The Evolution of a Twintentier Tournament for Children Open

Justin Timberlake and the Shriners are moving to center stage



he 2012 Justin Timberlake Shriners Hospitals for Children Open can be characterized in many ways. But one thing is clear: it will be the last of its kind. You could call it transitional. You could call it a new beginning. You could call it the end of an era. You could call it the year the tournament has come of age. For this will be the last year the tournament will be a part of the PGA Tour's Fall Series, the handful of events that have traditionally taken place after the FedEx Cup playoffs conclude.

Next year, the tournament will be a full-fledged member of the FedEx Cup series, with a bigger purse and a bigger stage, all renewed its sponsorship of the event for the next seven years, and the purse will increase with the tournament's new status, going from \$4.5 million to \$6 million.

As a Fall Series event, and a season-ending event before that, the tournament has always had a bit of an oh-by-the-way feel, particularly for the game's biggest stars—save for a patch of years over a decade ago when the tournament offered what was then one of the Tour's biggest purses (\$5 million).

As much as the players might love Las Vegas, leaving it off their schedule was not difficult if they'd just finished competing in the playoffs and PGA Championship and had no need for more official



appropriately set in a city who's expansive growth and marquee name recognition will now be reflected in the importance and quality of its golf tournament.

You could also call it a celebration. That's what the tournament's director, Adam Sperling, is calling it. "It's an exciting time," Sperling says, now in his fourth year as director. "It's a celebration of our history, our missions and our future."

This year's tournament will have the same title sponsor, the Shriners Hospitals for Children. It will be played at the same course, the TPC Summerlin in Las Vegas, Nev. It will also be played during its customary fall timeframe, this year Oct. 4–7.

However, while it's anticipated that the tournament dates will be similar in the future, there are many more changes anticipated as the Tour goes from a yearly schedule to one that overlaps years, starting with the 2013-2014 season. When that "season" begins in late 2013, the JT Shiners becomes one of the early-season events in the FedEx Cup Series.

As such, competing players will earn full points within the playoff system in their efforts to reach the 2014 FedEx Cup playoffs and PGA Tour Championship. Shriners Hospitals has just

money. The Las Vegas event, along with the other Fall Series tournaments, were critical to players attempting to make it into the Tour's top 125. Otherwise, its appeal outside the Las Vegas area and the affected players rested with the hardcore Tour fan.

That is until 2008, when the tournament began its association with a golf-crazy former boy-band member named Justin Timberlake, and subsequently the Shriners Hospitals. These associations gave the tournament a clear identity, and the well-established young entertainer as host injected a youthful cool into the tournament that had gone missing in prior years. Suddenly, the hardcore Tour fan found his previously low-key Las Vegas tournament now attracted the attention of Entertainment Tonight and *People* magazine, along with The Golf Channel.

Timberlake's involvement has certainly drawn more eyeballs and young fans to the event. But, as a Fall Series event, it seemed the tournament still hadn't maxed out on its potential. The tournament's status didn't match the city's status; however, the tournament's move to the FedEx Cup regular season seems destined to rectify that discrepancy.

Which brings us back to this year's event, its last as a member of the "old" Fall Series. While all involved look forward to the tournament's new position on the Tour schedule and hierarchy, there is the irresistible temptation to look at this year's tournament as the unique event it really is.

While past competitions have been fierce and occasionally historic (who can forget Jonathan Byrd's hole-in-one to win the 2010 playoff?), they have mattered most to players trying to maintain or enhance their Tour status for the following year. Other players had various motivations for participation—and not all of them could claim they were centrally focused on the competition.

The celebrity relief, bright lights, gaming and shopping opportunities also tended to give the event the cozy, relaxed feel of the old-time celebrity tournaments, which wasn't necessarily a bad thing. But given the choice between being a Fall Series event and



one of the season's first bona fide FedEx Series events, it's likely that not a single event organizer would turn down the opportunity—especially if the event is still to be held in Las Vegas.

