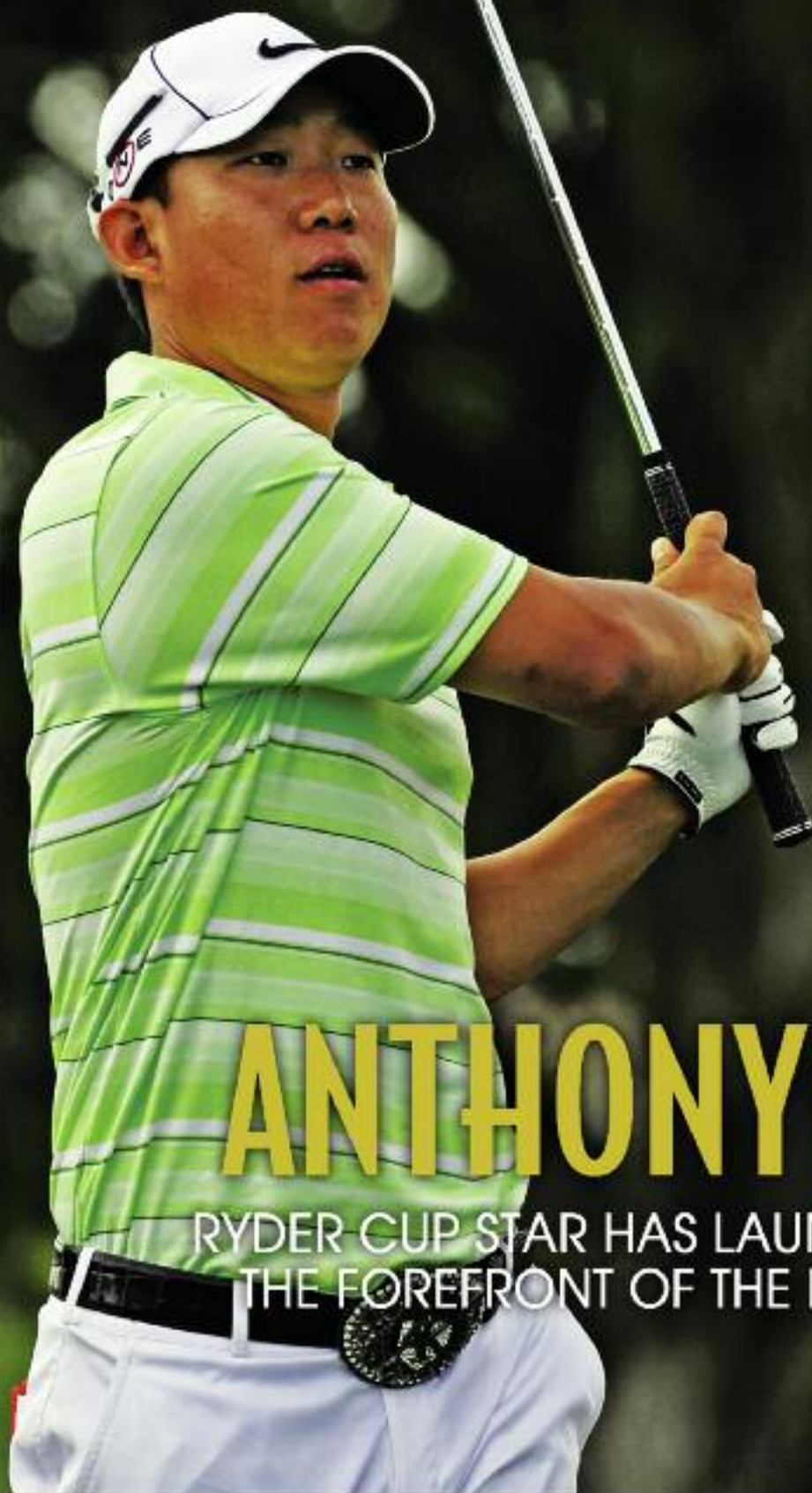

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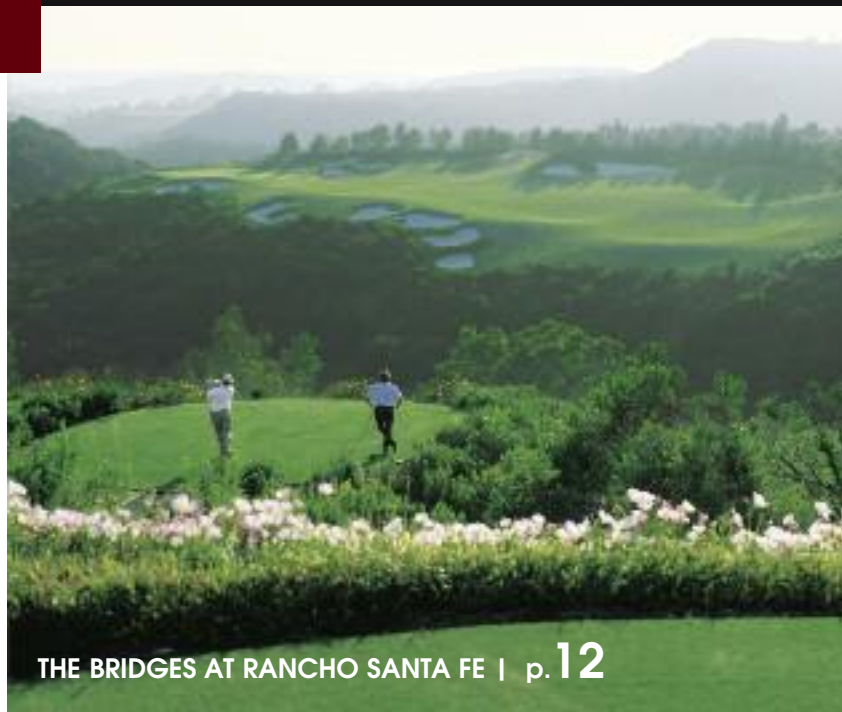

# ANTHONY KIM

COMES INTO HIS OWN

FROM LA QUINTA TO OKLAHOMA TO  
VALHALLA, AK HAS MADE HIS MARK



WHO IS THIS RYDER CUP DARLING WHO WAS LAUNCHED TO THE FOREFRONT OF THE PGA TOUR LIKE A ROCKET? HE WAS EVERYWHERE AT VALHALLA DURING THE RYDER CUP. HE WON. HE PLAYED HIS HEART OUT. HE LED THE CHEERLEADING. HE WORE HIS HEART ON HIS SLEEVE—EMOTIONAL, FIERY, LAUGHING. TIGER CALLS HIM “THE NEW HOT STUD ON TOUR.” HE IS FUN. AND HE IS FUNNY. HE PARTIES HARD. HE’S ANTHONY KIM

“You don’t get a trophy for second,” smiles AK. “I want a jacket. I want a jug. I want everything.”

Kim was born in Los Angeles, June 19, 1985. Today, he weighs in at 160 lbs. for 5’10” of firepower, energy, competitiveness and imagination. He is proud of his Korean-American heritage.

“I am lucky to have lots of Korean-American support everywhere. I want to be a worldwide player. The Ryder Cup was really ‘one round of golf,’ but probably the most important I have ever played in my life; it was great for my own confidence and my own self belief.”



AK continues to develop as a player and has adjusted his mental focus with great success. In 2007, he was concerned about the outcomes of his play. In 2008, he worried about the process and not the outcome, with the result that he finished sixth on the U.S. PGA money list with \$4.6 million—12th in world rankings.

“Now,” he says, “I want to have fun out here on the course. Scores and wins will come.”

It has not all been a smooth path to success. Paul Kim, AK’s father, was immensely influential, but he was very strict and there

were tumultuous times. “I have been taught by my dad, who was inspired by Tiger’s dad,” says AK.

