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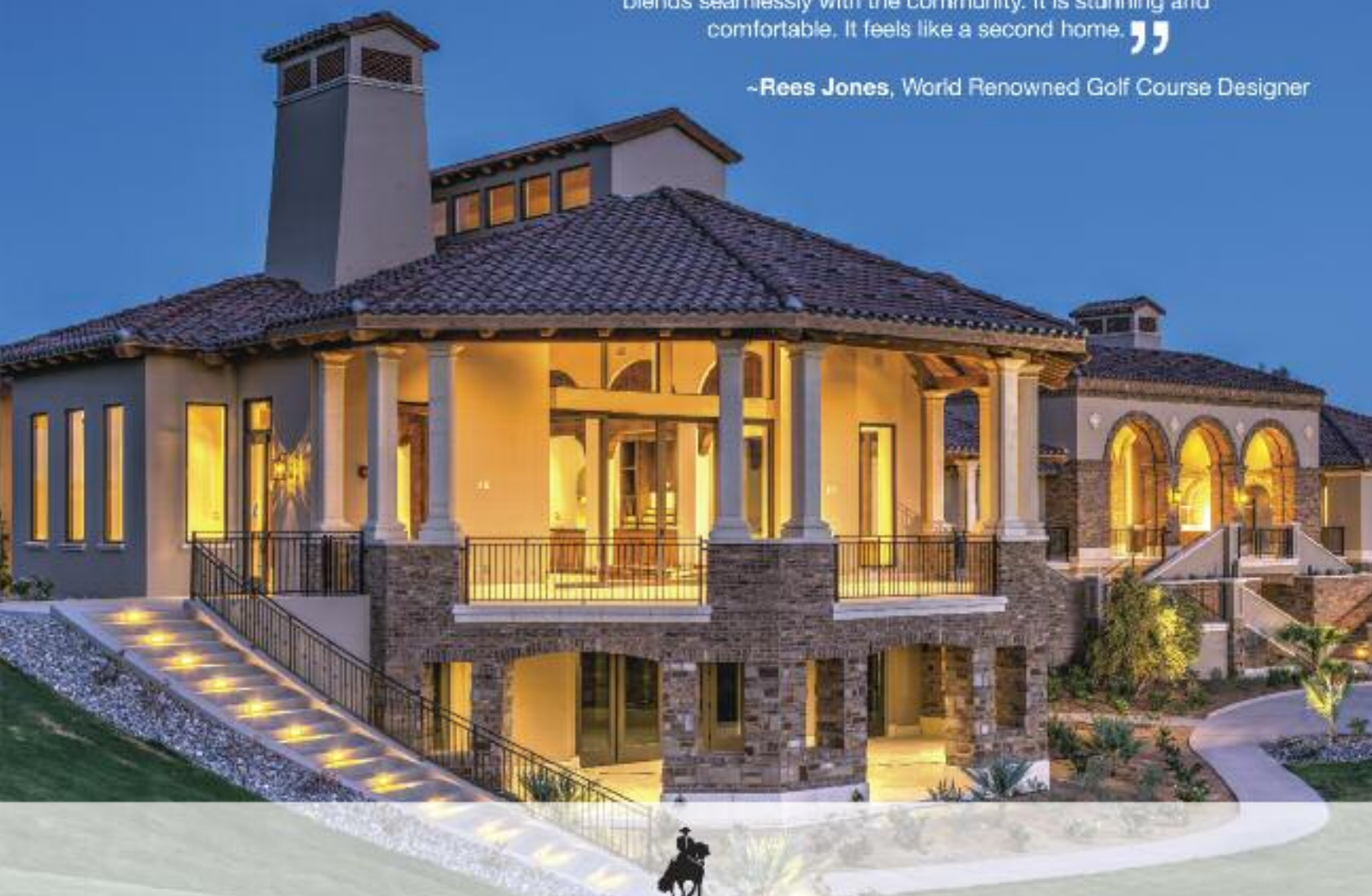

Huge change related to golf courses and development is impacting our desert communities and we want to provide

you with all sides of this important story. The economy, water issues and the simple fact that there are too many golf courses and too few golfers to sustain them has put a number of golf-course communities in peril. Communities face serious financial hardship these days, and without enough members and homeowners to support them, the future looks grim.

Unless the golf members and HOA support a community, it will eventually suffer or even face severe ramifications of change—including having to close or sell off its golf course. That was the case at Santa Rosa Golf Course in Palm Desert, where members could no longer afford to pay the debt of the club to continue enjoying the course. It has since been sold to a developer and condominiums will soon replace the lush fairways. At Rancho Mirage Country Club, acrimony, confusion and legal wrangling have risen to unprecedented levels. Now a judge must decide how it will be resolved. Unfortunately, this is only the beginning of a problem that will likely grow, and member attrition is one of the core issues for many clubs. You may not like what you learn, but you owe it to yourself and your community to understand the options so you can take action before it's too late. *Read our feature on page 48.*

We will continue to work hard to bring you coverage of these games we love. In spite of challenges, there is also much to celebrate, not the least of which is the amazing lifestyle the desert affords for all of us.

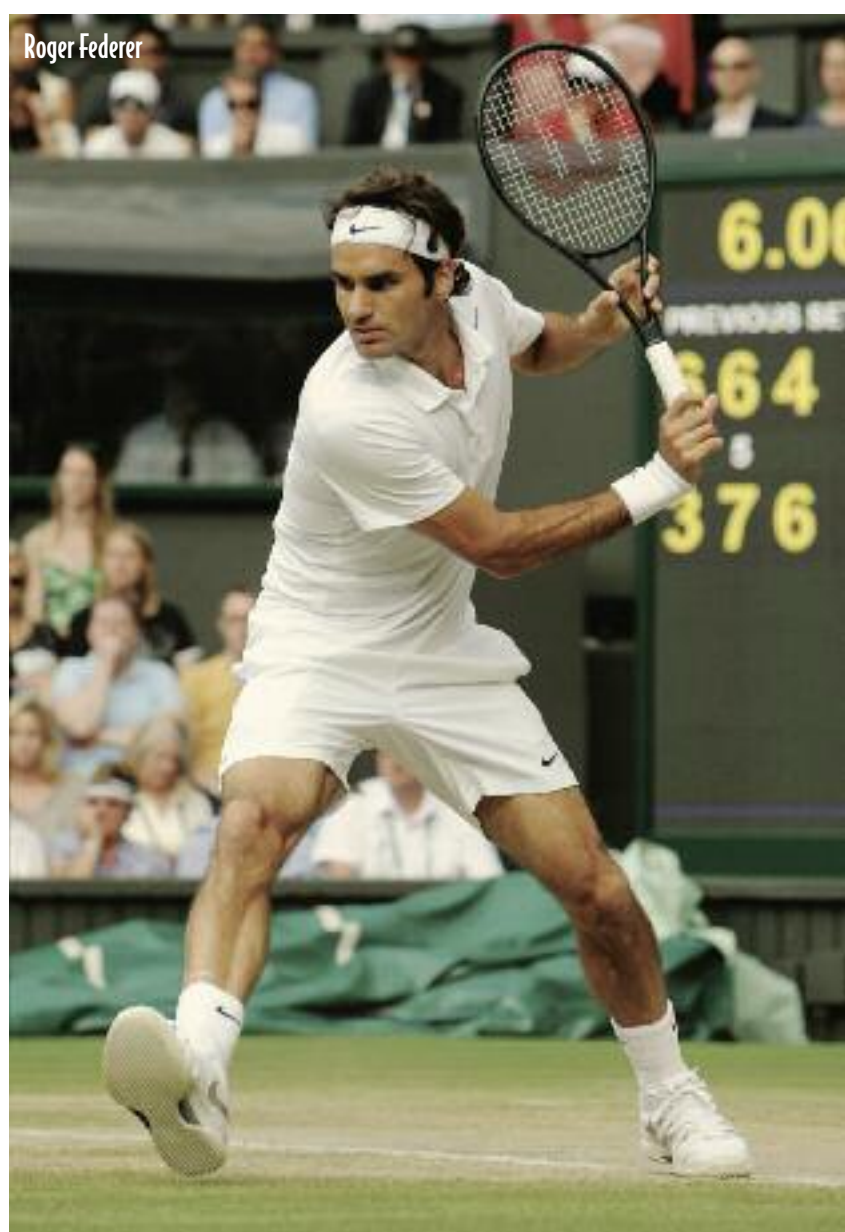
BNP Paribas Open

An enhanced viewing experience awaits fans at Indian Wells Tennis Garden, where Stadium 1 has been renovated—just in time for the 41st annual BNP Paribas Open

Aside from the four majors, the BNP Paribas Open is currently the most highly attended tennis tournament in the world—and for good reason. Held annually at the pristine Indian Wells Tennis Garden in Indian Wells, California, the tournament consistently hosts the game's best players, from Novak Djokovic and Roger Federer (who competed against each other in the men's singles finals in 2014 and 2015) to Serena Williams and Maria Sharapova.

It is also extremely fan friendly. In 2013, a second stadium was added to the facility. As a complement to Stadium 1, the world's second largest tennis stadium, with 16,100 seats and 44 luxurious suites, the 8,000-seat Stadium 2 increased the Tennis Garden's seating capacity to 41,485.

In response, more than 456,000 patrons attended the 2015 BNP Paribas Open, an all-time tournament record.

"Stadium 2 has been well received by both the players and the fans," says Raymond Moore, tournament director and CEO, BNP Paribas Open. "It provides an intimate setting, as well as a dynamic location to place marquee matches."

To prepare for the 2016 BNP Paribas Open and ensure that the attendee experience remains topnotch, Indian Wells staff

members made numerous improvements to Stadium 1 in recent months. New green seats have been installed in the stadium's upper and lower bowls. In addition, each seat in the lower bowl is larger than before and has cup holders.

Some of the stadium's old seats have been repurposed so that spectators now have permanent seating around the practice courts. And a new space, known as the Champions area, has been built into Stadium 1 to provide private access, security and comfort to the business, entertainment and sports leaders who annually attend the tournament.

