

This is our final edition of the season here in the desert; however, golf continues to grow, even in the hottest months, and we know many of you will be out on the southwest's great courses during our hiatus.





thing of breathtaking beauty. You can celebrate in its wonder, but then again, it is also dangerous-especially on a golf course. On a golf course, water is a place to avoid, a place where good rounds and hopes for victory can be washed away in the smallest of splashes.

At the Kraft Nabisco Championship, water has taken on a whole new meaning.

The final hole on the Dinah Shore Tournament Course at Mission Hills Country Club in Rancho Mirage will beckon the best of the LPGA when the Kraft Nabisco Championship, the year's first major, is played April 3-6. The green on the closing par-5 is an island. Surrounded by water.

Those trying to reach the green in two must calm both fears and nerves. Those playing the hole as a "three-shooter" will still face a challenge to find dry land. But



that one player who takes the win on championship Sunday will have another perspective on the final green; she will see it as a diving board—and that's a good thing!

Since Amy Alcott first plunged into Poppie's Pond following her win at the Kraft Nabisco (it was called the Kraft Nabisco Dinah Shore back then), each winner of the LPGA's first major championship of the season has gotten at least her feet wet. It's all part of a very special sorority on the LPGA Tour. The members are called the "Ladies of the Lake." They are also called the champions. It's a tradition in professional golf unlike any other.

Last year, Morgan Pressel had to wait awhile before taking the plunge. She had started the final round of the 2007 Kraft Nabisco Championship trailing—by a bunch. Pressel had improved each day, carding rounds of 74-72-70, but after signing her final round 69, the 18-year-old couldn't do anything but watch and wait.

The wait was worth it as Catriona Matthew, Brittany Lincicome and especially Suzann Pettersen failed to climb past her on the large leaderboard sitting behind the famously island green of the 18th hole on the Dinah Shore Course.

And when Pressel finally hit the water, she had company. She was joined in the swim-fest by her caddie Jon Yarborough and grandmother, Evelyn Krickstein. Pressel was raised by her grandparents after the death ofher mother when the champion-to-be was just 14.

"I know that my mother is always with me," Pressel said after becoming the youngest player in LPGA history to win a major championship. "And I'm sure she is proud of me.

"I would like to thank my grandparents for everything they have done for me and for all of their support and their love. I'm sure they are just as happy for me as I am."



Pressel will return to defend her title when the 2008 edition of the tournament is held in April. She'll be ready for another chance to hit the water, but she'll also have plenty of company in the fight to wear the white bathrobe that goes to the winner.

While other seasons on the LPGA Tour have gotten off to spectacular starts, nothing can rank with the way the current



season has started. Annika Sorenstam, the Swede who dominated on the LPGA Tour for more than a decade before suffering a back and neck injury last year, won the SBS Open at Turtle Bay Resort in Hawaii to send the signal that she is back.

Paula Creamer, the young American gun, then captured the Fields Open in Hawaii to also let the women's golf world know that she is ready for the challenge every time she sticks a tee in the




But the first line in the sand for 2008 was drawn at the Tanah Merah Country Club in Singapore when Lorena Ochoa, in her first start of the season, blitzed the field at the HSBC Women's Champions, winning by a whopping 11 shots.

And there will be others at Mission Hills, too. Former champion Karrie Webb and defending U.S. Open champion Cristie Kerr will be hoping to go for a swim come championship Sunday. Pettersen, who finished just one shot behind Pressel last year but then went on a tear the rest of the 2007 season, is also expected to join the battle for the first-place check of \$300,000.

"It's special having an event so close to home," says Castrale, a desert resident for much of her life.

Location isn't a factor in terms of preparation. Castrale points out that all tournaments are important no matter where they're played. But location does matter in another way for the Californian, whose family has always been very close. "The only thing I'll do different for this tournament," she says, breaking into an infectious grin, "is figure out how many extra tickets we need for family and

Looking every bit the California native, fashionably dressed in jeans, T-shirt, boots and trendy sunglasses, Castrale sat down with Desert Golf Magazine at Starbucks on El Paseo, the desert's version of Rodeo Drive. "I love to go shopping here when I'm home," the 29-year-old says, looking comfortable and confident.

