IS IT TIME TO JOIN A NON EQUITY CLUB?



The desert boasts some of the most beautiful golf courses in the country. The mountain vistas, palm trees, and weather draw you outside and on the course with frequency. With so much golf to choose from, what are the key factors that cause a family or individual to join a club?

If you agree with the experts in the golf industry, the quality of the golf course, ability to play a round in less than four hours, and proximity to home and social activities are the key reasons individuals join a private club. For many years, joining an equity club also was at the top of the list. The ownership stake and promise of financial reward in the future was very attractive. As the economy shifts, perspectives are changing.

Non equity clubs are gaining momentum. Talk to members in the valley today and there is a common theme: assessments of \$40,000 plus during tough economic times are not very popular. Neither is the obligation to meet a food and beverage minimum when clubs are cutting back on services. As a result, members of developer or corporately owned or managed clubs are enjoying an elevated status and interest in membership.

Clubs owned by ClubCorp, including Mission Hills Country Club, Indian Wells Country Club, and Desert Falls Country Club in the Palm Springs area are case in point. The fact that these clubs do not charge assessments or food and beverage minimums, they are becoming more of an advantage, especially in light of the quality of each club and the tens of millions of dollars invested in improvements over the past years.

To overcome financial stress, many clubs began cutting back when the economy started to decline in the fall. ClubCorp launched a Member Appreciation strategy that added more than \$15 million of value to membership nationwide. An increased emphasis on fun also is at the forefront with more social programming than ever before. Add this to initiatives to make it more affordable for members to improve their game and the result is active, happy members.

As the golf landscape continues to change, one thing is for certain, the financial stability of a private club is more important to new members joining than ever before. Where many equity clubs are assessing to cover operating costs, members of non equity clubs may have an advantage. Owners like ClubCorp are better prepared to weather the economic shifts and ClubCorp also is looking to add more clubs to its portfolio.

Ultimately, it is up to prospective members to ask the right questions so that the club they join is right for them. In today's fragile times non equity clubs are an attractive choice.

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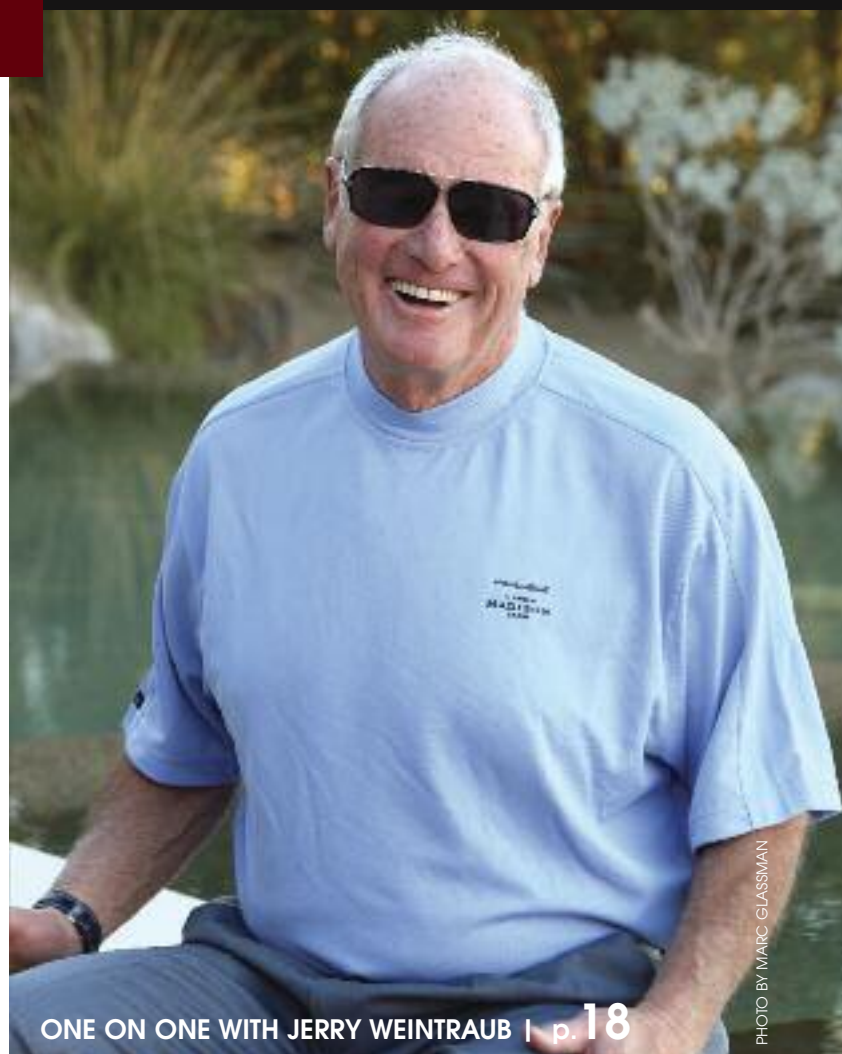
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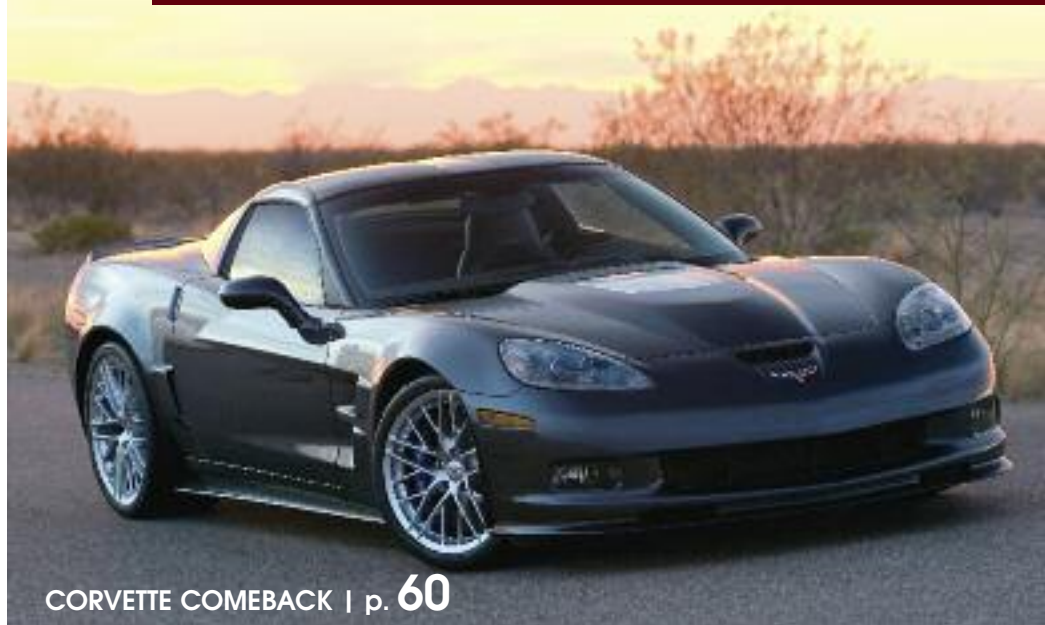

