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




Our 10th year anniversary celebration will continue throughout the year, and we hope you will join us each issue for what we know will be one of the best seasons yet.

As the world focused on this golfing phenom, so did the media. Between 2004 and 2005 more than 8,000 press stories were written about Wie, easily surpassing media darlings Paris Hilton and Jessica Simpson.

Fast forward to October 2006 and Wie's life is as exciting as any one life could be. Quoted two years ago saying, "I like challenges, and I think that I get really bored easily," Wie today is about as far removed from boredom as possible. This year she has played in seven LPGA events and won more than \$718,000. She has a driver's license, purchased a home at the Bighorn Golf Club in Palm Desert, California and is beginning her senior year at Punahou High School. She has also been on the cover of numerous publications, competed on the men's European and PGA Tours, and is definitely a fashion trendsetter.

With the world at her doorstep, Wie has also realized the importance of giving, and thus far has (on the record) donated \$500,000 to the Hurricane Katrina Relief Fund and \$300,000 to an endowment at the Yonsei University Severance Hospital and Korea University Medical Center, monies that will pay for operations for more than 30 children between the ages of eight and 18 who could not otherwise afford them.

As her first professional season draws to a close, Wie is also looking for a new caddy. Andy Lano II, who for the past 20 years caddied for PGA professional Kenny Perry, was hired to caddy for Wie at the European Masters and the 84 Lumber Classic. If all works out between the duo, Lano will continue his duties at the Samsung World Golf Championship October 9-15 at the Bighorn Golf Club.

For the third consecutive year, Wie accepted a Championship Selection Committee invitation to play in the Samsung saying, "Last year, the event marked the start of my professional career and I will always remember my debut. The tournament is a wonderful event and I am honored to play in it again. I love the Bighorn Golf Club because of its location, privacy, quality of golf courses, spa, fitness center and the community."

Obviously, having high-profile Wie as a part-time resident is very exciting for the community. Bighorn Chairman, R.D. Hubbard says, "We are honored to have Michelle and her family at Bighorn; they are a championship family working so hard to achieve Michelle's goals, not unlike the members here at our club. We expect great things from Michelle and look forward to hosting four more years of the Samsung World Championship."

As Wie readies herself for the Samsung, during which she will celebrate her 17th birthday, she is delighted to answer the really tough questions regarding music, food, cars and, of course, fashion.





Boldly wearing outfits on the golf course that are talked about by all ages and genders, Wie's input is a vital part of her look. "I share my ideas and insights with the Nike Golf designers about what I like in fashion, so I think I'm influential that way," she says, adding, "It's fun for me. Except for the LPGA majors, I choose all of my outfits. I'm scripted by Nike Golf for all of the majors."

Off the golf course, Wie has admitted to her love of shopping and frequents Theory, Louis Vuitton, C&C, Juicy Couture and Dolce & Gabbana. "Pink and black are my favorite colors," she says, "and watches, earrings and necklaces are my favorite accessories."

With so much happening in her life, it is easy to forget how she arrived at this level of the play. Wie was introduced to the game by her parents and began playing golfat the age of four. As a seven-year-old she played her first 18-hole round and finished 14-over par. At the age of ten she shot a 64 and became the youngest player to qualify in a USGA amateur championship. She began to chalk up amateur wins by the age of 11, and at 12 she became the youngest

player to ever qualify for an LPGA tournament on a Monday qualifying. Wie then began to divide her tournament play between LPGA events, amateur events and men's events. With a win at the U.S. Women's Amateur Public Links Championship in 2003, invitations to compete worldwide as an amateur in professional events begin to pour in. Two years later, she announced her professional status.

Wie works with renowned golf instructor David Leadbetter and is managed by the William Morris Agency. Her parents continue to be heavily involved in the decision-making regarding her career and life, mainly as protective parents concerned for their child's wellbeing. "They're always there for me," says Wie.

Often the epicenter of distractions at tournaments, Wie is learning the art of focusing on her own golf game and admires Tiger Woods' "level of concentration and motivation," and Annika Sorenstams' "consistency."

When not practicing or doing homework, Wie's favorite pastimes include watching TV, reading books, hanging out





with friends and listening to music. "I like the Black Eyed Peas, the Vines and John Mayer, and no, I don't have a boyfriend," she adds knowing the question will soon follow.

about her choice automobiles and the response is, "Currently it's BMW or Range Rover; it changes with the latest models." And the foods that this six-foot-tall slender beauty can't get enough include sushi, Korean BBQ, Dim Sum, Italian pasta and pizza.



# IMAGINE A GOLF COURSE THAT OFFERS THE "WOW" FACTOR ALONG WITH AN EMPHASIS ON "FUN" AND YOU'RE NO DOUBT IMAGINING THE NEW CLIVE CLARK-DESIGNED WEST COURSE AT THE LEGENDARY GOLF RESORT AT INDIAN WELLS

Timing is everything, and when the City of Indian Wells decided it was time to turn their 20-year-old established resort course into a course that would bring both resort guests and locals back for more, the Palm Desert-based Clive Clark Design company offered the City the perfect vision: An amenity-rich, first-class golf course with the feel and quality of any high-end private course in the Coachella Valley.

With 25 new golf courses and five course remodels throughout the United States, Europe and South Africa to his credit, Clark is delighted with the end result at the West Course. "This golf course now comes to life," Clark says, noting that his design offers a "private country club experience" for all golfers. "Apart from being playable, I tried to make the course fun, with a sufficient challenge for all levels of golfers as well as an element of charm."

Opening in November 2006, the new West Course plays to 7,088 yards from the back tees and gives golfers five teeing areas to choose from. Keeping with the theme of enjoyment, most of the severe bunkers are placed in relatively benign positions and many of the greens are open-fronted, allowing players the opportunity to run the ball onto the green. Green sizes vary throughout the course, and on several holes Clark has subtlety incorporated the risk/reward factor with a visually dramatic variety of hazards.



Costs for the new course have topped the \$11 million dollar mark, but Clark has managed to keep the cost as budgeted, even with a few minor glitches along the way.

"We're very pleased with the progress to date," says Roger Behling, Golf Resort Director for the City of Indian Wells. "At the onset of a project of this size there are a lot of critical details and time sensitive progressions. I'm thrilled to say that our expectations have been met if not exceeded in every case."

Aesthetic appeal is a Clark trademark and the West Course, gorgeous from every angle, is no exception. Golfers are treated to a rich mix of colors and textures — orange splashes of Gazania, mauve Verbena, the pale silver-green and textures of the Encelia bush and the





wispy effect of tall grasses including Pampas, Fountain and Regal Mist. More than 10,000 shrubs were hand planted to further enhance the vibrancy of the landscape, and Clark met the challenge of incorporating nearly all of the original 4,000 mature trees into the new design.