Experiencing a breakthrough season in 2007 with her first LPGA victory at the Ginn Tribute, hosted by Annika Sorenstam,


> The goal was attaining an extra five or 10 yards off the tee. "Five yards is a lot," she says. "Five yards means I can now get to the par-5s in two, where before I may have had to decide to lay up or not."

With the help of her coach, Bill Harmon of Toscana Country Club in Indian Wells, she made only minimal changes to her game. "We haven't changed her overall swing. What was there was very, very good," Harmon says. "We've worked on a lot of different shots—high draws, low draws, cuts, things like that."

Currently living next door to her parents in Palm Desert, Castrale says it was her parent's life-altering early decisions that made her "dream life" of today possible. "My parents have been so supportive throughout my whole career. My mom and brother and I moved to the desert when I was in the 8th grade so that my



brother and I could play golf." During this same time, Castrale's older sister and father stayed in Glendale where his business is. Though the sacrifices were many, the close-knit family endured and is thrilled with the outcome.



when we are home," she says. When they're not eating in, the couple's favorite restaurant for dinner is Pacifica in Palm Desert. "We go there more than any other restaurant because we have a lot of fun there and the food is great."

Glancing at her watch, Castrale admits that she has planned an afternoon of shopping with her mother, a special time the two look forward to when Castrale is in town. That leaves time for just one more question.

Asked to describe her life in one sentence, Castrale hesitates. "One sentence? Can it be a long one?" But her thoughtfulness and insights are actually very concise. "I feel very blessed to be able to do what I do and be given a talent and to use it in the manner that I can be a role model not only for young girls, but even for adults."

The other mainstay in Castrale's life is Craig, a professional caddy with a degree in finance. They met in 2002 at a tournament in New York, began dating in May 2003, were engaged by December of that year and married in 2005. Castrale describes her husband as "my best friend and an incredible partner. I never handle my mail and Craig handles all of the finances," she says with obvious devotion.

Craig has also been her caddy for several years, and the close bond between the duo shines on the golf course. "We are a team, even when our opinions differ, we always respect what the other one is saying," Castrale notes. This team plans to have children in the future and looks forward to that time; but for now, the priorities are on business and being the best competitor.

In addition to working out in the gym, improving her golfgame and competing in tournaments, Castrale also knows how to have fun. "When I'm off I like to be off and be at home. I hang out and watch my shows that I've Tivo'd, and my whole family is Greek Orthodox and that's a big part of my life."

Castrale also loves to cook. What is Craig's favorite dish? "Lamb chops, he loves lamb chops, so I'll do that at least once

INTRODUCING THE PHOENIX CELEBRITY CLASSIC



THIS NEW TOURNAMENT IN TOWN IS GOING TO BE ONE TO REMEMBER

DO YOU WANT TO PLAY GOLF WITH NFL GREAT THURMAN THOMAS? OR MAYBE YOU'D LIKE TO HOBNOB WITH THE 44TH VICE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, DAN QUAYLE? YOUR CHANCE TO DO JUST THAT IS COMING MAY 7-10 AT A BRAND NEW GOLF TOURNAMENT, THE PHOENIX CELEBRITY CLASSIC

The Phoenix Celebrity Classic will take place at the AAA Four-diamond Pointe Hilton Tapatio Cliffs Resort, and the tournament will be played at Lookout Mountain Golf Club at Tapatio Cliffs. The 6,535-yard, par-71 layout is among Arizona's top golf courses, one that provides an enviable combination of challenging play and drop-dead gorgeous Sonoran Desert scenery. Champions Tour players have coined it the "Champagne Stop" on their tour.

There are a multitude of charity tournaments around the country, but this one figures to be a little different for a number of reasons.

To start, Tournament Director, Nick Schmitz, former president of the Celebrity Players Tour, has longtime, personal relationships with an expansive A-list of athletes, actors and entertainers, and he has handpicked the participating celebrities for this event.

"I chose them because they're great people who enjoy being accessible and who enjoy giving back," Schmitz says.





In fact, accessibility at this event is part of what sets it apart. While other tournaments give amateur players access to celebrities primarily on the golf course, the Phoenix Celebrity Classic is going to put participants together on the course, at breakfast, at each of the evening events and even for a beer or cigar after a round of golf. And not just participants who pay for premium sponsorships, but those who pay for just one round of golf, too. Schmitz says he expects 50 to 60 celebrities to participate.