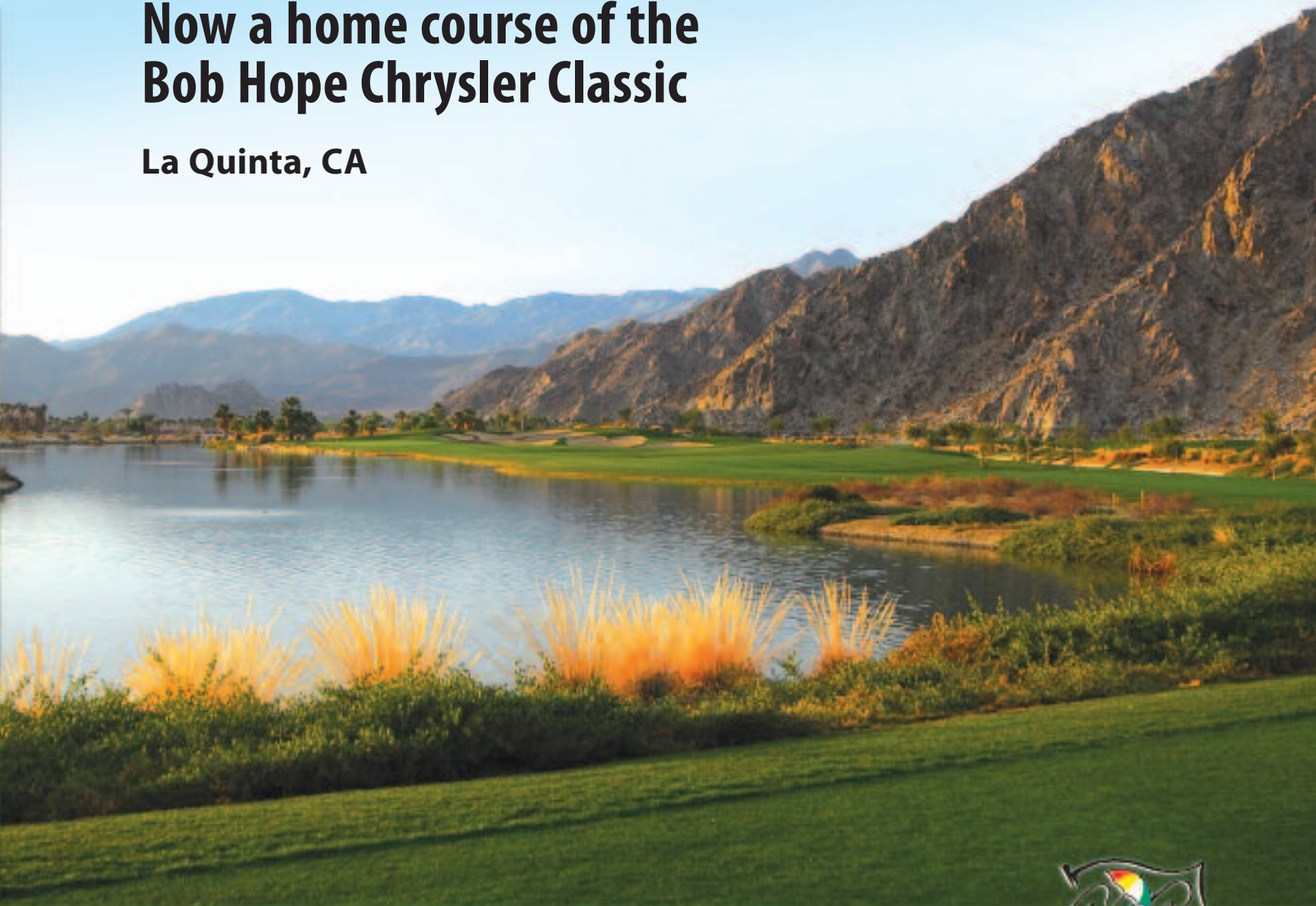

LORENA OCHOA'S GOT GAME; MORE IMPORTANTLY SHE'S GOT HEART. A lover of life with a big smile and an open, extrovert personality, Ochoa is instantly likeable on the links and off. In just a few short years she has managed to lead a very full life, and to impact many people in positive, meaningful ways.

She is dedicated to giving back to Mexico, to people in need and to the world

ran in marathons and competed in Ecothons—a race that typically combines running, paddling, swimming and biking or some combination thereof. She was just 17 in her first Ecothon, the youngest participant ever, and during the five-kilometer swim fought through horrendous conditions. Many of the

(14,300 feet) four times starting in 1993, and Mt. Iztacihuatl (17,324 feet) in 1994.

Snow skiing is another love. Post-season 2007, Ochoa and her girlfriends hit Vail, Colo., for 10 days of schussing and fun. From Vail she disappeared to her beach house for water skiing and workouts, plus a strict regimen cutting sugar and fat from her diet. Always thin and super fit, Ochoa works consistently on her nutrition and fitness during the off-season.

Sugar and calories aside, Nutella, the popular hazelnut spread, is one of her favorite treats. Not surprising, the Mexican star's favorite cuisine is that of her homeland—particularly *tortas ahogadas de marlin*, a specialty of Guadalajara and the state of Jalisco, and *chilaquiles*. A close second is Argentinean beef, and as she has traveled around the world, she has also become a self-described “sushi addict.”

Ochoa loves music and concerts, from Madonna to Pavarotti. An aficionado of Spanish music, she is partial to Chayan,



of golf. She has created her own foundation that funds educational scholarships for economically disadvantaged children, and makes appearances for a variety of global charitable organizations. During summer holidays she has played soccer with underprivileged children, and she is an avid participant in the annual soccer game raising money for the ELA charity at the Evian Masters, along with other golfing stars like Laura Davies, Ai Miyazoto and Momoko Ueda, and World Cup notable Zinedine Zidane.

Born in 1981 in Guadalajara, Mexico, Ochoa took up golf at the age of five. Between 1990 and 2000 she also competed successfully in tennis, track and field, swimming, basketball and soccer. She

participants got hypothermia, but Ochoa, supported by her brother, Alejandro and exhibiting the strength and perseverance that would serve her as she rose to the top of the golf rankings, finished.

“Ecothons and marathons are all mental. It’s all about pushing yourself as far as you can; you learn to be tough even though you are having a bad time, you try to do the best,” Ochoa said.

Ochoa’s love of the outdoors and sports covers a wide range of skills and terrain. Waterskiing tops her list of favorite pursuits, followed closely by mountain climbing, horseback riding and hiking—all part of her childhood at the family retreat in Talpalpa in the Sierra Madre Mountains. She climbed Mt. Nevado de Colima

Shakira, Mana and Carlos Vives. As for movies, *Gladiator* and *The Mission*, a film about 18th-century Spain, are among her favorites, and she had *Harry Potter* on DVD with her at the 2007 British Open. On the more serious side, she adored *Lecciones de Vida*.

She has had a chance to travel the world and has been spotted enjoying Paris with all its distractions, skiing in Whistler, B.C. and getting away from it all in Santiago, Chile. To celebrate her historic win at the British Open in St. Andrews, she cruised the Norwegian coast, and she often relaxes with family and friends at her beach house in San Juan de Alima on the Pacific Ocean.

But of all the places in the world, Ochoa is most passionate about her home city of Guadalajara, where she grew up with her father, Javier, a real-estate developer and her mother, Marcela, an artist. The family lived adjacent to Guadalajara Country Club, which gave them a golf course and swimming pool almost in their backyard. Active and athletic at a very young age, Ochoa won her first golf tournament at age six.

"We were members of the country club, and that was amazing, a blessing," she says. "We struggled to pay for the fees but my dad always made it, with my mom's help."

Ochoa's education was at Catholic schools, and extracurricular activities consisted not only of sports but visits to poor areas to distribute food and help the needy. "I hated school," she said with a laugh, but she did go on to college on a golf scholarship at the University of Arizona.

Turning pro in 2003, she won the Rolex Rookie of the Year award that year and hasn't stopped setting records since. But she has never forgotten her roots. Rafael Alarcón, Ochoa's golf instructor since she was 10, was celebrating his birthday the day of her first major victory, the British Open at St. Andrews. In typical Ochoa style, she sent greetings to him from the green.

A 2008 high for Ochoa was the Inaugural Lorena Ochoa Invitational at Guadalajara Country Club, which brought the Tour to her club. "I wanted it to come here where everything started, to be able to play here for my gallery and my people," she said with a big smile.

In 2008, *Time* magazine named Ochoa one of the 100 most influential people in the world, saying it is "her passion and dedication to those in need off the golf course for which she is being honored." She also was named Mexican of the Year 2007. In the world of golf, Ochoa won her third consecutive Rolex Player of the



"I don't have my life planned. I just know that I'm not going to play golf forever," she says. "It could be three years; it could be seven years...Hopefully, God has a good plan for me...I still want to come back here to Mexico and work on my foundation and do other things. Hopefully I can do that, have my wish. I don't want to play competitive golf for many, many more years."

In the meantime, the player who is known for her kindness has touched the lives of fans, gardeners, groundskeepers, caddies and people around the world. She is a role model for being *simpatico*.

"I want to be remembered for the things I did outside the golf course," Ochoa says, "Not for winning tournaments. That's very clear to me."

Viva, viva, viva!

Year in 2008, and also received the Vare Trophy, the LPGA's award for lowest scoring average, for the third year in a row.

"Lorena has had yet another incredible season," LPGA Commissioner Carolyn F. Bivens said. "Her work off the course has been equally impressive. Once only a national hero, Lorena is now a global hero. The world is grateful to have her, and we are more than proud to call her our own."

Ochoa's commitment to helping others is unwavering. Talking about her foundation, the 27-year-old said, "At first I was focusing on kids with cancer, organ donation, education. Too many things." She finally narrowed the focus to education. "We have an elementary school, La Barranca, in the countryside near Guadalajara. I am very involved, hands on. I go there every time I go home. Education is the only way you can go forward."

Her goals include expanding the school—the first year of high school has already been added—and parents are included in the program as well.

Ochoa has been a member of the Women's Fellowship group since 2003, and makes the weekly Tuesday meetings an important part of her tournament prep. "We become the same and just talk and relax." She concedes that life on tour can be full of loneliness and jealousy, but she revels in the support received each week.

Romance? Ochoa had a relationship that ended in late 2006; since then she has been single, but she hopes one day to start a family and says she will put away the clubs when it's the right time.

ASKED. ANSWERED.

JUST MOMENTS AFTER LORENA OCHOA WON THE KRAFT NABISCO CHAMPIONSHIP LAST YEAR, A MEMBER OF THE MEDIA POSED THE QUESTION ON EVERYONE'S MIND. COULD OCHOA WIN THE LPGA GRAND SLAM?

"YES," OCHOA SAID

She didn't accomplish that feat in 2008, but the banner-carrier for the LPGA Tour has a brand-new shot starting with the 2009 Kraft Nabisco Championship at the Dinah Shore Tournament Course at Mission Hills Country Club in Rancho Mirage, Calif. The tournament will be played April 2-5, and with Annika Sorenstam stepping into retirement—at least for a little while—Ochoa is now the biggest name in women's professional golf.

stomach virus that sent her to the emergency room the night before the final round.

