The golfing great is gone but will not be forgottenin the Coachella Valley.

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
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Finally, the season is upon us! The courses are all in mint condition and the weather is, as always, amazing.

ARNOLD PALMER SEPT 10, 1929 - SEPT 25, 2016

ince Arnold Palmer passed away on Sept. 25, some of the planet's best scribes have been hard at work attempting to encapsulate his life and times and his impact on the game of golf. As those stories are told, somewhere within the copy is a nod to Palmer's connection to the Coachella Valley. The stories would not be complete without it.

Like tourists attempting to describe Machu Picchu, or newbies fumbling to explain what Burning Man is all about, the writers have struggled. There is simply too much life, too many times and an inordinate amount of impact to cover in one article. From professionals flying to events to municipal players sharing a postround ice-tea-and-lemonade combo, it's not unrealistic to say that much that is done in and around the modern game of golf can be directly or indirectly traced back to Palmer.

That goes double for the Coachella Valley, which Palmer first visited in the 1950s. He competed there during the '60s and '70s, designed courses during the '80s and '90s and served as an unofficial ambassador for the region from the moment he set eyes on it. Palmer helped turn an undiscovered desert landscape 100 miles from Los Angeles into the golf mecca it is today, and he championed the area not just as a place to play golf and relax on vacation, but as a place to live, part-time or otherwise.

Palmer arrived in the valley in 1955 just to have a look around. He immediately saw the possibilities for world-class golf that would eventually help the area become the home of winter golf in the United States. The next year, he played in the Thunderbird Invitational, and saw the possibility for increased golf-course development with even more spectacular features and exclusivity. Over the next 50 years, he would design or have his hands on no fewer than eight courses in the area, each one considered a gem as it was added to the desert's rota.

Palmer's love of the desert ensured that he'd participate annually in the valley's fledgling PGA Tour event, which evolved from the Thunderbird Invitational into the Palm Springs Desert Classic and eventually into the Bob Hope Classic and all its later iterations. America's love of Palmer ensured that all eyes would be on the desert each and every time he competed there. That, too, brought attention and prestige to the burgeoning resort getaway, and Palmer did nothing to disassociate himselffrom it.

When Bob Hope and former president Dwight D. Eisenhower began to advocate for the desert as a golf and vacation destination, it was only a matter of time before their predictions became self-fulfilling prophecies. By 1960, Palmer had a TheKing

residence at Bermuda Dunes and hung out with Eisenhower, a member at Eldorado, and Hope, who had his famous mountaintop compound in Palm Springs.

Within a few years, the Coachella Valley was no longer a secret playground of Hollywood elite, thanks mostly to the exposure the game and Palmer were getting from the TV cameras. The 1960s and '70s were heydays for the Classic tournament, as top players, including Palmer, were winning, and top screen and television stars were participating in the five-day event. Palmer won his fifth desert event in 1973, his last on the Tour, but he was never far from the tournament either spiritually or through personal participation, even acting as host of the 50th anniversary event in 2009.

Back in the early days, it wasn't uncommon to see Palmer out in the streets, on the course or dining and socializing during those swanky desert nights. His favorite watering holes were well known, and Palmer was, as usual, willing to meet, greet and even drink with new friends made while making the rounds.

Already a desert icon after five wins in the Desert Classic,

Palmer further entwined himself in the valley's history as he became involved in the development of many of the area's top courses. Perhaps most notable is the Tradition Club in La Quinta, where Palmer lived and built one of his most critically acclaimed courses. The ultra-private club is still one of the valley's most sought after memberships. Other courses in the Coachella Valley with design links to Palmer include SilverRock Resort, The Palmer Private Course at PGA West and Mission Hills' Palmer Course.

He also designed the Classic Club, which opened in 2005 and was constructed to serve as the home of the Bob Hope Classic for years to come. But when high winds plagued the initial events, the tournament was moved away from the course. Palmer said in a 2009 radio interview he didn't believe he'd live to see the Classic Club play the way he intended, implying that the young trees planted on the course would eventually have a sheltering effect against the winds of Banning Pass.

Golfcourse designs, memory packed clubhouses and late-night haunts—not to mention the Arnold Palmer Prostate Center at Eisenhower Lucy Curci Cancer Center, a not-for-profit treatment center for prostate cancer—all are continuing reminders of Palmer's legacy in the desert. Golfers from around the world still clamor to play his desert layouts, his charitable contributions still positively affect lives in the area and there's still a restaurant in La Quinta bearing his name.

The King may be gone, but it is unlikely he will ever be forgotten—particularly in the Southern California desert, which conducted a mutual love affair with him for more than 61 years.

hen the CareerBuilder Challenge tees off January 18-22 in La Quinta, California, it will be the 58th version of the tournament that began in 1960 as the Palm Springs Desert Golf Classic. Yet somehow, this year's event seems younger than

It's a time warp brought on in part by the passing of time and individuals who were once the heart of the tournament, the "millennialization" of the Coachella Valley's tourist base, the PGA Tour's fan demographic and a conscious effort by tournament officials to reboot the modern tournament as an annual gathering that valley social animals consider a can't-miss event.


