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

fter an undeniably successful 2012 Humana Challenge, and a few months before the January 17-20, 2013 event, the wheels of change went into motion. "I understand and I know that we have to build on the strength of the field," says Bob Marra, new executive director and CEO of the PGA tournament.

Marra, a local businessman and Humana Challenge board member, replaces Larry Thiel, who served as the event's tournament chairman since 2010. "I'm honored to have the opportunity to take on this incredible responsibility in this community," says Marra.

Like many changes, this one comes with opportunity. A new direction and ideas for growing the tournament include making

The Humana Challenge gives us a wonderful opportunity to take a positive message and promote the idea of behavior modification for everyone as a key component to the long-term health of this nation."

There is no question that President Clinton's participation also brings a new energy to the event. Throughout the tournament week an abundance of meetings and lectures take place involving the Clinton Global Initiative America and the Clinton Global Foundation. Serving as host in 2012, President Clinton worked hard to recruit new PGA Tour players to the event, and even played in one pro-am round.

"CGI members have improved the lives of more than 300 million people around the world," President Clinton says." We

form partnerships to take action on issues that matter most, which is why I am pleased that the Clinton Foundation, the PGA Tour and Humana are working together to promote healthy lifestyles. The tournament builds on my personal love for golf, preserving the Bob Hope Classic legacy, and the Clinton Foundation's commitment to healthy choices."

In 2013, the Humana Challenge will continue to honor and celebrate the legacy of Bob Hope, as well as maintain the new four-round format and three-course rotation. New is the expanded field of 156 PGA Tour professionals and 156 amateurs, including celebrities.

Also new is the focus on areas of Marra's expertise—marketing and public relations. "My greatest strengths lie in the farreaching and long-established relations in the community and business community, and with those in the nonprofit organization world who need to be activated to a much greater level to understand the importance of this event and their involvement in it," Marra says.

Working with and helping local charities remains a top priority for the Humana Challenge. During the past 53 years, this tournament has generated more than \$52 million for charities in the Coachella Valley, primarily the Eisenhower Medical Center. Each year, the goal is to



raise more funds than the previous year, and now there's the equally important goal of providing on-the-spot healthy lifestyle programs and options during the event.

Tickets for the 2013 Humana Challenge are priced starting as low as \$30. They can be purchased on the tournament's newly redesigned website, humanachallenge.com, or ordered via phone by calling 888.672.4673.

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

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The Waste Management Phoenix Open By Matt McKay

A Proud Tradition of Nontraditional Golf. The Waste Management Phoenix Open has a good thing going

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et's face it. Golf in Scottsdale isn't traditional. It isn't old school. It isn't buttoned-down oxford shirts with bow ties. It's straw fedoras and button-up shirts made to be worn untucked. It's not patent-leather spikes but spikeless sandals.

That's why the Waste Management Phoenix Open (WMPO) is the perfect reflection of the area's golf culture. It's out there but in there. It's got polish and it's got its rowdy, frayed edges. It's wide open and played under vast skies. It's as free and unfettered as the Wild West itself—or at least as free and unfettered as a PGA Tour event can or dares to be.

"We're a young city. We're only 61 years old, and the state is still comparatively young, too," says Laura McMurchie, vice president of communications for the Scottsdale Convention and Visitors Bureau. "A lot of people move here with the spirit of the west and embrace that "Wild West" mentality. We're still shaping who we are as a city and people feel like they can be whatever they want to be."

There is certainly no other event on the PGA Tour like the WMPO, and you'd be hard pressed to find disagreement on that issue. One of its unique characteristics is its position on the calendar, with the final round typically falling on Super Bowl Sunday. This year's event is no different; the tournament is scheduled for Jan.28-Feb. 3, and the Super Bowl is set for Feb. 3 in New Orleans.

Perhaps no other PGA tournament is celebrated as much for what happens off the course as for what happens on it. The famous Bird's Nest, this year sponsored by Coors Light, has been host to millions of golf revelers over the last 20-plus years, and the tournament's concerts and related activities are well known throughout the golf world.