The regimen included getting up at dawn each day to train, no car and continual pushing by the elder Kim. “I pushed him really hard. I hurt him. I’m sorry I did that,” Paul Kim says.

The regimen worked. AK was a four-time AJGA All American who was heavily recruited. He opted for the University of Oklahoma, and on a scholarship he helped the Sooners win their first Big 12 golf title. Why Oklahoma? “I loved their football team,” smiles AK.

But when he left Oklahoma in his junior year to turn pro, AK got a bad rap as being arrogant and full of himself. Now he has opened up to both kids and fans, and he gives credit to his friends for helping make changes, friends like Mark O’Meara, whom AK



describes as a “huge help” both on the course and off. As for difficulties with his father, those are in the past. “My family is the most important,” he says. “I do the best I can every day to pay back my parents. They worked so hard.”

work with Schriber. "It was a huge effort for them," AK says of his parents, Paul and Miryoung. "We are a traditional Korean family. They gave me the best opportunities."

Schriber had had a lot of success with young stars like Angela Park and Candy Kung. Schriber says he knew "the cocky teen was special. At 15, he won the World Juniors in the 18 and unders just six months after we started working together. We are very close still. I wasn't just a coach, but a close friend and Anthony was like a little brother to me. Anthony has great heart, is bright, has tons of talent and loves kids; and he has always been there for me and helped me too when I had tough times.

"We have shared so many wonderful moments from the Walker Cup to the Ryder Cup," Schriber continues. "His match against Sergio Garcia—the lead match of the last day—was immense, defining! Nothing is better than playing for your country; it was so spectacular and a treat to be part of that with him."

Also with him at the Ryder Cup were his parents. "My parents only come to five to six tournaments a year; they get so stressed out when I make a bogey," AK says.

Perhaps no other influence has been as critical to AK's success as the one the young player has had—and still has—with Adam Schriber, with whom AK first took a half-day lesson at age 10. At 15, AK convinced his parents to let him move to La Quinta, Calif., to focus on his golf and to

AK now has a house in La Quinta where he spends about a month each year. While there, he likes to stay at home and enjoys having friends visit to "just hang out and chill," though going to the Taco Shop El Ranchito is a must.

While AK prefers to lay low during the silly season, he took time this off-season to work with Craig Davis to get in shape. And, of course, he plays golf on the local courses. Of the hundred-plus courses near his La Quinta home, his favorites are PGA West and the Stadium Course, La Quinta Country Club, The Palms and The Madison Club.

As for the famous trademark belt buckle," AK smiles. "Everyone at Oklahoma wore big buckles. I found one, wore it, liked it. Now I have them made in LA with the AK."

Which brings us back to the humor for which Anthony Kim is also famous, apparent in the joking reply he made to Nick Faldo. "No, don't worry; I don't have any distractions in my putting from the 'bling' on the AK!"



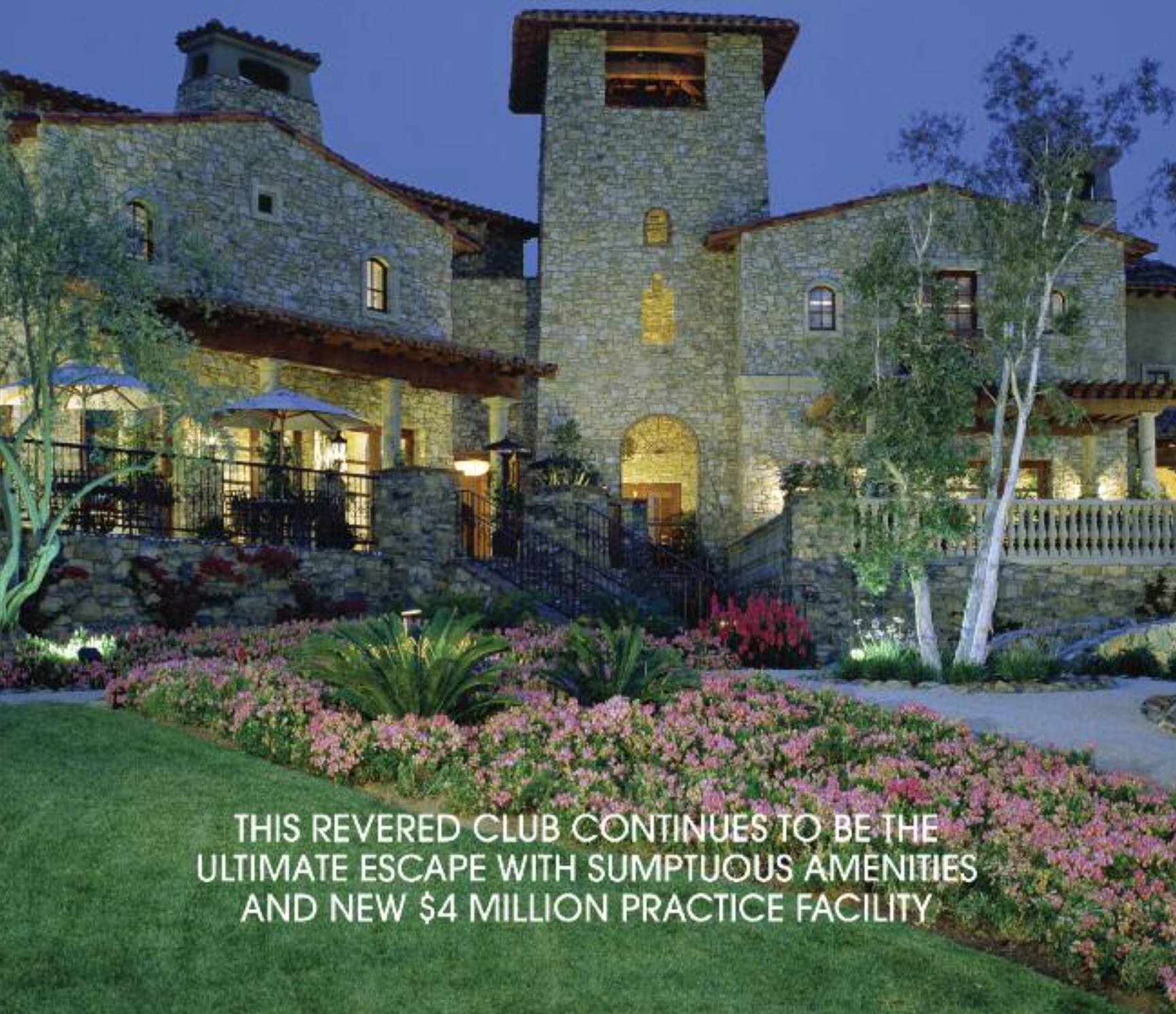

Will the club, tucked into the coastal hills of San Diego, be forever known for its three annual "Battles"? Membership Director Gordon Cooke says, "That ended in 2005. Now we want to be consistent with our tagline: 'Bridges, a glorious place in time.' We want people to know that this spectacular development stands the test of time, delivering a venue and service that make for an exceptional experience each and every day we're open—and continues to improve upon itself. We reinvest in the asset. Our driving range is a good example (a \$4 million investment), and next we will focus on tennis and a children's sport area for the community. We're doing what it takes to offer a consistently phenomenal overall experience."

Cooke calls The Bridges a sanctuary for members where they can leave their troubles behind. By any definition it is a true respite from the world with an emphasis on personalized service.

"We want residents happily calling as they're driving home, knowing we're creating a fantastic dinner for the family to pick up as they drive to the porte-cochere," Cooke says. "A unique signature for us is the whole idea of a self-sufficient community. We have an established vineyard and produce 200 cases of wine a year—we received a gold medal for our 'Birdie Blend.' An acre-and-a-half organic garden on premises provides 70 percent of all produce consumed at the club."

