The History

"The Frank Sinatra Celebrity Invitational has a rich and glamorous history that began in Palm Springs as a small event for the Sinatras' entertainment industry friends and has grown into a legendary weekend of golf and parties supported by famous athletes and entertainers," says Tournament Director Mary Martin. "It started with pals like Dean Martin, Sammy Davis Jr., Gene and Jackie Autry, Robert Wagner, Jill St. John, Kenny Rogers and Jack Lemon. Over the years its supporters have included Shirley MacLaine, Dick Van Dyke, Gary Mule Deer, Tom Flores,

Fernando Valenzuela, Steve Garvey, Elke Sommer, Pat Boone and William Devane.

Most important, Martin adds, "the Barbara Sinatra Children's Center has saved a lot of young lives thanks to their support."

Barbara Sinatra is quick to acknowledge supporters and tournament participants who make it possible for the center to keep doing the work it does, work she considers critical. "The children who come to us for help continue to receive the therapy they need and deserve," she says, "and no child is ever turned away due to a family's inability to pay."













The Luncheon & Fashion Show

Among the popular elements of the event are the annual luncheon and fashion show, which this year features Fe Zandi. "We are thrilled to once again welcome Fe Zandi to the luncheon and fashion show, says Martin. "Fe spent her early 20s in Paris apprenticing with masters such as Jean Patio and Pierre Balmain. Today, Zandi's limited-edition collections, available at her salon on El Paseo, offer some of the world's most elegant, high-fashion feminine ensembles."


The fashion extravaganza starts at 11:00 a.m. with a reception and preview of the silent auction featuring furs and jewelry, and at noon the doors open to the luncheon and fashion show. Reserved tables of 12 are available when paid for by one table host, and tickets for the luncheon and fashion show are \$125 per person, which is \$25 less than last year.

















The Golf

The tournament takes place Friday and Saturday on the superb Eagle Falls Golf Course at Fantasy Springs Resort. Designed by desert resident and golflegend Clive Clark, Eagle Falls has elevation changes and water features not usually seen on a golf course that is open for public play. But this is no ordinary public course, and tournament participants will find plenty to keep their rounds interesting and exciting. The 6,715-yard, par-72 course will test the low handicapper, but it will also provide an enjoyable and fair round of golf for other players as well. And, of course, there are the celebrities to ramp up the fun quotient.

The Sinatra is a five-player team gross and net scramble tournament. Teams consist of one celebrity and four amateur players. Each team of four amateur players remains together for two consecutive days, but the celebrity contestants change teams on day two.

The Benefits

There are many ways to be part of this incredible annual event, starting with free admission to see the action up close as part of the gallery (bring your camera for celebrity meet-and-greets).

But the way to make a difference is to buy one of the packages offered by tournament organizers. New this year is the Club 25 package in honor of the



tournament's 25 remarkable years. For \$25,000 you get two spots in the golf tournament on Friday and Saturday; two Platinum Circle Tee gift packages; a coveted Club 25 gift of desert photography by Frank Sinatra, signed and dated; and admission for 10 to the Thursday night dinner and pairings party, the Friday luncheon and fashion show, the Friday night dinner and live-auction party, and all three spectacular Saturday night events: the pre-gala cocktail party, the black-tie gala and the exclusive post-gala nightcap festivities. Those at the Club 25 level also receive recognition in the tournament program.

Other options are \$2,300 for the Party Only package, \$3,500 for the Gold package and \$10,000 at the Platinum Circle level. Both Gold and Platinum packages include golf for one plus parties.

The Children

There's a reason so many have given so much for so long to this grand event, and it goes far beyond golf and parties. The desert is not immune to violence against children, something


















he esteemed Kraft Nabisco Championship's organizational history is nearly as unique as the tournament structure itself. Another chapter in that history, and the history of the tournament, will begin with the 2013 event.

This year's event, traditionally the first major championship of the year, is scheduled for its traditional date during the first week of April (April 4-7 in 2013), and will be played at its traditional home, the Mission Hills Country Club's Dinah Shore Championship Course. However, while many of the tournament's time-tested elements remain in place, a major organizational transition will be taking place in front of, but largely unnoticed by, everyone's eyes.

In late 2012, Kraft Foods, the sponsor and owner of the tournament, made the decision to bring in International Management Group, better known as IMG, to organize the event. This was a big move for the company for several reasons, the most important being IMG's profile in the international and domestic golf communities, and its years of experience in the golf and golf tournament industries.