The WMPO has also developed into what amounts to the social event of the season in Scottsdale. Those who want to see or be seen, or get out and feel a part of it all in this town, know there is no better way to go about it than to attend the WMPO.

"Even if you're not a golfer, it's THE event to go to here," says McMurchie. "If



you're in Calgary, everyone goes to the Stampede. It doesn't matter if you know roping or wrangling, you just have to go.

"On the course, there's a lot to see. Everyone wants to know who has the best ticket or vantage point or corporate tent...it's very social and, of course, the players really get into it. It's evolved into something everyone enjoys. It's a special culture we have."

There's no better embodiment of the tournament than the famous par-3 No. 16, the only true "stadium" hole in the game, in that it is completely surrounded by grandstands. In part because of it's originality and one-of-a-kind history, players not only tolerate the rambunctious atmosphere, they often encourage crowd participation, occasionally donning football jerseys or flinging promotional items into the throngs above as they make their way toward the green.

The hole has become such a successful and notable experiment that several other Tour events nationwide have considered, or are actively employing, similar techniques on their par-3s. While that may be flattering, McMurchie believes that the concept at core is consummately Scottsdale. The 16th at the TPC Scottsdale is what it is because golf in Scottsdale is what it is.


"Over the years, seeing what players have had to say, they love [No. 16]," McMurchie says. "They wouldn't want every tournament to be like that, but this one is like a breath of fresh air. Everyone embraces what it is. There's a synergy between the marshals and fans where they all know it's a little out of the ordinary, but they know they need to keep it within certain limits.

"We realize if a few people are looking at that model for their tournaments, then they feel like what we're doing is a success. There may be room for a few more [events] with a lighthearted feel, and obviously players can pick and choose where they want to play. So if that type of situation isn't for them, they have other options. But it's our tradition, we're proud of it and we think it reflects who we are as a golf community."

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The Ultimate Hideaway

A master architect provides an insider's view of The Hideaway Club golf courses

Restling peacefully near the base of the majestic Santa Rosa Mountains is the ultimate hideaway. Aptly named, The Hideaway Club is a place in which to rejuvenate, unwind from personal and


business stress, and be pampered in unabashed luxury. This year The Hideaway celebrates its 10th anniversary.

The Hideaway is a Discovery Land Company project. Discovery Land specializes in the development of exceptional, high-end private club communities, and has developed over a dozen in locations from Kukio in Hawaii to Baker's Bay in the Bahamas.

Michael Meldman, CEO and founder of Discovery Land, says, "We

created The Hideaway to fit the traditions of La Quinta, a place where our members and their families can escape and enjoy the luxuries and amenities of a club in a great location."

The Hideaway is entered via a pair of massive Castilla-style wooden gates, which open onto a private courtyard containing a charming old-Hacienda-style security house. The Hideaway has all the facilities of an elite country club, including an Olympic-size swimming pool,

tennis courts, a spa and a fitness center, and a level of service that is phenomenal.

At the heart of the community is the 45,000-square-foot Spanish-revivalstyle clubhouse, the setting for numerous well-attended functions. The club is extremely active, offering a roster of events from twilight golf and fireside chats with touring professionals to master cooking classes with the club's executive chef—and much more. The clubhouse also offers views of two golf courses: "The Pete," designed by legendary architect Pete Dye, and "The Clive," designed by the author of this article, Clive Clark. The beauty of the

two courses is that they perfectly complement one another.

"The Pete"

This course is true to the Dye philosophy, well designed with challenge and risk-and-reward elements. Although it's not the easiest golf course in the world, aggressive play can reap great dividends. That said, if you're attacking the course and your shot making is less than anticipated, it's easy to spin off the track.

The fairways are generally wide and provide an attractive target. The trouble typically begins with the second shots and approaches. There are several holes where water creeps devilishly close to the green, making the margin between success and failure extremely slim. There is, however, a good balance between ease and difficulty. For example, take the short par-4 15th hole. For a scratch player, it's almost drivable, and it should offer a comfortable par for the mid-handicap or even higherhandicap golfer. Two holes later, at the 17th, the 'tips' offer players a par 3 of 235 yards with an expansive stretch of lake in front and to the left edge of the green, with only a small 'bale-out' area on the right. Even off the 195-yard members' tee, it has an intimidating effect.