Even with a terrific golf course, the club continues to make minor adjustments, such as tweaking or adding bunkers and enhancing teeboxes. "What's great," Cooke adds, "is that we have 540 acres and the golf course covers 300 of them. Here, you don't



see other golfers. It's a private experience with each hole separate and distinct. There could be a whole bunch of people on the course and you don't know it."

With a slew of opulent club amenities, how exciting can a new practice facility be? Off the charts, when it has \$4 million to back up thoughtful planning and premier resources. The newly configured area was

made up of three usage-specific sections on 15 acres. A pre-existing warm-up area with multiple fairway and sand-trap targets has been enhanced, allowing golfers to hit every club in their bag. This is also the site of major-manufacturer equipment demos. A brand-new section is dedicated to wedges and short-irons only, with targets spaced from 40 to 140 yards out. The

undulating section for hill situations. The facility also features a stretching cage for golfers to warm up major muscle groups before a lesson or practice session.

Project leader Tom Martin says, "The objective was to make it the best of its kind in the country and have it measure up to the quality of the club's already existing amenities, all of which are considered the



years in the making (it was stalled by permit issues) but officially opened in January and was well worth the wait.

The Titleist Performance Institute's golf-and-fitness system with certified trainers and PGA instructors is supplemented by state-of-the-art, swing-analysis equipment. The overall space is

largest area allows golfers to practice on virtually every terrain found on the golf course, making it the place for members to spend a couple of hours working on their game. Target greens range from 50 to 270 yards away, and there's an additional designated chipping area, a large bunker for greenside and fairway trap shots and an

best of the best. There's nothing else like this in California, or in the country to our knowledge—all in one of the most beautiful settings in the world. It's truly one-of-a-kind and just for members of The Bridges Club."

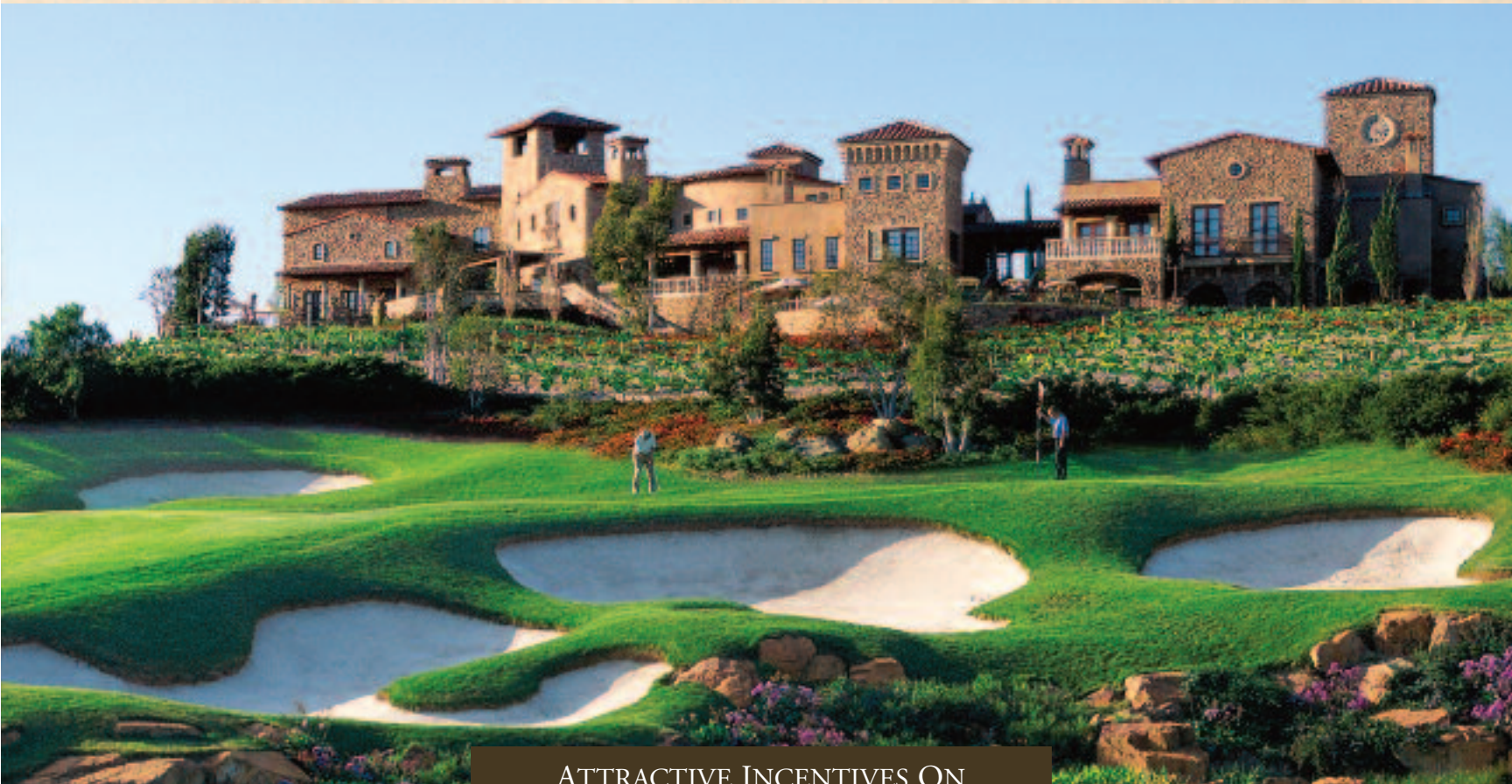
Equity memberships are still available, and while many members are Bridges homeowners, that isn't a requirement. National memberships with a reduced initiation fee are an option for those who aren't residents of, or property owners in, San Diego County.

"We have a happy, vibrant membership who enjoy the finer things in life," says Cooke. "It's a friendly, inviting club, not a pretentious place at all. The whole industry is kind of upside down now. Despite a difficult economic environment, we continue to weather the storm and grow. We have positioned ourselves for the uptake. When it happens, we're ready."

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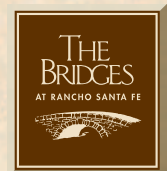

# SILVERROCK RESORT

## IS READY FOR SUCCESS



WITH THE CURRENT ECONOMY IT MAY TAKE TIME TO REACH FULL POTENTIAL, BUT SILVERROCK IS A RISING STAR IN THE DESERT WITH A LOT TO ITS CREDIT ALREADY





## WHAT'S THE UPSIDE POTENTIAL FOR SILVERROCK RESORT IN TERMS OF ITS FUTURE AS A TOP-FLIGHT RESORT, ONE OF THE VALLEY'S BEST GOLF FACILITIES AND A KEY MEMBER OF THE BOB HOPE CLASSIC ROTATION?

It all depends on the upside potential of the current economy.

"We're supposed to start clubhouse construction this spring or summer," general manager Randy Duncan said. "But with the economy the way it is, everything is sort of in a holding pattern. A lot of people are still scared to invest money right now, so it's all kind of a wait-and-see thing."

In other words, SilverRock has all the pieces of the puzzle in place to thrive and expand in an expanding economy. It's just a matter of when the economy gets cranked up again.

As a top-flight resort, SilverRock has all the elements you want to read in a travel brochure either in place, i.e. its 18-hole, Arnold Palmer-designed golf course, or on the drawing board. Master plans include three hotels, a golf course designed by Jacobsen-Hardy, 8,000-plus square feet of commercial space and a 38,000-square-foot clubhouse. When that plan can be executed is anyone's guess.

"Do you have your Ouija board?" quipped Doug Evans, Assistant City Manager-Development Services for the City of La Quinta. "We were very close to beginning our first boutique hotel and the economy went in the tank, and it's still in the tank."

"We believe development has been delayed by two to three years at this point. We have no guarantees with the economy; no one knows what's going on."

