A Legacy of Quality

Huntsman Springs

World-class golf, homes, amenities and outdoor enticements are designed to make lasting memories in Idaho's scenic Teton Valley, and profits from the development aid cancer research



Known globally as a successful businessman, Jon Huntsman, Sr., served as special assistant to President Richard Nixon and is recognized as one of the nation's most generous philanthropists. His new resort community in Driggs, Idaho, is made up of top-notch golf, distinctive homes and superb amenities with the majestic Grand Tetons as a stunning backdrop. No surprise, Huntsman Springs is already winning national acclaim—you would expect that with the Huntsman name and solid financial backing. Talk to anyone involved with the project, and it's all about quality and a long-term commitment. For five-time cancer survivor Jon Huntsman, it's personal. All profits are going to the Huntsman Cancer Foundation.

"Huntsman Cancer Institute in Salt Lake City is known as having the highest quality in the world with superior research facilities," says Huntsman. "Anything we've done as a family is done with quality and a generous human context. With Huntsman Springs I thought long and hard, and wanted to attach our name and spend decades building a major resort and family recreational area."



Huntsman Springs will offer a spectrum of relaxing, top-notch enticements, all designed to make memories. "We have beautiful homes, similar to Jackson Hole (on the east side of the Grand Tetons, just 45 minutes away), but less expensive," he says. "Huntsman Springs is the perfect family outing, without the turmoil and traffic of Jackson. We've built it so you can walk into Driggs with lovely stores and fun restaurants—it's a vacation spot for the future. Huntsman Springs will be a less tourist-oriented place with activities for families to enjoy."

Eight lakes on the property are filled with rainbow trout for a catch-and-release experience, and residents can take a wilderness walk on the world's longest boardwalk through the 500-acre protected wetlands area, go horseback riding or head to nearby Grand Targhee ski resort just 12 miles away. Classes offered at Huntsman Springs include photography, cooking, wine tasting and painting, along with fitness-focused yoga, Pilates, water aerobics and a hiking club. The Huntsmans are moving a



collection of classic cars and museum-worthy Native American artifacts to the community.

Huntsman Springs Golf Club is the centerpiece of the resort. "I told David McLay Kidd before the recession to leave no stone unturned to make it the finest course in America, a destination place for golfers intrigued by the uniqueness of Bandon Dunes (Oregon) but superior even to that course," says Huntsman. "Even though we had to build it through the recession, we did not cut corners and gave Mr. Kidd all the resources to put in one of the greatest courses in the world. It is a remarkable golf course, one that will be remembered for many years."

David Huntsman, Jon's son and the community's CEO, says, "Our initial concern about not being from a golf background was unfounded as we relied on David Kidd and his team, who promised to give us something that would stand the test of time and be interesting 10 to 20 years from now. He delivered on his promise and the response has been overwhelmingly positive."

The course is already on national “best” lists, even though its official opening was just last July.

“It’s amazing and one of a kind, truly jaw dropping,” says Operations Manager Tony Snoey. “Fescue grows knee-high and transitions throughout the summer from reddish-purple to golden. [The course] makes you think on every shot with 153 bunkers and water of some form on 15 of 18 holes.” The layout plays from 5,400 to 7,300 yards and retains a natural Scottish-links look, but there are trees in the surrounding wetlands and native areas. Greens can be a massive 10,000 square feet. “It’s a big valley, so big, so massive you stand there and feel so small but one with nature. Big, wide fairways and big greens fit. Small course features would look out of place.”

Snoey says guests playing the course for the first time have extended their stay at Huntsman Springs in order to play it again, telling him, “That was the most fun I’ve ever had on a golf course.”

While a mountain-golf season can be dictated by weather, daily play here can extend past 9 p.m. Even with its “18 signature holes” design, there are some don’t-miss experiences. “No. 1 is everything



the course offers with water, bunkers and vistas, with an opening tee shot people remember,” says Snoey. “No. 15’s green is 80 yards long from front to back, and No. 18 is a drivable Par 4 that can upset your

bets with your buddies.” Snoey credits superintendent Guy Johnson with course conditioning that is “second-to-none.”

“Huntsman Springs is a great place not only to come and visit but to make home,” David says. Homes currently represent a second or third residence for most members, fulfilling the vision of a cherished, extended mountain-getaway experience. Home sites up to three-quarters of an acre start at \$295,000, and 23 homes have been built with a comfortable, upscale-rustic look—and some are still available to buy. Designed by award-winning architect Larry Berlin, houses range from 2,450 to 5,300 square feet and offer assorted gorgeous views of the golf course, water and mountains. Built to the highest standards, the homes feature hardwood floors and granite counters, heated-tile bathrooms and highest-quality kitchen appliances.

Members aren’t subjected to added fees. “It’s the club of the future,” says Snoey. “Golf lessons are complimentary and unlimited. We don’t charge cart, locker or storage fees, and members have the ability to leave (without penalty) at any time. Adult children of members can stay connected to the club through our

Legacy Membership. We want to keep generations together.”

The Huntsmans have reached out to be a part of Driggs, providing the county with a new courthouse on the Huntsman

Springs property, plus eight parks throughout the town. The 1,350-acre resort remains fence-less, an easy five-minute walk to downtown.

“We’re not the normal developer not developers at all,” says David. “It’s not something we normally do. But we fell in love with the community and the valley. Jon, Sr,

was born in Blackfoot, Idaho. He’s a farm boy through and through. You’ll find him on the Teton River, fishing for rainbow trout.”

Huntsman Springs has become the Huntsman family’s home away from home, notes David. “It’s a hands-on family project. All the decisions on Huntsman Springs are family: my mother, father and me.”

Yellowstone National Park, the Grand Tetons and Jackson Hole resort are all located within a short drive, and the private airport just a quarter-mile down from Huntsman Springs offers easy resort access year-round. Driggs sports a super-deluxe grocery store with fresh sushi, plus a corner drugstore churning out old-fashioned milkshakes and a renowned lime-freeze. Snoey says, “Conversations with total strangers can happen in stores, the post office and restaurants. That doesn’t happen anywhere else.”

David sums up: “This isn’t a project we’ve taken on because we need the money or have a profit expectation. My father announced publicly that all income would go toward cancer research at the Huntsman Cancer Institute. Our motives are different—we make sure our commitment is to the community and giving back to mankind, making society a better place.”