The hire officially signaled the end of Kraft's foray into golf tournament organization. Since the tournament's inception in 1972, it was operated in-house by the company that owned the tournament contract—Colgate-Palmolive, Nabisco, and Kraft-rather than the LPGA or another specialized outfit.

It's likely the catalyst for the move was Kraft Foods' recent split into two different corporations. Approximately two-thirds of the products in the "old" Kraft Foods brands portfolio, primarily the snack and biscuit products, were spun off into a new entity entitled Mondolez International.

The remaining products, including cheeses, Oscar Meyer meats, etc., were retained under the Kraft umbrella.

During that restructuring, the opportunity for change was at hand and Kraft seized on it by outsourcing its tournament to IMG. It's noteworthy that





Kraft's contract with the tournament expires after the 2014 championship, and the evaluative and marketing skills IMG brings to the table could help Kraft reinvigorate its enthusiasm for a contract extension, or at very least, position the tournament to make it attractive to a cosponsor, presenting sponsor or entirely new sponsor/owner.

IMG didn't get where it is today by making poor decisions. So when Kraft Nabisco came calling, IMG went right to the Nabisco employees who had been organizing the tournament prior to 2002 when Kraft took control of Nabisco. For example, former Kraft employee and Kraft Nabisco Championship business manager Gabe Codding is now the Kraft Nabisco tournament director on behalf of IMG.

Codding, who began working with the tournament staff as a volunteer in 1996 and was hired as a paid employee in 2001, says he never really considered how different the tournament ownership and



its in-house organization was until he became involved full-time. "I remember going to LPGA meetings and meeting with organizational representatives of other tournaments who worked for the LPGA," he says. "There was no one who worked full-time for the tournament sponsor."

Codding says it was easy to see evolution and potential growth as two key reasons Kraft has implemented a new strategy for its tournament involvement.

"Kraft is a food company. They're trying to navigate this global economy, not run a

golf tournament. Seeing them go to experts to handle it makes sense. They do this 40 times a year instead of me just doing it once," he said. "I'm sure their thinking was, 'With all that we have going on within the company, let's get the leading sports agency in the world to help us, not only with this event, but with other (sports marketing) opportunities around the globe."

While Kraft gains the decades of experience IMG brings to the partnership, Codding believes IMG also comes out of

the deal a big winner. "The greatest thing about it for IMG is, they operate off so many different platforms around the world with so many different corporations. Just the golf divisions in particular, they work with all sorts of corporations around the world to activate programs in different sporting spaces. So to have access to a corporation like this (Kraft) is a benefit to them," he said.

"Secondly, they operate around 30 women's golf events around the world. They operate almost all of the Asian women's events, and they also own and operate the Ricoh Women's British Open. But they don't currently have a lot of domestic LPGA events, and that's a space they want to operate in. So having access to one of the top events on the LPGA Tour is a benefit for sure."

Another thing for sure is that fans will find the Kraft Nabisco Championship 2013 to be as exciting and memorable as it has always been, regardless of major changes behind the scenes.

She says her best achievements so far are her first win at the Navistar and playing in the Curtis Cup. Open, direct and full of laughter, Thompson has been home schooled all her life. She started playing golf at age five, following in the footsteps of her older brothers Curtis (an LSU team golfer) and Nicolas (a Tour player). Their

Does that make for a pleasant family outing? "No," assures Thompson, "that's never the case. Ever. Always competitive and

Prodigy pro golfer she may be, but off the course she was a 17-year old looking forward to her prom night last May 18 in Ft. Lauderdale. Through Facebook she invited America's servicemen ages 18 to 20 to send a photo and note about being her prom date.

She loves movies, particularly those with dancing. "I used to dance a lot, a shadow dancer with the mirror or in the shower," she

Thompson is very superstitious. She wears ladybug earrings and charms, and don't ask about Friday the 13th or spilling salt. Before her first win at the Navistar, waffles were her go-to meal, prepared by Valerie Perry at the Waffle House. In 2012, Thompson again had the same meal daily, and Perry didn't take vacation so she could be on the job for the defending champ!

Thompson is clear and philosophical beyond her years. "I'm looking forward to the places I get to see and play," she says. "Getting to experience all this is amazing; hopefully I can win along the way."





Ryann O'Toole took the college route before turning pro in May 2009, just after graduating from UCLA with a degree in sociology. In 2010, she grabbed two wins on the Symetra Tour. She was also a hit in Golf Channel's "Big Break Sandals Resort Show," which she calls "two weeks of my life that were really life changing."