Schmitz also handpicked the charity, one in sync with his passion to make a difference. Only recently transplanted to Phoenix from back east, Schmitz was looking for a non-profit partner for his new tournament. After speaking with a woman whose son had benefited from services provided by the Foundation for Blind Children, located in Phoenix, he knew he had found the non-profit he was looking for.

He also saw immediately how his tournament could help the Foundation—by providing money for a capital fund created to build a secondary school for blind and visually impaired children.



Foundation Executive Director, Marc Ashton, has guaranteed that all monies raised by the tournament will go to that fund so middle-school kids can stay in a program that provides for their specific needs rather than being mainstreamed into the public school system.

Schmitz doesn't have any children of his own, but that hasn't lessened his passion for this project. "I love kids," he says, and you can hear in his voice that he does.

The event will include two days of Celebrity-Am competition (Thursday and Friday) and one day of Celebrity-only play (Saturday). There will also be three nights of evening functions and events that include live and silent auctions as well as headline entertainment.

Schmitz has set up the pricing to attract every level of participant, from individuals who don't want to break the bank to corporations in a position to give generously and to benefit from extensive exposure in a marquis event—including national network television coverage to 60 million households. At every level, participants get a lot for their money.

"It's a VIP experience from start to finish, "Schmitz says. An individual can pay for one day of golf with a celebrity or two days on the course (playing with a different celebrity each day), but either way the fee includes lodging for three days, two tickets to each of the three evening events and 100-percent time spent with

celebrities chatting, getting autographs and raising money together.

Foursomes can sign up, too, opting for packages that include lodging or not, making the Classic attractive to golfers in the Phoenix metropolitan area.

Naturally there is also every level of sponsorship, from \$15,000 for Hole-in-One and Long-Drive sponsorships, for example, to \$425,000 for title sponsorship.

Schmitz, whose considerable experience with celebrity tournaments gives him a realistic perspective, says, "The first year is always the hardest to get going." But that experience also tells him that he has found a winning combination in the setting, the charity and the celebrities who are already on board.

"Phoenix didn't have a tournament exactly like this one," he says, "so it's an ideal venue. I also wanted to partner with a non-profit group that, like the tournament itself, is growing, as opposed to other charitable beneficiaries that are already well supported by the community."

Schmitz is looking to forge a long-term partnership with the Foundation for Blind Children, and he's committed to making the Phoenix Celebrity Classic an annual event. What better opportunity for sponsors, especially corporate sponsors, than to get in on the ground floor of a tournament with a long and distinguished future in front of it?

Schmitz is so committed to the success of this project that he relocated to Phoenix to work on it. He felt it was important to talk to people face to face to get the event off the ground, and one of his core tenets has been to make the tournament a real part of the



Phoenix community, benefiting and giving back to members of that community.

It's hard not to feel equally enthusiastic about it when you talk to him. If passion and commitment guarantee success—and they usually do—the Phoenix Celebrity Classic is well on its way.

Each year the Shelter From The Storm event is designed to "wow" participants with its lavishly beautiful setting and top-name entertainment in an atmosphere of camaraderie and fun. And each year it does exactly that.

But it's also one of the most critical events of the season, a fundraiser for the Coachella Valley's only shelter-based provider of emergency and adjunctive services for women and children who are victims of domestic violence and abuse. Sadly, the number of victims needing these services is growing. Even sadder, funding for these life-saving services is decreasing.



"This year's event is more important than ever," says Lynn Moriarty, executive director of the non-profit Shelter From The Storm (SFTS). "In California we are facing dire budgetary cuts; there are 10-percent cuts across the board."

While that doesn't sound like much, it is, in fact, a lot. SFTS's emergency shelters are primarily funded by the state. "When you're already operating on a shoestring," Morarty points out, "10 percent is a huge cut." Add to that the fact that SFTS also depends on funds from the county and the city, and those funds are being cut 10 percent as well.





Last year the Casablanca Nights Gala raised more than \$400,000. This year, says Moriarty, "We are lighting candles in hopes of raising even more."

