roger will also have Stan Wawrinka as a supportive partner. The duo won an Olympic gold in Beijing in 2008, so there's no reason to believe they can't enjoy success together yet again."

### 2015 BNP Parilbas Open

It's great tennis, it's an economic powerhouse in the community and the venue is better than ever so reserve your seats now

f you missed one of the Coachella Valley's most lucrative economic drivers in 2014, not to worry: Tickets for the 2015 BNP Paribas Open are now on sale—and the venue where it's played is better than ever.

If you were there in 2014, you already know that this mega sports event is prestigious, exciting and fan-worthy—even for those who don't regularly follow tennis. What you may not know is the level of positive economic impact the BNP Paribas Open has had on the Coachella Valley community.

A recent study by The George Washington University shows that when all elements are factored in, the impact of the tennis championships is more than \$417 million. Here's how it breaks down:

According to Steve Simon, tournament director, the 2014 BNP Paribas Open, the largest WTA and ATP World Tour combined two-week event in the world, held at the Indian Wells Tennis Garden in March, generated an estimated total gross economic impact on the Coachella Valley regional economy of \$373,898,629. That includes money spent by out-of-town visitors, vendors, sponsors and the tournament organization. It also includes the re-spending of that money by regional businesses in the local economy. Additionally, the study examined the impact that the construction of the new Stadium 2 and renovations to the Indian Wells Tennis Garden had on the local economy, and when these were factored into the equation, the gross economic impact rose to \$417,624,972.

The BNP Paribas Open has experienced significant growth over the past several years, and that's good news for the tournament, the fans, the sport of tennis and local businesses. Given that 86 percent of spectators traveled from outside the region to attend the event in 2014, it's easy to see how hotels, restaurants and other businesses catering to out-of-towners would benefit.

"The growth the BNP Paribas Open has seen over the past three years, both in attendance and improvements to the Indian Wells Tennis Garden, has been significant, and we are very proud that it is reflected in our economic impact study," Simon says. "It is very rewarding to know so many businesses throughout our valley benefit from our multi-week event with the influx of fans, players, media, officials and sponsors who enjoy the numerous restaurants and shopping and entertainment options the valley offers."

And the tournament has now made significant improvements to the venue, all designed to make the spectator experience even better. Among them: the new permanent Stadium 2 with 8,000 seats and three restaurants, including world-renowned Nobu; four more practice courts and an additional 19,000-square-foot shade structure.

Inside Stadium 1, eight new (9 feet x 5 feet) video screens will be added to enhance the visual experience, and new hydration stations will be located on the Loge level. In total, 3,625 seats will be added to the venue, with 45,110 seats being available for a session at the 2015 BNP Paribas Open.

It's not too early to get your tickets for this prestigious event, which will run March 9-22, 2015 at the Indian Wells Tennis Garden. Daily loge and grandstand tickets for Stadium 1 range from \$15 to \$105, depending on time and specific area. Daily tickets for reserve seats in Stadium 2 in the lower bowl, including 100 sections and select 200 sections, start at \$130. Access to some 200 sections and all sections in the upper bowl is on a general-admission basis and available to any patron holding a ticket to the tournament. Additionally, any ticket to the BNP Paribas Open provides access to the general admission sections of Stadium 1-9 for day sessions.



A total of 431,527 people attended the event in 2014, and every indication is that the spectator number will increase in 2015, so reserve your favorite spot on your favorite day now. Over the course of the tournament's two weeks, there is no question that the BNP Paribas Open is *the* place in the Coachella Valley to see and be seen.

olossal-caliber athleticism is generally more than enough to propel one to the lofty heights of sports mega-stardom. In the case of tennis champion Billie Jean King, her presence on the courts has become far more than a series of sports exhibitions and simple celebrity. She has become a symbol for social equality and expressions of personal freedom, and her influence impacts both genders and all ages on and off the courts.

The cofounder of Mylan World TeamTennis (WTT), King was recently on hand at the Indian Wells Tennis Garden in Indian Wells, California. The home of the annual BNP Paribas Open played scenic host to the 2014 National Championships comprised of six to eight players each, teams with names such as Boston Lobsters and San Diego Swingers. King offered coaching tips during rotational player clinics and graciously posed for team photos with every single participant.

The convivial atmosphere created inspiration and excitement for players and non-players alike, affording attendees the rare opportunity to personally talk with King and to receive advice on improving skills and techniques.