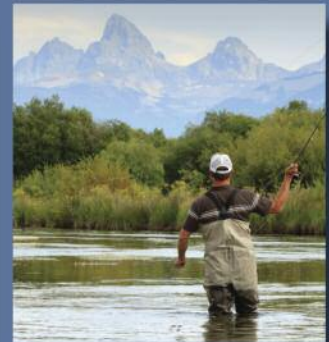

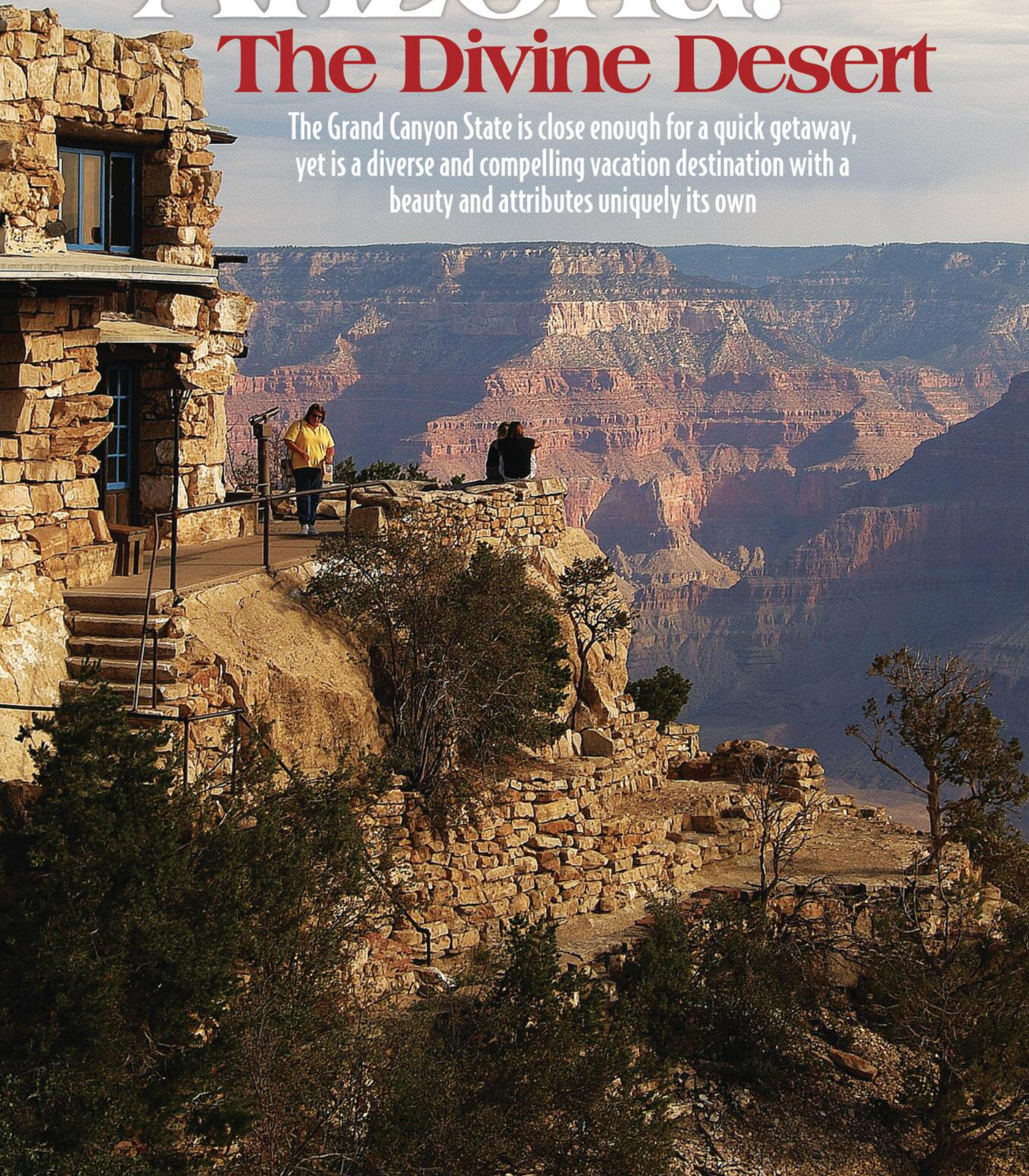

Arizona: The Divine Desert

The Grand Canyon State is close enough for a quick getaway, yet is a diverse and compelling vacation destination with a beauty and attributes uniquely its own





Abundant sunshine, championship fairways and a wealth of recreation opportunities beckon millions of visitors to Arizona each year. From Tucson in the south, through Phoenix and Scottsdale and on to the awe-inspiring Grand Canyon and its neighbor Flagstaff in the north, there is much to keep vacationers busy.

The **Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum** in Tucson is the perfect place to get an up-close view of desert life. This nature conservancy gives visitors the chance to wander among eye-catching native animals and plants that are adapted to the desert climate. Almost everything will prick or poke you, so stay on the trails and soak in the beauty that is the Sonoran Desert.



Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum

Looking at all this wildlife can make you want to get wild; you're in luck. The **Desert Diamond Casino**, about 20 miles south of Tucson, has slots and blackjack and entertainment most nights.

For quintessential luxury and the five-star desert experience, stay at the **Westin La Paloma**. Rooms are furnished with Westin's signature Heavenly Bed and designed to bring the feel of the desert indoors where it can be experienced in total comfort. Don't miss the opportunity to get a spa treatment at the **Elizabeth Arden Red Door Spa**. If you choose the resort's unlimited golf package, you can

gorge yourself on good shots at **La Paloma Country Club**, home to a Jack Nicklaus-designed course.

Any trip to Arizona requires that you bring along your golf clubs. On your way north to Phoenix, another must-play is **The Gallery Golf Club**. The Gallery's fairways frame the desert. Saguaro cacti raise their arms in celebration of every shot and you'll celebrate too. The Gallery hosted the 2007 and 2008 Accenture World Golf Match Play Championships. In 2008, Tiger Woods walloped Stewart Cink 7 and 8 and you'll be channeling Woods as you navigate these greens' subtle breaks. Keep it out of the desert and you'll enjoy one of Arizona's best residential courses.

Ride the high from The Gallery all the way to Phoenix. Set up base camp at the foot of **Lookout Mountain**. From here you can enjoy Phoenix nightlife and the paradise of golf that is the Phoenix/Scottsdale oasis. For lodging, **Pointe Hilton Tapatio Cliffs Resort** is an all-suite AAA Four Diamond resort. hole courses for the ultimate in desert golf. Phoenix has a top-notch zoo and several pro sports teams to keep the entire family entertained.

An overlooked aspect of Phoenix is the multitude of outdoor opportunities. Balloon rides and ATV tours top the list for adventure seekers. The **Phoenix Mountains** skirt the city and provide thousands of acres of parks and trails that are pleasant in spring. Dust off your mountain bike and check out the competitive seven-mile track at **White Tank Regional Park** west of Phoenix with its waterfalls, petroglyphs and numerous outdoor activities.