Featuring three components—a valet car park entrance with a welcome center, a Champions Box and a Champions Lounge, located beneath the seating expanse—the Champions area has been compared to Wimbledon's Royal box and the U.S. Open's President's box areas.

"We have also lowered the court surface in Stadium 1 by approximately 28 inches. In doing so, television camera positions have been moved off of the court and into a recessed area similar to the placement in Stadium 2," Moore explains.

As was the case in 2015, patrons will have access to free, public Wi-Fi so they can check scores on the BNP Paribas Open app, listen

to live audio play-by-play and stream live videos of matches (via tennistv.com) from multiple courts.

"We want our fans to be actively engaged on social networks while they are at Indian Wells Tennis Garden," Moore says. "So far, fan reactions have been positive, and we have seen a great amount of content regarding the tournament shared on various channels."

In addition to public Wi-Fi, the facility also offers eight 9' x 5' video screens in Stadium 1, providing fans with more opportunities to view the matches and complementing the live streams and in-person viewing experiences. Moreover, the BNP Paribas Open remains the only tennis tournament in the world that offers the Hawkeye official line-challenge system on each match court, providing fans with an additional interactive component to every match, including the qualifying rounds that will occur from March 7-9.

This year, over 300 tennis professionals will participate in the tournament. Of that aggregate, spectators will be especially focused on world No. 1 Novak Djokovic, who won his record-tying fourth BNP Paribas Open title last year (and second in a row), as well as world No. 2 Roger Federer, who shares the tournament

record with Djokovic as a four-time champion.

Rafael Nadal, a three-time champion who last won in 2013, remains a fan favorite and is expected to reemerge this year after a loss of form in 2015. Stan Wawrinka, who won the French Open and ascended to No. 3 in the world rankings last year, also has the potential to end Djokovic's two-year winning streak. After all, he defeated Djokovic in the finals of the 2015 French Open.

On the women's side, Maria Sharapova is not only a top-five player in the world rankings, but also a regular contender at the BNP Paribas Open. A champion in 2006 and 2013, she also finished as runner-up in 2012. She is currently favored as a potential champion alongside world No. 1 Serena Williams, the 1999 and 2001

champion, and Simona Halep, the second-ranked player in the world, who claimed her first BNP Paribas Open victory last year.

The men and women's singles finals will be played on March 20, while the doubles finals for men and women will be "Once again, fans will be treated to incredible matches featuring the brightest stars in the game," Moore says. "We invite patrons to come and experience world-class tennis firsthand—at one of the best venues in the world."

Dining at the 2016 BNP Paribas Open

Hungry patrons at this year's BNP Paribas Open (March 7-20, 2016) will find more than typical sports-arena fare. Food at the world-class tennis tournament at Indian Wells Tennis Garden is all about elevated cuisine and upscale ambiance. Three restaurants offering wildly different food will share space in Stadium 2, providing an authentic restaurant dining experience, created custom for the event.

Local favorite Piero's PizzaVino will serve up signature pies including the traditional Margherita; an artichoke, ham, mushroom and olive-studded Capricciosa; and the white-sauced, Italian sausage and caramelized onion-laden Bubba-Bubba. Also on the menu: the restaurant's noted side dishes, such as ziti "pizzaiola" with tomato sauce, garlic, capers and oregano; a luscious lasagna Bolognese; fried calamari; Italian wedding egg soup and fried zucchini blossoms.

Valley restaurateur Lee Morcus brings his Chop House to the stadium this year, creating a sophisticated, classic American steakhouse experience with elements of Desert Moderne. A wood-fired rotisserie and char broiler will be used for a menu highlighted by in-house-aged, in-house-butchered prime steaks and chops. Think prime, dry-aged, grass-fed domestic and Wagyu beef; prime Colorado lamb chops; thick-cut pork chops; and organic Jidori chicken. A bevy of fresh shellfish and seafood items complete the menu.

Malibu-based Nobu also returns with dishes inspired by Japanese and Peruvian specialties alongside well-crafted cocktails. Sushi, ceviche and other light fare complement the gorgeous desert climate. Rumor has it that one dessert is centered on the beloved valley date. Also rumored to be making a return appearance is the popular Nobu-style Pimms Cup.

Andy Scorteanu Tennis Academy



As a former top-ranked junior himself, Andy Scorteanu is focused on helping today's junior tennis players achieve their goals

For as long as he can remember, Andy Scorteanu has been involved with tennis in some capacity. Introduced to the game when he was eight years old, he grew up in southern California and competed against the likes of the Bryan Brothers, eventually becoming the area's No. 1 ranked junior player.

After being drafted by California State University, Fresno, and ranking in the top 30 in NCAA Division I singles and doubles, he competed in singles and doubles on the ATP World Tour, ultimately achieving a world ranking in each.

As he prepared for retirement, he remembered the guidance and instruction that his two coaches, Harry and Guy Fritz (Guy's son Taylor is currently the top-ranked junior in the world) provided to him when he was younger. Longing to offer junior players the same opportunities he had, he decided to create his own junior academy in the Coachella Valley.

"As much as I was helped by the Fritzes and others, I've always enjoyed helping other people achieve their goals as well," Scorteanu says.

Founded in 2009 with eight students, the Andy Scorteanu Tennis Academy, located at Monterey Country Club in Palm Desert, California, now has a maximum capacity of 20 students. In addition to offering students 18 of the club's tennis courts for private or group lessons and practice, the academy features a highly disciplined curriculum focused on progressive lesson plans that evolve according to a student's age, body strength and skillsets. In doing so, Scorteanu and his staff are able to improve each student's physical and mental capacities.

"The academy's curriculum is physically demanding in order to build competitive nerve. This nerve requires not only a highly developed physical skillset, but mental and emotional toughness as well, which is critical in competition," Scorteanu says. "Physicality is another important element. It is not enough just to hit the ball hard; students must also be able to use the kinetic energy of the body appropriately, so we focus on strengthening their abdominals, as a strong core is essential."

To fulfill the academy's primary mission—creating a learning environment where discipline, tenacity and court integrity interconnect with fundamentals, fitness and game education, thereby allowing for maximum player development—Scorteanu has hired coaches including Vicente Ferrer, College of the Desert's former No. 1 player, and Marcin Rozpedski, a retired ATP singles and doubles professional.

On a weekly basis, he also welcomes renowned tennis stars such as Mark Woodforde, one half of "The Woodies" doubles team that won 11 Grand Slam doubles titles, and Rosie Casals, a nine-time Grand Slam doubles champion, to share their knowledge with academy students.

"By receiving advice and instruction from world-class players on the court, our junior students are inspired to achieve their goals for the rest of their lives," Scorteanu states.

It's a formula that works on all levels. "Andy is very passionate about junior tennis and I am interested in doing whatever I can to promote it," Casals says. "I am very excited to have the opportunity to increase the popularity of junior tennis in the Coachella Valley through an academy such as Andy's."

Since founding the academy, Scorteanu has witnessed his students pursue a variety of aspirations. Several of his alumni have competed at universities including UCLA (Pamela Montez and Austin Rapp), Cal Poly (Brittany Blalock) and Boise State (Abe Hewko), while others have decided to focus on careers outside of tennis.

"Some are driven and will stay after their lessons and classes to serve one last bucket of balls. They may not have as much talent as some students but their work ethic stands out," Scorteanu notes. "Others may have the talent but not the work ethic, and they may just want to be good social players. Each aspiration is equally valid."

He adds, "I've learned that students must be treated as individuals. It's not a one-size-fits-all situation."

As Scorteanu prepares for the future, he is interested in maintaining the academy's current participation levels. Since the academy only instructs 20 students—at most—at a time, he presently has a waiting list that includes several junior players from the Coachella Valley. He has also just begun to offer an 11-and-under Tot Academy, so that children learn how to properly play the game, stretch and exercise early on in life.

"It is very rewarding to help students learn the game and achieve their goals. But more importantly, I would like to believe I've played a role in the development of gentlemen and ladies who like to win but who also know how to lose," Scorteanu says. "That's sportsmanship. In my view, it's not a bad approach to life either."

Tennis with the stars

Bounces back into the desert



The star-studded pro-am event draws top professionals and talented amateurs

Building on the success of its inaugural year, the second annual Tennis with the Stars takes place March 8 at Omni Rancho Las Palmas Resort and Spa and Rancho Las Palmas Country Club in Rancho Mirage, California. Dovetailing with the first week of the BNP Paribas, this year's event is expected to double in both attendees and sponsorships.

Cliff Drysdale Tennis introduced the event to the Coachella Valley last year after having successfully produced its prototype in Florida, the Miami Open All Star event, at the Ritz-Carlton, Key Biscayne since 2009. The West Coast version will again provide an opportunity for 24 amateurs to take part in a round robin pro-am tournament, rewarding the finalists with the chance to play against and alongside several ATP World Tour top-10 pro players.

To date, this year's players include:

Garbine Muguruza, the Spaniard-Venezuelan currently World No. 3, 2015 Wimbledon finalist and a player many expect to be the next big tennis star once Serena Williams moves toward retirement in the coming years.

Eugenie Bouchard, the standout 21-year-old Canadian who is a former World No. 6 (in 2014), junior Grand Slam champion, 2014 Wimbledon finalist and one of the most highly touted

players to emerge from Canada. She is a favorite among Palm Springs tennis enthusiasts.

Kei Nishikori, currently No. 6 in the world and the only Japanese tennis player ever ranked in the top 10. He will likely be the face of the Japanese Olympic team in 2020. Always a crowd pleaser on court, he was a participant last year.

Several other top players will be announced as the event draws closer.

A full afternoon is planned for players and fans. Highlights for the 300 spectators will be the exhibition games and matches that will pit the pro-am winners from earlier in the day against the stars, members of the media playing points against the stars, and the finale matches of the stars. And, like last year, play will be followed by an intimate VIP player meet-and-greet reception with food, drink, music and one-on-one autograph signing with the stars.

