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
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


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
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Publisher's Notes



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DON Release on the Stage and on the Golf Course

The famed guitarist has a full and happy life post Eagles



ans imagine a dream world of private jets, limousines, nonstop parties and sleepless nights, and that is the case for some famous musicians. For others, however, life is about family, giving back, dodging the limelight and doing what you love. That's where legendary songwriter and guitarist Don Felder enters the conversation.

Gone are the shoulder length hair and brooding eyes. Today, Felder sports short blonde hair, an infectious smile and an enthusiasm for the topic at hand, golf. But we have our priorities. For the legions of Felder fans interested in his music first and golfgame second, we asked, "What are you doing these days?"

A lot, it turns out. "I'm perpetually on the road, to tell you the truth," Felder says. "I'm currently in New York City doing a show for the National ALS Foundation, then I'm in and out of LA for a few weeks. We are planning a tour of Europe and South America sometime in December, and then I visit my clothes occasionally." He has a sense of humor.

Born in 1957 in Gainesville, Floridas, Felder became interested in music after seeing Elvis Presley on the *Ed Sullivan Show*. Set on playing the guitar, at 10 years old he exchanged a handful of cherry bombs from the 5 & 10-cent store for his friend's guitar. Felder still owns that guitar, along with 299 others. He has become famous not only for his talent in playing the guitar but also for the guitars he plays when performing, including his Gibson Les Paul and Gibson EDS-1275.


Felder's career has been something of a wild ride of highs and lows, but the most controversial time was during his run as lead guitarist and songwriter with the Eagles from 1974 to 2001. Starting as a country rock band, the Eagles moved into the rock genre enjoying multiple hits, including "Hotel California," one of the band's best known and most successful songs, for which Felder wrote the music.

A string of creative differences eventually broke up the band and lawsuits ensued. The cases were settled out of court, but today lawyers are the only form of contact between Felder and former bandmates Glen Frey and Don Henley.

There is, however, life after the Eagles. Felder's career is flourishing and he currently performs with his fifth career group, aptly named The Don Felder Band.

For the guitarist, talk could not turn to golffast enough. Stepping back to the early 1970s, he says golf came into his life for something to do on the weekends. "In Miami, we were in the recording studio five days a week from 2 p.m. in the afternoon until 6 a.m. the following morning. Our producer said we were pale and didn't look good and needed some sunshine. He suggested we play golf. None of us knew how to play, so we took a lot of cold beer and just drove around and hacked at the ball and had fun."

Once back in California, the group discovered that their producer had taken golf lessons in their absence. That prompted Felder to take lessons and a friendly competition ensued at the Malibu GolfCourse. What was at first just something to do became a passion for Felder, who plays whenever possible.

He's noticeably bothered by his current handicap. "I was a seven about three years ago," he says a bit wistfully, "but then I started working so much. I was on the road doing tours and traveling to Canada and throughout the U.S. and Mexico. It became too difficult to maintain that handicap even though my clubs were on the bus with me."

Currently Felder holds a 12 handicap and remarks, "I hate to be in double digits when I was a single, but there are some days when I play like a three and other days when I look like I'm a 23 and have never played the game before."

Acing his only hole-in-one in Costa Rico, the story that follows is hilarious, but we'll leave it at Don Felder, "the holey one!"

Felder describes his game as "consistently inconsistent." An avid driving-range fan and short gamer, Felder keeps his clubs in the trunk of his car and works on his golf whenever the opportunity arises. That might be for just 30 minutes if he spots a driving range where he can jump out and practice. Once on the course, he says, "I don't practice. I try to play with whatever game I have that day and I try to enjoy it."

When they have a day off, Felder notes there might be 24 of them on the course including crew, friends and people he works with. "The sun, golf and friends—it is always a great day when that happen," he says.

When he's at home in Beverly Hills, the guitarist is a regular at Lakeside Country Club and Sherwood Country Club, but claims





he'll stop and play anywhere if he can squeeze it in. He quips that the 19th hole is the strongest part of his game, and the weakest is trying to crush the ball off of the tee. "There is something very masculine about driving 260-300 yards," he says. "I can hit the ball that far, but the chance of it being in the fairway is less successful."

Felder supports a variety of organizations in the Coachella Valley and he plays in 10 to 15 charity golftournaments annually. "I have been playing golfdown there for 35 years," he says, "staying at the La Quinta Resort before it was this massive hotel and spa. I've played in the Bob Hope, Humana, Patrick Warburton and several others. I love sneaking down to the desert to play golf for three full days in perfect weather."

Not worried about finding people to play with, Felder does have an ultimate foursome in mind. It would include "Someone who not only loves the game of golf but who wouldn't necessarily have to be a golf master," Felder muses. "I would choose someone like Robin Williams because I know it would be five hours of fun and laughter and a great experience that you would never forget."

Even in the course of a short 45-minute conversation with Felder recurring themes emerge: his love of playing the game and of being outdoors in the sunshine, the camaraderie with friends and family, laughing and having a good time. "For me, I'm out to have a wonderful day and not worry about being too competitive," he says.

Today, Felder is in a great place with a loving family and a busy career. He's quick to describe his life with a hearty laugh, "Two words that are hyphenated: non-stop!"

The Bob Hope Classic Gets a New Name, and New Business Model



he Bob Hope Classic golf tournaments of the 1960s and '70s were a real happening. The Coachella Valley ground to a halt as the stars rolled into town en masse—and not just the stars of the PGA Tour. Hollywood's A-Listers wanted their spot in the field. If you were somebody in the entertainment business, you were in the celebrity field at the Hope.

When the 2016 Careerbuilder Challenge tees off Jan. 21-24, however, any Hollywood stars on hand will be there as spectators. For the second straight year, no celebrity element is included in the event. There will be no celebrity pro-am, no celebrity jam sessions and no off-campus late night parties where passwords are needed to get into the compound where actors and rock-and-rollers mingle with PGA Tour pros. The buzz for this event will be all about the new, enthusiastic sponsor and the strong early-season field.

How did we get here? A number of factors have contributed to the current situation. Most obviously, the tournament had lost its fizz. It was somewhat predictable that when Bob Hope stopped playing, and eventually passed away at the age of 100, the tournament might have its compass scrambled without its guiding star. By the time Mr. Hope died in 2003, he was one of the last of his generation to bid adieu as many of his peers who helped make those heyday Hope events were already long gone. Even prior to his death, celebrities with competitive handicaps who had formerly made the scene each year at the Hope, as well as the Crosby Clambake, were dropping out of the game by the dozens. Fewer and fewer A-List celebrities were ready to take their place.

Additionally, the tournament was passed by in the modern game by other tournaments on the schedule in more metropolitan areas and with larger purses. The Hope's position on the schedule also worked against it and still does to a certain extent, but the new "wraparound" seasons on the PGA Tour have put it in a better overall position on the calendar in terms of encouraging the top pros to blend the Coachella Valley into their schedules.

