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

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
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
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Publisher's Notes

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
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





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s a successful musician and singer, Mickey Thomas could live just **A** about anywhere he wants. But he fooled around and fell in love

with the Coachella Valley.

Now 68 years old, Thomas has been on your radio since 1976 when he sang "Fooled Around and Fell in Love" for the San Francisco-based Elvin Bishop Band. That stint was just one in a musical career that began in 1965, when he and two of his boyhood friends from his hometown of Cairo, Georgia, made a road trip to Atlanta to watch The Beatles perform.

"I was 15 years old and got to see The Beatles live," Thomas says. "And it pretty much changed my life, really. We were so overcome by the experience of seeing the Beatles, and experiencing Beatlemainia firsthand, we said, 'you know, we've gotta try this."

The next week they started their first band. "We really didn't know what the hell we were doing. One of my buddies was a drummer in the high school marching band, so naturally we figured he was going to play the drums so we at least had one real musician. And one of my other best buddies was left-handed. Paul McCartney was left-handed, so we figured, hev, he'll play the bass. That's kind of how we sussed it out."

To quote another famous band of the Bay Area, it's been a long, strange trip for Thomas since that night in 1965 and that first band back in Cairo. These days, he leads what now must be considered his "old" band, Starship, from his desert home

While some things in life, like his move to the desert, have been under his control others have seemed strangely pre-planned, including a musical career that has taken him from Georgia to San Francisco to Lake Tahoe and eventually to Palm Desert, largely based on two "bolt out of the blue" telephone calls.

When it came time for college, Thomas left Cairo to attend Valdosta State University in Georgia, where he helped form a college band with a number of likeminded musicians. He admits it was all mostly for fun and "to get girls to notice

Eventually, he began to think it was time to leave behind the fun and games of fiddling around in a band and to settle down and get serious about his college education in order to properly prepare for a real job in the real world.

But his world changed one day in 1971. "I got a call, it was a bolt out of the blue, really, from this guy named Gideon Daniels, who was a gospel singer originally from Philadelphia and based in San Francisco," Thomas says. "His musical concept at that point in time was basically pure gospel music, but with contemporary lyrics. And his band was kind of multiracial, multicultural and he really wanted it that way. He had a Japanese guy, an Italian guy, an African American guy, a Filipino .He got it in his head that he needed a white male southern tenor to complete this puzzle. So he came down

"He met some people at a restaurant that knew about me, and they struck up a conversation. He told them what he was looking for, and they said, 'Hey we know this one guy, Mickey Thomas, he sings pretty high! He may be available.' So they gave him my number, he called me up, we had a little meeting and a week later I was in California."

south looking for a singer.

Under Daniels' tutelage. Thomas learned to really sing for the first time, rather than simply being an imitator of whatever song he was duplicating. "Gideon really taught me how to discover my voice and to use it in a more original way," he says.

Daniels had cultivated many friends and connections in the music business, and after about a year, he introduced Thomas to Elvin Bishop, a guitarist who'd risen to fame as a member of the Paul Butterfield Blues Band and had gone on to form his own group. Thomas started doing studio work for the Elvin Bishop Band in 1973 and became an official member of the group in 1975. The next year, the band's signature tune hit the airwaves, peaking at No. 3 on the Billboard Hot 100 chart.



Just a few years later, Thomas was set to embark on a solo career complete with a new album, and that's when the second bolt struck.

The remnants of Jefferson Airplane, the San Francisco-based band that blew kids' minds and scared parents nationwide in the late 1960s, had largely stuck together through the mid-to-late '70s in the form of Jefferson Starship. The band had renamed itself after replacing Airplane bassist, Jack Casady, and guitarist, Jorma Kaukonen, who left to form Hot Tuna.

Then in the late '70s, Marty Balin, another of the original six Airplane members, also left the band. After much consideration and discussion between original members Grace Slick and Paul Kantner and the remaining members of Jefferson Starship, they decided to push on and recruit a new singer.

"They were based in San Francisco and I was in San Francisco at the time," Thomas says. "The story is that one of the roadies somehow had my number and brought it into the band. And again, for me, it was another one of those phone calls right out of the blue.

I didn't know any body with the Jefferson Starship and you couldn't really say I was a huge fan of the music or anything. So all of a sudden, here I get a call from the Jefferson Starship asking if I'd be interested. I said, 'Yeah, it's kinda weird, but what have I got to

Thomas went to meet the band and hear the new music they were working on. "I heard what direction they were trying to take the band," he says. "The next thing you know, we're sort of jamming on 'Jane,' and I thought, man, this sounds pretty cool, let's give it a shot. So we came in and recorded "Jane." It was the first song we ever did and the first single we ever put out. And it became kind of the calling card for the 'new' Jefferson Starship."

Thomas says part of the reason he loves living in the desert fulltime is that, more often than not, he's out on the road with Starship during the heat of the summer. While the band's lineage has over 50 years of history, he likes to point out that this version of Starship—which includes himself, singer Stephanie Calvert, guitarist John Roth, bassist Jeff Adams, drummer Darrell Verdusco, and keyboardist Phil Bennett—has been together longer than any other Airplane/Starship lineup.