Handcrafted stone bridges, eleven waterfalls, twisting streams, split-level lakes and babbling brooks placed strategically through the course add to the "wow" factor. Players familiar with the previous design will be amazed to discover backdrops and mountain views previously unseen from the course, particularly the views out to the Santa Rosa Mountains and the panoramas of Mount Eisenhower to the south.

The West Course is only the beginning of a \$55 million dollar

project. Currently, the original Ted Robinson-designed East Course is available for play. When the West Course debuts, construction will immediately begin on a new John Fought (East) Course, as well as on a 50,000-square-foot Douglas Fredrikson-designed clubhouse and a spacious practice facility. The entire project is slated for completion in November of 2007. Meanwhile, golf packages remain available throughout the season, including the 2007 Indian Wells Golf Card offering preferred greens fees, tee times, services and special savings.

An incomparable natural setting and stunning design ensure that the West Course at The Golf Resort at Indian Wells will provide the kind of exceptional golf experience that keeps players returning time and time again.

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
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# IT'S A THANKSGIVING TRADITION – JUST LIKE TURKEY, DRESSING, MASHED POTATOES AND CRANBERRY SAUCE. FOR THE PAST 23 YEARS, THE SKINS GAME HAS BEEN AS MUCH A PART OF THANKSGIVING AS OVEREATING AND FALLING ASLEEP ON THE COUCH. THIS YEAR WILL BE NO DIFFERENT – EXCEPT FOR THE FALLING ASLEEP PART

With defending champion Fred Funk, long-hitter John Daly, Fred Couples, "The King of Skins" and current Players Championship winner, Stephen Ames in the field, the possible fireworks — and a \$1 million purse — won't leave much time for a nap. The 24th Skins Game will be played Nov. 25-26 at the Trilogy Golf Club in La Quinta, California, with 20 percent of the money going to charity.

#### **THE GAME**

Anyone who has ever bet a nickel on the golf course has probably played Skins. The bet is simple. If one player wins a hole outright, he (or she) wins the money. If two players tie, then the money for that hole carries over and is added to

"You certainly feel a lot better once you get a skin," Couples has said. "Until that happens, the pressure just keeps building."

The thing is, under the format you can play well and not win a dime. Last year, Sorenstam made three birdies and didn't win a hole. Seven times, Couples was tied on a hole before coming up empty at the pay window.

Funk, who actually had to don a skirt — there was a little side bet — when he was out-driven by Sorenstam, made an eagle on the par-5 ninth, a birdie on the par-4 12th and a birdie on the par-5 18th to win the last 15 skins.

This year, each of the first six holes will be worth \$25,000; holes seven to 12 are worth \$50,000; holes 13 to 17 are







the money available on the next hole. And so on and so on and so on.

In theory, the first 17 holes could be tied — making the last hole worth the entire \$1 million. It's happened before. Greg Norman won every skin in 2004. It almost happened last year when Funk, the shortest hitter — and least famous member of the Skins foursome that also included Tiger Woods, Couples and Annika Sorenstam — won the last 15 skins to pocket \$925,000 and an invitation to return as defending champion. Woods won \$75,000 while Couples (the Skins Game's all-time career money winner) and Sorenstam were both shut out. And that's the biggest fear for any player.

worth \$70,000 and the 18th hole alone is worth \$200,000. There's \$300,000 up for grabs on Saturday and \$700,000 on the table Sunday.

#### THE PLAYERS

FRED FUNK. Funk is probably the least-likely winner in the history of The Skins Game. It's a format tailor-made for a long hitter who makes a lot of birdies, and that doesn't exactly describe Funk. He was 197th on the PGA Tour in driving distance in 2005 and finished 168th in putting average. But as was true when he won the Players Championship in 2005, he's one of the most consistent scorers on tour — ranking 29th in scoring average in 2005. He's also a crowd favorite



because he wears his emotions on his sleeve and plays to the gallery. When he took the Skins Game crown last year, he became the oldest winner in the history of the event at 49, stealing that record from Gary Player who was 48 when he won in 1983. Funk also became the sixth player in the history of the tournament to win in his first Skins Game and he set a moneywinning record for a first-time player.

FRED COUPLES. The 46-year-old sweet swinger is the most prolific player in the history of the Skins Game. He's played the event 12 times, posting five wins. He holds records for most skins won (77), most career money (\$3,515,000) and most birdies in one vear (nine in 1999). He won the Skins Game in 1995, 1996, 1999, 2003 and 2004. Another gallery favorite, Couples won the Masters in 1992 and

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has 34 worldwide wins in his career. He has played on five U.S. Ryder Cup teams.

JOHN DALY. Big John owns two major championship titles, the 1991 PGA Championship and the 1995 British Open. He has the perfect game for skins with a combination of length off the tee and a deft touch around the greens. He won seven skins and \$160,000 in his Skins Game debut in 1991 before being shut out in the 1996 edition of the event. His last PGA Tour win came at the 2004 Buick Invitational, although he finished second twice in 2005, losing to Woods in a playoff at the WCG-American Express Championship and to Vijay Singh in a playoff at the Shell Houston Open. He is averaging more than 306 yards per drive this year and had one drive measured at 397 yards.

STEPHEN AMES. The only player in the history of the PGA Tour to be born in Trinidad and Tobago, Ames is the unknown in this year's Skins Game. But remember, no one gave Funk much of a chance last year. Ames, who captured his first PGA Tour win at the 2004 Western Open, shocked the field at this year's Players Championship when he won by six shots in the tournament that annually has the best and deepest field of any PGA Tour event. And, he knows how to play skins. He won the Canadian Skins Game in 2005.


#### THE COURSE

The Trilogy Golf Course is a par-72, 7,038-yard layout designed by Gary Parks. It's located at the base of the Santa Rosa Mountains and is the centerpiece of Trilogy at La Quinta, a community built by Shea Homes Inc., the country's largest private homebuilder. The course follows the natural terrain of the Coachella Valley.

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
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### Jim Murray Invitational Golf Classic

#### THIS CELEBRITY TOURNAMENT RAISES FUNDS FOR JOURNALISM SCHOLARSHIPS WHILE HONORING AN ICON'S LEGACY

When sportswriter icon Jim Murray passed away in 1998, his wife Linda McCov-Murray took stock of his awards and then she took action. She set up a foundation in his name to honor top journalism students with significant scholarships. Considering Murray's ardent love of golf, creating a celebrity tournament as the focus for fundraising was a given. Talk to McCoy-Murray for five minutes and you know she is dedicated and passionate about the cause. As president/founder of the Jim Murray Memorial Foundation, she works tirelessly on events, the scholarship competition

continuously alongside contributors and well-wishers. It's not a part-time gig. She says, "I get asked all the time: What would Jim say? He would say, 'Why don't you get a life?""

