Oscar De La Hoya

A champion in and out of the boxing ring

When *Desert Golf & Tennis* first featured Oscar De La Hoya in 2002 at 29 years old, he was already a legend in the boxing ring, a gold-medal winner, an avid golfer with an 11 handicap, a huge supporter of youth programs and the new founder of Golden Boy Promotions.

Sixteen years later and now retired from boxing, De La Hoya's strength has grown outside of the ring as he continues to be quick on his feet while trading jabs with other professional titans in his role as CEO and chairman of highly successful Golden Boy Promotions, lauded as one of the most active promoters of boxing in the world.

Born and raised in the rough neighborhoods of East Los Angeles, De La Hoya took self-defense to a new level and made it into a multi-million dollar business with his current net worth around \$200 million. Yet his persona as a soft spoken, courteous and fun-loving person has not changed, and neither has one of his true joys in life, helping others.

In 1995, the Oscar de la Hoya Foundation was created to bring a better quality of life to the people of East Los Angeles. Today, the foundation serves thousands of people annually via the Oscar de la Hoya Ánimo Charter High School, the Cecilia Gonzalez de la Hoya Cancer Center (named after the boxer's mother) and the Oscar De La Hoya Children's Medical Center.

The question we're dying to ask this successful entrepreneur, philanthropist, husband and father of five is, "Do you still play golf?" Without hesitation De La Hoya replies, "Absolutely. Golf is a game

you can always improve on, whether it's having the worst round of your career and then having the best shot on hole number eighteen, golf always brings you back for more! In fact, all of these years have passed since our last interview and I love the game more than ever. It's my escape from the craziness of my world. I take my clubs everywhere I go."

And go he does. If you think you saw De La Hoya out and about in the Coachella Valley you probably did. In partnership with Fantasy Springs Resort Casino, Golden Boy Promotions now brings world-class boxing to the valley on a monthly basis.

"I sold my home in Bermuda Dunes some years ago," De La Hoya says, "but I'm out here so much I'm thinking it's time to build one. I belong to the Plantation Golf Club in Indio, so it all seems to make sense."

As a natural left-handed golfer, De La Hoya is currently a six handicap but has been as low as a two. He's had two holes in one. His first was 178 yards downhill using a new line of golf balls Titleist had provided. "The Titleist rep had just called me as I was getting ready to swing. I stop the swing, answer the phone and tell him to hold on. As he's on the phone, I hit and made a hole in one. It was one of the most exciting things that's ever happened to me."

Back in our 2002 interview, De La Hoya stated that his goal was to "one day play on the senior tour." When reminded of this, he gives a little sigh.

"Unfortunately, life has become so much busier now that I'm retired, which is kind of funny. I'm still competitive, still love the



game and going out there and playing with my friends, but I realize on that level you have to somehow be born with it, live, eat and breathe golf. For me right now it's impossible to do that."

One thing he always makes time for is raising funds for his foundation. Next year marks the 19th year of the foundation's Annual Golf Classic, a popular event among his celebrity friends and supporters that takes place at his home course of Lakeside Golf Club in Los Angeles.

"I am extremely thankful and proud of the monies raised at the tournament for services that benefit the community of East Los Angeles, with after school programs to help guide young people toward leading positive lives and away from circumstances of gang violence, juvenile delinquency and substance abuse," De La Hoya says.

Acknowledging his own struggles as a youth and prior to winning a gold medal, De La Hoya carried a food stamp in his wallet as a reminder of hard times. Today, that very food stamp is framed and displayed on his office wall, now a potent reminder that life can change.

Putting little pressure on himself to play well and enjoying the game of golf more than ever, he considers our question, "Who would make up your ultimate foursome?" and answers almost immediately. "Joe Lewis, the Brown Bomber, one of the best boxers ever and a great golfer; Bill Clinton, just because of the mastermind that he is; and my best friend since childhood Eric Gomez, where you can't help but laugh when he swings."

No laughing matter is De La Hoya's expanding empire. Few probably realize he is also owner of the Houston Dynamos, a major league soccer team, and he recently launched another new entity, the Golden Boy Fight Night series on Facebook Watch.

"I have been mining the media landscape for the past several years to find a broadcast and platform partner to change up the sport and to create a series that delivers fans across the world a new and engaging spin on the great sport of boxing," De La Hoya says. "This collaboration with Facebook has been nothing short of amazing."

Also nothing short of amazing for Oscar De La Hoya is the life that he has worked hard to create and which he humbly describes as "satisfying and fulfilling."

A Match Made in Heaven, Played in Sin City

Tiger VS Phil

Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson go one-on-one in Las Vegas

It's being billed as historic, the ultimate showdown, the match of the century. While hype around the 18-hole, head-to-head duel between Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson over Thanksgiving weekend in Las Vegas will certainly increase to epic proportions up until the moment they tee off, the truth is this is one event that will likely live up to the hyperbolic spin surrounding it.

Las Vegas oddsmakers are already having a field day. Naturally, you can bet on who will win, with Woods currently the favorite. But rumor has it you'll also be able to bet on what color shirts the two will wear (currently white for Mickelson and any color other than red, white or black for Woods), and other minutia tied to the event.

The rivalry between Woods and Mickelson, who have a combined 122 PGA Tour wins and 19 Majors between them, has not always been friendly. Yet in recent years they seem to have mellowed at least enough to see the value of a relationship that will take them to a \$9 million, winner-takes-all match seen around the world.

Not that either player *needs* the money. On the 2018 Forbes' Celebrity 100 list of the world's highest-paid entertainers, Woods came in at No. 66 with \$43.3 million for the year, and Mickelson at No. 74 with \$41.3 million.

But it's not all about the money, at least for them. "The iconic Tiger Woods and five-time Major champion Phil Mickelson are generational talents who have transcended the game of golf and their rivalry continues to be one of the most compelling in the history of sports," said David Levy, President of Turner, in a statement confirming the long-rumored event.

"This one-of-a-kind, winner-take-all matchup provides a great opportunity to harness the assets within the AT&T and WarnerMedia portfolio. For the first time since AT&T's acquisition of Time Warner (now WarnerMedia), Turner, DirecTV and HBO will come together to present a multi-faceted presentation of the live event and accompanying content across a vast array of platforms."

The match, scheduled for Friday, Nov. 23, will be hosted by MGM Resorts and held at Shadow Creek Golf Course, a Tom Fazio design in North Las Vegas. Live pay-per-view coverage of the event will be distributed through Turner's B/R Live, the broadcast company's new premium live sports streaming service, and AT&T's Direct TV, as well as other on-demand platforms. Other parts of the

goliath media empire will provide coverage of events leading up to the event, international access, behind-the-scenes coverage and more. Suffice it to say, there will not be a moment of this match before, during or after that fans will not be party to—for a price.

The action started in earnest in August when the PGA and Warner confirmed the match, and Tiger made it a certainty with just two words sent out via Twitter: "It's on."

Mickelson was quick to come back with a (good-natured) tweet: "I bet you think this is the easiest \$9 million you will ever make," complete with an emoji laughing so hard it's crying.

Banter between the two pros will no doubt ramp up in the coming weeks, with the odds going back and forth on various aspects of the match. While Woods currently has the edge according to oddsmakers, it's not a given that he will win, even though his recent forays ever closer to the top of the leaderboard have thrilled fans.

He placed T6 at the 2018 Open Championship at Carnoustie, Scotland, his first top 10 at a Major since 2013, and followed that with a thrilling Sunday run at Bellerive in the PGA Championship that got him to No. 2. In the process, he shot the lowest ever final-round score of his career, a 64—and that after not driving a single fairway on the front nine.