Thomas and Rachel moved to the desert after 12 years in Lake Tahoe, where they grew weary of shoveling snow and driving on icy roads. After Rachel paid a visit to a friend in the Coachella Valley, she told Mickey he should come down to have a look. He only needed one.

"The next week, I came back down with her and just fell in love with it," he says. "I love it here. I even like the summers. I don't mind the heat. I grew up in South Georgia so at least it's not humid here."

They've been living fulltime in the valley now for nearly 15 years. Thomas says there's a magical, mystical, sort of transcendental quality about the desert. "Especially when you get over to that side, north of 1-10, it gets even more mystical. And there's actually an entire music scene in what we call the High Desert, "he says. "It's very underground but there's some really interesting music going on up there. Someone described it to me as psychedelic harmonicas. I love that."


Another reason Thomas loves the desert is the occasional opportunity to play great golf near his home, at facilities such as Desert Willow, The Classic Club and the JW Marriott Desert

"You know, sometimes it's hard to find that five- or six-hour commitment that it takes to go out and play a round, but I do enjoy golf. It's a great game, it's a great game for sharing fellowship on the course. I've made great relationships and friendships on the course through my whole life. I'm involved in the Patrick Warburton Classic here every year," he adds, "which is just one of the greatest events in the world for a good cause and a good time."

The summer is shaping up to be a busy one for Thomas and Starship. Their current schedule has them on the road from March to June, including a show in Santiago, Chile. As a result, there may not be much time for golf in Thomas' future, particularly if he wants to fulfill the longtime goal of recording a Christmas album. If that happens, it would be just another interesting stop on Thomas' trip of a lifetime.

"It's been a rather charmed life," he says. "Sometimes I believe with some of the crazy things that have happened to me, there must be some sort of predestination here, some sort of manifest destiny or something. Because it's been kind of a weird trip, how I got here from Cairo, Georgia."

excruciating he even considered retiring. But his passion for the game and his desire to compete against the world's best was more resilient than his pain.

When he first chose to make a comeback, he questioned his decision. He struggled to find his form, as his once reliable twohanded backhand was no longer feared by his competition. His passion was still considerable, but his body simply wasn't dependable enough.

But the 29-year-old showed no signs of past injuries against Federer, whom he had also defeated during the finals of the 2009 U.S. Open. Not only did he win the match 6-4, 6-7 (8-10), 7-6 (7-2), he also ended the world No. 1's 17-match winning streak, resulting in Federer's first loss of the 2018 season.

"Juan Martin was a bit better at the end," Federer said. "It's a tough loss, but I still had a good week. I'm happy for him."

An Unbelievable Match

Prior to the loss, Federer, the defending champion, was seeking his sixth BNP Paribas Open title, an all-time record. On the other hand, del Potro was competing in his first BNP Paribas Open finals match since 2013, when he lost to Rafael Nadal. Federer was also 18-6 against del Potro at the time, but one of those losses included that 2009 finals defeat at the U.S. Open.

By the time the two-hour, 42-minute match ended, del Potro was standing with the trophy and reflecting on all the obstacles he had overcome to earn his first Masters 1000 title in his 51st attempt.

"It was worth everything I've been through to experience this moment," he said, speaking in front of the record crowd of 18,347 at Indian Wells Tennis Garden.

As the No. 8 seeded Argentine considered the impact of the match, he was nearly at a loss for words. "It was an unbelievable match. It's difficult to describe. It's like a dream."

Despite his 18-7 record against Federer, he has won four of the six finals matches that the duo has completed so far. And after so many years away from the limelight, it appears del Potro, who has now claimed 11 straight match victories, is ready to contend for majors once again. After all, he beat Federer in the quarterfinals of last year's U.S. Open as well.

"I'm excited to see what's next," he says. "I'm still surprising myself, and I want to keep surprising the tennis tour."




The Women

This year's BNP Paribas Open women's champion, 20-yearold Naomi Osaka, also shocked tennis fans. On the way to victory and the first tittle of her career, she not only defeated fellow 20-year-old Daria Kasatkina of Russia 6-3, 6-2 in the finals match, she also claimed match wins against Simona Halep and Karolina Pliskova.

In spite of her loss, Kasatkina's week was nearly as impressive. Ranked No. 19 in the world prior to the BNP Paribas Open, she defeated Caroline Wozniacki, Venus Williams, Angelique Kerber and Sloane Stephens during the two-week tournament. That performance raises her to No. 11 in the world.

On the other hand, Osaka, a native of Japan, will rise 22 spots in the world ranking—all the way to No. 22. The rise was well earned as she defeated Kasatkina in just 70 minutes. Renowned for her groundstrokes, which are typically high-powered, Osaka decided to not utilize them as often. Instead, she took a more relaxed approach to her finals match, a method that clearly worked.

"I wasn't trying to hit hard today because I felt like it would be better for [Daria] to take my pace. I was just going to sit back and see



Kasatkina, who has defeated every reigning Grand Slam champion over the past year, says Osaka outplayed her, adding that her loss was, to a degree, at least, due to exhaustion.