This year the Jim Murray Invitational Golf Classic gets underway on Nov. 13 at SilverRock Resort in La Quinta, California. Foursomes include one celebrity player, and participants receive a host of niceties, including a souvenir journal and foursome photo. Longtime friend Arnold Palmer honorary chairman, a

role he has filled since the first tournament in 1999. The event had its beginnings in Los Angeles, but when McCoy-Murray moved to LaQuinta on a permanent basis last year, SilverRock was a natural choice as the tournament site. The resort's Arnold Palmer Classic Course is an intriguing and sumptuous design—one of the few municipal venues with Palmer's stamp.

"Arnold is so generous—he's terrific," says McCoy-Murray. "We have a wonderful cross-section of athletes and actors." Tournament veterans include baseball great Steve Garvey, racecar driver Danny Sullivan and comedian Dennis Miller among a host of luminaries. Along with Palmer, NFL Hall of Famer Joe Namath and Indy champ Bobby Rahal are among those who have been honored by the foundation as "Great Ones," and have teed it up as well. The Great Ones-Murray Scholars Awards Dinner, with comedian Tom Dreesen scheduled to emcee, will be held at the resort the night before the tournament.

"Whenever I complimented Jim on a column, which was often, he would say, 'When I'm out of here, people will say, Jim who?' He had tons of humility and little ego," says his wife.

"People do have a short memory, so he didn't think he would be remembered. I felt I needed to do something to perpetuate his legacy."

Along with keeping alive Jim Murray's contributions journalism, Murray is devoted to the foundation's Murray Scholars. This year's class marks a total of 49 recipients chosen from the top 15 journalism schools in the country. Winners are flown to Southern California with parents and relatives in tow, and some have had the memorable honor of

writing on Murray's 1946 Remington typewriter. Year after year, McCoy-Murray unwittingly assumes a surrogate-mom role with each student and stays in touch after the ceremony. "When scholarship recipients say they couldn't finish their education without the Jim Murray Foundation, it brings tears to my eyes," she says. "They are really struggling financially and are so talented. To be able to help them it validates everything we do."

Justin Doom, among those in the inaugural class of Murray Scholars, recently described why this scholarship program is different. "A lot of places will write you a nice



check, pat you on the back, congratulate accomplishments and send you on your way," he writes. "Certainly nothing wrong with that. But becoming a Murray Scholar is quite literally like becoming a family." The winners have formed friendships, and some have contacted McCoy-Murray

as they set up a Murray Scholars alumni group. They anticipate donating \$5,000 for one of the annual scholarships and are planning a reunion for the 10th anniversary of the awards dinner.

Syndicated Los Angeles Times columnist Jim Murray has been called "the gold standard for sports

journalism" by at least one of his peers. He blazed trails working at Sports Illustrated and Time magazine, and was honored with so many prestigious sportswriting awards (including a Pulitzer Prize and induction into the Sportscasters and Sportswriters Hall of Fame), that naming just his major accolades is a hefty list. In a career that exceeded half a century of sports hoopla, his favorite event to cover was always the British Open. McCoy-Murray says, "He especially loved St. Andrews and loved golf. That was his No. 1 sport. He played, but he could write it better." With a laugh, she adds, "And he would not deny that."

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
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
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## WHAT'S NEW, AND REMARKABLY DIFFERENT, ABOUT THIS EXCEPTIONAL COMMUNITY

The Las Vegas area is just entering its peak golf season, when the fairways are lush and green and nature sees fit to make just about every day a perfect golf day. Located high above the Las Vegas valley floor in the luxury community of MacDonald Highlands, DragonRidge is a unique private Country Club that offers features unsurpassed in Southern Nevada.

"The community has come of age now, and it's nice to see that coming about," says DragonRidge owner and president, Richard MacDonald, who is also developing the MacDonald Highlands community around the club. "DragonRidge is now the luxury golf experience we always intended it to be, making it a great time to join this exclusive, upscale club."

Increased membership and high demand are creating changes within club facilities, too. The men's locker room is being expanded to accommodate nearly 100 new members in the past year, and those soon to come. Under development is a new fitness and tennis center while the Dragon Grill at the clubhouse will soon have an outside patio so members can enjoy these perfect golfdays off the course, too.

What hasn't changed is the course itself, designed by Jay Moorish and rising architect David Druzisky and named for the Sleeping Dragon rock formation above it. Since opening in 2000, the course has won numerous accolades, including being voted #1 Golf Course of Las Vegas in 2002 by *Nevada Business Journal* and Best Upscale Golf Course in 2004 according to *Vegas Golfer Magazine*. DragonRidge has hosted both the Tiger Woods Foundation's Tiger Jam III and IV and Wendy's 3 Tour Challenge.



It's a course infinitely playable for all skill levels, yet the architects also designed it to "keep players off balance," creating a mix of challenge, interest and fun so that members will continue to enjoy it year in and year out—though the views alone would do that. Moorish and Druzisky were careful to preserve natural rock outcroppings and desert washes, and added strategically placed manmade hazards for a layout that demands precision shot making. Situated in one of the highest spots in the valley, the par-72, 7,039-yard course has greater elevation change than any other area golf course, adding yet another level of challenge.

Some homes have now been carefully set along the course, but the natural beauty of the area and the wildlife within it remain at the heart of this development that reflects, rather than detracts from, its natural surroundings. The design of the clubhouse, for example, includes stonewalls and buttresses that mirror the lines of ridges and draws its color palette from the hills and rocks, so the building seems almost a natural part of the landscape. It is just



one example of the developer's attention to detail and to nature itself.

Long-range plans call for just over 1,000 homes in the MacDonald Highlands community. About a third are In development are 144 luxury currently built. condominiums that will be completed next year, with phase one already purchased. MacDonald says they are now facing a somewhat enviable predicament – sales and demand are off the charts.

"While other areas around Las Vegas have seen the housing market soften," he says, 'the values here continue to appreciate. We're finding that people are willing to pay what it takes to live here."

One reason for that is certainly the developers' philosophy that informs every aspect of the community. "Rather than focus on trying to increase density, we increase quality and charge more for it - larger lots positioned to capture the exceptional views and take advantage of the land. That's what we believe our buyer wants, and our success bears that out," says MacDonald.

MacDonald describes the typical home here as a "contemporary Frank Lloyd Wright concept, homes with lots of windows that utilize and fit into the terrain. Desert Elegance, for lack of a better term." Custom lots range from about \$1 million to \$5 million, custom homes start at \$1.4 million.

