Bermuda Dunes Country Club has been going strong for 51 years and it remains a vibrant and lively private facility with 27 holes of championship golf and a dedicated membership. Hollywood celebrities Clark Gable, Cary Grant, William Holden, Eddie Fisher, Debbie Reynolds, Patti Page and Bill Gargan were among the first property owners in the Bermuda Dunes home development, no doubt drawn like others to the views of towering palms, sparkling freshwater lakes, desert terrain and the snow-capped peaks of the San Jacinto Mountains.

With water readily available, Bermuda Dunes was the perfect setting for a golf course—one marked by rolling, grassy dunes and verdant greens, spectacular manmade waterfalls and two lakes. The course's designer, Billy Bell Jr., was given simple instructions: "Make the course long enough to test the professionals but make the fairways wide enough so the average golfer will not always be out-of-bounds or in a hazard." Bell, who also designed courses at Bel-Air Country Club, Hacienda Country Club, La Jolla Country Club, Newport Beach Country Club, San Diego Country Club, Tamarisk Country Club, Tucson Country Club and Woodland Hills Country Club among others, succeeded admirably.

A lot of history has been made at Bermuda Dunes. The club has participated in 49 of the last 50 Bob Hope Classic tournaments. It was the site of Arnold Palmer's first Classic win in 1960 as well as his last PGA Tour win in 1973. Palmer remains a member today and calls the course, "one of my favorites anywhere."

He's not alone. Phil Mickelson calls it a great course that makes you think about every shot. Fred Couples says that Bermuda Dunes' classic design is one of the best anywhere, and Davis Love III says he could play the course every day.

Celebrities and professionals from around the world have played the "traditional" style course, but true to Bell's instructions for design, it's also a course that is ideal for all kinds of golfers. Ardent fans come from near and far to join Bermuda Dunes, many of them also members of other top clubs.

Today Bermuda Dunes is attracting a new generation of avid golfers to its ranks. Mark Range, general manager, is quick to point out that younger golfers are joining Bermuda Dunes thanks to the innovative new "Classic Membership," which allows a low initiation (non-equity) and reduced monthly dues. These members can then upgrade to an equity membership at anytime.

This "once in a lifetime opportunity" has never been available to prospective members of the prestigious club, notes Chip Dimon, Bermuda Dunes' membership director. Dimon enjoys showing potential members and guests the club and all 27 holes of the golf course. In many ways, innovation is nothing new at Bermuda Dunes.

The original 18 holes were built in 1959. When the Lakes Nine was added in 1963, Bermuda Dunes became the first 27-hole golf course in the Coachella Valley. Also of note is the permanent marker near the 18th green dedicating the hole to longtime member and supporter Bob Hope for his extraordinary contribution to the community, the game of golf and generations of America's servicemen and women.

One popular feature of the course is that the first tee and ninth green of each of the three nines are located near the clubhouse, making for an easy transition from one nine to any other. All three nines play to a par of 36. With three sets of tees, the yardage can stretch from 6,065 to 7,017 for the men, and 5,302 to 6,149 for the women.

Also popular is the extensive practice facility, used not just by members but also by PGA and LPGA professionals as they ready for the Bob Hope Classic and Kraft Nabisco Championship. Participants of the Frank Sinatra Celebrity Invitational also hone their game at Bermuda Dunes, which offers three driving ranges, two short game areas, three separate putting areas and more.

Bermuda Dunes has been an integral part of the iconic Bob Hope Classic and it is beloved by the golfers of the Coachella Valley and beyond. The only argument might be about which of the 27 holes gets top honors as favorite.







High on the list is undoubtedly No, 18 on the Classic Nine, the 514yard par 5 that was dedicated to Bob Hope after his passing. It is not only among the most scenic holes, it's also an excellent test of golf. A well-placed tee shot makes the green reachable in two for long hitters, but is the reward worth the risk? The elevated green is narrow in depth but very wide, making the back right pin placement extremely difficult. Shorter hitters must place their second shot as far left as possible to avoid the lake and the palms on its shoreline and to get the optimal approach placement. The bottom line is that this hole is just plain old-fashioned fun!