"The Clive"

When I was asked to design a course at The Hideaway, it was a very exciting prospect. At that time, a lot of my work was done in the UK and on the European Continent. Not only was this to be my first design in the desert, I lived a mere five minutes from the site, and I knew that designing a course surrounded by custom home lots in the Californian Desert would be an entirely new challenge for me.

My plan—and I believe it succeeded was to design a golf course that would inspire club members to play well, give them a moderate degree of challenge but ensure that they would have fun. Although 15 of the holes contain water, I didn't want The Clive to be either penal or intimidating. It was designed very much as a course for members to play and enjoy, not as a course to be a test for major professional championships. That doesn't mean professional golfers will not enjoy playing the golf course, but the focus was on members.

Most of the greens are open-fronted and allow players to run the ball onto the green. Many of the greens have a tendency

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to collect the golf ball rather than reject it, and most of the fairways are some 50 yards wide, a generous target.

Various strategies were employed within the design. For instance, the 1st and 10th holes have particularly wide fairways-nothing like getting a round off to a good start! Hole #12 employs what I call "the St. Andrews theory." Those of you who have played The Old Course at St. Andrews know that the trouble from the tee is on the right. To the left is half of Fife. However, playing toward the trouble on the right provides a much better angle for the approach to the green. By contrast, the abundance of ground on the left may be safe, but it usually leaves a shot that is forced to go over trouble and is therefore more difficult. On the 12th at The Hideaway, the right side of the fairway is a perfect line, but you risk going into a couple of nasty bunkers. To the left is half of California where you are safe, but vision to the green is obscured by substantial mounds and the blind shot creates a greater degree of difficulty.

The 13th hole is an unusual par 5 in that the second shot can be played two entirely different ways. Off a good drive, the longer hitter may go for the green in two; it's all carry over a lake and two mounds with a valley in between, which gives a great sighting line to the pin. The alternative is to go down a separate piece of fairway some 30 degrees left of the aforementioned line, which then leaves a shot of around 100 yards to the green. The 13th is a classic risk-and-reward par 5.

To increase the enjoyable factor, I avoided making the par 4s very long. Many championship courses today have par-4 holes of 500 yards or more, which for most club golfers is unreachable in two shots and therefore in practical terms adds another par 5 to the golf course. At The Hideaway, I kept the par 4s shortish to medium in length. The 18th is the longest par 4 on the course, measuring 452 yards from the tips, and also the most difficult. It makes for a challenging finish even off the members' tee at 420 yards. The landing area for the drive is generous, but the second shot skirts a lake and then traverses up a gentle hill to a green protected by bunkers that stagger up the right-hand approach. In other words, the first bunker you see on the right approach is 30 yards short of the green. This creates 'dead ground,' the effect of which is that the pin seems closer than it really is. Skillful golfers who understand course management will quickly realize that they may have to add a club-and-a-half to allow for playing uphill and the effect of the 'dead ground.' Less skilled golfers will no doubt find themselves working on their bunker play!

One of the most outstanding holes on "The Clive" course is far from the most difficult. Off the members' tee, which generally plays 130 to 140 yards (the ladies play it at just over 100 yards), the 7th hole is one for everyone to enjoy. This short par 3 has oodles of visual appeal and is laced with babbling brooks, split-level lakes, several waterfalls and masses of colorful shrubs and flowers, all set against the magnificent backdrop of the Santa Rosa Mountains. Although it is a forced carry over these lakes and waterfalls, it is a short carry and the target is large. It's a hole where one might enjoy the scenery as much as the par that most players comfortably achieve.

Don Sutton, the famed pitcher, was one of the first members at The Hideaway. He once said, "My perfect day starts with a morning whirlpool in the locker room, a cup of coffee, playing with three of my best buddies, winning all of my bets and then enjoying a glass of Chardonnay on the patio while watching the sunset over the Santa Rosa Mountains. I'm enamored by Clive's floral concept; it's like playing golf in the middle of the Rose Parade!"