In a one-on-one interview with *Desert Golf & Tennis*, she shared her enthusiasm for returning to the desert again, having been a regular visitor since her pre-teen years when she competed in the (then) 13 and under division competitions, making When Oracle CEO Larry Ellison took over ownership of the BNP Paribas Open in 2009, King says she considered remaining a major investor along with Chris Evert, Pete Sampras and Greg Norman. "Of course, I am such a supporter of the BNP and the venue in Indian Wells, largely because of Charlie Pasarell, going back to the time I knew him when he was NCAA Singles and Doubles champ playing for UCLA and his business partner in the BNP, Ray Moore, who is from South Africa just like Ilana."

Pasarell, a former Puerto Rican tennis champion, is best known as the past tournament director, managing partner and former owner of the BNP Paribas Open, as well as a tennis-industry leader.



for the WTT's Recreational and Corporate Leagues, Nov. 7-9.

According to Ilana Kloss, CEO and commissioner of World TeamTennis since 2001 and King's life partner, nearly 500 players from around the United States competed in matches over the three days for a chance to take home national titles.

During the first evening of competition, King generously and enthusiastically spent several hours with the various teams the trek from her home in Long Beach, California.

"That was a big trip, especially coming over here as a child," she says. "I have vivid memories of spending time over at the Racquet Club in Palm Springs in its heyday, which I loved. There was just so much history there, with people like Charlie Farrell and Ralph Bellamy, who founded it. At that time, I was only earning \$14 per day as an amateur." Kloss, who played on the South African tennis tour for 11 years, says, "Billie Jean King's entire platform in life is equality, which is reflected in her whole philosophy oftennis, geared to be accessible for as many people as possible. It's why the World TeamTennis events are so significant to her. It's all about men and women playing together and emphasizing a team environment."


Mylan World TeamTennis is known as the groundbreaking coed professional

When asked what she is most proud of in her life either culturally or in sports, King replies, "Well definitely World TeamTennis, which is such a significant force. But honestly, I'm not finished yet!"

#### A Lifetime of Achievements—and Still Counting

Billie Jean King's honors and accomplishments transcend the world of sports. Here are just a few:

In 2009, King was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

Life magazine named her one of the 100 Most Important Americans of the 20th Century in 1990.

She won 39 Grand Slam singles, doubles and mixed doubles tennis titles, including a record 20 titles at Wimbledon.

King was instrumental in the birth of women's professional tennis and the formation of the Virginia Slims Tour and Women's Tennis Association.

She empowered women and educated men when she defeated Bobby Riggs in one of the greatest moments in sports history, the Battle of the Sexes, in 1973. This match is remembered for its effect on society and its contribution to the women's movement.

King founded the Women's Tennis Association (1973), the Women's Sports Foundation (1974), *womenSports* magazine (1974) and co-founded GreenSlam, an environmental initiative for the sports industry (2007). She cofounded Mylan World TeamTennis in 1974.

A leader in the fight for equality and recognition in the LGBT community, King has been honored by many of the leading LGBT organizations, including the Human Rights Campaign, GLAAD and Lambda Legal Foundation.

In 2006, the National Tennis Center, home of the U.S. Open, was renamed the USTA Billie Jean King National Tennis Center.

King currently serves on the boards of the Women's Sports Foundation, the Andy Roddick Foundation and the Elton John AIDS Foundation.

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### The Decline and Rebirth of the Golf Industry

There are some signs that the industry is starting to rebound

Since the economy went over the waterfall in late 2008, it is clear the repercussions have resulted in a dismal few years for the golf industry and for golf clubs. Last year, the National Golf Foundation reported that although 3.7 million people had taken up golf, as many as 4.1

million golfers had retired from the sport, leaving a net deficit of 400,000 golfers.

dad managed to procure an old bag of golf clubs for about the same amount. OK, there was an odd hickory shaft in there!

Money was tight in those days. I recall one member who used to attach a piece of string to a tiny silk parachute and then tie it around his tee peg. This certainly limited the number of tees that went missing in action. The only peril remaining for him was the horrific sight of a tee peg breaking. Being a man of cunningly crafted creativity, he would take the offending broken tee home and perform surgery on it with globs of super glue. As far as I remember, no tee peg ever escaped his clutches. I also don't recall many 18-inch putts being conceded. It's harder today to save much money playing golf.

Critics also highlight the fact that the game has become too slow, which is valid. Typically a round of golf in a four-ball can take four-plus hours, and when things get out of kilter, this can even extend to five or six hours—a huge time commitment for today's relentlessly busy folks. Going back a few years, there was shock and horror, along with



#### The Problems

Even the daily-fee courses, although perhaps less affected than some of the private clubs, have been losing rounds, with the exception of the very small percentage fortunate to have exceptional locations. At the bottom of the pile, a number of courses have been forced to close. Such dire events have not been seen since World War II. Who would've thought that a number of these unfortunate cases would end up being transformed into residential housing estates?