"People here really want this event to be relevant and they want community connectivity to it," says Nick Raffaele, tournament director. "When you're trying to go from AAA baseball to the majors, or trying to turn something around, the first thing isn't action, it's vision. We've got a lot of

great people and a lot of great partners helping us execute that vision. "The No. 1 goal and No. 1 mission that Desert Classic Charities wakes up to every morning is to raise charitable donations for this valley year over year," he continues. "When it's your goal to raise charitable donations, you've got to create top-line growth, and to do that, you've got to create a fan experience. It's that simple."

sponsors, a change in format from a five-day to a four-day event and the elimination of the celebrity element—a longtime staple of the competition. These changes helped consolidate operations and lure higher-ranked players.

Now, with CareerBuilder as the title sponsor, tournament officials are attempting to cultivate a crisp new image, highlighting sun and fun while maintaining a healthy respect for the days gone by. "We want to grow more relevant in the world of connectivity, just as the entire PGA Tour does, and that's usually aimed at a younger demographic," Raffaele says. "But we know you don't grow just by switching demographics; you go with the demographic you own and then you add to it. That why at our tournament, we'll reach out

to all fans. We've got two components, one is about energy and one is about relaxation."

One need only visit the tournament website to get a feel for what today's organizers are aiming for with their push for freshness in 2017. Bold colors, camera flashes, cheering fans and hashtags galore are front-and-center (#GameChanger, #SeriousFun, #BucketList, #ArniesArmy, #fun, #sun, #cocktails, #golf, #friends, #music,

cocktails and music, you think of fun and sun. You think of an oasis, you think of Splash House, Desert Trip, all our golf courses...I mean, that's why people come here."

Raffaele adds that this year's pro-am events sold out in early November, noting that the last time all pro-ams were sold out at this time of year the tournament was still known as the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. Now, a pro-am waiting list is forming.

Steps Up to President of the PGA

Before being elected president in November, Levy served as vice president and secretary

ounded in 1916, PGA of America is the largest working sports organization in the world. It's comprised of dedicated men and women who passionately promote the game of golf to everyone, everywhere. Their mission is to promote the growth and success of the game.

On November 11, Paul Levy, 56, made his final step up the ladder from vice president to assume the role as 40th president of this prestigious organization. A lifelong golfer, Levy earned his PGA membership in 1986 with the simple aspiration of helping an organization that represented the game he loved.

At the start, the PGA had no idea that newcomer Levy was a consummate "doer," never without his daily diary, calendar and appointment book in-hand. The organization would soon discover, however, that Levy would work tirelessly to grow the game, represent the game, give back to the game and accomplish tasks that many thought fruitless.

Over the years, the new president has accomplished a multitude of projects for the PGA and the organization embraces his efforts. But Levy is quick to point out, "It's not just one person. We all work together for the good of the game and love what we do."

At his office at Toscana Country Club in Indian Wells, California, where Levy is the general manager, CEO and a resident, visitors are immediately struck by his obvious passion for golf. The walls are covered with photographs of Levy with golf's greatest, pictures of his family on and off the course, autographed items from courses and tournaments around the world, awards, recognitions and a peculiar plaque with a gavel on it representing Levy's tenure on the PGA's Board of Control. On his desk are the obligatory stacks of paperwork, his appointment book and a small version of the Ryder Cup trophy, a reminder of the game's greatest moments and his upcoming role in Paris in 2018, when the Ryder Cup will be contested at Le Golf National.

Seated at his desk, Levy is outgoing and eager to talk golf. However, in a world where the first thing we all do is a Google search, little comes up about Levy's golf game. So how did golf come into his life?

"This is an interesting story," the New Orleans native says. "My dad had a bad back so he never played. Every Sunday we'd go out to dinner and there was a putt-putt course nearby, and I always wanted to play. When we went on vacation, I'd nag my dad because I always wanted to play putt-putt." But it wasn't until Levy was almost 12 that he got to play real golf. "We were building a house and moved into an apartment in New Orleans," he says. "It was a little before my 12th birthday. My brother had a friend in high school that lived in the same building and he would hit whiffle balls in the courtyard. He had clubs and everything. He wanted to play, and I wanted to play, so I started tagging along. The very first time I played I was hooked." That first course was Pontchartrain Golf Course.

At Louisiana State University, from which he graduated in 1983, Levy was a three-year member of the Tigers golf team. Early in his career, he often participated in PGA Section events, finishing third in 1985 and runner-up in 1986 in the Southern Texas PGA Assistant Championship.

In 1992, he founded PKL Golf Group Company, a golf management and development company. He served as its president and CEO and still operates that entity today. In fact, the term "president" pops up often related to Levy. He's also president of club operations and development for Sunrise Company, a Palm Desert-based development group.

Levy grew up playing public courses and what he loves about the game is that you make it or break it on your own. "It's up to you what happens out there," he says. "I love everything about it; golf really is my life. I don't play as much as I like. I used to play every day. But I have some back issues now and play 30 to 40 rounds a year."