How to Use Goal Setting To Become a Better Golfer It's not enough just to practice-you have to practice effectively

ndividuals are not born experts in their area of interest. It takes many years and thousands of hours of deliberate practice for a person to become an expert in a given area, be it music, sports or any other category.

When an individual is first learning a new skill, the step-by-step instructions of how to perform that skill are kept in the working memory. Once a person has become proficient at the task, the information becomes procedural as opposed to declarative, meaning the performance becomes automatic.

Research suggests that high-level athletes have better recollection of their performance, as well as details about the environment. Novice athletes, on the other hand, have a better recollection of the step-by-step mechanical procedure they used to execute the skill. This speaks to the fact that the expert golfer is not using working memory; rather, he or she is performing the skill automatically and thus has the ability to pay attention to other stimuli and environmental cues without a decrease in performance of the primary task, and to adapt to different conditions when necessary—skills professional players must have.

The key to becoming an expert in golf, or any other desired domain, is deliberate practice. It has been documented that it takes approximately 10,000 hours of deliberate practice for anyone to become an expert in anything and move from using the working memory to the procedural memory. "Deliberate" is the key word here. Practicing without purpose will not develop the memory needed to encode the necessary motor programs to become an expert golfer.

One way to make practice deliberate is by goal setting, a terrific mental skill that can be used to improve your practice, increase motivation and focus and help you develop the desired motor programs to become an expert golfer, at whatever level of expertise is right for you.

The key is to set clear objectives and define the level of intensity necessary to achieve those objectives. When we fulfill a goal, we feel a sense of achievement; but if the goal isn't met, we may feel a sense of failure. That's why the process of goal setting is so important.

Here are some basic guidelines to follow for setting appropriate goals.

- Make goals specific and attainable. A vague goal (e.g., I want to get better) will not help you. Goals should be as specific as possible. Typically what golfers desire is to play better, lower their handicap, hit the ball farther, be a more consistent putter and improve other skills. But simply stating that you want to be better and then going to the practice range to hit a bucket of balls will not correlate to improved abilities. Instead, you have to set attainable goals that will result in improvement in these areas. A good practice goal, for example, might be to start every practice having to make five 10foot putts in a row before hitting any balls on the range. Not only is this a concise goal, it's easy to measure improvement and success.

• Find the right level of challenge for you. Goals should not be so challenging that they are unattainable; however, if a goal is too easy it will not motivate you and your performance will suffer.

• The goal should be within your control. For example, winning is not always within your control regardless of your execution. An opponent's game and environmental variables are outside of your control. The only thing you can control is your own personal performance.

- The goal should reflect what *you* want to achieve, not someone else's goals.

- The goal should be measurable. Measuring progress will help keep you motivated to achieve your goals. For example, one of your goals might be increased focus on a specific swing-thought. To measure how well you are achieving that on the golf course, take a second score card with you and score yourself on your level of commitment. Use a scale of 1 (not committed at all; many other thoughts enter your mind) to 5 (completely committed) to score your chosen swing-thought for the day. Remember, you're not scoring the *result* of the shots. The more 4s and 5s you start to see on your scorecard, the better your actual golf scores will likely become.

• Every practice or training session should include small goals that build toward the greater goal. One example of this might be how you approach your warm-up before teeing off. You could commit to spending at least the last 10 minutes of your warm-up going through your pre-shot routine for each ball you hit on the practice range, changing your target or club with each shot. That smaller goal helps you achieve larger goals on the course.

Learning how to effectively use goal setting is an excellent way to improve your deliberate practice procedures, which will ultimately help you achieve your desired level of expert performance.

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

Yes, solar energy helps the environment, but money talks with significant savings

ith monthly electricity bills approaching fourdigit amounts in summer, more and more desert homeowners are embracing all that sunshine and finding economic relief—with solar energy. "Solar is the new Hummer in the driveway, the new buzzword, the hottest thing that's environmentally friendly," says PlanetSolar regional sales consultant Jill Weiss. "More importantly, people are saving money, so it makes sense." Studies show that installing just one solar-panel system is the environmental equivalent of taking two cars off the road. Are solar customers out to save the planet? For most, that's an added bonus. They're primarily out to save money.