"Vegas is always a great time for the players," says Sperling. "We've got top corporate sponsors, great volunteers and, of course, it's a city like no other. It's not just about the golf course and the points. Players know when they come here, they're going to have a great time."






o you ever judge a book by its cover? Sometimes that's not a bad thing. For example, if you were to judge Toscana Country Club by its cover, you would not be disappointed by the contents. Even the entry and driveway exude all that is luxurious. Situated in the heart of Indian Wells in Southern California, Toscana is in the center of a desert. Yet the lush landscaping could easily make you

believe you were thousands of miles away in the heart of Tuscany.

This theme continues at the clubhouse where visitors are greeted by a tall splashing fountain and a building designed in the grand tradition of Italian architecture. The Club Villa complex spans 90,000 square feet. In addition to the clubhouse, it features dining facilities, a golf shop, an inviting spa and a sports club that includes a fitness center and tennis courts.

The entire complex exudes style and charm; yet it also has an informal, intimate feel that makes everyone feel perfectly 'at home.' That includes former British Open champion and CBS golf commentator Ian Baker-Finch, a member who plays much of his golf at Toscana between working on televised



The project was developed by William Bone, CEO and founder of The Sunrise Company. 


Nicklaus Design is the most prolific golf design company in the world, with over 370 courses in 36 countries to its credit. Jack Nicklaus has masterminded his company for the past 40 years, and is arguably not only the most successful golfer the world has ever seen, but also one of the greatest strategists in the game. As a champion who won 18 Majors, his course management was impeccable. This expertise has carried through to his golf course design. I believe Jack feels there is more to golf than simply hitting the ball, and that golfers should also enjoy the challenges that add an element of interest and fun to the game.

Toscana's courses are elegant and manicured, but true to Nicklaus philosophy, they are in essence thought provoking and challenging. And they each offer differing design and landscape elements. The South Course features a lush environment while The North Course reflects a more natural desert landscape. Both, however, offer playability for golfers of every level, and both require that players not only execute but also *think*.

There are a number of risk-and-reward holes. There is also evidence of traditional cross-bunkers. These in particular add to the challenge of the second shot, depending on what the player did with the tee shot and what the wind conditions are. Is it worth the risk of trying to carry these bunkers that are often placed 50 to 60 yards short of the green? Or is a lay-up a better choice? Playing over cross-bunkers also adds a further dimension; behind them lies "dead ground," which creates an optical illusion and makes the green appear closer than it really is.

One feature that will surely be noticed by players here is the speed slot. A speed slot is found on the tee shots and typically demands carrying trouble or having to play toward a hazard. Invariably the hazard is a bunker, or nest of bunkers, that must be



carried. On the far side of the bunkers is a downhill ramp that will propel the tee shot forward. On these particular holes, it is possible for an accurately executed drive to gain an additional 20 to 30 yards—and we all like that!

However, if that's not the case, Bill Harmon, outstanding golf instructor frequently seen on The Golf Channel, is on hand to help you with your game.

What might also help are new tees, added at Toscana under the supervision of Jack Nicklaus. They're part of the PGA's Tee It Forward program, which Toscana Country Club supports. This program has been endorsed by a number of top players, as well as luminaries in the golf club manufacturing industry, such as Barney Adams. The Tee It Forward program encourages golfers to play


from tees that match their skill level so they can better enjoy the game with fewer overall shots and shorter distances played on each hole. The benefit is that the new set of tees will encompass a greater range of skill levels.

Toscana has added a new tee on each hole on The South Course, giving members and their guests the option to play the Par-72 course at 4,550 yards. Four sets of combo tees, rated and sloped by the SCGA and the WSCGA, will also be available giving additional options.

Golf in the desert, which attracts a large number of retired or semi-retired golfers, will no doubt gain from this program. Toscana General Manager Paul Levy and Director of Golf Dave Craig are very optimistic that this will not only keep more elderly golfers in the game, it will encourage golfers of all levels to enjoy the game more.

At Toscana Country Club, that isn't hard.




Designer Perspective Jack Nicklaus talks about the courses

"With the first golf course at Toscana, we thought we would be fairly bold with our design approach. Basically, that was accomplished with the use of bold bunkering. It's a concept where you flash sand up the sides or faces of the bunkers. You can do that in the desert where you don't have the thunderstorms encountered in, say, Florida, which can tear it down.