For Levy and his wife, Heidi, golf is a family affair. They are the parents of three sons, two daughters and five grandchildren. "Heidi plays, all the kids play, and I did get to play Hazeltine with my boys after the Ryder Cup. That was really special," he says. "Everything in my life is intertwined with golf."

Recalling a multitude of exciting moments pertaining to golf, Levy is quick to boast about his seven holes in one, and rightly so. But he contemplates for a moment when asked to name his ultimate foursome, finally replying, "One, he never played golf, so my dad; two, my brother, who passed away six days after I lost the PGA election in 2010—he loved to play golf; and then Jack Nicklaus."

The new president of PGA of America has some thoughts on the state of the game he loves. "We are in the seventh year where there are more courses closing than opening and I think that is a natural

correction. People have to remember that not all golf courses were built for the same reasons," he notes, pointing out that some clubs and courses were built primarily to sell homes.

"Then you have for-profit golf courses," he continues. "Many that were built in the last 20 years never quite figured out how it was supposed to work. My point being that in the last seven years, the numbers are getting better because there are only so many businesses you can have. I also think we are going to see a renaissance of golf and over the next 14 to 15 years we are going to see a spike back up. Right now we have the greatest young players in the world…and we are doing as much as we can to bring youth into the game with the junior golf programs."

As Levy looks at his appointment book, he realizes there's time for just one more thought. When asked to describe his life in one sentence, he breaks into a huge smile. "Golf has given me everything. Golf is my life. I am so blessed."

For decades, tennis enthusiasts have come from around the world to play at and enjoy the valley's superb resorts and tennis facilities. Here's our list of the top places to combine a tennis vacation with excellent dining, spas, pools and family amenities.

JW Marriott Desert Springs Resort & Spa Palm Desert, California

The JW Marriot Desert Springs Resort & Spa has everything tennis enthusiasts need, including 20 courts managed by Peter Burwash International (PBI) featuring hard, clav or grass surfaces for maximum flexibility. The resort also offers lighted courts and events, demonstrations and clinics for all skill sets. Classes are available to hotel guests and the public, with morning clinics especially popular according to Dave Kensler, head tennis professional. Tennis Resorts Online ranks JW Desert Springs the No. 3 tennis resort in the world and No. 3 in the world for instruction and tennis programming. Each Saturday from late December to April, guests can see the popular PBI Tennis Show, which has been performed in 99 countries and includes skits, music, raffle drawings and invaluable tennis tips.

La Quinta Resort & Club, A Waldorf Astoria Resort La Ouinta. California

Legendary La Quinta Resort & Club has long been at the forefront of hosting tennis tournaments and providing excellent tutelage and instruction to athletes. Tennis Resorts Online ranks La Quinta among its Top 50 Tennis Resorts & Camps. The expansive facilities include 23 courts with hard or clay surfaces and the highly regarded tournament-style stadium center court. Says Lynne Rolley, executive director of tennis, "Many people visit our resort just to play on our center court or take pictures of it." Events are still held there, as they have been for decades. PBI Director of Tennis Kevin Connolly says it's a place to relax and unwind. The seven hard courts are situated near the spa, providing an easy wind-down after a day of exercise. As Connolly notes, Desert Smash is where "Hollywood and tennis collide." The event has drawn celebrities such as Will Ferrell, Justin Beiber, Novak Djokovic and Maria Sharapova.



Omni Rancho Las Palmas Resort & Spa Rancho Mirage, California

Before the Omni Rancho Las Palmas Resort & Spa, there was Desert Air Hotel & Resort, which had a private airstrip and clientele that included Hollywood luminary Marilyn Monroe. When the resort became the Omni Rancho Las Palmas in the 1970s, Cary Grant, Bob Hope and other celebrities appeared frequently. Today, the legacy of the 240acre resort, which enjoys a ranking among the top 25 tennis resorts in the world, continues. Amenities include one of the larger tennis complexes in the valley with 25 hard courts managed by Cliff Drysdale Tennis, as well as Splashtopia, a fanciful water park for kids and families. Indian Wells Tennis Garden Indian Wells. CA

Highly anticipated Indian Wells Tennis Garden opened in March 2000, featuring the second largest tennis stadium in the world and a year-round tennis club. It's home to the BNP Paribas Open, the largest international tennis tournament after the four Grand Slams. This gives tennis fans the opportunity to play on the same 29 hard courts on which many of the greatest professionals have competed. There's also access to a range of programs for individuals and groups as well as clinics and camps for all ages.

Palm Springs Tennis Club Palm Springs, California

Opened in 1937, Palm Springs Tennis Club is the oldest standing club in the valley. It was originally situated below Pearl McManus' mansion and attracted everyone from Palm Springs' then mayor, Frank Bogart, to Hollywood legends. Today, the club features 11 courts and a stunning downtown location. Bill Markley, tennis coordinator, says, "It's probably the most beautiful setting you'll ever see." Lessons with the club's three pros are open to the public, but tennis matching is for members and hotels guests only. Fortunately, you don't have to be a member or tennis enthusiast to book a table at Spencer's Restaurant, described by Markley as, "the best restaurant in the whole valley."