Bermuda Dunes also has much to offer members beyond the golf course. There are year-round social events and the classic design of the 40,000-square-foot clubhouse creates an easy and comfortable setting for members after a round of golf. The outdoor patio with its mountain and sunset views is a favorite gathering place for drinks and food prepared under the watchful eye of well-known Executive Chef Robert Brito. Members also have access to a spa and saunas for men and women, state-of-the-art fitness equipment, tanning booths and professional trainers. And the member-owned pro shop is stocked with the latest in equipment and apparel.

It's not surprising that the club attracts a strong membership. The friendly, accomplished staff at Bermuda Dunes has perfected the art of member and guest services through its many years of experience—some with the club for 20 years. That has helped to make Bermuda Dunes the club of choice for top executives in the desert and across the country. Best of all, there has never been a better time to join.



Actor Kevin Sorbo has been the star of such television hits as *Hercules: the Legendary Journeys* and Gene Roddenberry's *Andromeda*. But it's a behind-the-scenes role that he cherishes as much or even more than those in front of the camera: spokesman for A World Fit for Kids.

Since 1997 Sorbo has been the spokesman for this organization that uses mentoring and after-school activity and youth-development programs to decrease school dropout rates and childhood obesity and to battle gang violence and drugs. He's happy with the progress that's been made but knows there's much work ahead.

To that end, the 2nd Annual Kevin Sorbo Golf Classic is scheduled for June 10-11 at DragonRidge Country Club in Henderson, Nev. Last year, the tournament raised more than \$145,000 for the organization in its inaugural outing, and Sorbo is looking for more—much more—at this year's tournament.


Like other organizations, A World Fit for Kids has faced challenges in this economy, but Sorbo is adamant about the need for this program and the work it does.

"We've grown quite a bit," the actor said during filming of his latest movie in Hawaii, *Soul Surfer*. "Like everyone else, we're battling cuts. I can certainly understand budget cuts, but when it comes to the children of our nation, they need to be a priority."

Others agree. California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger honored A World Fit for Kids for its 100-percent graduation rate among its 12,000 students in the Los Angeles school system, a system with a staggering 54-percent dropout rate.

Sorbo worries about the government's goals. "We have a lot of problems in our own country and those should be our priority," he said. "As much as the press wants us to believe that the world hates the U.S.A., when other countries get in trouble, we're still the first country they call. That's fine, but we need to help ourselves first. There are plenty of problems to fix right here in our own backyard, starting with our children, their obesity and their education."





Sorbo admits he doesn't have all the answers, but he knows that A World Fit for Kids is making a huge impact. "It's a lot of hard work by a lot of people, but we're making a difference."

And now, golfers can add to that difference by playing in the fundraising tournament. The cost is \$3,500 per team and \$1,000 per single player. "You get a great bang for your buck," said Sorbo.

Celebrities scheduled to be part of the event include Cheech Marin, Kevin Nealon, Meat Loaf, Alice Cooper, Franco Harris, Julius Erving, Marcus Allen and Joe Mantegna, among others. In addition to the golf tournament, there will also be entertainment both nights at Planet Hollywood, the host hotel.

Naturally, golf will be a highlight. DragonRidge Country Club is a Jay Morrish/David Druzisky designed private course just minutes from the Las Vegas Strip. It's a course that Sorbo believes players won't soon forget.

"Mr. [Rich] MacDonald has donated the entire course for the day," Sorbo said. "He's always been a big supporter of the program and it's just a phenomenal course."

Sorbo remains busy as an actor. He was in Hawaii for more than a month working on *Soul Surfer*, the moving story of rising surfing star Bethany Hamilton, who at 13 years of age lost her arm in a shark attack. Hamilton not only survived, she returned to surfing.

"I play the father of her best friend who was in the water with her when the attack happened," Sorbo said. "I save her life. It's a pretty intense movie and it's heart-warming."

Also in the movie are Helen Hunt, Dennis Quaid, Craig T. Nelson, Anna Sophia Robb and singer Carrie Underwood, who makes her feature-film debut. In fact, Underwood also plays a major role in Sorbo's golf tournament; one of her concerts is a high-profile auction item.