Undoubtedly, when news like this gets out, the naysayers offer all sorts of theories regarding the health of the game. Analysis being what it is, many are prepared and willing to dissect the game and come up with reasons for the decline. These notions, many of which have merit, concern equipment and fees, both of which are indeed expensive.

By contrast, I remember when I started the game that my dues as a Junior Member in the North of England were \$4 a year and my arguments bubbling over in the clubhouse, if you couldn't get around in a four-ball in three hours and 45 minutes.

The computer, social media and, to a degree, television with its copious number of channels, have also had an effect. Are we indeed turning into couch potatoes? How many people spend weekend hours on their computer rather than out experiencing the joys of fresh air and the camaraderie of golf?

So, what can be done to renew enthusiasm for the game? Some extreme devotees came up with a plan to institute a very short course with huge holes, whereby one kicks the ball into the 'bucket'. No, sir, I don't think that is going to be a hot favorite!

Sure, the currently promoted "Tee it Forward" program, as well as the abolition of greens at 12 and 13 on the stimpmeter, will help. Largely, though, the cure to slow play is the use of good old common sense and awareness. How often have you seen players inattentively dawdling and not being ready when it is their turn to play?

Private golf clubs have also taken a hit these past few years. At many, the initiation/joining fee has had to be reduced, and there have been a plethora of other enticements on offer such that these clubs can plump up their dues-paying memberships, some of which have fallen to near-disastrous levels. The good news, however, is that although there is not a rush to knock the clubhouse gates down, there is now a steady flow of new members coming back into private clubs. Many are not yet out of the woods, but the signs are more encouraging.


Within the design and construction industries, the last six years have been miserable. With fewer houses being built and clubs losing members, there has been little appetite to build new courses. I believe that last year there were only in the region of 12 new golf courses built. If one goes back 10 years, the figure was well over 200 new courses a year being constructed. So, it's been "slim pickings" for those in the industry. Much of the work that has been available has been for much smaller jobs and commissions, with a few of the clubs carrying out upgrades to their courses and/or clubhouse facilities in order to attract new members.

#### **Positive Signs**

The encouraging news, however, is that over the past 12 months there appears to be renewed energy, and developers are starting to look for new opportunities.

Tim Finchem, the Commissioner of the PGA Tour, also sees a silver lining. "We see real signs of growth and interest at almost every turn. There seems to be a perception out there that young people are no longer interested in playing the game. We don't see that at all. As a matter of fact, we are very bullish about the future of the game from these standpoints, when you consider 3.5 million kids took advantage of the First Tee program last year, lining up to try the game."




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# 2015 Waste Management Phoenix Open

It's hard to imagine ramping up this event to even higher levels, but this may be the year

or at least 25 years, the Waste Management Phoenix Open in Scottsdale, Arizona, has been one of the most anticipated tournaments on the early portion of the PGA Tour schedule. Very few would argue such an assessment. But after all those years, all the improvements, all the changes and all the seemingly-continuous year-after-year prestige gains the tournament has experienced, it would still be fair to say the 2015 event may be the most-anticipated and biggest of them all.

Consider: This year's event marks the tournament's 80th anniversary; features a renovated golf course; will benefit from thousands spent on landscaping; offers an expanded clubhouse; includes a new "loge" level integrated within the existing superstructure grandstand that now completely surrounds the world-famous No. 16.

On top of it all, the tournament will be played the week of January 26-February 1, 2015, which begins the day after the NFL Pro Bowl and shares the week of the Super Bowl. Both the Pro Bowl Players have traditionally enjoyed competing at the Waste Management Open because of the enthusiastic and large crowds (including the fans at No. 16), the Tom Weiskopf-Jay Morrish golf course and the wide variety of activities available for family members. Tournament officials are hopeful that the playing experience will be enhanced this year after completion of a sixmonth course-renovation project that included the resurfacing of all 18 greens and the relocation of greens on the second, third, fourth and 14th holes. There has also been extensive reshaping of bunkers, greens and tee complexes, which called for the rerouting of some cart paths, and the addition of new paths where necessary.

All bunkers, be they re-shaped or not, will feature new white sand. A new irrigation system has been installed. More than 250 trees have been planted for both strategic and aesthetic value, while spectator hills, a long-time landform staple at TPC golf courses, were lowered and widened to allow for unobstructed views of the McDowell Mountains. The renovation, while staying



and Super Bowl will be played at the University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, just a 35-minute ride from Scottsdale.

Of course, most discussions involving this PGA Tour event center around the 16th hole, the iconic par 3 that has become one of the most famous holes in golf. This elevated status has far less to do with the hole's architecture than the structural architecture that surrounds it. Once a ground-level party hole, then a big-time party hole surrounded by bleachers, then a completely selfcontained stadium hole, the 16th notches another growth ring in its evolution with the addition of the new Loge Section in 2015.

