BUT IT WILL NO DOUBT GO INTO THE BOOKS
AS ONE EVERYONE WANTS TO PLAY IN

LAS VEGAS WILL PROBABLY NEVER LOSE ITS SIN CITY MONIKER, BUT THERE ARE MANY FACETS TO THIS DESERT TOWN. FABULOUS GOLF DESTINATION IS ONE OF THEM. HOST OF MEGA CHARITY EVENTS IS ANOTHER. AND ONE OF THE MOST POPULAR STOPS ON THE PGA TOUR FALL CLASSIC SERIES IS YET ANOTHER

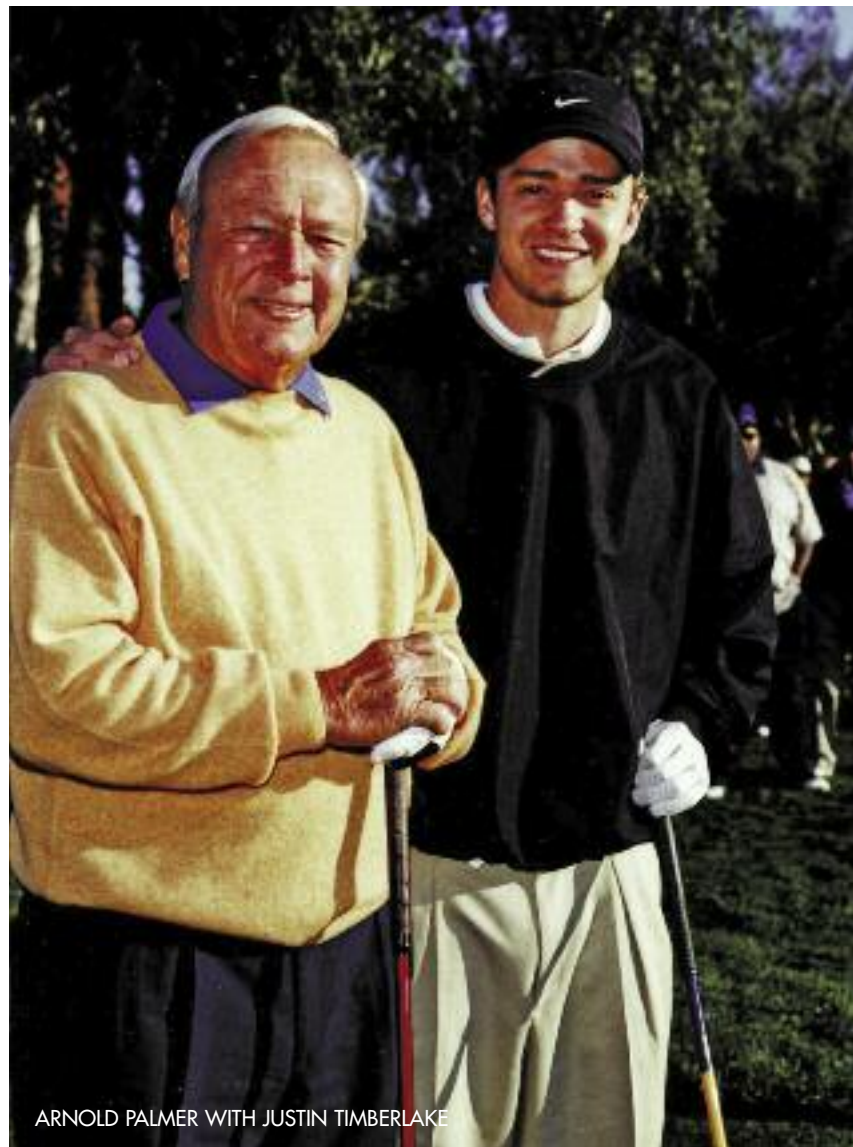


This October, the Justin Timberlake Shriners Hospitals for Children Open will bring all three of those facets together—and you're invited.

The tournament, which will be played at the TPC at Summerlin, is the PGA Tour's 26th annual Las Vegas event, yet there's much that's new this year—including the participation of Justin Timberlake.

In case you've been a recluse on another planet for the past decade, or perhaps if you're merely over 50, Timberlake is the six-time Grammy winner who became a mega celebrity as a member of mega band NSYNC, which Rolling Stone magazine once called "the biggest band in the world."

Here's the thing: Not only can Timberlake sing, dance and make girls swoon, he can play golf. He can play golf well. And he's serious about it.

Gary Davis, executive chairman of the tournament, says, "Justin is a real good golfer. He enjoys the sport and he takes it very seriously; but he also has a lot of fun."

And fun, notes Davis, is one thing that sets the Fall Classic series, and this event in particular, apart from PGA Tour events leading up to the FedEx Cup.

"Las Vegas is one of the great resort cities in the world and it's fun to come here," Davis says. "As one of the seven tournaments after the FedEx series ends, this is a tournament where we want the PGA professionals to have fun."



To that end, professionals will have an extra day of play on their own, without amateur participants. Pro-Am events will take place on Monday and Wednesday, the pros will play Thursday and Friday and the cut will be on Friday night, leaving the top guys to battle it out over the weekend.

If you're ready to join a foursome with a PGA professional, the tournament's defending champion, George McNeill, has some advice for you.

"Leading up to the event practice your short game," he says. "Even though the primary goal for these events is to have fun and raise money for charity, if you want to contribute to the team, focus on your short game. The long game is the glamorous part, but if you really want to score and help your team, practice your short game."

McNeill also wants amateur participants to know that professionals are just normal people who were once amateurs, too. They know what it's like to go through the learning process so you don't need to be nervous about your game.

The tournament will take place on just one golf course this year, rather than

multiple courses as in previous years. Not only is that of importance to players, it's of importance to spectators, too, because changes have been made to the TPC course that make it extraordinarily spectator-friendly. The area known as The Hill, overlooking the 16th, 17th and 18th holes, was created specifically to give spectators an amazing view of the finishing holes, Las Vegas skyline and Red Rock Canyon. In true Vegas style, it's a luxury "entertainment pavilion" with seating, bars and large plasma screen TVs.

There's more than tournament play to entice spectators. This year, numerous top

Las Vegas chefs and restaurants are participating in Restaurant Row on the Hill, where players and fans can get fabulous food at reasonable prices. And renowned instructor Butch Harmon will run a clinic Saturday afternoon. He'll have professionals there with him and word is that Timberlake will participate as well.

Additionally, organizers are bringing back one of last year's most popular moments of the event, Military Appreciation, which will also take place Saturday afternoon. Like last year, men and women from nearby Nellis Air Force Base will be part of that celebration.

That takes care of the golf aspect. And the fun aspect. But at the core of this event are children in need of orthopedic and burn care, and their families who cannot always afford to get that help.

Davis has great admiration for Shriners hospitals—20 of them across the United States and one each in Mexico and Canada.

"Almost 95 cents of every dollar raised is going to bottom-line patient care," he says, and that's a huge distinction from many charitable organizations where a hefty percentage of monies raised actually goes to administrative costs. "And these hospitals treat children at no cost to parents."



The difference comes down to the fact that this event is all about volunteerism. Davis, who expects to work from 4:30 a.m. to 11 p.m. during the event to make sure all goes right, is a volunteer. He's not alone.