The 5' 7" California beauty debuted on the LPGA Tour in 2011. "I love all Southern California sports—surfing, wakeboarding, skateboarding and snowboarding are my favorites.



When I got a scholarship to UCLA, I took their program over USC. I felt a better fit with the coach and the team."

It was during her LPGA rookie year that everything seemed to click. She was honored with a captain's pick for the Solheim Cup, and loved every moment. "It was a huge thrill," she says, "and my best golfing memory. I love the travel, seeing the world and the U.S. Ireland was very special during the Cup."

Being greeted by an elephant at her hotel during this year's Honda LPGA in Thailand was another hit, as was her trip to Australia, where she won. "I'll take my surfboard when I go back next year."



The Rolex Women's World Golf Rankings As of Dec. 10, 2012, this is how the American women stacked up in the Rolex Women's World Golf Rankings

It has been a long drought for U.S. women's golf—18 years since an American, Beth Daniels, won the Player of the Year award. But Stacy Lewis triumphed in 2012 with four wins and 16 top-10 finishes. No, she didn't win a Major; but she did tie for second at the Wegman's LPGA Championship and the Evian Masters (a Major in 2013) and took fourth at the Kraft Nabisco. She's ranked 24th.



At the end of 2012, 31 Americans were in the top 100, but some of the longtime favorites had moved down rather than up. Cristie Kerr, the first American to reach World No.1 in 2010, was ranked 11th with her win at the Lorena Ochoa Invitational, while Paula Creamer lost seven places to finish at No. 12.



Big-hitting Brittany Lincicome couldn't win this year and slid down to 18th. Angela Stanford finished at 20th and Brittany Lang was ranked 27th, up from 32nd. Teen queen and 2007 Kraft winner at 15, Morgan Pressl plummeted from 16th to 38th with only one top-10 finish.


When Michelle Wie graduated from Stanford, speculation was rampant that she would finally play the golf she seemed capable of since bursting onto the global golf scene. But in 2012 she fell from 17th to 56th.

Ranked 74th ending her fourth season, Vicky Hurst is still after her first W. Tall and bubbly 19-year-old Jessica Korda made the biggest move in the 2012 rankings, jumping up a whopping 233 places to 77th. She won the ISPS Australian Women's Open at Royal Melbourne in a grueling six-way play-off that included Lincicome and Lewis.

Watch out for USC star and four-year All American Lizette Salas, who had a superb rookie year in 2012. She's ranked 91st and mentored by her idol, legend Nancy Lopez. Ever-popular Natalie Gulbis slid to 94th, and Pepperdine graduate Danielle Kang had a good rookie season, finishing 105th. Another grad to look for is UCLA's Sydnee Michaels; she ended her rookie season ranked 124th.





o doubt about it, golfers planning their ideal stay-and-play vacation always envision plenty of time on the course. But at Indian Wells Golf Resort, even diehards on a mission to play their way through the day will find nirvana. 

Many people believe golf here isn't available to the public, but that's a misconception. "People think they have to stay here to play here, or that we're private," Tebbetts says. "But we are a public municipal venue owned by the City of Indian Wells (Calif.)." Guests of onsite hotels do receive tee-time preference—up to 90 days in advance.

Indian Wells is the only 36-hole public golf facility in the state named on a national Top 20 Best Places You Can Play list for California. "The golf courses have been top-ranked as the best municipal courses since they've been opened," says Tebbetts. "Both are fantastic but very dissimilar. "He's been around the block and is a Ryder Cup player. He's a fun guy."

The facility is managed by Troon Golf, which means guests can rely on certain standards including fantastic playing conditions and great quality products in the golf shop and in food-and-beverage offerings. "We have tournament-quality golf with reasonable prices, and we have warm, authentic member-of-the-family service," says Tebbetts. "That's what sets us apart."

IW Club at the Golf Resort at Indian Wells is a 53,000-square-foot clubhouse with a full-service golf shop, breakfast café and the IW Club Restaurant and Bar for lunch and dinner. Diners also enjoy a daily happy hour from 3-6 p.m., plus a weekly Sunday brunch—and an accompanying



stunning vista that encompasses the Coachella Valley. "It's a destination for weddings at sunset with a really nice ballroom that seats 180 with its own terrace; it's a pretty spot," says Tebbetts. "Chef Chris Olson is well-traveled, a seasoned pro who turns out great food with quality and value. He's conscious of making sure there are options for vegetarians and those with special needs."