Blixseth, who is president of the SFTS Board of Directors, has known abuse firsthand in her life. Her book on the subject, *Uncharged Battery*, was published in 1989; it's a book she wrote to help inspire women to find the strength and means to leave abusive relationships. Not content with just that, Blixseth then put her commitment to ending domestic violence to work at SFTS. Now,

for the seventh year, she is opening up her home to the fundraising event of the season.

The 7th Annual Gala, which is hosted by Blixseth, takes place on Friday night, April 25, at Porcupine Creek in Blixseth's spectacular 32,000-square-foot mansion. Elaborate decorations, fabulous food, dancing, entertainment and a live auction create an evening that is so spectacular it takes the breath away—even among guests who are used to the most spectacular of parties and fundraisers.

Of course, few homes, even in the Palm Springs area, have a private golf course in their backyard, and this one isn't just any golf course. Porcupine Creek is a superb, 18-hole championship course that has been rated among California's top 30 public or private golf



courses by *Golf Digest*. An invitation to play it is one of the most coveted invitations in town. Happily, this year's event on Saturday, April 26, is a chance for Coachella Valley residents and others to see the exclusive course up close and personal, and to experience both its challenges and its exceptionally maintained beauty.

An avid golfer, Blixseth is always among the tournament participants. For the past few years her foursome has included close friends Mary Hart of *Entertainment Tonight*, United States Congresswoman Mary Bono and fellow SFTS board member Mary Heckmann. The group usually does well, and has even won a couple of times.

Participation in the event is available at several levels. The cost of golf for one plus dinner for two is \$2,500, while just dinner is available for \$500. Participants can also buy entire tables for the dinner, a cost that ranges from \$10,000 to \$25,000. Those who generously purchase \$25,000 tables are among the privileged few that will be invited to attend a pre-event private cocktail party in the main residence.

"This year we are hoping for many of the \$25,000 tables," says Moriarty.

There is no question that the money goes to an important cause, one that is essential to women and children who don't have the power on their own to make their voices heard.

Shelter From The Storm is one of the nation's largest and most comprehensive providers of programs dedicated to abused women and children. It offers, in-house, all of the essential programs needed



Prevention and Education Program offered in local high schools, one of the only programs of its kind in the Valley at a time when dating violence among teenagers is on the rise. Shelter From the Storm also provides individual and group counseling for women as well as for children, and it offers a parenting group, too.

These may not seem like life-and-death services, but the truth is, they are. "The lives of people depend on these programs," says Moriarty, "now more than ever."



The Bridges at Rancho Santa Fe has achieved its goal—golf course, homes, clubhouse, amenities and even the membership roster all deliver. Try to describe the results without using overworked adjectives and you'll be reaching for a thesaurus

When developers first saw the 540 acres of coastal foothills that would become The Bridges golf community, they were mentally transported to the charmed countryside of Tuscany. Inspired, they created a sprawling, majestic clubhouse reminiscent of an Old World castle that is both a landmark and the cornerstone of the community. It's accented with a vineyard that annually produces 200 cases of The Bridges' private-label wine—a tangible metaphor for celebrating life lived high on the vine. Plush villas and magnificent custom homes continue the idyllic Italian theme while retaining individuality. A Robert Trent Jones II golf course was carefully and specifically designed to integrate into the picture-perfect landscape, and its two namesake, canyon-spanning bridges have become unique signature pieces.




The golf course could stand on its own merits but unquestionably adds to the community's allure. Site of Tiger Woods' series of prime-time "Battle at The Bridges" matches, the intricate Par-71 course runs almost 7,000 yards with non-stop views that belong on postcards. Its stress-ribbon concrete bridges are 285 yards in length, connecting Holes 10, 11 and 12 over deep canyons, giving testimony to the environmentally sensitive planning that went into both course and community. Gordon Cooke, membership and real estate sales director, has played a lot of golf courses but is enamored with this one. What do members tell him?

"It's a memorable course that is fair," he says. "With 96 teeboxes offering totally different play, you don't get tired of it. It's an exciting, enjoyable experience. Some courses can look similar, but a lot of our holes are distinctly unique. Anyone will remember No. 18, a Par 4 with a spectacular view with the backdrop of our clubhouse, a magnificent structure that sits on a hill. All of the holes are individually framed...you don't see anyone else. Other places will have balls flying left and right. Here, you're on each teebox looking at a beautiful hole, ready to play it."