"Everything I do as Chair of the Executive Committee, and all of the Shriner officers and the Shriners of the national organization—it's all volunteer work," he says.

Justin Timberlake is doing his part, too. He's putting on a private concert on Friday evening for the golf professionals and amateur participants and their families and guests. If you're one of the five people on the planet who missed Justin when he performed (with NSYNC) in concerts, at the Academy Awards, World Series, Super Bowl or the Olympics, this is your chance.

The good news is that Timberlake and the Shriners have committed to five years with the event, so you'll have plenty of opportunities to join in the fun and support a critically important cause for families across North America.

A WHOLE NEW BALL GAME

Eddie Grant is a former Arizona State football standout who also played three years with the Detroit Lions in the National Football League. In 2007 he was named junior golf director of the Southwest Section of the PGA, and he has already made a substantial impact in his new role.

Grant, who played at ASU from 1985-89 and with the Lions from 1990-92 as a deep snapper, was looking for an opportunity to work with children. "I love being able to do that," he says. "It's the greatest reward in the world to be able to work with kids."

The Southwest Section PGA's junior golf program has doubled its level of participation each year over the past several years, and

The demanding 36-hole, stroke-play events have routinely identified the finest junior golfers in the Southwest.

Among them is Trey Kaahanui, 14, a ninth-grader from Tempe who beat some of the nation's top American Junior Golf Association (AJGA) players at the ReBath Heather Farr Classic at Longbow Golf Club in Mesa this spring. Kaahanui bested a field of golfers three to four years his senior, including six Rolex Junior All-Americans. Five shots back in second place was Nicholas Losole III of Scottsdale, another regular in the PING Junior Players Series.

Only 13, Kyung Kim of Chandler has also emerged as a star for Grant. She won the first three PING Series events this year and

Grant, 40, is happy to step into a situation where success is both profound and meaningful. He is especially proud of the players in the PING Junior Golf Series.

The high-level tournament series will showcase seven two-day events in 2008. At press time five were in the books, but still on the docket are **The Southern Nevada Junior Championships** August 9-10 at The Las Vegas Paiute Golf Resort in Las Vegas, and the season-ending **2008 PING Junior Players Series Tour Championship** at Troon North Golf Club in Scottsdale, August 23-24.

then beat several Rolex Junior All-Americans at the ReBath Heather Farr to win the Girls Division. Playing in only her third AJGA event, Kim outperformed one of the highest ranked players in the country—15-year-old Danielle Frasier of Encinitas, Calif., a two-time Rolex Junior All-American.

To put Trey and Kyung's accomplishments in perspective, the event featured 138 players from 20 states, Canada, the Cayman Islands and Scotland. The field consisted of 90 boys and 48 girls, ages 12-18 and included 15 Rolex Junior All-Americans.

Other top players competing in Grant's PING Junior Series events include Alberto Sanchez of Nogales, Blake Brown of Scottsdale, Chun-Ji Kim of Chandler, Chan Kim of Chandler, Jordan Rodgers of Salt Lake City, Kimberly Kim, the 2006 U.S. Women's Amateur Champion from Chandler and Julie Yang of Phoenix.

Grant would like these tournaments to be a platform—and training ground—for top junior golfers, and just as importantly, for good citizens. "We want to offer the best local level tournaments in the country and train our kids to compete on a national level. We also want them to be well-rounded, contributing members of society."

As the Southwest Section PGA's junior golf leader, Grant also oversees its Antigua Junior Tour (affordable tournaments in 12 different section districts) and the U.S. Kids Tour (for ages 12 and under). Grant says the U.S. Kids Tour recently inked a deal to bring 500 young players to the Wigwam Resort in Litchfield Park in December for an annual international world qualifier.

"Everybody comes to us for this world-level championship," he says. "It's very exciting for Arizona golf."

A visionary, Grant has big plans for the 2009 tournament season. To kick it off in January, he hopes to partner with organizers of the FBR Open in Scottsdale, one of the PGA Tour's most popular events, to co-host a three-day FBR Junior Open preceding the main event.

"We think this type of event will build even more credibility," Grant says, "and get some of these kids even more exposure."

Grant, a father of three, developed a keen interest in golf after his professional football career came to a close. "I wanted to take that

competitive fire I had from football and transition it to golf," he says, and by the late 1990s he was down to a four handicap. By his own admission, he can hit the ball pretty far, "But I can't seem to finish very well," he adds.

It appears that won't be a problem with his latest job.

TEE OFF WITH GPS



THE TRIED-AND-TRUE TECHNOLOGY IS NOT JUST FOR PILOTS AND BOATERS ANYMORE

ON THE COASTS OF SCOTLAND AND IRELAND, ON PURE LINKS GOLF COURSES, DISTANCE MARKERS ARE RARE. AND WHERE DISTANCE INDICATORS DO EXIST, THEY ARE SOMEWHAT UNRELIABLE. IN FACT, THEY ARE USUALLY TOTALLY UNRELIABLE

In certain cases, people in charge of installing the markers have had a “long” lunch so that 150 yards might mean 150 yards to the middle of the green or the front of the green or even the side. Factor in wind, rain, ground conditions and hole location and a yardage marker is pretty much a total waste of time. A golfer has to rely on feel and intuition to make shots, though a caddy can be a significant help, especially when it’s windy.

Moving inland, assessing distance is more scientific, especially when the wind is down.

For better players, knowing the correct yardage to the hole from the fairway is vital. When playing an iron, for example, a professional can add or subtract five yards simply by hitting the club “hard” or “easy.” A good caddy will always note the distance as “155 yards” rather than “about 150.”

For at least ten years, many upscale golf courses have installed GPS systems in their golf carts. This technology definitely provides accurate distance information, but there are drawbacks. For example, what happens when fairways are wet and golf carts must stick to cart paths? Or what happens if you’re a purist who only walks the course and who believes that golf carts should be banned?

One of the most important advances in golf technology is the arrival of hand-held GPS systems specifically designed for golfers. Hikers have been using GPS for several years as an aid to navigating in difficult terrain. Now golfers have the same technology, but organized to help players navigate a golf course. Off the tee, a golfer using this technology can accurately determine the exact yardage to a stream, pond or bunker. From the fairway, a hand-held GPS can provide the precise distance to the hole.

Naturally, a GPS cannot determine the club you should use or calculate adjustments you must make for wind, rain and other environmental factors; however, knowing the exact distance to a target can be a major help to players of all abilities.

There are several hand-held GPS systems on the market and each has its unique benefits and features. All you have to do is figure out which one is the right tool for you.

Golf Buddy Plus (\$349) continuously calculates distance to the target and can store information for up to 1,000 golf courses, many of which are pre-loaded so you can use the product immediately.

The biggest name in the golf GPS market is **SkyGolf**, which offers four models. The new top-of-the-line model is SkyCaddie SG5 (\$429) with all of the bells and whistles including a color display with automatic backlight. SkyGolf’s technology lets the golfer assess the full shape and depth of the green from all angles, and the company has

digitally mapped thousands of courses around the world. For the golfer who wants all the functionality currently available, the SG5 is a good choice. The golfer who is generally not fond of technology may like the SG2.5 (\$259), which offers the same range-finding capabilities but with fewer features; it’s also the lightest and sleekest model.