Sponsors who have stepped up so far include Wilson Sporting Goods, LoveAll Tennis Apparel, Pro Tennis Premium Sunscreen, Alpha Media and this publication, *Desert Golf & Tennis*.

Four tiers of tickets are available, including Pro Exhibition tickets for \$50, VIP Spectator tickets for \$120, Pro-Am Entry and VIP Spectator for \$400 and the VIP All Star Package for \$2,500 per person.

Las Palmas Country Club, while general attendees can park next door at the resort and shuttle over to the court.

Kimberly Arena, vice president and event manager for Cliff Drysdale Tennis, says, "We're thrilled to bring this event back to the Coachella Valley as a preview of the action at the BNP Paribas Open. This is truly a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for tennis fans to have an up-close and personal view of some of the world's greatest tennis players having fun on the court. We appreciate the outpouring of support from the local community and look forward to providing another world-class tennis experience this year."

Also instrumental in the event will be Scott Colebourne, vice president and event manager with Drysdale; Albert Fernandez, director of tennis at Rancho Las Palmas Resort; and Michael Walker, general manager at Rancho Las Palmas Country Club.

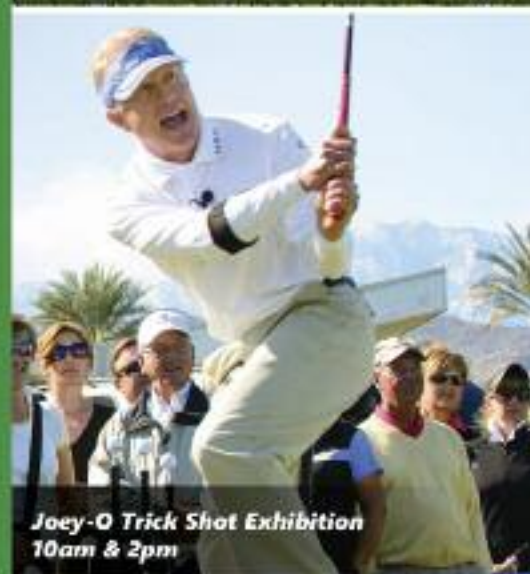
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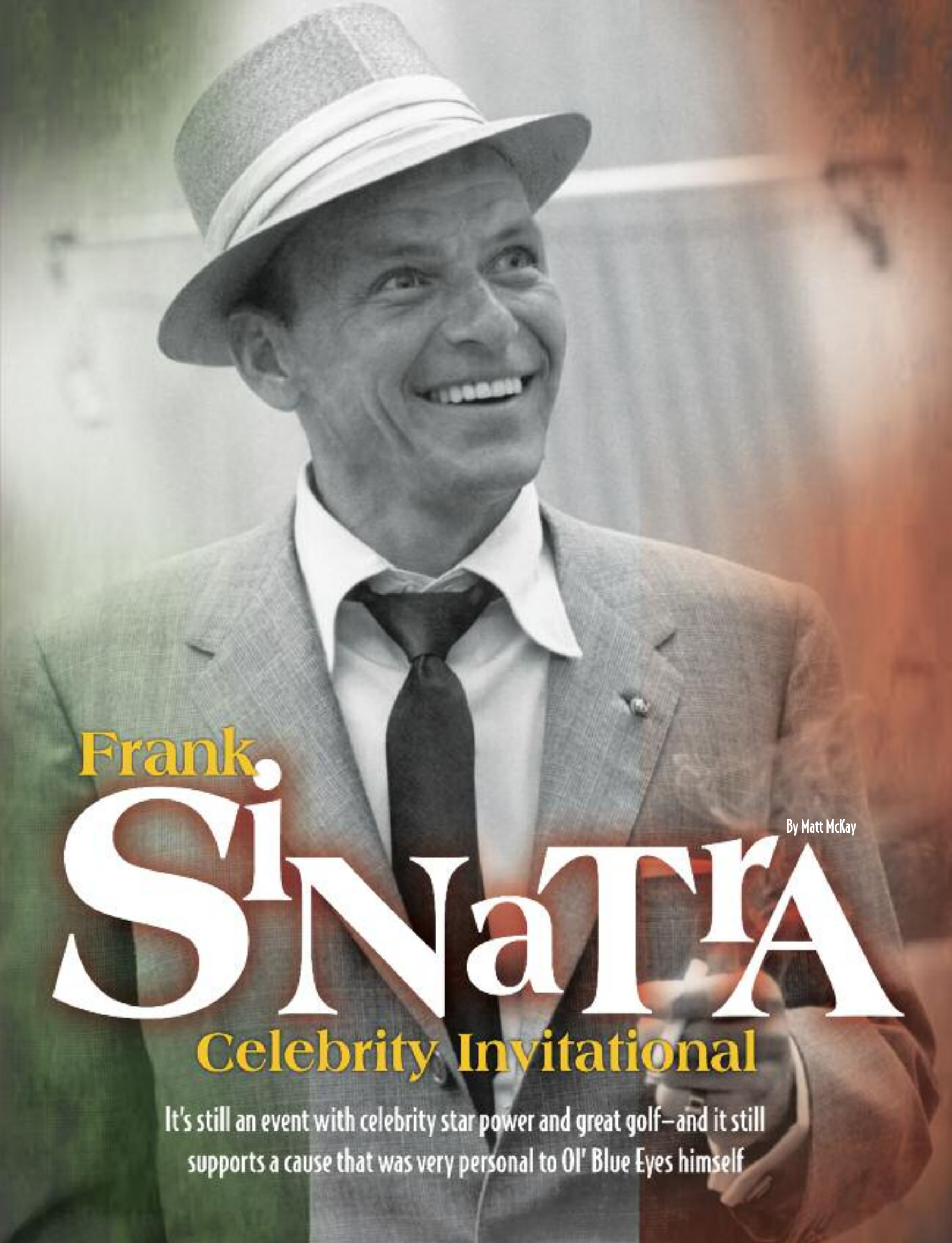
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SINATRA
Celebrity Invitational

It's still an event with celebrity star power and great golf—and it still supports a cause that was very personal to Ol' Blue Eyes himself

The days are short and sunny, the temperatures distinctly in-season for the Southern California deserts and there's a palpable air of casual elegance permeating the Coachella Valley from end to end.

There's no doubt the time is very nearly here for the annual Frank Sinatra Celebrity Invitational, scheduled for February 18-20 at its traditional home, Fantasy Springs Resort Casino and Eagle Falls Golf Course (designed by *Desert Golf & Tennis* contributor Clive Clark) in Indio, California. Organizers are pulling out all the stops to ensure that this year's event is one of the most memorable yet, as friends and fans of "The Chairman" continue to celebrate what would have been his 100th birthday on December 12, 2015.

A staple on the Coachella Valley golf calendar since 1988, the tournament serves as a gathering point for past players and celebrities to reunite, new players and new celebrities to develop friendships, and to keep Sinatra's memory and music alive. It's also the primary fundraiser for the Barbara Sinatra Children's Center at Eisenhower in Rancho Mirage, California, which opened in 1986. The center provides counseling for victims of physical, sexual and emotional child abuse, regardless of the family's ability to pay. Its mission is to break the generational cycle of abuse by focusing on

prevention and education. Approximately 90 percent of the center's budget comes from individual donors, fundraising events such as the tournament and other charitable organizations.

Celebrities and fashion have always been a big part of the festivities, and this year is no exception. Joe Mantegna, who currently stars on the CBS hit drama *Criminal Minds* and serves as host and producer for *Gun Stories* on the Outdoor Channel, is the event's cohost. Comedian Tom Dreesen, a Sinatra favorite, returns to emcee the event for the 28th year.

The golf tournament is a five-player team gross and net scramble competition, with teams comprised of one celebrity and four amateur golfers. The four amateurs players on each team stay together for all 36 holes while celebrity players change teams for the second round. Current USGA handicaps are verified and applied to all contestants.

The schedule of events includes registration and a pairings party on Thursday, February 18, with the first round of golf scheduled for Friday. Also on Friday, for those not out seeking birdies and the beverage cart, there's a reception and preview, silent auction featuring furs and jewelry and a luncheon and fashion show beginning at 11:00 a.m. Friday's activities are headlined by a dinner

headline entertainment provided by The Fifth Dimension. For those with a special invitation and not yet ready to call it a night, there are post-gala events, including the Sponsors Nightcap Party.

While Saturday night marks the end of the golf and festivities, there's still one more very important item on the agenda. The Barbara Sinatra Children's Center at Eisenhower will conduct an open house from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., hosted by Mrs. Sinatra herself.

To register, volunteer, learn about sponsorship opportunities or for any other tournament information, visit franksinatragolf.org. Tournament rounds at Fantasy Springs are open to the public and admission is free. Cameras are welcome.

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

The new golf clubhouse is the perfect addition to a community with everything

There's only one place in the Coachella Valley that features a Rees Jones-designed course. Jones, a member of the golf-elite family that includes his father, Robert Trent Jones, and brother, Robert Trent Jones, Jr., has made his own name in the world of golf-course design and he has impressive credentials to show for it. Known as the "Open Doctor" for his work on courses prior to major championships, his layouts can be found in some of the most revered golfing communities in the country: No. 7 at Pinehurst, the courses at Bear Creek and



Oyster Reef golf clubs on Hilton Head Island, the Rees Jones course at the venerable Breakers Palm Beach and the South Course at Torrey Pines in La Jolla.

Easily able to stand beside any of them is the Rees Jones masterpiece at Andalusia at Coral Mountain, a private community in La Quinta, California in the Coachella Valley, an area well known for having courses designed by the greatest names in the game.

The par-72 course at Andalusia is playable and beautiful, its lush fairways and bent-grass greens set against the dramatic backdrop of the Santa Rosa Mountains. Multiple tee options give golfers of all abilities a place of their own on this course, which plays 7,521 yards from the tips and a very approachable 5,489 yards from the forward tees. While community is front and center at Andalusia, homes do not crowd this course. By design, the course has exceptionally wide fairways, ensuring that homes and backyards do not impact play. The design also ensures that from hole to hole and round to round, play changes significantly depending on where on these expansive fairways you land.