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

Billie Jean King

This superstar believes in helping others be their best and tennis is just part of it

he's one of the most influential people in the world, and she's also one of the most approachable. Billie Jean King made her way back to the Coachella Valley in November for the annual Mylan World Team Tennis (WTT) yearend nationals for WTT recreational and corporate leagues, where she kicked off the weekend of play with a Wilson coaching clinic, personal team visits and photos with the teams before attending a players' reception.

She was joined by her partner, Ilana Kloss, CEO and Commissioner of Mylan WTT. More than 500 players, representing 69 teams and 18 states, gathered at Palm Valley Country Clubin Palm Desert, California, for the festivities.

The former World No. 1 professional tennis player won 39 Grand Slam titles and the singles title at the inaugural Women's Tennis Association (WTA) Tour Championships. She was founder of WTA, World TeamTennis (WTT) and the Women's Sports Foundation, and she was inducted into the International Tennis

Hall of Fame in 1987. In 1973, at age 29, King won the infamous Battle of the Sexes tennis match against 55-year-old Bobby Riggs. She is respected around the globe for demanding equal pay for women on the tennis courts, a catalyst to permanent social change and equality for women throughout the country.

Celebrating this culmination of WTT's 41st year was a priority for King, who in 1974 first conceived the idea of genderequal teams comprised of two men, two women and a coach to play each other in grassroots style. Catchy team names include the Orange County Breakers and Philadelphia Freedoms, of which King was an original team member (and yes, King and the team inspired Elton John, a friend of King's, to write the song, "Philadelphia Freedom")

King's loyalty to WTT remains rock solid. "This is very important to me." she says. "There were a lot of events on the schedule for me this weekend, but you'll notice that I'm here. These players...they're the customers. Everything about this just works."

King acknowledges that it can be difficult to balance everything in her professional and personal life. "The past six to eight months have been tough," she says. "I haven't been able to work out the way I want. [Producer] Shonda Rimes wrote a book called *The Year of Yes*. Well. I need to live 'The Year of No.' My problem is that I love what I do, and I'm running out of time on earth. I'm in my 70s, and I don't mind that, but I just want to do so much."

King believes in the positive impact of tennis beyond the courts. "My mom always told my brother Randy and me, 'You've got to keep moving,' Tennis is such a great way to do that. It's a great lifetime sport, good for the health of our people and our country. Tennis is also a great life experience that helps in getting jobs. Employers want to see that people are self-reliant as well as team players. It's a way to stand out."

It's important to note, she adds, "that the best people make other players better. That's what defines a superstar. Stars can be good at their game, but a superstar helps sports, and she continues to make her mark today. Her main thrust remains the pursuit of equality in society—for both men and women. "I've fought hard for equality since I was 12 years old," she says. "That's the essence of what I want for all. Equality was huge in the 1970s, then it evolved into diversity. Now we're back to equality, which makes this fight a little easier. Bottom line, it all comes down to one word: equality."

those around him or her to be the best they can be."

King, who started on the public courts in Long Beach, California, still remembers fondly the early days when she would make the trip to Palm Springs to play in junior tournaments at age 13. She recalls her excitement playing at the prestigious Racquet Club in Palm Springs, where the Hollywood set hung out with club founders Charlie Farrell and Ralph Bellamy and tennis "hostess" Julie Copeland. The self-avowed "California kid" says, "I still love everything about movies and film. I grew up with the classics."

And she still advocates for equality in every arena. In the past months King attended several fundraisers for Hillary Clinton. "This is quite remarkable for this generation," she says. "If you think about it, the frame of reference for a 14 or 15 year old today is that you have an African American serving as president and a woman running for the office. People my age have primarily only known of white males being president."

Discussing the recent situation at Harvard University, where the men's soccer team was suspended for the rest of the season over behavior toward the women's soccer team. King says. "It's a shame. People really want to follow each other. No one wants to be the misfit. All it takes is one person to say, 'No, we're not going to do this' to at least try to change something that is harmful or hurtful That's what leadership is, stepping up to shift those dynamics for both boys and girls. When we are younger, we all want to be alike, but when we are older, being different is how you get ahead with your career."

Throughout her life, King has created new inroads for both genders in and out of

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
By Michael Meng and Dr. Lynn Beasley Newton's Second Law & The Golf Swing

Want the ball to go farther? Look to science.

In golf, the most important factor affecting the travel distance of the ball is the speed of the club head at impact with the ball.


That's a reasonable statement and probably one few instructors or players would disagree with. Less clear is how, exactly, a golfer accelerates the club head to achieve maximum speed at impact.

That's where Sir Isaac Newton comes in. To understand how to apply body power to the club and increase club-head speed, we turn to Newton's laws of motion, those basic scientific theories of physics, mechanics, dynamics and kinematics. In the last issue we talked about the golf swing and Newton's third law. In this issue, it's Newton's second law we're concerned with.



Bear with us for a short physics lesson. Newton's second law tells us that for circular movement: $F = m^*a = m^* V^*V/r$, the direction of the velocity (V) is perpendicular to the direction of the force (F). If a golfer accelerates the club head along the armclub line, the club head's speed will be increased (the club's radius, r, does not change). It's important to understand that the direction of acceleration is in line with the arms and club—not toward the target. This is the opposite of what most golfers intend to do as they swing. In this article, we'll try to clarify what the intention should be.