SkyGolf has meticulously measured nearly 90 percent of golf courses in the United States, as well as courses overseas. In addition to purchasing the SkyCaddie model that most closely meets your needs, you will need to purchase an annual membership plan. The national plan is \$49.95 a year.

Garmin is one of the biggest names in navigational technology and it has entered the golf market. Garmin’s most recent product is the GPS-8, which the company says is the most user-friendly product on the market today. Garmin also has an impressive database of courses that users can download from the company’s website. Garmin’s plan includes one course for free and an annual membership of \$29.95. If Garmin has not mapped your course, you can ask the company to map it, a process that takes only about a week.

Another company making great strides in the GPS market is **SureShot GPS** (\$379). This sharp and user-friendly unit offers a wealth of features and the annual subscription is a budget-friendly \$19.95. The number of courses the company has mapped is steadily increasing.

One up-and-coming company is **uPlay**. uPlay’s uPro GPS has some of the most amazing graphics—and not just on a golf GPS device but on any electronic device. You can get aerial photography and even video flyovers of the hole you are playing. The cost is \$399 and there is no membership fee, although you will have to purchase the information for each course you’re going to play. For the golfer in love with his or her iPhone, uPro is *the* device.

Golf GPS systems are certainly fun, and in a game where distance control is half the battle, having the right information can make a difference. Naturally, golfers still have to hit the shot, but if nothing else, a hand-held GPS is rapidly becoming a must-have toy for serious and discerning players. Of course, it’s not an inexpensive investment and there’s a certain level of sameness entering the market. Before buying, take time to investigate each product thoroughly and assess which one has the features that are most important and helpful to you and your game.

Ryder Cup Rivalry

THE TWO TEAM CAPTAINS HAVE A LONG HISTORY OF COMPETITION, BUT WHO WILL COME OUT ON TOP IN THIS YEAR'S RYDER CUP MATCHES?

COME SEPTEMBER, PAUL AZINGER AND NICK FALDO FACE OFF AS CAPTAINS BATTLING FOR THE RYDER CUP AT THE JACK NICKLAUS-DESIGNED VALHALLA GOLF CLUB IN LOUISVILLE, KY. AZINGER AND FALDO ARE NO STRANGERS; THEIR RIVALRY GOES BACK TO THE LATE 1980S AND ENCOMPASSES TOUR CHAMPIONSHIPS AS WELL AS RYDER CUP MATCHES IN WHICH THEY WERE BOTH PLAYERS

Captain Paul Azinger

Azinger was a member of four Ryder Cup teams: 1989, 1991, 1993 and 2002. In the 1989 match the two teams tied. America won in 1991 and 1993 but lost to Europe in 2002. The U.S. team comes into the 2008 match having lost three in a row—a record for the Europeans—but 48-year-old Azinger is determined to captain his team to a win, and he's just the man to do it.

As part of the '91 team, Azinger compiled a Cup record of 5-7-3, including a 2-0-2 mark in singles play with a crucial point won defeating Jose Maria Olazabal. This was the infamous "War by the Shore" where some U.S. players showed up in camouflage. Azinger wants none of that ambiance in Valhalla, but he remains a fierce competitor.

Seve Ballesteros puts it this way: "The Americans are 11 nice guys and Paul Azinger."

As for the rivalry between the two captains, one unforgettable moment came at the 1993 Ryder Cup at The Belfry, in the singles match. Faldo had a hole-in-one, and though the U.S. had already won, Azinger fought back to earn a half-point against Faldo, the number one player in the world, by sinking a 10-foot putt not conceded by Faldo on the 18th green.

On seeing the television highlights Azinger joked of their duel, "Look at that. I had cancer and he still couldn't beat me."

He wasn't entirely joking. Azinger was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma in his right shoulder just after that 1993 match, yet he played in the 1994 President's Cup and was captain's assistant in 2000. He overcame his battle with cancer and became a Tour winner for the 12th time with a memorable, emotional victory at the 2000 Sony Open in Hawaii. A song, "A Man Named Zinger," was even written about his fight to beat cancer.

Now, he's ready to take on Europe and win the Cup back for America.

"The Ryder Cup means everything," Azinger says. "Being captain is the ultimate honor. I'm trying to surround myself with the right people. I've got Raymond Floyd, Dave Stockton and Olin Browne as vice captains who hopefully can keep me from making too many mistakes."

He may have history on his side, too. Azinger and Faldo have faced each other four times in the Ryder Cup, with Azinger owning a 2-0-2 advantage. In fact, he has never lost to Faldo in Ryder Cup competition.

"It will be a good rivalry," Azinger says, "but it's America vs. Europe—not Nick vs. Paul."

Faldo is no stranger to Americans. Britain's most successful golfer has been regularly heard commentating on the Golf Channel and CBS, and has occasionally shared a booth with Azinger, who also provides golf commentary.

Faldo has a great deal of experience and no shortage of tournament wins on his side. He's a three-time Masters winner (1989, 1990, 1996), and he has played in 11 Ryder Cup matches, becoming Europe's record Ryder Cup point scorer (46) in the process. And in 2007 he captained the British and Irish team to victory over the Europeans in the Seve Trophy.

"With 11 previous appearances and having played under five captains," he says, "this has given me tips and experience to keep us winning."

Faldo's Ryder Cup career began in 1978 at Royal Lytham St. Anne's. Twenty years ago he was part of Europe's winning team at Muirfield Village—Europe's first win in America—and ten years ago he was a member of the winning team under Ballesteros at Valderama.

"A win as captain is very important to me now," Faldo says. "My days of winning majors have gone; this is my biggest project in my golfing career now."

And he isn't concerned about the changes that Azinger has made in the U.S. selection process.

"Our system works fine now; European golf is in a very good state. Players from throughout the continent have proved themselves to be major contenders on the world stage. Above all, the European team understands the importance of camaraderie; it is a tradition that I hope to continue into 2008.

"I've seen men lying on the floor of the locker room either laughing or crying," he continues. "It's quite amazing what we will put ourselves through for one point, the value of winning a point. There's no prize money for Ryder Cup; it's very unique in any sport to have a team event like this to have 12 guys playing purely for a point. It's quite something, quite electric."

Just because Faldo and Azinger are competitors doesn't mean they won't have fun.

"We're going to have a great time," Faldo promises. "There will be a winning team and a loser. For me, the experience of it is very important and I think Paul shares that; we want to make it a memorable, great experience for all who come here and compete."

Will the Nicklaus-designed and retouched Valhalla layout help the Americans in their quest to win? That remains to be seen; however, part of Azinger's strategy might be course set-up, as we will feature in our next installment on the Ryder Cup.

What we can count on is that Zinger will be doing everything to keep a "no loss" Ryder Cup record against Faldo.