There aren't currently enough custom homes to meet the demand, however, so MacDonald, ever dynamic and proactive, now has his own company building them. What's interesting is that many local builders have little experience




building on a hillside. Typical of a man committed to quality and attention to detail and who thinks far outside the box, MacDonald is filming the process of constructing homes on a hill in order to provide an informative DVD to those who buy lots as well as their builders, thus ensuring quality and protecting owners from unforeseen costs tacked on by unknowledgeable builders.

Equally innovative is the club's Charter Membership program, under which someone can experience the club for a year — without dues. Confident of the product, MacDonald wants to let potential members try it out without a large upfront financial commitment. Membership categories include Full Golf, Sports and Social.

While DragonRidge has enough to keep residents occupied, all that Las Vegas offers is just 20 minutes away exceptional dining, shows and the world-famous Strip. What's different for those fortunate enough to call DragonRidge home is that when they leave Las Vegas, they really leave it. They return home in just minutes to a serene landscape where foxes, coyotes, bobcat and quail still roam, and the moon and stars are the brightest lights outside their windows.

#### THE SECRET ISN'T A SECRET ANY MORE

ONCE UPON A TIME, ABOUT THE ONLY FOLKS WHO STOPPED – OR EVEN KNEW ABOUT MESQUITE, NEVADA – WERE THE TRUCKERS WHO WOULD PULL INTO THE SLEEPY LITTLE TOWN UP THE ROAD FROM LAS VEGAS FOR A LITTLE FILL-ME-UP OR SOME R&R AWAY FROM THE HUSTLE AND BUSTLE OF THE CITY THAT NEVER SLEEPS. THOSE DAYS ARE GONE FOREVER – ESPECIALLY WHEN YOU SEE THE CROWD ARRIVING FOR THE MESQUITE AMATEUR GOLF TOURNAMENT

Nearly 650 players teed it up in the 2006 edition of the four-day event, and when the dust finally settled over the eight spectacular courses used during the tournament, winners had been crowned in four men and one women's division. The annual event has grown over the years, and the word is out in the world of amateur golf.

The 49-and-Under Men's Division, with four handicapped flights, drew 131 entries. The Senior Men's Division, with six handicapped flights, drew 200 players. The Super Senior Men's Division, with seven handicapped flights, had a whopping 223 players. And the Women's Division, with three handicapped flights, attracted 88 players. It all ended with a final day, 77-player, 18-hole round that matched the best players from each of those flights meeting for a shootout to determine the best of the best. And it took the best to be the best over those final 18 holes.

Robert Stout, Jim Keatts and Steven Nichois all fired net 62s, with Stout taking the title in a sudden-death playoff. If that's not impressive enough, Paudie O'Connor carded a 67 to capture the gross title. And it all was done at a place that is rapidly becoming one of the country's greatest golf destinations.

Think of it this way. If highly competitive amateur golf is your idea of a good time, you fly to Las Vegas and then leave town. Mesquite is less than an hour up Interstate 15 from the Las Vegas airport. St. George Utah — site of some of the courses used in the event and another former secret now gone common knowledge — is just a few more minutes away.

And each one of the courses used in the event will take your breath away. The Canyons at Oasis Golf Club is the newest course in Mesquite, incorporating the always-popular Vistas nine at the Oasis Golf Course with a new nine that is carved through a natural setting of hogbacks and ravines. The CasaBlanca Golf Club features a 7,011-yard championship layout that winds through Mesquite's natural desert wetlands at the foot of the Virgin River Mountains. And if you think desert means dry, think again —13 of the 18 holes at "Casa" have water in play.

The Coral Canyon Golf Club is one of St. George's special places. You haven't played par-3s like the ones here. The Entrada at Snow Canyon, another St. George course, sits at the foot of jagged Navajo and Kayenta sandstone cliffs near the mouth of Snow Canyon. Ancient lava beds and winding arroyos dot the landscape of this Johnny Miller-designed course. The Ledges Golf Club is yet another St. George gem. With its impressive red-rock backdrops, immaculate greens and expansive views of the St. George Valley, playing the Ledges is like playing a bigger than life postcard.

Back in Mesquite, Falcon Ridge Golf Course is just flat-out spectacular. There are drastic elevation changes, there is water and you could find yourself playing from the top of one mesa to the top of another with not a lot



Holes play down canyons that were carved a few million years ago. In more than a couple of places, those canyons are located 125 feet below the tee box. And one you find that fairway, the next shot may have to carry a lake.

If you are one of the best and make it to the final round of the Mesquite Amateur, you'll step onto the Palms Golf Club, a layout that is really two courses in one. The front nine is wide open - the perfect place to let that big-dog driver eat. The back nine is a different animal. There are mountains and narrow fairways. Listen closely, and you'll hear the word "reload" echo off the hills. There is a 115-foot vertical drop on the 15th from the tee to the green.

Yes, the 2006 Mesquite Amateur is history. And it was history. But the 2007 edition of the tournament will be played May 22-25. You can enter or find more information online at www.mesquiteamateur.com. If you've got game, the Mesquite Amateur has the place.

Bring it on.

# Seven Ways to Win in Mesquite, Nevada



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#### NOT EVERYTHING THAT HAPPENS IN VEGAS STAYS IN VEGAS. GUYS NAMED TIGER WOODS AND JIM FURYK LAUNCHED PRETTY GOOD CAREERS FROM VEGAS BY POSTING THEIR FIRST PGA TOUR WINS AT THE LAS VEGAS INVITATIONAL, A TOURNAMENT THAT HAS SEEN A LOT OF FIRSTS

It was the first tournament to offer a \$1 million purse. It was the first nonmajor tournament to have a \$5 million purse. And like the city that the tourney calls home, it's an everchanging, ever-evolving, living, breathing thing.

When the Frys.com Open tees it up Oct. 12 at the TPC of Summerlin and the TPC Canyons, the 24th edition of the event will once again be a major player on the PGA Tour scene. The 2006 tournament falls just three weeks before the season-ending Tour Championship and players fighting for the last few spots in that elite field figure Vegas is a must stop.

Next year, the event will take on a different importance when it becomes one of the seven tournaments on the PGA Tour Fall Series. When PGA Tour officials compacted the schedule, they established the FedEX Cup as a seasonending, lucrative run for the money title. The seven events - including the Frys.com Open in Las Vegas – will be played after the now-earlier Tour Championship, but will have a combined purse of more than \$32 million. While some of the bigger names in the world of golf may opt to end their seasons with the Tour Championship, the stage will be set for the mini-drama that plays itself out at the close of each year.

At year's end, only the top 125 players on the PGA Tour money list retain fully exempt status for the following year. The others are left scrambling for a sure-thing place to play every week. What the Fall Series will do is allow those players who are on that employment bubble to make a sundown run at keeping their jobs. Drama? Las Vegas just might be drama's hometown.