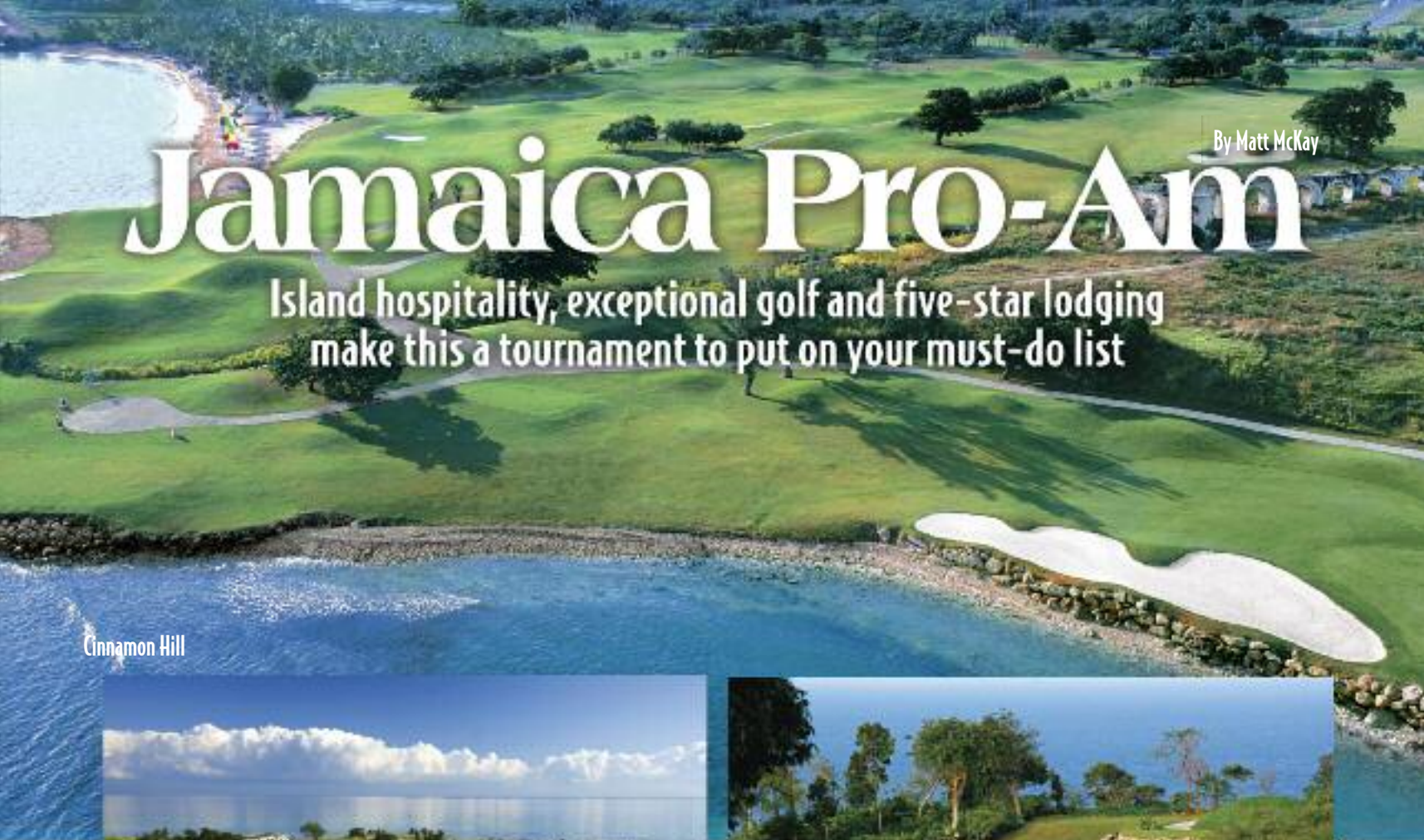
For his part, Mickelson ended the longest drought of his career back in March, winning the WGC-Mexico Championship at Club de Golf Chapultepec, just outside Mexico City.

While Mickelson and Woods are no longer at the pinnacle of their careers, it's hard to find two players who have a larger fan base or create more excitement on the golf course. They may never go head-to-head again on a PGA Major Sunday, but they're uniquely suited for a Las Vegas mega match-play event.

Best of all, perhaps, charities will benefit as well. As part of the deal, Woods and Mickelson will wear mics during play, all the better for fans to hear the ongoing rivalry and hole-by-hole side wagers the two will make, such as closest to the pin and longest drive. That money won will go to the winner's charity of choice.

As if the rumor mill hasn't been going full tilt for months already, rumor also has it this is just the first of multiple one-on-one golf mega matches that Woods and Mickelson will produce. It seems their relationship has grown closer than most of us ever knew.

Cinnamon Hill



World class service. Internationally famous beaches. A deliciously Caribbean climate. Savory local brew. Smiles that light up the Western Hemisphere. Pulsating reggae vibes echoing the heartbeat of the country.

Yep, a Jamaican vacation is a treat for the mind, body and senses. Now mix in competitive golf on two of the island's premier courses, and you've got the kind of irresistible getaway on offer during the 13th annual Jamaica Pro-Am, scheduled for November 14-18.

Many golfers have wished and dreamed about a Jamaican golf vacation during the dead of winter while perusing a brochure in an office cubicle in snowy New York City, or scouring a website in a darkened, air-conditioned office during a 115-degree summer day in Phoenix. The Jamaica Pro-Am ticks all the boxes those golfers dream of, from the included transfers to the five-star, all-inclusive Iberostar Grand Rose Hall to the golf courses, long known as among the finest in Jamaica and the Caribbean.

The courses on which the tournament will be contested are The White Witch (par 71, 6,758 yards, back tee), opened in 2000 and designed by the team of Robert von Hagge and Rick Baril, and Cinnamon Hill (par 71, 6,729 yards, back tee), originally opened in the 1970s and redesigned by von Hagge, Baril, and Michael Smelek in 2002.

The competition will incorporate a pro-am team format with teams consisting of one professional and three amateurs, and the Jamaica Tourist Board will play host to all golf professionals registering a complete team. Tournament participants will base up at the Iberostar Grand Rose Hall, a quick shuttle ride to both golf courses.

Cinnamon Hill once languished in obscurity after the initial excitement over having a golf course in the area had faded. However, the renovation at the beginning of the new century re-established the course as one of the Caribbean's best. During their 18-hole journey around Cinnamon Hill, players will experience "the flat" down by "the road," briefly sweep by the beach and launch into the hills, where challenges and authentic Jamaican scenery abound. Along the way, they'll pass by an ancient graveyard, Rose Hall itself, an 18th century aqueduct, the Cinnamon Hill Great House (better known as the old Johnny Cash estate), and a secluded area used during the making of *Live And Let Die*, one of the many James Bond films that utilized the beauty, charm and mystery of Jamaica.

The White Witch, named after a legendary former resident of the nearby Rose Hall Great House, was carved from land similar to Cinnamon Hill. But modern design and modern construction techniques allowed for the architects to create dramatic corridors, utilizing the landscape to play up, down, around and between the rolling hills that dominate Jamaica's interior. As with most von Hagge designs, the highlights are the dramatic par 3s and the challenging par 5s; the former exemplified by the 161-yard par 3 No. 17, which plays slightly downhill to a large green with a lone Guango tree helping to contrast the green and terra firma from the blue Caribbean Sea beyond.

A brief word or two about Annie (or Annee) Palmer, the legendary White Witch of Rose Hall. Annie Palmer did actually exist and did live in the Rose Hall Great House after marrying into the owning family. However, according to all attained historical records,



she and husband John Rose Palmer both lived uneventful lives. Upon John's death of natural causes, Annie inherited the property and eventually sold her remaining interest before passing away in 1846. But fictional pamphlets published some years after Annie's death conflated her life with a previous lady of the house, giving the depraved stories their initial traction.

Then, a fictional work written by Jamaican author Herbert de Lisser utilized the erroneous-but-fascinating existing vignettes to create *The White Witch of Rose Hall*. The book, published in 1929, painted Palmer as a ruthless, torturous, voodoo-practicing plantation master who murdered husbands and slave lovers with equal disregard before eventually being strangled by one of her slave lovers. While clearly a work of fiction, it verified the tales of legend many already believed to be true. The drastically embellished tale has served the island and the property well; the beautifully restored structure hosts thousands of tourists every year.

The golf event will consist of three rounds played over the two courses, and USGA/RCGA rules of golf apply. Practice rounds will be available on a limited basis, and players must secure their own tee times by contacting each course directly. Practice round greens fees are not included in the entry fee. Caddies are not required but are

included in the cost, and the loopers at both courses are generally regarded as among the best in the world. All amateurs will need to provide a valid handicap card or USGA GHIN number prior to the start of the event.

2019 CareerBuilder Challenge

Last year was pure excitement. This time around, it's all about improvement. Just over a year ago, CareerBuilder Challenge Tournament Director Pat McCabe and his colleagues at Lagardere Sports were celebrating the thrill of bringing one of the PGA Tour's longest-running events into the company's portfolio. Now, as the 2019 event draws nearer, McCabe says the enthusiasm surrounding the procurement of the tournament last year has transformed into a determination to make this year's event even better.