And that was when the party really started. It's long been a tradition at the Kraft Nabisco Championship that the winner takes a dip in the pond that surrounds the 18th green of the Dinah Shore Tournament Course. Ochoa and her fans took the pool party to a new level when friends and family joined her in her victory swim.

And while there was no doubt about the superstar's talent when she arrived at Mission Hills last year, she hadn't proven herself in major championships. In fact, she had won just one major: the Women's British Open. It only took four days for the Mexican star to erase all doubts that she could win a major in grand style.

Her 67 in the final round not only tied for the low round of the week, it gave her a five-shot win over Sorenstam who was battling a

"For some reason I couldn't stop thinking of that jump into the lake," Ochoa said following her victory. "That was something I've been waiting to do for a long time."

She took all the drama out of her future swim early in the fourth round when she birdied the first two holes of her final round to open a lead over six-time LPGA winner Hee-Won Han, who had started the final round only one shot behind Ochoa.

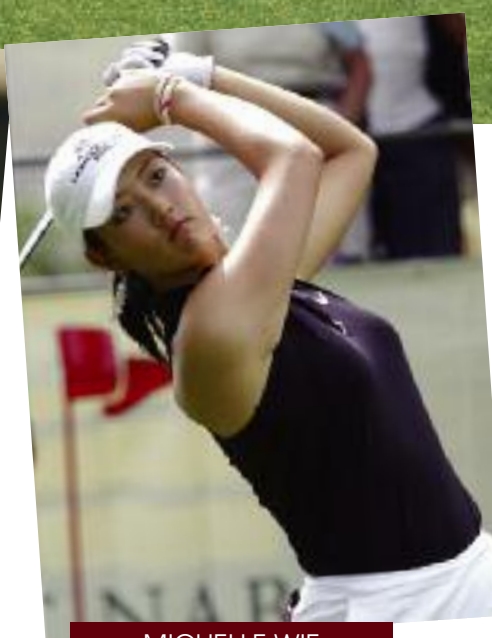

Han cut the margin back to one shot with a birdie on the sixth, but Ochoa answered with birdies on Nos. 8, 9 and 10 while Han struggled on the back nine on her way to a 74 and a tie for sixth. With a four-shot lead walking to the 11th tee, Ochoa was destined to become a Lady of the lake.

She had obtained over 100 tickets to the tournament for family and friends and at least a quarter of them joined Ochoa in the pond. The champion held hands with her mother, father and sister-in-law as she ran into the water, while caddie David

Brooker, who had taken the same dip after looping for 2004 champion Grace Park, took a dive into the shallows off the bridge that connects the island green to the rest of the golf course.

The win was Ochoa's third of the year in just four events and cemented her as the bell ringer for the LPGA Tour for years to come. It also ensured that Ochoa would find herself in the World Golf Hall of Fame at the finish of her 10th year as an LPGA Tour member. In addition to the Kraft Nabisco being her second major victory, it was her 20th career victory.

And the celebration continued even after Ochoa climbed out of the lake and donned the white bathrobe, the other prize awarded to the winner of the tournament many still call "The Dinah."

With a mariachi band playing, Ochoa was joined behind the final green by the many maintenance workers with whom she had breakfast on Wednesday morning. After she pitched in making scrambled eggs for the crew, they presented her with a banner they would hang on the first tee. They also promised her the band if she won.



They delivered. Just like Ochoa.

While the 2008 event marked Ochoa's coronation, it also signaled the end of one of the most celebrated careers in LPGA history. The 2008 Kraft Nabisco was the last tournament for Amy Alcott, one of only three three-time winners (along with Sorenstam and Betsy King) and the first player to take the victory dip in Poppie's Pond.

Ochoa wants to go for dip #2, but there are some players standing in her way. Morgan Pressel, the 2007 champion, will be back. So will 2006 winner, Karrie Webb. And do the names Michelle Wie and Stacy Lewis ring a bell?

Lewis was the medalist at the LPGA Qualifying tournament in December, while Wie, who was in contention at the Kraft Nabisco both as an amateur and a professional, also gained full-playing status at the Qualifying Tournament.

The first tee waits. So does the lake. And another chapter in the storied history of the Kraft Nabisco Championship will be written at both.

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GABE CODDING'S AMERICAN DREAM

FROM VOLUNTEER TO TOURNAMENT BUSINESS MANAGER,
CODDING IS A MODEL FOR SUCCESS

Gabe Coddington is literally living the American Dream, Southern California-style.

Just 13 years ago, he was a high school graduate volunteering on a lark to help organize the 1996 Kraft-Nabisco Championship at Mission Hills Country Club. When this year's championship kicks off at its traditional home in Rancho Mirage, Calif., it will mark the first tournament conducted with Coddington serving as the tournament's Business Manager, which means he's "the man on the ground" in the desert.

Coddington works directly with Kraft's Chicago-based tournament chairman, Dennis Belcastro, who is responsible for implementing Kraft's vision of the tournament in terms of how it runs and what impressions sponsors and consumers can take away from the tournament's branding efforts. In other words, Belcastro has the corporation's plan; Coddington and his staff of three full-time and two part-time employees have the responsibility of executing that plan.

"[My job] is to make the tournament the best experience it can be for our players, fans, and pro-am contestants," says Coddington, 31. "We take Kraft's plans for the event and implement them here."

Coddington came to the 1996 Kraft-Nabisco at the suggestion of a friend who knew the tournament needed hands for its famous "F-Troop," the lead band of organizers that is essentially the front-line for the tournament's logistics operation. Having already made the decision to leave high school during his junior year, Coddington had the freedom to put his construction job on hold and hit the road for the desert. His life would never be the same.

After working on a part-time, seasonal basis for the next five years, Coddington was given a full-time position with the tournament after the 2001 event. That year he was promoted to operations coordinator, and this year became the de facto on-premises tournament director. It's been a fast and rewarding ride for Coddington, who recently became a father. But he says his grass-roots, from-the-ground-up career path makes him the right man for the job.

Coddington says the biggest change he's had to cope with—or benefit from—is the opening of pro-am spots to the public. Because it's never happened before, and may not happen again based on the needs of the title sponsor, he's had to enact a new and untested program that may or may not be used again.

No matter what Kraft's intentions may be for the future as they relate to the championship, Coddington said he has every intention of being there for every change, innovation, or improvement for years to come.

"I've come up through operations," he says. "I can see what everyone else is dreaming up and then [I] get to make it happen. I have a deep passion for this event, and we have a tight-knit staff...we know about the tournament's rich tradition, because most of us have been a part of it. We want to build on that tradition and keep the tournament exciting and relevant."

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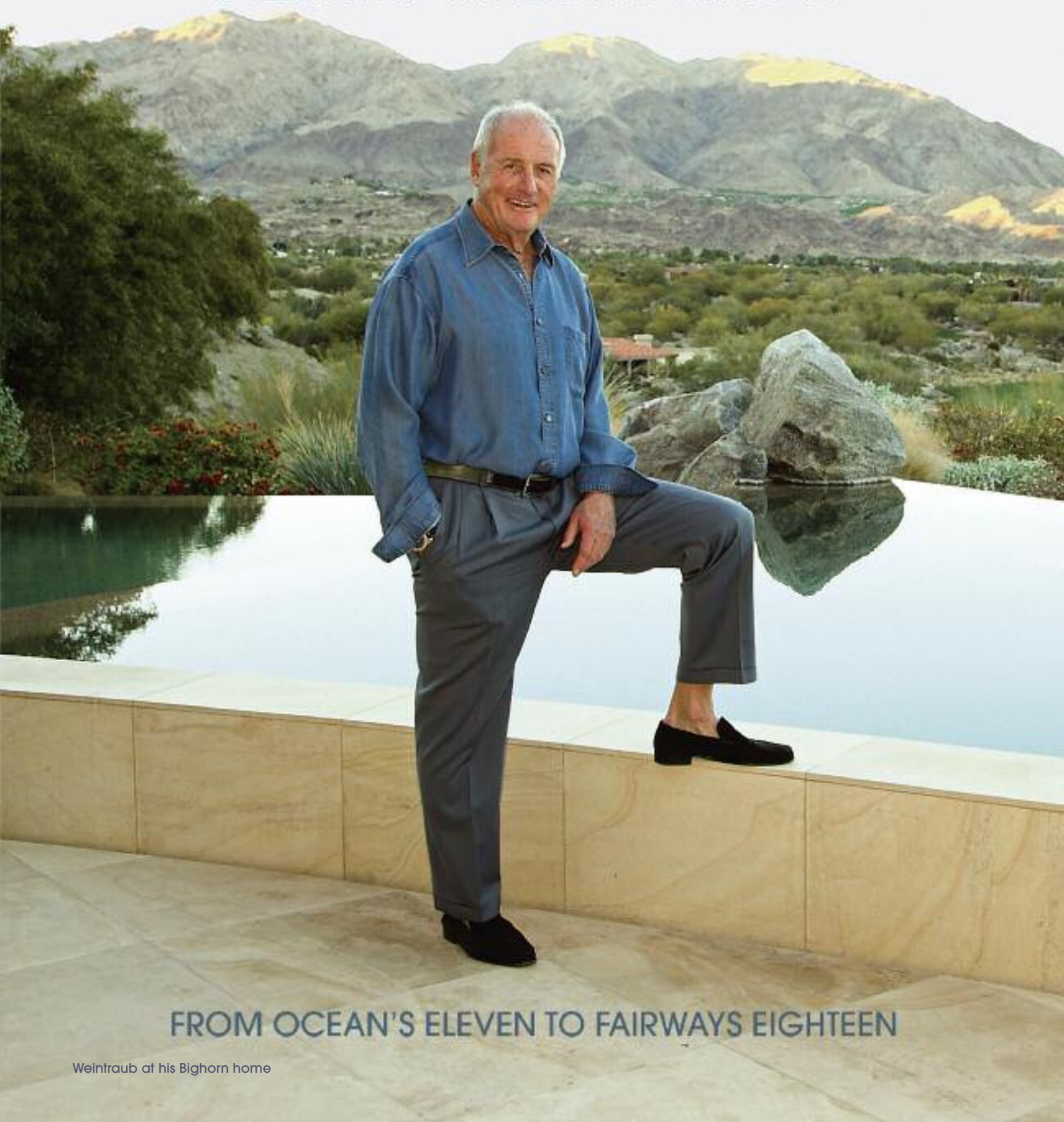