Do you hold on 12 when the blackjack dealer is showing five? Do you go all in before the river when you have the two top pairs and the guy across the table has just checked? Do you bet the max when the slot is running hot? And do you shoot at the flag on the second hole of a suddendeath playoff?

Furyk, who kick-started his PGA Tour career – which includes a U.S.

Open title, five Ryder Cup teams and four President's Cup teams — tried last year but came up empty, dunking his ball in the lake that protects the green on the par-3 17th at the TPC Summerlin. "I'm obviously disappointed," said Furyk, who was attempting to win at Las Vegas for the fourth time. "It was my tournament to win again, and I didn't get it done on the last hole."

Actually, it was the last hole times two that ended Furyk's chances at a fourth title. He three-putted the final green of regulation to open the door for 40-year-old PGA Tour rookie Wes Short, Jr. Short not only birdied the final hole of regulation to force the playoff, he got up-and-down from a bunker for par on the second hole of the playoff to finish off Furyk.

"Right now I don't have any emotions," Short said shortly after his first PGA Tour victory. "I thought if I ever won, I would be jumping over the moon, but I'm not." Talk about your poker face.

But that's often the way things play out in Vegas. Third-round leader Ted Purdy was one shot out of the lead until he reached the 17th—there's that hole again—and found the lake when his tee shot hit a sprinkler head next to the green and bounced into the drink. "I was trying to draw the ball into the pin and make birdie," Purdy said. "In hindsight, it was a pretty dumb thing to do."

Kind of like drawing to an inside straight.

And then there's the saga of Kevin Stadler, son of former Masters champion Craig, who was tied for fifth entering the final round but was disqualified when he was found to have a non-conforming club (a bent sand wedge) in his bag. Things like that happen in Vegas all the time.


"You can make a lot of birdies out there," Furyk said. "But there are a lot of disasters waiting to happen, too."

You win. You lose. It's not new news. It's just Las Vegas.

### THE PRESSURE IS ON: THE 2006 PINNACLE **EXCEPTIONAL DRIVER CHAMPIONSHIP**

### A GROUP OF AMATEURS WILL MEET IN NEVADA AND SOON FIND OUT IF THEY HAVE WHAT IT TAKES TO BE A PEDC CHAMPION

Pressure-packed is an apt description for the Pinnacle Exceptional Driver Championship, which tests the mettle of amateur golfers by placing them in an unfamiliar environment and forcing them to cope.

Amateur winners of 132 regional qualifying events across North America enter the pressure chamber in Nevada November 8-11, when the PEDC tournament returns to Laughlin for a second consecutive year.

It's gripping grass-roots golf. Trial by fire.

The pressure derives not just from competing, but from

multiple sources. First, there's the standing room only gallery at Laughlin Ranch Golf Club, the host venue. Add to that a production crew working on a 60-minute tournament highlights show that will debut nationally November 24 on ESPN2, and a potential payday of \$50,000 plus a new Honda S2000 Roadster, and there's enough pressure to make even the most experienced amateurs feel a rumble in the pit of their stomachs.

The 40-yard-wide grid into which competitors pound Pinnacle Exception golf balls and amass points also creates pressure. When the competition begins, the grid looks as wide as a six-lane super highway. Late in the competition, when players reach the match-play rounds, it's looking as narrow as a country lane.

Pressure equals shrinking. Shrinking equals more difficult to hit and score points. The grid is not the competitors' friend.

Adding suspense to the outcome is the decision top PEDC finishers face: Do they accept the prize money or elect to retain their amateur status?

The competition is managed and produced by Long Drivers of America, a Texas-based golf events company that also conducts the annual RE/MAX World Long Drive Championship, the premier event in power golf. But the two tournaments are very different. While the Long Drive Championship focuses on absolute power and is open to pros and amateurs alike, the PEDC tournament is all about accurate power and is for amateurs only.

The key to the PEDC is consistency. That is, filling up the grid with balls. The scoring system rewards both distance and accuracy. Players complete "sets" of five drives, attempting to amass as many points as they can. To register points, a drive must land inside the grid and remain inside.

Within the 40-yard-wide grid is a 20-yard "Exceptional Zone." Drives that finish within the Exceptional Zone receive one additional point for accuracy.

On the distance side, scoring begins at 200 yards and graduates in 10-yard intervals to 320 yards. Qualified drives of 320 yards or longer earn 14 points apiece (the maximum for a single shot).

Players who hit five consecutive drives in the grid earn a bonus sixth ball, which can spell the difference between victory and defeat.



A "perfect" PEDC score is 84 points (six drives of 14 points apiece). Based on 2006 qualifying rounds as of September 1, the highest score was 80 points. The top three Laughlin qualifiers, Billy Joe Hobert (80), David Buckles (78) and Justin Remick (77), each posted his score at a qualifier event in California.

Hobert, the former NFL quarterback (Raiders, Bills, Saints) who led the University of Washington to a national championship in 1991, might be more impervious to the pressure than his amateur counterparts.

Regardless, the tournament makes for compelling theater and should attract southern Nevada golf fans with its grass roots, everyman appeal.

In the world of professional long drive, the operative word is big: Big hitters. Big numbers. Big air.

Power golfs big event returns to southern Nevada in October, when the World Long RE/MAX Drive Championship unfolds at The Palms Golf Club in scenic Mesquite.

At stake are world titles in four divisions – open, senior, women and super senior - and bragging rights as the longest of the long.

From a record purse of \$500,000, the open division champion pockets a tidy \$125,000.

Action gets underway in Mesquite on Tuesday, October 24 and builds to a climax Saturday, October 28 with match-play finals under the lights. Ninety minutes of highlights from the big bash at The Palms Golf Club is scheduled for a Christmas Eve debut on ESPN.

Thanks to Honda and its "Drive for the Keys" promotion, all four 2006 champions will be allowed one additional swing to try and win a new car. No pressure. To take the driver's seat, all they have to do is better their title-clinching distance.

Among the celebrated sultans of swat appearing in the open division will be defending champion Sean (The Beast) Fister, who earned his third RE/MAX title in 2005 with a drive of yards. Among challengers will be some of the biggest hitters in the West: Arizona residents Brian Pavlet and Danny Luirette, the 2005 runner-up; Montana resident

Kevin King: Californians Vince Howell. Jim Heflin, James Horton and John Lawson; Las Vegas resident Greg Wellong, a three-time finalist and Logan Leavitt, who hails from nearby St. George, Utah. The championship is sure to attract a vocal contingent of supporters to Mesquite.

Fister will also face a strong international cast that includes Canada's Jason Zuback, a four-time world champion; New Zealand's Davyn Nola; England's Adam Stacey, who finished third in his finals debut in 2005 and Stockholm native Viktor Johansson, the 2000 winner.

Toss in recent world champions Carl Wolter (2002), Clayton Burger (2003) and David Mobley (2004), and the brackets are brimming with big sticks.