THE WORLD HAS LONG RECOGNIZED CHINA AS A MAJOR TOURIST ATTRACTION, BUT PERHAPS NEVER MORE SO THAN THIS YEAR WHEN THE COUNTRY TAKES THE SPOTLIGHT AS HOST OF THE 2008 OLYMPICS. WITH THE DOLLAR STILL WEAK AGAINST THE EURO, CHINA AND ALL OF ASIA BECOME EVEN MORE ENTICING FOR AFFORDABILITY, IN ADDITION TO A RICH AND ANCIENT CULTURAL HERITAGE THAT OFFERS MUCH TO TRAVELERS

China's capital, Beijing, is probably the most popular visitor destination in the country. Beijing is home to Tiananmen Square, the Imperial Palace, Ming Tombs, Temple of Heaven and the Summer Palace. Portions of the Great Wall, which stretches more than 4,000 miles, are less than 40 miles from the city. Within Beijing there are many tour operators offering package deals to see city highlights, but self-exploration offers adventure at your own leisure as well.

Tiananmen Square is the heart of Beijing and where government officials reside. The square has its own historical legacy and is the leading entrance to the magnificent Imperial Palace (also known as the Forbidden City), one-time residence of China's emperors. The Imperial Palace is definitely a must see, although it can be quite repetitious with 980 buildings.

For the most unique experience and a wide array of sensations, the Temple of Heaven is a key destination. At sunrise, people from the local community come for Tai Chi, sword fighting and ribbon dancing, and the playing of the erhu, an

ancient variation of a violin, seems to awaken the Temple gardens. For many visitors this is among the most exiting and rewarding encounters with the Chinese culture.

The Summer Palace, on the outskirts of Beijing, is an enchanted place of lush gardens and serene lakes with boats from which visitors can take in the astonishing beauty of the setting. Nearby are the Ming Tombs, burial site for thirteen dynasty emperors with its celebrated stone animal walkway.

China's greatest ancient achievement is arguably the Great Wall, which more than one million people visit every day. The most visited section is Badaling, resembling a dragon's back rising and falling over the cascading mountains. There is almost no limit to the ways you can experience the wall; visitors walk, run, hike, climb and even sleep on the ancient stones with special tour companies.

While Beijing has more than enough to fill a vacation, it is merely the gateway to what China has to offer. The country's most beautiful landscapes are within Guilin and Hangzhou cities. Guilin, with its "out of this world" scenery, is set on the Li River among lakes and mountains that have been featured in films such as *Star Wars*. Hangzhou, capital of the Zhejiang province, is known for West Lake, once described by Marco Polo as "Heaven on Earth."

You can delve deeper into the history of China with a visit to Xian, the original capital for thirteen dynasties and now a legacy to the Terra-Cotta soldiers discovered there in 1974. Or you might choose to experience the modern, high-rise society of Shanghai, which offers a pleasant balance between Beijing and Hong Kong.

Captivating with its charm and spicy food, Chengdu, in the Sichuan Basin, garnered world attention not long ago when an earthquake caused catastrophic destruction in the area. Chengdu itself, however, was relatively unscathed. One of the city's most popular attractions is the world-renowned Panda Breeding and Research Center, where visitors can

explore 92 acres that are home to giant and red pandas. For a unique privilege, you can make a "donation" of \$60 to pet a panda or \$145 to hold one. Just outside of Chengdu, the city of Leshan is worth exploring, not least for the opportunity to be dwarfed by the world's largest Buddha, carved into a mountainside and standing 233 feet tall.

Some aspects of travel to this region remain limited, so it's important to check with local tourist authorities for the most current information.

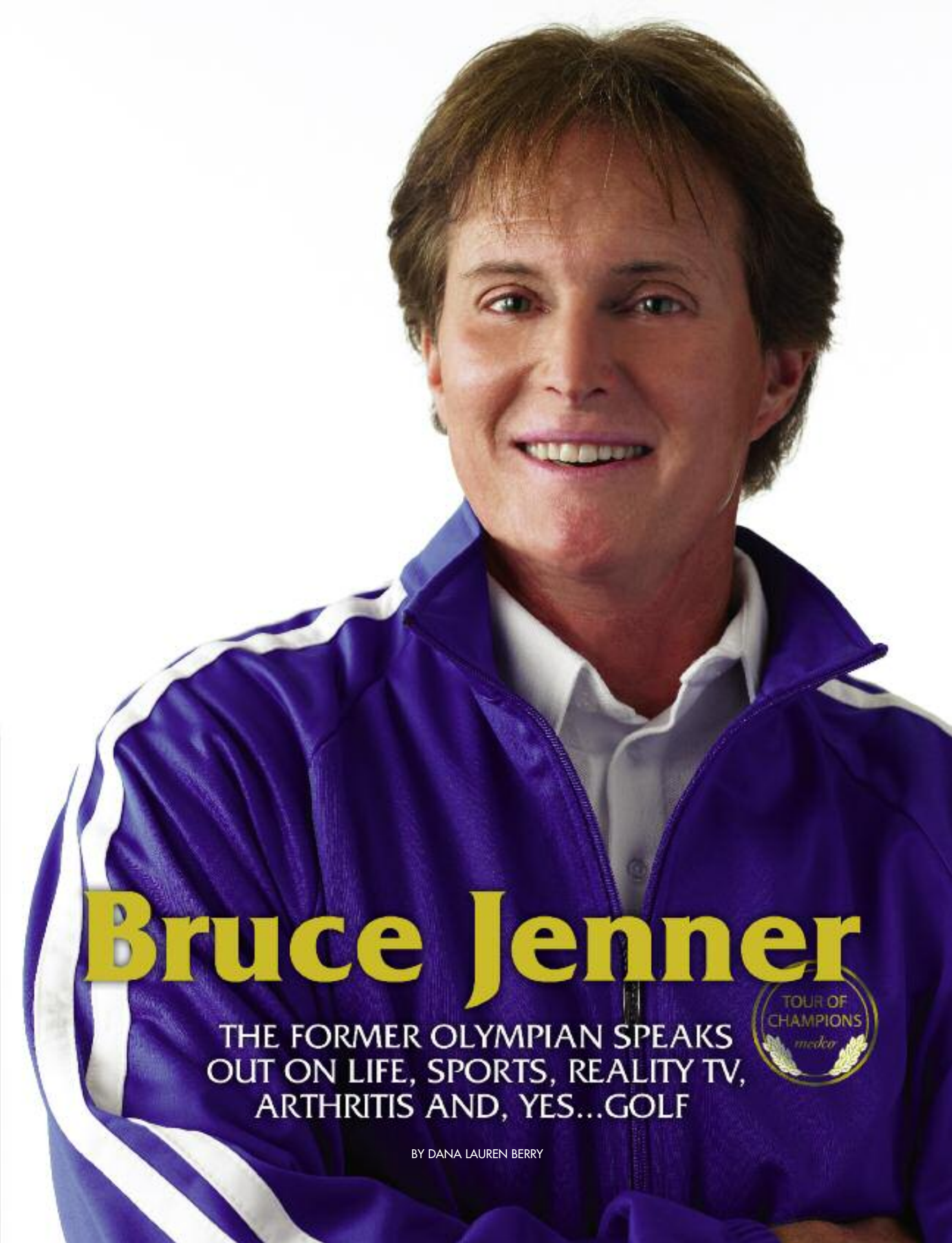
One of the most picturesque—and most controversial—locations in China is the Tibetan region, enshrined in the ethereal beauty of the cloud-piercing Himalaya Mountains. Among its treasures is one of the highest cities in the world, the Potala Palace, former residence of the Dalai Lama. To visit it is a rare travel venture not easily matched, even by the top destinations of the world. Unfortunately, as of Spring 2008, Tibet has been temporarily closed off due to violent protests. Once it reopens, remember that visiting Tibet requires special and specific visas.