When you've enjoyed all the city life and great golf you can handle, head north on I-10 to the cooler environs of **Flagstaff** and to one of America's iconic natural landscapes. **The Grand Canyon** is a bucket-list item, so check it off and you'll have accomplished something few people do. Millions of acres of "awe" sprawl across the horizon. You think you've seen it because of the proliferation of images in movies and television series, yet until you've tried to swallow the view in person, you have no idea.

Lodging in the canyon is the best way to soak in the vastness of the park. Looking out over the rim of a 2,000-foot drop while

An Inspired Partnership:
Cox Celebrity Championship
and **Drew Brees**

A partnership is often greater than the sum of its parts, and such is the case in the pairing of NFL standout Drew Brees with Integrated Sports Marketing for the Cox Celebrity Championship

From its infancy in Scotland, golf has always been about partnerships and pairings. Each year golf fans eagerly await the Ryder Cup pairings and unique partnerships among teammates who every other week of the year try to beat one another in individual competition. Every day on professional tours and local courses, men and women from all backgrounds are paired up before spending half a day together trying to conquer 18 holes. Pairings and partnerships are as indigenous to the links as putters and pars.

This spring, partnerships and pairings will be taken several steps further when the 13th Cox Celebrity Championship, hosted by NFL great Drew Brees, tees off May 20-22 at Morgan Run Club & Resort in Rancho Santa Fe, Calif.

The story behind the partnership that led to the development of the tournament—and more than \$1.1 million in donations to San Diego-area charities—began long before the New Orleans Saints' All-Pro quarterback hoisted the Vince Lombardi Trophy following his team's 2010 Super Bowl win.

It started with another former San Diego Chargers' quarterback, Stan Humphries, and Dave Miller, then a member of the team's front office.

newly created Integrated Sports Marketing, the two launched the Stan Humphries Celebrity Classic in 1999.

Since then, the tournament has grown into one of San Diego County's premiere sports hospitality events, now consisting of a two-day celebrity-amateur tournament (May 20-21), nightly parties (May 20-22) and the main event: a 36-hole celebrity competition (May 21-22) for a \$100,000 purse.

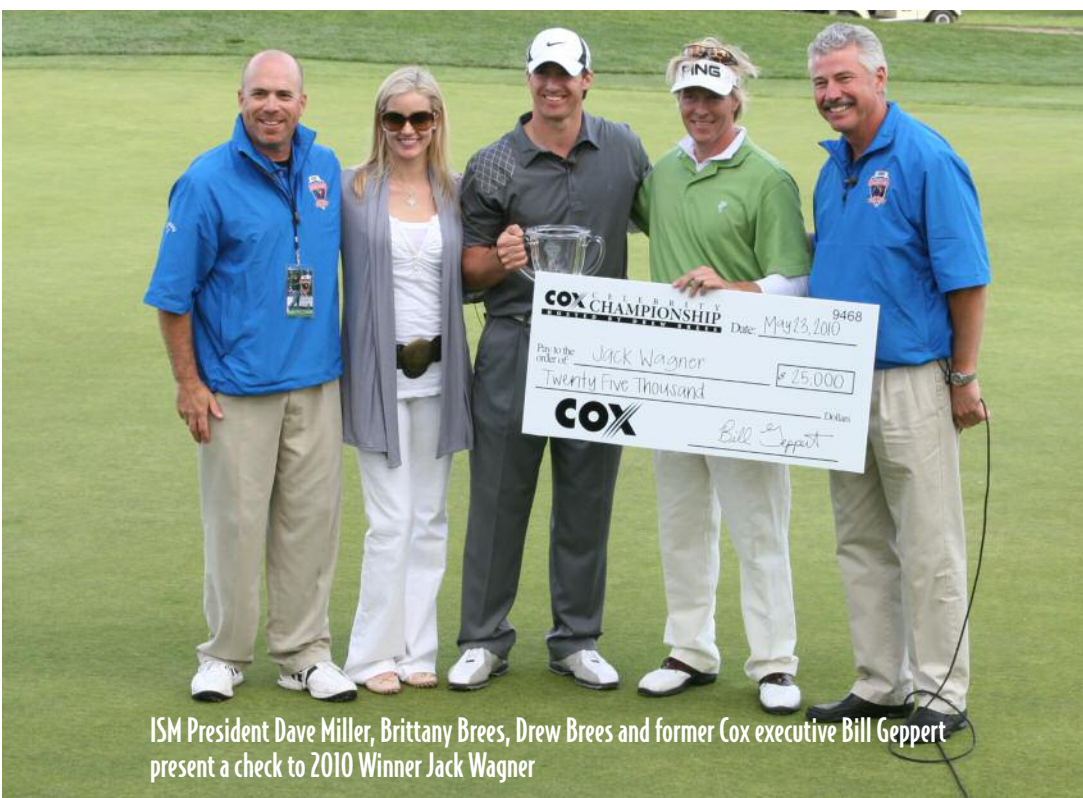
a spectacular four days of hospitality," says Dave Miller, president of Integrated Sports Marketing. "While it begins with our host Drew, none of it would be possible without partners like Cox Communications, EDCO and each of our sponsors and participating celebrities."

Humphries served as host for the first 10 tournaments before electing to spend more time at home in his native Louisiana. In a serendipitous move for Miller and

Integrated Sports Marketing, Brees took over that post prior to the 2010 tournament. After signing on as host, all Brees did was lead New Orleans to its first Super Bowl title and help the Gulf region recover from the devastation of Hurricane Katrina!

Brees doesn't go it alone; he has a partner in his wife, Brittany. Their Brees Dream Foundation, founded in 2003, aims to advance research in the fight against cancer, and provides care, education and opportunities for children in need. Together, they have given more than \$6 million to charitable causes and academic institutions in the New Orleans, West Lafayette/Purdue and San Diego communities.

Last year, the tournament and the Brees Dream Foundation distributed more than \$135,000 from monies raised at the tournament in support of its ongoing efforts in San Diego. Beneficiaries included Rady Children's Hospital, San Diego Armed Services YMCA, Friends of Scott Foundation and the National Multiple Sclerosis Society - Pacific South Coast Chapter.

became a part of it," says Brees. "It is an honor to welcome the celebrities who help us give back to San Diego. I can't wait to see everyone again, including the great fans that make this tournament so special and such a winner for the community."

As in years past, the 60-member field brings together the finest current and former pro athletes and entertainers and will again crown the nation's best celebrity golfer. Past tournament winners include standouts from each of the four major American sports: baseball, basketball, football and hockey.