"Carrie is on a nationwide tour in 2010 and whatever city the winner chooses on Carrie's schedule, we will send them to the concert and they get to meet her," Sorbo said. "It's a great auction item."

Other top items include golf at Bandon Dunes in Oregon, at Hazeltine in Minnesota and at Bethpage Black in New York, which hosted the 2009 U.S Open.

The tournament will be a "shamble" format in which team members use the best drive of the group then play their own ball from that point through the rest of the hole. It's a format Sorbo loves.

"You really feel like you're playing golf during the round. You get the chance to make more of an impact for your team."

There will be tents on each hole and Outback Steakhouse will have a set-up on each nine.

Noted Sorbo, "We just want to make sure everyone has a good time."

Given the celebrities, the course and the cause, it's a given that they will.





Born in Seoul Korea in 1983, Kevin Na moved to the United States when he was eight, settling into La Canada, Calif., with his parents, Yong and Annie.

His first desire was to be on television. "My Dad told me if I played golf and was good, I would be on TV, so I started to play golf."

Na started learning the game at La Canada Country Club. The family then moved to Diamond Bar, Calif., where he played at Western Hills Country Club in Chino Hills while attending Diamond Bar High School.

In 1996 Na qualified for the U.S. Junior Amateur Championship—the youngest player ever in USGA history to qualify and play. He had a sensational junior career, winning numerous city championships from Los Angeles to Phoenix to Las Vegas, and he was drafted to the 1999 America's Cup Team. During matches at Colorado's Perry Park Country Club, Na set the course record of 66. With a sponsor's exemption as an amateur, he played in the 1999 Korea Open on the KPGA Tour.

With the new millennium Na's results rocketed higher. He was chosen for the 2000 Cannon Cup Team, received the Curtis Cup Player of the Year Award and Alga's 1st Team All-American Award. He won the Orange Bowl International Championship (70-70-69-69) to achieve the No. 1 National Junior Scoreboard Ranking.

At the age of 17, Na shot a 66 to qualify for the 2001 PGA Tour Buick Open. He had eight straight wins in Golden State Tour events and was selected for the U.S. Team of the Japan Cup. Na finished the year as No. 1 in Golf Week's "Boys Ranking" and "National Junior Scoreboard." In total, he had more than 100 wins as an amateur.

In August of 2001 Na turned professional, deciding to bypass his senior year in high school and college to do so.

The Nas are a close family, and Kevin isn't the only golfer. His older brother Austin also plays and caddied for Kevin in the early years. The two brothers played one year of high school golf together at Diamond Bar. When Austin was a senior and Kevin a freshman, Austin beat his brother to get the No. 1 team slot.

"That lasted only a week," laughs Austin. "Our team made it to the CIF [California Interscholastic Federation] championship for the first time in the history of our high school with both of us in the team. One of our best memories from junior golf days."

Austin's caddying memories are amusing. "I remember the very first tournament that I caddied for him: the FBR Open in Phoenix. We get to the first fairway after the tee shot and I gave him the yardage. I don't remember the exact number, but let's just say 165 yards. I say, 'I got 165 yards to the pin' and Kevin looks very confused. He takes out his yardage book...then he started cracking up! 'Bro, the yardage you paced from the sprinkler head behind you, you're suppose to subtract it. I think you added instead....'

"I was so nervous to be inside the ropes during the tournament for the first time that I had no clue what I was doing. And FBR Open being so famous for big spectator attendance didn't help much either!

"For the first few weeks, Kevin covered me for the mistakes I made, asking the other players and caddies to be understanding," confides Austin. "After I got my feet wet, everything went well."





In 2002 the Na brothers traveled to mini-tour events in Canada, California and then the Asian Tour. After two Asian Tour events, Na was ranked 15th. He focused on playing there, starting his global golfing career. At the end of the year he was ranked No. 4 on the Asian Tour Order of Merit. His first win was the Volvo Masters of Asia, which qualified him for his first World Golf Championship event in 2003 as well as for various European PGA Tour events. Na played 11 events on the European Tour, loving the travel and the different countries.

"It toughened me," he says. "It taught me how to play in wind and rain."