While play at the course is down an estimated 12 percent year-to-year, Duncan said those projections aren't what's holding up planned development. In fact, Duncan said the city is fairly satisfied with the amount of play under the current circumstances.

He said the course continues to draw traffic as one of the must-play courses in the valley, a reputation that's been cultivated over the past two years as the course gains television exposure as a member of the Hope rotation.

"We're down a little, but I think by comparison we're doing pretty well," said Duncan. "We have 7,000 residents of La Quinta who play at a substantial discount, and it's helped to be a part of the Hope. We're the only public course where the Hope is played, and golfers want to play the course that the tournament is played on."

As a golf course, SilverRock has gained the respect of the resort player, the competitive amateur and, of course, players on the PGA Tour who compete in the Bob Hope Classic. The course stretched to 7,800 yards during the tournament, and while it yielded low scores set up for a Pro-Am format, it received an outpouring of support

"Having the tournament in La Quinta has had a significant impact on our community and our business community like no previous year," Evans said. "Last year we had three courses in the tournament and tour officials and players engaged the community like never before. Adding La Quinta Country Club, we think it's become a (City of) La Quinta event."

But the future of the tournament in terms of sponsor support is also up in the air. The long relationship the tournament enjoyed with Chrysler appears destined to end when the contract expires in 2010 (if not before), with more and more congressional pressure being brought to bear against the financially strapped automaker. Should that relationship fall apart now or later, the process of procuring a new sponsor will kick into high gear.

But who will it be? What will the terms be? What will the tournament format be? And, in a worst-case scenario, what if no sponsor is secured for an extended period and the tournament itself is threatened?

Duncan can't answer those questions. What he can say is SilverRock will be ready



from the players and PGA Tour officials. The scores also had amateurs familiar with the course scratching their heads that anyone could shoot such low scores on such a difficult test of golf.

Of course, being a member of the four-course rotation for the Hope is one of the biggest honors, events and opportunities for exposure available to local facilities. Perhaps there's no better example of how

external factors control growing reputations, and indeed what type of future SilverRock can expect.

The logistics, for example the ability to accommodate the parking and movement that accompanies large crowds, are also a proven asset for the facility. SilverRock has contracted to host the Hope for another eight years, and will feature in the 2010 rotation with La Quinta Country Club and

for the best-case scenario and prepared for the worst.

"When it's finally completed," he said, "whether that's a few years, 10, 12 or 15 years, in my opinion it's going to be the mecca of the desert."

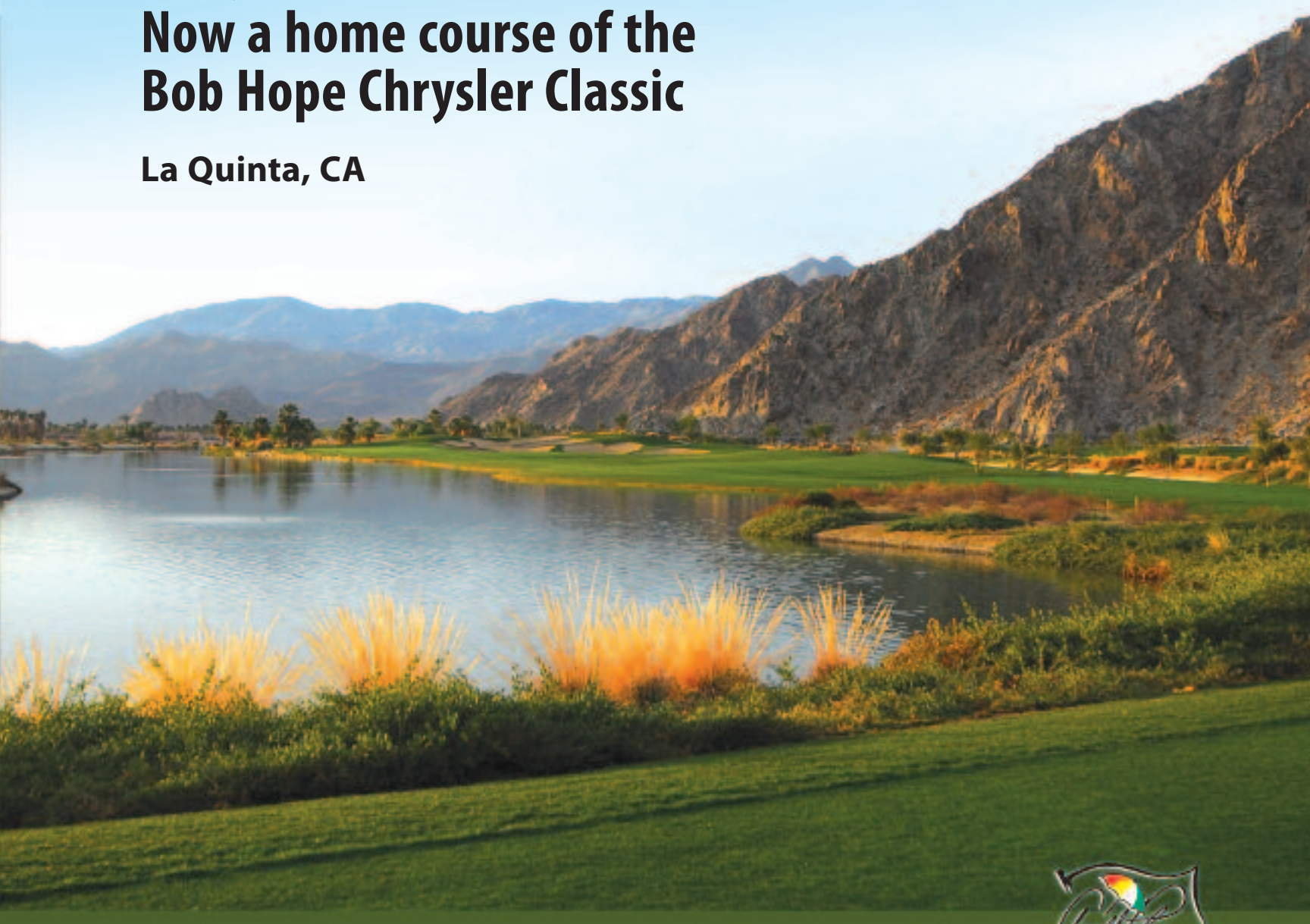


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# PHOENIX CELEBRITY CLASSIC

In spite of a challenging economy, Schmitz has not lowered his sights concerning the 2nd annual Celebrity Classic that will take place May 7-9 at the Pointe Hilton Tapatio Cliffs Resort. But he is realistic about how to achieve his goal and understands that patience is required.

“Last year was our first year. It takes time to grow an event to where you want it to be. You have to keep adjusting. We've made minor changes that will allow us to succeed in this economy.”

a good one. The two partners each bring different strengths to the relationship. While Schmitz has talent and a long history in the world of celebrity events, Gary Gietz, respected founder of the Happy Givemore Open, is a longtime member of the Phoenix community with solid, established relationships and support in the Phoenix business community and beyond. Together they are bound to make the Phoenix Celebrity Classic even better than it was last year—and that's saying something.

Among the adjustments he has made since last year is lowering the cost for a foursome to \$4,000, and a whole sponsorship to \$5,000. For \$4,000, a foursome plays two days of golf with celebrities (Friday and Saturday), and each member of the foursome is given two tickets to each primetime evening event—the celebrity pairings party on Thursday night and the Nicky Beach Pool Party on Friday night, which turned out to be the highlight of the entire event last year. Whole sponsorships include signage on the golf course and additional opportunities for corporate participants.

There's a new charity partnership as well, and Schmitz is confident that the relationship with the Happy Givemore Open, which is dedicated to support of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, is

“This is a first-class event with top celebrities and headline entertainment and that's not going to change,” says Schmitz. “The celebrities last year left raving about the event and many were already committed to returning this year.”