The roster of past champions includes four-time champion Rick Rhoden (2000, 2002, 2003, 2007), Dan Quinn (1999), Trent Dilfer (2001), Brian Kinchen (2004), Andy Van Slyke (2005), Grant Fuhr (2006), Mickey Tettleton (2008) and last year's winner, actor Jack Wagner, whose two-under par total earned him the \$20,000 first-place check.

He's everywhere, even inside of an M&M

American actor Patrick Warburton is as laid back as the orange M&M he turns into during an M&M television commercial. And a piece of candy is not the only out-there character he has given life to. Consider the oversized bug/superhero from his action series *The Tick*.

Warburton has a legion of fans who know him for his distinctive voice as well as the characters he has played in hit television series, from David Puddy, with whom Elaine broke up multiple times on *Seinfeld*, to Jeff Bingham, the ultra macho married guy on *Rules of Engagement*. Generation to generation, Warburton has gained fame as the big guy with the deep, baritone voice who makes being serious hilarious.



Considering himself a native Californian, Warburton was actually born in Paterson, N.J., but moved with his family to Huntington Beach, Calif., at the age of three. After graduating from Newport Harbor High School, he briefly studied marine biology but dropped out to pursue modeling and acting.

Warburton's lengthy and impressive resume includes television, film and voice work. What his resume lacked until now, however, was his name on the billboard of a charity golf tournament.

In March 2011, the inaugural Patrick Warburton Golf for Kids Celebrity Golf Tournament was played at Classic Club in Palm Desert, Calif. Celebrities and amateurs competed for two days on the course and partied the night away at the pairings party and a comedy night/ gala.

Warburton, who is 47 and married with four children, is very serious about raising funds to help children via St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. What he isn't quite as serious about is the game of golf, which he typically enjoys with a six-pack and a foursome made up of buddies.

"I didn't really start playing golf until I was 26 or 27," he explains. "However, the first time I played I was about 23 and it was back east. After a couple of libations with my cousin, we grabbed the clubs and went to the course and ended up hitting golf balls with a priest."

Currently playing to a 16 handicap, Warburton's lowest round is a 76, and he's had two holes-in-one, "both with the worst shot you can imagine," he admits. The Ventura, Calif., resident doesn't belong to a country club and doesn't live on a golf course, but he finds time to play on area courses. At this point, none of his family plays so it's Warburton and his buddies.

"I live in Ventura County but I love coming to the desert," he says. "I'm friends with Kurt Russell and have played at Big Horn several times; it's such an amazing course, I just love it." In addition to his own tournament, Warburton is happy to play in other charity events and has teed it up in the Frank Sinatra Celebrity Invitational, the Bob Hope Classic and many more.

When asked who would make up his ultimate foursome Warburton quickly responds, "Eddie Vedder, Bobby Jones and my father." Why these three? "It really won't mean anything to anyone else so I'll just leave it at that."

Warburton continues to be busy and sought-after actor. "I'm working on *Rules of Engagement*, have a new animated film called *Hoodwinked* coming out and I'm back to work on *Family Guy*. It's all a lot of fun."

What upsets the easy-going thespian? "Thoughtless people. When I'm out there and see somebody who is just, 'It's all about me,' who double parks their car or has to be first in line, it really bothers me."

The light of Warburton's life is his family. He spends as much time with them as he can, even with a busy career, and especially embraces the special moments that happen when they sneak away to their cabin on the Rogue River in Oregon.

After a long day at work, Warburton yawns and is ready to get home and be with his family. When asked to describe his life in one sentence, there is a lengthy pause before he responds. "Blessed and full."

Why Don't People Improve at Golf?

Desert Golf Magazine instruction expert Tom Stickney II offers five steps to guaranteed improvement

I had an interesting thought while watching a Tour tournament the other day. During the event, a manufacturer's advertisement stated that over the last twenty years or so the average handicap has not gone down in spite of the fact that we have better equipment and better teaching technology. The ad went on to say that all of that would change if golfers would simply start hitting that manufacturer's club.

How nice it would be if a club made all the difference. The question I pondered was this: If the equipment is better and the teaching technology is better, why don't players improve more quickly—or sometimes at all?

The answer lies not in the information given by the instructor (though hopefully it is sound,) the teaching technology or the equipment used (to a point). The answer lies in the *application* of what is learned and how it is practiced—how the student *applies* the information given during the lesson in subsequent trips to the practice tee.

Here are five steps that provide the optimum way to apply the information you receive in a lesson, no matter what it is, to your own game so you can learn as quickly as possible.

1. Use a mirror to audit the correct versus incorrect motion so you can see it visually and feel it kinesthetically

The first thing I tell my students to do after a lesson is spend quality time in front of a mirror seeing the differences between the old, incorrect fundamental and the new-feeling but correct fundamental. It is obvious that it will feel different and it will look different in the mirror. It's up to you to figure out what, exactly, makes you perform the correct versus incorrect move in the mirror. I am not "in" your body and I can't tell you what you feel; I can only go by what I am told by others making the same move or what I have felt personally. But I can show you where you should be and tell you physiologically how your body makes the motion in question. So, the real key is to make sure you can see and feel the different motion that your teaching professional has asked you to perform.

2. When you're on the practice tee, use small, stop-action swings as you hit balls between 30 and 60 yards off the tee

Now that you can see and feel kinesthetically the motion you're going for, it is time to try to hit balls using the same motion—but not at full swing. It's still too early to use a full swing even at partial speed. I suggest using a short iron with a stop-action swing and hitting small pitch shots so you can still feel the positive move versus the incorrect move. If you can identify through feel that you are in the correct and more fundamentally solid position, and then visually verify it through the stopping motion, you can move on to a slow-motion swing. Only move to Step Three when you have mastered this step at least 90 percent of the time without too much mental or physical strain.

3. On the practice tee make slow-motion swings with the ball placed on a tee, trying to feel the same (correct vs. incorrect) motion you identified above

Once you have identified a stop-action feeling of what you are trying to accomplish, it is up to you to reconfigure your full-swing motion, integrating the new and more correct motion into it. At this point in the process I suggest using small, slow-motion swings with a short to mid iron and using a tee so you can focus on mechanics rather than ball flight. This step will allow you to hit slow-motion, full-

length swings producing ball flights about one-quarter of your normal distance so you can feel what you are trying to do kinesthetically. Mach-1 swings too early will do you no good because you will quickly go back to what feels "normal," and that's counterproductive. Rest assured there will be plenty of time later on to hit full-speed shots. As you become more proficient at slow-motion swings, you can build your swing speed up notch by notch until you are moving at full speed again with mid to long irons. When you can make these slow-motion swings with short to mid irons at least 70 percent of the time correctly, you are ready to move on to Step 4.

4. Hit the long irons and woods at partial speed (working up to full speed) along with the small, slow-motion pitch shots with the short irons.