The club also features a rewards program that earns points redeemable for gift certificates with every credit-card transaction.

The Callaway Performance Center is one of 10 in the United States offering

group and private lessons, as well as club fittings. There's a dedicated putting course, too. "It's a John Fought nine-hole, lighted putting course with real grass; corporate groups tie it into their golf tournament, and it's a lot of fun," says Tebbetts.



here are many reasons Desert Willow Golf Resort in the Coachella Valley has been rated the No. 1 public-access course by Desert Golf Magazine for three years running, not the least of which is the setting. It boasts a collection of holes that flow together smoothly, yet each exudes its own personality. Desert Willow has a superb selection of amenities both on and off the golf course. The electronic system allows customers to summon the food cart, or help is just a click away in case of emergency.



Bridge the Gap

How to take what you learn on the practice range to the golf course

Anyone who has had a golf lesson has asked this question: "Why can't I carry over what I learned in my lesson to the golf course?" Or, "How is it that I hit it so well on the practice range before the round, but then look and feel like a completely different player by the time I get to the first tee?"

Both of these scenarios are very common—and very frustrating—to all those who choose to play this game. But if you want to improve your performance on the course, you have to practice like you play.



Use Your Brain

It is common for golfers to "rapid fire" or "scrape and hit" on the range. This is when a golfer stands on a practice range and mindlessly hits one ball after another without any specific intention, target, routine or discipline. This has nothing to do with improving a motor skill or transferring practice into play.

Likewise, during a lesson the golfer generally grooves a rhythm under the tutelage of the instructor and can experience some success with this practice style, but it is rarely retained and carried over into play. Motor skills do not live in the muscles, they live in the brain. The neuromuscular system controls our movement patterns. If it does not have an opportunity to try and solve a problem on every shot—which club should I use? Should I hit over the water or lay up? How do I compensate for a downhill lie?—it is never really going to learn anything new. If you do nothing more than continuously hit one ball after the other without going through the process that you go through on the golf course, you will not transfer the skill from the range to the course.

Practice Times Two

Block and random practice are essential components of how a successful practice session is structured. Block practice is used when a new motor skill is being learned or improved. This might include various drills that can be intrinsic or extrinsic depending on the need and skill level of the athlete. Quality is much more important than quantity, and each swing should be done with purpose and focus.

Random practice needs to move beyond motor skill training and to simulate the environment of the sport as much as possible. In golf, every shot is different. It might be a different club, different lie on the ground, different distance or many other possibilities. When a golfer is on the practice range, he needs to simulate this experience as much as possible. Instead of hitting one ball after another with the same club to the same target off the same lie, he should alter every shot to make the situation unique just as if he were playing.

Here is how you can start to integrate random practice into your golf routine the next time you are on the practice range:

- Plan to hit 20 balls. However, you must pick a new target or new club each time, and you must go through your pre-shot routine as you do on the golf course.
- Score yourself from 1-5 on your commitment to the process—not the result of the shot. If you were fully committed, you get a 5.
- Keep your score for all 20 balls (no mulligans). Your goal is a perfect score of 100.

Your results of each shot might not feel as good as "rapid fire," but the carryover to your golf game will be noticeable. If you truly wish to get better at playing golf, you have to sacrifice the reward of hitting one ball after the other on the range.


This is how a golfer bridges the gap from warming up to playing. But keep in mind that no skill can be mastered without practice and time. Please be patient with yourself, your coach and your game, and commit to the process.


Sun City Shadow Hills was one of the last new-home construction areas to open before the real estate market fell, and there are now new homes to choose from as well. Williams says, "For those wanting a newer home with a more open floor plan, this community is a definite must-see."

The real estate trend in this area is up. Sales in Sun City Shadow Hills were up 3.5 percent in price and up 25.3 percent in total

Member-only features include a library and locker rooms, and there are also areas ideal for nearly any type of gathering, including meeting rooms, a main bar and a large outdoor veranda. Banquet facilities can utilize the latest audio/visual equipment.



equipment you could want, all in an expansive space with spectacular views. Outside, 13,700 square feet encompass pools, spas and sand volleyball, and there are tennis courts, walking trails and parks to support an active lifestyle. As for dining, there are both gourmet and grill venues, as well as spaces for special events and meetings. All of these amenities come with very reasonable association fees of under \$300 per month, though golf is separate.