Because Lagardere got the news just a few months before last year's event teed off, McCabe says the order of the moment was to get that tournament re-packaged, re-branded and re-organized in just a handful of months. Initial reports indicated the company did a bang-up job executing on all phases in 2018, including Friday and Saturday concerts headlined by the Goo Goo Dolls and Huey Lewis and the News that drew well over 10,000 people per night.

The energy that drove last year's event, combined with the positive feedback, has now morphed into a determination to polish the diamond that Lagardere and the PGA Tour rolled out last year.

The 2019 event is scheduled for January 16-20 at the same golf courses that hosted the competition last year, PGA West's Nicklaus Tournament and Stadium Courses, and La Quinta Country Club. Phil Mickelson is returning as tournament ambassador, Jon Rahm will be back to defend his title and the tournament staff plans to utilize all those factors as its primary building blocks.

"Last year we came in late, obviously, so we were late with everything. We were late with announced music, we were late with finalizing what our public spaces would look like—we were late with everything because we didn't sign a contract with the tour until August," McCabe says. "The nice part now is, we've been able to work on the event for a full

year, and we've built some really strong relationships that we didn't have last year."

That includes relationships with local PGA partners, PGA West, the host hotel, homeowners and members. "We were building those relationships last year," McCabe notes, "and this year we fortunately have them."

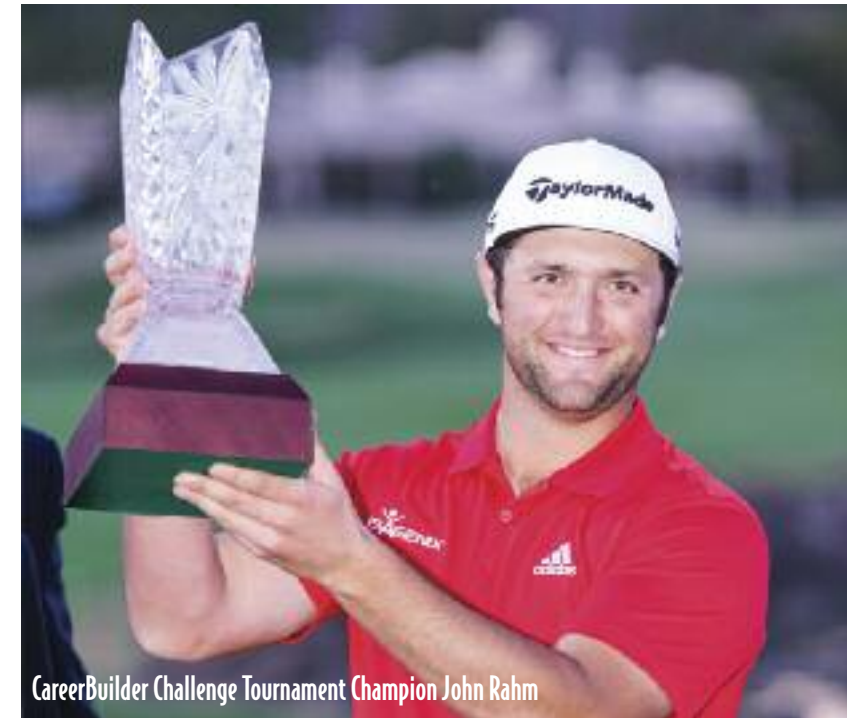
He says the tournament will be counting on many of the same pillars of success that helped last year's event linger in the memory, including a strong field, the \$30 "VIP" admission and, yes, Friday and Saturday night concerts.

The official announcement of the 2019 concert entertainers should come right about the same time as tickets go on sale in late September/early October. Once again, the plan is to sell tickets for \$30, and all ticket holders will experience what McCabe describes as the \$30 VIP treatment. "All our ticket holders are treated like sponsors," he says.

The fact that tournament officials had off-the-record reassurances from Tour officials that the CareerBuilder Challenge would remain in its traditional mid-to-late January spot on the 2019 schedule was also helpful in planning for the upcoming tournament. The traditional tournament window, however, has meant for decades that the competition has butted heads with NFL playoffs in the pursuit of television eyeballs.

"It's always helpful to know when your dates are going to be," McCabe says. "We'd been clued up during last year's tournament that we would be in [the same] window this year, even though nothing had been made official until just recently."

However, McCabe also hinted that the date could actually improve in the next couple of years when the Tour schedule is adjusted again.

"We understand that we're battling with football, and the really exciting part is to see what happens to the schedule for 2020," he says. "I've heard rumblings that we may get away from that championship weekend."

**This year's annual championship will be contested
at prestigious Indian Wells Tennis Garden**

Pickleball is not new. Its origins go back to 1965, and *Tennis* magazine first published an article about it in 1975. Now, 43 years later, the racquet sport that has been on a dizzying upward spiral of popularity and legitimacy has reached new heights: Its 10th annual National Championship event will be played November 3-11 at Indian Wells Tennis Garden, in Indian Wells, California.

It will be a joint effort between the USA Pickleball Association (USAPA), Indian Wells Tennis Garden (IWTG) and title sponsor, Margaritaville.

"The decision to move to Indian Wells was huge for USAPA and the sport," says Justin Maloof, executive director of USAPA. "The Indian Wells Tennis Garden is one of the beautiful venues in all of sports. The combination of the venue and the opportunity to work directly with the Indian Wells team to put on the premiere pickleball tournament in the world is a major step toward bringing pickleball into the national spotlight."

Maloof says the sport's top 500 players pre-qualified for the event, and when open registration was offered on August 1, the registration number hit 2,500 in one day. This will equate to approximately 550 matches per day or nearly 5,000 matches over the nine-day event. About the top echelon of competitors Maloof says, "There are too many top players to list them all but here are some names: For the men: Tyson McGuffin, Ben Johns, Marcin Rozpedski, Kyle Yates, Daniel Moore, Wes Gabrielson, Scott Moore and Glen Peterson. For the women: Simone Jardim, Iriana Tereschchenko, Lucy Kovalova, Sarah Ansboury, Jennifer Lucor, Alex Hamner, Corrine Carr and Christine McGrath.

If those names aren't yet familiar to you in the way the names of the world's top tennis and golf professionals are, stay tuned. This year's championship will put those players and the sport in general in an infinitely brighter spotlight thanks to the venue, title sponsor and Desert Champions, a sports and entertainment management company that includes the BNP Paribas Open, one of the most prestigious professional tennis tournaments in the world, among its high-profile events.

"We are excited to partner with the team at Margaritaville and the USA Pickleball Association to add this championship to our growing portfolio of events," says Steve Birdwell, chief operating officer of Desert Champions. "We cannot wait to welcome the entire pickleball community to the world-renowned Indian Wells Tennis Garden in November."

The tournament's nine days of events will incorporate all ages and skill levels including singles, doubles, mixed doubles and professional divisions. Indian Wells Tennis Garden, which hosts the BNP Paribas Open each March, is readying 44 match courts as well as a championship court. They will all showcase Margaritaville branding, as will the onsite Shade Pavilion and Bar. Naturally, live music, the centerpiece of the Margaritaville brand, will take place each day, along with exciting Margaritaville-inspired activities and promotions."

Forget the concept of a staid, demure tennis competition. This event is about a sport that's rooted in fun for all ages.

"Pickleball and Margaritaville are both synonymous with fun, so we are excited to bring our state-of-mind to the fastest growing sport in the U.S.," says Tamara Baldanza-Dekker, Margaritaville's

chief marketing officer. "From the party that surrounds the USA Pickleball National Championships to the palm trees and natural beauty of the Indian Wells Tennis Garden, Margaritaville's partnership with Desert Champions and the USAPA is truly a match made in paradise."

For longtime fans and even the newest aficionados of pickleball, the experience should be exhilarating.

"This is an opportunity to come watch the best pickleball players in the world compete in one of sport's greatest spectator venues. Spectators will be right on top of the action and will enjoy a variety of food, beverage and live entertainment throughout the competition," says Maloof. "A number of pickleball sponsors will also be onsite selling the latest paddles, balls, equipment and apparel."

While admission to the grounds and to the 44 field courts is free, fans will have to purchase tickets for matches played on the championship court.

As it stands now, pickleball courts at Indian Wells Tennis Garden are a temporary thing. Once the pickleball championships conclude, these courts will be repainted and return to use for tennis players. But Kyle Klein, one of the tournament's co-chairs, is hopeful that IWTG may soon be known for its pickleball facilities, too.

"Indian Wells Tennis Garden has worked hard to create temporary courts equivalent to how a permanent court would play," he says. "While temporary for this year, the possibility of permanent courts is very high. This includes painting of the lines, solid nets and barriers around the courts."