To better understand and conceptualize how to generate this force, think about the hammer throw in track and field. For athletes in that sport, there is a pulling force through the body felt in the shoulders and arms. This is a key point for golfers to remember: the pulling force is to your body, not to the hole or fairway. If you feel you're "pushing" the club or club head and using your arms or hands to try to hit the ball to the target, the result will not be ideal because the application of the force is in the wrong direction to increase acceleration.



Because golfers use a circular orbit from downswing to finish, they must exert a centripetal force (center-seeking force) to keep the club head moving on the circular orbit, especially during the downswing. This force is proportional to the square of the velocity of the club head divided by the radial distance between the club head and the golfer's body (center of mass), and can reach about 100 lbs. at the impact zone and continue to accelerate through the release.

The ability of a golfer to withstand such force at the impact zone is the main limitation in the ability to swing at high club-head speeds and stay on path. Not surprising, many professionals include heavy weight-lifting exercises in their regimen in order to increase their ability to withstand this force.

There are also other strategies that can help increase the final velocity of the club head while exerting the same centripetal force. For example, because the centripetal force depends on the square of the club-head velocity divided by the radial distance between the club head and the golfer's center of mass, it's possible to increase velocity (with the same centripetal force) by adding to the radial distance.



From a physiological perspective, this requires allowing the arms to extend as far as possible-and relaxation is the key. By completely relaxing your shoulders and arms and allowing your arms to dangle free and relaxed as they carry the centripetal force,

you actually extend the circle's radius. At the same time, the lower body and legs will drive the force (to the body not to the target) as explosively as possible to accelerate the club head into impact.

However—and this is critical—if you try to add force by using your arms, wrists or hands, the radius will actually be shortened and the swing power will disappear immediately. Thus, good golfers do not use their arms to generate power.

To summarize, here's how you can use Newton's second law to improve your golf swing:

To increase club-head speed, try pulling the club in toward your body (maybe to belly, chest or between, depending on the club) on the downswing. The club head will hit the ball naturally. Do not push the club to the target.

Use the big muscles of your legs and trunk to swing and allow your arms to be tension free. Do not try to add power by applying force with your arms, wrists and hands. Not only will this result in no power, it will actually rob the power generated by the big muscles of the body and ruin the entire swing.

Although longer arms can add to the length of the radius of the swing circle, golfers should not try to make both arms straight at setup and at the impact zone, especially the right arm for righthanded golfers.

We have only just begun to cover the science of the golf swing. The body structure for an optimum golf swing is complicated and involves not just physics but other sciences as well, including structure mechanics and dynamics. That said, understanding Newton's laws is an excellent place to start.



Golfer's Playbook Green Reading Made Simple

PGA West features some very difficult putting greens across its six golf courses. The good news is that you don't necessarily have to have a great putting stroke to make putts. In fact, the Hall of Fame is filled with legendary golfers who did not have what would be considered a technically good putting stroke. What they *did* have was an ability to accurately read the slope of the green. Here's what you need to know.



Establish the "Clock Around the Hole"

When I'm looking over a putt, the first thing I establish is what I call "the clock around the hole." To give you an accurate frame of reference, the size of this clock relates to the length of the flagstick. On this clock, the primary points you want to establish are the 6 o'clock putt, or straight uphill into the hole, and the 12 o'clock putt, the straight downhill putt into the hole. Establishing these two reference points now lets you fill in the other angles of the clock, e.g. the 3 and 9 o'clock putts, which are usually the putts that have the most break around the hole and make up what I refer to as "the putting equator." Putts below the putting equator are uphill putts and putts above the putting equator are downhill putts. This may seem conceptually elementary, but it's very important to understand in the execution of a putt.



Practice Stroke from the Peak of the Arc

Once I have established the speed I want the ball to roll to the hole, that creates the arc of the putt. I like to make a practice stroke from the peak of the arc in order to give myself a feel for the arc, slope and pace of the putt. This location of practice stroke also makes me feel like the putt is shorter than it actually is and gives me a chance to make the practice stroke while looking down inside the hole.

Try these techniques on how to improve your ability to read greens more accurately and give yourself a better feel for executing your putts.





Launch Line

What makes putting so challenging is the amount of slope that a golfer has to calculate, especially on the side-hill putts from the 3 and 9 o'clock angles. I select the launch direction of a putt based on the speed I want the ball to roll. My strategy behind this is that I increase the speed of the ball as it rolls to the hole in order to reduce the amount of break the ball will have. Getting back to the putting equator, if I have a putt below the equator. I execute the putt with extra speed on the ball to eliminate as much break as possible. In the photo on the opposite page, the white ball rolling to the hole is a ball rolling with extra speed and therefore less break. The pink ball has 'exact' speed, therefore I need to play additional break and I try to roll the ball at exact speed to the hole. The white ball in the photo to the left represents the speed that I use on putts above the equator, meaning at exact speed with maximum break. The pink ball is rolling on a more direct line to the hole and with extra speed.