Officials promise the new section will be the newest and coolest spot to hang at the event. The Loge is literally built into the stadium superstructure, featuring unobstructed views of the 15th and 16th holes. The Loge will be outfitted with HD televisions, a wide assortment of food and beverage options and scattered couches to enhance the upscale, avant-garde feel of the Loge and, indeed, the entire 16th-hole environment. And because it will require its own special ticket for entry, the Loge will essentially be a VIP clubwithin-a-club. true to the principles of the original architects, has resulted in strategic changes on all 18 holes. Along with the course improvements, the 28-year-old Mediterranean-style TPC Scottsdale Clubhouse was also renovated, and now features new locker rooms, larger meeting spaces and interior upgrades throughout the facility.

The buzz in the Phoenix-Scottsdale area that week should be palpable as the tournament celebrates its 80th anniversary, the top PGA Tour pros roll into town, the Bird's Nest gets cranked up, the stadium at No. 16 fills up, the Pro Bowl concludes and the Super Bowl hype begins in earnest.

And amid the din, the good works performed by the Phoenix Thunderbirds, the organizers of the event, will likely be celebrating a milestone as well. Since the tournament's inception in 1937, the Thunderbirds have raised over \$93 million for local charities, and the group expects to shatter the \$100 million mark with the help of the 2015 event.

# By Rob Stanger Piping Your Drives with a "Control" Tee Shot


Golf instruction for this issue comes from the 18th tee at Desert Willow's Firecliff Golf Course. The 18th is a fantastic golf hole in the Coachella Valley. It requires you to hit a "control" tee shot that position your ball in the fairway between the creek on the left and the looming bunker to the right.



### The Setup

When setting up for a tee shot that requires optimum control, be sure to pick a very detailed target in the distance to get your focus off of the trouble guarding the fairways. In this picture, I placed a star between the palm trees at the top of the hill as my target, and I have extended a line back through my golf ball as my target line.

In my setup, I want to *feel* that my posture is tall and tilting over the ball. This posture helps my arms and hands hang directly over the toe line so that my arms, hands and golf club will have a clean path back on top of the toe line in the takeaway. Too often, golfers crouch, which puts their arms too close to their body. You can also see how my foot alignment is parallel to my target line, which extends to my target in the distance.



#### Backswing

Since we are executing a control tee-shot, I want a shorter backswing to give me the necessary control to pipe the ball down the middle of the fairway. To complete this backswing, I'll use a full shoulder turn but keep my left arm level to the ground and directly on top of the toe line, with the shaft angled just inches behind the golf ball and toward the target line. The creating of this shaft angle to the target line serves the purpose of establishing the swing plane for the forward swing.

A key element for you to work on in your own backswing is to not *over*swing. Too often, golfers take too big of a backswing and they fail to create the correct angles for this kind of control shot. One way to prevent these errors: Instead of generating power by swinging your arms, use your legs by "loading" them with a knee bend so you can under swing your arms and keep the shaft angled towards the target line.



#### Impact

The key through impact is maintaining a steady speed. You don't want to hit too hard through the ball or, worse, slow down. When hitting control tee shots, you should feel like you are swinging through the ball in the same gear, neither accelerating nor decelerating. You simply maintain the same smooth, steady speed through the ball.

As I am rotating left through impact, I want to feel my right foot stay a little lower to the ground. Keeping my feet very quiet will help my hands maintain a square clubface through impact. It's also important to rotate correctly. Too often, I see golfers stop their body rotation and swing through with their arms, flipping their hands. Remember that body rotation helps the hands maintain a square clubface.



#### Finish

The finish of this control swing is a mirror image of the backswing: a shortened, abbreviated finish. The blue swing plane line that I created at the top of the backswing is now the goal for my finish.

As I rotate through into my finish, there are several factors that influence my perfect swing-plane finish. First, I need a quiet foundation that is in perfect balance. Next, I want a "leveling" of my shoulders into the finish so that my left elbow is level to my right shoulder. Finally, I need a flat left wrist complemented by a cocked right wrist, which keeps the clubface square.

I hope you enjoy working on this "control" tee shot. Successful implemented, this shot will help you on tight driving holes.

# Pete Carlson's Golf & Tennis Golf Expo


The popular exporeturns in 2015 and will be bigger and better than ever




The store location, at 73741 Highway 111, expanded from 10,000 to 14,000 square feet just over a year ago, and its interior is arranged in such a way that Carlson—and others—refer to it as a "golf department store." Carlson's store is growing despite tremendous competition thanks to creative, interactive public relations efforts such as the Golf Expo, as well as in-store jazz concerts.