Na's breakthrough onto the PGA Tour came in 2003 when he secured his card in Q school; he was just 20. The youngest member on Tour, he finished his first season, 2004, inside the top 100 on the money list. In 2005 he earned more than \$1 million, plus two runner-up finishes—at the FBR Open in Phoenix and two weeks later with a play-off loss to Geoff Ogilvy at the Chrysler Classic of Tucson.

Na's "ArizoNa" nickname came into being.

Phoenix seems to be one of Na's top-scoring events every year. Players jokingly refer to him as the "Desert Rat" because he always seems to score well in desert climates, including in Dubai at the Dubai Desert Classic where he tied for sixth in 2003.

In January 2006, Na's right hand was slammed in a car door, limiting his playing and getting him a medical exemption for 2007. He played several Nationwide Tour events during rehab and won the Mark Christopher Charity Classic in 2006.

Na has progressed rapidly. He finished 2009 in 26th place on the Fedex Cup, with over \$2 million in earnings for the year. Is 2010 his breakout year? With ties for eighth at the Bob Hope Classic and 10th at the Northern Trust Open, Na is ready. At the age of 26, he qualifies for all of the Majors this year.

"I am thrilled, it is going to be great. I took a month off and went to my home in Seoul, chilling out and a little partying at the end of the season. No golf. Just relaxation and loved going down to Jeju Island—a really cool place."

In the United States, Na has a home in Las Vegas, where he practices at TPC Las Vegas. When back in Diamond Bar he plays at Empire Lakes Golf Club.

"I love helping friends with their game and just hanging out," he says.

Easy going, open, friendly, he always takes time for autographs, photos and chats with fans both on and off the course.



In his leisure time he's a huge fan of video games and Playstation 3 soccer. One of his wishes is to go to a European soccer game preferably Manchester United.

American and Korean music are among his favorites. He loves "oldies" and KEarth radio but isn't into country. His mother is an accomplished piano player. Na took piano lessons when he was young, but a career in music was not to be. Looking back he laughs. "My teacher said lessons were wasted on me, no way would I ever play."


Na does enjoy going to concerts, particularly Justin Timberlake performances. He usually plays in JT's tournament as well. He says he's not too good at dancing, but he is a chic dresser and he's currently unattached.

Smiling he suggests, "Just send Valentines."

This past January Na's motivation for starting golf as child was finally realized: He appeared on TV not as a golfer but an actor; he had a cameo role in CSI: Crime Scene Investigation.

That's a good start to 2010, a year that should be the one in which he also has his first PGA Tour win.

Drama, suspense, joy, anguish, honor, sportsmanship, integrity, mastery—all part of the Open Championship since its inception on Scotland's spectacular Ayrshire coast so long ago.

The first Open Championship took place in 1860 at Prestwick Golf Club. Golf clubs from England and Scotland were invited to send up to three professionals each to compete on Prestwick's twelve-hole links. Willie Parks defeated favored Tom Morris Sr. by one shot to be named the tournament's first champion. There was no prize money, no Claret Jug. The winner received a Challenge Belt made of Moroccan leather with silver emblems and a buckle. Each champion had to prove to the club treasurer that he could safely return the Belt the following year. By winning three times consecutively, the champion could keep the Belt—a feat achieved only by Tom Morris Jr. in the first decade of the Open Championship.

In 1873 the rota (rotation) came into being with the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, the Honorable Company of Edinburgh Golfers and Prestwick. The 1874 Open Championship was held at The Musselburgh Golf Club, and as other clubs became involved in the tournament, a new trophy was a must. Instead of another belt, a silver claret jug was chosen as The Golf Champion Trophy, for which each club contributed £10 pounds.

In 1920, The Royal and Ancient Golf Club was given full responsibility for The Open Championship. With Bobby Jones' incredible win at St. Andrews at the 1927 Open, the committee decided to retain the Claret Jug and present the winner with a replica each year. Both the original Golf Champion Trophy and original Challenge Belt are on permanent display at The Royal and Ancient Golf Clubhouse.