In November, the new clubhouse for golf members and their guests opened with well-deserved fanfare, completing the village setting that also includes the community's expansive Racquet Club. Rees Jones, for one, believes that the new clubhouse pairs beautifully with the golf course he designed.

"Every design element at Andalusia has been extremely well conceived," he says. "The orientation, rhythm, beauty and the ebb and flow of the golf course I designed are unlike any other layout in



the Coachella Valley. Now that the clubhouse is fully operational, it is evident that this design element blends seamlessly with the community. It is stunning and comfortable. It feels like a second home."

The new golf clubhouse features a pro shop, dining terrace for mixed dining, and men and women's locker rooms. Adding to the convenience, food and beverage service is also available in lounge areas of the locker rooms. Just like Andalusia's equally impressive Racquet Club, the new clubhouse was designed to bring the outside surroundings into the interiors.

John Cummings, general manager of country club operations, says, "The new clubhouse is spectacular and enhances the golf experience at Andalusia. The architecture is reminiscent of the great garden palaces of southern Spain and it was designed to maximize the views from every angle."

Andalusia is a community of active, engaged residents, some of them full-time desert dwellers and others arriving seasonally. All enjoy a host of amenities to complement the desert lifestyle, from social engagement to outdoor adventure. Tapas, Andalusia's casual and fine-dining restaurant with indoor and outdoor seating and spaces available for private dining and events, also offers winemaker's dinners and wine tastings, as well as the convenience of home delivery.



The community also has a game room, and active pursuits for members include swimming and working out in the expansive fitness facility along with hiking and biking the trails that weave in and around the Andalusia property. There's even a dog park for residents and their four-footed friends.

Tennis, like golf, is core to Andalusia. The Racquet Club offers five hard-surface courts and three red-clay courts, to say nothing of four dedicated pickleball courts. All of the courts are lighted.

Wait. Pickleball? Indeed, and it's becoming increasingly popular according to Nolan Sparks, vice president of T.D.



Desert Development Corporation and part of the team that developed Andalusia at Coral Mountain. Extremely active himself, Sparks is an accomplished marathon runner and a tennis player who participates in many of the Andalusia Racquet Club events. He's also an avid pickleball player.

"Our membership stays busy with golf, exercise and fitness classes, tennis and pickleball" he says. "We have tennis players of all levels, and even the purists and the diehard golfers are embracing pickleball as fun cross-training. We could not be more pleased with how active our community is!"

Like the rest of Andalusia, the residences are a cut above—upscale homes designed by top architecture and design firms and filled with touches that make the most of the indoor-outdoor desert lifestyle. Among the features prospective home buyers can expect are private central courtyards and expansive patios with custom-designed pool and spa areas. There is little the developers have not thought of in this meticulously planned community that just keeps getting better.

The new clubhouse is one of Andalusia's crowning touches, yet this community is not just about its amenities. "We are really proud to offer our members world-class facilities with the valley's only Rees Jones-designed golf course, a beautiful golf clubhouse and an impressive racquet club." Cummings says. "But what really makes Andalusia Country Club special are the friendly members."

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The Long and the Short of It

Some par-4 holes are a "damned if you do, damned if you don't" scenario. Our own Clive Clark breaks it down for those who dare

What do you like the best: The most challenging par 4s or short par 4s that give a longer hitter a chance of driving the green with perhaps a great chance to make a birdie or even an eagle 2?

As we all know, golf holes come in all shapes, sizes and lengths.

How about the 10th hole at Riviera in Los Angeles? It is perhaps one of the greatest short par 4s in the world. We've seen this hole appear in up to triple playoffs during The Los Angeles Open, with top Tour professionals battling it out on a 300-yard hole.

However, this hole has one of the narrowest greens in the game, and if your tee shot is out of position, particularly with a drive slightly off to the right of the green, you will be facing one of the

most difficult short pitch shots that golf has to offer. You will be coming out of semi-rough to a slightly elevated green over a bunker with a landing area that seems to be about the size of a gentleman's silk handkerchief.

What are the chances of driving the green for a tournament professional? Length is not a problem. But with the green cantered off-axis to the play line, you pretty much have to drive the ball into a six-yard gap, and that can test even the very best.

In Indio, California, my design at Eagle Falls Golf Course at Fantasy Springs Resort Casino has a hole that very much falls into this category. No. 11 is a 295-yard par 4 off the back tee and shortens to 240-250 yards from the forward tees. As you see from the photograph, it is a question of, "Do you go for it or don't you?" There is ample space on the right where the fairway provides a generous landing area. However, for the brave who wish to tackle the job of driving the green, there is water, sand and even an old English stonewall to contend with.

Riviera Hole No. 10



Eagle Falls Hole No. 11

This hole at Eagle Falls demands a strategic approach and sometimes patience. Suppose you are 5-under your handicap when you come to the 11th tee. Do you say to yourself, "I am playing so well, I should go for this green and pick up yet another shot?" Or, do you say to yourself, "I'm already 5-under, let me secure a safe par on this hole and move on."

Holes of this nature offer a tantalizing chance of one good shot leading to an automatic birdie or, alternatively, one bad shot and your great play has imploded and your score goes up the Khyber Pass! If one day there were to be a Tour event at Eagle Falls, it would be very interesting to see what decision the best players in the world would make.

Although short par 4s can entice the golfer into turning his scorecard into a shipwreck, there are larger and more threatening holes dotted about the world. How many of you have played in Scotland? Have you ever played at Troon? The 11th there, a par 4 of 485 yards, is one of the most daunting holes on The British Open Championship rota. Why? Because you have a sea of gorse to drive over. This treacherous, prickly bush is abundant down the left side of the fairway of this hole. Oh, and did I mention the railway line, which is out of bounds, that hugs the right-hand side of the hole all the way from the tee to the green? I remember Ernie Els in his bid

to win The British Open Championship in 2004 getting snarled up in one of these menacing gorse bushes and eventually succumbing to a 7. He went on to lose The Open that year in a playoff.

Back in the early '60s during his first British Open challenge, Jack Nicklaus made a 10 on this hole! Life, as they say, is not always fair, perhaps especially not on the golf course.

Another hole that makes the blood curdle is No. 18 at TPC Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra Beach, Florida. How many times haven't we seen those who escape the gnarly island green at 17 only to plunge their tee shot or even their 2nd shot on 18 into the massive lake that runs the entire length to the left of this extraordinarily frightening hole. When you stand on the tee, Pete Dye's railroad ties, which define the lake on the left, jump out at you like your worst nightmare.

We could also talk about the awesome and extremely difficult par 4 that is known as "The Road Hole" at St Andrews, but I tell you what, we won't go there. I think I'll just stick to playing the short, driveable par 4s.

O K, so the golf tournament and surrounding functions are well known for being among the desert's biggest parties. But as Patrick Warburton is quick to point out, it's a "party with a purpose."

Warburton is a bit of a warrior for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, the beneficiary of his Patrick Warburton Celebrity Golf Tournament, scheduled this year for March 6-13. The golfing portion of the tournament is scheduled for March 12-13 at The Classic Club; however, the event has become so much more than a couple of rounds of competitive golf. That's the way Warburton likes it, and that's the way tournament chairman Clarke Rheney put it together.

"It's taken on this fantastic life of its own," Warburton says. "It's Clarke Rheney, our chairman, it's really his tournament. He built it

from day one and has dedicated a good portion of his life to it. He works tirelessly every year on this event. That's why we have the jam session we have, it's why we have a golf tournament everyone wants to play in."

Warburton took inspiration for his tournament from an old Super Bowl tournament hosted by former NFL quarterback Jim McMahon, which also benefitted St. Jude. When Warburton was subsequently asked to come to the hospital to read to some of the patients, he suggested doing much more through an outside fundraiser, such as a golf tournament. The rest is history that's still being written.

"My wife [Cathy] and I talked about doing something like this for a while, and it had to be something really important that helped sick kids—that just meant a lot to us," Warburton says. "I told my

wife what was going down and told her we were probably going to have our hands full pretty quickly. But we're very pleased with the opportunity to be a part of something important, outside of raising our own family and doing what we have to do and what is called upon us as parents. We wanted to do something more.

"We're blessed," Warburton continues. "We have four healthy children. And St. Jude means something to everyone in this country, whether [they've] had a critically ill child or not. St. Jude represents the best of humanity, and in this day and age, St. Jude is a place that gives all of us hope in humanity. This is something that Clarke had known firsthand, so the smartest thing I ever did was get Clarke involved."

and live auctions and entertainment provided by Sixwire & Friends.

Of course, the tournament proceeds are a direct help to the hospital as it goes about the daily chore of funding its work. Last year, the tournament wrote an \$881,000 check to St. Jude. But Warburton knows the week of fun and golf also achieves another goal that's almost as important as fundraising: it raises awareness of the hospital, its mission and its impact on the lives of children and families, inspiring potential philanthropists to consider the hospital when deciding on their charitable contributions.

The Branding Strategy Behind the ANA Inspiration

For fans, the tournament is about great golf and LPGA stars;
for the sponsor, it's about brand awareness

With each passing month All-Nippon Airways, or ANA, is getting everything it wanted out of a relationship with the LPGA Tour and the major it now sponsors in Rancho Mirage, California.

In 2015, the airline took over sponsorship of what had been the Kraft Nabisco Championship and quickly went about creating a new image and complete branding change for the event. With a year of experience under their respective belts, and the branding basics in place, the tournament and the airline are prepared to take the tournament to a higher altitude.

Tournament director Gabe Coddington, who began his career with the event as a volunteer more than 20 years ago, says the tournament and airline have quickly created a comfort zone, and ANA executives are not only happy with what has transpired under their watch, they're highly enthusiastic about the future, including the upcoming 2016 event.