The tournament will once again be played at the Lookout Mountain Golf Club at Tapatio Cliffs, one of the top 25 courses in the Phoenix area. Last year, Phil Nevin, former Major League Baseball great, logged a 70 on his scorecard to win the tournament at -1. Former National Hockey League player Darren Veitch and U.S. Ski Team member and World Cup mogul skier Nate Roberts tied for second at +1, while Vince Coleman, best known as a St. Louis Cardinal, and Adrian Young, drummer for the uber popular band No Doubt, tied for 5th at +3.

Nevin, Veitch, Roberts and Coleman have already signed on for this year's tournament, as have rocker Alice Cooper and TV's Kevin Sorbo, who soared to fame as Hercules. Among the other celebrity participants so far are A.J. Feeley, back up quarterback to Donovan McNabb, and Seth Joyner, whose stellar NFL career finished as a member of the 1999 Super Bowl-winning Denver Broncos.

There will be others as the date draws closer; last year's participants included Dan Quayle, among famous names. Meanwhile, the focus of the event is about raising money for a worthwhile cause. For Gietz, the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is a personal passion. His two older brothers died from the disease in their teens.

"My early years are filled with memories of the challenges that come along with this disease. At the time my brothers were born, life expectancy [for CF patients] was seven years of age. Because of the generosity of donors and breakthroughs in CF research, that age has moved all the way to 37 today—and expanding. That is remarkable and I would love to be a small part of continuing to move the line of life. That is why I am doing this."

Last year's event raised a significant amount of money for charity, and in spite of the present economy, Schmitz is confident that this year will be just as successful, or better. But he's not focusing on dollar amounts.

"We want to rally the troops and get people involved in raising money for a great cause," he says. "If we worry about the economy and put the tournament on hold, we raise nothing. In my view, anything is better than nothing. We will raise significant funds again. We CAN do that."

With that attitude, the 2nd Annual Phoenix Celebrity Classic is guaranteed to be a success.

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# BEYOND THE 18TH HOLE

Use it to improve YOUR game*

Success is not an accident! Becoming a better golfer requires you to become a better person. Unlike any other sport, golf mirrors both business and life. You can learn more about whom you are as a person by how you are on the golf course. To master golf and become a peak performer, it is important to consider and master the following:

### **DREAM BIG, THINK SMALL**

Having a vision of what you want to achieve allows you to strategize how to succeed. It also gives you a big reason, "Why." The stronger the "Why," the easier the "How." Once you have established your goal, focus on the small action steps it will take to get you there. These action steps put the odds in your favor of achieving your goal.

### **PRACTICE DOES NOT MAKE PERFECT**

Rather, perfect practice makes perfect. While it may be impossible to play "perfect" golf, it is possible to play great golf. It is important to engage in *purposeful* practice and practice the way the game is played. The quality of the practice is more important than the quantity of the practice.

### **PLAY FROM THE HEART**

The power of passion cannot be underestimated. If you have lost your love for the game, reconnect with the things that made you appreciate the sport in the first place: being out in nature, spending time with friends, challenging yourself, taking a break, etc. Peak performers are great because they love the game—both on and off the course—and enjoy practicing and the pursuit of excellence. Celebrate golf and what it does for your spirit.

### **ENGAGE ALL LEVELS OF CONSCIOUSNESS**

Golf is more than merely a mental and technical game. Golf requires mastering the physical, mental, emotional, spiritual and technical aspects of the sport. Think about golf in all these dimensions and see where you need to focus your effort in order to excel.

### **EXPERIENCE THE POWER OF FOCUS AND INTENTION**

It is important to focus on your target and both practice and play with intention. Play while you practice, practice while you play and step onto the course with a strategy. The best golfers have a game plan. They are focused and intentional, and they are clear about what they want to achieve.

### **FORGET ABOUT THE OUTCOME**

In golf and in life, you cannot control the outcome of events. What you can control is your effort, your attitude, your course

strategy, your pre-shot routine and the level of commitment you bring to your game. Focus on the things within your control and release the rest.

### **LET GO OF EMOTION**

Emotion is simply "energy in motion." Feelings such as anger and frustration can ruin a round of golf and result in a high score. It is important that you learn to control your emotions while on the course. One thing that can assist with this is having a pre-shot routine that puts you back in the zone and focuses your attention on the task at hand. Positive self-talk and visualization can also help calm and center you.

### **CORRECT AND CONTINUE**

As you know, when it comes to golf, perfection does not exist. It is to be expected that shots will not always go where you want them to go. In those moments, it is important to accept what is and simply move forward.

### **CREATE-A-VISION**

Whatever you focus on expands. Take the time to visualize the type of round you want to play. Visualize all aspects of your game in as much detail as possible and involve your senses. You want to be able to *feel* as if what you are imagining is true.

### **BE TRUE TO YOURSELF**

Rather than trying to emulate someone else, become the best you, you can become. Work with your body, your swing and your desires. Trust yourself and your intuition.

To master the game of golf requires mastering the game of life. Take the opportunity to learn from each shot and play the game as if it is your first time, every time. Allow yourself to have fun, release the struggle and celebrate your victories. Success breeds success. When you accept responsibility, play with a level of detachment and non-judgment and acknowledge your successes, you set yourself up for a great round of golf and lower scores!

the golf industry will endure,” said John Kawaja, executive vice president of TaylorMade-Addidas Golf Company. “I think every industry is in for a tough first quarter of 2009, but in April when the sun

comes out and is shining, the core golfer will return and continue to play the game.

“There will be an asterisk to this year, but at the end of the day, golf will be okay. Players still want to play and they will spend. Those PGA golf professionals, golf facilities and golf companies that manage their business efficiently during the changing times will be fine in the long term.”

The PGA of America sponsored more than 70 education seminars and special events during the three days of the show, many of them focused on the economy.

“There seems to be a very positive vibe at the show this year, despite the economy,” said Keith Bach, head professional of the Players Golf Academy at Hilton Head Island, S.C. “I’ve been coming to the show for the past 10 years and this is as good or better than any in recent memory. I was happy to see how crowded the show was. It just proves that the golf industry is strong. People still want to play the game, and the show remains the best place to see everything in golf under one roof.”



Tom Watson was there. So were Lorena Ochoa, Ian Poulter, Paula Creamer, Jan Stephenson, Christina Kim, Brittany Lincicome and Jeong Jang. But it was appearances by Boo Weekley, Nancy Lopez and Annika Sorenstam that created most of the buzz.

“Our goal was to create an event that would help energize the golf industry as it goes forward in 2009, and judging by the heavy traffic on the floor, it seems the golf industry will be fine,” said Ed Several, PGA Show Group vice president. “The PGA Merchandise Show certainly underscores the resiliency of the golf industry and speaks to the industry’s commitment to growing the game under all circumstances. New programs such as Get Golf Ready, new products and new innovations show that golf is continuing to move forward.”