The two photos show the difference of how I adjust my speed and launch line when I have putts below and above the equator line.



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Bikram Yoga for Golfers & Others Just Breathe & By Ann Marie Palma

s Faith Hill would sing, "Just Breeeeathe!" In yoga, we move with our breath. Breathing properly and completely is key to a successful yoga practice. Yet proper breathing doesn't happen automatically; it takes awareness

New practitioners to Bikram yoga are often intimidated by the heat element and the duration factor, so the first advice I give my new students is this: "Breathing is mandatory; everything else is optional." I get a good laugh and it breaks the ice—but honestly, it's the truth. No posture can be effective or healthy if one is holding his or her breath. Breathing properly also improves posture, a great benefit for athletes.

Athletes who learn how to breathe properly channel greater oxygen flow to muscles and the brain, optimizing their function. With proper breathing, golfers and tennis pros can swing faster, utilizing less effort. Tension is also relieved with proper breathing. A greater flow of oxygen to the brain sharpens focus and coordination, a plus for spot-on contact of the club or racket.

In addition to breath control throughout a class, in Bikram we have two highly effective specific breathing exercises. One comes at the very beginning of class and one at the very end. This article focuses on the beginning breathing exercise.

We begin our practice with Pranayama breathing, which benefits the lungs and respiratory system. It's a standing breath exercise.

One may ask how this is different than normal breathing in everyday movement. Since breathing is essential to life and since we never have to focus on it, we take it for granted and don't even realize how shallow our everyday breath actually is. Our typical resting breath is more of a short sniffle—nose breathing rather than deep lung breathing. In fact, we typically use only about 20 percent of our lungs' breathing capacity. As we begin exercising, we typically use a greater percentage, but most of the lungs remain unused.

Pranayama breathing changes the shape of our lungs and actually increases our lung capacity, training us to use a greater portion of our lungs more often. Doing so keeps our entire lung tissue healthy and functioning properly. This is a great breathing exercise to do in a steamy shower in the morning, and I never miss an opportunity to do several sets of Pranayama breathing when I'm in a spain the eucalyptus steam room.

In Bikram yoga we coordinate the arms and head movement in synchronization with the breath.

The Pranayama breath is an energizing breath that allows the ribcage to open and the intercostal muscles-the muscles that help form and move the chest wall-to stretch as the elbows are lifted up toward the ceiling during the inhale. It fills the lungs with up to six time more oxygen than regular breathing.

The exhale breath is detoxifying as it pushes stagnant air from the bottom of the lungs, releasing cellular and metabolic waste from the respiratory system. During the exhale, students are instructed to look up to the ceiling and follow an imaginary line across the ceiling and back to the wall behind them. This provides an additional benefit of stimulation to the optical nerve.

As students' eyes move to the wall behind them, their head tilt opens up the upper spine. Students are instructed not to go into a backward bend; the spine should stay nice and straight. Only the arms and head move with the breath while the body stays erect.

It's not unusual for new students to feel lightheaded or dizzy during this breathing exercise due to the increased oxygen flow. But this is a temporary feeling and the benefits are invigorating. The entire body is energized and the circulatory and nervous systems are stimulated.

This breathing prepares students for the class ahead. More importantly, they are ready to tackle whatever is thrown at them throughout the day—including on the golf course or tennis court.

luxury home market in particular (homes priced over \$1 million) typically slows to a dead stop. But this exceptionally hot summer was definitely not "off." In fact, it was the biggest ever for recorded luxury sales! More than 217 sales were recorded over the past six months and another 56 are pending, including the iconic Bob Hope Estate in Palm Springs priced at \$24,999,000. Palm Springs led the way with 65 sales including the Pond Estate, which sold for \$7,500,000, and the El Rod estate recorded at \$7700,000. La Quinta was next with 56 sales including a house sitting on five acres across from the polo grounds that sold for \$3,900,000 and an estate at the Madison Club that sold for \$8,675,000. Rancho Mirage recorded 45 sales while Indian Wells

recorded 31 sales, including a home at the Vintage Club that sold for \$8,000,000. Palm Desert recorded 20 luxury sales. Here's an overview of the buying-selling trend.

Why now?

Many home sellers are finally pricing their homes to sell. Buyers are taking advantage of this soft market—the average asking price to sale has been 92 percent—and making some great deals.

Who are the buyers & How Can Clubs Attract Them?

Demographically, typical buyers are age 40-70, and younger buyers appear to be the ones purchasing the high-dollar homes. Half of them are not purchasing in country clubs and many are not even serious golfers. Rather, they simply enjoy the desert lifestyle and active outdoor pursuits. Given this trend, existing country clubs have had to adapt what they offer in order to attract these new buyers. Clubs offering only golf and dining are not making it. Those that provide a topnotch fitness center and spa services along with outdoor pursuits such as hiking, biking, swimming and racquet sports, including pickle ball and tennis, are more successful. Many clubs have added activities for children, especially during the holidays, and gourmet dining and wine choices are a must.

istorically, summer months in the Coachella Valley are the off-season for real estate. The

Big Horn has created a whole new aspect to its amenities with its auto club, which requires a separate membership for those seeking auto storage and a place to socialize with fellow auto enthusiasts. Several area luxury clubs, including The Vintage Club, Big Horn and Tamarisk, have completed multimillion-dollar renovations to their clubhouses to meet the new standard of



members. And some long-established clubs are offering programs to mature members to attract their children to become members as well. In the past year, newer country clubs have enjoyed strong sales and gained new members, among them Andalusia, The Hideaway and The Madison Club in La Quinta and Toscana Country Club in Indian Wells.