"I've come to enjoy [the ANA executives] as people. They're really, really good people. They have a healthy respect for the history of this event, yet they're very innovative and very excited from the CEO and the top down. The whole company is excited to be a part of this historic event," Coddington says. "Year one, they talked about it being very much a soft opening. They didn't want to mess with any of the traditions. They said, 'We just want to come and observe and kind of see where we can add value.'"

Now it's time for the full opening. "Year two is really kind of our grand opening," Coddington notes, pointing to some upcoming major announcements and large-scale exhibitions, such as the Inspiring Women In Sports Conference and events with Olympians in varying sports. "It's all about getting kids and getting women and getting people excited about being in sport. You'll see some updates to our champions junior challenge that will be exciting and will help grow that event, and you'll see that theme of inspiration coming to life even more than you did in 2015."

By many metrics, the 2015 event was a success. Despite having only six months to prepare everything from programs to on-course signage, ANA executives were thrilled with the exposure and more excited than ever about the partnership's potential. On top of everything, the tournament produced another dramatic finish, with Brittany Lincicome winning in a three-hole playoff over 2011 champion Stacy Lewis.

Coddington said this year's event, scheduled for March 31-April 3, has even more going for it than momentum and a happy sponsor. The 2016 event marks a convergence of significant anniversaries, as ANA celebrates its 30th year of flying to the United States just as the tournament celebrates its 45th year at Mission Hills Country Club.

It should also receive a significant boost in interest with the 2016 Summer Olympics in Rio de Janeiro bearing down on players who hope to compete for their respective nations. Coddington says the tournament will feature the top 115 women in the world from 25 different countries, so even though the final Olympic teams won't be announced until the first week in July, fans will have either a fairly clear picture of which players will likely be competing in Rio, or at the very least, how tight the race is for team spots.

Of course, all tournament initiatives are undertaken for two reasons: to enhance the fan experience and generate brand and service awareness for the sponsors. Although ANA had been flying into the U.S. market for decades, it was well known only by the discriminating Far East traveler. ANA executives hitched their wagon to the tournament to increase awareness among the U.S.

based flying public, and they received concrete evidence the plan was working during the week of the 2015 event.

"Before the 2015 event," Coddington says, "I sat in Tokyo on one of the highest floors of the ANA Building across from the CEO and other executives. They said, 'If you Google ANA in the United States, the American Nurses Association shows up. We hope with sponsorship of this tournament, that changes.' Sure enough, if you Googled ANA on the Monday of the tournament, All Nippon Airways came up. So there was an instant ROI in the branding and awareness for ANA that they could tangibly see, something they called out a month in advance that actually happened on the Monday of the tournament."

Coddington notes that the challenge and opportunity for ANA and the tournament is to continue to grow that awareness moving forward. "A lot of the strategy we'll execute is to bring about awareness in the markets where ANA is currently operating. There are 10 North American hubs right now and the West Coast is obviously huge with L.A., San Jose, San Francisco, Seattle and Vancouver."

The strategy, Coddington says, will be year-round and will reinforce the concept of an inspired journey back to the ANA Inspiration every year. In concrete terms, it's about promoting ANA's U.S. hubs and creating brand awareness, particularly on the West Coast. Based on the first year of the partnership, it's already working.

With a renewed team spirit and focus, 2016 may be the year for a Team USA win

In February 2015, the U.S. Ryder Cup committee selected Davis Love III to repeat as captain at this year's event, following extensive deliberations by the task force appointed after Team USA's 2014 loss at Gleneagles in Scotland. Team USA last won in 2008.

Love immediately named 2006 Ryder Cup captain, task force member and Minnesota native Tom Lehman as 2016 vice captain, a smart move given that the 2016 tournament will be

played at Hazeltine National Golf Club in Chaska, Minnesota, Sept. 30-Oct. 2.

Active, dedicated in planning and work, Lehman is helping Love get to know Hazeltine and its specific dynamics. "All the task force [members] are, have been, totally committed, involved and focusing on winning the Cup back," Lehman says. "Love is hugely supported, sharing ideas, pulling together with the PGA on this goal." He also notes that playing in the United States gives the



group the advantage of more control over such elements as course setup, and, of course, the fan base is strong here.

In late November, Love announced three additional 2016 vice captains—Jim Furyk, Steve Stricker and Tiger Woods—aimed at bringing Ryder Cup “been there, done that” experience and passion to win, in addition to grooming likely future captains for the job. This year there are five slots available, meaning he has one selection left to fill.

Woods, whom some thought would not be invested in the Ryder Cup, emphasizes, “I’ll do whatever it takes for our 2016 team to be successful.” The passion and commitment are obvious.

Lehman talks about the unity of the group and its shared goal. “We have a collective 2016 thought—go and win in Hazeltine. The U.S. team has been too individual before. All great teams have a collective thought, goal, vision and mission. We will have this.”

Lehman notes that the emphasis on team means Ryder Cup players have to be selfless and not worried about their record. Their focus has to be for team benefit and they show commitment by taking the time to play Hazeltine during the year and

dedication to victory ahead, not just Ryder Cup Monday.

“We need to get our players there, knowing the course, feeling at home on it, having a home advantage even though we don’t have PGA events there,” Lehman says.

Love strikes the same note of team spirit. “All players must feel, ‘I’m tired of losing, we are better than that, I want to be on a winning team.’ It’s not just, ‘I want to make the team,’ he says.

A Major winner, Love has more than 20 PGA victories to his credit since turning pro in 1985. His 2015 Wyndham Championship victory at 51 made him the third oldest winner in PGA Tour history, and the third player to win on the Tour in four different decades, joining Sam Snead and Raymond Floyd. He’s involved in course design with his brother Mark, and he’s an author. Love wrote *Every Shot I Take*, highlighting lessons on life and golf and honoring his father. This year, Love will play the Champions Tour and PGA Tour, keeping close contact with the players.

Team Europe’s captain, North Ireland’s Darren Clarke, OBE, is well known in America and globally with his 22 wins worldwide on golf’s main

tours, highlighted by his 2011 Open Championship victory at Royal St. George’s Golf Club in Kent, England. Clarke was a member of five consecutive European Ryder Cup teams from 1997 to 2006, and served as assistant captain.

Hazeltine National Golf Club will present challenges for all. Located in Chaska, just outside of Minneapolis, the course’s Robert Trent Jones design was widely acclaimed at its 1962 opening. The course (par 72, 7,628 yards) has been rerouted to enhance spectator viewing for the Ryder Cup matches, with Love’s help and both captains approval. It also allows for better flow of play and ease of movement.

At 2016’s early PGA events, Ryder Cup wasn’t on most players’ lips yet. But Jordan Spieth, World No. 1 and likely to be the first player to make the team, already has his goals in place. “Improving as an individual player is first and foremost,” he says. “Also, I’d really like to get a Ryder Cup win this year.”

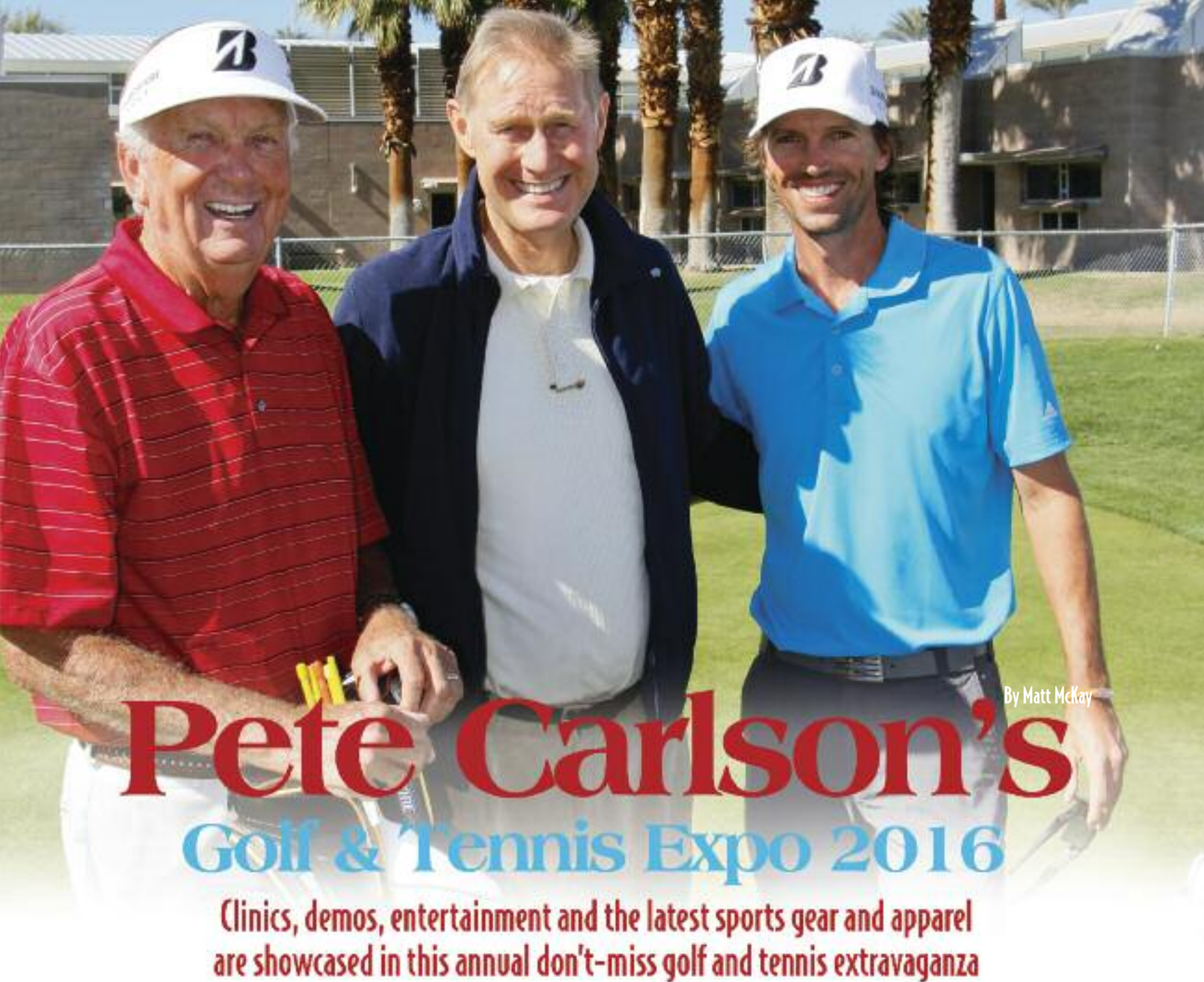

Clinics, demos, entertainment and the latest sports gear and apparel are showcased in this annual don't-miss golf and tennis extravaganza

If you've always wanted to attend the massive PGA Merchandise Show in Orlando just so you could be the first to see all the new equipment, gadgets and apparel, don't rush to make those flight reservations just yet. Pete Carlson's Golf & Tennis Expo could save you time and money.