With the first course, the initial piece of property was relatively flat and did not have a lot of unique, existing characteristics, so we had to create the course's personality with the placement of trees and the bunker style. With the second course (which has nine holes completed), we tried to make it more native and wanted to include more natural materials, particularly rock. When Bill Bone decided he wanted to do a little bit of rock work, he eventually incorporated over \$2 million worth onto the nine holes, some of which needed to be artificial. He did that to enhance the course. It's not what we did—it's what Bill Bone did.

This is a great example of when you have a commitment from the owner to create something very special, which you don't get very often. Bill Bone understands golf; he understands what his clientele wants and what his golfers want. Without Bill Bone there, I would venture to say Toscana might probably be just another nice golf course."







One year later, Golf Digest added Cochise to its list of America's 100 Greatest Courses. Since then, the course has steadily been acknowledged as one of Arizona's finest.

So there is little surprise that the course will host yet another Champions Tour event this fall, the Charles Schwab Cup Championship, the tour's season-ending tournament. Nov. 1-4, the top 30 leading money winners of 2012, including the likes of Fred Couples and Bernhard Langer, will compete for the \$440,000 first-place prize.

"As the longtime host of The Tradition, Desert Mountain was a natural choice to host the Schwab Championship," says Ian Knight, executive director, Charles Schwab Cup Championship.

With a \$2.5 million purse, this is the only Champions event, aside from the Tour's five major championships, to feature four rounds of action. It is also one of the most popular tournaments of the Champions Tour's entire schedule.

Similar to the PGA Tour's FedEx Cup, the Schwab Cup is a season-long competition that is strictly points-based. To determine the most consistent golfer of the season, points are awarded to players when they secure top-ten finishes. All point totals are doubled during major championships and the Charles Schwab Cup Championship itself. In addition to the pressure of winning the Championship, all 30 contestants are also focused on securing the Cup and its \$1 million grand prize.

But the task is not easy. Cochise, a 6,929-yard, par-70 layout, is expected to have contoured greens with a Stimpmeter at 13-plus feet. Precise shot making will be essential, as a majority of the greens provide small landing areas with very little forgiveness for errant shots. Many of the course's fairways are surrounded by water or rock ledges, forcing players to focus on precision rather than distance.

The course's signature hole, the 215-yard par-3 No. 7, will



certainly test players' nerves. The hole's double island green, which it shares with No. 15, is not only surrounded by water and bunkers, but also features more slopes than perhaps any other green on the entire course. Par will likely be a very welcomed score, especially during final-round action.

As television viewers witness the course's formidable par-5 holes, including the island green 15th, and daunting par-4s, like the 3rd (Cochise's No. 3 handicap hole), they will also notice the layout's natural beauty, from its perfectly manicured greens to its mountainside views.

Nicklaus himself calls Cochise one of the most picturesque golf courses in the world and "one of the highlights of my career as a course designer."

In addition to its exquisite views of the Continental Mountains, Desert Mountain offers members a youth activity center; sixmile private trail system; and a fitness center and tennis complex, complete with hard, clay and grass courts. Restaurants, spas and pro shops are also plentiful, as each course features its own clubhouse with a specific architectural theme, ranging from Western to Frank Lloyd Wright-inspired designs.

A \$1.6 million state-of-the art Golf Performance Center was recently finalized, featuring putting greens, ranges, bunkers, pitching and chipping areas, and



instruction from PGA-trained professionals. Members also have access to four-camera video-motion analysis and three-dimensional motion capture, among other technological applications.

Resale properties, including cottages, custom homes, estates, townhouses, and villas are currently available for purchase and are centrally located near each of the six courses. In fact, an onsite, full-service real estate company, Desert Mountain Real Estate, presently serves the community.

"This fall marks our 25th anniversary and we successfully transitioned into a

member-owned club less than two years ago," notes Bob Jones, Desert Mountain's COO and general manager. "We introduced the Golf Performance Center earlier this year, and we're moving forward with an expansion of our fitness center. It's a great time in our history."



ith 85 films on his resume, lead roles in numerous television shows and an established stage career, actor Christopher McDonald is well known in the entertainment world. Golfers, however, know him as Shooter—Shooter McGavin, that is.