Integrating longer clubs to a new swing is nothing short of impossible at times. That is why I suggest curing this "latency" by switching back and forth between the long clubs and the short, slow-motion pitch-shot swings of the short irons. This way you can feel with no doubt the difference between these motions. The long clubs will feel different and will react differently to your changes, but remember that the fundamentals are the SAME! Master this drill before moving on to full-speed swings with all clubs.

5. If you find yourself slipping back into the same old swing flaws, go back to Step 1!

You will do the same things wrong from now until the end of time, so if and when you fall back into your previous swing flaws, just repeat the steps above and you will find your way again. Don't go off on some new tangent without trying the steps above again. Remember that you will fall back 90 percent of the time—guaranteed!

These steps are not fun. In fact, they're boring. But they are the proven motor-learning steps to improving your game. No one is exempt from these steps though some people move through them quicker than others.

Navigating a sale in bank-owned waters

Location, Location, Location. This remains Rule No. 1 when purchasing a home, even if it is bank owned. Always search for the best location. Paint and carpet can revive a drab interior but you cannot decorate over the noise of a busy street or pesky neighbors. When searching for the best deal, use a local realtor who knows the area and has experience with bank-owned transactions and short sales. When purchasing any kind of property, take time to do your due diligence. This can be especially important in a challenging economy. Talk to the neighbors in the area and ask questions about the neighborhood. Check out the financials of the club and HOA. In today's economy many HOAs are insolvent, which could lead to large charges for club maintenance. Have a home inspection and if anything is found call an expert to look at the problem and give you an estimate. If the problem is large or expensive and was not apparent on an initial walk through, ask the bank for repairs or monies off the purchase price. Even if it says, "as is," always take the time to ask. Do a thorough title search and make sure the contract includes free and clear title backed by title insurance. Read *everything*—every addendum and all the fine print to make sure it is clear who is paying for what in the escrow process.

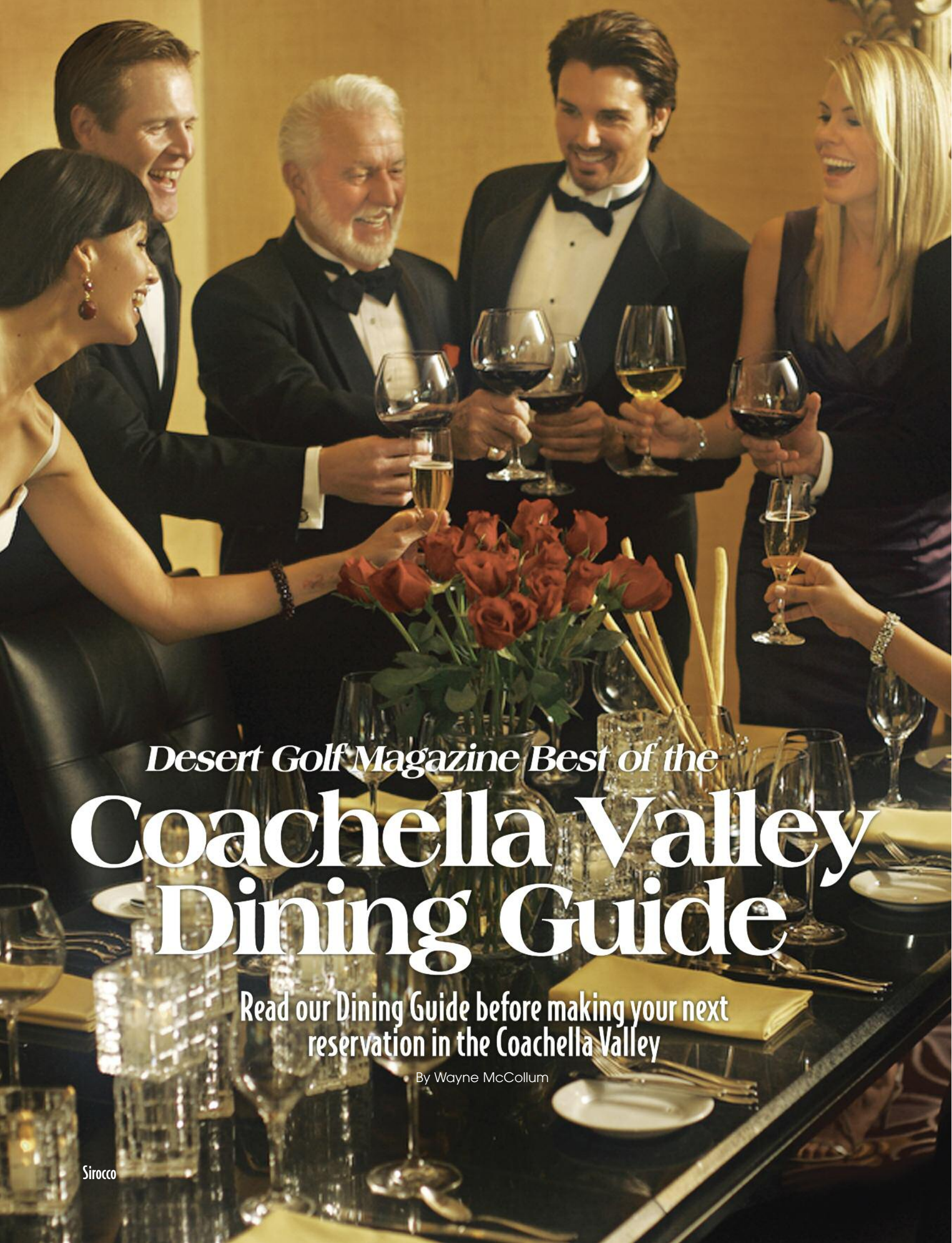



Getting a Good Lie with the **BMW 760Li**

BMW's luxury sedan raises the bar in the V-12 market



In the upper-crust class of luxury sedans with price tags under \$200,000, there are only a handful of competitors. BMW's 760Li is looking to distance itself from the regal but hungry pack.

The 760Li is at the top of BMW's totem. Since getting into the V-12 market in the late 1980s, BMW has slowly declined in sales and stature in this class. That trend is likely to change with this model.

Reading reviews is one thing, but readers need do nothing more than sit inside the 760Li to understand why it's two steps ahead of the competition. BMW takes

Outwardly, there is very little that one might consider remarkable about the 760Li. It is almost understated for a car that costs more than \$140,000. It's elegant and everything you would expect, but the "wow" comes in the execution. BMW purposely put very few additions from the more pedestrian 7 series models into the 760. Quad rear exhaust and V-12 emblems gracing the doors are about the only indicators that the 760 has something special happening. It's a well-kept secret.