Like Europe, China's primary mode of transportation is train. Depending on your departure and arrival destinations, sleeper train tickets typically range from \$15 to \$40, while tickets for seats only range from about \$5 to \$20. Some visitors hesitate to use the rail system, but trains are the cheapest and most widely available way to get around. By contrast, air travel can cost \$200 or more per ticket, and serves only the major cities.

Although China is one of the most ancient civilizations on earth, it is in many ways still in the developing stages as a contemporary tourist destination. Pollution and hygiene are very much a concern that visitors should be aware of and prepared for. Cultural differences, too, present challenges for western visitors, so advanced preparation is important.

That said, China is a compelling destination offering an experience that is exotic and rich with history and culture. Today's visitors also stand on an historical threshold, able to see the antiquities and awe inspiring natural features that have long drawn travelers here, but also to experience the dramatic reawakening of a modern China.

OUT ON LIFE, SPORTS, REALITY TV,
ARTHRITIS AND, YES...GOLF

BRUCE JENNER, GOLD MEDAL WINNER OF THE DECATHLON IN THE 1976 SUMMER OLYMPIC GAMES, IS A BUSY MAN. HE STARS WITH HIS FAMILY ON A HIT REALITY SHOW, *KEEPING UP WITH THE KARDASHIANS*; IS A FATHER OF 10 AND A GOLF ENTHUSIAST. WITH ALL THAT'S GOING ON IN HIS LIFE, HE DOESN'T HAVE TIME TO LET A CHRONIC ILLNESS SLOW HIM DOWN

Jenner has osteoarthritis—a degenerative arthritis caused by the breakdown and eventual loss of the cartilage in one or more joints—both in his knees and left shoulder. Among the more than 100 different types of arthritis conditions, osteoarthritis is the most common, affecting over 20 million people in the United States alone. Jenner knew it was time to seek medical attention when it began to hurt to play golf.

“A lot of golfers have problems with their knees, they kind of beat them up over the years,” says Jenner. “You have to give up things along the way.”

For Jenner, that meant giving up tennis and running, then trying running on easy surfaces and finally giving biking a shot. “Anything to try and save my knee,” he says. “Until eventually, it got to the point where it hurt to play golf—now you gotta do something!”

Jenner adds that after two knee surgeries, one in 1969 and the other in 1977, combined with beating up on his knees for 50 years and just plain getting older, his “poor right knee is gone.” But, he is now proactively managing his condition so that he doesn't have to change or give up his golf game.

“I manage the pain with a hyaluronic acid medication that gets injected right into the joint (once every nine months) and glucosamine supplements, and I take Celebrex every once in a while,” he says.

Jenner is working with Medco Health Solutions Inc., the nation's leading pharmacy benefit manager and mail-order pharmacy. Currently, more than 60 million Americans are Medco members and have access to its benefits. Jenner says that taking proper medication and working with a pain-management pharmacist from Medco has helped.

“Medco offers pharmacists who specialize and are experts in various chronic conditions and the medications for treatment. If you're a golfer who has arthritis, Jenner recommends that you take an active role in managing your health. “I think it's important, especially since we all get older and tend to have to deal with more chronic issues,” he says. “There are great arthritis medications available and there is no need to be in pain, but you need to be responsible with your medication and health. You just can't take everything at face value. You have to seek advice all the time. I never



assume, and I always ask questions of my doctors and, as a Medco member, of my pain-management pharmacist.”

Jenner's home course is Sherwood Country Club in Thousand Oaks, Calif. He says he hits balls every day at his home and plays as much golf as possible when his schedule allows.

“My home course at Sherwood Country Club is my favorite—it's a par-72 Jack Nicklaus-designed Signature golf course. Every year Tiger Woods comes to the course to put on a tournament,” says Jenner, noting that Woods is the one golfer he would love to play with.

When he's not golfing, Jenner is with his blended family, consisting of wife, Kris and their two girls; Kris's four children from her previous marriage to attorney Robert Kardashian and Jenner's four kids from his two previous marriages. Their show on the E! network is hilarious and entertaining.

“It's been a great opportunity for my family to grow and try out new opportunities,” Jenner says. “Beyond that, I think that people might recognize me more!”

SUMMER SALES HEAT UP IN THE DESERT

Previously the idea of selling a desert home during the hot summer months was a joke shared between real-estate agents and sellers; it was just too darn hot to bother. For decades, it was common for desert communities to become ghost towns at the end of May as businesses closed up shop for the summer and owners left town. It didn’t take long for residents to follow that lead and migrate to cooler climates, only to return at the end of September to ready their homes for the season.

ARIZONA

Arizona continues to take a beating with job losses and layoffs adding further stress to the already weak housing market, according to Jay Butler, director of Realty Studies in the Morrison School of Management and Agribusiness at Arizona State University’s Polytechnic campus. But for the first time since July 2005, the local resale housing market in the Greater Phoenix area has posted year-over-year improvement. April had 5,585 recorded sales in contrast



So what happened? Suddenly, the deserts of Arizona, Nevada and Southern California are booming year-round. Now, only a handful of businesses close, residents are too busy to leave for the summer and the *For Sale* signs triple in number. Is it a buyer’s market or a seller’s market? It’s your call.

to 4,855 sales a year ago. Given the improvement, the basic question, says Butler, is whether this is the first sign of the much-anticipated recovery or merely a blip in the continuing weak market.

“One of the driving forces in increased activity has been rapidly declining prices that have fueled renewed investor interest and



potential owner-occupants," he says. "Investment interest is being driven by the anticipation that home prices will rise again in the next few years."

With 835 sales recorded in April, the townhouse/condominium market also improved, up from 685 sales in March. And the median home price decreased from \$174,500 in January to remain for the third straight month at \$165,000. Underlying reasons for that fairly stable price may be tied to the return of the seasonal visitor, international investors and new households satisfying their initial housing needs.

Another interesting note in Arizona's housing market is the increase of size in single-family homes. The median square footage for a single-family home sold in April was 1,770 square feet, compared to 1,700 square feet a year ago.

Markets with an increase of sales in April were Phoenix, Mesa, Glendale, Sun City, Gilbert, Avondale, El Mirage, Goodyear and Surprise. Declining markets include Scottsdale, Peoria and Chandler.

As homes priced at a million dollars or higher continue to sell, the question is





“Why?” Perhaps it’s location, or maybe it’s that once you get past the million-dollar mark, who’s counting?

NEVADA

Nevada’s Century 21 “Aadvantage Gold” member Millie Fine does an excellent job of keeping her clients informed about the Las Vegas real-estate market. According to Fine, there is tremendous growth on and around the Strip. It is estimated that with current projects in place, 45,000 more hotel rooms will be added to the Strip area by 2012. Deutsche Bank Securities estimates that the casino industry will have to hire 113,500 workers for the positions being created.