One competitor sure to receive close scrutiny is Canadian teenage sensation Jamie Sadlowski. In July, Sadlowski won the 2006 RE/MAX World Junior Long Championship in spectacular fashion. He unleashed a series of 400-yard drives, the longest of which was measured at 437 yards. In the finals, he put 420 on the board.

Adding fun to the championship week festivities in Mesquite will be a Celebrity Long Drive Challenge on Thursday night. Celebrities scheduled to appear in support of children's charities include Wade Boggs, Rick Barry, Gabrielle Reece, Shawn Bradley, Kevin Sorbo, Bill Engvall and Bo Jackson.

Open Division champs and celebrities aren't the only draw at this competition that brings heavy hitters in to battle for three other titles as well.

In the Senior Division (ages 45-54), the names Gerry James, Bobby Wilson, Frank Miller and Mike Gorton appear on the short list of pretournament favorites. James won in 2005, edging Wilson. Wilson won in 2004, edging Miller. Gorton has made seven straight senior finals. The third time could be the charm for Miller, who's finished second and fourth in two appearances.

Leading the pack in the Women's Division is SoCal resident Stacey Shinnick, who notched her third world title in 2005. She'll likely face a challenge from 2005 runner-up Liz Uthoff and past champions Lee Brandon and Nancy Abiecunas. Emerging Australian star Melissa Brydon should also figure in the mix.

The Super Senior Division (ages 55 & over) includes defending champion Steve Griffith who must repel the challenges of two-time champion Fred Hooter and 2005 runner-up Rick Barry, the former NBA great. Others to watch are California residents Obie Anderson and Michael Hooper, a long drive Hall of Fame member and threetime winner in Mesquite.

# The Big Bang Theory

DRIVERS ARE AS BIG AS THEY CAN GET

**BUT ARE THEY ANY BETTER?**

# DRIVER DESIGNERS HAVE CLEARLY BEEN LISTENING TO THOSE WHO BELIEVE THAT BIG IS BEAUTIFUL. JUST ABOUT EVERY GOLF MANUFACTURER HAS REACHED THE 'LINE IN THE SAND' THAT GOLF'S GOVERNING BODIES HAVE DRAWN: DRIVER HEADS ARE 460CC; COR, OR TRAMPOLINE EFFECT, IS ALSO MAXED OUT

There must be something to the size thing. Even venerable Titleist, one of the few golf manufacturers to keep driver size somewhat sensible over the Titanium age, recently unveiled the Pro Titanium 905R which has a 460cc head. Titleist also makes the 'smaller' 905T and 905S models but it's all relative: these are 'just' 400cc.

While the massive heads provide a larger sweet spot and more forgiveness, the maximum-size heads also help to increase distance by reducing spin and providing a higher (or optimal) launch angle; touring professionals, with their high swing speeds, are getting obvious results with this equipment, but the larger heads can benefit average golfers as well — so long as said golfers make the time to get a proper driver fitting using a ball launch monitor that measures all the key variables.

With size and COR at the limit, manufacturers are developing increasingly exotic forms of titanium and other materials and are starting to focus on features that address the other key vector in golf—direction.

TaylorMade started the weight bias trend by offering weights that could be removed to produce a certain type of ball flight. Such is the success of the line that TaylorMade now offers six drivers under the R7 and R5 name. The best for the average golfer who struggles with pushes or even a slice is the R5 Type D, which offers high launch, maximum forgiveness and a bit more spin for players with a slightly lower clubhead speed. It also offers a slight draw bias. Average golfers who still want to toy around with the moveable weights (and why not?) should go with the R7 460.

Even without the marketing muscle of the big boys, Tour Edge has been successful with its Exotics driver. The company advertises that its three wood and driver are the longest in the marketplace.

MacGregor Golf (www.macgregorgolf.com) is aggressively marketing its new Mactec NVG2 Driver, which uses 'cup face' technology — no welds or inserts — so that the entire face should feel like the sweet spot. Yonex (www.yonex.com) is now offering its Cyberstar Nanospeed driver with a unique 'snap-back' shaft.

Callaway Golf (www.callawaygolf.com) is emphasizing fusion technology with its Fusion FT-3 and FT-3 Tour drivers. The fusion benefit is that mis-hits find a way to find the fairway; the carbon back means that Callaway can put weight around the perimeter of the club for more distance. The all-new X460 and X460 Tour Drivers boast a 'Consistent Alignment Sole' that helps line up the club. The tour model, with its slightly open face, might be a good

choice for the better player who tends to hook violently from time to time.

Top-notch players searching for a driver should take a serious look at the 460cc Bridgestone J33R driver that features an elastomer compound insert that decreases vibrations, producing a more efficient energy transfer that results in greater distance (www.bridgestonegolf.com).

Ping's new G5 driver is proving to be a favorite in the marketplace. At 460cc, the revised weighting means a repositioned center of gravity for lower spin. Ping engineers actually moved eight grams from the crown of the club to the sole; they also added new face geometry that will remind G2 fans of that popular club.

While most manufacturers that have gone to the 460cc model are using a brick-like shape, Nike has gone with a slightly slimmer model for the Sasquatch. The key is 'powerbow' technology that 'adds a trailing volume of mass' according to Nike. There's also a model for the better player who wants a bit more workability—the Sasquatch Tour 460; it has a slightly deeper face than the original model.

All the new technology means that it's pretty much a whole new ball game for the shaft manufacturers and, most importantly, the clubfitters. For example, while a low spin ball flight works well for golfers with high swing speeds, those with lower swing speeds need some spin to help them maximize distance. The key is a fitting with the ball launch monitor and a trained clubfitter. In their quest to produce more distance, manufacturers have also been lengthening the club to 45 inches; this shaft length may be too long for the average golfer.

Are the newer, bigger and more muscular drivers that much better? The fact remains that the true key to maximizing their effectiveness is a good swing and a skilled clubfitter.

IN BASEBALL THE NUMBER THREE USUALLY MEANS YOU'RE OUT! IN SHERRI STEINHAUER'S CASE, THE NUMBER THREE PREVIOUSLY REPRESENTED A THREE-YEAR SLUMP. BUT FACTOR IN ALL OF THE CHANGES IN HER LIFE, INCLUDING A NEW INSTRUCTOR AND A NEW CADDY, AND THE NUMBER THREE NOW REPRESENTS STEINHAUER'S THIRD WOMEN'S BRITISH OPEN TITLE

"I'm on cloud nine right now and feel like I'm in a dream," said the 43-year-old Steinhauer several weeks after her win. Steinhauer's relaxed demeanor and textbook shot making produced an even-par 72 at England's Royal Lytham on Sunday, setting the stage for her third Women's British Open title and first Open win since it became a major in 2001. "That is the biggest thrill for me, that I've done it now as a major," she exclaims.