When the light turns green though, onlookers will recognize that this isn't your

model as well. It also lowers the weight required to make the car move. And at lower speeds, the rear wheels actually turn away from the direction you require in order to quicken response.

Critics might ding the model for its disconnected feel. Translated, that means the car is just too quiet. The V-12's roar is dampened enough to make driving and talking pleasant without road or engine noise. Perhaps BMW wanted you to be able to hear those emails being read to you without having to crank the 16-speaker stereo system.



luxury seriously, and it's clear that the 760Li's designers were determined to put their brand back in front of the luxury sedan market.

Supple leather and rich wood wrap a sophisticated technology package. Sync your smart phone and let the car read your emails to you while you drive. The seats adjust in a million different configurations to give you just the right angle for a long drive through the desert, wine country or rush hour. All four seats are heated, cooled and give massages. With this feature alone, the 760Li gets my vote for best way to win friends and influence people in 2011.

What lies beneath the surface, however, is truly the treasure of the 760. Open the massive hood and you'll find twin rows of six-cylinder power. As they run north and south, they are each operated with separate turbochargers. The addition of the extra turbocharger rockets horsepower into a league with something NASA might put on its showroom floor. With 535 horsepower, the 760Li is packing more firepower than an Aston Martin Vantage or Mercedes-Benz CL600. In fact, 535 horsepower is the second largest number for any BMW ever.

grandfather's Town Car. Lightning quick for a flagship, the 760Li covers the quarter mile in about 12.5 seconds. That's about the time of a Dodge Viper but it would have a Mini Cooper strapped to the roof.

"You absolutely feel like you are riding in a sports car," says Jonathan Craft, client representative at BMW Palm Springs. "The horsepower is a good match for the weight."

Most customers, according to Craft, are opting for the all-wheel drive XDrive package, which costs about \$2,000 more but gives drivers the ability to tackle mountain snow. There are also several innovative options like night vision with pedestrian detection alerts. A blind-spot detection feature warns of traffic in areas not easily accessed visually. Multiple cameras ensure that you're never driving blind.

BMW also added additional gears to the transmission. Now there are eight separate gears in the new electronically regulated transmission. Seamless shifting is what's expected at this level, but the long 8th gear dictates the jump from zero to 60 will feel weightless.

An ingenious active steering model provides the responsiveness of a sportier

Pronghorn Resort is a getaway from your getaway. Tucked among the fragrant desert sage, natural lava rock outcroppings and 20,000 acres of old-growth junipers, this Tuscan-style private community just east of Bend has quickly become a true destination resort in itself.

Jack Nicklaus and Tom Fazio, two of the world's best course designers, are the names behind Pronghorn's superb golf facilities, which sit below an opulent 55,000-square foot clubhouse. Both courses, particularly their immaculate putting surfaces, are the gold standard for golf courses in a region saturated with excellent layouts.

The Jack Nicklaus Signature course is a 7,300-yard, par-72 "bear," if you will, that takes players on a true desert golf experience. It's firm and fast and the scenery is breathtaking—snow-tipped peaks in the distance and ancient lava rock outcroppings throughout.

The layout's signature hole is the 15th, an uphill, 543-yard par 5 with fiendishly placed lava outcroppings that guard the green

where players are rewarded with unobstructed views of the Cascade Mountains.

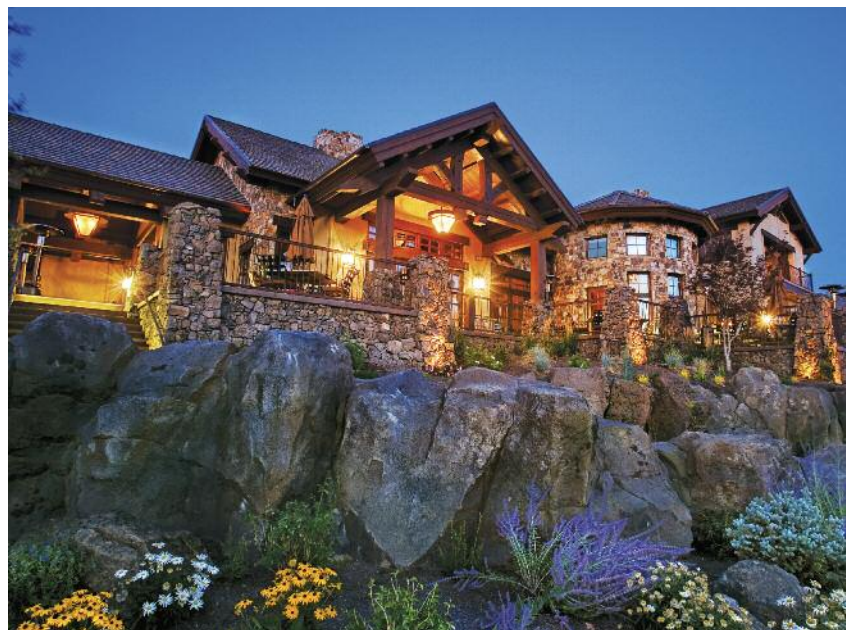
Last year *Golfweek* named the Nicklaus course at Pronghorn the 21st best resort course in the nation. When it opened in 2006, it was called "one of the top two new courses in the nation."

Adjacent to the Nicklaus course is a Tom Fazio classic. Fazio's first Oregon course measures more than 7,400 yards and plays to a par 72. It is home to one of the most unique golf holes you'll ever see—the par-3 No. 8 features a 45-foot canyon and an exposed lava tube.

Golfweek named the Fazio course the 8th best residential course in the nation and *Golf Digest* ranked it among the top four best new private courses in 2008.

Bring a camera and a few extra golf balls.

But if you didn't bring your "A Game" and want to find it while you're here, Pronghorn has you covered with the PGA's Tour Academy Pronghorn.



With a state-of-the-art instruction facility featuring some of the best instructors in the region and the latest in high-tech video swing analysis, you may just leave ready to tackle your home club championship.

Central Oregon

There's a course for every type of player in Central Oregon

Central Oregon is quickly becoming a mecca for golfers, mentioned in the same breath as Scottsdale/Phoenix, Myrtle Beach and Bandon Dunes. The high-desert region 150 miles southwest of Portland—from Madras to La Pine, Sisters to Prineville—boasts more than two dozen public and private courses that will leave beginners begging for more and low-handicappers feeling truly tested. Each of the courses offers breathtaking scenery from the national forests they wind through, rivers they run alongside and mountain range they sit beneath.

The Bend/Redmond area alone is a golfer's paradise with several courses within a couple of miles of each other, making it easy to get those glorious 36-hole days.

In Central Oregon, public courses offer many of the same amenities as upscale private clubs, giving locals and visitors the feeling that they've been valued members of the courses for years. And the private clubs offer frequent public play, offering

visitors a taste of the services, amenities and experiences usually reserved for members only. And that's just part of what makes Central Oregon a truly desirable golfing destination.