"I was pretty tired after the match against Venus on Friday," she says. "Physically, I could do better. But Naomi was much better today than me, so she really deserved to win."

In addition to playing a more reserved game, Osaka also appeared very calm during her finals match, another technique she believes was useful throughout her dominating performance.


"I was extremely nervous, but my plan was to fake that I was very calm," she says. "I couldn't afford to lose points based on nerves. Iknew [Daria] would fight for every point."

Tennis is in the air, literally, with tennis balls lobbing overhead and racquets in full swing.

Fresh off the 2018 BNP Paribas Open in Indian Wells, California, the desert is set to welcome the 4th annual Rosie Casals & Jackie Cooper Tennis Pro-Am on Sunday, April 22 at Indian Ridge Country Club in Palm Desert, California. Tennis icon Rosie Casals' company, Sportswoman, Inc., in conjunction with the Love & Love Tennis Foundation founded by Casals and former WTA Tour professional Tory Fretz, will once again produce this fundraiser benefiting junior tennis in the Coachella Valley and serving up an exciting day of tennis for all levels of pros and amateurs as well as for spectators.

The Pro-Am will feature local juniors and pros in all-doubles play competing in a roundrobin format. Teams will consist of one pro, one junior and two amateurs. Players are invited to organize a complete team or to enter as individuals to be placed on teams, after which there will be a team Shoot-Out on Stadium Court with prizes awarded to the winners.

Players will enjoy a catered barbecue lunch and silent auction before the Shoot-Out. The fee for players is \$250 per person, and lunch is available for non-players for \$25 per person. A raffle drawing will feature prizes such as unique sports memorabilia, dinner or lunch at top desert restaurants and

This year's recipient of the Jackie Cooper "You're the Best" award will be Lornie Kuhle, sidekick and friend of Bobby Riggs. Kuhle was recently cast in the movie Battle of the Sexes, as the emcee of the famous 1973 match between Billie Jean King and Bobbie Riggs, and he is also the promoter of the Easter Bowl and the Girls 16s and 18s USTA National Championships in San Diego.

The award's namesake, Jackie Cooper, was a much-adored tennis player and coach in the desert for many decades who passed away from cancer in 2013. Over the last three years, the Casals & Cooper Tournament has raised approximately \$100,000, which has provided significant funding to numerous junior tennis organizations in the Coachella Valley.

The Love & Love Tennis Foundation (LLTF), established in 2015, advances junior tennis participation in the Coachella Valley and provides financial aid to junior programs. LLTF has established itself as a leader on the charity scene, having worked closely with the National Junior Tennis League (NJTL), Boys & Girls Clubs of the Desert, Coachella Valley Housing Coalition (CVHC), Andy

Scorteanu Tennis Academy and others to expand youth tennis in the desert. LLTF is making a significant impact by helping kids, regardless of their ethnic or economic backgrounds.

LLTF has also launched the free Kids Love Tennis Clinics with Boys & Girls Clubs throughout the desert for young players 6-13 years old. Billie Jean King, Barbara and Gary Tolman, USTA/SCTA, NJTL and LLTF are the sponsors of the

"We're bringing tennis to all kids throughout the Coachella Valley," Casals says. Our goal is to eventually produce more players and tournaments-and ultimately champion players-from this area, to compete with juniors all over the world. Tennis has given us many wonderful years, and now Tory and I are giving back."

Casals' tennis career spans more than three decades, starting in the early 1960s. Together with Billie Jean King, Casals was one of the pioneers and a powerful moving force behind women's tennis in the 1970s, fighting for equal prize money and acceptance of females in the tennis world. Casals and King captured five Wimbledon doubles titles, which helped Casals earn 12 Grand Slam doubles titles and a No. 1 ranking in doubles for most of the mid-1960s and 1970s. Together, King, Casals and the "Original 9" challenged the old establishment and created the first professional women's tennis tour: the Virginia Slims Circuit.

n May 8, 2007, Annalee Thurston suffered a ruptured brain aneurysm. Three days later, she passed away at the age of 55. As a daughter, sister, aunt and friend to countless people in the tennis industry, she had so much more left to offer to the world.

A senior consultant to the Virginia Slims Tour as well as a sports executive, Indio Chamber of Commerce manager and specialevents coordinator for the city of Indio, Thurston even worked for Billie Jean King at one point in her career. Her impact on the world of tennis was immeasurable.

"She was a beautiful person who knew how to handle people, especially players and the media. No matter what crisis there was, she would find a way to handle it," says Tennis Hall of Famer Rosie Casals. "She was great at her profession—but an even better friend."

To celebrate her legacy and honor her memory, the Annalee Thurston Award Reception was established in 2011. For seven years, the reception raised money for the Annalee Thurston Scholarship Fund at the Warsaw Sports Marketing Center at the University of Oregon. But this year, with the scholarship fund now been fully endowed, the event benefited another tennis-oriented grant instead, via the Love & Love Tennis Foundation.