No stranger to winning, Steinhauer passed the \$4 million dollar mark in 2004 and has seven wins to her name. With an exceptional junior career that included three consecutive wins at the Wisconsin State Junior Championship and low amateur at the 1983 U.S. Women's Open, Steinhauer quickly went from amateur to professional by qualifying for the tour in 1986 on her first attempt.

Born in Madison, Wisconsin, Steinhauer was surrounded by golfers while growing up. "I was fortunate to be raised by two wonderful parents and will always be grateful to them for raising me with good values. My parents and my four older brothers were golfers, so I started watching my family play at a very early age. When I turned six, I had the choice of staying home with the babysitter or going to ride around in the golf cart with my mother. I always wanted to be with my family so I went to the golf course." Steinhauer goes on to say that she started playing the game at the age of six at Nakoma Golf Club in Madison, where her picture and LPGA career are proudly displayed on the clubhouse walls.

For Steinhauer, winning the Open was great, but she believes it's important to keep moving forward. Currently in the process of changing her swing with her new instructor, Hank Johnson, she recalls a difficult time in her career. "I was at a crossroad with my game. Should I move on to something else or should I make one last effort to improve my game in order to compete on the tour?" With the support of her family the decision was made and it seems to have been the right one. "I enjoy working on my new swing; the process has been a slow transition, but I think it's working," she says with a laugh.

With her latest win, Steinhauer qualified for the Samsung World Championship at Bighorn in Palm Desert, an area she knows well. "I've been coming to the desert for a long time, beginning with my parents and brothers who have been spending their winters here for years. I did live at Mission Hills Country Club from 1989 to 1994, then moved to Indian Ridge Country Club from 1994 to 2004 and am happy to say I'm back living at Mission Hills. One of my favorite courses in the valley is the Tournament course at Mission Hills, but I also play with my brothers on different courses throughout the valley.

"I'm a big fan of Mexican food and eat at all the restaurants," she says. "You'll also find me at Bangkok 5 and The Grill at The Reserve where one of my brothers lives." Steinhauer plans to be in the Valley a couple of weeks before the Samsung to get ready.

In addition to golf, Steinhauer also enjoys snow skiing, reading, cooking and her dog, Dainin, a five-year-old mix between a schnauzer and poodle, a.k.a. a schnoodle. The name Dainin means great patience and great endurance, which seems just right for Steinhauer. "I found Dainin at the New Jersey Schnauzer rescue association about a year and a half ago," she says. "He travels everywhere with me."

Life keeps getting better for Sherri Steinhauer. When asked to describe it in one sentence she laughs, "The first word that comes to mind is hectic, yet often times [it's] a dream. I'm getting to do what I always wanted to do," and that is being a professional golfer on the Ladies Professional Golf Association tour.







Is it time for home buyers to slip on their walking shoes and begin searching for a new home? According to the nation's housing analysts, the words "buyer's market" cannot be used when the median price of homes continues to rise, up from \$215,900 last year at this time to the current \$230,000. And that's true even though the overall housing market in the southwest is down 6.4 percent. Regardless, the old adage still applies, 'your house is only worth what someone will pay for it.'

Developers Norris & Bailey LLC is in escrow (for an undisclosed amount) to purchase Mesquite Golf Course in Palm Springs, and is in negotiations with the Tommy Jacobs Bel Air Greens nine-hole executive course. Current plans are to put a hotel and upscale townhouses where the Tommy Jacobs course now stands. No word yet on the future of Mesquite Golf Course, though residents in the surrounding area point out that there are 30 years remaining on their 50 year lease with the golf club owners.



Southern California Desert real estate offerings currently include more than 7,000 resale homes, yet the area has managed to register gains in the median price of homes, which is now at \$400,250 (higher than other areas of the state). According to DataQuick Information Systems, resale single-family homes were up 1.3 percent, resale condos up 4.9 percent and new-construction homes registered a 21.3 percent increase as of the end of June.

The fact that golf courses benefit when fairways are lined with homes has prompted many of the desert courses to take a new line of action regarding building.

Presales are finally underway at Escena Palm Springs, the first new gated, golf-oriented residential retreat to hit Palm Springs in 20 years. Featuring a Jack Nicklaus-designed 18-hole golf course that is now open, this Lennar community is "An exclusive enclave community for people who like their architecture a little out there and edgy, and who don't want to see the same-old, same-old when they come home at night," says Holly McKie, director of marketing for Lennar Communities. There are two distinctive residential series. The Spanish series, inspired by the Spanish Revival Movement first seen in Palm Springs in the 1920s and 1930s,



LaBlonde Homes LTD might sound like a new company in town, but quite the contrary. LaBlonde has been building homes in the Pinnacle Peak, Scottsdale and Carefree areas for 15 years. LaBlonde offers two 4,592-square-foot homes in The Monument at Troon North, priced from \$1,450,000. At the Enclave in Pinnacle



and the Modern series. The Modern series offers a selection of boldly designed detached residences that capture the very essence of desert style. Anticipated pricing for the Spanish series is from the \$800,000s, the Modern Series is priced from the low \$600,000s.

Indian Palms Country Club in Indio continues to build new homes in this adjusting marketplace. Casa Bella at Indian Palms offers three residences to choose from with square footage ranging from 1,704 to 2,101. Homes begin at \$400,000 and are constructed by First Pacifica.

Mountain View Country Club in La Quinta is on the move as well, with four communities to choose from. This 365-acre gated country club community is home the lush 18-hole Arnold Palmer Signature Golf Course with all the amenities expected of an upscale private country club. Home prices are as follows: The Village \$615,000 - \$794,000, The Villas \$789,000 - \$995,000 and The Vistas \$1,251,000 - 1,641,000. All are constructed by Toll Brothers.

Many resorts in the valley are in the process of major renovations as well. The Golf Resort at Indian Wells, in Indian Wells, is currently in the process of a \$55 million dollar renovation. The renovation includes



the redesign of both golf courses, a new club house, new practice facility and pro shop.

Arizona is all over the map in terms of median prices. In fifteen areas analyzed, median prices range from \$150,000 to \$1,400,000. The total of homes reported for sale varies as well, from 46,000 to over 53,000. Whichever number you choose, Arizona has a large selection of homes to offer buyers.

Canyon at Troon North there are six new homes in development. The price is yet to be announced for two of them, and the lowest price for a 4,838-square-foot home is \$1,910,000. LaBlonde earned the ranking of "Number One Custom Home Builder" from *Arizona Business Magazine* in 2002 and 2004.

Toll Brothers seems to be the largest builder of new homes in Arizona with several projects, including Toll Brothers at Dove





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
made arrangements to sell two of the courses to Pulte Homes for moderate housing tracts. Prices will range from the low \$300,000s to the high \$400,000s.