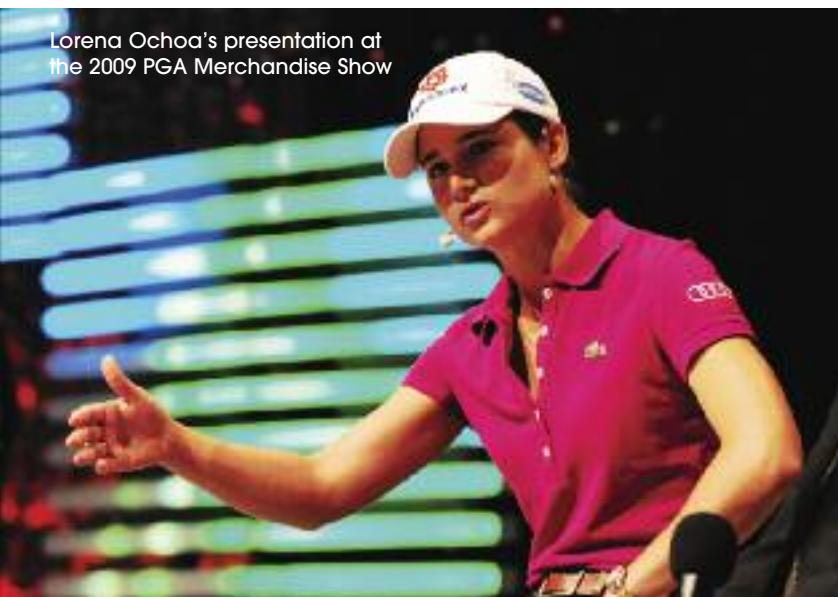
If there is such a thing as *the* celebration of the game of golf, the PGA Merchandise Show is it. Even given the economy.

“I don’t know if anyone knows exactly what will happen with the economy, but

And “everything” means more than clubs, balls, bags and clothing. Many of the booths, proudly proclaiming that their products would make the game “go green,” displayed environmentally friendly products such as solar-powered golf carts and biodegradable tees.

Still, the biggest draws for club professionals and buyers were the staples of the game. And two of the biggest names in the business—Titleist and Cobra—returned to the show in 2009 to join Callaway and Ping with the most visited booths.

“We’re excited to be back at the merchandise show,” said Peter Broome, vice president of business partnerships for Titleist. “Many people have asked us in the past month why we decided to return to the merchandise show. First, we welcome the opportunity to showcase our products and meet face-to-face with so many of our

customers. Plus we feel that it’s important to participate in the largest gathering of the golf industry as a major stakeholder in the industry.”

But the two biggest parties were thrown by Callaway and Ping as they celebrated the careers of Sorenstam and Ochoa, respectively.

“I have enjoyed a wonderful career,” said Sorenstam, who was a featured speaker at the PGA Equipment Forum and at the Callaway booth. “I have always felt that I had the best equipment throughout my career and it certainly helped me win as much as I did.”

While Sorenstam was holding court at the Callaway booth, Ochoa was helping Ping celebrate its 50th birthday. “Ping’s support has been great for my career,” said Ochoa, who demonstrated Ping’s nFlight custom fitting software, which she is using to make a few changes in her own bag. “I’m replacing my 5-wood by adding four wedges this year,” she said. “And I’ve switched to a new putter because I’m just like everyone else who plays golf; I want to make more putts.”

When the doors closed for the last time on Saturday afternoon, most visitors left with a better feeling about the state of the game.

“I have been at my facility for more than 50 years and this is the scariest time I have ever seen,” said Ken Morton, head professional and general manager at Haggin Oaks Golf Club in Sacramento, Calif. “We were at a record pace in both rounds and revenue heading into June, but then we saw a slight decline for the next three months. Then in mid-October the bottom just fell out of retail sales.

“You have to make difficult decisions in these times, but those who remain proactive will be all right.”

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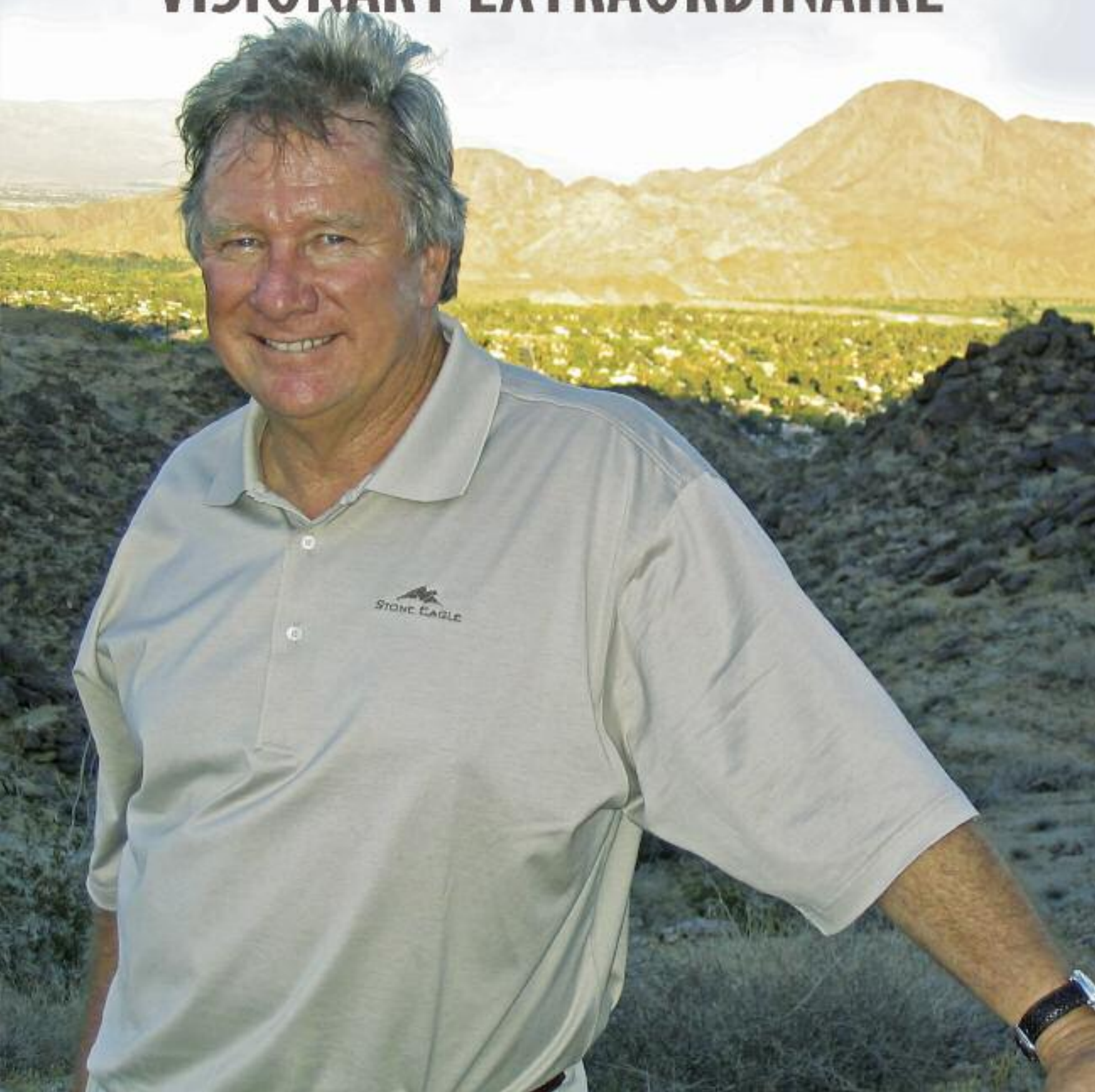

# TED LENNON: VISIONARY EXTRAORDINAIRE



## MEET A DEVELOPER WITH THE ABILITY AND DESIRE TO CREATE COMMUNITIES WHERE NATURE AND PROGRESS CO-EXIST

Is it possible to develop land *and* enhance its natural beauty? Ted Lennon can and has, and the result is a collection of multi-million dollar residential communities on unique parcels of land that form a safe haven for both residents and animals.

President of LLD Desert Development, Inc., Lennon earned a Civil and Environmental Engineering degree from Loyola University in California that has

He is also a former captain in the U. S. Army, college All-American volleyball player and the oldest of 13 children. He excelled at tennis, rugby, golf and surfing—a true All-American California boy.

Lennon's first project in the Coachella Valley was the takeover of the Shadow Mountain Tennis and Racquet Club back in the early 1970s. "I cut my teeth in development there. I was the general manager, the developer, the real estate

As one of the first members at the upscale Vintage Club in Indian Wells, Lennon admits to his fondness for luxury properties. His understanding of the concept was solidified there. "My first big project was The Terraces at the Vintage Club, luxury condominiums; we ended up winning an award for the project."