Homeowners at The Bridges are not automatically inducted into the club, but an astonishing 85 percent choose to participate with golf or social memberships. Golfers enjoy





all club amenities and pay a one-time initiation fee of \$350,000, with monthly dues just under \$1,600. For social members, it's \$100,000 and \$619 a month to access everything except the links: use of the entire 10,000-square-foot Sports Centre, a plethora of opulent spa services and participation in club events. Within the 36,000 sumptuous square feet of The Bridges' clubhouse, all members enjoy niceties that include a boardroom and winetasting room, along with ultra-fine dining. In addition to the working vineyard, an onsite organic garden grows 80 percent of the produce used at the club, while select entrées utilize revered Brandt Beef.

Even with luxurious amenities, it takes a village to create a quality, convivial club atmosphere. "The facility, the golf course and amenities and service—even the quality of food—are unparalleled," says Cooke. "But we also have great people. They have proven to be an essential element of the community, able to integrate and be part of the club. It's a conduit for community, moving from another state and being able to connect and make friends."

PGA champ Phil Mickelson is a golf member, but Cooke says there's still a misconception that because of its elite status The Bridges' membership is made up primarily of retirees. "In reality, it is a very vibrant community of all demographics and all ages. It seems to be growing more with younger families and business executives and entrepreneurs. It's a very dynamic club...a fun, hip,



fairly young crowd. It's private, but a friendly and inviting place."

National memberships are an option for anyone living and owning property outside of San Diego County. Non-resident golf members receive full benefits, paying a 40-percent equity initiation fee and dues that are half of full-equity memberships.

Breaking ground in 1999, the community of 256 home sites has been so well received that only a handful of lots remain. Homes represent a wide variety of choices. Villas from 3,000 to 3,800 square feet are available for \$1.8 to \$2.8 million. Large, custom-built homes are priced just below \$9 million. The Cotile Collection ("cotile" is "courtyard" in Italian) is made up of 44 limited-edition, Tuscan-styled manors ranging from 4,400 to 5,500 square feet, selling for an attractive \$2.8 to \$3.8 million. Rich, Old World Mediterranean nuances complement state-of-the-art appliances and media wiring, and a spacious floor plan is enhanced by each home's centerpiece—a namesake peaceful, inviting courtyard.

"We are experiencing the first real-estate market shift that was not initiated by a recession," says Newton. "Basically, this market collapsed from the bottom up, not the top down, therefore the higher end has had some insulation."

Confirming this fact are real-estate agents throughout California, Arizona and Nevada who are saying that the more expensive the property, the faster the sale. These same agents are also advising, "know your market." While many markets are doing fine, others aren't, and the wise buyer will know the difference. To find out how a particular area is faring, log onto ofheo.gov, website of the Office of Federal Housing Enterprise Oversight. The site posts quarterly reports on home-pricing appreciation trends in 275 markets.

Yet even in those markets that are not as strong as others, sellers and buyers can still come out of a deal doing well.

BUYING TIPS

According to Bernie Deckys, a manager of Costco Real Estate Services, sellers are more willing to negotiate. There are many more homes for sale, they are taking longer to sell and sellers are reducing prices and more frequently paying a portion of the closing costs."

However, don't lowball the seller because it won't work, adds Deckys. "Offending a seller will most likely cause them to not want to negotiate." At the same time, there is nothing wrong with asking for a few extras. "In a buyer's market," Deckys points out, "you don't have to accept worn hardwoods, cracked

In addition to what sellers offer, listing agents in some markets may be willing to work for less than the traditional 3 percent.

SELLING TIPS

You've probably heard the term "curb appeal." Surveys indicate that a clean house with a fresh coat of paint and dazzling flowers out front can help potential buyers form a positive first impression. Now there's also what might be called





"virtual appeal." Deckys says that "84 percent of home buyers use the Internet to search for homes, and one third of home buyers use the Internet first, before any other source." That means presenting your house well online can determine whether buyers will even consider looking at it in person.