Introducing Tennis to All Kids

Founded in 2015 by Casals and WTA tour player Tory Fretz, the Love & Love Tennis Foundation offers grant donations to academies, individuals and organizations that support youth tennis in the Coachella Valley.

"The foundation is working hard to introduce tennis to all kids—no matter what their economic background is—through the Kids Love Tennis Clinics that are being conducted throughout the valley," Casals explains. "We want to help every junior tennis organization that needs help."

With these primary goals in mind, more than 150 people attended the reception, which was held at Indian Wells Tennis

Garden on March 11. More than \$75,000 was raised during live and silent auctions. The event also included an hour of mixed doubles with Chris Evert and Martina Navratilova, each of whom, along with Billie Jean King, Ilana Kloss and Barbara and Gary Tolman, sponsored and attended the reception.

Honoring Two Very Special People

United States Tennis Association (USTA) chairman, CEO and president Katrina Adams was presented with the annual Annalee Thurston Award, an honor that identifies individuals who have achieved peak success in the tennis industry. Not only is Adams the first African American and youngest person to ever serve as president of the USTA, an organization founded 135 years ago, she was also a highly successful tennis professional with 20 career doubles titles to her name.


"Katrina has risen to the occasion to lead rather than follow," Casals states. "I feel that as a former player she also understands more of how players think and strives to meet their needs—while also understanding the business part of her job. She mixes both


In addition, Tatiana Harvey, a Rancho Mirage High School senior and tennis star, was awarded a \$2,500 grant from the Love & Love Tennis Foundation. Harvey is undefeated in De Anza League play and also led her team to its first-ever California Interscholastic Federation championship two years ago. To top it all off, she will graduate this June with a 4.0 GPA.

"Tatiana is committed to being the best she can be on and off the court," Casals says. "She is a very special young lady who knows what she wants. And she is definitely going places."

fter a distinguished and memorable tennis career that spanned several decades, Tommy Haas hung up his **L**racquet and retired. The announcement was made on March 15 at the Indian Wells Tennis Garden, at the conclusion of Roger Federer's win over Chung Hyeon in the quarterfinals of the 2018 BNP Paribas Open.

"I consider myself extremely fortunate that I was able play professional tennis for a living for more than two decades," Haas said at the event. "The sport gave me cherished friendships, an ability to travel the world and opportunities to create incredible memories. It also taught me a lot about what it means to face challenges, battle back and overcome them. To my parents, family, wife and children, thank you for all the love and support that you gave me over the years. And, to the fans, thank you for cheering me on throughout my career."

Haas' celebrated and illustrious playing style propelled him to the pinnacle of his game as World No. 2 on May 3, 2002, when he wrapped up eight phenomenal seasons in the Top 20. Careerdefining moments include capturing 15 singles titles throughout his career in 28 finals appearances, with the most recent in 2013, when he had notable wins at Munich and Vienna.

Memorable career achievements include reaching the quarterfinals or better at all four Grand Slams. In 1999, 2002 and 2007, he had multiple Australian Open semifinal appearances, coupled with a fantastic Wimbledon semifinal in 2009. His career wins total an astonishing 569, putting him second only to Boris Becker (713 wins) among Germans in the great Open Era. Equally impressive, he brought home a silver medal for the Germans at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, and here in the desert at Indian Wells Tennis Garden, he reached the quarterfinals in 2007 and 2008.


During his remarkable and prominent career on the ATP Tour, Haas endured numerous back surgeries. His resilience, however, remained constant, which led to his being named ATP Comeback



Player for 2004 and 2012. Among his most notable victories was a win at Stuttgart in June 2017, his final career ATP World Tour tournament, when he beat his close friend Federer.

For the past several years, he has held the prominent and prestigious position of Tournament Director at Indian Wells Tennis Garden, and he will continue in that role.

The Quarry at La Quinta has many distinctions, but one of its primary accolades is the fact that's it's the only golf course in the Coachella Valley that appears in the Golf Digest America's 100 Greatest Golf Courses ratings.

General Manager Mark Scheibach, who has a pretty good idea about what makes a great golf course, believes he knows why.

"Other than the obvious, with the setting of the golf course and the layout, the overall condition of the place is just far superior to most other golfcourses," he says. "We've rated, and have been rated, in the top five in overall conditioning in the Golf Digest ratings in the United States since the golf course was built."

The Tom Fazio design opened in 1994 and has enjoyed a lofty reputation since, well known for its playability, exclusivity and conditioning. The membership roll, intentionally kept at a manageable level, reaps the benefits of the club's offerings. Members know they can take on the course anytime, and that the product will provide a completely different experience than their previous round.

Should they bring a guest, and that guest is observant and very, very lucky, there's a remote chance the guest could be offered a

"It's a long-standing rule from the original developer, Bill Morrow. If you're on the golf course and you find a weed, you get a lifetime membership at the club," Scheibach says.

According to Scheibach, the course's unusual setting in southern La Quinta creates different zones, which all work together to keep members on their toes, no matter how often they

"There are three unique elevations offered on the site, so there are three distinct playing areas," he says. "So you get this gradual elevation, and it's just so unique that it's a fact that you never get

tired of the golf course because you're constantly playing with the size of the greens.