Projects underway include the \$6 billion City Center, \$1.8 billion Palazzo and \$1.4 billion Encore. In addition, Boyd Gaming is preparing the closed Stardust site for its Echelon Place, a \$4 billion project. Station Casino broke ground in February on the \$600 million hotel/casino in North Las Vegas, and additional projects scheduled to open in the 2008-2009 period include Turnberry Associates’ Fontainebleau and the Trump International Hotel and Tower. All of this translates into one thing: housing.

A recently released study of the local market by the Southern Nevada

Homebuilders Association forecast the following: The largest wave of openings (Strip-area projects) in the region’s history is set to begin later this year. It is estimated that this and other contributing factors will stimulate demand for 177,400 housing units between 2008 and 2012, a 13.3% increase over the demand reported during the preceding five-year period. Interestingly, this 75-page study predicts that late 2007 and early 2008 might be the housing-supply peak, and that, combined with an increase in demand, could potentially create a housing shortage by late 2009.

Also increasing with demand are homes on the ever-widening outskirts of town. There are many golf-course communities to choose from, the majority offering both new homes and resales. Now is definitely the time to be precise. Compare the monthly HOA dues in the communities that interest you, along with what is being offered. Compare golf club memberships as well. Is the club equity owned? Is there an annual food-and-beverage cost? Is cart rental mandatory or can you own your own golf cart? Can you walk the course, if that’s your preference? Everyone wants your business, so be smart and stay focused and soon you’ll enjoy the golf-course view that you always dreamed of, from your own patio

CALIFORNIA

Southern California’s Coachella Valley continues to enjoy one of the lowest median-priced home markets in California, according to Scott Newton of Scott Newton Real Estate in Indian Wells. Only three areas in California have lower home prices: Central California (Fresno, Modesto), High Desert (Victorville, Lancaster) and Sacramento, none of which compare to the desert’s beauty, lifestyle and proximity to major Southern California destinations.

Newton notes that many sales right now are the result of some homeowners losing their homes because they can no longer afford them. What’s good, he points out, is that those homes are being sold to families with the credit and income to purchase them, resulting in a more stable housing market in the future.

Greg Berkemere, Executive Director of the California Desert Association of Realtors is quick to point to the figures released mid-May showing that 42 percent of Coachella Valley households could afford to buy an entry-level home during the first three months of 2008. That’s up four percentage points from the 38 percent of local households that could afford a home at the end of 2007.

Despite the good news Berkemere is cautious. “I don’t think we can call it right now. This is a housing cycle that is different. It has different causes, and different cures.”

One element that makes this market different is the second-home market, and La Quinta seems to be the hot spot for buyers in the \$750,000 price range and above. The current typical La Quinta buyers are investing in second homes, many in gated communities with golf courses. Realtors say La Quinta’s numbers indicate that growth continues to push eastward, and buyers are attracted to the city’s amenities that include new homes, golf courses, shops and restaurants.

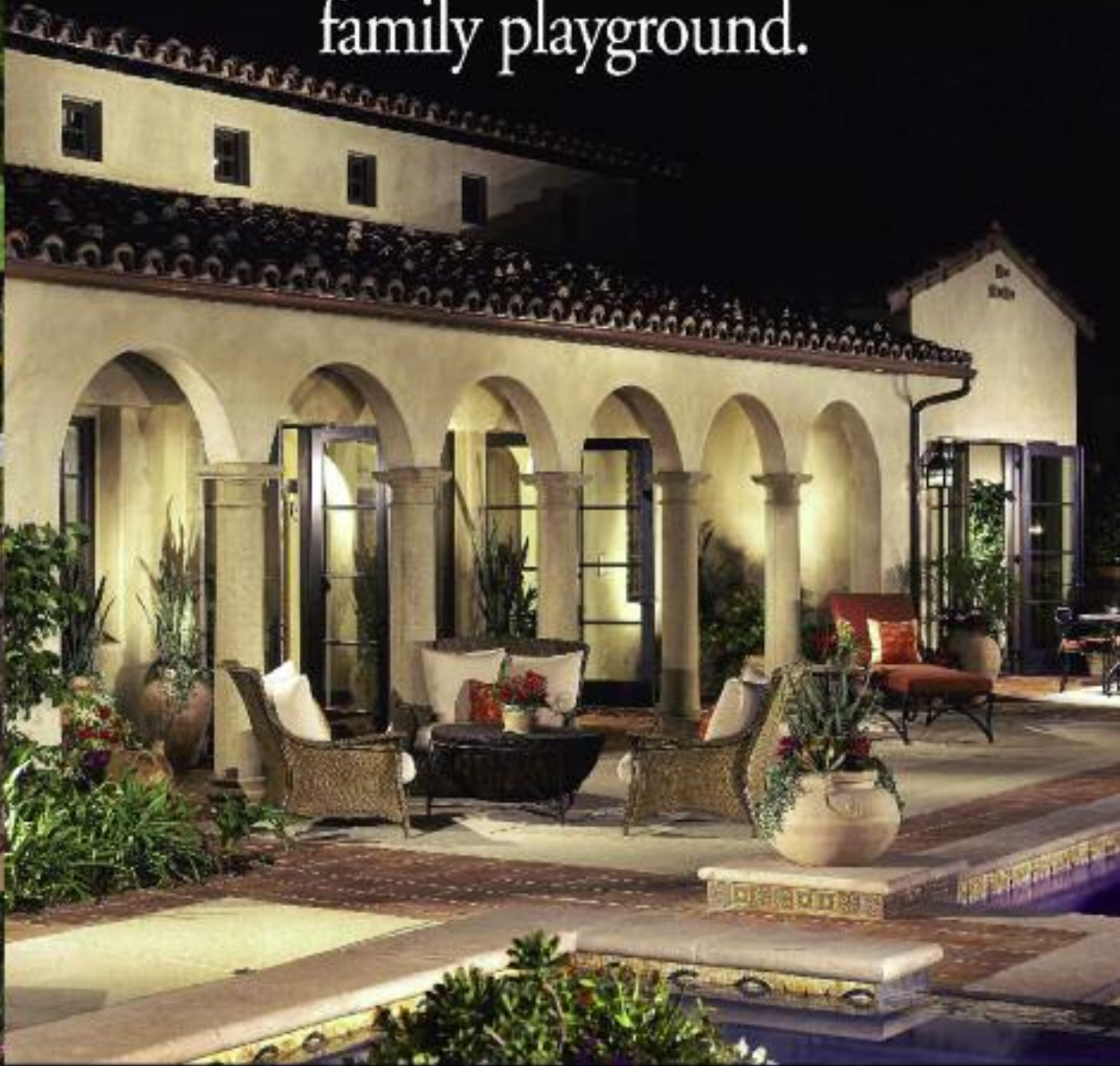
Palm Desert holds the title of most popular with entry-level buyers in first-quarter sales figures, and Indian Wells holds the crown for the most expensive home sold in April: \$7.7 million.

The bottom line is this: If you are a credit-worthy and value-minded buyer, the best opportunity and greatest number of choices may be right now. Just don’t forget to take along the sunscreen when you’re out touring your area’s “hot” communities.