There are also key rooms in your home that can make or break a deal. According to the National Association of Realtors (NAR), 59 percent of homebuyers in 2007 remodeled or made improvements to their homes/key rooms within three months of



purchase. Of those, 47 percent made improvements to the kitchen, 45 percent remodeled or improved a bathroom and 43 percent remodeled a bedroom. Budget permitting, if you're thinking of making improvements in your home before selling it, focus on these key rooms to enhance buyer appeal.

Essay contests

For the seller: Essay contests are a lot of work and take a lot of upfront money with no guaranteed success. Robert Irwin, author of *The Armchair Real Estate Investor*, says to be realistic about your home's appeal. If it's an historic gem, it may inspire essayists. 

For the seller: Free stuff is great, but cash incentives may be the deciding factor for many buyers.



Going green has its part in this ever-changing world of carbon emissions, and luxury has only flirted with the concept until now. The new Tesla Roadster is changing everything. This electric-powered dynamo has the guts and the intellect to make driving easy on the conscience and still exciting.

Say goodbye to the rounded, bubble-like proto types of the mainstream hybrid revolution. Those cars wouldn't know performance if they were parked on Broadway. Tesla is aiming to shatter the misconception that you can't boast about your vehicle's 0 to 60 time and still go easy on the ozone.

You know that feeling when it seems gravity has suddenly turned sideways to pin you to the driver's seat, when the whole earth is spinning in a direction to force you against the leather? That isn't some driving god enacting a mythical spell. That feeling is torque, and the new Tesla Roadster has it pouring from every seam.

Much has been made of the preliminary production talk surrounding this car. Several aspects of the Tesla Roadster pay homage to the Lotus Elise. The chassis, for example, shares features, and the dash and steering wheel are nearly identical. Tesla is quick to point out that they are very different machines, however.

"One of the more common misconceptions about the Tesla Roadster is that it is an electrified Lotus Elise," says Darryl Siry, vice





president of sales, marketing and service. "If you were to try to convert an Elise to a Tesla and started throwing away parts that aren't carried over, what you would basically be left with is a windshield, dashboard (complete with airbags), front wishbones and a removable soft top."

The difference, perhaps, is most startling when you turn the key and hear silence. Well, a series of recognitions gives the green light to go, but otherwise, simply silence. No piston grumble, starter grinding, camshaft whirring or exhaust heaving.

Aside from the fact that sitting at a stoplight creates less greenhouse gas than a dairy farm, perhaps the greatest result of the electric vehicle movement is the quiet that comes with the absence of combustion. If you are one whose heart races at the baritone song of a muscle car, the Tesla will get your adrenaline meter into high gear.

Push the accelerator and wham! This is an instant lesson in the laws of torque and power. Torque is the only thing a driver actually feels. Most combustion engines operate under what is called a toque curve—reaching maximum glue-you-toyour-seat torque in a range between 2,000 and 5,000 rpm.

The Tesla Roadster has a torque curve that plateaus at zero rpm with the tabletop running through 6,000 rpm. That means rocket propulsion through what most cars consider the red line. The roadster doesn't even think red until 13,000 rpm. Prepare to peel yourself from the interior.

"I really think this is the most fun car I've ever owned, beating out the McLaren F1 and my 2007 Porsche 911 Turbo," Tesla Board Chairman, Elon Musk writes on his



are expected to last between 100,000 and 150,000 miles. Talk around the electricvehicle market is that advances in battery efficiency and charge rates will someday make worries about range and wait to charge sound like discussion of dial-up Internet service.

According to Tesla's figures, after calculating the cost of the electricity you're looking at about a 135-mpg equivalent or two cents per mile. That may make the price tag look reasonable.

Priced at \$98,000, the Roadster inventory is already spoken for in 2008.

blog. "You can achieve max acceleration every time with ease. Try to do that on a Viper or a Porsche Carrera GT and you'll burn out your clutch within a week and destroy your rear tires."

The result of a transmission redesign was a stronger power center and a one-gear drive train. Now, says Tesla, the Roadster will whisk its tree-hugging owners from 0 to 60 in 3.9 seconds, and do it while making every hybrid car look like a geriatric gasguzzler.

The Tesla Roadster is able to run for about 200 miles on every charge. Batteries


While Tesla Motors sets up its sales facilities in Menlo Park, Calif. and West Los Angeles, potential buyers will have to scramble to get on the waiting list for a 2009 model. You can find details on the website at teslamotors.com.