"They're vital because they show that we are very community oriented and rooted here in the same location for so long," Carlson says. "We're not just selling and retailing."

While the golf department store still drives a majority of store traffic, Carlson notes that tennis sales are up significantly year-overyear. He says the store has always had a good offering of tennis products and expert staff, and there has always been steady tennis traffic over the decades. But now, partly due to the increased visibility and expansion of the Indian Wells Tennis Center's professional competitions, tennis and tennis equipment are back in vogue.

"The tennis tournament is going tremendously, and the spirit of tennis just keeps going up and up," Carlson adds. "We've always had a good offering, but it seems like tennis has been growing faster than golflately, and it's nice to see the game growing again."

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

# Reevaluating Your Real Estate Investment Strategy

he real estate market has seen its ups and downs in the past few years. Well, mostly down, down, down. But now we are seeing values trending in a gentle upswing. The new year will be a good time to reevaluate your real estate assets. What was once a viable asset in your real estate portfolio may have changed due to the movement in home values, rental values and changes in the tax law. Now is the time to find out. #### Good information leads to good decisions

#### Is it Time to Sell?

It could be. Most homeowners are out of the danger zone of owing more money on a home than it is worth. The number of short sales and foreclosures is about a tenth of what it was just three years ago. If you do owe significantly more money than the home is worth, then it might be time to consider a short sale, loan modification or a Deed in Lieu.

Prices are up and we are evolving into a seller's market as buyers return in full force. Many who lost their homes in 2009 or earlier are now buyers again, creating a competitive market for sales and move-in-ready inventory. This turnaround is coming roughly seven years after the housing bust and amid signs that the economic recovery is picking up. As the unemployment rate drops and consumer confidence increases, more buyers are entering the housing market and sellers are finding that they have more leverage in negotiating the prices of their homes.

Fueling this seller's market are several factors that have unexpectedly converged. For-sale listings are limited, which is pushing prices up. At the same time, mortgage rates are rising. #### To Rent or Not to Rent?

A full or seasonal rental strategy may be a way to increase the profitability of your real estate asset. Even your primary residence may be a rental opportunity. Some of my clients rent out their homes for a few weeks each summer or during events, using the rental monies to pay for a much-needed vacation. If you own a second home, you may want to consider offering it as a seasonal or even full-time rental. Adam Ochoa of The Practice CPA, one of the Coachella Valley's leading accounting firms, says, "There are many tax advantages of vacation-home ownership. Generally, the expenses of ownership become deductible in proportion to the amount it is rented, compared to the total that it is used. This is limited to your income, but it can allow you to deduct a portion of the HOA fees and other expenses that are not normally deductible. In addition, the interest and taxes are deductible if this is your second home"

Using a second home as a seasonal rental has many advantages. First, you can still set aside time for personal use and rent it out when you are not using it. The second advantage is that the dollar amount for a seasonal rental can be very lucrative during the designated high season in an area. Websites such as HomeAway and VRBO allow owners to rent out their vacation or second homes, while Airbnb and Couchsurfing take a more social-mediainfluenced method toward matching travelers with available space. In many cases, just renting your second home for a few months of the year can cover the mortgage payment for the entire year. This is a great way to move your second home out the "doghouse" category and into "cash cow" status.

If you are thinking about your home as a seasonal rental, interview professionals in your area. Good resources include a real estate office that specializes in rentals or a property-management company. The percentage that these companies charge is justified in timesaving for the homeowner. There's a lot involved with offering a seasonal rental, including a good contract that protects all parties.

#### You Got to Know When to Hold Em

Once you have finished your valuation and market research, you may find that the best strategy is to hold onto your property. There are always tax consequences to consider, and holding an asset an extra year could provide a significant tax savings as the asset moves from a short-term gain to a long-term investment. It also may be a good time to buy. Prices are continuing to increase and the overall market has been gaining in healthy ways. It may also be a good time to add another investment property to your portfolio.

Americans who lost their homes will be coming back to purchase. Many are now clear of the bank-enforced five-to-sevenyear stay, which has prevented them from financing. According to CNBC, most Americans want to own their own home. Some even call it a biological urge based on our human desire to nest. Whatever the current economic condition of the country, whatever the latest programs offered or atrocities committed by government and banking institutions, that desire doesn't seem to change and is unlikely to change even 25 years from now.

Perhaps Thomas Jefferson put it best: "A right to property is founded in our natural wants." Even after a devastating housing and mortgage crash that resulted in millions of foreclosed homes and trillions of dollars of home equity lost, the majority of Americans have not given up the idea that ownership is representative of their economic dream.