"Every day is a different experience. You never get sick of playing it, even if you play it every day And to have the golf experience be such that there are no tee times and the club only hosts limited tournaments and no outside play is really nice," Scheibach adds. "I think the availability of just being able to walk onto your own golf course every day is what makes it a great experience. The on-course golf experience, combined with the level of service we provide our members and guests, that's what makes The Quarry so special. It's all about the golf."

Before moving to La Quinta to take on the general manager's job at The Quarry, Scheibach played golf for a living, then got into the business and management side of the game. For five years, he served as senior vice president of a private golf-management company in Hawai'i, where he oversaw 11 courses in the western U.S. including the Princeville courses on Kauai, Mauna Kea and Hapuna on the island of Hawaii, Ko Olina on Oahu and Makena Resort on Maui.

Despite having what many would consider a dream job, Scheibach jumped at the chance to manage The Quarry when he learned the post was available. He doesn't see himself leaving a second dream job.

"Someone asked me what my interest was in The Quarry and I simply said, "Well, it is The Quarry. It's got such an unbelievable reputation, it was something I wanted to be a part of. I've been here two years now," he says. "This is as special as it gets in the desert. My wife and I love living out here, and I wouldn't want to be anywhere else, that's for sure."

ike Frank Sinatra's "Summer Wind." the PGA Tour came blowing in from across the sea in mid-January, moving from → Hawai'i to its traditional California swing that occupies a nice chunk of every new calendar year.

In retrospect, it seemed there were times when it didn't want to

Jon Rahm, Jason Day, Ted Potter, Jr. and Bubba Watson each picked up Tour titles during the 2018 Golden State swing, but each did so in dramatically different fashion.

Rahm, the Spaniard from Arizona State considered by many to be "the next big thing in golf," showed why at the CareerBuilder Challenge. He opened with a 62 on Thursday en route to shooting 22-under par for the four rounds, and then fought off a robust playoff challenge from pesky Tour rookie Andrew Landry to claim his second Tour win.

The playoff lasted four holes and the sun was rapidly disappearing behind the Santa Rosa Mountains when the players came to the 18th hole for the fourth time. Rahm clinched victory by hitting a shot from the rough to 11 feet, and converting the birdie putt for the win. Had Rahm or Landry not won the playoff on the fourth extra hole, it was likely the duo would have had to return Monday to play possibly only one hole or even hit one putt. Instead, Rahm's win kept the tour on schedule and vaulted the 23year-old to No. 2 in the men's World Golf Ranking.

The circus then moved to Torrey Pines in La Jolla, where the Tour and its competitors weren't so lucky. Day eventually won the tournament in a six-hole playoff, besting Swede Alex Noren with a birdie on the 18th—their first hole on Monday. Both players finished tied with Ryan Palmer at 10-under after 72 holes, but Palmer fell out of the Sunday segment of the playoff after making par on the first playoff hole. Day and Noren continued to punch and counter-punch right through the next four holes, forcing the pair to return to the course on Monday.

The next morning, Day didn't need birdie to win after Noren hit a high-risk approach into the pond fronting the 18th green. But that's what he made, knocking his approach to 18 inches and making the ensuing putt, concluding the longest playoff in the tournament's history. The playoff took place in a strange galleryfree session when tournament organizers announced they could not arrange for crowd security on Monday. It was Day's 11th win on the Tour, and his first since winning The Players Championship in 2016.

However, it was the way Sunday's final holes of regulation went down that was the talk of the golf world on Monday morning. As the tournament wound down, J.B. Holmes and Noren found themselves locked in a struggle to see if one or the other could win, or at the very least get into a playoff with Day, who had already posted. Needing an eagle to get to 10-under, Holmes took four minutes, 10 seconds to hit his second shot, which left pace-of-play advocates fuming while others considered the inconsideration of making Noren wait nearly five minutes before he could hit his crucial second shot.

Noren ended up making par, which put him in the playoff. But social media sites were already lighting up Holmes for his potential negative effect on Noren and the pace-of-play principles he shredded, which certainly helped create the circumstances for the Monday playoff extension. Holmes later apologized, saying he didn't realize he was taking so long.

After quick diversions to Phoenix, where Gary Woodland defeated Chez Reavie in a playoff, and Pebble Beach, where Potter Jr. broke a string of four straight events decided by playoff to win his second PGA Tour event, the Tour rolled back into Southern California for the Genesis Open. Watson hadn't won since he lifted the trophy at Riviera in 2016, and that win was his second at Riviera Country Club, often referred to as "a shot-maker's course." So when Watson broke out of his funk to win again at the Riv, his reaction suggested he was among the most-surprised.

Watson seized the tournament lead he would take to the clubhouse with a critical chip-in for a birdie from the gaping bunker on the par 3 No. 14, closing with a 69 while his fellow competitors were firing and falling back. Watson was up and down on the front nine with three bogeys and two birdies to turn at 1over 36. But he navigated the back nine at 33 with three birdies, including the holed bunker shot, and no bogevs to finish 12-under for the tournament.