Where are luxury buyers coming from? Many of the luxury buyers are from

California. As the housing markets in the coastal areas remain strong, buyers are taking advantage of the desert's market. The Pacific Northwest provides a huge contingent of buyers seeking the warmth and sunshine of the valley, and buyers from the Midwest are a strong segment as well. In spite of the value of their dollar, Canadians are also returning to the

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Coachella Valley market. It's a plus that Palm Springs International Airport offers seasonal direct flights from New York, Chicago, Denver, Salt Lake City, Dallas, Sacramento, San Francisco, Seattle, Minneapolis, Toronto and British Columbia, making it easy for prospective





buyers from those areas to get to the valley. And for high-end buyers with their own planes, there are convenient, low-key private airports including Thermal, Bermuda Dunes and Palm Springs.

What are buyers looking for in a luxury home?

Today's buyers want updated, modern, light, bright and move-in ready homes. They seem unwilling to put in the work to remodel a home unless the price is very low and the location is superb. A sanctuary for entertaining and enjoying an indooroutdoor lifestyle is a must. Mid-century modern homes, offered mostly in Palm Springs but found throughout the valley, are huge. The soft contemporary look is in. Sought-after finishes include light hardwood floors or ceramic tile floors that replicate wood. Back in vogue are color schemes of white or soft gray, light wood or synthetic manufactured cabinets, and white marble countertops in the kitchen, often mixed with other stones or even manmade materials.

The kitchen remains a desired focal point. Sub or prep secondary kitchens are often found in today's luxury homes, typically including a second set of appliances and added food-storage options. Vanishing pocket doors are expected to provide seamless indoor-outdoor living, and outdoor living areas must offer an over-thetop pool and spa, a fire feature for warmth, outdoor cooking and water features for soothing sounds. At least four bedrooms and a den/office are preferred. Last but certainly not least, location and view are paramount, with mountain views a must.

More than 60 percent of all luxury buyers pay cash despite currently low interest rates.

What does the future look like?

Based on current activity, we anticipate strong luxury sales continuing in the coming year, and prices are not expected to rise due to a large inventory.

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
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




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Haute Style of Luxury Timepieces Extraordinary craftsmanship and brilliant engineering set these watches apart

We are told that less is more. But not this time.

When it comes to luxury timepieces, most of which are produced in Switzerland, "more" makes sense because of the complicated mechanics, precision engineering, exceptional design and precious stones and metals that are used in creating these exquisite pieces. Many have a price tag the equivalent of at least one Silver Cloud—appropriate considering that luxury timepieces help define the wearer's taste, image, style and success.

CHRISTOPHE CLARET

Christophe Claret's concept watches do a lot more than get you to your massage on time. Based in Le Locle, Switzerland, the brand creates three watches in the "Gaming Complications" collection, each one akin to having a functional casino on your wrist.

The Blackjack watch lets you play 21 on the front and roulette on the back, with all of the "cards" on solid gold discs on ceramic ball bearings under the smoked sapphire dial. The back roulette wheel is actually part of the automatic winding mechanism that spins and finally stops on one of the fixed positions. You can also play dice by shaking the watch to see where the dice land. The two 1.5 mm wide die are found on the lower right side of the window.

The Blackjack watch has power reserve of 72 hours and is available for \$208,000. The Gaming collection also includes the Baccara and Poker timepieces, available for \$204,000 and \$17,000, respectively. christopheclaret.com

The design was inspired by the spaceship from the 1970s anime Captain Future, a show the company's founder, Maximilian Büsser, watched as a child.

Machine No. 6 has a power reserve of 72 hours and its case is constructed from titanium in 18K red gold and sapphire crystal/red gold or sapphire crystal/platinum. There are 10 domed sapphire crystals: four for the hour and minute indications, four for the turbines, one for the tourbillon and one for the display back. Another Swiss watchmaker, Hublot pays tribute to the modern lines of a Ferrari with its MP-05 Le Ferrari, which includes the Ferrari logo on the front of the watch. This timepiece comes with 50 days of power reserve in a sleek, tapering black case in titanium with a rubber strap. The sapphire crystal dial reveals the manually wound movement and a suspended vertical Tourbillon. There are 637 parts in the watch movement alone, as well as 108 jewels. Eleven mainspring barrels coupled together produce the heavy power reserve. Synthetic rubies are used as frictionless rollers over the barrels.