# Going, Going, But Not Yet Gone

# New neighborhoods and homes will soon be available at PGA West

Does location make the property, or does the property make the location? For legendary PGA West, the analogy easily works both ways.

Located in La Quinta, California, The Club at PGA West opened for membership in 1985. New residents, delighted in their prestigious development, quickly united and mapped out their golf membership criteria and future plans for major golf events.

Word spread quickly about the PGA West development. Accolades and awards followed. Construction thrived in the 2,000acre golfand lifestyle community, and professional tour events soon came knocking, PGA West earned its title, "The Western Home of Golf in America," hosting prestigious tournaments that included players from the PGA Tour, Senior PGA Tour, LPGA and NCAA.

Six golf courses helped solidify PGA West's reputation: the Arnold Palmer Private Course, Greg Norman Resort Course, Jack Nicklaus Private Course, Nicklaus Tournament Resort Course, Tom Weiskopf Private Course and the TPC Stadium Resort Course. Three amenity-filled clubhouses added to the mix, making PGA West a golfers paradise, one that finally seemed to be sold out and built out.

Not so fast! Inside PGA West sat approximately 42 acres of raw land that remained undeveloped for nearly three decades. The

parcel, located in the center of the community, was included in the original master plans. Now, the project is finally coming to fruition. Slated to open in July 2015, the Signature Club clubhouse will cater to the three new Signature neighborhoods surrounding it.

Why did it take so long to start the project? According to California West Communities, a development company with more than 60 years of homebuilding expertise and the current owner of the property, the original concept was flawed. Plans called for a hotel to be built on the site, but it became clear that a hotel was neither suited for the area nor in the best interest of homeowners. The city, too, was against the idea. The property was then sold to a housing developer, Remboldt, which started the process of rezoning it for single-family homes. The economic downturn and other problems again stalled the project, and 10 years passed before the site finally landed in the hands of California West.

The property was never formally placed on the market, meaning it was under the radar of most buyers. But California West already had a relationship with the seller and was well positioned to close the deal.

After purchasing the property, California West also took over part of the previous owner's community plans. But a changed



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housing climate and shifting buyer needs made California West reassess those plans. The company opted instead to change the project again, this time with input from various stakeholders.

The company listened to the city, PGA West neighbors and the governing HOA, and the plan evolved as part of a community effort. Among the changes from the original: a decrease in attached housing and fewer units overall.

There will be 230 residences in total, located in three distinct neighborhoods. The Villas will offer condominiums ranging from approximately 1,466 to 2,298 square feet. The Haciendas' oneand two-story residences will average 1,941 to 2,429 square feet, while homes in The Estates will be the largest, with floor plans of approximately 2,528 to 3,479 square feet. Included across the nearly 42 acres will be golf-course home sites with private yards.

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For those looking to live the PGA West lifestyle, the new Signature neighborhoods with their Spanish-style luxury homes may be just the ticket. California West Communities is dedicated to quality, consistency and attention to detail in its homes, and committed to making the home-buying experience a positive one. The fact that the development plan was a thoughtful collaboration between California West, the city and members of the community speaks to the fact that, however long it was in the making, this vision for the long-awaited parcel in PGA West is finally the right one.

Here are some of our favorites. **Morgan's in the Desert** (La Quinta Resort & Spa, 49-499 Eisenhower Drive, La Quinta, 760.564.7600). This is the creation of (multiple) James Beard Award winning chef Jimmy Schmidt, who favors local/seasonal ingredients and likes to cook fast. The current menu includes entrées such as red-honey-glazed nova salmon with sweet corn and chive pudding and roasted-pepper and cilantro chimichurri, and hazelnut-crusted rack of Colorado lamb with baby artichoke and sunchoke gratin, wild mushrooms and garlic chives. From Dec. 1-15, patrons can enjoy the Santa Barbara spiny lobster festival, while the Pomegranate Festival runs from Dec. 16 16th-3th. There's, and an Alba white truffle special all month. Do try one of the interesting vintage cocktails. *MorgansintheDesert.com* 

Lavender Bistro (78-073 Calle Barcelona, La Quinta, 760.564.5353). Chef Nicolas Despras turns out exceptional flavor pairings, such as norisesame-crusted Pacific ahi tuna with bamboo rice, spiced carrot-sake-sweet ginger sauce, steamed baby bok choy, and green papaya-Ataulfo mango relish. There's also a cold seafood menu that includes a seafood platter with four oysters, four shrimp, lb. of king crab legs,

lb. mussels, and a half Maine lobster so you can taste all of the seafood on the list. The beautiful al fresco patio dining area gets booked early, so plan ahead. *lavenderbistro.com* 