The community is just minutes from the Wolf Creek Golf Club, and the Oasis Golf Course is visible from the main entrance to HawkRidge; both are among the area's acclaimed championship courses. With an excellent amenities package and prices from the \$170s, the two- and threebedroom residences provide exceptional quality and value.





"We continue to get requests for our cufflinks that can be engraved, as this is something that makes the item a little more personal. Engraving of family crests is also an option. Tiffany has kept many crests on file for generations and employs some of finest hand engravers in the world."

While the majority of Tiffany & Co.'s cufflinks, which start at \$115, are traditional styles such as squares and ovals,

more whimsical designs can be found, including the 18 karat gold "bull and bear" cufflinks, \$1,300.

"The style of cufflink that a man chooses for a specific occasion really shows off his mood and personality," says Bennett. "Cufflinks are they key to unlocking a man's sense of style."

Golfers can show their love of the sport with cufflinks in the form of a golf ball, golf tee, golf bag or other designs.

One example of functional cufflinks is the Even Design Inc., "Even Steven" cufflinks. Wildly popular in the United Kingdom, the rhodium cufflinks, \$125 at



www.evendesigninc.com, feature either a level or a compass, to help you "find your own inner balance and direction." The level and compass both work —something guaranteed to impress when put to use.

At www.redenvelope.com, locket cufflinks are a sweet choice for the man who likes to keep photos of loved ones close at hand. The single-initial-monogram sterling silver cufflinks, \$130, open to display two small photos.

For many, cufflinks become heirlooms, a collectable of sorts that are passed down for generations.

"They are something that you can always pass on to children and grandchildren, so they can hopefully get as much pleasure from wearing them as you did," says Tiffany & Co.'s Bennett. "For this to happen, you want to make sure you have a pair that will last for generations to come."

Bennett recommends looking for quality and craftsmanship to ensure that the cufflinks will withstand the test of time. "Cufflinks are a lot like really good watches," he adds, meaning if they are high quality and are well cared for, they will last for generations.

Doug Paris, wardrobe consultant and author of Style: A Life's Work, says antique cufflinks "are an exceptional way to express one's style and a fun way for an individual to have additional fine accounterments."



"Always be aware of estate sales in your area, and while traveling, look for galleries unique jewelry specializing in estate jewelry," adds Paris. "Developing a collection of old or antique jewelry is a continuous experience that develops over time. 

Portmarnock is known for its long rough, hazards appropriately placed to catch the wayward strike and large greens subtly contoured and traditionally well defended. Great shot making is required, a caddy is highly recommended.

The European Club is rightly called special. Pat Ruddy, well known in the European golfing world for many years, is both owner and links designer and he and his family still welcome all who come to play. The course itself is superb. Set into a wild and spectacular land of dunes and sea, players are challenged by dunes, sea marsh, undulating fairways and those spectacular



Royal Dublin came to its present home on Bull Island in 1889. The sandy isle in the middle of Dublin Harbor was formed as a maritime necessity in the early 1800's by Captain William Bligh of HMS Bounty fame. In addition to the golf course, the island hosts unique plant and bird life. Royal Dublin was redesigned by H.S. Colt in 1920, and has been the

vistas that take in the beaches and the Irish Sea. The back nine is even more memorable than the front, if that's possible. Tiger Woods shot the course record, 67, when he, O'Meara and pals played in 2002. You don't need to be a professional to enjoy this course, however. Ruddy's craftsmanship and his love for the game and "his" course make it an experience not to be missed.



The K Club in County Kildare has two stellar courses, both designed by Arnold Palmer, both very different. The Palmer Course is where this year's Ryder Cup will be played. It's widely acknowledged as one of Europe's most spectacular courses, and not just from the championship tees. The newer of the two is the Smurfit Course, opened in July 2003. The Smurfit European Open was played on this course when then U.S. Open Champion Retief ultimately Goosen topped leaderboard. One of the most prominent features on this course is water — right up until the finish. No. 18- Swan Lake- is only for the brave – there are at least a thousand Pro VI Titleists in wet graves on this harrowing par 5, and scores for the pros have ranged from birdie to 11!

The Smurfit's indisputable signature hole, however, is No. 7, no surprise given Palmer's known love of 7th holes. This one is a testing 600 yards from an elevated tee to a flat landing area between water, quarry and deep rough. The shot into the elevated, well-defended green needs to be precise. Cascades and waterfalls on the right are a nightmare for the slicer. Variety, excellent greens, verdant nature and the stately

#### King Tut's Tomb & Museum

3900 Las Vegas Boulevard South, Las Vegas, NV 89119 If you can't make it to Egypt, but you are interested in Middle Eastern history, this is the place to go. Located deep inside the Luxor pyramid, the museum is a real treat. Exact reproductions of the young king's tomb and riches will be discovered on this self-directed audio tour. All room measurements and placement of the artifacts are based on the notes of Howard Carter who discovered the original tomb in 1922. It is so realistic, you might just worry about being cursed. Audio tour translations available in English, Japanese, French and Spanish.

#### Bellagio Gallery of Fine Art

3600 Las Vegas Boulevard South, Las Vegas, NV 89109-4303

This collection is impressive even to those who have visited better-known museums in New York and Europe. On display are sculptures and paintings from late 19th and 20th century artists, including original works by Pablo Picasso, Claude Monet, Vincent Van Gogh and other European masters. The tour is best appreciated when the audio headphones are used, which are included with admission. Reservations are necessary, as this is a very popular attraction. Admission is 15\$ for adults and 12\$ for students and senior citizens. Seasonal discounts are occasionally offered.

#### Stratosphere Tower

2000 Las Vegas Boulevard South, Stratosphere Hotel, Las Vegas, NV 89104

This is America's tallest observation tower, rising 1,149 feet above the city streets. Located at the Stratosphere Hotel, it houses two hair-raising rides. The 'Let It Ride High Roller' is the world's highest coaster and is guaranteed to provide the ride of a lifetime. The 'Big Shot' shoots riders 160 feet into the air where they experience zero gravity then free fall to the platform, which is 800 feet above the street. Tower admission prices are subject to change.

#### Shark Reef

3950 Las Vegas Boulevard South, Mandalay Bay Resort and Casino, Las Vegas, NV 89119

This truly amazing state-of-the art aquarium has sharks, alligators, monitor lizards and other amazing creatures living in more than 1,000,000 gallons of salt water at the Mandalay Bay Resort. You will enjoy a beautiful display of blue sharks, stingrays, sea turtles, eels and a remarkable jellyfish display with black lights. Tickets are USD15.95 for adults; USD9.95 for children 12 years and above and free for children younger than 4. This is a must-see exhibit for the whole family.