Coming to the Desert Soon?

If Larry Ellison has his say, the answer is yes

On August 16, the International Tennis Federation (ITF) voted overwhelmingly to revamp the Davis Cup competition considerably, starting next year.

After months upon months of debates, a clear majority—71.43 percent of all votes at the federation's annual general meeting—believed the 118-year-old competition was not only in need of an evolution, but a full-on revival.

As of this year, national teams played five best-of-five-sets matches in four weeks total, yet these matches were contested over a period of several months at various sites across the globe. Now, thanks to the recent vote, the Davis Cup will feature four rounds of three best-of-three matches—all held in one week in November and at one site.

Preliminary rounds, used to determine spots in the finals, will be contested next February. Featuring 24 participating countries, the home-or-away preliminary rounds will be completed in one week, as 12 winners will be able to advance to November's finals. Aside from these 12 winners, the finals will also feature six other teams: four semifinalists from last year, along with two wild-card teams, which will be chosen before the qualifying round.

Although the finals will be held overseas the first two years (the finalists for next year's hosts are Madrid and Lille,

France), Larry Ellison, owner of Oracle and the wealthiest man in the tennis industry, has recently discussed his interest in hosting the Davis Cup at Indian Wells Tennis Garden, a property he has owned (and expanded substantially) since 2010.

Just 10 days before the ITF voted in favor for the Davis Cup's revamp, Ellison not only stressed his full support of the revisions, but also discussed his excitement about the prospects of helping to ensure the California desert is the United States' first host of the revived competition.

"I am very excited about the new format that the ITF and Kosmos have

developed for [the] Davis Cup," Ellison says. "I am thrilled that the Indian Wells Tennis Garden, one of the premier tennis venues, is being considered to host 18 National teams and their associations, in the new Davis Cup Finals event in 2021."

Kosmos, a company founded and chaired by professional football (aka soccer in the United States) player Gerard Piqué and featuring a portfolio of entertainment, media and sports venues, will partner with the ITF as it reforms the prestigious competition throughout the coming months. Piqué, who is helping to oversee the 25-year, \$3 billion partnership, fully supports Ellison, who has also announced that he will become an investor in the new Davis Cup format.

"I personally want to publicly welcome Mr. Ellison to this project," Piqué states. "We are very pleased and proud to join forces and have him financially backing our commitment for boosting the Davis Cup."

As Ellison and his team prepare for the prospects of hosting the Davis Cup—one

of the most talked about events of this year's tennis season—the future of Indian Wells Tennis Garden has arguably never been brighter.

"The agreement [between Ellison and Kosmos] reassures the ambition of our engagement together with the ITF," Piqué continues. "I know it will be welcomed as a positive announcement for the global tennis community."

JR Thomas

Returns to the Golf Car Industry

Building on extensive expertise and acumen, JR is undoubtedly heading for success



Once upon a time in the desert, JR Thomas was the crown prince of golf-car sales. He's back now and threatening to assume his place as king.

Thomas and his father, Bobby Thomas, were titans of Coachella Valley golf-car sales for decades, combining to operate and manage Electric Car Distributors in Rancho Mirage. Having started up in the mid-1960s, it wouldn't be a stretch to say the father-son combo and the company to which they dedicated their lives set the groundwork for the golf-car industry in the area.

After taking on partners late in the senior Thomas' career, however, the business slowly eroded. Father and son watched as poor management practices had a detrimental effect on the business they had built together. Electric Car Distributors eventually disappeared in 2015, when the lease expired on its long-term home on Highway 111.

But this was not the end for JR Thomas. Rather than drive a golf car off into the sunset, Thomas has taken his decades of experience and connections in the valley to launch JR Thomas' Golf Cars in

Rancho Mirage. Thomas intends to use the relationships and business practices he and his father forged to build Electric Car Distributors into a giant of the industry to take his new business back to the head of the golf-car class.

Now 60 years old, some might wonder why Thomas would jump back into the competitive world of Coachella Valley golf-car sales. The way he sees it, he's too young to turn over the game he and his father wrote the rules for to those who would love to fight for his slice of the valley's golf-car pie. And the industry is still keenly aware of the weight the Thomas name carries—another reason he's back in the game.

"You know, I have a good name. This is all I've done all my life," Thomas says. "Being 60, I'm still too young to retire, and I'm still physically in pretty good shape. I wanted to come back and shake things up and run a small company. I'm going to put 10 years in and I'll see if the guys working for me want to buy me out, or if an outside guy wants to come in and get into the golf-cart business. I'll have a good running business in 10 years that will be worth quite a bit of money."

Thomas entered the business with his father in 1977, starting at the bottom and working his way to the top, all under the watchful eye of Bobby Sr. He started in the service department, learning everything about how a golf car is put together and runs. After seven years in service and three years as the general manager, he finally earned a coveted sales spot and became president of the company as the 1980s became the '90s. The two were synonymous with golf-car sales and the Coachella Valley, and did so much business as a tandem that Bobby eventually gave JR his nickname so customers and callers could distinguish between the elder Thomas and his son.

Bobby sold the company in 2012, and JR says he could "see the writing on the wall" in short order. He stayed with the company for a short time before moving to another valley car company in 2014. Thomas says he contracted with the dealer for a year in hopes of taking over the company after the contract expired, but the owner decided after year that he, too, was too young to retire. At that point, Thomas offered the owner a handshake and re-introduced himself as "your newest competitor."

A year later, JR Thomas' Golf Cars was up and running with two locations—a showroom on Highway 111 in Rancho Mirage and a hardcore repair and customization shop on Cook Street in Palm Desert. Thomas says minor repairs and customizations are handled in the showroom, but big jobs are handled at the Cook Street location, including full customizations, renovations and repairs. The shop offers mobile services and repairs onsite as well as pick-up/drop-off services.

The company is aiming for a November grand opening at its Highway 111 location, a former Italian restaurant that's being completely updated to create a state-of-the-art showroom. The location is directly across the street from the old Electric Car Distributors location, an intentional move on Thomas' part.

"When someone drives up to the Electric Car property, which we've had since the 1960s, someone's going to say, 'Wow, where are the golf car guys?' And then they're going to say, 'They're right across the street.'"

Fitness Footwear

Finding your best fit

For many golfers and tennis players, staying fit away from the course and court is part of their goal in maintaining a healthy lifestyle, so that means there must be careful consideration for their footwear revolving around running, walking and other fitness activities.

Regardless of the activity, there are three key elements crucial for achieving a great performing shoe: fit, comfort and durability.

There's a reason sneaker makers such as Asics, Brooks, Adidas and KSwiss have owned a large part of the billion-dollar fitness footwear marketplace for years. It's the same reason why golf club manufacturers such as TaylorMade and Ping and racket producers like Wilson and Head have been so successful through the decades. They all emphasize technical innovation.

While they're certainly aware that style points count, these are the companies that set the trends because they delve deep into the science behind the design and creation of a great performing shoe.

In attempts to maintain their edge and well-earned reputation in regard to fit, comfort and durability, these shoe companies are always striving to be at the leading edge of the continual evolution of what makes athletic footwear stand out.

All that R&D for better footwear comes at a price. Since cost is a factor, one current trend for more affordability is multi-functionality.

"Today people are leading a more active lifestyle. This is creating more of a need to have footwear that not only looks good in casual settings but also provides a fit and feel of an athletic shoe," notes Brendan Murray, U.S. sales and marketing manager for Inov-8.

"Convenience is a driving aspect in today's world, and athletic shoes are starting to reflect this mindset. Athletic shoes are evolving into shoes that can be used in many different aspects of the day so you don't have to change shoes throughout the day."

Beyond the casual cross-over consideration, that multi-usage appeal applies to grouping physical activities in using the same model of shoe. There is a movement, for example, to produce athletic footwear that includes technical components that cross over with powerwalking and jogging.

"Most shoes that are developed for running will perform just as well for walking. One trend across the running and walking space is that there is less of a need for shoes to have an abundance of bulky overlays in order to perform at a high-level," says Jena Winger, Brooks Footwear product line manager. "If the shoe is built with sound biomechanics in mind, there is less of a need to add unnecessary parts and pieces."

The trick these days is to come up with a comfortably versatile design that is aesthetically appealing but also ensures performance.

We asked Graham Jordison, lead designer for Inov-8 Footwear, how he achieves that.

"We continually evolve our technology, from our cushioning technologies that aim to be lighter while still maintaining exceptional cushioning properties, as well as materials that are lighter, softer but also very durable. There has been a lot of advancements in textiles, rubbers and foams in the past 10 years, and you are seeing a lot of this reflected in our product."