**Tiramisu Ristorante Italiano** (72655 Hwy. 111, Palm Desert, 760.773.9100). Sicilian Chef Mario Marfia and his wife, Marika, pack a lot of people into this cozy Italian trattoria that is usually booked solid. Traditional foods such as cioppino, made with mussels, clams, shrimp, sea scallops and salmon in a light tomato sauce, and Rigatoni alla Norma, a rigatoni pasta with eggplant, tomato sauce and aged ricotta,



are signature dishes. Agnello alla brace, a grilled marinated rack of lamb with spinach and roasted potatoes, is an excellent choice on a cool winter night. Tiramisu's wine list includes rare treats such as Brunello Di Montalcino, Poggione Riserva, Tuscany 2006 and American favorites including Rutherford Hill Merlot Napa Valley 2009. *trattoriatiramisu.us* 

Sirocco at Renaissance Esmeralda Resort (44-400 Indian Wells Lane, Indian Wells, 760.773.4444). A staple in the Coachella Valley for more than a decade, Sirocco has just been updated into Sirocco Pizza Company (SPC). It's now a high-energy, casual Italian eatery with communal tables, a 900-degree wood pizza oven, "do it yourself" cheese and charcuterie boards and a walk-up to-go window for guests and residents. The pasta menu includes tagliatelle with locally made spicy Fulvio's sausage and a signature SPC salad with wild arugula, prosciutto di Parma, Bartlett pear, sunflower seeds, gorgonzola dolce and



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balsamic vinaigrette. The twelve Neapolitan pizzas have a bit of char to the crust and gluten-free crust is available. *marriott.com/hotel-restaurants/pspsrrenaissance-indian-wells-resort-andspa/sirocco/74424/home-page.mi*  **The Grill on Main** (78-065 Main St., La Quinta, 760.777.7773) has only been in Old Town since 2010, but the executive chef and manager, Brett Maddock, has a background that includes Ritz-Carlton hotels and Arnold Palmer's in La Quinta,

making him perfect for this casual establishment. The eclectic weekend brunch menu ranges from huevos rancheros and crab cake Benedict to a brown-sugar bacon burger and beerbattered fish and chips. A vegetarian quesadilla with broccolini, onion, peppers, shiitake mushrooms, spinach, goat cheese and guacamole, and a bison burger are gems on the lunch and dinner menus, along with dozens of salads, burgers, sandwiches and casual seafood items. *thegrillonmain.com* 







# The Mercedes-ANG GT Takes On All Challengers



Sleek, light, fast-exactly what a super sports car should be



sychologists have found that men can generally agree on what they consider to be attractive traits in a woman. It's hardly worth the academic brain cells to study the same concept about cars. Line up a cohort and gaze upon the new Mercedes-AMG GT. The consensus won't waiver. This is undeniably an attractive car.

Begin your inspection deep in the bones. The aluminum-frame body is light and

strong. Weight was reduced massively from GT's sister, the SLS. At just over 3,000 pounds, this featherweight contender throws its weight around perfectly; the 47/53 front-to-back distribution is ideal for the frame on which it rides.

Marry that high-tension frame with a seven-speed, two-clutch automatic and you have yourself a nice pairing. Hang onto your bucket seat when you round the corner in the GT (or its big brother, the GT S) and

have the definition of tight cornering impressed on you. Four hydraulic mounts support the underpinnings of the drive train. To make a physics problem seem easy, these mounts fool the tires into thinking they are caring less weight, thus make the steering even more responsive.

A shorter wheelbase than the SLS also keeps things in line. The GT is formidable in the sector that defines sports cars. This isn't a one-off afterthought on the part of

Mercedes-AMG. Designers sculpted the GT to compete at every level with the best, and compete it does.

More than 450 horsepower gives the GT advantage over Jaguar, Maserati and Audi. The GTS breaks the 500-horsepower barrier and threatens to break the 200-mph mark at top speed (193 mph is the preliminary benchmark Mercedes-AMG is publishing). Sub-four-second 0-60 mph times aren't just impressive; they're astonishingly fast.

As for the body on this beauty, it's pin-up quality. A sleeker nose than the SLS makes driving it even more fun. And at three inches slimmer, the GT offers more visibility than the SLS, though it's a little less aggressive in its overall look. The thin hood height lends itself to a longer, sleeker build, while the muscle seems to come from the cascading cpillars that end in a brute tail. Clearly Mercedes-AMG is giving more than a nod to the Porsche 911; it's throwing down the gauntlet to go head-to-head.