ONE ON ONE WITH JERRY WEINTRAUB



FROM OCEAN'S ELEVEN TO FAIRWAYS EIGHTEEN

SOME MIGHT SAY AWARD-WINNING PRODUCER JERRY WEINTRAUB HAS LIFE BY THE BALLS—GOLF BALLS, THAT IS. AS DARKNESS FALLS ON WEINTRAUB'S HILLSIDE ESTATE IN PALM DESERT CALIF., HE SEEMS EAGER TO TALK GOLF. "SORRY I MADE THIS SO LATE," HE APOLOGIZES, "I HAD A TEE TIME TODAY."

For the young moviegoers of today, Weintraub is the producer of the successful *Ocean's Eleven* series starring George Clooney, Brad Pitt and Matt Damon. That sums it up for one generation.



But ask members of a slightly older generation and they refer to Weintraub, 71, as *the* music promoter of their time, with clients such as Elvis Presley and Frank Sinatra. What many of his fans don't know is that the tenacious Weintraub pursued Presley for a year before convincing him to perform at arenas in front of thousands, which in turn made Weintraub the most sought-after concert promoter on both coasts.

With the success of Elvis's tour, Weintraub founded Concerts West. His company went on to promote concerts for some of the biggest names in the recording industry, including Bob Dylan, Neil Diamond, Led Zeppelin, the Beach Boys and John Denver. Weintraub also promoted old-blue-eyes Frank Sinatra, whom he presented at Madison Square Garden in the famed and first-ever around-the-world satellite concert, a.k.a. *The Main Event*.

Weintraub has enjoyed enormous success as a promoter, record-label owner, movie producer and founder of his own production company, but ask this guy from

the Bronx what he would rather be doing and the answer is "playing golf."

The one-time single-digit player carries about a 14 handicap and can claim two holes-in-one. Titleist supplies all of his golf clubs and slow play is not an option.

Weintraub's love of golf goes back half a century to the days after he left the service. He had barely been playing a month when he got that first hole-in-one. "I hit a bad shot that rolled from the tee up and into the hole," he recalls with a laugh. But he was serious about learning and credits three-time Tour winner Jimmy Demaret, golf pro at the Concord Hotel in the Catskills Mountains at that time, for teaching him.

"He was very instrumental in my golf game."

Weintraub arrived in the desert more than 45 years ago, "because I was in the business with Sinatra and Elvis, who both had homes here, along with Col. Tom Parker. I loved to play tennis, and they had great golf and great weather here, so I bought a home, too. This was the weekend getaway for everyone in Hollywood."

Given that he maintains home in Palm Desert, Malibu, Beverly Hills and Kennebunkport, Maine, it's not surprising that Weintraub looks a little confused when asked about his "home course."

"I don't have a home course," he laughs. "I belong to over 30 clubs and am an investor in many of them, and have honorary memberships in others. Here in the desert, I belong to Bighorn, Madison Club, The Quarry and The Hideaway, but I play mostly at the Madison Club."

Weintraub's "interest" in many of these clubs is the real estate surrounding the golf courses, which he notes, "has financially done very well."

The game of golf is a family affair for the Weintraub clan. Three generations, including his four children and his four grandchildren, play golf. When not golfing with his family, Weintraub does have a regular foursome, but an ailing back limits his time on the course. "I play as much as my back will hold up now and I hate the driving range," he says.

As for his ultimate foursome—make that fivesome—it would include George Bush Sr., Tommy Armour, Freddie Smith and his friend Sooz. He has plenty of opportunity to play with high-powered



colleagues, but that's not his focus. "I enjoy playing with my friends and family; that is what golf is all about for me now."

Relaxed and casual in jeans and a sweatshirt, Weintraub is an entertaining raconteur who goes from serious to captivating to unbelievable all in one sentence, as when asked to recall his most exciting moment on the golf course.

"I was in Europe on a date with this gorgeous girl and I took her out on to the green of the third hole with a bottle of champagne and we made love, it was a fantastic moment."

The man exudes a love of life in every way. He's a major humanitarian who sits on the board of more than 30 charitable organizations. In 1997, the Weintraubs funded UCLA's Jane and Jerry Weintraub Center for Reconstructive Bio-Technology, the first medical center in the world to blend a variety of intellectual approaches and scientific fields including tissue engineering, gene therapy, oncology and wound healing.

Weintraub is a regular celebrity player in many charity events. He's also in the production stages of his own charity golf tournament in Provence, France, where he has joined forces with George Clooney,



Brad Pitt, Matt Damon and Don Cheadle. The cause is *Not on Our Watch*, a humanitarian campaign to end the genocide in Darfur.

In addition to golf, Weintraub says his hobbies are drinking good wine, making love and enjoying "the most spectacular view" of the valley from his Guy Dreier-

designed home. Ask him to describe his life in one sentence and he is quick to reply. "Fantastic and lucky!"

Indeed.

When the LPGA Tour arrives at the Superstition Mountain Golf and Country Club for the 2009 LPGA International, this year presented by Coca-Cola, the latest edition of the tournament that has graced the desert for 27 years will have several new looks.

Safeway is gone as the title sponsor of the event, and longtime favorite player and former champion Annika Sorenstam will be missing from the field as she enjoys her first year of retirement from competition.

But golf, just like life, goes on.

While Sorenstam will be absent from the field of the \$1.5 million event to be played March 26-29, Stacy Lewis and Michelle Wie are expected to compete. Both earned fully exempt playing status at the 2008 LPGA Qualifying Tournament.

But the young superstars-in-waiting will have to clear a major hurdle if they expect to crack the winner's circle. Superstition Mountain belongs to Lorena Ochoa, currently the best female player in the world. She is the two-time defending champion and she has staked her claim on the side of Superstition Mountain.

In 2005, Ochoa had a stranglehold on the event going into the final round, but lost in a playoff with Sorenstam after blowing a four-shot lead with three holes to play. "Sometimes it's tough," Ochoa said. "But you learn a lot with the bad times."

It was a lesson well learned. She came back in 2007 to win the event by overtaking Suzann Pettersen down the stretch, making three birdies over the final four holes. Last year, she didn't need any final-round heroics, running away from the field on her way to a seven-shot win over Jee Young Lee that gave her the 19th win of her still-young professional career.

Opening with a 65 and closing with 66, Ochoa carded a 72-hole score of 266, a tournament record by four shots. "It was a great day," she said after her final round, "especially on the back nine."

The Mexican star turned the tournament into a runaway with birdies on holes 13, 14 and 15, and put a cap on her fourth round with a tap-in birdie on No. 18.

"Once I enter a tournament, I know I can win and I play to win," she said. "I always give 100 percent of myself."

And her fans gave that 100 percent back. As she walked down the 18th fairway on Sunday, three large Mexican flags flew over the gallery that circled the final green.

"It was nice to see the support and feel the love," Ochoa said. "They know that I play not only for myself but for all of them."

It's a theme that Ochoa has brought from her home country to the LPGA Tour, where she meets with the grounds crew and their family members—especially at the clubs in the Southwest—during tournament week.

"I'm just trying to give something back," she said. "I'm trying to really fight for my dreams and always try to keep my head up."

And children, especially young girls, flock to her in droves. "I see them and they say, 'I want to be just like you,' and that feels nice," Ochoa said. "So I try to be a positive influence for them and help in anyway I can for all of them."

During the press conference following her victory, Ochoa said she would do everything in her power to keep the tournament in the Phoenix Area, almost next door to where she attended college at the University of Arizona.

"I feel very comfortable here and I have a lot of fans here," she said. "And they keep coming back every year and I love the support they bring me. It always feels good to see the Mexican flag flying over the golf course."

So when the tournament opens this year, Ochoa will once again be the favorite, much to the delight of the crowds.