The Humana Corporation deserves a lot of credit for saving the tournament. The last years of Chrysler's sponsorship were painful for the tournament and the country as the auto industry teetered on collapse and ties to golf tournaments were seen as an unaffordable extravagance. Humana and the Clinton Foundation's involvement beginning in 2012 literally pumped new life into the tournament and built an event valuable enough to attract its new sponsor, Careerbuilder.

Survival and PGA Tour Takeover

When Chrysler pulled out as sponsor and attendance was at an alltime low, there were questions about the PGA Tour's ability to keep the event alive without sponsorship. Because the tournament was fast becoming a relic, it was clear that changes had to be made to stimulate attendance and professional participation in an era of top pros playing only when and where they want to and for the biggest purses.

Two widely held beliefs were that more top pros would compete if the tournament were trimmed to the traditional four rounds as opposed to the Hope's unique five-round format. Evidently, the grind of a fifth round was a big deterrent for the new breed of Tour pros. There was an equally strong belief that more top pros would play in the event if they didn't have to play with those plucky-butpesky celebrities who were fun to know otherwise but a major distraction on the golf course (Tiger Woods never played in the tournament).

When Humana took over, the tournament was officially reduced to four rounds and the celebrity/pro-am element took on a more muted role while the focus became the tournament's renewal and stronger field. According to tournament officials, a celebrity element was planned for 2015, but when the pro-am teed off, there wasn't a single "celebrity" in the field.

Goodbye, Norma Jean

With only four rounds and no celebrity element, the tournament is now an entirely different entity from the days when Hope and Arnold Palmer ran things on and off the course. It's a traditional tour stop with a traditional pro-am and a traditional format.

Those who clamor for a modern celebrity element to the tournament must consider the modern "celebrity problem," which is twofold. First, while some movie and television actors play golf well, not enough play at a level to prevent them from being a distraction as well as a pace-of-play problem during a celebrity pro-am. Second, not every golf-playing celebrity today has the cache those Golden Age Hollywood stars enjoyed. The AT&T National Pro-Am on the Monterrey Peninsula is currently dealing with these very issues. Critics have been quick to pan the tournament recently, asking how relevant some "stars" are.

This didn't happen in the Hope era. If you were alive and owned a television, you knew each and every celebrity in the field. Being in the pro-am field was like being invited backstage at a Bob Hope Christmas Special or wandering freely on a Hollywood set. Many captains of industry would spare no expense to be part of the shenanigans, rubbing elbows with Jackie Gleason, Dean Martin and Jack Lemmon. The networking, the private parties…it's all the stuffoflegends.

Time marches on. For better or worse it appears that, at least for the moment, the celebrity pro-am aspect of the desert's PGA Tour stop has gone the way of many long-ago Hollywood stars. The powers that pull the strings for today's Careerbuilder Challenge embrace a new business model, one with a focus squarely on golf and without celebrities.

The Courses of the Careerbuilder Challenge

The TPC Stadium Course at PGA West will take center stage at the 2016 tournament

ull on your parachute pants and white tennis shoes and fire up the Delorean. The 2016 Careerbuilder Challenge is going back to the future. The PGA Tour and Desert Classic Charities, the organizing force behind the event, recently made the much-anticipated announcement regarding the new course rotation for the 2016 version of the tournament. Many fans were surprised, and doubtless an equal number were thrilled, that the architectural breakthrough TPC Stadium Course at PGA West was included.

The iconic Pete Dye design opened to a wide range of reviews in 1986 and was used only once in the tournament rotation, the illfated 1987 event which was plagued with cold and wind. Many professionals panned the course for what they felt were its over-thetop elements, including features that are now standard on many Dye courses: deep, punitive fairway bunkers; tricky putting surfaces; threatening water hazards and, yes, even an island green for a par-3 17th hole.



Not only is TPC Stadium Course back in the rotation, it will serve as host venue and will host the final round. Joining the Stadium Course in the rotation are the Nicklaus Tournament Course, also at PGA West, and another of the tournament's mainstay host facilities, La Quinta Country Club. The 2016 event is scheduled for January 21-24.

Prior to the announcement there was scuttlebutt throughout the valley regarding the possible selection of the Stadium Course to the rotation, but there was also a general feeling the PGA Tour pros might not want to revisit the problems that plagued their predecessors in 1987. The counter argument was that the facility hosted PGA Tour Qualifying School six times, and during the long qualifying process, low rounds were the norm on both the Stadium and Nicklaus courses. Harrison Frazar and David Gossett each shot 59 during qualifying rounds on the Nicklaus Course, and the Stadium's one-time cutting-edge design has been softened by time, clearing processes and modern equipment.

The TPC Stadium Course has played host to the Skins Game (1986-1991), the PGA Club Professional Championship (1990) and the Liberty Mutual Legends of Golf on the Champions Tour







(1995-96). The Nicklaus Tournament Course, which starts from the same clubhouse as the Stadium Course, has not hosted an official PGA Tour event; however, it did serve as one of the venues for PGA Tour Qualifying School finals in 1986, 1988, 1989, 2002, 2006 and 2008.

"This will be the 56th year Desert Classic Charities has hosted a PGA Tour event, and throughout those years it has been played on some of the Coachella Valley's most dynamic courses," says John Foster, president of the organization. "This latest move reflects that perfectly. We take great pride in our history of challenging, interesting and diverse courses and we look forward to this latest chapter in our rich history."


If a rank-and-file golfer has an ingrained memory from the TPC Stadium Course's previous appearance on the pro stage, it's most likely Lee Trevino's ace at the par-3 17th, which resulted in a \$175,000 skin during the 1987 Skins Game. The 17th is named "Alcatraz" because of its island green trimmed with jagged boulders and well-place large rocks, but the design concept is nearly identical to the famous No. 17 at TPC Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra Beach, Florida. In fact, the two courses share many similarities, including a long

finishing hole with water left and heavily roughed, uneven lies right, and a reachable, risk-reward par-5 16th. It's expected that the "Club 17" concept, which was well received at the Palmer Private Course, will be re-employed at the TPC Stadium 17th in 2016.


Despite, or perhaps in part because of, the 1987 episode, the TPC Stadium Course remains a favorite of the American golfer, a "must-play" course when players make their way to the Coachella Valley for the first time. It's currently ranked No. 40 on the Golf Digest list of the 100 Greatest Public Courses. Golfweek ranks it as one of the Top 10 public golf courses in California, and The Desert Sun ranks the 17th hole at No. 2 and the par-4 16th hole at No.12 among its Top 100 Golf Holes in the Desert. The Nicklaus Tournament Course played host to the PGA Grand Slam of Golfin 1992 and 1993, and its par-5 15th hole is ranked 84th in The Desert Sun Top 100 Golf Holes in the Desert.

"Having the iconic and fan-pleasing TPC Stadium Course as our host course lets us offer a number of exciting new hospitality venues and spectator areas," Foster says. "The three closing holes are



just spectacular, especially with the islandgreen 17th shaping up as an incredible place to watch the greatest players in the world take their best shots. Earlier this month, we saw the excitement the 17th island green of the TPC Sawgrass course generated for fans at The Players Championship. We can't wait to showcase our own island green in January."