MEMORABLE HIGHLIGHTS FROM RECENT OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS AT ST. ANDREWS

Having hosted 27 Open Championships, it's fitting that the tournament returns to the venerable Old Course this year. The "Home of Golf" last welcomed the Open in 2005, when Tiger Woods won his second Open Championship (the first, in 2000, at St. Andrews as well). The 2005 event was also the one at which Jack Nicklaus bade a moving farewell to the Open, taking that memorable final walk up the 18th fairway and over the famed Swilcan Bridge. Nicklaus was a three-time British Open champion, two of the victories coming at St. Andrews.

In 1995, John Daly's big power game, beautifully complimented by his touch around the greens, allowed him an unforgettable birdie in overtime from the infamous Valley of Sin at the front of the 18th green to defeat Italy's personable Constantino Rocca. The 1990 event didn't have that same kind of drama, thanks to Nick Faldo's record setting final day and five-shot lead over Payne Stewart.

Sometimes what is memorable is not what went right but rather what went wrong. Such was the case in the 1984 Open Championship where Tom Watson misjudged his approach on the famous Road Hole—the 17th—and sent it flying over the green. Seve Ballesteros fulfilled his pre-round prediction with par on 17 and a birdie on 18 to take his second of three Open titles.

Fifty years ago Arnold Palmer, buoyed by his fabulous U.S. Open victory, arrived in St. Andrews for the Centenary Open, aiming to wrest the Claret Jug away from Australia's Peter Thompson and South Africa's Bobby Locke who had won seven titles in the previous eight years between them. He finished second that year, but launched a new epoch at the Open Championship as huge crowds turned up for his initial appearance on the Old Course. Palmer took the Championship the following year at Royal Birkdale, and then defended his title spectacularly in 1962 at Royal Troon, winning by six shots over Kel Nagle who had bested him in the Centenary Open. Palmer's aggressive attacking style endeared him to the fans and the ambiance of golf's most historic tournament was never again the same. Previously sedate spectators invaded the course from the beaches and roars became the norm.

It was on the Old Course in 1927 that Bobby Jones successfully defended his Open title, which he had won the year before at Royal Lytham and St. Annes. Jones' first visit to the Old Course was in 1921 but had dire results after he didn't complete the round following his debacle in No. 11's Hill bunker. Jones won his third Claret Jug in 1930 at Hoylake en route to his Grand Slam.

150 YEARS AND COUNTING IN 2010

Each year, history continues to be made at the Open Championship. Will the 2010 tournament, celebrating its 150th birthday appropriately at the "Home of Golf," be the one at which Tom Watson makes golfing history? He came so close last year at Turnberry and there





are many fans that hope to see him raise the Claret Jug on the Old Course this year.

Yet whoever finishes victorious this June at St. Andrews, golfers from near and far will be celebrating and thanking the Royal and Ancient Golf Club for assuring that the game continues as it always has, played with respect and with traditional values, etiquette and spirit. That is the legendary heritage of the great Open Championship.

Last year when John Ott became general manager of Flagstaff Ranch Golf Club, he held a membership meeting in the clubhouse. Standing in front of vista-framing windows overlooking the 18th hole and surrounding pine forest, he had everyone's complete attention—until two bald eagles flew into view. At 7,300 feet, breathtaking mountain scenery and wildlife are the norm at Flagstaff Ranch, yet they always turn heads. Ott says he's seen members set up shop near the 13th tee with lawn chairs and cocktails to watch wildlife at dusk. While this is a private venue with expected accourrements and yearround social activities, the atmosphere is much more laidback than a typical country club—more like that of a true mountain retreat.

"It's a casual elegance," says Ott. "You don't have to bring your tie; we allow nice denim for dinner. It's more relaxed. Just put on your boots and jeans."

Located two miles west of Flagstaff, the gated community's centerpiece golf club broke ground in 2004 and opened two years later. PGA great-turned-environmentally-conscious-designer Jerry Pate created a course that integrates naturally into the largest area of Ponderosa pines in North America, utilizing 454 of the 1.8 million acres of Coconino National Forest. Playing 7,160 yards from the tips and a female-friendly 5,200 yards from the front tees, the course is a pleasure for players of all abilities.