Solar energy launched in the 1980s and because it is a relatively new industry, information may be sketchy or misunderstood by consumers. Solar-panel opponents argue that these systems are hard to maintain, not worth the investment and ugly. But those who use solar-energy systems counter that cleaning is easy, they pay for themselves in a few years and add value to a home. Their most compelling argument is as basic as it gets: Get over it—I'm saving a ton of money.

Solar fans make a valid point. In fact, a 2008 study compared the

investment return of solar installation, S&P 500, a 30-year U.S. Treasury bond and a five-year CD. The ROI breakdown: Solar installation: 10-15%; S&P 500: 9.59%; 30-year bond: 3.62%; five-year CD: 2.82%. Impressive.

Terry Beardsley, director of golf at Eldorado Country Club in Indian Wells, Calif., says club members who made the switch to solar urged him to do likewise. "I did the math. If you live in the Sun Belt, it's a no-brainer." Beardsley says the annual electricity bills for his home at Indian Wells Country Club were running \$5,500 a year, and with summertime temperatures hitting 110 degrees, his costs were \$850 a month running his air-conditioning at a constant 80 degrees. Since installing his system nearly two years ago, he says, "My highest bill has been 98 cents. I saved \$4,000 a year out-ofpocket. With California rebates (state rebates vary), it took off \$23,000 to install solar panels and six years pays for it. I keep my house at 76 degrees, the benefit adds \$50,000 value to my house and there's a 20-year warranty." He says he hoses off the panels twice a month, then twice a year has them professionally cleaned.

Beardsley's HOA was worried about aesthetics, but he went with a more expensive set of solar panels that use less space and had them placed on the southern, back portion of his roof. "My



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homeowners association was fighting it and initially wouldn't give permission. I was trying to be nice guy and wanted their blessing, but it's a federal law and nobody can stop you. They approved it and I haven't heard from them since."

New homes at Tradition Golf Club are all built with solar panels, and Coachella Valley golf communities including Bighorn, Mission Hills, The Vintage, Indian Wells Country Club, Morningside, Indian Ridge, The Reserve and Citrus are also on board with solar projects. Kirk Weiss, PlanetSolar's regional sales manager, says the company is the exclusive solar-trade partner for new homes at Toscana Country Club, and the success rate has been pronounced with 100-percent buy-in since the program began in June. "Five years ago HOAs thought solar panels were ugly, but now they can be blended into the architecture."

Jill adds, "Savings are there whether residents are full time or seasonal. Those who are not here for the summer still save 80 percent of their annual bill since all solar energy produced is banked with the utility company." To new customers who are eager to learn specifics of solar usage, Jill notes, "Basically, you have an electric plant on your roof. You need to get a rider on your household insurance, but panels are rarely broken, made to withstand 140mile-per-hour winds and four-inch hailstones." What about wayward golf balls flying at course-side homes? "In every case except one we have never had golf balls damage a system," Weiss says. "The problem was the pro tee box which was quite far back but elevated, and golfers liked going over the houses. Balls landed on this house more often than not. Only one panel was damaged—and there were 20 balls on the roof."


You may not play like "The King," but you can certainly dine like him. **Arnold Palmer's** in La Quinta (78-164 Avenue 52) serves variety to guests with the same inimitable flair with which Palmer brought golf to the masses. Happy hour from 4.00-6.00 p.m. in Arnie's Pub is a perfect way to finish off your round or start your evening. The half-priced bar menu includes Prosciutto di Palmer California Antipasto Rolls, a tasty snack to pair with the pub's excellent wine list. For dinner, ample seafood, vegetarian and steak dishes can complement the day's scorecard whatever number you posted.

At **Morgan's in the desert** at the La Quinta Resort & Club (49-999 Eisenhower Drive), James Beard awardwinning Executive Chef Jimmy Schmidt prepares some of the most aptly lauded cuisine in Southern California. In talking about his locally sourced menu, Schmidt says, "December is really the start of the growing season for the Coachella Valley; everything that was planted in the fall is starting to come in."