Southern Californian Patrick Cantlay led for much of the day, and was in position to snatch his second Tour win of the season, which surely would have been a crowd-pleasing event at Riviera. But he made bogeys on Nos. 12 and 13, Watson followed with his chip-in and Cantlay eventually finished tied for fourth. With the win, Watson joined Ben Hogan and Lloyd Mangrum as the only other three-time winners at Riviera.

Then, suddenly, just like the summer wind, the tour was gone

Many golf courses have deep pot bunkers guarding the greens and punishing a less-than-perfect approach shot. When a player hits into one of these challenging greenside bunkers, it can be very anxiety producing. My key to executing great golf shots from the sand is to "splash" the sand in order to carry the ball up and out of the bunker.

Here are my strategies for playing successfully from these bunkers.

SETUP

When I address a ball in the sand, I angle my feet and body alignment slightly left of the target, in what's called an "open" position. With my alignment open, I lay my higher-lofted wedge open as well, so it has the appearance that the clubface is aimed right of the flag. The alignment of my body counterbalances the angle of the clubface. With my body alignment angled 20 degrees left, I want my clubface angled 20 degrees right, which will make golf ball come out of the bunker straight.

In my setup, I also want to feel like I am "sitting down," so when I swing through the ball the bottom of my clubface will arc through a couple of inches *beneath* the ball. You will also notice in the photo that I have the shaft leaning slightly forward toward the target. This way I am actually "pre-setting" the angle of the shaft for impact.





BACKSWING

I want a big core windup in my backswing, which in turn will move the club back for me. The mistake that many high-handicap golfers make in the sand is that they don't turn their body enough and they use their arms too much in moving the club. My arms are actually very quiet when I allow my body rotation to do all the work.

You can see in the photo that when I'm at the completion of my backswing, I have my legs flexed as if I'm sitting on a chair, and my shoulders have rotated nearly 90 degrees, creating the feeling of being wound up like a loaded spring.






SPLASH THE SAND

As I make my way through impact, my focus is to splash the slightly open clubface through the sand, which will carry the ball up onto the green for me. You can see in the photos how much work the sand does to carry my ball out of the bunker. Many golfers try to pick the ball clean out of the bunker, but this is a mistake. When you use the sand, it does much of the lifting.



The next time you're in a practice bunker, follow my steps on setup. Then, without using a ball, swing and splash through the sand with your clubface. Try to get the feel of splashing the clubface through the sand and throwing the sand up onto the putting surface. Once you've done that, place a ball on to the ground and feel the same splash of the sand as you swing through, allowing the sand to carry the ball up and out of the bunker and onto the green.







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Bikram Yoga:

The Power behind the Series

Beyond the breath: The secret to outdriving your golf partners and winning your tennis matches



¬ olfers who speak of Tiger Woods Jand Fred Couples in the same sentence may be thinking back on "problems," which we know can be deadly to one's game. Bikram Yoga aficionados think Half Moon Pose—backward

Strengthening the spine and avoiding pain is key to increasing performance success. The power of the Bikram series of voga poses continues as we move our way through the standing series warm-up.

In the past two issues of Desert Golf and Tennis we covered the beginning breathing exercise and two of the moves in Half Moon pose. Within Half Moon pose are two additional moves: backward bending and forward bending. The concentration in this article is on backward bending. We will complete the entire spine

warm-up in the next issue with the forward fold. Collectively these four moves within Half Moon pose master bending the body in all four directions, stimulating the spine at the very start of class.

Backward Bending

Bikram Choudhury was very specific in his emphasis on the importance of the backward bend. The human body is continuously bending forward in everyday life. We drop something and we bend forward to pick it up. We get into our cars with a foreword bend. I always get a laugh out of my students when I say, "How often are you standing around talking to your friends and say, Excuse me, I need to do a quick backbend to even myself out."

We are lopsided beings and need to be cognizant of balancing both sides of our bodies. Within the Bikram Yoga series, backward and forward bending with hands-to-feet warm-up do just that!

Alignment and form are always key. With Half Moon we can concentrate on our form in the mirror. With backward bending and hands-to-feet, instructor cues are instrumental.

Beginning students struggle in Half Moon pose with keeping their elbows straight and "glued" against their ears, and their knees "locked" out. In side bending, the issue is usually physical.

In backward bending, the issue is typically mental. There's a lot of fear when one moves into a backward bend for the first time, which is not surprising given that it is not something we do on a daily basis. However, the benefits of backward bending are monumental, so getting over the fear is imperative.

Backward bending is so therapeutic that there are entire workshops on it. Golfers and tennis players quickly see results in increased agility after engaging in consistent back-bending exercises. Nothing is more stimulating to the spine than getting an infusion of blood flow there. When done in a heated environment, as in Bikram Yoga, the results are accelerated.