The desert and its vibrant communities are about location. But they are also about opportunity. If a new home is in your future, now is the perfect time to look into what's on the market. You could soon be enjoying the incredible desert lifestyle that so many have already discovered.



dmit it, you've thought it or thought about it. Whether it's at neighbor's home or a high school football field, you've looked at artificial grass and considered its cosmetic value. But you haven't quite been able to rationalize bringing it into your life for a number of reasons.

"It sure looks good," you tell yourself, "but it's gotta be superexpensive." Plus, you think, your backyard would have to be torn up for weeks, maybe months. And at the end, you'd have plastic grass instead of living grass, which can't possibly be "green," right? And what if little Sparky decides it's his new favorite place to go once you've spent all that money?

Even if you don't know the answer to all your questions or whether the problems you imagine would in reality be problems at all, it just seems easier to keep things as they are, with the patchy lawn and its flaws, watering, re-seeding and maintenance.

Or is it? Back Nine Greens, based in Palm Desert, Calif., would like to help you revise your thinking about artificial surfaces. In fact,



the company has taken steps to address all of the doubts that potential customers might have about their products, and representatives will tell you how using those products can actually improve your desert lifestyle.

As for the looking good part, that goes without saying. Back Nine has installed custom surfaces throughout the southwest, and the company is capable of tackling jobs as large as sports complexes and golf practice facilities. But what will most likely catch your eye is what it can do for residential landscapes and backyards just like yours. As an added bonus, the improvement might actually help you become a better putter or even chipper, depending on how large your backyard is.

Costs vary depending on the thickness or lushness of the surface—think thread counts in linens. The more lush, the more expensive. Rodger Lantz, director of sales development for Back Nine Greens, says putting surfaces also require a certain amount of additional conditioning during the installation process, including a curing powder and a good "rolling" (just like on a real course). Size and accessories, such as boulders or other landscaping features, also figure into the final cost. But taken on average, customers can figure approximately \$15 per square foot for their job.

As for the process, Lantz says there is a minimum of disruption to your life and your backyard, and that most jobs take anywhere from two to five days, depending on the size of the job and accessibility of the site. Back Nine also streamlines the preinstallation process during visits from company representatives who come with paperwork, samples and sketchpads to get the job moving.

"We talk with customers about the surfaces, and let them see and feel what they'll be getting," says Lantz. "We get a little background on the customer and their tastes, and then we look at each area. We determine what needs to be done in terms of irrigation systems, and we provide the customer with a sheet explaining what they can expect.



"After that, we measure, provide the customer with a sketch, double-check their landscaping requests, sign a contract and set a date for the installation."

As for being "green," well, no, you can't exchange gases with it, nor can pets or cows eat it. But it will help maintain water table levels, critical in the desert. That's right, no watering. For that reason, there are incentives offered by the state as well as some county and local municipalities that allow for installation rebates. Desert residents also get the extra benefit of not having to transition from Bermuda grass to rye grass every fall and spring to ensure the lawn is maximized year-round. Back Nine Green's surfaces are the same in October and in May.

And, of course, nothing is literally as green as the products offered by Back Nine. The earliest these surfaces begin to lose their spanking-new luster is 15 years, and they can last as long as 20. Over the lifetime of the surface, the savings in water and maintenance alone will likely have paid for the original surface and its replacement—with some significant coin to spare.


As for Sparky, try as he might, neither he nor his cat friend that also lives with you can reduce the value, optic pleasure or, in the case of putting greens, the reaction of the surface. They will remain colorfast and are designed with a special sand ingredient that repels such indiscretions, allowing both liquid and solid waste forms to be hosed into the nearest disposal point or container.

Unlike most other artificial surface companies, Back Nine Greens exclusively uses its own installers. The benefits of having an in-house installation unit are many, including pride of employment. Lantz believes that pride is manifested in every job the company does.

"Our installers work for us," he said. "We've trained them, they know what to do and they're proud of what they do. They look at their work like it's a work of art."

Blue Orchid Thai Bistro (73030 El Paseo) in Palm Desert continues its Eastern momentum in the West with small plates that are even more delectable than diminutive. The menu's traditional dishes are ideal for sharing, but when feeling selfish, don't miss out on your own chicken coconut soup. The Blue Orchid's style of presentation makes it ideal for your next group or couple's gathering.









Also in Palm Desert but presenting a very different style is the redressed **Tilted Kilt** (72191 Highway 111), which has flourished since its late October reopening. Long on excellent lunch, dinner and drink deals, the Kilt is famously short on garb for its sexy servers. Dozens of taps pour regional and specialty beers to complement a menu replete with pub favorites.