"Every hole is a postcard," says Ott. "It's laid out well with dramatic vistas that include the Humpheys and San Francisco peaks. It's carved out in pine trees with large, undulating greens. We have four lakes, 58 bunkers, bluegrass fairways and bent-grass greens."

Flagstaff Ranch is situated in a volcanic region and has a caldera preserve on property; the driving range is adjacent to a natural cinder wall that towers over golfers at 150 feet. What else makes this club a standout among others in the area? Ott points out that unlike most mountain courses, this one doesn't have any blind shots. It's also unaffected by planes landing at the local airport, a factor for other venues in the area. Golf season generally begins on May 1 and runs through October, but Ott says if there is demand, mild weather conditions could easily stretch it on either end of the calendar.

Many golf clubs across the country call themselves a best-kept secret, but Flagstaff Ranch has a credible case. "It's such a great property, but was too exclusive for awhile," says Ott.

To make matters worse, the club was closed in 2008 when the home development ran into financial difficulties. Ott, with years of clubdevelopment and management experience in Colorado and the Southwest desert, was brought onboard for the club's 2009 re-opening and is determined to continue its positive upswing. He's making sure media reps are invited to visit and share their reviews, and the course now opens its doors to members of other clubs, which resulted in 3,000 rounds of reciprocal play last year. Most importantly, Ott says, the venue is now on solid financial footing. "We paid down \$1 million in debt in 2009 and showed a profit operating the club."





The gated community that surrounds the golf course is made up of 456 lots in seven neighborhoods designed for distinctive single-family homes and stylish condos. Forest-centric and fire-wise, Flagstaff Ranch has its own private fire department and security. Ott calls the home opportunities "a tremendous value," and has purchased a lot himself. Golf memberships are available for homeowners and nonresidents alike, and the club roster includes those who live in the community fulltime and those who have second homes there. Demographics run from young families to retirees, some seeking respite from the summer heat of Phoenix and other members from across the region who join to take advantage of Flagstaff's ski season as well as superb mountain golf.

In addition to a complete practice area, a sumptuous 25,000-squarefoot clubhouse opened last year featuring a comfortably elegant dining room, patio seating and meeting areas that include a library and boardroom. There's a separate full-service pro shop in addition to luxe locker rooms and a card room. Members and residents take full advantage of the comprehensive, onsite fitness center with tennis facilities, hot tub and swimming pools.

Why choose Flagstaff Ranch? "This is a member-owned club," says Ott. "And other area clubs are older so homes need updating and so do their courses—they're spending capital dollars to upgrade. We have the forest setting. This is a private mountain course that is playable, forgiving and fair. Our members love the weather and the pines, and they love Flagstaff. They can get away from everything in a quiet, peaceful environment with abundant wildlife."




The Cox Celebrity Championship hosted by Drew Brees

The golf-loving MVP of the 2010 Super Bowl is a current New Orleans Saint and former San Diego Charger who believes in giving back

The buzz words "celebrity" and "championship" have always elicited a special excitement, a feeling of something out of the ordinary and worth watching.

"It is a privilege for me to be connected with the Celebrity Championship because of my connection to the city of San Diego and to our foundation's long-term commitment to support charitable causes in the San Diego community," said Brees.

In addition to naming Brees as host—he succeeds former NFL quarterback Stan Humphries—the star-studded event has been rechristened as the Celebrity Championship. This year's winner will be crowned as the nation's best celebrity golfer.

The Bob Hope Classic is not just an icon among desert tournaments. It's an icon among all tournaments, beloved by players and fans throughout the world. Now the January PGA event is poised to become even better as one of golf's most experienced executives takes over as tournament chairman. Larry O. Thiel will utilize his three decades of experience to help keep the Classic one of the top events on the PGA Tour's West Coast swing.

"Larry Thiel's expertise will be especially important to the Bob Hope Classic in this coming year as we seek to explore

a variety of sponsorship possibilities and work with PGA Tour players to fine-tune the tournament to maximize its potential for fans," says John Foster, tournament president.

Thiel also directed the company's activities



in the development of more than 50 private clubs, real estate and club resort properties throughout the world.