The event dates back to 1980 when Jan Stephenson won the first Sun City Classic at Hillcrest Golf Course. Past winners include Beth Daniel, Betsy King, Pat Bradley, Danielle Ammaccapane, Patty Sheehan, Laura Davies (five times) and Annika Sorenstam (three times).

But in recent history, no one has dominated the par-72, 6,629-yard Prospector Course at Superstition Mountain more than Ochoa. And she knows that Wie, Lewis and the rest of the young guns on the LPGA Tour have her in their sights for this year's tournament.

"I know there are so many good players behind me trying to get me, but I like where I am and I'm going to make sure I stay in that position."

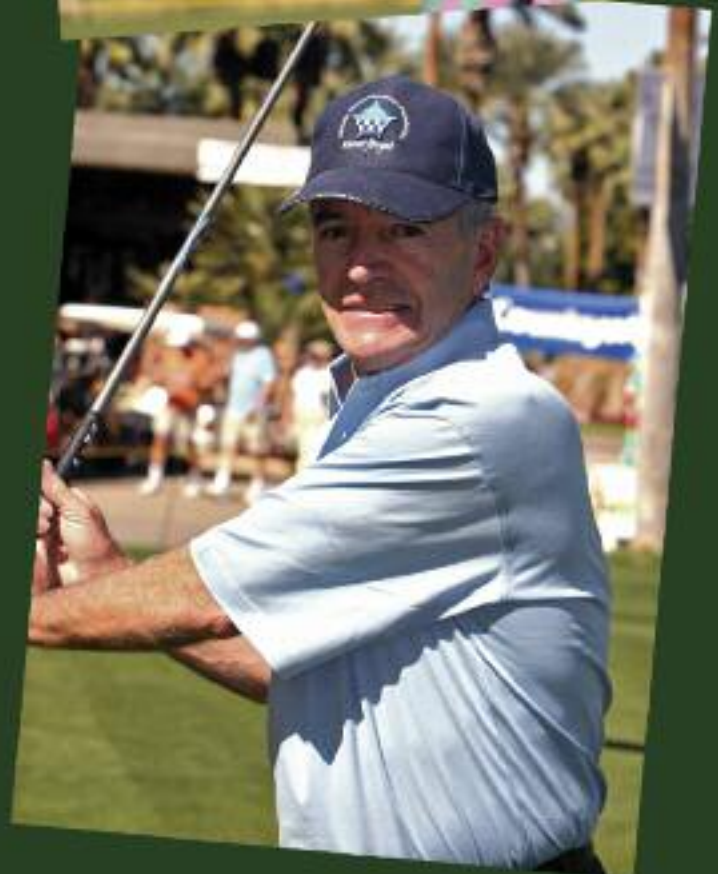

Twenty years later, all three of the famous Gatlin Brothers return to the desert to sing, swing and raise money for the Barbara Sinatra Children's Center. Although each brother now leads his own distinct and successful life, the group is honored to reunite on stage and on the golf course for the 21st Annual Frank Sinatra Starkey Hearing Foundation Celebrity Invitational, February 19-21.



Larry Gatlin met Frank Sinatra while rehearsing for the second Ronald Reagan Presidential Inauguration. "One day Frank, Merv Griffin and I were sitting around rehearsal," Gatlin recalls. "Merv told Frank, 'This kid has written a song you've got to hear.' The song was *I've Done Enough Dyin' Today*. We talked about Frank recording the song, but that never happened. After that, Frank sent me a wonderful letter that is framed and hangs in my office. I was blessed to have a short friendship with Frank and am happy that I can support Barbara Sinatra in her charitable cause."

The Gatlin Brothers have millions of fans worldwide and their musical successes include singing for five U.S. presidents. But their talent and love for life go beyond music and the stage.

Larry Gatlin was born in 1948 in Seminole, Texas, the son of an oil driller.

The oldest of the three brothers, it was Larry who steered the famous trio to stardom.

During his years as an English major at the University of Houston, Larry developed what he calls "a love affair with the English language." Soon after graduation, he expanded his interest in music to include writing and quickly became an accomplished songwriter. In 1971 he moved to Nashville where he wrote hits for Elvis Presley, Dottie West, Johnny Cash and Anne Murray. That success paved the way for his brothers to join him. Larry went on to enjoy a Broadway career, starring in the *Will Rogers Follies* and in *Civil War*.

Whether he is standing alone on the stage with his guitar or alongside his brothers and the band, he is in total control of an enjoyable evening of music. Out on the golf course, he has a 3.5 index.

Steve Gatlin, born in 1951, is the middle brother. He recalls how he and his brothers sang together in church and "anywhere and anytime somebody would listen to us." After the group recorded several hits, Steve's business abilities led him to take on the role of manager, with daily responsibilities for coordinating tours, recording schedules and interview requests. His role in the group included playing bass in addition to singing. With all that, Steve still found time for golf and carries a 3.4 index.

On his own, Steve has been involved in three major production shows and has recorded several CDs—one big band swing and one Gospel, as well as a children's CD. He also speaks at churches and various events, sharing his life experiences and focusing on his recovery from clinical depression. Steve is quick to say he is blessed and believes in "a loving God whose mercies can be seen morning by morning."



Rudy Gatlin is the baby of the family. Raised on gospel music with his mother playing the piano and his father on guitar, Rudy was initially taught to sing harmony. He was just two-and-a-half when big brother Larry, age six, convinced their mother that Rudy was ready to join him and Steve on stage.

Currently Rudy speaks nationwide at various corporate events, associations and civic organizations, sharing his personal experiences as an entertainer, inspiring and motivating people with his unique message and talent. A regular on the Celebrity Golf Tour, Rudy carries a handicap index of 1.3 and is involved with several charity golf events throughout the country. "I'm always happy to do whatever I can for these great causes, especially if there is a little golf associated with it," he says.

Like his brothers, Rudy has a great love for children, and nowhere has this been better displayed than with his tireless efforts and 20 years of service to the Gatlin Brothers MDA Golf Tournament in Dallas, Texas.

The return of the Gatlin Brothers will surely make this year's Invitational special, from their talents on stage to their incredible talents on the golf course. And yes, they love to sign autographs!

Woods is still recovering from the surgery on his damaged left knee that was performed just days after his emotional playoff win over Rocco Mediate in the 2008 U.S. Open at Torrey Pines. When he will return is an unknown right now, but most believe he won't rejoin the PGA Tour until sometime in the Florida swing, most likely at the Arnold Palmer Invitational, which is scheduled just two weeks before the Masters.

And while Woods' absence might take some of the luster off the tournament for the less-than-average fan, it won't for those who understand and relish match play. His absence, in fact, might be a break for the rest of the world.

Woods has dominated World Golf Championship events. In the first 26 he played, he won 15 of them. Only one other player, Darren Clarke, has won more than one. And if there was any doubt that Woods can take apart an opponent—and a golf course—one need only look at his 8 and 7 thrashing of Stewart Cink in the finals of last year's event.

"I spent the whole week demoralizing my opponents," said Cink, who went to the 18th hole only once in his first five matches. "Today I was demoralized."

It has been a Woods thing, even when he was behind in his preliminary matches. He defeated long-hitting J.B. Holmes 1-up in the first round after falling 3-down on the 13th green. In the second round, he defeated Aaron Olerholser, 3 and 2. In the third, he hit his first tee shot into the desert, beamed a cactus on the fourth hole, hit a marshal on the 13th and still beat Aaron Baddeley on the second hole of sudden-death.

K.J. Choi was the next to fall, losing 3 and 2, which set up a semifinal match against defending champion Henrik Stenson, whom Woods dispatched, 2-up.

Then came the scheduled 36-hole final against Cink. Woods was six under par through his first 11 holes and led 5-up. When the two started the afternoon round, Woods had a 4-up that he pushed

even higher with four birdies in his first eight holes. He finished the match by going birdie, birdie, birdie, eagle, par.

But that was then and this is now. With no Tiger in the field, an already volatile match-play format can become explosive. The tournament is open only to the top 64 in the World Golf Rankings (any player not playing in the tournament will be replaced by the next in line in the rankings), and that means a lot of Ryder Cup players will be in the field.

Little did we know last year that Holmes and Boo Weekley, who went out in the third round, would later in the year be stars for the U.S. team that snapped the European hold on the Ryder Cup. In fact, the final four in the Accenture—Woods, Cink, Stenson and Justin Leonard—all played in the 2008 Ryder Cup.

If Woods had not played last year, he would have been replaced in the field by Anthony Kim, who will be solidly inside the top 64 this year.

But this is match play, and while it's the purest form of golf, it can also be the most unfair. Consider that Robert Karlsson, another Ryder Cup player, was at seven under through the first 18 holes of his first-round match against Ryder Cup teammate Paul Casey, but lost as Casey had nine birdies over those same 18 holes. In the semifinals, Cink shot 29 on the strength of four birdies and an eagle in his win over Leonard.

There's also the fact that in every other tournament on the PGA Tour, Thursday is the first round. At the WCG Match Play Championship, 32 players will go home Wednesday evening. Who they'll be is anyone's guess. Last year, 13 lower seeds—at least according to the World Golf Rankings—won, sending players like Ernie Els, Jim Furyk, Rory Sabbatini, Justin Rose, Zach Johnson and Geoff Ogilvy (all seeded in the top 16) home before the normal first-day Thursday.