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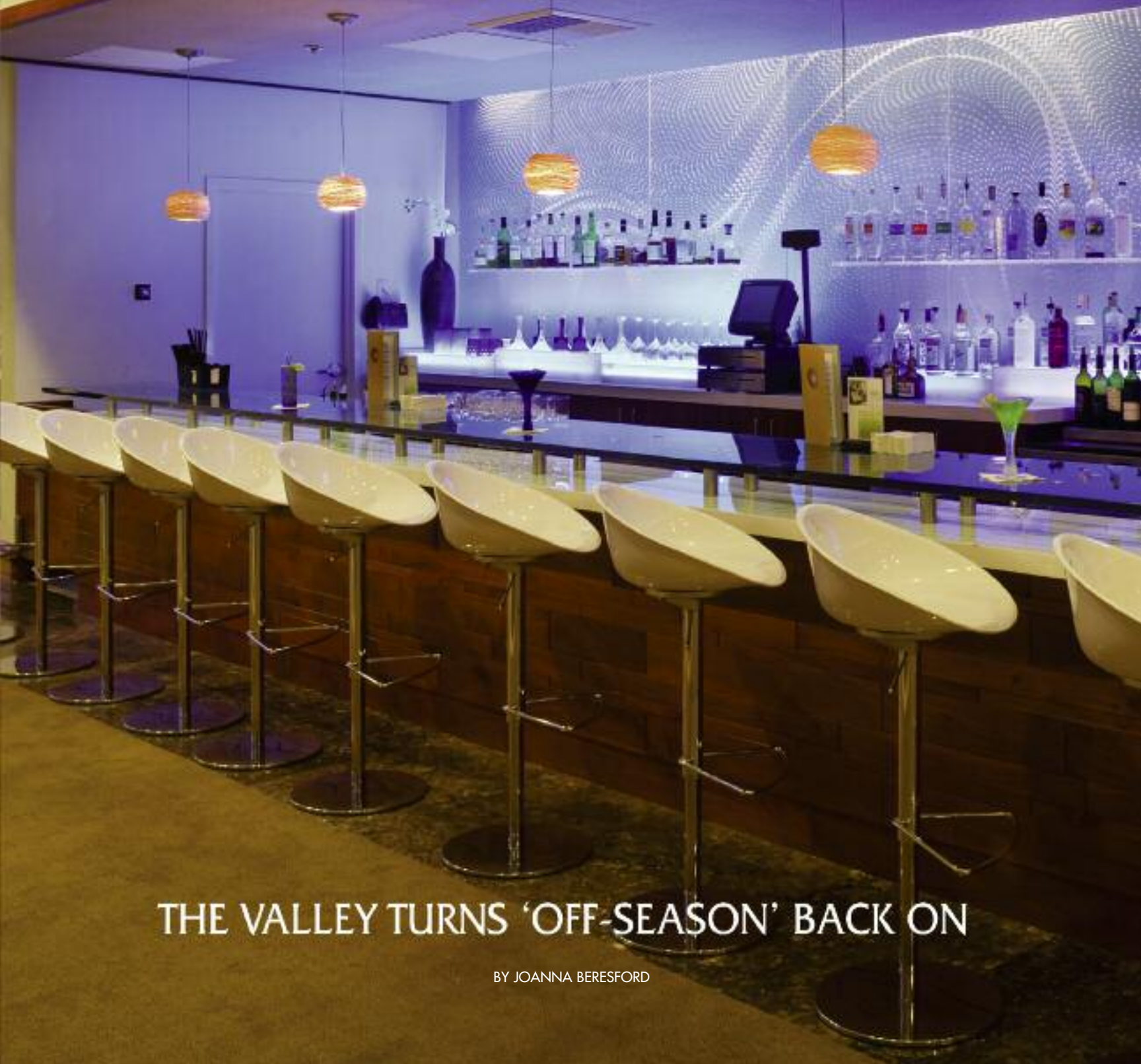

THE VALLEY TURNS 'OFF-SEASON' BACK ON

TEMPERATURES HAVE SOARED WELL OVER 100 DEGREES AND ALL OF THE MOVIE STARS, DIPLOMATS, MOGULS AND OTHER SEASONAL RESIDENTS AND VISITORS HAVE FLOWN AWAY. TRADITIONALLY THE DESERT IN SUMMERTIME BECOMES, WELL, A DESERT—HOT AND EMPTY. BUT THE AMAZING THING IS, SUMMERTIME CAN BE THE BEST TIME OF YEAR TO LIVE IN OR VISIT THE PALM SPRINGS DESERT RESORT REGION

First of all, the desert becomes itself in summertime. The region reverts to its original secret, seductive, secluded kind of place where heat settles and everything slows way down. The fans turn more slowly, the breezes flow more slowly and always carry the miraculous refreshment of a nearby mister. Everyone moves more slowly and a sort of general laziness sets in, as if a spell has been cast over the land and its inhabitants.

It seems to happen suddenly. Those of us who have lived here for a few years know it's coming; we feel the heat rise, we notice birds flying north in their vast v-shaped formations like the arrow of time itself and if we have children, we gear up for the end of the school year and a blaze of summer activities.

Yet for me, summer always arrives at a specific moment on a particular day. Abruptly, it seems, the whole valley is quieter, stiller and you can hear yourself breathe and think. That summer stillness is good for contemplation and for intimate conversations, for slowly savoring a cold drink or a light meal. It's also a fantastic time to savor the great bargains that proliferate throughout the valley.

When summer arrived this year, I was sitting on the patio at **Stuff Pizza Bar & Grille** in Old Town La Quinta on an afternoon in early June. I had found a shady spot under some trees whose little blossoms drifted gently over me like snow. A few brave, diurnal birds hopped among the bricks and brush, poking for crumbs. I was working on an assignment but frequently sat back to enjoy the hush. Relax, I told myself, don't rush, don't fight the heat, let your blood and thoughts run slow and easy. I sipped from a glass of Stuff's signature Honey Blonde Ale, light and frothy. When a friend joined me, we shared a favorite custom martini and the most delicious glass of deep-red, fruit-filled sangria. Stuff runs a terrific happy hour every day from 3 to 6 p.m. with substantial discounts on well drinks, house wines, draft beers, appetizers and small plates. And the pizzas and salads remain ever popular.

In the old days, desert restaurants and businesses closed during the summer months. A few, like Wally's Desert Turtle in Rancho Mirage and Vicky's of Santa Fe in Indian Wells, still do. But most establishments stay open, and many of them lure—or reward—the courageous year-round residents and summer visitors by providing 'off-season' specials on food and drink.

Piero's Acqua Pazza, at the River in Rancho Mirage, offers indoor-outdoor seating. The patio overlooks a glowing stretch of water and twinkles with white cafe lights at night as the moon hangs over the nearby San Jacinto and Santa Rosa mountains. Piero's has a great happy hour and mouthwatering lunch, dinner and appetizers year-round, but the summer specials really sizzle. Starting in June, all day and all night Sunday through Thursday, patrons are tempted with a three-course summer feast for \$19.95, which includes appetizer, entrée and desert. The summer early bird menu (3 to 6 p.m. daily) features two courses from \$15.95. Hours vary slightly, but the vibe is always chill and so are the drinks.