Continue along the 111 to **Alberto's Ristorante** (71416 Highway 111), which offers one of the most intimate and personalized experiences in the area. Aptly lauded service, ample portions and a selection of delicious Italian dishes and flavors have long made this venue hugely popular. Pasta lovers shouldn't miss the homemade gnocchi or ravioli plates, while no fewer than 10 veal options greet the carnivorous.



The authentic Neapolitan pizzas at Piero's Pizza Vino (73722 El Paseo) in Palm Desert require but two minutes in a 900-degree, wood-burning oven, yet the unique flavors will stay with diners for many hours. Open daily for lunch and dinner and presenting an impressive list of beer and wine, Piero's is an ideal spot for a fun family gathering or casual date night.

The art extends from the walls to the

dishes at **Café des Beaux-Arts** (73640 El Paseo) in Palm Desert. Enjoy the collection of paintings by local artists that dress the space and are culturally complemented by jazz and a terrific small-plates menu in Le Bar. There's music on Wednesday and Friday nights from 6:00-9:00 p.m. With its

prime El Paseo locale and tempting French-Mediterranean flavors, Café des Beau-Arts is a must-visit for locals and visitors alike.

At Pacifica Seafood Restaurant (73505 El Paseo, #2500), the longstanding vision of an outdoor patio extension is soon to be realized. Scheduled for January

completion, the patio remodel will match an extended bar menu (with the same happy hour prices and potential for music) to complement the west-facing mountain views. "It will be an extension of our bar," says owner Kip Downing. "Lounge seating with fire pits and views of the mountains.







When it's done, it will be perfect for the weather in February and March and to watch the sun setting."

Luxury and power in one beautiful package

'n this day and age you can have it all. That must have been what designers were thinking when they went to the drawing board for the BMW 650i. Take a look at the styling and power and you'll find that the best of BMW's brawn has been combined with the supple elegance.

The higher-ups in Germany are calling the 650i a coupe in the sense that it isn't a sedan, though it has four doors. They are suggesting that there's more to this machine than meets the eye, and they're right. The exterior lines are both aggressive and reserved. There's a Mohammad Ali meets Grace Kelly factor going on here. You know there's power and you can't wait to take her out on the town.

It may sound odd to say, but the first features you'll notice in the 650i are the seats. Yes, the place where you first interact with the

option) you'll be staring at 60 from a standstill in 4.3 seconds. The twin turbo V-8 engine has enough power to hold its own among the big names in the class, and the 455 horsepower will have you looking for opportunities to punch it. You could stand the 650i up against the Jag XK or Porsche Panamera and it will easily win several rounds—perhaps the whole bout, depending on the judges.

In the luxury division, the 650i is every bit the equal to the Mercedes CLS or Jaguar. The Bang and Olufson sound system has a tweeter that rises out of the dash and sounds exquisite, while the interior leather and wood trim is coach quality in every way.

On the outside, the 6er is a head turner. A somewhat controversial matte finish takes the traditional clear coat off the market and simplifies the paint a bit. It's unusual but that's the point. The stylish lines and aggressive posture make onlookers take



car hasn't been overlooked. The luxury-seating package is well worth the upgrade and makes it impossible to not dream about a quick drive to anywhere. You'll find that the controls are as intuitive as any on the market; in this car, you will not be confused about where to find the air conditioning or the radio. This may sound simple but plenty of so-called luxury coupes leave drivers stumped for weeks while they hire exploratory committees to find out how to sync their phone to the car's Bluetooth.

You'll have enough technology in the 650i to keep you wellcared for while not breaking you into a sweat when it comes to the simple things. You'll definitely notice a nice responsiveness when the 650i is in "sport" mode versus "comfort." You'll be glued to those luxury seats with your foot to the floor in sport mode. In comfort mode, enjoy a more relaxed ride that is still responsive without being punchy.

There's enough power under the hood to quicken the heart. Though the 650i weighs in at a hefty 4,300 pounds, the performance won't disappoint. With the xDrive (all-wheel drive





notice. Few of your neighbors will have seen a 650 and that sparks conversation. Expect a slew of questions and a few whistles. Double your mystique by opting for the convertible. The sportiness factor rises even more with the M Sport package that upgrades to 20-inch wheels and apron

covers that are distinctive and add to the feeling of exclusivity.