Trevor Immelman and Stenson went 25 holes in the second round. Rod Pampling and Vijay Singh went 25 holes in the third round.

At the Accenture Match Play, every day is a new tournament. And a new adventure. This year, with the best player in the world still on the sidelines, "adventure" may not even begin to describe it.

Scott McCarron is nothing if not positive.

"I think this is going to be my best year ever. I gave myself the best opportunity by coming down here to the desert. I feel better prepared and in better shape than ever, and my golf game is in better form than it has been at the start of any season."

McCarron, a PGA Tour player for 15 years, moved from Reno with his wife, Jennifer and their two daughters to La Quinta and The Palms Golf Course a few months ago in order to better prepare himself for the Tour. He's well aware of the sacrifice his family has made for him, and he's confident that things are working out as planned.

It's not that he's sitting around waiting for the universe to do him a good turn.

On the contrary, he's taking on every aspect of his life to make sure that he reaches his goals. He works out with Bob Duvall at the Titleist Performance Institute at the Madison Club, and gets help with his mental game and attitude from Dr. Glen Albaugh, author of *Winning the Battle Within*. And always, he stays positive.

That same positive attitude brought him back from an elbow injury that kept him out of play half of 2006 and all of 2007. His tendon was torn completely away from the bone and had to be reattached. At the time he was told he had a 50/50 chance of playing competitive golf again.

"When someone tells me that I start thinking, 'I'm going to come back even stronger' and that's what I did."

It was during rehab that he started working with Duvall, and the two still work together, though the focus now is overall fitness and conditioning as related to golf. So well has McCarron recovered that the Golf Channel filmed Duvall working with McCarron at the Titleist Performance Institute.

To get his game in the best shape, McCarron plays The Palms and the Madison Club. He calls The Palms "a straight, really good golf course that tests all parts of your game, especially on the very long back side."

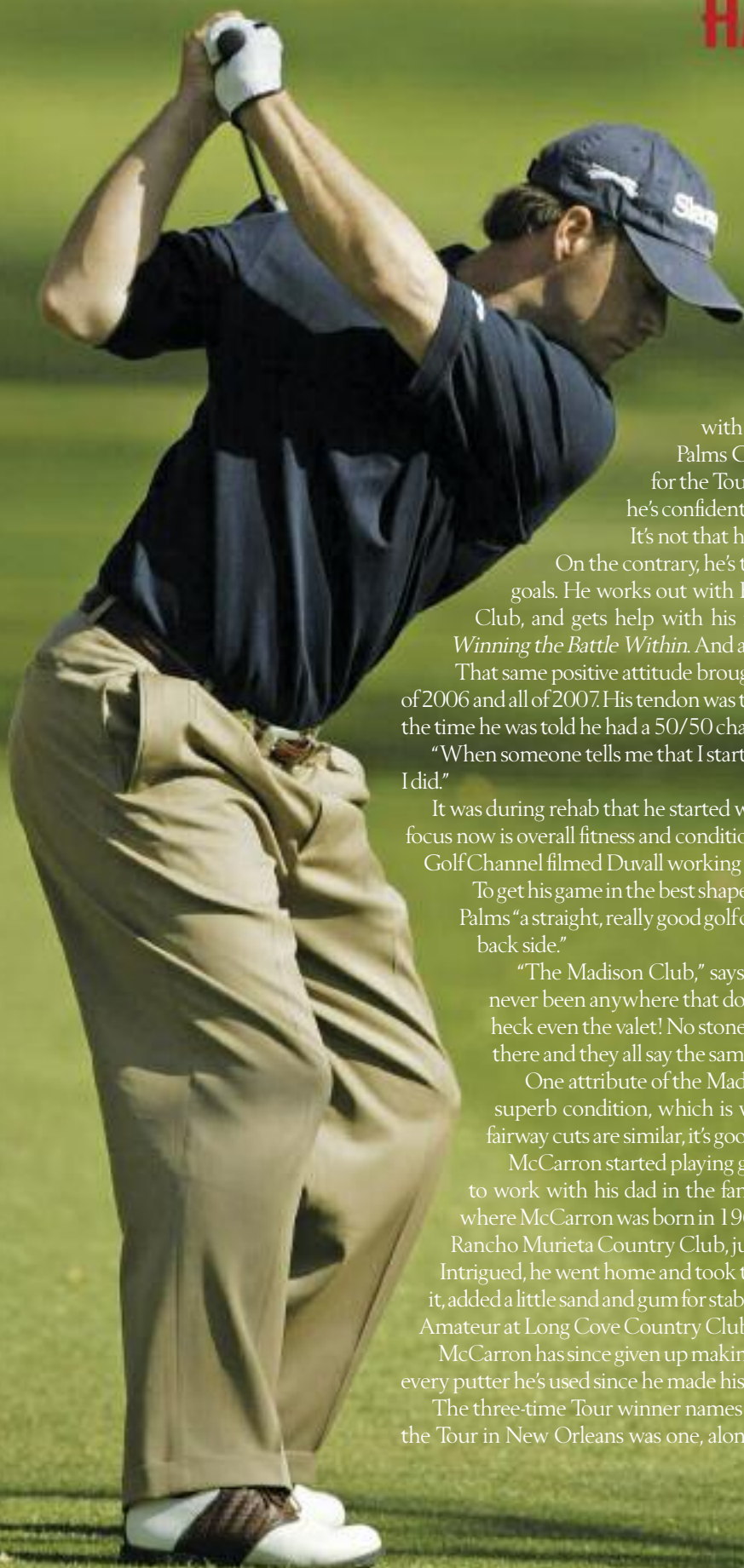
"The Madison Club," says McCarron, "is probably the best golf experience of my life. I've never been anywhere that does a better job. And not just the course but the food, the service, heck even the valet! No stone is left unturned at the Madison Club. I've taken many Tour pros there and they all say the same thing."

One attribute of the Madison Club that makes it ideal practice ground for Tour pros is its superb condition, which is very similar to Tour courses. "The green speeds are similar, the fairway cuts are similar, it's good for replicating what you get on Tour," McCarron says.

McCarron started playing golf when he was young, but gave it up for four years after college to work with his dad in the family's golf apparel company in their hometown of Sacramento, where McCarron was born in 1965. He was lured back to the game when the Senior Tour came to Rancho Murieta Country Club, just outside Sacramento. There he saw players using a long putter. Intrigued, he went home and took the top off a Ping Anser 2, stuck a sawed-off three-wood shaft into it, added a little sand and gum for stability and ended up with a 49-inch putter. He almost won the Mid-Amateur at Long Cove Country Club on Hilton Head with it that year.

McCarron has since given up making clubs. He now uses a TaylorMade Spider on the greens, but like every putter he's used since he made his own in 1991, it's a long 49-inches.

The three-time Tour winner names several highlights in his career. Winning his first tournament on the Tour in New Orleans was one, along with a well televised hole-in-one in 1999 at the CVS Charity

Classic. McCarron told Lee Janzen, who was up right before him, to put his ball in the hole because he was going to knock his in on top of it. Janzen did, McCarron did, and ESPN cameras and sound caught it all. Talk about positive attitude.

"He'll never doubt me again," McCarron laughs about Janzen.

This year, though, the pro has loftier goals. "I want to make the President's Cup team and play on it with Freddie Couples. And I want to make the Top 30 for the FedEx Cup."

But it's not just about golf. McCarron believes that you have to work on all aspects of your life. He writes down goals for everything—health, fitness, business, agents, and, of course, golf. He shares his goals with Jennifer, too, and the two of them write out family goals together. He's a devoted dad and spending time with his family is important. His two girls, age 11 and 13, are in a junior golf program at Desert Willows, and he likes to go there to help out.

He enjoys his off-the-course time, frequently spending it learning something new. "I had never shot a bow in my life," he says, "but I went with Steve Elkington and Tom Watson to Greg Norman's ranch in Colorado and shot my first elk."

He has also caught a 300-lb marlin off the coast of Cabo San Lucas and has tried aerobatic flying, something he plans to do again.

This year, though, golf is front and center. "I want to get back in the mix and play majors. I want to win a major. I think I'd have a good chance at Augusta."

If a positive attitude and hard work truly pay off, 2009 will be McCarron's year.