Arnold Palmer's, near the cove and Old Town La Quinta, is a happening place all year, too, but also offers tantalizing off-season happy hours Monday through Wednesday from 4 to 7 p.m. There are discounted menu items and cocktails, as well as house wines, which cost a mere \$7. Every Thursday during summer there are half-off specials on bottles from the restaurant's wine cellar. Nightly entertainment (Tuesday through Saturday) by the smooth, gorgeous Kevin Henry, along with a world-class aura created by the stunning general manager and hostess, Dodi Henry (who happens to be Kevin's wife), make for an unforgettable evening.

famous, infamous, exotic and enticing? Among the deals this summer is the Glutton's Delight, which includes a \$200 credit toward a meal—preferably at the unfathomably decadent and delicious **Mister Parker's** dining room. If you're more in tune with spa pleasures, there's also a Spa Junkie's Delight, with the same credit to be used at PSYC Spa during an overnight stay.

No matter where you live or stay, arguably the very best spot in the Coachella Valley for a sweet cocktail, cool staff, magical setting and most awesome sunset views is the **Cliffhouse** in La Quinta. This place is an institution that feels like a rustic date palmer's ranch with firepit, waterfalls, winding stairways and rich, Spanish-Inn ambiance. In summertime, the Cliffhouse happy hour on bar food (fabulous burgers, seafood, pasta) extends from 4:30 to 7 p.m., and runs all night Sunday and Monday. All the staff and bartenders are in the groove, and Tyler Cotton, in particular, is known for

Then there's the venerable **Tommy Bahama's Tropical Cafe** at the Gardens on El Paseo in Palm Desert. Bartenders here concoct one of the best mai tais in the valley (a great summer libation) and horde a top-shelf rum "locker" that looks and drinks like it came straight off a Caribbean pirate ship. Tommy's tends to expand its happy hour during the summer, and its "Lite Summer Nites" menu, available June through September, features lighter fare and prices.

Many of the valley's hotels have restaurants well worth visiting, too, and you might even want to stay over for a treat. At the Renaissance Esmeralda in Indian Wells, for example, you can take part in a daily tradition at **Glo**, the indoor pocket bar. Each afternoon at 5 p.m., bartender Tim Duval creates a new exotic drink for

the patrons on hand. If you're a summer guest at the Renaissance Esmeralda you've no doubt gotten a super deal on the room; best of all, you can lounge by a series of pools and waterfalls and even a beach for the kids, sipping cocktails by the chlorinated sea. Once you've tasted Duval's latest exotic drink, you can finish up with excellent sushi or tapas—yummy, light treats for a hot summer day.

Ah, the Parker Hotel/Spa/Resort, in Palm Springs. Is there any place as heavenly,

enslaving patrons with a luscious passion fruit or espresso martini. The main attraction at the Cliffhouse, however, is the view. If you sit in the dining room or bar late in the afternoon as the shimmering, sulphuric sun melts over the mountaintops to the west, you'll feel like you've come home, and you'll never want to leave.

X-Citing New BMW X6



IT'S AN SUV, IT'S A COUPE, IT'S TWO
X-CEPTIONAL VEHICLES IN ONE!

IF JAMES BOND WERE LIVING IN NORTH AMERICA, HE'D BE DRIVING A BMW X6. IT BLENDS THE SPORT UTILITY VEHICLE AND THE COUPE IN WHAT BMW LABELS THE SPORT ACTIVITY VEHICLE—THE POWER OF A COUPE WITH THE ALL-WHEEL DRIVE AND RUGGED DESIGN THAT IS UTILITY

The X6 stares daringly down the open road with the guts to take on the best tracks or trails. The inline twin-turbo charged, 6-cylinder won the Engine of the Year Award in 2007 and has built its reputation in the 1-, 3- and 5-series models. It cranks out a lively 306 horsepower.

"The X6 is for those who don't want the wagon feel of an SUV but do want the performance of a coupe," says Dave Thoreson, Desert BMW of Las Vegas sales manager.

The only thing about the X6 that is wagon-like is its shiny red color. The look raises eyebrows right away. A powerful front grill leads to a curved, complex fender design. The aerodynamics are obviously well engineered, and there's enough panache in the first five feet to make anyone wonder exactly what it was that just passed them by.



Calling this a crossover seems a bit like calling an iPod a digital music device. There is a sense that more is going on here than we may know. Expect to see several Sport Activity Vehicles launched by wannabe envelope pushers. BMW has created a new category that leaves us wondering how to compare it to others in its class; in fact, the design and combination of brawn and brains makes comparison nearly impossible.

Imagine if a 650 series coupe fell in love with an X5 SUV and they had a beautiful little baby BMW. That's the mold the X6 is casting. The X6 could help you get your kicks on Route 66, and if you want to see what heads it will turn on the Vegas Strip, it's comfortable there as well.



"It catches you off guard because it's so different than anything we've ever had in a BMW," says Brad Williams, fleet sales manager at BMW of Palm Springs. "Really it's different than any other car ever made. We have a waiting list for the 8-cylinder, which is due out in July."

The optional 20-inch tires create a higher profile, while the double-kidney front grill is classic BMW styling. Dramatically sloping, the rear hatch lends to the excitement and creates motion even while the X6 stands still.

"Its profile is dynamic," says Thoreson. "It has about the same functional storage space as the X5 but seats four rather than five or seven. It's a new way of thinking for BMW."

The interior has all the trimmings you'd expect of a luxury BMW, and a new function that's delighting drivers is the custom programming of controls. Six programmable buttons allow drivers to save anything they can think of to the convenience of one-touch recall. Program a radio station or a phone number. Visit the same location all the time? Program it into





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the customized buttons and with one touch you have directions on the screen.

The 16-speaker HD surround sound is nothing short of paradise distilled into sound waves. The Logic 7 Sound System is equipped with real-time equalizing that gives each seat the ideal mix, and whether you're parked or moving, the sound is exquisite.

Not that you'd want to park for long in the X6 because it probably handles better than anything of its kind on the planet. With a weight approaching 5,000 pounds, the X6 could buckle under the pressure to perform on the road—but that doesn't happen. In track testing, skid demos and the rigors of the open road, the X6 is a true champion.

The Dynamic Performance Control is an enhancement on the company's xDrive all-wheel-drive system. The sticky handling comes from the ability of the xDrive to spin the outside wheels faster than the inside. The car detects yaw and applies power where needed to avoid slipping.

"It feels organic," Thoreson says. "You don't feel electronic adjusting or anything. It does what you want."

Initial reports from journalists around the country are that you have to work to make the X6 slip. The handling is so tight it puts a handshake on the road and doesn't let go. Couple this with a six-speed transmission that is quite adequate and



you have a platform for performance. Mash the pedal and you feel the effects of power and technology.

"I sold two in the same day a few weeks ago," Williams says. "Both customers said the exact same thing: it was the first time they'd ever been truly excited about ordering a car in their lives."

The excitement of the X6 comes with a price tag of about \$55,000 for a loaded

X6 xDrive 35i, and the 8-cylinder 50i is slated to cost about \$10,000 more. Dealers don't know exactly when to expect the 50i but if you want one, get your name on the list today. Otherwise James Bond is going to beat you to it.