A wide variety of regional crops highlight the high-season menu. Entrees are complemented by pomegranates, sweet corn, artichokes, figs, mangos and snow apples, and there are tempting starters such as Trotten Inlet oysters sourced from the Puget Sound area of Washington. When asked to describe one of his favorite dishes, Schmidt doesn't hold back. "We have a great rack of lamb crusted in pistachios that come out of a valley just north of Coachella, and we do it in a pomegranate reduction using unusual varietals of pomegranate that are really fullseeded. We serve it with black beluga lentils grown by one of our local farmers during the hot summer months." The dish pairs perfectly with a Syrah.










In Rancho Mirage, diners can celebrate the glory of Gotham with a visit to **The Slice Pizzeria** (72775 Dinah Shore Drive, #107), where New York flavors and milieu are among the ingredients for some of the best pizzas in the region. Additional menu selections include a build-your-ownpasta option and other Italian favorites.



Seasonal specials and promotions make the tab as casual as these welcoming environs. "The Slice is a fun, familyoriented, full Italian restaurant," says owner Jack Srebnik. "And the name deceives you that's it's only pizza. We have a full variety of salad, pizzas, pastas and all homemade deserts. And it's all New York-style food." Detailing a few Slice favorites, Srebnik says: "Our Linguine and Clams is one of the best-selling dishes and the Lasagna is like grandma's, full-bodied lasagna. "Our downtown Palm Springs' Maracas has a huge outdoor patio and it's a place to be seen," he adds. "And our Rancho Mirage restaurant has live entertainment and a huge bar that's just like *Cheers*."

Be sure to return to the singular setting that is **The Cliffhouse** (78250 Highway 111), where a remodel by new owners has turned a Valley favorite into an updated classic. "I think it has a sort of a pop, sort of an edgy, contemporary feel that anyone can feel," Maltzman says. "My art (has) kind of an inspiration and a twist from everybody put together in one."

Maltzman has been painting and creating both on and off the golf course since his youth. His golf talents led him to compete at the collegiate level at both San Diego State and Chapman University, and he graduated from Chapman in 1986 with degrees in art and psychology. His art has more recently led him to Beverly Hills, where he owns, operates and supplies the Daniel Maltzman Gallery.

Maltzman says that he has always loved to draw, but it was his experience in the clothing industry that actually led him into the world of art. While in his mid-20s, he was creating clothing for private labels such as Ann Taylor. That job not only allowed him to attain a level of financial freedom, it also allowed him to tap into his creative, artistic side. Now he employs those same elements while working with his newest chosen craft.

Because his gallery came with blank walls, Maltzman now spends a majority of his time creating the feature works that he exhibits there, and he also handles the business ends of the enterprise. However, his second love - golf - is never far from his mind. Still sporting a nine handicap and with two hole-in-ones to


his credit, Maltzman can often be seen at his old stomping grounds, Hillcrest Country Club in Los Angeles, partaking in his "other" passion.

The artist's works include his Women's Series and his Shadow Figures Series. His abstract art is also very popular with his regular clientele, a group that ranges from venture capitalists and casino-hotel owners to rock-and-rollers. Many of those clients have been cultivated through golf relationships, which began before his love of, and talent for, the world of art developed to its current state.



Maltzman learned to play golf accompanying his father, Donald, on rounds at Hillcrest. He eventually grew to love the game while also developing a desire to master certain elements of flair—something he says the game of golf and the act of creating artwork share. The

two pursuits are more similar, he maintains, than they first appear.

With the opening of his Beverly Hills gallery, Maltzman's art world has grown so much that it dominates much of the time he once devoted to golf. He is in the process of rolling out his "The World of Maltzy," project, which will be based on photographs manipulated into the style that reflects Maltzman's creative philosophy. He says the series will have elements of reality. It will have its roots in a photograph but will be transformed by surreal overlays and retouches by Maltzman. The result could be described as psychedelic billboards.

But as those who play know, golf is on your mind even when you're not playing. And the game is such a prevalent part of Maltzman's life that it was inevitable that it would eventually creep into his artwork. It did so with the Art of Golf series created in 2011.