In addition to attending tradeshow and staying up-to-date on the latest fashion trends across industries, athletic footwear manufacturers use designated teams of marketing personnel that leverage consumer feedback to determine the seasonal color palette and to ensure their latest model has stylistic appeal.

Another major challenge, however, is literally that one size does not fit all.

"The most important thing to look for, and best way to reduce the risk of injury, is to select the most comfortable pair of shoes for you as an individual," says Winger. "For some people that may mean softer cushioning while for others that may mean firmer, more responsive cushioning. It may mean having plenty of that cushioning underfoot or being closer to the ground, and it may mean a shoe that incorporates support technologies or an after-

market orthotic. There are a lot of options out there to find your ideal fit, feel, ride and look, and working with an expert at your local running store is the best way to quickly narrow down the best option for you."

Adds Jordison, "The idea of 'the shoe needs to break in' is not a mindset one should have when buying an athletic shoe, especially a training or running shoe."

It's easy to get lost in fancy design patterns and looks when you're in a store. But the fact remains one should always rate a shoe based first on fit and feel. It sounds like an obvious consideration but often is not followed. Support and performance should always be the chief consideration in athletic footwear.

Everybody's foot is different, but nobody should wear something too snug or even too soft when working hard to stay in shape.

By Rob Stanger Golfer's Playbook How to Stripe Your Drives

Getting off the tee is so important to having a great round. The tee shot puts you in position for a shorter approach from the fairways, which can set up a shorter putt for birdie. Here are my keys to striping your drives.

IT ALL STARTS WITH POSTURE

The key for me to stripe my tee shots starts with my posture at address. Notice in the photo that standing taller in the legs allows me to tilt more from the hips. This type of posture allows my arms to hang, positioning my hands directly on top of the toe line. This posture keeps my shoulders and forearms square to my intended ball flight line, which is to the star in the distance. Remember that posture affects alignment of the shoulders and the forearms, which in turn affects the golf club path in the swing.



TRANSITIONING FROM BACKSWING TO FORWARD SWING

When I am transitioning from backswing to forward swing, I keep my focus on my angles; the left arm on top of the toe line and the angle of the shaft pointing to the target line. Like shooting a rifle, I need to have the angles pointing to my target, in this case the target line. As I previously noted regarding posture, you can see that my posture has been maintained, keeping my angles congruent. In other words, I have not changed my posture angles in any way. Posture has a big influence on how I'm able to swing the golf club on a specific path that references the target line.



ROTATION THROUGH IMPACT

My key to striping my tee shot is now to be rotational with my body through impact. With my foundation staying in balance underneath me, my body rotation serves as the power source to swing the golf club back through the ball. Because I had my angles on the correct path in transition, the steering of the clubface with my hands is actually pretty simple: I just keep the clubface at a 12:00 angle as it makes contact with the ball.



STRIKE A POSE IN THE FINISH

The rotation of my body in balance keeps my arms and hands moving through on my desired swing plane. The referencing of my hands and clubface to this swing plane gives me control of the flight of the ball. You can see in the photo how my hands are basically dissecting the swing plane line, with my wrist angles controlling the clubface angle.



MENTAL STRATEGY

My mental strategy for striping my tee shots is to master one particular "shape" of shot. For me it's a draw. It's very important for me to shape my ball flight on my tee shot from right to left to maximize my distance. When I'm practicing or playing, I always initially pick a target to aim at along the right side, then spin the ball from right to left into the fairway.

A New Approach to Tennis Strength Training

To improve an amateur's fitness and on-court performances, Sports Fitness Advisor has developed a novel, three-phase strength-training program

For nearly 20 years—dating to its 2001 founding—Sports Fitness Advisor, a website loaded with sports and fitness information, has had one primary goal: to offer its clients exercise tips and training plans that are backed by scientific research.

Inspired by this chief mission initiated by founder Jacky Anderson, a comprehensive guide on tennis training, comprised of more than 30,000 words and featuring 13 key points, has been developed by Jillian Anderson (no relation), a writer at Sports Fitness Advisor who was determined to help amateurs of all ages and skill levels better condition themselves via a strength-training program.

Often, amateurs weight-train incorrectly, usually lifting three sets of 10 in weight rooms, for example. Such misunderstandings typically lead to injuries and poor performances on a short- and long-term basis. However, by learning how to optimally train for tennis specifically, amateurs can reap a variety of rewards on the court, from greater acceleration and speed to more power in their backhand, forehand, serve and volley.

Anderson advises amateur athletes to consider “periodization,” a method in which they disintegrate a long training regime into small periods of training instead. She believes three primary phases—conducted across the off-season, pre-season and the actual tennis season itself—should occur in various intervals, lasting from six weeks to four months.

“Unlike many sports, tennis demands several different types of strength, particularly muscular endurance and explosive power,” she says. “Before these can be developed to optimal levels, athletes first need to develop good foundational and maximum strength.”

If amateurs try to train for every type of strength at once, she notes, “they’ll end up with very little of anything, except fatigue! So the best method is to focus on one type of strength in each separate phase.”

Phase 1: Foundational Tennis Strength Training

There is simply no way around it. No matter how experienced amateurs are, they will be swinging their racquets with one arm and one side of their body, leading to uneven demands on the body and injuries to rotator cuffs and elbows.

To help amateurs overcome the potentially serious impacts of these uneven demands in which some muscle groups are severely overworked while others aren’t used at all, Anderson recommends that tennis players build solid training bases first. Designed to help amateurs prepare their connective tissues, ligaments and tendons for future strenuous activities, the first phase of the tennis strength-training program lasts just six to eight weeks.

“During this time, amateurs should have two sessions a week and conduct 10 to 12 exercises during each session,” Anderson says. “They should also conduct 12 to 15 repetitions and rest for 90 seconds between each exercise. This will prepare them for more intense, tennis-specific fitness later.”

Phase 2: Maximum Tennis Strength Training

Although maximum strength on its own is not vital for tennis players, amateurs cannot ignore one of the most significant components of the game: power, which is developed by a combination of speed and strength. Simply put, the more maximum strength players have, the more potential they have to increase their power.

To help players increase their maximum strength considerably, Anderson advises a six-week phase of intense workouts, comprised



of two to three sessions per week. During each session, amateurs should complete six to eight exercises, repeating each one four to eight times.

“The greater an amateur’s strength, the more this strength can be applied over a prolonged period,” Anderson says. “This principle of building maximum strength is used worldwide by elite athletes—outside of tennis as well.”

Phase 3: Conversion to Power and Strength Endurance

Anderson recommends that amateurs focus on more tennis-specific exercises—roughly two to three during each session—throughout the next phase of the tennis strength-training program. She believes that power training, via plyometrics, is critical, as it increases contraction speed and power, leading to more acceleration on tennis courts.

“For the lower body, plyometrics is very similar to jump training,” she states. “But for upper body power, medicine balls are among the most effective training tools available.”

To achieve their utmost potential, amateur athletes should consider conducting one to two sessions a week for four to eight weeks during the final phase of the program, along with 10 to 12 repetitions—while also setting aside three to four minutes to rest between each exercise.

In addition to plyometrics, these athletes must also focus on improving their strength endurance, which, like power, is another crucial aspect of their game. To increase strength endurance substantially, amateurs should consider circuit training for four to eight weeks, completing 10 to 12 exercises during each session (one to two per week).

“This program may take a little more planning initially than a general weight-lifting routine, but it doesn’t take any more time to perform,” Anderson says. “And, best of all, it often works wonders for a player’s game.”

The Complete Golfer Optimize Your Game!

It's not enough just to practice; you have to practice the right way

Golf is a unique game requiring proficiency in numerous skills and physical aptitudes. The short game requires a sense of feel for distance control and the ability to visualize slopes and breaks. The long game requires hand-eye coordination, balance, mobility, strength, power and timing.

Those are just the physical skills; it also takes a strategic mind and self-management of emotions.

The average golfer desires desperately to improve. Yet, rarely does a golfer take an honest assessment of his/her game and what areas need the most work. In truth, all the components I described



need to be consistently evaluated and improved. Regardless of age, gender or skill level, the foundation and fundamentals of every component should constantly be worked on.

This is easier said than done and takes an expert in all areas to help evaluate and guide you. Just hitting balls on a range every day will not do anything to help your game and can actually hurt it if you're not practicing deliberately on the correct motor skill. It takes thousands of hours of deliberate practice for anything to become habit, whether physical or mental.