In 1985, Thiel joined The Vickers Company as president of Castle Pines Management Company and executive director of The International golf tournament. That event, which debuted on the PGA Tour in 1986, attracted many of the world's top players and drew much attention because of its use of the Stableford Scoring System, which rewarded birdies and eagles at a greater level than in regular stroke play.

Thiel is a nationally recognized lecturer and holds the title of Lecturer Emeritus at both the University of Wisconsin School of Management and Cornell University, America's premier school in the Hospitality Management Industry.

While Thiel believes talk of changes at the venerable Classic is premature at this point, he notes that working to secure a new title sponsorship is paramount in order to put the tournament in its rightful place of prominence.

"I know we will achieve that goal," he says. "There are so many sound business reasons why a major corporation should want to be associated with the Classic, and most importantly, to be part of a tournament that has dedicated its past and committed its future to continuing its great charitable work."

What's In Your Bag?

Consider the latest golf clubs, to say nothing of state-of-the-art GPS devices and feather-light shoes

When golf historians look back at the golf equipment of 2010, they will likely note the garishness of today's offerings. They will also note the innovation that's omnipresent in today's market. And it's not just drivers, wedges, putters, etc. Innovation—and garishness—can be found in balls, bags, accessories and clothing. Some of the equipment makes Rodney Dangerfield look reserved. The good news, however, is that you won't hit the ball like the great comic actor if you purchase some of this new equipment.

Golf-club innovation, especially in drivers, has taken a totally different direction, due, mostly, to the line in the sand that the USGA drew a few years ago. Driver sizes cannot get any bigger. Driver spring-like effect cannot get any springier. Tweaking the shafts can help, as can custom fitting, but it's unlikely that the newest drivers will provide significantly more distance. Rather, the 'latest driver technology' is really about new materials and combined materials that primarily increase forgiveness.

FAIRWAY WOODS

On the other hand, there's clearly room for more distance in fairway woods—or at least one company thinks so: Tour Edge. While its base models are popular and great choices for the budget-minded golfer, its Exotics line is for the serious golfer who wants top-quality performance. The new **Tour Edge XCG-3 Fairway Wood** (\$299) is the first to combine a titanium cup-face with a tungsten sole. The company is so certain it will provide 20 yards of additional distance that it guarantees the performance: if you're not happy with the club, return it in 30 days.



PUTTERS

In the past three years, putters have taken on some bizarre shapes. A company that has taken a basic model and added a totally fresh approach is Texas-based Utopia golf. From the back, the **Utopia TXR-I and TXR-II putters** (\$169) look like standard heel-toe weighted putters; look at the face on these milled putters, however, and there's a distinctly raised line that strikes the ball. The result is less skid plus a superb feel.

IRONS & HYBRIDS

Callaway has traditionally been better known for its consistently excellent drivers and fairway woods than for its irons. That will likely change with the introduction of the new Callaway Diablo Edge irons

(\$499-\$799). Callaway believes these irons provide the greatest distance and largest sweet spot of any of its stainless steel irons. You'll see these irons in the bags of some professionals but they are targeted directly at the weekend warrior. Titleist has irons to consider, too. For the better player who wants forged feel and workability, the Titleist AP2 710 irons (\$999) have some aluminum in the mix for a soft feel; the reduced bounce sole helps with workability. Finally, remember those classic old fairway woods with the rails on the sole? Cobra has reintroduced the concept in a 'utility metal,' a re-make of its Cobra Baffler (\$149). This hybrid is good from the fairway, but it's especially good from the rough.



WEDGES

Even though there's a lot going on in the world of golf equipment, perhaps 2010 will go down as the year of the wedge. The recent rule changes have motivated almost every golf company to introduce new and wonderful wedges. The new Cleveland CG15 DSG Oil Quench Wedges (\$119) have a classical look with a sole design for all turf conditions. The line of Titleist Vokey wedges has expanded and there are several

different finishes available, including Tour Chrome, Oil Can, and the attractive Black Nickel.