Hublot includes a tool to help wind and set the watch, because of the torque required. Le Ferrari may be purchased for \$300,000. hublot.com

Jacob & Co. was founded in 1986 by diamond designer Jacob Arabo and is headquartered in New York City. The celestial Astronomia Tourbillon Baguette, a limited edition of nine pieces, has 342 stones weighing 16 carats. It is crafted from 18K rose gold invisibly set with white diamond baguettes and sapphire apertures. The watch is 50 mm wide and 25 mm thick, with four windows on either side of the watch. The elements inside revolve around the dial every 20 minutes via four arms powered by a hand-wound movement set and wound at the rear of the case by two bow-style crowns. There is a triple axis tourbillon inside a gravitational cage. The Earth, made of lacquered and handpainted aluminum, and its moon, represented by a faceted spherical diamond, are locked in position around the dial. Based in Saint-Blaise, Switzerland, Louis Moinet created the **Derrick Tourbillon**, a limited edition of 12 watches that pay tribute to the bounty of the oil industry, depicting a moving oil derrick. The upper half of the dial has a petrol blue background color. The brushed aluminum pump jack of the mechanism completes a cycle every 15 seconds. The 60second tourbillon is positioned at 6 o'clock, and the layout is completed by the silvered central hour and minute hands and sapphire crystal.

The Hannibal Repeater Tourbillon, part of the Classic Collection from Ulysse Nardin, a Swiss watchmaker founded in 1846, combines a complicated Westminster Repeater chime with jaquemarts (chiming automatons). On the dial, intricately engraved animated characters move with the minute repeater, requiring multiple gears and levers that must be synchronized. The scene depicts Hannibal, who famously led his brigade and elephants over the Alps in the third century BC during his quest to conquer Rome. These applied figures are crafted from 18k white gold and engraved by hand. The top plate of the dial is made of a thin slice of genuine granite sourced in the Alps. Behind the sapphire case back sits the Calibre UN-78 and a one-minute tourbillon at 6. This movement puts out 70 hours of power reserve.

The Hannibal comes with a 44 mm platinum case and sells for \$735,000. *ulysse-nardin.com*

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X-traordinary Tesla SUV A falcon that seats seven

fter the sensation that Tesla created with the Model S, a repeat performance was daunting. Yet the Model X delivers an encore worthy of a top performer. There's a lot nothing wrong with that. But what the Model X offers is the features of a minivan without losing the panache of a Tesla. It probably won't stop traffic, however, with its slender-beefy,

The truly unique feature of the X is its hinged falcon doors, which give the car a soaring look immediately feel chic when loading groceries into this mean machine. The doors extend less than 12 inches outward as they fold automatically above the car. The double-hinged doors provide a practical and beautiful design. In addition to the ability to open in close confines, the doors provide great access to the third row. No climbing over people required.

A full-frontal view of the Model X will have you wondering what's missing. A grill is absent. Often, other manufacturers include a dummy grill that functions only to keep the electric car from standing out in a crowd. Tesla wants to stand out in a crowd and dismissed the idea that anything functionless was necessary in this design.

The Model X also boasts the largest piece of curved glass ever used in a production vehicle. A monstrous windshield covers the cockpit and ends at the B-pillar. The thinking here is that the falcon-winged doors eliminate the possibility of a moon roof, but the huge glass windshield gives everyone a seat with a view.

The S lends many of its interior features to the X, and nothing is missing in this luxury SUV that you'd expect to find in a vehicle selling for north of \$100,000. This is not an Aston Martin. You won't feel you've stepped back in time with nods to days of yore. Instead, this minimalist design calls to the future with no qualms.

Tesla delivers two editions of the Model X: the 90D and P90D. Both sport allwheel-drive configurations with the same battery pack, but the 90D has dual 259horsepower motors in the front and rear, while the P90D boosts output for the back wheels to 503 horsepower, bringing total torque to 713 pound-feet.

The 90D is no slouch. Its 0-to-60 time is 4.8 seconds, while the P90D drops a full second to 3.8 seconds. In the category of just silly, Tesla also offers a "Ludicrous Speed" upgrade, which drops the time again to 3.2 seconds. All electric is the way to go if you want the stomach-turning G forces of a super car with the fuel efficiency of a 4cylinder.

How about adding a towing package? No problem. The Model X is rated to tow up to 5,000 pounds. Good luck finding a boat that is also all electric, but when you do, you'll have the total package. Without the boat, you get about 250 miles of range on the battery packs. Tesla's nationwide network of charging stations gives you the opportunity to easily traverse the country with a little planning and rest stops to charge up.


Tesla truly has reinvented car-charging technology. It uses a 10 kW charger—a step above the 6.6 kilowatts or so commonly found in today's electric cars. You should see about 30 miles of range for every 30 minutes of charging. An overnight charge should get just about anyone to work and back.

If all that's enough to make you want your own Model X, get in line. The 90D starts at \$132,000 before federal and state incentives. The more powerful P90D can be had for \$142,000. Features such as seating for six or seven passengers, the Ludicrous Speed upgrade, a trailer hitch and the twin-charging system that cuts Level 2 charge times can add tens of thousands to the starting price.

Tesla has created a category of vehicle in which it is the only competitor. Only two cars come close: the Volvo XC90 T8 and the BMW xdrive40e. But neither will have you zigzagging the country without stepping foot in a gas station.

Get in line now because you won't be alone in craving this sporty grocery-getter.