The good news is that everyone can improve their performance and enjoy the game more if they are willing to evaluate all aspects of their game, stick to a plan and work on improving the foundations. But, *your expectations must match your skill set in all areas.*

Here, for example, is a drill that should be done regularly by all levels of golfers. Knowing *where* you are hitting the ball on the clubface is critically important, and just giving your brain a little feedback can help improve your ball contact dramatically.

This drill is very simple. Spray some foot powder on the clubface of any club, hit the ball and then notice where on the face you made contact. Your goal is to strike the ball close to the center of the face. Don't judge or try to make any drastic changes to improve it. Simply let your brain notice and try again. With continual feedback your hand-eye coordination will automatically begin to improve and get better at finding the sweet spot!

Welcome back golf and tennis aficionados! While the magazine took a summer hiatus, we Bikram Yogis never take a break from stretching and stimulating the body in our favorite yoga poses derived from Bikram Yoga.

Known for its highly therapeutic yoga asanas, Bikram yoga helps consistent practitioners stay youthful internally because of the systematic compression and release nature of the poses. We know how important it is to facilitate proper body function in order to keep our muscles, organs and glands in optimal working order as we age, in addition to keeping performance levels at a maximum in our activities.

As we move our way through the Bikram yoga series, we continue through the warm-up pose by bending the body in the fourth and final direction, Padahastasana, or hands-to-feet pose. (Please refer to previous issues of *Desert Golf & Tennis* regarding Half Moon Pose/Side Bends and Backward Bending.)

We come right out of the backward bend and into a forward fold. This forward fold, endearingly referred to as the “Japanese Ham Sandwich Pose,” coined by none other than Bikram Choudhury himself, who spent a lot of time in Japan. What is a Japanese ham sandwich you ask? It’s two pieces of bread and one very thin slice of ham in between that’s so thin you can’t see it.

This pose has students literally sandwiching their upper and lower body halves together. It’s a great inversion for the upper body as it sends blood to the brain and stimulates the endocrine glands, while also a tremendous stretch for the legs, hamstrings, hips and back. The forward fold also compresses the intestines and the abdominals, helping to stimulate the digestive system.

While this stretch has great benefit for those without injury, it is a strong stretch and should be avoided for anyone with a herniated disk (also true of any rounding of the spine forward).

We discussed fear in the last article as we reviewed the backward bend. While most students are afraid to go back too far because it’s a foreign way to posture the body, the opposite is true of the forward bend. Ironically, it’s in the forward bend that one tends to tweak oneself because there is typically no fear in coming forward. If students aren’t paying attention, they can move into this pose mindlessly and actually pull something inadvertently.

Moving into the pose slowly as one comes out of the backward bend and completes a U-turn into the forward bend requires proper positioning and is the key to success.

How To

It’s important to remember that every forward fold requires engaging the abdominal muscles to protect the spine. With bent knees and

abdominals strongly engaged, a student hinges at the hips and bends forward.

However, prior to getting into the set-up for this pose, students are encouraged to warm up their legs and hips by placing the tops of their fingers on the floor and marching in place, alternately bending the right and left knees, wiggling the hips and even squatting up and down a few times. The “cha cha cha” movement is a great little warm-up to the intense stretch for the hamstrings.

After warmup, students are instructed to bend their knees deeply, wrap their bent elbows around their calf muscles, sandwich their stomach to their thighs, lift their heels and scoop up their heels from behind with the palms of their hands cradling the heels.

The fingers are tightly “glued” together with baby fingers aligned next to each other. Wrapping one’s bent elbows around the calf muscles strengthens the grip and helps bring the baby fingers together; however, modifications are in order for beginners who can’t quite wrap their elbows in this fashion. If that’s the case, the hands may be positioned closer to the outsides of the heels.

Students then use their bicep strength to pull their heels as they simultaneously lift their hips up toward the ceiling and roll the weight into their toes. The greater the pull and hip lift, the greater the intensity of the hamstring stretch.

The goal is to eventually get the upper and lower halves of the body tightly together, hence, a perfect Japanese ham sandwich. In addition to the tight proximity between the upper body and the legs, one eventually wants to achieve a lengthening of the spine by sliding the upper body down the legs so that the top of the head is almost on the feet.

According to Bikram Choudhury, Padahastasana pose benefits the body in numerous ways:

- Stretches the legs/hamstrings
- Improves digestion
- Stretches out the wrists, helping with carpal tunnel and arthritis
- Improves sciatica
- Awakens you, sending blood to the brain
- Stimulates the nervous system
- Tones the abdomen

Padahastasana, like many of the Bikram yoga poses, is challenging and often daunting, but one cannot dispute the amazing benefits. Bikram Yoga El Paseo student Mike Setchell, a PGA Life Member who has worked at prominent golf clubs for years, understands the love/hate relationship with the yoga.

“Padahastasana is my biggest struggle but I love it,” he says. “It has built up my core strength and balance, which has helped tremendously with my golf game. Yoga and golf are very complimentary, especially heated yoga since it accelerates the results. I always recommended it to all of my golf buddies.”

Sizzling Hot Coachella Valley Luxury Real Estate Market

This looks to be a record year for real estate in the valley



Not only were the Coachella Valley summer temperatures the hottest on record, the real estate market was very hot as well. The valley's selling season that was once defined as November through April has now become year-round, with an equal or greater number of homes being sold April through October.

In the past six months, 377 houses sold for more than \$1 million across the valley. The most expensive house closed in August at The Madison Club in La Quinta, going for \$12 million. Other high-dollar sales included two at Big Horn for, \$6.8 million and \$9.97 million, and another at The Madison club for \$6.75 million.

Here's a sales breakdown of homes that went for more than \$1 million at Coachella Valley's luxury country clubs.

The Hideaway Club: 16 sales ranging from about \$1.3 to \$3.9 million

The Madison Club: 4 sales ranging from about \$2.4 to \$12 million

Tradition Golf Club: 12 sales ranging from approximately \$1.1 to \$3.6 million

Andalusia at Coral Mountain: 32 sales priced from \$925,000 to about \$1.9 million

Big Horn Golf Club: 27 sales from approximately \$1.47 to \$9.9 million

The Vintage Club: 12 sales from about \$1.2 to \$6 million

The Reserve Club: 6 sales from approximately \$1 million to \$2 million

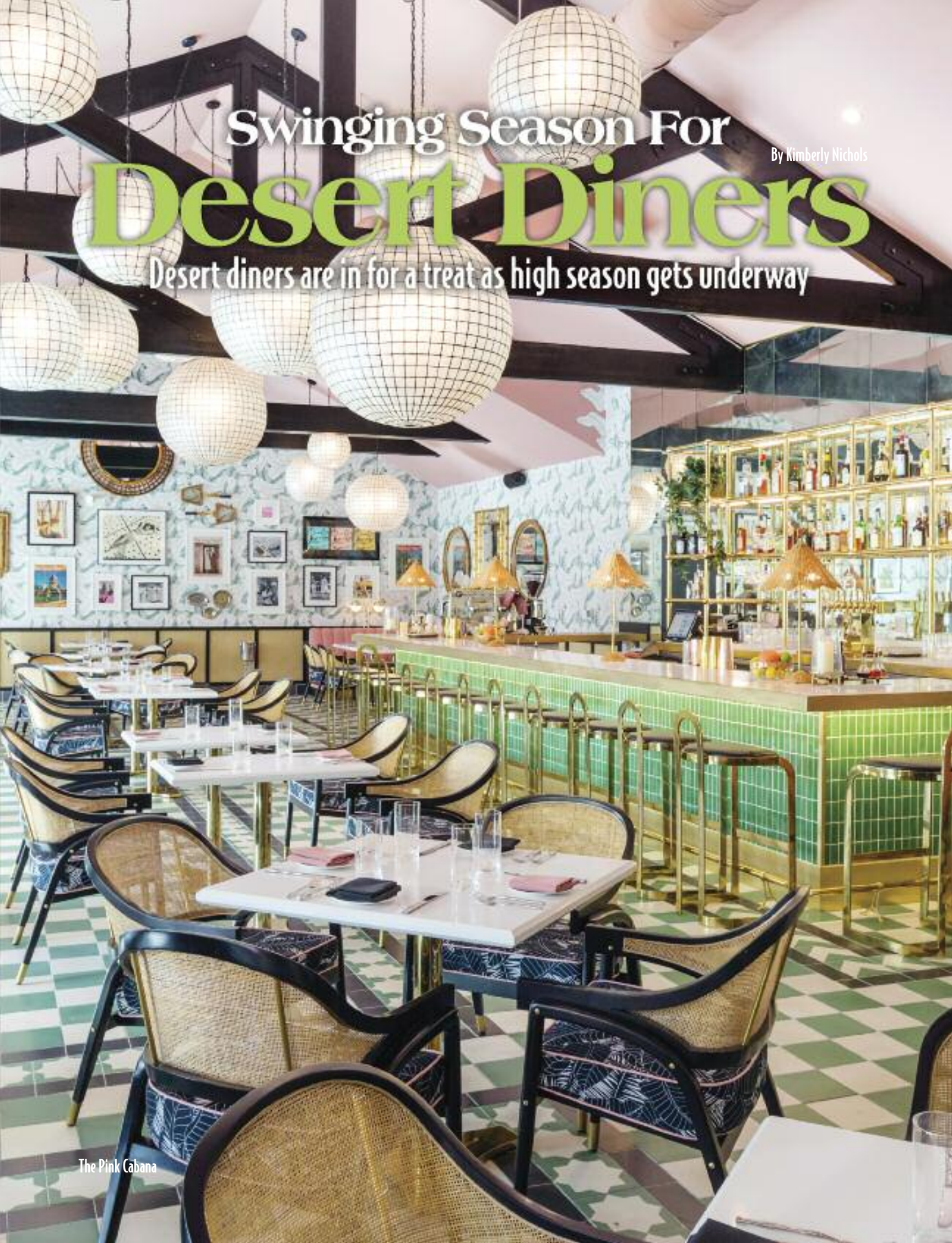
Toscana Country Club: 21 sales from about \$1.3 to \$2.4 million