The movie, of course, is Happy Gilmore. "I turned [it] down twice because I was really tired from doing back-to-back movies," McDonald recalls. "The [script] did look pretty funny, and they kept asking me to do it so I decided to go meet Adam Sandler. Within 15 minutes of our meeting, I knew I had to do this movie."

Playing Shooter wasn't difficult for McDonald as he was already a regular on the golf course. And thanks to Happy Gilmore, his game only got better. "My game got sick," the actor says. "I was playing golf five hours a day, six days a week. It was nutty. I had a lot of fun doing that part as a villain who was in on the joke."

McDonald picked up a golf club about 25 years ago thanks to his manager, Scott Manners. Like so many others, he found the game frustrating at first. "I always wanted to kill," he admits. But it only took a few tweaks here and there and McDonald was on his way. At his best, he boasted an 11 handicap; today, he considers himself "a bogey golfer."

Married in 1992, McDonald and his wife, Lupe, currently have busy schedules raising three daughters and one son. The actor has also enjoyed a nonstop career and is accomplished in multiple mediums of the entertainment world. The downside of all that success is that he now finds it difficult to get out on the course. "My home course is in Lake Arrowhead, and we just moved," he says. "If I get on the course three times a month that's good."

Regardless of how often he plays or how steady his game is at any given time, one thing remains true: McDonald is always up for a



charity tournament. He has been at such events as the Child Help tournament hosted by John O'Hurley and Cheryl Ladd, the LPGA's Kraft Nabisco Championship and the Frank Sinatra Celebrity Invitational. He has also been asked several times to play in the Bob Hope/Humana Challenge. So far he has always been





working at that time, but he hopes he can play in it eventually.

One of McDonald's most embarrassing moments on the course was during the making of *Happy Gilmore*. "There was a scene where I'm supposed to miss the putt but look like I'm trying to make it," he says. "No matter what I did, I kept making it, so I told myself to focus on making it and I would miss it. Twenty putts later, I finally missed it."

His most exciting moment wasn't on the silver screen but in a charity tournament. "It was stepping up to the first tee in front of about 300 people at the Frank Sinatra," the actor says. "I wasn't even warmed up. They announce my name and my role in *Happy Gilmore*. [Spectators] are lined up and down the fairway. The cameras are rolling and I hit the most spectacular drive right down the middle, straight as an arrow! It felt fantastic, everyone was cheering, it was like, 'oh man!'"

When asked who would make up his ultimate foursome, McDonald gives this question serious thought. "Wow," he exclaims. "Bob Hope, Bobby Jones, Frank Sinatra and one of the three Stooges, the one who plays good golf." That might be considered a fivesome, but it's likely no one would bother McDonald about it.






"Now that I've moved closer to the desert, I can't wait to play there more often. I love playing in the desert." For McDonald, golf isn't just swings and scores. With three new movies coming out this year, a wonderful family life, and more time to get out on the course, it seems that McDonald's life is right where he wants it. When asked to describe his life in one sentence he's quick to reply. "Chris McDonald has life by the tail!"



Another Bubble or Road to Recovery?

Only time will tell, but this is definitely a good time to sell





ith housing inventory at a low, would-be buyers are scrambling to bid on homes even before they're listed, and real estate agents are vying to represent the few sellers that do exist," stated a Los Angeles Times article on June 10. Real estate agents in California, Arizona and Nevada echo that assessment and wonder what happened to the inventory.

The short answer is that many of the predictions were based on the number of homeowners in default, on the assumption that many of those homes would go into foreclosure. Default simply means that an owner has stopped paying the mortgage for three months. And once a homeowner is in default, he or she can attain a price modification or a short sale. In the last year, banks have been able to process these short sale and price modification files in a much shorter time, thus providing homeowners with an approved short sale or price modification of their loan. The result is that much of the projected inventory never made it to foreclosure and thus reduced the potential shadow inventory significantly. Housing inventory has sunk to levels not seen since the bubble years. In fact, the number of U.S. homes for sale hit just 2.5 million in April—the lowest number for an April since 2006 according to the National Association of Realtors.