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Strategy, Intrigue and Character

That's the winning design combination in play at Tradition Golf Club

Tradition Golf Club is a private sanctuary, tucked away in La Quinta, California, nestling up against the Santa Rosa Mountains. It is a club known for its warm welcome and understated elegance, and one can feel the history dating back to the 1920s and 1930s.

"If these walls could talk" comes to mind when we think of such Hollywood stars as Greta Garbo, Ginger Rogers, Marlene Dietrich and Clark Gable, all of whom spent time at the ranch, Hacienda del Gato, back in the 1930s when they sought a retreat from the spotlight.

From a golf architect's perspective, I have selected two holes at Tradition for discussion: No. 17 and No. 18. It's a tough

choice as there are so many very good holes. These two, though, are totally different from one another and yet seamlessly combine to give a great course an extremely memorable finish.

Once you've played the 16th hole with its majestic outcrop of rock forming the backdrop of the elevated green, you wend your way up the mountain to the 17th tee, all the while courted by the whitewater rapids cascading vigorously down the mountainside to the lake below.

The farther back you play this short par 4, the higher the tees become. The forward tee sits about 120 feet above the fairway. If you go all the way to the back, there is a tiny tee cunningly cut into the mountain 200 feet above the fairway. The view from this mountainous position is a panoramic vista of La Quinta. One is so high above the water on the left and the verdant green fairway ahead that it gives a feeling similar to that of being on a large jet making its final runway approach. There are walls of rustic colored mountains to the right and water to the left.

18th Hole 505 Yards


Because there is so much hang time from this hugely elevated tee, it should be noted that side spin on your tee shot is definitely not your friend!


From the members' tee the hole measures 330 yards. The low-handicap player will seldom play a driver on this hole for two reasons. First, a long iron or utility club gives the golfer 50 percent more fairway on which to land, avoiding the long, yawning sand shelf that lies along the left between the fairway and the large lake. Second, from that position it leaves a shot to the green of about 100-115 yards, which is a good length for a low handicapper to select one of his wedges. The club golfer will select the driver and likely finish in the same spot. For the approach, there's water on the left and a bunker on the right. With wedge in hand, these hazards should not create a problem. However, the bigger test is hitting the right *length* and this is where local knowledge comes into play.

With a front pin, the green is sloping toward you. Experience teaches you that if you're playing a gap wedge or a sand iron, you need to throw the ball past the pin. Why? Because as you look at the slope and think about the irrigation, you understand that the irrigation water tends to drain toward the front of the green, making that area softer. So you know you have to contend with the element of a soft green inclined toward you. The strategy and the danger is in choosing a club that is just 'barely enough,' and then hitting it hard, thus creating extra spin. Sometimes the ball will back up six or seven yards!

The 505-yard, par-5 18th hole at Tradition is another spectacular hole. It offers twin fairways, divided by a host of bunkers containing white, crushed marble sand. The drive is from an elevated tee dramatically perched on the mountain 50 feet above the fairway. The conventional tee shot is down the left. Some longer hitters may try hitting to the right fairway, which does shorten the hole a little. But to reach the green, one then has to traverse a large lake with a long club. This is the challenge for the longer hitter. The average golfer, who typically opts to go down the left fairway, will probably end up hitting a drive and utility club to the left of the lake and a wedge or short iron onto the green.

Certainly, No.18 is one of the very best finishing holes in the desert. For the longer hitter, who can reach in two, it offers a classic risk-and-reward opportunity. The





With the pin on the back of the green, however, the equation is totally different. The pin sits on a level piece of green, but eight to 10 feet behind it the green dips toward the back. If you pitch your wedge or short iron too far by only a few feet, the ball releases and you're off the back of the green.

This is not only one of the most beautiful and spectacular holes in the Coachella Valley, but one of the most intricate in terms of design. For a hole of only 330 yards, it is a masterpiece of intrigue, deception and strategy. water beckons! I once played in a match where one player in our group holed his third shot from 120 yards for an eagle; the next player followed him into the hole from 100 yards for another eagle! Fortunately, he was my partner.

So, you are now wondering whether I designed this golf course. The answer is no. One of the very grand men of golf, Arnold Palmer, designed Tradition. "The setting for Tradition Golf Club is so special," he says. "There are dramatic elevation changes and I like how many of the holes flow along the base of the mountains. It's fun and challenging from the members' tees at 6,515 yards, and it's the kind of course you never tire of playing."

Mr. Palmer is proud to call Tradition his home for several weeks of the year.

Stay & Play at By Christine Loomis Pechanga Resort & Casino

The resort is a short drive from the Coachella Valley and has much to offer -

ocated 80 miles southwest of Palm Springs and just under 60 miles north of San Diego, the Temecula Valley is recognized as the jewel of Riverside County, California. With an inviting Mediterranean climate, it is well known for its citrus orchards and shines as southern California's premier wine region. In fact, this valley of extraordinary diversity produces 50 different varietals of wine, both white and red. The valley is known for its golf, too, and one of the top layouts in the state lies at Pechanga Resort & Casino, a destination resort in every sense of the word.

Golf Week rated Journey at Pechanga among the Best Courses You Can Play in California in 2015, and also in 2015, one of the Best Casino Courses.

If you're looking for some tips to help you on this challenging course, the prostaff has conveniently provided a few tricks that will come in handy on the greens:

Pay attention to where you are on the green so you can appropriately adjust your putting speed. If you're putting toward the mountain, the ball is likely to go slower. A putt toward the valley will travel faster.



Pechanga, meaning, "place where the water drips," is built on a portion of the ancestral lands of the Pechanga People, who have called this valley home for more than 10,000 years. Among the most iconic features of the land is The Great Oak, one of the largest natural-growing, indigenous coastal live oaks in the nation and estimated to be between 850 and 1,500 years old. The land, the culture and the deep connections between this place and its people are all encompassed in the course, Journey at Pechanga, designed by Arthur Hills and opened in 2008.

The golf course winds along a boulder-strewn mountain offering dramatic panoramic vistas, rock outcroppings, stately old oak trees and 7,219 yards of spectacular play. The design was conceived with respect for the natural habitat and cultural sensitivities—many of the oak trees on the property were deemed sacred and untouchable—and completed with an eye toward providing a course that combines a perfect union of nature, form and function. Likewise, check the slope. A break toward the valley will most likely increase the ball's movement while a break heading toward the mountain probably will not break as much as it looks like it will.

And check out the grain of the putting surface, too. If the grass is shiny, the grain is running with you and your ball will move faster. If the grass is dark in color, the grain is running toward you and the putt should be hit a bit harder than normal.

While Journey at Pechanga is definitely challenging, it's also meant to be fun. "Throughout the design, we have remained dedicated to leaving plenty of room for relaxation and fun along the way," Hills says of the course, and players find that to be exactly the case.

To complement the course, the facility includes a wellstocked golf shop featuring the latest in equipment technology and top accessories, as well as Journey's End, located in the clubhouse and providing excellent dining with spectacular views. The restaurant has both indoor and outdoor seating and

an inviting bar, making it the perfect end to a day out on the course.