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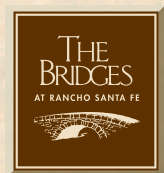

Celebrate a winning round or any special occasion with champagne and caviar at the **Ventana Room** at Loews Ventana Canyon Resort, one of only two AAA Five Diamond restaurants in Arizona. The new Chef's Tasting Menu blends classic French style with local seasonal produce grown by the Tohono Oo'dham Nation. On the à la carte menu, items can be ordered separately or combined to create a prix-fixe meal, perhaps finished with the fancy cheese course and a dessert wine pairing. Floor-to-ceiling windows capture sunset views, and as the lighting dims, tables around the big central stone fireplace take on a glow of their own. Fans of Caesar salad will be pleased to find that Anthony's carries on the tradition of Caesar prepared tableside, the old-fashioned way. Multiple dining rooms allow space for intimate gatherings as well as large parties to enjoy the elegant, romantic atmosphere. Anthony's is tucked into the foothills of the Santa Catalina Mountains. As night falls, city lights begin to twinkle below. 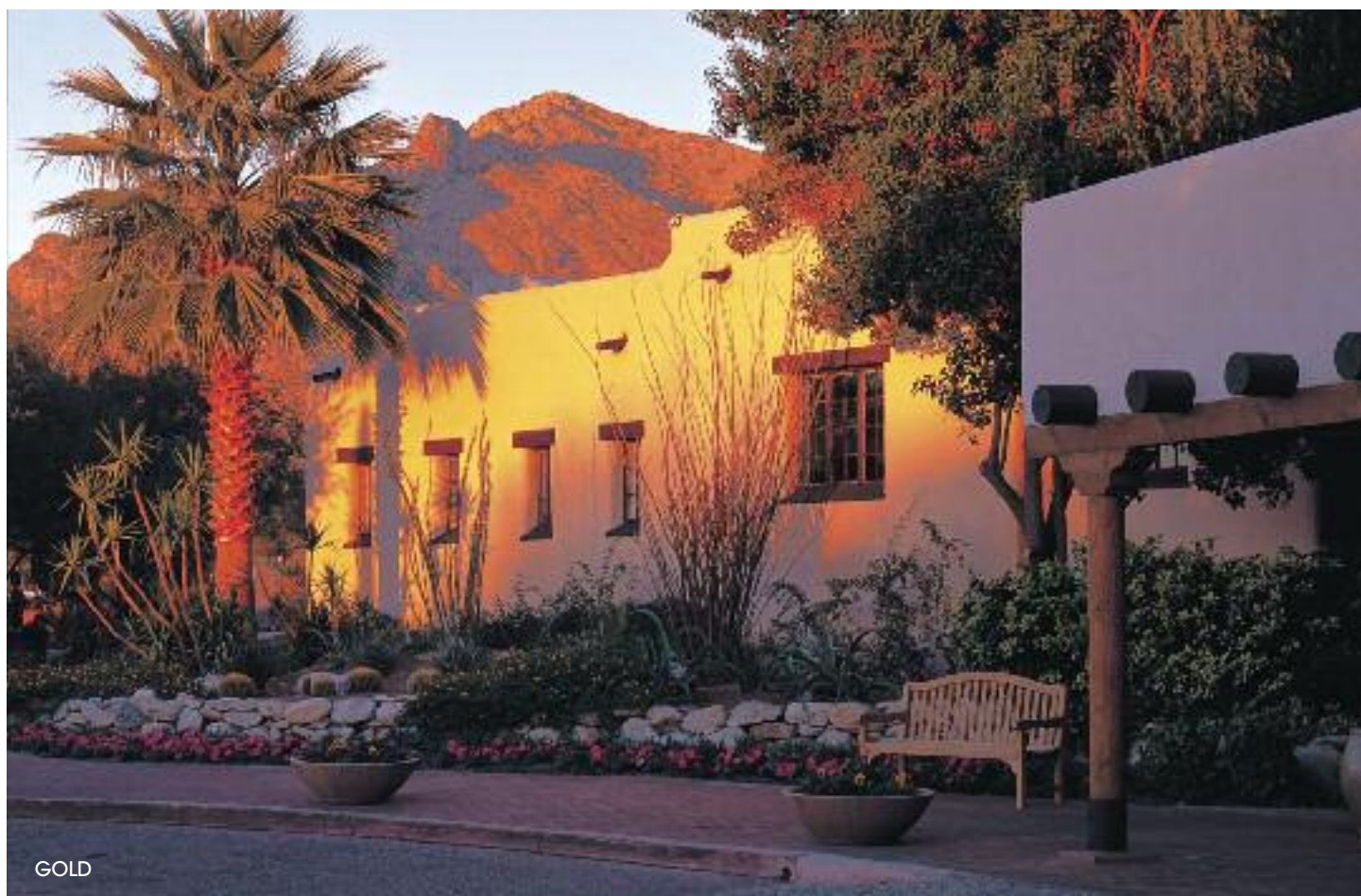

Recent major renovations at the historic (1912) Westward Look Resort have brought an updated style to the property and especially to its signature restaurant, **GOLD**, formerly the renowned Gold Room. Located about an hour north of Tucson in Chandler, Kai is in the Sheraton Wild Horse Pass Resort & Spa, which sits on 2,400 acres owned by the Gila River Indian Community. At Kai, dining is both a culinary and a cultural experience. The menu is a fascinating and delicious mix of authentic Native American flavors and locally farmed ingredients from the Pima and Maricopa tribes, who comprise the Community. Menu items are listed in order of "The Birth," "The Beginning," and "The Journey." Grilled tenderloin of buffalo from the Cheyenne River Tribe is always popular, challenged by the new signature dish, Potpourri of Ancient Pima Tribal Herbs and Plants Dancing With Chippewa Walleye. Desserts are "The Afterlife." Patio dining opens to unobstructed views across the desert as the sun sets over the mountains.

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CORVETTE COMEBACK

THE ZR1—NOT YOUR FATHER'S CORVETTE



FIFTY-FIVE YEARS AGO, THE CORVETTE MADE WAVES ON THE AMERICAN AUTO SCENE, SETTING THE STAGE FOR MUSCLE AND FINESSE. TODAY, THE RIPPLE EFFECTS ARE ABOUT TO BECOME A TSUNAMI WITH THE NEW ZR1

An entirely redesigned LS9 motor produces the fastest, most powerful car GM has ever made. A 638 horsepower, 6.2 liter engine creates 595 pound-feet of torque at 4,000 rpm. While GM's attorneys aren't suggesting you try this at home, they have said that 205 miles per hour is not unimaginable in this crazy-powerful machine. That's Ferrari speed with American roots.

"For a 50- or 60-year-old who grew up dreaming of owning a Corvette, this is a dream come true," says John Cook at Champion Cadillac and Chevrolet in La Quinta, Calif. "Most guys I know didn't grow up wanting a Ferrari or Lamborghini, they wanted a Corvette. This is the American dream come true."

The legend of the ZR1 begins with a design meeting between a bunch of gearhead engineers and the GM CEO Rick Wagoner in 2001. They were showing off the new Z06 with its meager 505 horsepower. The Z06 was tentatively priced around \$70,000 and Wagoner asked matter-of-factly, "If we could do this for \$70,000, what could we do for \$100,000?"

of a standard transmission in luxury sports cars makes this feature either a joy or a head scratcher. Either way, the reinforced gearbox is tight and delivers power quickly. The twin-disc 260mm design provides plenty of power while maintaining a relatively easy clutch action.

"It all boils down to the power-to-weight ratio and the ZR1's is exceptional," says Chevy General Manager Ed Peper. "Better than the Porsche 911 GT2, the Ferrari 599 and even the Lamborghini LP640."

GM started with the Z06 chassis, and then improved on it in the front and rear independent suspension to handle the ZR1's mega-broad tires. The increased traction and control will add to the driving experience. GM isn't shy about telling us that the ZR1 will achieve fighter-jet-like g forces.

"It is a world-beating super car from America that makes no apologies," Peper says on the GM Fastlane blog. "And to those who question its capabilities or technical supremacy, I have only two words: **Bring it.**"

The look of the ZR1 is not entirely inventive, but how creative can you get with a brand that has been