Mercedes leaves nothing undone inside the GT. A large center console—cup holder included just for us Americans—demands attention. The dashboard ignites and the surprisingly high roofline makes so much sense it's almost shocking. No, there couldn't be this much room in a super sports car, could there? The intelligence and smartdrive features that have put Mercedes ahead of every manufacturer are not lost on the GT.

Of course, the AMG badge means you get the ultimate in luxury. This is a handmade work of art. Consider the handcrafted seats. The leather tells you immediately that it was chosen for something special, and it was. These are seats you won't mind spending plenty of time in.

The twin turbos inside the hood are all natural, meaning that what you hear is what is actually happening rather than those faux soundtracks so popular in other models. The high end gets a little throaty according to some who clearly have too much time on their hands and not enough imagination. But the 4-liter V8 is more than capable of having your ears perked to its comings and goings. It promises to get stares from gawkers even at 7,000 RPM, where the "notes" may lack a bit of growl.

A rear spoiler extends and retracts at appropriate speeds. While the gull wings so popular in the SLS are no more, the functionality of the GT and GT S is evident. Paddle shifters to user interface, every detail has been considered. The competition must be taking notice. Watch for Porsche salesmen to brush up their resumes and come knocking at your local Mercedes dealer any day.

While U.S. pricing hasn't been announced, it's likely to mirror the Porsche 911 pricing closely at around \$120,000.

Expect this girl's dance card to fill fast.


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

#### What is the history of your company?

It was actually an accident. My original direction was to get my doctorate in clinical psychology after a double major in psych and English. During school breaks, I used to go to my dad's clothing factories in eastern Pennsylvania and his offices in New York. I was always artistic. Someone In New York suggested I go for an interview at one of the most innovative menswear companies in the industry, and I was offered a job. I made the decision to follow my creative side.

I moved to New York City and the Barbizon Hotel for Women, where if I stretched out my hands I could touch the walls on both sides of my bed. Moving In during the summer and reading books on the roof, I poured pitchers of water on my head to cool down, waiting to go back to work on Mondays. I loved what I did and put in as many hours as I could. I'm a lucky girl; I love what I do.

#### What is your inspiration as a fashion designer?

My inspiration? Every time I open my eyes, or for that matter, close them. I'm constantly invaded by ideas and have always been the one to set the trend toward whatever looks fresh to me. Influences can be anything from architecture to art to a horse's mane. Once I had a surprise party for my husband's 40th birthday. Since he thinks he's a reincarnated cowboy, I hired a horse to come to the loft. From that horse, I took a few strands of the mane and got the next shade of khaki to use for the upcoming season.

Inspiration can come from anywhere. I see art in everything I look at. It evolves regardless of the project I'm working on: clothing, painting, photography, jewelry, and some new projects that will only be available in fine art galleries and my online galleria. (Sneak peak alert: One of them is art dolls.)

# Do you follow the latest RTW trends (colors, silhouettes, fabrics, detailing) shown on the U.S. and European runways?

Not really. I'm always aware but would rather create the trends according to our customers' tastes rather than follow trends that may not be suitable.

#### Do your customers influence your styles?

Women of all sizes request the Sadock CollectIon styles, so we run tops in XS thru XXL. Bottoms range from 0 thru 18 or 20. Every style goes through a rigorous fitting procedure. I won't release anything for production until it's approved in all ways, from proper manufacturing of all details and placements to the fit of each and every item. We take all body types into consideration and won't place a detail anywhere that could be unflattering. I want every customer to look like a piece of art, even if wearing one of our solid tops.

# Who is the Sadock customer? Is she the same customer you originally designed for when the line first launched?

This woman is not afraid to make a statement. She is confident and feels special when wearing my designs. She's not just wearing an outfit but a piece of art. This has been my customer, whether conservative or edgy, since I started in business. She was [with me] at Le Coq Sportive, at Ixspa 2000 and has remained loyal.

#### What's in the future for Jamie Sadock?

Actif by Jamie Sadock is our new multisport performance/lifestyle apparel line. I had been asked for years to put my twist into the men's business, and we launched J MEN by Jamie Sadock in 2012. Another new category is Jamie's JammIes fun nightwear, which will be exclusively online at the Sadock Galleria store.

The international part of the business is growing daily. As part of my history is a strong acceptance, it's wonderful to have this momentum and acclaim worldwide. I loved walking down the street in Japan seeing my designs in five store windows! The first Jamie Sadock store opened a few years ago in Prague, which was an exhilarating milestone. More Sadock stores are in the works, which is thrilling.

My fine-art photography has now been in several gallery shows, and I'm always working on new ways to expand my photography aspiration whenever I have a restful moment. There is a new jewelry collection just launching now at special events. I've been

This piece is priced at \$3,600.