If you want to stay over—and why wouldn't you?—the AAA Four Diamond resort offers spacious guest rooms and suites with all the amenities discerning travelers need and want, and well-priced packages aimed at golfers, wine lovers, spa lovers and craft brew aficionados, among others. 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during your stay, the resort's business center is open 24/7, as is the fitness center. Hotel guests also receive complimentary valet parking.

Guests have no lack of entertaining things to do. After playing golf during the day, you can see top headliners perform at Pechanga Theater, which has become one Southern California's of premier entertainment venues. Or you can settle into a table at Eagle's Nest nightclub, appropriately named for its airy perch on the top floor of the hotel. Well-known and up-and-coming comedians provide entertainment at the Comedy Club at Pechanga. And, of course, there's gaming, including slots, poker, bingo and a highlimit area. at the casino. The dining options are many. The resort has 10 restaurants and a 24-hour food court, offering a variety of international cuisines and everything from quick bites to fine dining. If a guest wants it, the resort probably has it.

Finally, shoppers can have their fun, too. The ever-expanding Promenade Mall with its flagship stores is a good bet, and a field trip to the Outlets at Lake Elsinore could pay off for the serious bargain hunter.

Pechanga Resort & Casino is close enough to the Coachella Valley for a quick trip and offers enough to do for a getaway of several days. The one thing you don't want to miss is playing the resort's stellar golf course.

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An Insider's Look at the 2015 BNP Paribas Open

To celebrate the 40th anniversary of the BNP Paribas Open in 2015, tournament director Steve Simon discusses the most memorable moments of this year's finals matches.





From Novak Djokovic's second consecutive finals victory to former world No. 1 Martina Hingis's return to the winner's circle, this year's BNP Paribas Open was one of the most exciting tennis tournaments in recent memory.

In reflection of the event's four memorable finals matches, and in celebration of its 40th anniversary, tournament director Steve Simon recently spoke to *Desert Golf& Tennis* and shared his thoughts on the singles champions, Djokovic and Simona Halep, and doubles champions, Vasek Pospisil and Jack Sock and Hingis and Sania Mirza.

Novak Djokovic defeats Roger Federer, 6-3, 6-7(5), and 6-2

On March 22, world No. 1 Djokovic competed against his rival, Roger Federer, a four-time BNP Paribas Open champion, in the finals for the second straight year.

As expected, the match was highly dramatic. Federer won the second set, thereby ending Djokovic's outstanding streak; until then, he had not lost a single set during the entire tournament. Djokovic ultimately prevailed, capturing the third set to win his fourth BNP Paribas Open and 50th ATP title, becoming only the 12th player in the Open era to capture that many victories. Even more astounding? He was only 27 years old at the time.



"To have won 50 tour-level titles by the age of 27 speaks for itself—an amazing accomplishment," Simon says. "Novak's victory showcases the fact that he is clearly the player that all other players are going to measure their games against."

Simon was equally impressed with Federer who, at the age of 33, continues to compete for championships on a regular basis.

"Not only will Roger be remembered as one of the best to ever play the game, but he also continues to show pure enjoyment as he plays and competes at the highest level," Simon states. "It was so exciting to watch Roger, who is currently being discussed as the greatest ever, compete against Novak, today's world No. 1, for yet another men's finals championship."

Simona Halep defeats Jelena Jankovi , 2-6, 7-5, 6-4

In spite of her left-toe injury, Romanian Simona Halep captured her first BNP Paribas Open (and 17th WTA singles victory) in a thrilling match against 2010 BNP Paribas Open champion Jelena Jankovi.

Occurring on the same day as the men's finals championship, the match appeared to be a runaway victory for Jankovi at first. But Halep persevered and won the last two sets.

"I believe Simona and Jelena were each feeling the results of a long, tough road to the finals match," Simon says. "I was especially impressed with the fight and resolve Simona showed as she fought her way back to win." Just like Halep, Jankovi also battled an injury, a torn leg muscle. A former world No. 1, she has won 13 WTA titles and has appeared in the finals of a major championship—the 2008 U.S. Open.

"As a player who has reached the ultimate height of the world No. 1 ranking, Jelena has to be respected every time she's on the court," Simon says. "From my perspective, her two strengths, her movement and ability to turn defense to offense, so to speak, stood out once again."

He adds, "At the same time, Simona's victory reflected the type of competitor she is, while also displaying her greatest strength her ability to adjust her play, as needed, during a match."



Vasek Pospisil and Jack Sock defeat Simone Bolelli and Fabio Fognini, 6-4, 6-7(3), 10-7

Pospisil and Sock's match, contested one day before the men and women's singles finals, began rather convincingly, with a 6-4 victory over the Italian duo (and recent Australian Open champions).

But Bolelli and Fognini remained poised, capturing an exhilarating second match, 6-7. It wasn't meant to be though, as the Canadian/American duo, who, like the Italians, are also Grand Slam champions, ultimately prevailed.

"I was especially intrigued by the power, speed and athleticism that both duos had. The match's tremendous energy kept the fans fully engaged," Simon says. "Vasek and Jack are two very talented players that reflect the depth of the game and provide fans a preview of the sport's future. Barring injury, there is no reason to believe we will not be seeing this duo for many years to come."

Martina Hingis and Sania Mirza defeat Ekaterina Makarova and Elena Vesnina, 6-3, 6-4

In the midst of her reign as the top female tennis player in the world, Martina Hingis captured the 1998 BNP Paribas Open singles title and 1999 BNP Paribas Open doubles title. But then she suffered ankle ligament injuries, which required several surgeries and a few years away from the sport to recuperate.

Remarkably, she returned to the winner's circle on March 21 alongside her partner, Indian Sania Mirza, earning her first BNP Paribas Open victory in 16 years. Although the duo had not competed together in a professional tournament beforehand, they defeated the championship's No. 2 seeds, Russians Ekaterina Makarova and Elena Vesnina, in two sets.

"As a team, Martina and Sania really seemed to be on the same page. In particular, Sania remained consistent throughout the tournament, which provided Martina an opportunity to utilize her shot-making skills," Simon says. "As long as they remain healthy, I expect them to enjoy a great deal of success together this year."

Every March, when the BNP Paribas wraps in Indian Wells, California, tennis enthusiasts get ready to play or watch in the next town, like concert roadies following their favorite band. This year, however, both players and fans scored encores right here in the desert, making it clear that local tennis events continue to grow—in the number of tournaments and exhibitions and attendees.

Following the BNP, the 2015 National ASICS Easter Bowl Tournament, dubbed the "Super Bowl of junior tennis," took over occupancy at the Indian Wells Tennis Garden for a week leading up to the Easter Holiday.