If you're intent on a side trip to Walt Disney World, the Expo can't help you there. What it can do, however, and has done for the last 11 years, is bring together a huge percentage of the golf industry's brands for a golf show on a grand scale—a sort of Merchandise Show West—at the College of the Desert (COD) in Palm Desert, California.

This year's event is scheduled for Feb. 5-6, literally just days after the final representatives have cleared out from the PGA Merchandise Show in Orlando. Be they equipment manufacturers, designers of cutting-edge golf and tennis apparel or upstart providers of the newest, must-have accessories, chances are they'll be represented at the Expo. Nearly 40 major manufacturers will be on hand providing products ranging from the hottest new driver to the latest trend in golf gloves.

Perhaps the most important element of the entire presentation

is the fact that it is, and always has been, free to the public—a concept originally suggested by Barney Adams, creator of Adams Golf.

The show will run 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day at COD's Golf Center, located at Fred Waring Drive and San Pablo Avenue. Free parking is available on the campus. Signage and attendants will direct patrons to the closest available parking, and shuttles from the parking lot to the driving range will be available.

"After the holidays are over, we start thinking about the Expo and getting ready for it," says Carlson, who opened his store in 1981. "It's exiting to get to continue to do it. We're excited, the vendors are excited and the public is excited. People know they can see, feel, hit and purchase all the new stuff all in the same place.

"Also, it's going to be Super Bowl weekend. So while a lot of people are going to be thinking about football, we want them to take some time and think about golf that weekend, too," Carlson adds.

There are many golf shows scattered throughout Southern California and the nation at this time of year, but the Pete Carlson event has metamorphosed into a huge annual golf happening in the

Coachella Valley. More than 4,000 attendees made last year's festival, and the organizers are ready for even more this year.

There will be club fittings, mini-lessons, full-shot opportunities and two shows daily (10 a.m. and 2 p.m.) by trick-shot artist Joey O, all in a friendly, sophisticated, laid-back atmosphere. Desert resident Al "Mr. 59" Geiberger is scheduled to conduct a short-game clinic each day at noon. Additionally, specials will be available to tempt customers in the checkout lines, and health experts specializing in golf-related maintenance, including LPGA golf chiropractor Jenni Martin, will make their services available.

And that's just a glimpse at the offerings. The 14,000-square-foot store, located at 73-741 Highway 111 in Palm Desert, is the home of the Jazz for Jazz Lovers Concert Series, a manifestation of Pete Carlson's love of the genre. So it should come as no surprise that there's also a strong jazz element at the Expo, with George Cebra's Jazz Quintet and The Boys & Girls Club Heatwave Jazz & Show Band performing live. Cebra's ensemble will appear both days while the Heatwave will play Saturday only.

"It creates kind of a nice, relaxing atmosphere," Carlson says. "The young kids are ages nine to 18 and they've been a mainstay in the valley for the last six to eight years. They're a very energetic, talented group of kids that perform about 150 concerts a year. They're really tested. George usually brings five to six solid players that live here in the valley and they play a variety of well-known tunes. It's kind of an eclectic group of guys and makes for a good contrast between the two groups."

Fitness trainers, nutritional representatives and sustenance in the form of food and beverages will also be available, with food and beverage proceeds benefitting COD's golf programs.

There's so much is going on, it's almost a disservice to refer to it as a golf show. It's more of a golf festival. So skip the airport, the mouse ears and the monorail, put a couple of bucks worth of gas in your tank and head over to College of the Desert in early February. Once at the Expo, your travel savings can be applied to discount purchases of some of the latest and greatest golf and tennis gear.

Searching for alternatives to surgery, she discovered Bikram Yoga, and with consistent practice over just four months, her symptoms and pain disappeared. Today, she shares that success with athletes and others at her studio on El Paseo.

BIKRAM YOGA

Before beginning Bikram Yoga or any new physical exercise, students should check with their physician, especially if medically compromised or taking medications, and mention any health-related concerns to instructors. Once starting, students should listen to their bodies and acclimate to the heat accordingly. While it is normal to feel nauseous and dizzy the first two weeks of exercising in the heat, prolonged symptoms should not be ignored. Students should also hydrate properly prior to and after class with water and electrolytes and avoid alcohol and caffeine.

GOLFER'S PLAYBOOK: Master Solid Contact with Putts and Chips



The beginning of a new year gives each of us the opportunity to create resolutions and get back to mastering the simple things in life. Golf is no different. Mastering the simple things, including making solid contact with putts and chips, will help improve your scores—not a bad way to start a new year.

For this lesson, fellow golf instructor Paul Bucy, from the Golf Academy at Desert Willow, joins me. He will address putting and I will address chipping

Improving your putter-face control

Players often come to lessons wanting more consistency with their putting. The first thing I look at is how well they aim and control the putter face. Being able to control the putter face is critical to starting the ball on its intended line. Here's a great drill designed to improve your putter-face alignment at impact.

I start with a three- to five-foot putt and build a gate for my putter to travel through. I make sure the tees are aligned so that when I place my putter down, I can use them as a guide for squaring my putter face at address. Then I build another gate for the ball to travel through, approximately two feet in front of my setup gate. I want the gate for the ball to be in line with the gate for my putter.

My goal is to strike the ball with a square putter face without hitting the tees, and to roll the ball to the hole without contacting either tee. It's not as easy as it looks. I try to keep my focus on making a straight backstroke and straight through-stroke in between the tees, which helps me get a feel for the correct swing path with the putter face remaining angled to the hole.



If, when I make a stroke, my putter makes contact with either tee, then the swing path of my putter needs to be refined. If I make a good stroke and the ball hits either the right or left tee, then I learn from that feedback that my clubface is not angled square to the hole as I am making contact with the ball.

I use this feedback to make necessary adjustments so that I can consistently execute a stroke without my putter or ball making contact with any of the tees. After completing this drill, I find that my own putting stroke is more productive in making those short putts on the golf course.





Improving your contact in chipping

To make solid contact with my chip shots, as well as any other golf shot, I start with my grip. How I hold onto the club has a lot to do with making solid contact. I like to position my hands in what I call a “square grip,” where my thumbs are positioned on top of the grip and matching the angle of the clubface, and my palms are “square” to the target.

As I setup to the golf ball, I should have the feeling of being balanced and square to the path that leads to the target, called the target line. I can feel my weight distributed equally with my shoulders directly on top of my hips and feet.



In my takeaway, I like to feel my core rotate and serve as the power source that moves the golf club directly back along the target line. The purpose of my backswing is to store up energy for the forward swing. At the completion of my backswing, I want to feel a subtle hinge in my wrist, which helps create “lag” for the forward swing and contact with the ball.

My key for hitting solid chip shots is this feeling of lag through impact. As my body rotates left in the forward swing, my wrist maintains its hinged angle all the way through impact. The shaft leaning towards the target makes the club bottom out underneath the golf ball, insuring solid compression between the ball and clubface.

New-home sales top the list, but buyers have many options





New homes are the big winners in California's desert communities. We are seeing a boom in new-home sales in country clubs as well as outside of them, and in all price ranges. Land and lot sales are also strong, and the most sought-after style for homes these days is contemporary. A new type of buyer is also coming to the Coachella Valley market.

One area that's red hot is Andalusia Country Club in La Quinta. Over the past six months, 35 homes priced over \$1 million have sold in this community. Andalusia recently completed a new golf clubhouse, complementing the club's extensive amenities that include a state-of-the-art fitness center, tennis clubhouse, community swimming pool, dog park and walking and bike trails. Five new model homes have also opened. They're light, bright and contemporary inside with vanishing walls of glass that take advantage of stunning views. Andalusia features an 18-hole Rees Jones championship golf course, and there are plans to add a second golf course.

Toscana Country Club in Indian Wells also had a banner year with 38 homes sold, 20 of them new. Toscana recently opened new and updated models with vanishing pocket doors, contemporary flooring and lighter finishes. The club offers two Jack Nicklaus courses, a fitness center, topnotch tennis and a stunning clubhouse.

With the opening of the Ritz-Carlton, Rancho Mirage and all of the amenities that it provides, the community of Rancho Mirage has experienced brisk sales, especially in the Mirada area. Newly constructed villas and spec homes are available.

Old Palm Springs has been a hot market in terms of mid-century home sales, but also with new homes modeled in the mid-century style. More than 200 homes priced over \$500,000 have sold there in the past six months.

Some established high-end clubs have seen a building boom, many with custom estates featuring spec homes that will give buyers another option. The Hideaway in La Quinta has more than 30 homes under construction. Madison Club has 12 homes. At prestigious clubs such as



Big Horn, Reserve, Quarry and Vintage, homes are now going up on lots that have been vacant for a long time.

Buyers are coming from all areas of the country, and not surprising from up and down the West Coast, Southern California and the San Francisco Bay Area up to Oregon and Washington. It's interesting to note that the age of buyers is also coming down as Gen Xers (age 35-50) join Baby Boomers (ages 51-69) in the search for homes. These younger buyers are looking for a family experience and multiple activities. They want golf and tennis but also outdoor pursuits including hiking and biking, as well as newly popular activities such as pickleball. They also want luxurious spas and fine dining.