Central Oregon is on the "dry side" of the Cascades with a high-desert climate that offers cool, clear mornings (frost delays have been known to creep well into June) and warm, sometimes blazing hot, summer days. Sunshine is abundant and rain showers are few and far between. Bring a sweater—but leave the umbrella at home.

While many visitors make the three-hour drive to Bend after flying into Portland, more and more direct flights are being offered from all over the country to Redmond's Robert's Field, making getting to Central Oregon even easier.

Once here, the area's diverse restaurant and lodging options, eclectic shops, fine golf and unmatched outdoor adventure opportunities have the reputation of quickly turning visitors into residents.

REDMOND & NORTH

Crooked River Ranch

Twelve miles northwest of Redmond, Crooked River Ranch is off the beaten path. Locals, however, have beaten a path here because it's one of the most scenic and challenging golf courses you'll ever experience. Built in the middle of stunning Crooked River Gorge, this Bunny Mason-George Ramey design is "only" 5,800-yards from the back tees; but the par-71 course is known to be a player's course—and with teeth. Crooked River is home to what is arguably the most spectacular golf hole in all of Oregon, the 260-yard, par-4 5th that veers around the edge of the gorge. The newer back nine features waterfalls, lakes and arresting views of the deepest gorge in Central Oregon. (541.923.6343; crookedriverranch.com)

Eagle Crest Resort

Eagle Crest Resort, northwest of Bend in Redmond, offers three different tests of golf to challenge players of all abilities. The Resort Course is a 6,700-yard par 72 and the original layout on the property. Home to the Oregon high school state championship, it features tight fairways and two distinctive nines that force players to use every part of their game.

At 7,000 yards, the par-72 Ridge Course is the resort's "grip it and rip it" layout featuring wide fairways and subtle greens. It's a true championship-level course, having hosted the prestigious Northwest Open in 2006.

The 4,200-yard, par-63 Challenge Course may be short but it's not exactly an executive course. Popular with families, the Challenge features 400-yard par 4s and difficult par 3s, so bring your game when tackling what *Links Magazine* called the Pacific Northwest's best short course. (541.923.4653; eagle-crest.com)

Juniper Golf Course

Juniper Golf Course in the town of Redmond has quickly made a name for itself as one of the best courses in the state. Home to

numerous local and regional championship events, the five-year-old course has also hosted the 2007 and 2010 Oregon Open.

The John Harbottle III-designed layout is carved from a landscape of native juniper trees and lava rock outcroppings, resulting in a 7,200-yard course that, when the wind-blows, is one of the toughest tests in the region. Juniper's immaculate greens have a reputation for being among the best in the area, and with Central Oregon's unique weather, the course is often open 12 months a year. (541.548.3121; playjuniper.com)

Kah-Nee-Ta High Desert Resort & Casino

Located on the Warm Springs Indian Reservation about an hour north of Bend, Kah-Nee-Ta High Desert Resort & Casino offers a getaway for families wanting a little bit of everything—spa, pools, stables, dining and, of course, golf. The par-72, 5,800-yard golf course offers two distinctive sides, with the front nine featuring wide-open fairways and relatively flat putting surfaces that lull golfers into thinking they're in for a cakewalk. But the back nine quickly narrows, forcing players to switch gears to a high-desert, links-style challenge with doglegs and undulating greens. (541-553-4971; kahneeta.com)

SISTERS AREA AND WEST

Aspen Lakes Golf Course

At the base of the Three Sisters, Central Oregon's iconic volcanic peaks, this 18-hole, 7,300-yard W.L. Overdorf-design is a perennial favorite of visitors and locals alike who want to experience a great test of golf in one of the more breathtaking settings imaginable. But be careful of becoming too distracted by the beauty—lakes and ponds come into play on more than half the holes. The perfect bent-grass fairways and greens and unique bunkers made of crushed red volcanic rock contrast with the snowcapped peaks that seem to hover over this course

located near the small tourist town of Sisters, 15 miles from Bend. (541.549.4653; aspenlakes.com)



Black Butte Ranch

Black Butte Ranch Resort, near Sisters, features two championship-caliber golf courses including the Big Meadow Course, designed and recently renovated by Robert Muir Graves. This 7000-yard course celebrated its 40th anniversary in 2010 and has long been the perfect example of Central Oregon's merging of beautiful backdrops and natural scenery with challenging golf holes. The course winds through a forest of Ponderosa pines and offers amazing views of the Cascade Range.

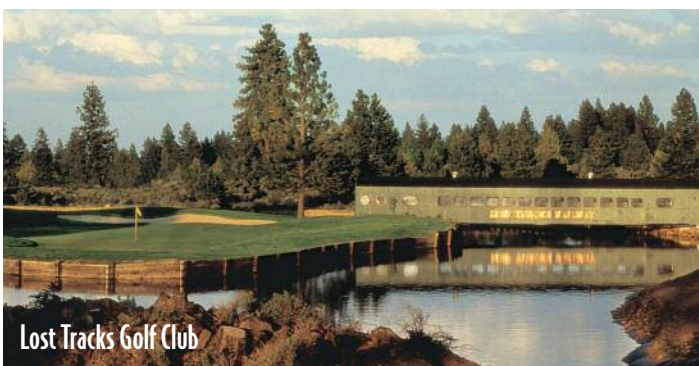
The Glaze Meadow Course is currently undergoing a massive renovation that's expected to keep the Bunny Mason-design closed until 2012. As one local golf writer declared, the construction at the course is essentially the building of a new golf course. Stay tuned! (541-595-1500; blackbutteranch.com)



BEND AREA

Lost Tracks Golf Club

Brian Whitcomb, the club's owner, designer and a former President of the PGA of America, has long said the course is what



the word "golf" is all about. Few would argue with him. Off the beaten path in Bend, Lost Tracks is a par 72 that takes players over rolling terrain fashioned into 7000 yards of beautiful golf holes and equally beautiful views of the Cascade Mountains. Named for the railroad tracks that crews uncovered during the course's construction, Lost Tracks is one of Bend's most popular layouts.