It was also incorporated into the appropriately titled painting "Golf Girl," which was right in line with his penchant for painting provocative women in alluring poses. Maltzman says he will be creating more golf-related work in the near future, including a painting currently in progress.

"Golf has the same characteristics that art has, as painting," says Maltzman. "You cannot pinpoint the element of the desire that is created within the mind, the brain, the soul, and the passion...yet that element is there and it's deep with both [disciplines.}."

MP4-12-C Spider

McLaren's Formula 1-turned-everyday-car is for a daring few

f McLaren is a household name, you either have a rarified zip code or subscriptions to every car magazine on the planet. The McLaren MP4-12C Spider is audaciously priced and raucously designed.

Imagine owning a Formula 1 car and driving it to work every day. The MP4-12C Spider, not to be confused with the MP4, is all sport. You may know McLaren from the company's F1 days wowing onlookers with the racing aspects of a super car. When the MP4-12C hit the market in 2011, it was clear McLaren was actually upping its game—if that was even possible.

The 12C rides on an all-carbon composite chassis. The weight is more like

like a Ferrari. You can drive the McLaren all day without regrets or the need for a hot tub afterward.

The seating system gives drivers the feeling of hovering just above the asphalt, and the sensation at 200 mph is exactly why owners pay \$268,000 for the vehicle. This brand of heart-racing adrenaline is only found in cars like this—and some would say only in *this* car. Finding something to complain about in the Spider is tough. Sunburn perhaps?

If speed is what you're looking for, the Spider won't disappoint. With a 0-60 time right at three seconds, McLaren hasn't left anything on the design-room table. It's all in the engine. The rumble of the turbos is power orated and the only sales pitch a dealer needs to make. Put the top down while you roll through town (you can operate it at speeds up to 19 mph) and let the car rip on the open roads. A top speed of 204 mph will have you looking for any sucker with a muscle car to take you on at the stoplight.

Technologically, the 12C is advanced to the point of space age. The rear wheels are driven by a seven-speed SSG dual-clutch transmission, operated with rockermounted shift paddles. A clear view of the 12C Spider's lightweight M838T power plant is available through a glass panel positioned behind the tonneau cover. A complex brake-steer technology tells the





a Mini Cooper than a V-8 turbo-charged sports car. Weighing in at just over 3,000 pounds, the recipe for wow is all there. Early criticism of the 12C was that it just wasn't awe-inspiring enough compared to Italian competitor Ferrari. With the addition of the topless Spider, the game has changed. The folding hardtop added less weight than a supermodel but decidedly raised the stakes in the sexy department. Steel reinforcement was added to the rollover protectors, and off the line rolled a fully convertible MP4-12C. Truth is, very little needed changing.

The specs for 2013 are jaw dropping. An additional 25 horsepower was added to an already beefy engine to top out at 618 horsepower. The 3.8-liter twin turbo isn't designed to break your neck or have you on a first-name basis with your chiropractor, either. In fact, many critics praise the 12C for the ways in which it *isn't*




car which wheels to slow through the corners, virtually eliminating under steering and injecting confidence. The Spider's visibility is a key confidence booster as well. With the top down, there is no doubt about the line the car is on and what is happening at nearly every angle.

Designers give drivers several choices for comfort or spot options in the chassis.

The "track" option will rev higher and allow for manual shifting. "Normal" is great for around town. A new feature for 2013 is the adjustable suspension; add 1.6 inches of lift in the front and an inch more in the back to get over speed bumps and up steep driveways. The lift feature can be operated while moving at speeds of up to 37 mph. The active spoiler system is a nice touch so

that the 12-C isn't outdone by the likes of Porsche's 911. McLaren also boasts myriad personalization options on the interior and exterior features. Hot colors and a simple interior design are certain to live up to the McLaren expectation in this competitive price sector.

McLaren's technology and design elements are not just sporty, they're beautiful. To look at the MP4-12C Spider is to gaze at art on wheels; however, driving the Spider is life changing, euphoric and potentially hazardous to your bank account. Pre-orders are being taken at global dealers in 22 countries.

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
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Your choice in rings has a lot to say about you