Thunderbird Country Club: 14 sales from about \$1 million to \$4.1 million

In Palm Springs, among properties not at a country club, there were 106 sales above \$1 million and ranging up to \$3 million.

Inventory per the Desert Area MLS is down 20 percent over this time last year. We anticipate the inventory to increase as it always does in October and November as the heat subsides and snowbirds return. If this summer is any indication, it is going to be a fantastic year for real estate in the Coachella Valley.

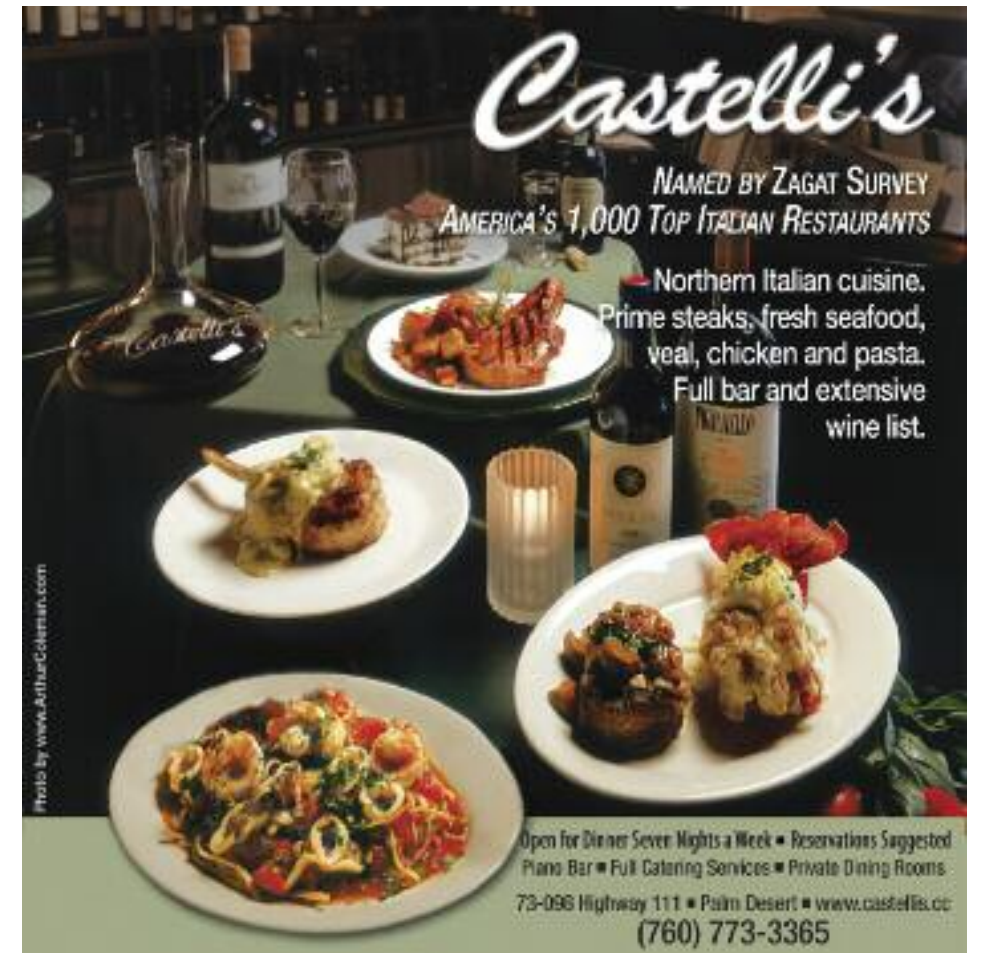

Lambo-OH!

Aventador SVJ has power and smarts



The Lamborghini Aventador SVJ Coupe is one part rocket, one part rock-n'-roll. While every Lambo is a super car by definition, the Aventador SVJ is out of this world in its performance, technology and awe factor.

The SVJ's redesign has added 30 percent more downforce with a new underbody configuration, making this one the most aerodynamic of any of its predecessors. Using a sophisticated series of flaps and generators, the Aventador SVJ pushes air where it provides the most stability for the car when it's needed most. Lamborghini is calling this system the Aerodinamica Lamborghini Attiva (ALA for us Americans). The flaps and spoilers can actively push air around, under and over the car to make for better handling and less friction.

This is something engineers can geek out on and drivers can appreciate—even if they don't entirely understand it.

The high-tech cooperation in the underbody and spoilers gets results. The Aventador SVJ just ascended the throne of supercars by turning in the fastest time at Nurburgring. The 6:44 lap was three seconds faster than the Porsche 911 GT2.

"The Aventador SVJ is an innovative car and represents the absolute pinnacle of our super sports car product range," says Automobili Lamborghini Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, Stefano Domenicali.

"The challenge to Lamborghini designers and engineers was to improve the purest essence of the Lamborghini super sports car, drawing on every inspiration from a space ship to a jet fighter—all the most exceptional examples of super-fast, super-athletic, aerodynamic superiority. The Aventador SVJ takes another step into the future, shaping the potential for super sports car development."

Beyond the jet-like aerodynamics, the retuned V12 gives this Aventador 770 horsepower, keeping it near the top of the list of all-time, most-powerful models to come out of Lamborghini. Its acceleration is mind blowing, with 530 pound-feet of torque at 6,750 rpm. The Aventador will run 0-62 mph in 2.8 seconds and has an "official" top speed of 216 mph. There's ample speculation that this may be a conservative estimate.

Gazing at the Aventador from the front, you'll see an air intake on each side of the hood emblem. The effect is of staring down a jungle cat about to make you its lunch. The rear bumper is completely redesigned from the Aventador SV. The two-level bumper features added diffusers and exhaust pipes mounted very high relative to previous models. A carbon fiber engine cover decreases weight and was specifically designed for the SVJ.

The interior is a blend of carbon fiber and leather. The computer's technology is nothing less than space-age. The telemetry system will save your lap times and compute nearly anything you'd ever want to know. The ALA system not only reduces drag and



of the front axle, creating more precise turns. At high speeds, the opposite occurs, in effect lengthening the wheelbase and offering more control as you work to break the sound barrier.

Only 963 drivers in the world will have the opportunity to own this new Aventador SVJ, 63 of which will be commemorative editions to celebrate Lamborghini's founding in 1963. The SVJ starts at \$517,700 with deliveries beginning in early 2019.

That's a launch you don't want to miss.

increase downforce, it also reduces turbulence, making the ride one that won't beat you up.

As for the SVJ steering, it is also out of this world. The four-wheel drive is able to communicate between the front and rear axles. And depending on the driving mode

selected (three out-of-the-box modes to choose from and an option to customize a mode just for you) and the speed, the computer will compensate on corners if needed and allow a more "direct steering" option. When required at low speed, the rear axle will steer in the opposite direction

Escada's use of color, print and innovative fabrics remains a hallmark of the brand, which has garnered an A-list following from stars including Naomi Watts, Rachel McAdams and Jessica Alba.