Cooper, who died from cancer in 2013, was a champion in garnering support for junior tennis. He served as the longtime director of tennis at La Quinta Resort and was known as a teacher to the stars, with a clientele that included Johnny Carson, Jackie Kennedy and Merv Griffin. He later opened Jackie Cooper Tennis at the Palm Desert Resort Country Club, where he kept his courts free of charge for juniors. He was also involved in his friend Charlie Pasarell's efforts to establish the forerunner to today's BNP Paribas Open.

Representing their father, sisters Laura Cooper Regusci (with husband Jim) and Carrie Cooper Skarsgaard (with fiancé Pat Nevens), were on hand to meet many of the juniors, as well as the prostheir dad had

Part three of the trifecta, the Rosie Casals & Jackie Cooper Tennis Invitational, hit the stage for its debut, with proceeds benefiting the Jackie Cooper and Tory Fretz Tennis Fund. The Fund was established in 2014 to provide financial aid through grants for local juniors and organizations or individuals who provide opportunities that enhance and promote junior tennis in the Coachella Valley. The end-of-April event took place at Indian Ridge Country Club, home to International Tennis Hall of Famer Rosie Casals. A tennis legend, cultural pioneer and passionate activist, Casals believes junior tennis should be as accessible as youth soccer and other popular sports.

Casals' company, Sportswoman, Inc., produced the tournament, which had 10 teams, each comprised of one local pro, one junior and two amateurs. It was structured under the World Team Tennis (WTT) format, which provides medals for the top four teams. Players rotated in and out of play as well as among courts while event choreographer, producer, director and host Casals kept balls in play and made sure that 150 spectators and supporters were kept hydrated and happy.

One of the amateurs who participated was Gary Tolman, president and CEO of esurance, this year's title sponsor for the tournament, who attended with his wife and event patron, Barbara. Also supporting the event was Dr. Raj Sinha of Star Ortho, the presenting sponsor. Other sponsors included PGA Superstore, Marker Broadcasting, Desert Golf and Tennis, Mama Gina's and The Old Spaghetti Factory.

The highlight of the day was a WTT doubles shootout between the pros and juniors, divided between Team Fretz and Team Cooper. After five intense matches,



the winner was determined by a tiebreak declaring Team Fretz the victor.

In addition to standout junior players from local high schools, there was also 14year old Taylor Johnson, ranked No. 4 in the nation in her age group, who made the trip over from Redondo Beach just as she does several times a month for training time with Casals.

Tennis fans were able to mix and mingle with tennis royalty during the event, including Tory Fretz, Lornie Kuhle and Jackie Cooper's daughters.

Fretz, half the namesake of the fund to benefit the juniors, was ranked in the U.S. top ten from 1963 to 1966, and was No. 2 in the doubles rankings in 1965 and 1966. She is known for her outreach along with Cooper in creating tennis opportunities for juniors.

Kuhle, Cooper's business partner and best friend, is the Easter Bowl Tournament chair and probably best known as confidante and coach to Bobby Riggs, who lost The Battle of the Sexes against Billie Jean King in 1973. coached. The Reguscis donated bottles of merlot from their Regusci winery in Napa Valley, California, which was the perfect accompaniment to the ample buffet barbecue lunch that guests and spectators enjoyed while watching the doubles shootout and awards ceremony on center court.

This year's inaugural tournament raised \$35,000. "This event is the beginning of something special that will carry Jackie's name and his legacy for years to come," Casals says. "I am looking forward to next year's event and to organizing some grassroots clinics later this year to work with many of our youth organizations."

Casals encouraged players and spectators alike to be as involved as possible, saying, "Supporting these boys and girls is essential to help them realize their dreams and reach their goals."

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Jaylor Britz On the Rise

here's bound to be a lot of pressure on any top performing young athlete, but when you're just 17 years old and the No. 1 ranked junior tennis player in the world, it can all be quite heady.

Taylor Fritz is very proud to be top ranked, but he manages to stay in the present and remain grounded. He says, "I realize that it's just juniors. I don't in any way take my current ranking to mean that I'm automatically going to make it to the top. When I first ranked in the ITF (International Tennis Federation), it felt incredible. But at this point, I take my success as encouragement for the future and I just want to use it to help me transition and move forward."

Fritz is already starting to attract notice from fans, pros and media. He won two ITF Junior Circuit singles titles last fall by defeating top-ranked Russian junior, Andrey Rublev, to win the Yucatan Cup, a Grade 1 ITF junior tournament, in Merida, Mexico. He began 2015 by achieving his first professional semifinal at the \$15,000 USTA Pro Circuit Futures in Los Angeles in early January, and advanced to the boys' quarterfinals at the Australian Open in Melbourne at the end of January. He also captured the 48th annual ASICS Easter Bowl ITF Boys' 18s singles title in April at Indian Wells Tennis Garden in California.

When Fritz spoke with *Desert Golf & Tennis*, he had just returned from Paris where he reached the boys' singles final at the 2015 French Open at Stade Roland Garros. His participation in that match marks the first time in the 114-year history of the tournament that two Americans have played in the boys' final. His opponent and ultimate victor of the junior title match was Tommy Paul of New Jersey.

The French Open tournament is played on outdoor clay courts, and clay just happens to be Fritz' least favorite surface. He strongly prefers grass and hard court. "This year's French Open was a great experience," he says. "Idid get to participate last year, but this year I was obviously involved for the entire tournament. My mom enjoyed going with me, too."

His mom is Kathy May, an American former professional tennis player who reached three Grand Slam quarterfinals, once at the U.S. Open in 1978 and twice at the French Open in 1977 and 1978. She won one WTA singles title during her career and achieved a career-high ranking of No. 10 in 1977.

Fritz' dad, Guy Fritz, was the University of San Diego's first tennis All-American in 1972 and spent five years on the pro tour. He has played the role of coach since his son was two years old. The family lives in Rancho Santa Fe, just outside of San Diego, where



Fritz attended Torrey Pines High School until partway through his sophomore year. A junior now, he has opted for an online high school program.

"Switching to online education is really the only way I could possibly work everything in with my training schedule," Fritz notes. "This way I can put tennis first, and all of the other things fit in around that, including studying at unusual hours."

It's clear that the schedule is demanding, but there are some vestiges of normal teen life, including having a girlfriend and "hanging out with friends." He says he loves living in Rancho Santa Fe, and he also enjoys soccer, football and lacrosse, at which he excels. As he modestly puts it, "I'm pretty good at lacrosse."

When he graduates high school next year, a semester early, his plans may or may not include college, where he already knows he will have his choice of scholarship opportunities. "My plan is really on going pro," Fritz says, "but I'm not ruling out college right now, even if it's for just one semester."

Next on the schedule is Wimbledon, which runs June 29 through July 12 with qualifying matches starting June 22 in London. Fritz will be heading across the pond a few days ahead of the main event to play in warm-up tournaments, which, to his delight, will be on grass. He was a Wimbledon junior semifinalist in 2014. "I'm excited to play there this year," he says. "I did well last year, and I think my chances this year are really good. I think I have the best chance so far to do well at this tournament."

In July, Fritz will be the youngest team member to play both singles and doubles for the San Diego Aviators, part of the Mylan World Team Tennis schedule and a powerhouse in its Western Conference. Home matches will take place at the Omni La Costa Resort & Spa and will be coached by tennis champ and commentator John Lloyd.