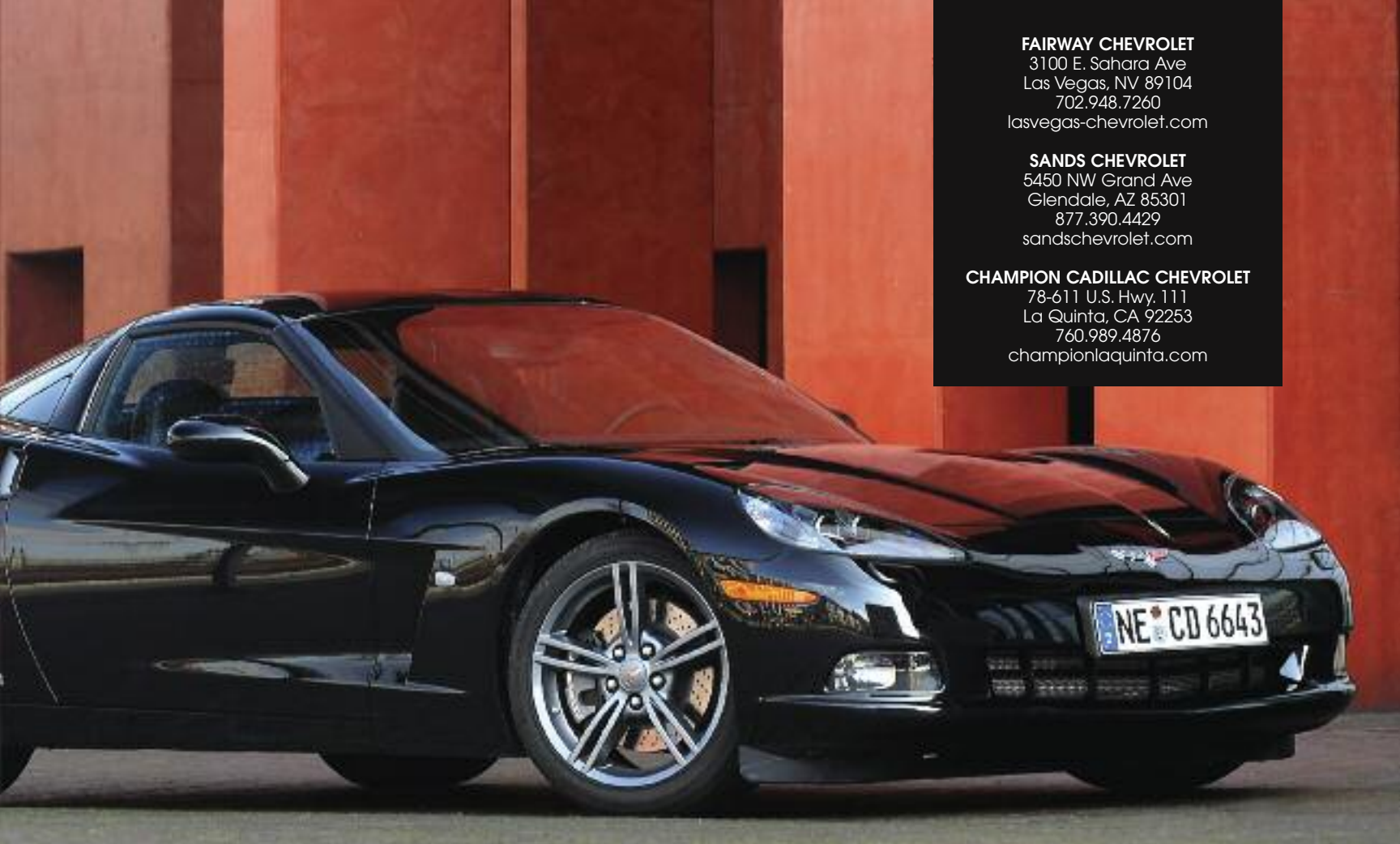


That question set into motion a covert operation with designers looking for answers. The resulting ZR1 is a testimony to the fact that when GM puts its mind to it, greatness is possible. The ZR1 and its Z06 counterpart aren't going to save the domestic auto industry single-handedly, but they are a huge leap in the right direction. The Z06 blazes from 0 to 60 mph in a mere 3.6 seconds. With the added 115 horsepower, the older brother ZR1 will likely be closer to three seconds flat.

The ZR1's supercharged V8 is paired with a six-speed manual gearbox and new high-capacity clutch designed for the increased power. The relative rarity

set in auto stone for 20+ years? The lines have gotten slightly more aggressive, however, giving the traditional profile a look that's a bit sleeker. Using carbon composites and the unmistakable slender nose, GM went with something similar to the early 1990s body, which harkened back to the Lotus influence.

The roof and front fascia splitter have a raw carbon fiber appearance with a protective clear coat. The hood is painted like the rest of the car, but the underside is exposed carbon-fiber-weave for unique texture. Another standout feature of the hood is a clear polycarbonate "window" that provides a view of

the top of the engine's intercooler, with embossed "LS9 Supercharged" lettering.

The ZR1's suspension is GM's Magnetic Selective Ride Control (MSRC) suspension system. The MSRC shocks are digitally adjusted based on driving conditions and real-time vehicle dynamics. This "handle-on-demand" function produces the perfect ride for every driver. The system is calculating each milisecond in order to provide sharp handling during intense driving and a smooth ride while taking it easy.

There is very little optional equipment on the ZR1, but very little extra is needed. The seating is comfortable and the upgraded package includes power, leather-trimmed sport seats, leather-wrapped interior elements (including the dashboard), a navigation

system and Bluetooth connectivity. The leather feels elegant and the interior is everything you'd want in a car that's made more to roar than purr.

GM is only producing about 1,500 of these beauties—two to each dealer. They are due out in early 2009. With a price tag starting around \$105,000, this isn't your typical Corvette. In fact, buzz got out and had the initial ZR1 at a Phoenix auto auction with proceeds going to charity.

"The first car off the line sold for \$1 million dollars," says Cook. "That sets the bar pretty high."

DECO DIAMONDS

VINTAGE OR NEW, ART DECO JEWELRY IS BEAUTIFUL, TIMELESS AND COLLECTIBLE



FOR MY BIRTHDAY THIS YEAR, MY MOTHER GAVE ME A BEAUTIFUL PLATINUM BRACELET WITH INLAID DIAMONDS AND SAPPHIRES, WHICH HAD ONCE BELONGED TO MY GREAT GRANDMOTHER. THE BRACELET IS DELICATE, WITH FINE DETAILING IN THE PLATINUM AND INTRICATELY CUT STONES IN DIAMOND AND TRIANGULAR SHAPES, AND IT REPRESENTS AN ERA WHEN JEWELRY WAS AN ART FORM. Jewelry pieces classified as art deco typically are from the period of 1925 to 1940, and are characterized by geometric motifs, bold colors and a streamlined, modern design. Vintage metals, such as platinum or white gold, were traditionally used. Art deco designs often feature either deep blue sapphires or luscious red rubies in addition to diamonds. The pieces typically include a geometrical shape used singly or in combination with others for an elegant, sophisticated look. Squares, circles, ovals, triangles, rectangles and fusions of the shapes were used to create sleek, precise designs. Art Deco reached its peak in the mid-1930s, and platinum surpassed gold as the most precious metal. Today, platinum has experienced a boom in popularity, as have art deco styles.

The art deco look is not new but does seem to be experiencing a revival. At this year's Academy Awards ceremony, numerous stars were bejeweled in deco designs, including actress Jennifer Garner, who wore a Van Cleef & Arpels circa 1928 art deco necklace with 61 carats of dazzling diamonds.

Last year, at a Christie's auction in Geneva, art deco Cartier jewels were up for auction, including a circa 1925 diamond bracelet estimated at \$200,000 to \$280,000, and an aquamarine and diamond bangle, circa 1935, estimated at \$35,000 to \$50,000. A Christie's spokesperson said art deco is the most highly regarded period of jewelry design.

Quinn's Auction Galleries in Falls Church, Virginia will be posting for auction a unique art deco brooch with 80 diamonds and a total carat weight of just over 11 carats. Matthew Quinn of the auction house says, "the brooch was a gift from King Zog I of Albania to Hungarian Countess Johanna Mikes in December of 1936, as part of marriage proposal that would never happen. She later married the Prime Minister of Hungary's son Geza Teleki and moved to America."

The brooch is expected to sell for \$15,000 to \$25,000, and bidding starts February 7 at 11 a.m. EST. Visit quinnsauction.com for more info.

Kwiat Jewelers has an Art Deco Collection with stunning pieces, including geometric design rings. One octagonal ring has 1.10 carats of diamonds set in 18-karat white gold for \$5,450, and another clover-shaped ring from the Clover Collection is \$5,050, with one carat of diamonds in either platinum or 18-karat white gold. The Kwiat Art Deco Collection has evolved over the past century, but a majority of the pieces were launched this past year, coinciding with the 100th anniversary of Kwiat.

"What resonates with me about art deco design is that it is not limited to wearable art such as jewelry, but that the movement applied to all elements of lifestyle," says Greg Kwiat, a fourth-generation member of the Kwiat diamond empire. "Given today's economic and political climate, we are seeing a return to buyers looking for investment pieces that will maintain their value through fluctuations in the market and provide investments of pleasure."

Designer **Judith Ripka** is known primarily for 18-karat gold designs with large brightly colored gemstones. Ripka's Deco Estate Cuff is in 18-karat yellow gold with 15.7 carats of diamonds, retailing for \$60,000. The dazzling cuff bracelet has an interlocking diamond pattern down the center of the cuff, and the yellow gold offers a twist on the traditional deco designs in platinum or white gold.

The **Tanagro New Deco Collection**, recently launched, defines a new century of creativity with bold, linear architecture and geometric concepts. The collection uses traditional red, white and black colors that identify deco, fused with an 18-karat gold base with silver, and then oxidized to give each piece an antique appearance. Tanagro craftsmen manipulate the natural process of oxidation to produce a softer, more aesthetically appealing black. Tanagro's pavé-set diamonds and bezel-set rubies are placed in such a way that the oxidized metals framing the gemstones let light pass back and forth through the stones to capture every nuance. The half circles and straight lines that are hallmarks of the Tanagro New Deco collection create a unique, flattering symmetry.

The New Deco collection consists of a necklace, pendants, earrings and rings, held together with the most delicate metalwork. Prices in the collection range from \$4,500 up to \$31,000. Gorgeous interlocking circular deco earrings set in 18-karat yellow gold and silver, with 2.87 carats of diamonds and 1.64 carats of diamond melee, retail for \$20,500.

With all of the new deco-inspired collections available today, it is nice to know that the bracelet I inherited is not representative of a fad from a bygone era, but rather, is a hallmark of classic jewelry design that will forever be in style.