Escada is still headquartered in Munich, Germany, where the endeavor began. However, after corporate expansion and going public in 1986, the company was acquired in 2009 by India's London-based billionaire Lakshmi Mittal, whose daughter-in-law, Indian businesswoman Megha Mittal, is now the owner and director of the board. Escada has a presence in 80 countries with 1,100 points of sale worldwide. Its primary international locations include Milan, Paris, London, Beverly Hills and New York City.

Escada's fall playbook showcases plenty of petal power. The printed jacquard pants feature a highly pigmented burst of red and blue peonies with a straight-leg silhouette that's gently cropped, perfect for pairing with strappy sandals or loafers. Constructed of lightweight cotton and viscose jacquard, the pants have a clean finished waistband, slanted front pockets and are lined in a blend of cupro and elastane. They sell for \$875.

The coordinating short-sleeve orange-red sweater is cut to a turtleneck silhouette with flattering short sleeves, identifying itself as an elegant layer for fall. The slim-fit piece is spun from a smooth viscose and polyamide blend, detailed with a textured stripe along the front and back and rib-knit trims. This piece may be purchased for \$495.

Building on the floral theme, Escada's embellished jacquard dress is a stunning piece for special occasions with a rhinestone-and-crystal embellished neckline. Fashioned from rich floral jacquard in polyester and polyamide, the short-sleeve style flares to a subtle A-line

and comes fully lined in satin cupro. Displaying bouquets of blue and green set against a black background, the dress features a hidden zipper at the back and measures just over 20 inches from the waist, hitting above the knee. Full of personality, this power sheath retails for \$1,795.

The crepe printed dress is a relaxed yet sophisticated silhouette with a bold graphic print in purple and black with accents of olive. There's even a centrally positioned, mirror-image heart, conveying Escada's customary sensual femininity. Crafted from 100 percent luxury viscose crepe, it is light to the touch and drapes gracefully. Unlined so as not to add bulk, it measures 22 inches in length from the waist and is available for \$395.

When the chill does eventually set in, Escada's wool cashmere cape will wrap you up in style. Designed with a relaxed shape for easy layering, the striking plum-purple hue gets along well with a spectrum of palettes for the season's wardrobe. Constructed of 90 percent wool and 10 percent cashmere, the cape is unlined with an open front and patch pockets. This eye-catcher may be purchased for \$1,895.

Some of Escada's most distinctive characteristics are embroidery and elaborately designed knitted fashions. The wool embroidered cardigan is inspired by this Escada heritage, featuring a vibrant floral motif of rich pinks, blues and yellows, embroidered with sparkly beads and sequins against rick black intarsia knit. The longline design is spun from 100 percent virgin wool and has a V-shaped front trimmed with branded buttons. The long-sleeved cardigan sells for \$1,250.

The wool and silk cardigan is a cheerful piece with an all-over, multicolor tweed print, inspired by vintage Escada fabrics. Spun from the finest wool-silk yarns, 75 percent wool and 25 percent silk to be exact, this spunky little sweater has a round-neck silhouette with delicate buttons down the front. The fitted styling has rib-knit neckline, cuffs and hem and measures 23 inches in length from center back. This dignified cardigan makes a handsome twin set when layered over the matching short sleeve top, with both pieces creating a trompe l'oeil effect of dimension and texture. Designed in primary hues of red, blue, green and yellow, the vivid colors pop against the black background and separates. The cardigan is available for \$995 and the matching top is available for \$550.

As the ideal complement for both cardigans, Escada's wool flared pants are crafted from 98 percent virgin wool with two percent elastane to provide just a touch of stretch. These classic pants flatter all body shapes, as they are styled with a flared leg that hits at the ankle while pressed pleats offer a lengthening effect. Accented with welt pockets at the back and Escada logo detail at the hip, these have a price tag of \$650.

Escada proves time and time again that it's about much more than unique designs with exquisite inlays, sumptuous fabrics and unconventional combinations of colors and patterns. The brand and its designs generate looks that communicate cool, timeless glamour and reinforce a woman's individuality. Young fashionistas can rest assured that the future is bright, if generations of loyal followers of the Escada lifestyle are any indication.

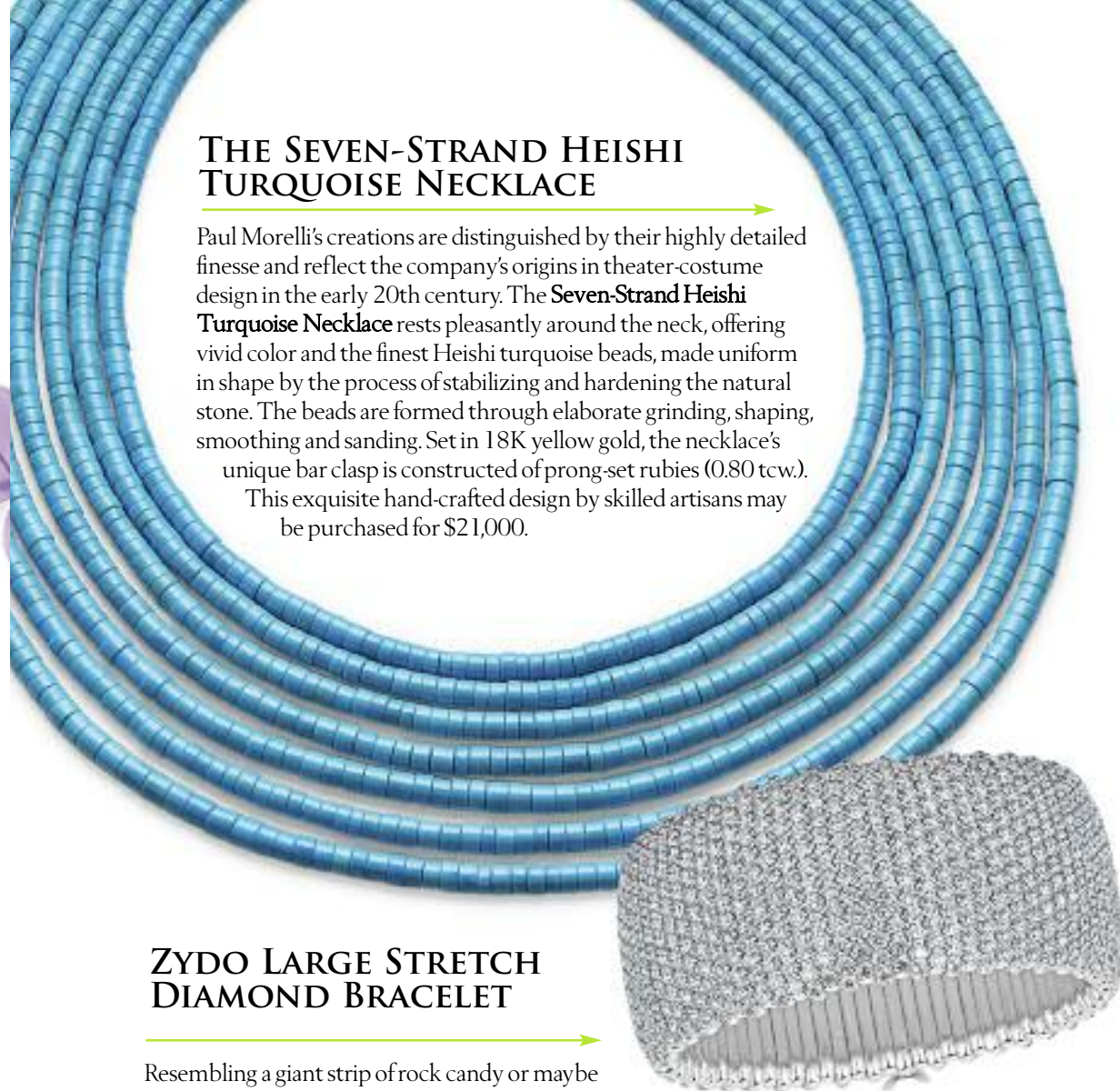
BUDDHA MAMA HEXAGON DROP EARRINGS

ZYDO LARGE STRETCH DIAMOND BRACELET

Resembling a giant strip of rock candy or maybe the walls of an Alpine ice grotto in Switzerland, the **Zydo Large Stretch Diamond Bracelet** instantly confers an air of sophistication and empowerment. From the Stretch Collection, this cuff is the star of the show, requiring simplicity and minimalism in the remainder of the ensemble.