For now, Fritz says, "Tennis is my priority. It definitely takes the most time and focus in my life every day. I'm on the court for an average of two to three hours a day, and I also spend an hour or two training in the gym every day so I don't have lots of free time. That part can be tough, but I'm driven to do it, for myself and my future."

Taylor Fritz knows what he wants and is serious about staying true to his goals. "My aim is to be the best possible player and be top in the world in my career. It's really just about being the best you can be."

Looking back on a storied career

hese days you'll find 91-year-old Jack Whitaker relaxing by the pool, working out at the gym, meeting with friends or writing his as yet untitled book about the people he has worked with. This accomplished, award-winning sportscaster, commentator, broadcaster and journalist still has more to say.

Even today there is something about Whitaker that makes his audience lean forward and wait with anticipation to hear him talk about his storied life, a life that seemed only a dream for his era. Born and raised in Philadelphia, Whitaker grew up in the East Germantown neighborhood. He describes his childhood as "kind of tough in a way, but I look back on it as great times. I played a lot of sandlot baseball and some stickball." When asked if he aspired as a child to be a broadcaster, Whitaker is quick to reply, "I loved radio, so yes, I think I did aspire as a child to be on the radio."

Whitaker notes that after WW11, the FCC opened up a lot of new frequencies, which meant that little towns that never had radio stations got them. "Little 250 watters, 1,000 watters," he says. "I got a job in a little 250-watt station, WPAM in Pottsville, Pennsylvania. We had to do everything—open the station in the morning, clean out the news machines, you were a newscaster, disc jockey and interviewer, everything. It was pretty good training, I was there for about three years and then I saw television was coming."

Although he never lost his love for radio, a love he still has, Whitaker realized that television was going to be the next big thing in entertainment. "I got a job at a television station as a news writer," he says. "A couple of months later, the sportscaster quit and they asked me if I knew anything about sports. I said, 'of course.""

It was a moment that changed Whitaker's life forever.

He spent the rest of his career on television, 21 years of it on CBS. He covered the Summer and Winter Olympics, baseball, football, soccer, track and field, basically any sport he was asked to cover. An avid golfer and horseracing enthusiast, he was best known for his passionate coverage of those two sports. He announced several Triple Crown races and golfs four majors: the Masters, U.S. Open, The (British) Open Championship and the PGA Championship. Yet with his extensive resume, little is said about his announcing the very first Super Bowl and the first televised championship boxing match.


With so many highlights, was there anything Whitaker didn't announced that he wishes he had? "I was pretty lucky to do a lot of things," he says. "I guess it would be the British Open that Nicklaus won at St. Andrews when he beat Doug Sanders."

Whitaker's introduction to the game of golf was twofold. "My wife played and I picked up her clubs. That was around 1947-48, and of course when you hit that first good shot, you're hooked for life." However, Whitaker continues, "I grew up at a public course, and as I got a little luckier, I bought my own clubs and joined a private country club." Actually, there were several clubs, including Shinnecock Hills Golf Club in Southampton, New York.

Golf is quite a struggle for Whitaker now due to a bad back. But during his playing peak, his lowest handicap was an 11.

Currently Whitaker divides his time between Indian Wells, California and Pennsylvania. "I came out here to do a show and I saw what great weather it was and decided I would like to spend my winters here," he says. "I'm a member at Citrus."

Whitaker is astounded at the money-machine sports have become. "We knew it would be big, but never thought it would become this big," As for career regrets, there are very few. "Well, I



could have been better a few times and done a little more homework a few times, but that's about it."

Career highs for Whitaker include announcing Secretariat's win at the Belmont, Mary Lou Retton's victory at the Olympics and working the first Super Bowl. And there are the personal highs as well, including, "every time a child is born." Whitaker's family includes five children, eleven grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. "Building a house and moving into it, that's quite a high," he adds with amusement.

With several friends coming over for dinner, Whitaker checks the time and remarks, "Lucky, I'm the luckiest man alive." That's not a bad way for a man to describe a life that spans nearly a century.

By Rob Stanger Creating Lag in Your Swing

Lag creates stored energy and power—exactly what's needed for an efficient swing

If you're feeling that your swing is losing its energy through impact, it might be a result of lack of lag. In the attempt to hit the ball farther, many golfers cast the golf club at the ball by releasing their wrist angle. Unfortunately, this casting motion releases the critical stored-up energy prematurely. One key to an efficient golf swing is creating lag in the backswing and then maintaining that lag in the forward swing through impact.

Lag in the Takeaway

Through many years of teaching I have observed that the majority of higher-handicap golfers move the club in the takeaway too much through their wrist, which results in not creating lag and also promotes "casting" the club in the forward swing. In fact, the hands and the clubface should be the last to move away from the golf ball.



The correct motion is very similar to that of snapping a whip. The lagging of the club head serves the purpose of storing up energy. One way to feel this lag in the takeaway is through a swing-training device called the orange whip, which you can see in these photos. In this first photo, notice how my body has made a strong rotation into the takeaway as the hands and the golf club lag behind. This helps me create a wide arc in the backswing, which will be stored as power.



When the shaft is approximately waist high, I like to feel the weight of the club take over the role of cocking my wrist. As the weight of the club cocks my wrist, my body begins to pivot and transition for the forward swing. There is a feeling of separation between the upper body winding up and the lower body springing into the forward swing. This is where the second lag in the golf swing kicks in.

Lag in the Forward Swing

In the forward swing, allowing the weight of the club to cock your wrist transitions into *maintaining* that cocked wrist through impact. You can see in the photo above how my right wrist is cocked as I am turning my body back through impact toward the target.

The benefits of doing this correctly are seen and felt through impact with the golf ball. The shaft is leaning forward toward the target as I am making contact with the ball. Technically, I am slightly" de-lofting" the clubface, which makes for stronger impact.



The role the body plays in the golf swing and in helping golfers maintain a cocked wrist through impact is significant. It is important for me to feel a strong body rotation toward the target as I am making contact with the ball. A common swing flaw of higher handicappers is slowing down body rotation coming into impact and releasing the hands at the ball, a casting motion.