In fact, Lennon's office in the Reserve sales building is filled with awards scattered among photographs of family,

served him well. However, it's his vision for what a raw piece of land can become, and his focus on preserving nature while fostering progress, that has earned him the respect of peers, friends and citizens.

Case in point, two developments in the California desert. Both the Reserve in Indian Wells and Stone Eagle in Palm Desert came with seemingly insurmountable challenges from officials, citizens and the land itself. Today, both developments are complete and a testament to Lennon's tenacity, and the communities admire the developer's genuine concern for the land and for the luxury upscale communities he designed. In spite of all the admiration and accolades, Lennon is as low key as a person can be.

A California native and resident of the Coachella Valley for more than 34 years, Lennon's name is familiar. He is a first cousin of the famous Lennon Sisters who became household names as regular performers on the Lawrence Welk Show.

From golf course designer to resort architect, Lennon is a multi-talented man. "When I got out of the army I got into real-estate development and property management," he says. "I've since discovered I'm more into designing places

and habitat and everything that fits to make a great habitat, whether it's a golf community, skiing community, tennis complex or shopping center, even though I don't feel that commercial buildings are my forte.

"In my mind, everything comes from nature and what we see in beauty, from the colors of the flowers and the colors of nature. My goal is to incorporate nature into a development, not the other way around."

When Lennon sees an open piece of land, his goals are simple: Improve people's lives; leave the earth a better place; set an example for other developments; impassion people about nature; share the land with the region's plant and animal wildlife; make it a great place to live, play or work.

As successful as Lennon's upscale communities have been, much of his focus has been on preserving natural landscapes in this development-happy world. Twelve years ago Lennon and a diverse group of people founded Friends of the Desert Mountains, an organization that acquires land in places "where it makes sense to keep open spaces open and protect the important natural resources." Lennon is the current president and his organization now owns about 16,000 acres. The group has helped to preserve over 36,000 acres in the Coachella Valley. Lennon's ultimate dream development would be to "recreate the valley," putting in a park system separating all of the cities. Since that is unlikely to happen, what does Lennon do for fun?

"I play golf occasionally; I'm starting to play a little more tennis again and am

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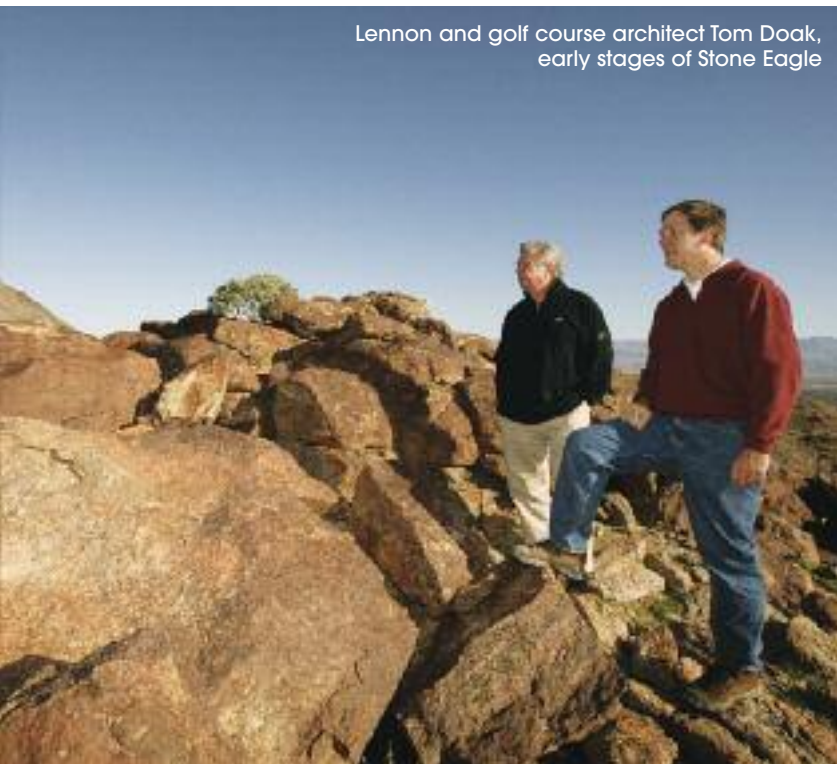

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# THE ECONOMY OF GOLF



EVERY AREA OF THE COUNTRY AND EVERY INDUSTRY HAS BEEN AFFECTED BY THE ECONOMIC DOWNTURN, BUT LIFE AND GOLF IN THE COACHELLA VALLEY STILL HAS MANY POSITIVES



*“Pessimism is your friend, euphoria the enemy,”  
— Warren Buffett, in a 2009 letter to shareholders.*

According to national statistics, the game of golf has been, at best, stagnant for the last two years, neither growing nor slowing. More recently, however, there has been a “definite contraction” in the industry, not just according to national statistics but also to experts within the industry. Experts like Tony Manozoni, who probably knows as much about golf in the Coachella Valley as anybody. Manozoni directs the driving range at the newly renovated College of the Desert (COD) Golf Center; he’s a professor at COD and coach to the college’s golf team, currently tied for first in its conference.

“The economy is in dire straits, there’s no doubt about it,” says Manozoni, who concedes that there’s an upside for the Golf Center in this economy: People who can no longer afford play at private or public golf courses now flood into the Golf Center.

“Golf is down by about 30 percent everywhere,” he says. “But we do benefit from the downturn. We haven’t lost any business. The Golf Center is a very economically viable notion because a driving range is a pretty good place to hit some balls, feel like you’re playing and really get in some good golf.”

As testament to his words, the parking lot of the Golf Center is filled to capacity with Porsches, pickups and everything in between on an average weekday day in March, and the crisp crack of balls being struck can be heard throughout the grounds.

Economy notwithstanding, the Golf Center invested in improvements and those investments are paying off. Since re-opening in November, the Golf Center has offered new range balls, more grass, better turf and better targets than before. New technology has revolutionized the approach to teaching, playing and selecting appropriate equipment, and Bryan Geiberger, who runs the Center’s Motion Analysis Technology, helps golfers study their technique with remarkable precision.

“The technology is accurate to a tenth of a degree,” says Geiberger. It’s an investment that has proved successful for the center and for athletes, who can learn more in one session by studying digital analysis than they might in a month of traditional coaching sessions. One session vs. many sessions is definitely a cost-saver for budget-conscious golfers.

Manozoni’s words of advice to all members of the golf and recreation industries, owners and managers of more than 100 local golf courses: “The valley has to take a look at Phoenix and other places that provide these services to make sure that we don’t price ourselves out, push people away.”

Enterprises that have suffered the most in the current financial crisis are small retail outlets, some middle-tier golf courses that have closed and club developers who have either stalled in their efforts to build new golf clubs or who can’t raise funds or find credit to break ground on approved projects.

Struggles among these entities can be far reaching, resulting not only in a depressed business climate in general, but in specific job losses and other lost opportunities.

Larry Bohannon, golf writer and columnist who has lived in the desert and chronicled the game for more than two decades, says, “In each of the last three years, more private clubs have closed than have opened. That’s unheard of in my history in the valley. We may be especially vulnerable here because so much of the industry is pegged to real estate. We’ve seen memberships at private clubs shrivel, home sales and revenue shrink.”

The good news, however, according to Bohannon, is that “People who weren’t able to join a private club or afford public ones, now have access to these places because prices have come down. That makes a big difference for the daily golfer.”

More good news: Many top-tier golf clubs and longstanding local venues have retained their successful relationships with members and clients.