Country Club Residents: *Can You Spare a Dime?*

Desert Golf & Tennis takes a hard look at financial
issues facing golf-course communities today



You finally did it. You purchased a residence in a gated country club. Mornings are spent enjoying coffee on the patio overlooking a lush green fairway, the same fairway you'll play later in the day with friends. When you do play, the pace is good, no one in front of your group or behind it. In fact, you didn't even need to call for a tee time. Life is idyllic.

Or is it? Take a moment to think about the bankroll required to maintain a golf course—the superintendent, maintenance staff, pro-shop staff and cart-barn staff, to say nothing of golf carts and other equipment, landscaping and facilities. There's a lot of money going out each month.

In 2004, the Golf Course Maintenance Association reported that the average cost to maintain one hole on an 18-hole course was \$50,172 annually, roughly \$900,000 for 18 holes. Today, that cost for an 18-hole course has risen to \$1 million or more.

Can your community afford that? When was the last time you looked at your community's year-end budget review? Perhaps you should, because one day you might receive a letter from the new owner of the golf-course property saying that the golf course is being closed and redeveloped to accommodate new homes. Surprise!

If that notion shook you up, ask yourself this: Who owns the golf course where I live and who pays to maintain it?

In 2015, the closure of two golf courses in the Coachella Valley received a lot of attention. Santa Rosa Country Club in

Palm Desert, California, opened in 1978. Ten years ago at its peak, there were more than 300 members. Due member attrition, challenging economics and loan payments, the 95 remaining members had a hard decision to make in 2013. They could payoff the existing loan as it came due with an assessment to members, find a new lender that would lend on a golf course (unlikely considering the economic climate of the golf industry) and then run the course themselves. Or, they could sell the course to developers. Ultimately they decided to sell the 79-acre parcel to a developer with visions of residential units.

"A loss of membership is what it boils down to," commented Rick Barnes, a 10-year member. Unfortunately, the club had been reactive rather than proactive. Members waited too long to address the declining membership and subsequent loss of income, income that had kept the course afloat.

According to the National Golf Foundation, there are 29 million golfers in the United States, defined as anyone who has played an 18-hole round in the last 12 months. But it's the avid golfer who keeps the game going. That's someone who plays 25 regulation rounds or more in a year. Avid golfers count for just 26 percent of the total 7,540,000 players. Break that down by state and it's just 150,800 per state—not a lot of golfers.

Once figures are compiled for 2014, the foundation expects it to be the ninth consecutive year of more closures than openings. In 2013, the last year for which

figures are available, 1,575 18-hole equivalent courses closed compared to 14 courses opening.

The most high-profile course closure in the valley is occurring at Rancho Mirage Country Club, currently a hotbed of accusations, lawsuits and stalemate between the new course property owner, Oasis Ranch LLC, and club residents.

Rancho Mirage Country Club opened in 1985 with 266 home sites along the once thriving 18-hole golf course. To date, golf membership is made up of 22 residents, hardly enough income to sustain a golf course. Confusion ensues on several points: Did the members know they didn't own the golf course? Should a property owner be forced to keep infusing money into a business that has been declining rapidly over several years? Is it fair for the city to say property owners have the right to sell, then increase acrimony by siding with homeowners who had a chance to buy the property but didn't? Is the problem a matter of equity vs. non-equity club? And if so, why didn't property owners know Rancho Mirage Country Club was a non-equity club before purchasing?

Equity-membership structure is typically defined as one in which members are theoretically "owners" of the club, which is run by a Board of Directors elected by members. Operation and maintenance of the club are the responsibilities of the members, who typically employ an outside resource to handle day-to-day operations. In a non-

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equity model, the club and all amenities are owned by an entity other than members. This entity could be the developer or an organization that specializes in owning and operating club facilities and which takes responsibility for the operation, management and maintenance of the club.

In Rancho Mirage Country Club's CC&Rs, the words "Condominium and Community" are spread throughout the 116-page document. The golf course property is referred to as "Country Club Property," with the main verbiage on pg. 47 stating that a separate "Country Club Corporation" was formed to own and operate the Country Club Property that includes an 18-hole golf course, tennis courts and clubhouse facilities. The section also states that if the Country Club Corporation elects to sell and the Association wishes to acquire the Country Club Property, the terms and conditions of such acquisition shall be agreed upon by the parties in the future.

Is this then an issue about members not reading the fine print? Or is it a broader issue, centered on the financial stability of gated golf-course communities across the country?

The bottom line is this: Can your community afford to have a golf course? Or, more realistically, can you afford to be part owner of a golf course? As golf memberships continue to decline, club management companies and HOAs are putting the burden of debt on the entire

membership, not just golfers, which is creating discord among residents.

Recently it was reported that the prestigious Morningside County Club in Rancho Mirage added an additional \$250 per month to the already \$1,050 HOA dues. The increase is earmarked to subsidize the golf club. According to one non-member (who wished to remain anonymous), the non-members find two things unfair, though they enjoy the golf-course views and added value that brings to home prices. First, with more club members than non-club members, club members have more voting power to pass what they want. Second, those same club members who passed the increase gave themselves a \$250 monthly credit, making the \$250 increase a wash for members.

These are three separate cases but all lead back to membership decline and cost of maintaining a golf course. Forced to face the obvious, communities are reacting by adding view fees for homes overlooking golf courses, assessments, beautification fees and mandatory social membership fees for non-club members. More creative assessments are likely to come.

Meanwhile, if you're purchasing in a gated country-club community, read the fine print!

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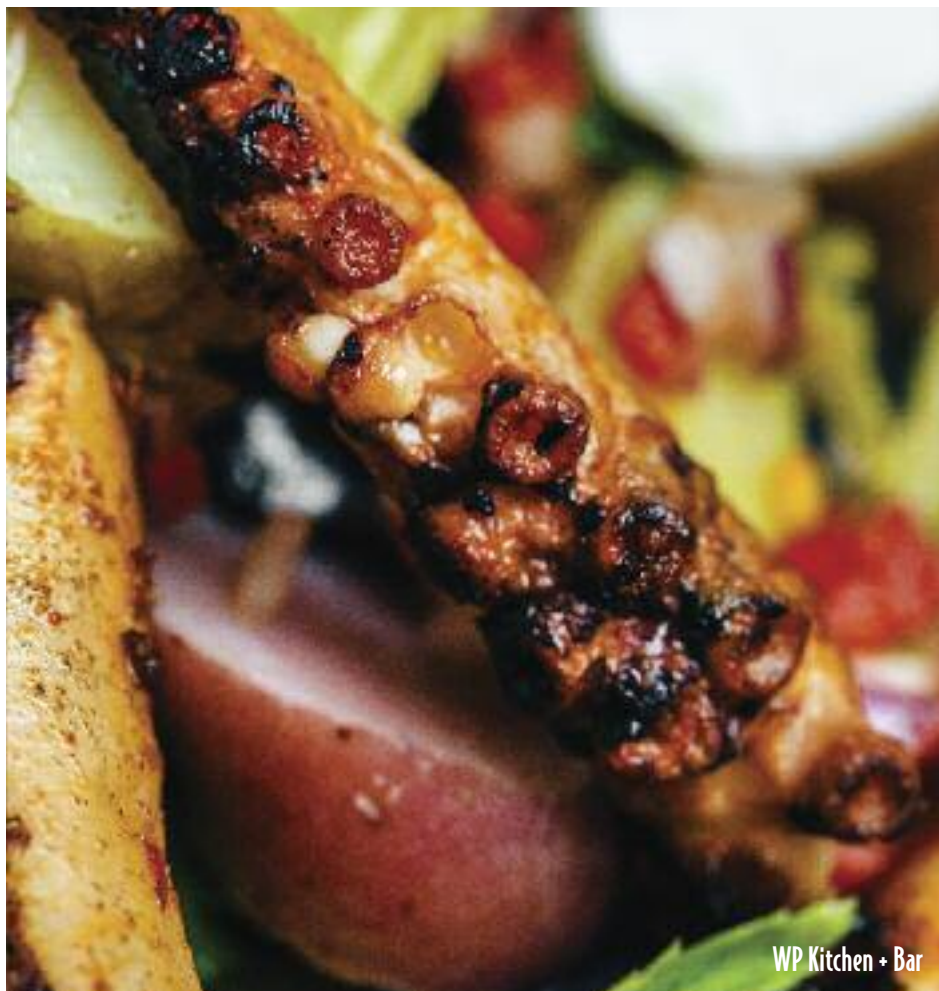

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



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Flying Spyder

Porsche's 918 Spyder bites the competition



The Porsche 918 Spyder has so much green muscle you'd think it was the Incredible Hulk. This hybrid competes with all the heavy weights of road and track. In short, this is no Nissan Leaf. The 918 Spyder is a bona fide super car—not a hint of frumpy or techy. The body is classic Porsche. It levitates a breath above the asphalt and flies like a stealth bomber.

Aerodynamics makes this Spyder the fastest production car on the market. While in development, the Spyder ran a lap around Germany's famed North Loop of the Nürburgring track. It obliterated the record coveted by sports cars around the

world, turning in a time of six minutes and 57 seconds—nearly 20 seconds faster than the previous record. The Corvette ZR1 and Dodge Viper weren't even in the same mountain range.

With one part hybrid, one part gas engine, the Spyder has a recipe for speed. The 4.6-liter V8 is Grade A material to pair with the dual electric motors. One electric motor drives the front, the other drives the rear. The V8 is the brawn while the electric motors are the finesse around corners and on takeoff. The results speak for themselves.

The 918 Spyder's bite will plaster you to the driver's seat. It does 0 to 60 mph in

2.5 seconds. It took longer to read that sentence than it did to decide that this is a special machine, and, not surprising, the designers at Porsche haven't been modest about their expectations.

"We promised a great deal with the 918 Spyder, namely to redefine...performance," Wolfgang Hatz, head of Porsche R&D says. "We have kept our word."