Bill Cardone, a Bikram Yoga practitioner for 10 years, states that his consistent practice has been a "game changer." He sites backward bends in particular as having strengthened his spine and increased his flexibility. "I have been playing golf for over 30 years and have no back issues," he says. "I am capable of hitting my 8 iron 150 yards at 60 years of age, which I could not accomplish at age

The Benefits of Backward Bending

The benefits can impact multiple areas of your life and body. Backbending:

• Counters our continuous forward bending, such as in deskwork or dental and other professions Increases mobility of the spine

- Improves posture
- Boosts mood, relieves stress and wakes you up by stimulating endorphins
- Opens the heart and the mind
- Relieves symptoms of pain related to immobility, stiffness and sciatica

Backward Bending Posture Mechanics

The backward bend in the Half Moon warm-up is very specific. Since classes take place in a heated environment and the student has already completed a strong breathing exercise and alternating side bending for a full minute per side, the spine is ready to move backward.

Slow and steady is the key for proper alignment and letting go of fear. A gradual decent while concentrating on form is essential, but very little depth needs to be achieved for one to gain the full benefit of the compression/release tourniquet effect.

Students put their feet together with heels and toes touching, arms over their head. Glut and quad muscles are engaged as they breathe slowly and lift their chest up toward the sky. They bring their arms back to the wall behind them as they slowly lower into a backbend. They reengage their leg muscles and keep some lift in their chest so they don't collapse into their lower back as they move deeper into the bend. The visual is a large beach ball they are arching up and back over, coordinating their movements with their breath. They hold static in the deepest expression before release and slowly coming back to center with their arms directly over their head.

There is some discomfort associated with backward bending, but it's that "good hurt" sensation.

Nothing is more healing and/or preventative for spinal injuries than backbending.

If you're nervous about bending backward, go slowly. Start with side bending in the Half Moon pose, along with gentle spine twists and yoga's cat/cow movements. Eventually you can work yourself up to the amazing world and significant results of backward bending.

ay golfor tour any high-end country club these days and the once idyllic tranquility is under attack from the sound of hammers and nails!

What has been very quiet for over 10 years is now booming at the upscale country clubs in the desert. Not only are very large custom homes being built, there is a lot of major remodeling going on as well as tearing down of properties to build on the best locations. What you might not expect is that places that are wellestablished—20-plus years old and older—are participating in this

I recently had the opportunity to play the Vintage, one of the first luxury country clubs established here, and was amazed by what was going on alongside the course. It seemed that on every hole there was a construction fence around a previously vacant lot and a very large contemporary home being built. Or there was a home undergoing remodeling from the ground up.

At the Tradition club, which has approximately 240 buildable lots, an average of one or two homes per year have been built over the past five years. Now, there are six homes under construction and the club is close to 96 percent totally built out. And Big Horn Country Club with its new, over-the-top clubhouse is also seeing a huge increase in building.

Vacant lot sales rose over 40 percent between 2016 and 2018. New building is especially active in newer clubs such as The Madison Club, the Hideaway and Toscana Country Club.

At the Hideaway, development activity is strong with 15 homes under construction and 10 in design review. There are now 341 completed homes in the community, which translates to 78percent built-out, and 71 vacant lots remain. Within the Hideaway, the trend is clearly toward larger homes. Eight of the homes under construction are over 6,000 square feet and five are more than 7,000 square feet, bringing the average size of the 15 homes under construction to 6.443 sq. ft.

The style of these new homes is trendy and upscale, from soft contemporary to a very contemporary style. The focus is on the outdoor living spaces with vanishing pocket doors in every room to enhance indoor/outdoor living. There's also a focus on entertaining so the kitchens are very grand, and colors are definitely trending

With builders becoming busy again, building costs are starting to go up. Just a few years ago, custom homebuilders would quote \$300 to \$400 a square foot to build a topnotch custom home. Currently, the quotes are typically \$400 to \$600 a square foot, depending on finishes and so on. This doesn't include the cost of the lot, fees or architectural and design costs. And as established builders and city planning departments get busy, there are time increases, too. Homes that used to take 12 months to build can now take up to 18 months.

There are many reasons for this boom. First and foremost is the strength of the economy fueled by stock-market growth over the past two years. Interest rates also continue to remain stable and attractive. In addition, many new desert dwellers are coming from strong housing markets such as Orange County, Los Angeles, San Diego, Washington, Oregon, many Midwest areas and, of course,

Why build instead of buy? The desire for light, fresh contemporary is very dominant, and many of the resale properties are in the darker Tuscan and Mediterranean styles. Another factor is the age of the new buyers. Many are in their 40s and 50s with families, and they're looking for the whole package in a house and




In response, many established clubs are now offering young-executive memberships to attract the younger generation, and tweaking the focus of amenities. Most clubs, for example, are emphasizing activities beyond the golf course. New fitness and spa facilities have been added or upgraded in many clubs, more casual outdoor dining has been upgraded, and outdoor pursuits such as hiking and biking have been added along with many activities for children and young adults.

All of that bodes well for the Coachella Valley. Based on the facts and current economic predictions, we are in a desert building boom for quite some time to come!

urning 70 isn't the typical benchmark for high performance. Few septuagenarians set new records for speed unless their name happens to be Ferrari.