Lightly fried to pop in the mouth with an exquisitely tender crunch, the crab is enjoyable with any of the \$4, \$6 and \$8 featured cocktails. Try a Dirty Shirley with vodka, Sprite and grenadine, or the bartender's choices of a Spencer's Matchpoint Old Fashioned with *bacon bitters or the more traditional Spencer's Matchpoint Collins. spencersrestaurant.com*

Johannes Restaurant (196 S. Indian Canyon Drive, Palm Springs, 760.778.0017) features a deservedly famous wiener schnitzel. Chef Johannes Bacher's traditional Austrian dish was included in this year's bestselling book 1,000 Foods to Eat Before You Die: A Food Lover's Life List by Mimi Sheraton. The chef prefers his thin, using 3.5 ounces of breaded veal. The pan-fried treat goes best with an endive and watercress salad accentuated by grape, pecan praline, Asian pear, blue cheese and organic agave Dijon dressing. A Stiegl beer or flute of Champagne completes this combination. *johannesrestaurants.com*

Giuseppe's Pizza & Pasta in the Smoke Tree Village Shopping Center (1775 E. Palm Canyon Drive, Palm Springs, 760.537.1890) features standard pies and bowls of spaghetti. But for warmer evenings, the go-to dish is the "pizza salad," a delicious nutty blend of spinach, fresh strawberries and pineapple, candied pine nuts, pancetta and goat cheese tossed with homemade balsamic vinaigrette assembled on top of a gluten free flatbread crust. A slice accompanied by a subtle syrah rose makes for an excellent summer snack. giuseppesps.com


Smoke Tree BBQ (1775 E. Palm Canyon Drive at the Smoke Tree Commons, Palm Springs, 760.778.6521) offers home-style cooking with a Southern flare including house-smoked barbecue meats. Executive chef and pit master Steven Helland recognizes the importance of offering

lighter fare in the summer months, so he created a smoked, pulled-pork salad for the menu. It is made of chopped romaine and iceberg lettuce, red cabbage with slowroasted red peppers, shaved red onion, tomatoes, scallions and slow-smoked pulled pork all tossed with a tangy, honey Dijon vinaigrette and topped with crunchy onions. Mitch's on El Paseo Prime Seafood (73951 El Paseo, Palm Desert, 760.779.9200) is open only through July so make sure to





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visit before the end of the month for the renowned happy hour Monday through Saturday from 4-7 p.m. and all night on Sundays. California Rolls, house wine and Crater Lake vodkas are only \$5 each. Other items include Mitch's famous tacos with sirloin steak, grilled chicken, cabbage, fresh salsa, lime, cilantro and cream sauce or the mini ahi poke tacos—both of which pair well with the array of sakes on hand. It is also easy to spend a few hours at the prized sushi bar. mitchsonelpaseo.com

Last but not least, Tommy Bahamas, on the top floor of the Gardens on El Paseo, (73595 El Paseo b2200, Palm Desert, 760.836.0188) is known for its casually sophisticated bar that



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COME LEARN TO PLAY THE GAME OF A LIFETIME Tesla Model S P85D in a Class of Its Own

Tesla's Mars-loving founder presents one very cool car to Earthlings





esla made a big splash when it came on the scene sporting an electric-only engine and a spacecrazed founder. Today, Tesla is moving into more conventional space with its Model S sedan, which brings the best electric-car technology to the luxury market.

Tesla founder Elon Musk isn't light on new ideas. Building on Tesla's battery technology, he's launched a movement to install batteries for homes that would propel the solar-energy industry forward. He's working to colonize Mars. If he gets his way, Musk will have a quiet little home there in a decade.

Will they be driving the Tesla Model S on Mars? They could do a lot worse. The Model S brings luxury and tech into a divine collaboration. The truth about Tesla's battery technology is that the rest of the industry can't touch it in terms of effectiveness. The next best battery by density belongs to the Nissan Leaf, which has a range of just 75 miles compared to Tesla's Model S P85D with 270 miles. Not even a contest.

The battery is beautiful in others ways, too. The designers at Tesla didn't just throw the bulky unit in the trunk area and call it a day. Rather, they incorporated the battery weight and mounting into the integrity of the vehicle. The battery unit sits low near the middle of the car, adding the feel of a mid-engine sports car to the handling. This gives Tesla the option to keep the suspension light without the Model S bouncing down the highway like an overloaded pickup.

As you'd expect, the technology inside the Model S is as sophisticated as it comes.

But much effort has gone into making users feel at home with a massive touch screen that actually works in a vehicle situation. The intuitive settings, with all the features you'd expect from a top-of-the-line vehicle, give drivers the sense that Mars may be within reach. Sitting in the captain's chair of the Model S is an inspiring experience.

Because the Model S has no gas engine, it takes time to calibrate your internal speed meter. If you're accustomed to gauging your likelihood of getting a ticket based on the decibels coming from under the hood, you may have to budget for a few infractions in the early months of ownership. For a relatively large car, the Model S P85D gets going in a hurry. The torque on electric motors is fabulous for that feeling of going from zero to launch. The P85D brags about a 0-60 mph time of just 3.1 seconds.

The use of dual motors (front and rear) gives 691 horsepower to the P85D. That's astronomical for a luxury sedan. The top speed is limited to 155 mph. With roadster-like take off and a large-luxury interior, the Tesla Model S is a game changer.

Inside there's no need for the bulky transmission tunnel that marks nearly every other vehicle on the market. And without trunk space reserved for battery power, there is actually room to open up a third, rear-facing row. This isn't where you'd want to put Elon Musk if he came for a visit, but the fact that it's possible to seat seven in a luxury sedan is quirky if nothing else.

Open the sunroof to reveal the all-glass, panoramic roof and you'll feel like you're soaring. The leather is locally sourced from Napa, California, and the zinc door handles add a feel that is unique. The truth is, you've never driven a vehicle like this, and there is no competitor to the Tesla Model S.

As Musk and his team work to overcome a few of the hurdles—charging stations, charge times and effective range drivers will still have an experience that surmounts any obstacle. This car can already have updates served over Wi-Fi, so it will only get better as technology improves. And as the electric car market grows in the United States and the popularity of charging stations increases, the practicality of recharging will only become easier.

The Model S doesn't come without a price. The S P85D retails for around \$108,000. If your inner explorer is ready for a ride that takes you intergalactic, the Model S is the vehicle you need.

Stella McCartney Designs

for the Athlete and the Aesthete

Focused on style, comfort and practical functionality, McCartney's sports line does it all

orn in 1971 and raised in both London and the English countryside, Stella McCartney has known celebrity. The daughter of Beatle Sir Paul McCartney and American wife Linda, she is philosophical about fame. "It certainly opened a lot of doors and certainly closed some minds. So I think there was a balance," she says.

Despite the family's celebrity, the McCartney children led as normal a life as possible, attending local state schools in East Sussex. At 13, McCartney was already planning her future in fashion by tailoring her first wearable garment, a pink bomber jacket. Three years later she became an intern for designer Christian La Croix, working on his first haute couture collection, and she honed her skills working for her father's Savile Row tailor. Upon graduation from design school, McCartney showcased her work on supermodels Kate Moss and Naomi Campbell, who prowled the catwalk to a song composed by her proud father titled, "Stella May Day." The event was front-page news when the complete graduation collection sold to a London boutique.

McCartney has since received countless awards and honors, including being appointed Officer of the Order of the British Empire (OBE) in 2013. After she was assessed as one of the most powerful women in the United Kingdom, Queen Elizabeth said to her, "My, you have been busy," to which McCartney replied, "Not as busy as you, Ma'am."

Among celebrities who favor McCartney's collections is Madonna, who chose McCartney to design her wedding dress for her marriage to Guy Ritchie in 2000.