Bring an extra bag tag to hang alongside the thousands already adorning the vintage railcar that serves as a bridge to the 16th hole's island green—one of the more unique experiences you'll have on a golf course. (541.385.1818; losttracks.com)

River's Edge Golf Course

River's Edge Golf Course, in the heart of Bend, is a true local's favorite, in part because it's often open year-round. Enormous elevation changes, numerous side-hill lies, undulating greens and amazing views of the city give this course both its teeth and appeal. The 18-hole, par-72 Robert Muir Graves-design offers views of Mount Jefferson, Smith Rock and the Deschutes River. One of its signature holes, par 3 No. 16, measures 216 yards from the back tees and requires pinpoint accuracy to a green 300 feet below. (541.389.2828; riverhouse.com)



Tetherow Golf Club

Tetherow Golf Club may offer the most unique golf experience in Central Oregon. Imagine Bandon Dunes without the ocean, Scotland without the cold, wet mist. Imagine golf as the inventors of the game imagined it, and that's what you'll find at Tetherow—right in the heart of Bend. This course topped the *Golf Magazine* "Best New Courses You Can Play" list two years ago when it opened, and it's gaining a reputation as *the* place to play when you're visiting the region. Stretching nearly 7300 yards, this links-style course is firm and fast as it snakes along two different ridgelines ravaged by a forest fire many years ago. The tightly mown fairways demand expertise in the ground game—and then you reach the lightning-quick greens. "Undulating" doesn't begin to describe what you're up against. (541.388.2582; tetherow.com)



Widgi Creek Golf Club

Widgi Creek Golf Club is truly a Central Oregon gem, situated within the Ponderosa pines of Deschutes National Forest along the quiet road to the Pacific Northwest's largest ski area, Mount Bachelor.

At just under 7,000 yards, this Robert Muir Graves design isn't the longest layout in Bend, but the par-5 3rd hole is one of the longest holes in the state at close to 670 yards from the tips. Accuracy replaces distance off the tee at Widgi Creek where enormous pines and perfectly placed ponds and bunkers keep par in check. Readers of *The Source Weekly*, Bend's alternative weekly newspaper, have voted Widgi "Best Golf Course in Central Oregon" eight of the last nine years. The course also features an onsite full-service spa and salon. (541.382.4449; widgi.com)



EAST DESCHUTES/CROOK COUNTIES

Brasada Ranch Golf Club

Brasada Ranch Golf Club is just a short drive from Bend in the town of Powell Butte. This Jim Hardy design is resort golf at its finest with elevated tee boxes and wide, absolutely immaculate fairways that almost seem like artificial turf leading to smooth, fast putting surfaces. When summer winds come into play some of the holes can be challenging to say the least, including the par-4 9th that plays 499 yards from the tips. But when the majestic snowcapped Cascades are your target line and a pull hook puts you in the middle of the stunning high desert, you might not care about writing a five or a six on the scorecard. (541.504.4421; brasada.com)



Meadow Lakes Golf Course

Meadow Lakes Golf Course in Prineville, about 40 minutes east of Bend, is another local's favorite for a quality, inexpensive, challenging and no-nonsense round of golf. Water comes into play

on 16 of the 18 holes, but don't let that scare you. The 6,700-yard, par-72 layout is a fair test of golf for players of all abilities and is always in excellent shape, even in winter when many of the "city folk" of Bend take advantage of Meadow Lakes' year-round oasis. (541-447-7113; meadowlakesgc.com)



SOUTH DESCHUTES COUNTY

Quail Run Golf Course

Quail Run is located about 25 miles south of Bend in La Pine, and as any local will tell you, it's definitely worth the trip. Quail Run grew from nine to 18 holes four years ago and is now rated the second toughest 18-hole course in the region. At 6,800 yards, this quiet little course has perfectly maintained greens and fairways, and affordable rates have made it the secret diamond-in-the-rough of south Deschutes County. (541.536.1303; quailrun golf.net)



Sunriver Resort

Sunriver Resort, south of Bend, features four distinctive courses in addition to every other amenity your family would want in a vacation resort, including fishing, biking, tennis, a children's program and a full-service spa.

The Meadows Course is located at the center of the resort below the Grand Lodge, a Jeff Fought design that winds its way



along the meandering Sunriver. It has hosted several USGA and other championship events and both the men and women's NCAA National Championship. The Woodlands Course is a 6,900-yard, tree-lined layout that's a favorite among locals for its beauty and serenity.



Crosswater Club

But the opportunity to play the famed Crosswater Club is reason enough for anyone to plan a trip to Sunriver. Host to the Jeld-Wen Tradition Champions Tour major championship from 2007-2010, this Bob Cupp-designed bear of a layout is open only to resort guests and members. It's a traditional heathland-style course featuring wide fairways and subtle green complexes. Its teeth are perfectly placed bunkers, water hazards...and the fact it's nearly 7,700-yards long. How long is the course? Even Hall of Fame professionals didn't play from the back tees during the Jeld-Wen Tradition.



Caldera Links

Conversely, the new nine-hole Caldera Links is a more family friendly test of golf. Across the street from Crosswater, Caldera offers the same tour-quality bent-grass fairways and greens, but with holes ranging from just 60 to 185 yards, it's the perfect place to hone your short game or bring the family out for a lovely early evening instructional round. (800-386-2243; sunriver-resort.com)

Bandon Dunes Resort

Shines On

After you've enjoyed all that Central Oregon offers, head to the coast where all four Bandon Dunes courses are "must play."

It's hard to find words that haven't already been used to describe **Bandon Dunes Golf Resort** located on the Southern Oregon Coast, about five hours south of Portland. It's home to four distinctively different courses as well as a coastal landscape that rivals any in the world for scenic splendor. All four of the resort's courses are on the *Golf Magazine* "Top 100 Places You Can Play" list.

Bandon Dunes, ranked No. 5 by *Golf Magazine*, is the original course at the resort. Perched on a bluff above the Pacific Ocean, this David McClay Kidd layout is links golf at its finest, where the challenge comes from the demanding natural layout and "brisk" ocean breezes. Mastery of the ground game is a must on this course, just as it is on the courses in the British Isles to which Bandon Dunes is so often compared.

The resort's website sums up **Pacific Dunes** by saying it "doesn't feel as if it was built as much as it was discovered." The extensive and challenging contours on this Tom Doak masterpiece hugging the shoreline require that players be precise off the tee and on the equally contoured greens.

How good is Pacific Dunes? It's tops the *Golf Magazine* list of places you can play—ahead of Pebble, ahead of Bethpage, ahead of Pinehurst No. 2.

Ben Crenshaw and Bill Coore's **Bandon Trails** course takes players further inland to a gem within the coastal forest. Its architects liken a round here to a nature walk that takes you from sand dunes through meadows and into a forest of pine and spruce. Oh, don't forget to hit a few shots along the way.

Old MacDonald is the newest course at the resort and has quickly gained a reputation among its admirers as Pacific Dunes' equal. Play it and find out why.

So many things have been said about Bandon's courses that perhaps this blurb from *Golf Odyssey* sums it up best: "It is here, on this remote stretch of wildly stunning Oregon coast, where the finest golf courses in the whole world quietly await you."