Celebrating its 70th year in auto racing, Ferrari rolled out a game-changing machine that takes Ferrari to a new level—the 812 Superfast. This front-engine V12 is all natural. No super-charger or turbo, yet the kind of speed that drops jaws and wins awards. The 812 Superfast lives up to its name going 0-60 mph in 2.8 seconds. You can almost feel the thundering of 789 horses racing in front of this modern-day pony express. Ferrari claims this is the most powerful, naturally aspirated production car ever made.

That kind of horsepower comes at a price of more than \$330,000, but brings with it seven decades of history. The 812 Superfast has the fingerprints of past classics like the 365 GTB in its rear spoiler. The sweeping side panels give a nod to its predecessor, the F12berlinetta. The cabin is a mix of ultra-luxe and Formula One racing features.

Most of the voodoo is underneath where Ferrari engineers have created downdraft and reduced drag like sorcerers of physics. The hocus pocus creates a machine that eats curves for breakfast and is just getting started at 6,000 rpm. Vents and gashes across the body work both aesthetically and functionally. Two passive flaps in the frontend open by pressure of the airflow created at 124 mph. That force works to stall the front diffuser and reduce drag, while three flaps in the rear of the car mirror that effort to the rear diffuser.

The Superfast is the first Ferrari to have electronic power steering. The steering system replaced a hydraulic version and is paired with a traction-control system called Side Slip Control to give drivers a completely integrated steering experience. All systems operate to alert drivers of oversteer or understeer. The result is a strong feeling that doesn't try to correct you but rather follows your lead.

The 812 Superfast isn't petite. Weighing in at over 3,300 pounds, the wheelbase and length are wide and long at 107 and 183 inches, respectively. That's nearly a foot longer than an Audi R8

Inside there are no frills. A simple screen on the passenger's side and two customizable screens on the dash handle all that's requires. An oversized tachometer tells you what's important to Ferrari—as it should be.

It's hard to comprehend how the V-12 engine does what it does. The Superfast delivers max torque of 529 lb-ft at 7,000 rpm. The mystifying piece of this equation is that it also gives 424 lb-ft way down at 3,500 rpm. At the low end you're getting big torque and you haven't even gotten out of the neighborhood. As the engine reaches for the higher rpm, you sense you're just getting warmed up above 6,000 rpm.

The 6.5-liter engine is destined to make news for another seven decades as car lovers crave it and manufacturers work to emulate it. Much of the redesign internally hinged on reworking piston strokes and psi. This gives the extra horsepower without having to resort to turbo or other gimmicks.

No Ferrari is a miss, even for the most discerning and spoiled drivers; however,

the 812 Superfast marks a new line on the road for others to follow. The drive is comfortable, the engine note strong and performance mind-blowing. In a day when automakers trick out a car with gadgets and gizmos, Ferrari has carved its own trail by bucking the trend. Nothing is overlooked but nothing superfluous is added, either.

It's state-of-the-art design with simplicity.

The exterior brawn and brains exemplify the Enzo Ferrari legacy. The sophistication of aerodynamics and engineering stand on the shoulders of decades of racing excellence, and styling and performance dare competitors to imagine equality as attainable.

The 812 Superfast takes 70 years in stride and scoffs at those who would call

the brand old school. Think Ferrari is slowing down? Just try to keep up. With a top speed of 221 mph, good luck!

MARC JACOBS

Marc Jacobs also came out swinging with looks that have garnered a lot of attention this spring. Jacobs was the youngest designer to win the CFDA Perry Ellis Award for New Fashion Talent, and he's been at the top of the fashion heap since 1986. He's equally adept at turning out his trademark "grunge aesthetic" as he is at crafting ladylike suits and dresses.

The Marc Jacobs Tiered Fringe Skirt features five rows of scallop detail and an A-line silhouette that hits at the knees. This playful black number can be tastefully worn to a cocktail party or charity lunch. Made from imported Italian viscose, this swingy skirt retails for \$795.

The Marc Jacobs Fringe-Trim Sheath Dress adds movement and swing to layers of dangling silk threads at the bust as well as the thigh. In soft pink, the satin-back crepe construction has a sleeveless fitted silhouette and a wide V-neckline with peek-a-boo detail. It's made in the United States of imported fabric and is available for \$1,500.

Another fashion influencer, Alexander McQueen manages to dominate the runways year after year. The late English designer Lee Alexander McOueen founded the design house in 1992, quickly gaining a reputation for opulent, sometimes outrageous, bespoke creations. Today the line is under the creative direction of Sarah Burton, perhaps best known for creating the gown worn by Catherine Middleton when she wed Prince William.

The spunky Alexander McQueen Mixed-Plaid Dress in black and white flatters a whittled waist and toned gams. The mixed-plaid pattern with patchwork details over the hips and red accents throughout features short sleeves, a Vneckline and a fit-and-flare silhouette with a front kick pleat. The center thorax is a strand of round sapphires, gently decreasing in size from top to bottom. The brooch may also be worn as a pendant. It measures three inches long by almost as wide and is a one-of-a-kind piece that will be made to order for \$15,000.