McCartney's own marriage to publisher Alasdhair Willis in 2003 resulted in filling their home with four children without dropping a stitch or a much-applauded season-by-season ready-to-wear collection. There was also a launch ofher first perfume, Stella, in 2007, and a lavish lingerie line introduced in 2 010. Her last daughter was born in 2010, coinciding with the launch of the Stella McCartney Kids collection for newborns and children up to age 12.

A lifelong vegetarian, McCartney is following in the footsteps of her late 'mum.' A staunch supporter of animal rights, she does not use leather or fur in her designs. Some even have text that elaborates on her "no animal" policy. For example, one of her jackets for Adidas has a smart quip, "suitable for sporty vegetarians," on the sleeve. McCartney does use wool, silk and other animal-derived fabrics in her designs. Her footwear is made of vinyl or plastic and all belts are raffia and fabric. Everything is designed and crafted with attention to detail and an awareness of the active life of the real woman within.


In 2004, McCartney launched a jointventure line with Adidas. The critically acclaimed collection is a sportsperformance line for women, and has since successfully expanded to several athletic disciplines including running, gym, yoga, tennis, swimming, golf, winter sports and triathlon. In 2010, Adidas named Stella McCartney creative director for Team GB's performance wear at the 2012 Olympics—the first time in the history of the Games that a leading fashion designer created the apparel for a country's team across all competitions for both the Olympic and Paralympic games.

McCartney talks about her newest collection in the context of her unwavering vision. "I am so proud of what we have been able to achieve with the Adidas by Stella McCartney collection. When we began working on the first season, nobody had ever created anything like it—a combination of strong design aesthetic with true performance technologies. It has since been the standard principle of this collaboration, and this season is no exception."

The Adidas collection, like McCartney's ready-to-wear line, is am embodiment of the designer's philosophy that life is complicated but dressing for it shouldn't be. Style, comfort and functionality are one in this apparel for the athlete and aesthete.

The invigorating Spring/Summer 2015 tennis collection features lightweight support and cooling performance technology. It ably defied Melbourne's warm climate at the Australian Open where Caroline Wozniacki and Maria Kirilenko wore it as they competed in the first Grand Slam of the year.

The SS15 collection unveiled the new tennis shoe. Designed to meet the demands of the best players in the world, a new four-way-engineered mesh upper and heel stabilizer offer unparalleled support

ith summer here, we once again welcome the popularity of the LBD (little black dress). Thankfully, the options for accessorizing this fashion staple are practically endless. Whether you opt for brightly colored jewel tones, an earthy stone vibe or glamorous metallics, there's a way to take total ownership of your look and define your style.

A great place to start is with Ippolita's Rock Candy Lollipop and Gelato collections. Designer Ippolita Rostagno, a New York City-based jewelry designer since 1999, was born in Florence, Italy, and raised and educated in the hills of Tuscany. She studied sculpture and earned her baccalaureate degree from the Istituto D'Arte in Florence. Ippolita's materials are sourced from all over the world. Her fine jewelry designs are created for everyday wear, not just special occasions.

Ippolita's **Large Lollipop Ring with Diamonds**, forming the trademark "lollipop cut," displays a series of tiny, random facets across the surface of the ring, all hand cut. The circular mound of turquoise is surrounded by petite pavé diamonds (.45 tcw) and set in 18K gold. Measuring 1.12 inches both in length and width, this treat is available for \$3,795.

The designer's coordinating Lollipop Stud Earrings with Diamonds are miniaturized versions of the ring, one-half inch in diameter with a diamond carat weight of .33. The pair sells for \$2,095.

To really indulge, Ippolita's **Rock Candy Lollipop Pendant Necklace with Diamonds** adds a delicious splash of vibrant color and coordinates with the other Lollipop pieces. The round turquoise doublet (which means reinforced) is 3/4 inch in diameter and covered by rutilated quartz with needlelike, embedded golden rutile. Surrounded by a full circle of tiny diamonds (.33 tcw), the pendant is set in 18K gold and rests on a 16-inch gold chain. This neck adornment retails for \$2,295.

The Rock Candy Gelato Medium Rectangular 14-Stone Bangle is also a sweet choice but with a bit more drama and variety. A collection of richly hued gemstones, these pieces include greengold citrine over turquoise doublet, cognac citrine, clear quartz over blackshell doublet, orange citrine, clear quartz over mother-of-pearl doublet, and rutilated quartz over turquoise doublet. The stones stand in bold contrast to the 18K gold that circles the wrist. It's priced at \$7500.

The coordinating **Rock Candy Gelato Rectangular 4-Stone Linear Drop Post Earrings** are striking but not overpowering. Hanging 1.84 inches from the ear and measuring a half-inch wide, these earrings feature a collection of gemstones including cognac citrine, rutilated quartz over turquoise doublet, and clear quartz over mother-of-pearl doublet. Also set in 18K gold, these small statements of enormous style sell for \$2,995.

A tapestry of colored gemstones and natural materials, the **Rock Candy Gelato 11-Stone Rectangle Long Necklace** features orange citrine, clear quartz over black-shell doublet and rutilated quartz over turquoise doublet. With a length of 40 inches, the necklace is set in 18K gold, available for \$10,000.

Another female jewelry artist is Mimi So, known for her passion for 'living' art, fashion, music, travel and architecture. The Mimi So brand is positioned as modern luxury lifestyle jewelry. The clean asymmetrical lines of positive and negative space on her jewelry represent the energy of vin and yang. The materials she selects by hand are meant to represent a 'second skin,' expressing a woman's bold movements with a feminine side. Celebrities including Jennifer Lopez, Diane Lane and Courtney Cox frequently wear her designs, and they were favorite accessories for the characters on HBO's Sex and the City

Mimi So says her Phoenix Collection is about rising, freedom, spirituality and feeling empowered, and was created to instill a belief in oneself.

The **Phoenix All Pavé Diamond Ring** is crafted from 18K rose gold with 18 pinnae or leaflets, each lined down the center with a strand of pavé diamonds (.68tcw), extending from a gently curved center spine. This version is available for \$4,300. A scaled-down design, the Center Pave Diamond Ring, with one strand of pave diamonds lining just the center spine and delicate scoring on each gold leaflet, is available for \$2,800.

Also shaped with sensuous curves and depicting a natural leaf form, the **Phoenix Large Wavy Necklace** drapes the neck with a chain of 18K rose gold culminating in a lush leaf blade of 18 leaflets, each dotted down the center with pavé diamonds (1.39 tcw). This piece is \$8,900.

The coordinating **Phoenix Large Wavy All Pavé Earrings** feature the same leaf motif with pavé diamonds (1.14 tcw) delicately surrounded by 18K rose gold. An additional trail of petite diamonds dots the piercing wire. These sell for \$6,900.

Finally, the **Phoenix All Pave Diamond Wavy Hinged Cuff** adds elegance to the wrist and makes any little black dress look finished and tasteful. One long, continuous strand of 18K rose-gold leaflets wrapping the wrist is accented by sparkling pavé diamonds (2.03 tcw) and is available for \$11,900.