“At this point people would rather invest in real estate than in the stock market,” says Theresa

Maggio, director of marketing at Bighorn Golf Club. “We sold seven home sites in January and prices are holding steady.

Also, the number of golf rounds and dining reservations are up by 25%. Our members want to be here, they want to be surrounded by friends. They’re making choices that reflect that.”

Some retail outlets continue to do well, too. If you stroll into Pete

Carlson’s golf shop any day of the week you will be embraced by bright color, bustling activity and the same friendly, knowledgeable staff that has made visitors and residents feel at home here for nearly 30 years. Carlson still puts on a successful Golf Expo and Fashion Show every year, and his employees still glow when they describe both their boss and their patrons.

“People literally get off the plane and come here,” insists salesperson Bonnie Ford. “We’ve been slammed all day today, for example. One woman bought four pair of shoes—just to wear around town, not even on the golf course. People like to hang out here. They’re comfortable here. I’ve heard more than one customer walk in the door and say, ‘Recession? What recession? Doesn’t look like there’s anything wrong around here.’”

While experts acknowledge that the economy and golf industry face challenges in these economic times and that the future remains uncertain, some things do remain constant. The physical beauty of the Coachella Valley and the loyal, loving relationships that have developed here have not wavered.

What it all boils down to is, when it starts to boil it's down to us. Now that the Bob Hope Classic, The Phoenix Open and even the Kraft Nabisco Championship are in the books, the signs are clear that "the season" in the desert is rapidly coming to a close. After the snowbirds fly home, the tours head for more seasonally appropriate venues and the major amateurs are contested in other parts of the country, year-round desert residents are left to populate and sustain the valley golf courses that remain open, and also to fill the fields at local charity events and competitions.

Among the Coachella Valley charity tournaments this spring are the Palm Springs' Power Annual Golf Tournament (May 1), Marine Corps Desert Cities Golf Classic benefiting the U.S.

stroke-play event with a \$9,000 prize purse. The tournament includes pin prizes and an optional skins game, with gross and net divisions. Call 760.777.8884 to register.

The Palm Springs' Power Annual Golf Tournament is scheduled for Indian Canyons Golf Resort in Palm Springs. The baseball team has filled a void in the desert's desire for hometown baseball, playing two-month seasons at the Palm Springs Stadium, once occupied by The California Angels and their "A" franchise.

The tournament, at Indian Wells Resort (Celebrity Course), provides financial assistance to Marines who suffer serious injury in combat and who are either stationed or treated at the 29 Palms Marine Corps Base. The scholarship currently assists 27 eligible recipients, with three involved in Masters' programs, and nine graduates. This year's tournament will help provide \$3,000 scholarships to five new recipients.

One of the last golf benefit soirees of this season is the annual YMCA Charity Golf Tournament at the JW Marriott Desert Springs Resort in Palm Desert. The event is one of the Palm Springs YMCA's key yearly fundraisers, and will feature on-course

Nevada will receive professionals later this summer when the Legends Reno-Tahoe Open parks itself near the ancient lake. Down south, where pines don't grow (unless they're planted by Steve Wynn or Tom Fazio), the summer calendar lightens accordingly. However, those charity-minded individuals in the area who permanently stick it out in Vegas, or those who aren't quite ready to flee to Sun River or Monterey, can take advantage of the National Charity Golf Association Championship in Las Vegas May 18-20. This team tournament benefits all charities registered by entrants, and features rounds at Rhodes Ranch Golf Club in Las Vegas and Boulder Creek Golf Club in Boulder City.

Even during the hottest days of the southwest's summers, many golf courses remain open to serve their local communities and memberships. However, when the tours aren't in our region, they are engaged in what could be the most difficult stretch of the season, which piques golf interest nationwide and keeps desert golfers on the course regardless of temperature. There's no doubt Coachella Valley golf courses will see a pop in play around U.S. Open and PGA Championship time, despite the fact that the daily high in the area will be somewhere near 10,000 F. The desert golfer is a difficult breed to deter.

Temperatures notwithstanding, it's time to get motivated. The keys to golf in the desert are about to be handed to those who call it home.

ASTON MARTIN—IF HE CAN AFFORD IT

The Aston Martin One-77 is flirting with an elite clientele. Once whispered about as being the most expensive car ever to roll out of the silk sheets of the production house, the One-77 lost the title to the declining value of the British pound. For now, the Bugatti Veyron will keep that distinction. In a high-end auto connoisseur's demographic, that makes the One-77 a luxury almost too affordable to pass up at £1.2 million—about \$1.7 million in U.S. dollars.

Credit crunch be damned. Aston Martin is claiming between 100 and 250 serious potential buyers who have called since the early release of the design. But, will any of the

cars make it to the U.S.? With only 77 slated for the potter's wheel, it isn't likely you'll see many on the freeways of Scottsdale or the Vegas Strip.

"I'm not sure how many we'll get here in the U.S.," one sales person who requested anonymity said. "If they can't get the car to meet the U.S. safety standards, then buyers will have to work that out on their own."

Reports range from 12 cars allocated for the U.S. market to zero. Aston Martin's West Coast representative couldn't be reached for comment; she was at the Geneva Auto Show where the car is working the crowd.

"It's a magnificent car," Alex Phaneuf, sales specialist at Desert European in

Rancho Mirage, Calif., says. "I just saw a McLaren F4 selling for \$4 million, so I don't think it's unrealistic to think there is a market. This is the biggest package Aston Martin has ever put together."

That package is a bombshell. The public hasn't gotten a peak under the skirt yet but rumors are running rampant. Aston Martin is boasting a 7.3-liter, naturally aspirated V12 engine manufactured by Cosworth. This is a significant upgrade from the V12 powering Aston Martin's DBS, DB9 and Vantage. Cosworth dropped the weight 25 percent and rocketed the power curve.

Exact horsepower specs aren't released so we can only guess until someone can kiss







and tell. One-77 Program Manager Chris Porritt will only say that the number is well above 700 bhp and a top speed over 200 mph. The suspension has double wishbones at all four wheels with pushrods that transfer vertical movements to the horizontal damper units. The result: lighter and more control.

For those interested in spending their stimulus money on this beauty, there's a mandatory trip across the pond. You don't build a showroom for a \$2 million dollar car; you bring drivers to you.

"Everything is designed for each owner," Phaneuf explains, "from pedal placement to seat design and measurements. Each car will

have unique features like the dashboard and weight of the shifters. The only thing we know for sure is that there will be paddle shifters and an Aston Martin emblem on the steering wheel."

Home decorators rarely offer this level of customization. The One-77 is going to the far reaches of exotic in an effort to woo buyers. Once drivers' measurements are taken, the hand crafting begins.

There's enough carbon in the One-77 to make the Hope diamond. This keeps the weight low and the speeds high. Ribbed side panels and hood raise purist's eyebrows, but this minx has spent long hours undergoing wind whipping engineering tests. Every flare and roll has a purpose and looks both endearing and risky.

The One-77 is created from aluminum panels hand-rolled from single sheets. The nose, wings and tail are all single pieces. There are no cuts made, nothing breaking the glassy skin.

"We were aiming for the simplicity and purity of cars from a bygone era," Design Chief Marek Reichman told Top Gear. "It takes time and effort to find the simplest solutions. It's clearly an Aston Martin, but the intention is to put the feel of the next-generation Astons into the body. The more you look at this car, the more you will see."

Reichman calls the car "sculpture." Like any Venus de Milo, the One-77 will awe viewers and make owners proud. But the One-77 can't sit in a museum. It demands to be driven.

"Imagine the feeling of getting up to speed faster than anything on the road," Porritt says. "It's beyond the feeling of going fast. It's almost the feeling of 'should I be doing this?'"

Among the most classic gold pieces are bangle bracelets and pendant necklaces or lockets, simple rings or charm jewelry.