So, what does that mean for the future of real estate? The sharp drop in inventory, along with rock-bottom interest rates, has helped stabilize even some of the hardest-hit markets, including Las Vegas and Phoenix. If you are thinking of selling, now is a great time. And if you're thinking of buying, there are some wonderful communities and properties to choose from.

appointments or the budget-conscious family looking for good food in a clean, quick and fun environment.



educing your carbon footprint is all the rage these days. But being environmentally conscious doesn't have to mean leaving your automotive scruples at the door. The Tesla Model S and the Chevy Volt, while two very different automobiles, give you the opportunity to explore an electrifying driving experience.

Tesla came on the scene in 2003 with an all-electric roadster that quickly become the envy of anyone who desired speed and had a penchant for the unique. Tesla showed the auto world that electric didn't have to mean boring or slow.

The display of ingenuity created a demand for something a little more practical, and out of that demand was born the Model S. On the practical side, the Model S seats four and has a battery life that delivers quality range—300 miles on one charge says Tesla of the loaded version of the S.

But it's not just about practicality. The interior's woodlooking panels are made from banana leaves harvested from the forest floor after they've fallen from the tree, while the leather is plush to say the least. And technology is integrated exquisitely, exactly what you'd expect from a group of Silicon Valley designers. The touch-screen control panel is the nerve center of the vehicle, giving access to everything but the Starship Enterprise.

The interior isn't roomy but it isn't cramped, either. The floor is flat—some say giving the S the appearance of a minivan—and it's slightly raised in order to provide room for the massive battery carrier underneath. Taller passengers will make friends with the headliner, but it's not unusually low.

On the outside, you'd swear you are looking at a Jaguar XF. On the inside, you'd think Apple has gotten into the car business. A blend of sleek and funky makes the Model S not only interesting but fun, and knowing that you aren't burning an ounce of fuel when you make your morning commute is almost religious. In all of this, don't miss the fact that Tesla loves power. Its brand of electric car has guts.

The Model S has 362 horsepower and 306 lb-ft of torque. That translates to G forces in the turn and slamming you back in your seat on the takeoff. In just 5.6 seconds, the Model S is doing 60 miles per hour. The fun comes from the fact that the electric motor stays in the power band all the time. There is no letdown in torque like you experience from a gas transmission.

The Model S has a very low center of gravity as well. This gives you a decidedly



sporty sense of handling. The weight of the battery sits beneath the vehicle frame instead of in the hood of the car like most gas engines. Taking turns is exhilarating and you notice that there is nearly no body roll as you might expect in a larger car.

Tesla expects to produce only 5,000 of the S. You can choose from four trim packages that provide varying battery range and interior features, and the price ranges from \$49,900 to \$97,900.

On the less exotic side of the electric super highway, the Chevy Volt comes with a gas and electric motor. While the interior

and horsepower are pedestrian, the fun is exceptional. In spite of a motor with just 149 horsepower, the torque of the electric gives it the kick of a Rockette.

The range on the Volt's electric motor is around 40 miles, depending on how you drive it. When the battery is depleted, the gas motor comes to life and takes over, which ensures you're never stranded without a long enough extension cord to reach a plug through your office window. Honestly, most of you don't drive 40 miles in a day anyway, so you can go almost anywhere you need to on the Volt's nightly charge.



You may have a state tax credit for buying a low-emissions vehicle, making the price of the car easier to swallow. California gives up to \$7,500 in credits depending on the make and model.

The interior of the Volt is what you'd expect from Chevy. Everything works without being obtrusive or clunky. With just a slight learning curve, you'll be navigating all the onboard features like Captain Kirk. The ride of the Volt is surprisingly sporty. Jaunts around the city feel like you're in a much smaller car due to the tight handling and acceleration.

Any negative reviews about the Volt seem unwarranted in this writer's opinion. The Volt has all the range of a gas-powered vehicle while still giving you the benefits of a robust electric motor. With some forethought, most drivers will charge their Volt often enough to get the range they need for the daily drive—and in doing so, embrace the electric revolution!