The 887 horsepower that crawls from the belly of this Spyder is mind blowing. The Spyder puts the wraps on everything else on the road, and if it's possible for a car that costs \$845,000 to be somewhat understated, it is. By the way, while you read this paragraph, the Spyder completed



the game as quickly as possible. Hot Lap mode dumps the maximum battery power into getting every bit of traction and torque out of the machine.

Like a black widow's signature hourglass figure, the 918 creates a unique look by routing the tailpipes into a design feature. The tailpipes come out immediately above the engine behind the driver and passenger seats, nearly head high. The look is not only memorable but practical. The top pipes' greatest benefit is optimal heat removal because the hot exhaust gases are released via the shortest possible route and back pressure remains low. To refrain from too much technical talk, it's freakin' cool and sounds even better.

The cockpit has a simple, clear design. Driving tools, settings and information are on the steering wheel and in a set of three gauges. Climate and entertainment controls are routed through a raised touch-screen panel on the driver's right.

The clear indication that Porsche got it right inside the car is that every review has been a resounding "Yes" from auto writers worldwide.

This Spyder isn't creepy but it certainly will raise the hair on the back of your neck. This isn't your momma's hybrid. The 918 Spyder puts a new perspective on a car that runs on batteries. You'll undoubtedly feel like a superhero with this kind of muscle and the skin of a Spyder.

Former Tennis Great
Bjorn Borg
Challenges the Fashion World

Fashion inspired by the great space race looks to Mars

Scandinavia is known for many cultural additions to the American lexicon and lifestyle. Think ABBA, Absolut vodka and the trusty Volvo. Think herring sauced with lingonberries, Swedish meatballs and sensual massage. Of course, the celebrity Swede of the 20th century was film star Greta Garbo, who spent her life explaining that she didn't famously slur, "I want to be alone," but instead had said with a toss of her blonde waves, "I want to be left alone." There is all the difference, she claimed.

Also a Swedish star, Bjorn Borg was born in Stockholm, the capital of Sweden, where fine design is a way of life not a luxury. The city encompasses 14 islands of the vast Stockholm archipelago on the Baltic Sea. The cobblestone streets and ochre-colored buildings of medieval Gamla Stan, the old town, are home to a 13th-century cathedral, the royal palace of Kungliga Slottet and its underground armory, cafes and restaurants. Ferries and sightseeing boats shuttle passengers between islands and beneath more than 50 bridges in this city that is romantic and thoroughly modern all-at-once.

Borg, the only child of Rune and Margretha, grew up fascinated by a golden tennis racket his father gave to him after winning it at a table-tennis tournament, setting his path to fame and fortune.

But burnout at the age of 26? What's up with that? After racking up 11 Grand Slam singles titles (French Open and Wimbledon) between 1974 and 1981, Borg set Open-era records that still stand, and his total 82.7 percent win rate still ranks the decade's best. The pay-off was spectacular. As a teenage superstar, Borg's successful career made the sport more lucrative and at the decade's end the popular player was the first to earn more than \$1 million in a single season.

Nicknamed "Ice-Borg" for his personality trait of grace under pressure, Borg was a player recognized for his swift athleticism and extreme endurance with a distinctive "cool" style and appearance, including his mind-blowing speed. Like Jimmy Connors, he was a master of the two-handed backhand, releasing his grip with his left hand at point of contact and following through with his swing as a right-hander. His natural muscularity allowed him to put heavy topspin on fore- and backhands.

In 1983, his announcement of retirement left the tennis world in shock. Even prime competitor John McEnroe tried to talk him out of retiring, unsuccessfully. Later, Borg attempted a comeback, adopting use of a modern graphite racket, but was dissatisfied with his performance and gave it up. His future success, however, was assured in an entirely new direction as the owner of the Bjorn Borg fashion label, today in Sweden second only to the American designer label Calvin Klein.

Then, a big surprise: The planet Mars came down to earth in 2015 when Borg captivated Fashion Week audiences in Stockholm with an epic, out-of-this world Mars-inspired fashion show, a tribute to global space initiative Mars One and the grand vision, courage and desire to take on the ultimate challenge—training for Mars.

The show featured top Swedish supermodels and a retro space-inspired Spring-Summer 2016 sportswear collection showcased on set at a Mars-like outdoor location under the Vasterbron bridge in Stockholm. The event was packed with the international fashion elite and celebrities. In the front row were Borg with his wife, Patricia, Mars One founder Bas Lansdorp and four of the 100 candidates who may be the first to settle on Mars. Acclaimed artists as well as editors from top-tier international fashion media added to the star-filled experience.



Borg's line made a stellar statement. "Technical elements are really important in the collection in both material choices and details. This ranges from using moisture-wicking fabrics that remove sweat away from the skin to strategically placed mesh panels for increased ventilation," says James Lee, head of design. "We work with laser-cut seams that are used to create ultra flat and non-irritable seams through to details like waterproof zippers that are bonded to the garment to block water and keep it away from these critical areas."

The collection, including a special capsule collection, took inspiration from the history of space travel during the 1970s and '80s. A-List Jewels For Award-Winning Style

Days are getting longer, winter will soon morph into spring and Oscar-party season beckons. Celebrities walking the red carpet will showcase the designs of three popular jewelers who are the go-to choices for A-listers.

BAVNA

Favored by Juliana Margulies, Halle Berry, Jessica Simpson and Charisma Carpenter, Bavna was founded by Sunny Jain in 2008. A variation of his mother's Hindu name, Bavna translates to "of good intentions." The brand is deeply influenced by the ancient art of Sanskrit and the concept of developing mind, body and soul. Jain brings the purity of unrefined gemstones to each piece, gravitating toward diamond and sapphire packages, opal rings and turquoise drop earrings, among others.

Create your own star power by sashaying into the awards after-party with Bavna's Diamond Pavé Double-Marquise Drop Earrings. These post earpieces are full of personality and hang two inches in a marquise-shape with delicate, pavé diamonds (782 tcw) and sterling silver. They retail for \$6,060.

Bavna's Silver Pavé Diamond Floral Ring features an open frame with a solid oval center and flower-shaped clusters in sterling silver. Resting just over one inch on the finger, the ring combines pavé diamonds (2.66 tcw) and gray rose-cut diamonds (28 tcw), both of which are Jain's trademarks. This piece is available for \$2,400.

YEPREM

Also frequently worn on the red carpet, Yeprem is considered one of the more progressive brands in the jewelry industry. Celebs including Lady Gaga, Pink, J-Lo and Gwen Stefani regularly wear the designer, as seen recently at events including the 2015 American Music Awards and the Unicef Snowflake Ball.

Yeprem's White Gold Diamond Climber Single Earring follows the current trend of wearing only one earring. This one, designed for the left ear, is crafted from 18K white gold with prong-set round and marquise white diamonds (1.34 tcw). Measuring four inches, a wire wraps around the top of the ear and is secured by a post back for a pierced ear. As a single, the Climber is valued at \$12,500.

For those who want to stick to tradition, Yeprem's White Gold Diamond Climber Earrings (as in two) display clusters of round white diamonds (3.17 tcw) extending up each ear. The pair of diamond dazzlers has

clip-on backs and are 1.3 inches in length. They sell for \$10,800.

Yeprem's Wildfire White Gold Diamond Ring ignites a beautiful show of bright diamonds set in 18K white gold covered in 332 mixed round and marquise diamonds (5.17 tcw). The linked "wildfire" design moves with the finger, has a tapered band and measures 3.9 inches long and one inch wide. Wildfire retails for \$18,000.

Definitely categorized as progressive, Yeprem's The Claw White Gold Diamond Hand Bracelet is designed as a four-finger claw design that slides over one hand so as to stand out but still allow freedom of movement. Made up of 98 mixed round and marquise white diamonds (5.87 tcw), The Claw is set in 18K white gold and may be purchased for \$17,200.

Yeprem Chakardemian founded his iconic brand in Lebanon in 1964. Of Armenian descent, the Lebanese born Yeprem was originally inspired by a golden bracelet bestowed upon him by his mother, intended to provide him and his family a brighter future—which it apparently did. Celebrating his brand's 50th anniversary in 2014, Yeprem's designs have become favorite Hollywood accessories.

ELIZABETH LOCKE

With a focus on color and pigment, Elizabeth Locke's designs are an equally glamorous option. Launched in 1988, the line is inspired by the founder's extensive travels to exotic locales. Handcrafted in 19K gold, each Elizabeth Locke creation features uncommon design elements including 17th-century Venetian glass intaglios and ancient Greek and Roman coins.

Elizabeth Locke individually designs her Antique Animals Intaglio Gold Bangle in Multicolor Pastel. This Venetian glass bracelet modernizes the intaglio, which has historically served as a practical stamp or seal. The 19K yellow gold has a hammered finish, with multicolor pastel Venetian glass stations with animal intaglios and mother-of-pearl backs. The intaglios are made with modern glass using 17th-century glass molds. This unique wrist design measures 6.5 inches around, is 3/4 inch wide and sells for \$12,350.

Elizabeth Locke's Pan Picnic Antique Gold Intaglio Pendant in Blue has a 19K yellow gold bezel with hammered finish. The Venetian glass pendant displays an antique picnic scene intaglio and mother-of-pearl backing (35 X 41mm), and the intaglio is again made from modern glass using 17th-century glass molds. The

pendant has four moonstone cabochons (5 X 7mm) and a two-inch drop. It retails for \$4,550 (chain sold separately).

The Gold Pastel Intaglio Link Bracelet by Elizabeth Locke offers multicolor pastel Venetian glass intaglio links surrounded by 19K hammered, yellow gold and sells for \$8,100.

The coordinating Elizabeth Locke Cherub and Sea Horse Intaglio Earrings in Pink feature a 19K yellow gold bezel with faceted pink tourmalines (.65 tcw), a pink Venetian glass center with cherub and sea horse intaglio and mother-of-pearl backing. These earrings have an omega clip with a fold-down post back for clip or pierced option and are available for \$4,350.

Whatever color carpet you find yourself walking, accessorizing with fine jewels from Bavna, Yeprem or Elizabeth Locke will complete your Academy Award-winning look.