GOLF SHOES

Golf shoes come in just about any color these days but one company has totally reinvented the golf shoe, essentially taking a beach sandal and making it golf-friendly. The result is absolutely the lightest shoe made. Dawgs Golf is the company and while they may not be the choice to wear in Scotland in horizontal rain, they would be a good choice in warmer climates, especially if you find traditional golf shoes too cumbersome. Dawgsgolf.com



PULL CARTS

For the die-hard walker, the number of golf carriage devices has increased almost exponentially. It all started with Sun Mountain, who turned a baby jogger into a device for moving a golf bag around the golf course. The original, the Sun Mountain V1 (\$199), has new and improved tires; the newest model is more compact and lighter: the Sun Mountain Micro Cart retails for (\$199) and is supposedly even easier to push than the original.



GPS DEVICES

Five years ago, the concept of GPS for golf barely existed. Today, it's a crowded market with numerous excellent options. One of the first companies to offer golf GPS, Sky-Caddie, has an entry-level model, the Sky-Caddie SG 2.5L (about \$249). The modest price makes it a good value for someone who wants a quality GPS without all the bells and whistles. Callaway got into the business a couple of years ago with the Callaway uPro (\$399) that offers superb aerial graphics with a 320x240 color screen; it's compatible with most web browsers.

Lovin' the LR4

Land Rover brilliantly combines elegance, comfort, super technology and impressive off-road power in the LR4





Land Rover's loyal, cult-like following has come from more than 60 years of building classic, go-anywhere machines. Birthed out of the WWII need for off-road capability, Land Rovers quickly gained worldwide recognition as tough and terrific. True to its British heritage, Land Rover threads elegance and simplicity into every design. That's especially true in the latest model, the LR4.

The LR3 was occasionally criticized for its undersized engine and lack of stability. Land Rover took that mountain head on. The LR4 has a 375-horsepower engine—an added 75 horses from the LR3. Added horsepower comes from the Jaguar-designed V8, and the extra punch hasn't increased gas mileage.

"The efficiency comes from engine venting," says Rick Nelson of Land Rover Las Vegas. "That also has increased torque. You can definitely tell the difference between the power of the LR4 and the LR3."

Land Rover also took to rounding the body features and adding modern amenities for comfort and technology. "Off-road" doesn't have to exclude Main Street. With that in mind, the LR4 deluxe package added a five-camera surround system giving a 360-degree view of the vehicle. The display is great for backing up in the Home Depot parking lot and negotiating that tough rock crawl miles up the trail.

LED lights under the head lamps give an ultra modern feel while interior LED lights take the cabin up a notch. Land Rover added a true iPod port and USB connection to allow interface with the onboard computer, and the navigation system was upgraded to do away with the need for discs. The leather interior also got an upgrade.

"I had a customer get into one this morning and say, 'This is luxurious,'" says Denise Shaft, sales guide at Land Rover Rancho Mirage. "Land Rover took the utilitarian and softened it a bit. It's always been great off-road. It's even more convenient for families now."

The Terrain Response system is like four-wheel drive for dummies. A simple turn of the dial lets you choose the current conditions: gravel, grass, snow, rocks, street and other terrain. From grocery-

getter to gravel giant, the LR4 is ready to handle either instantly. The engine, suspension and transmission are tuned specifically for each condition. On gravel the transmission slows launch speed and helps with tricky maneuvers like rock crawling.

Along with Terrain Response, Hill Descent Control is another feature that holds back the power of the LR4. On downhill travel, the transmission is geared down to make steep descents more manageable. The result is a more confident driver.

That confidence only grows with an added stability package. Stronger, beefier roll bars decrease the sway that plagued Land Rover's reputation. An internal sensor also monitors under steer and applies the brake when drivers need a little added help. It isn't a sports car, but the LR4 feels as stable as any SUV on the market with this feature.

"Safety has always been a concern for Land Rover," Shaft says. "Even though most of our driving is inevitably done without the need for four-wheel drive, Land Rover's safety is ready for those tough conditions."

Care was taken to make the suspension more comfortable on the street, and the rebuilt suspension has impressed drivers. An air-suspension system helps drivers enter the vehicle by lowering up to two inches so that everyone can climb inside without the use of a harness. But as your drive gets increasingly difficult and obstacles

like rocks and ruts grow larger, drivers can add up to 2.15 inches to the clearance. Not to mention that the LR4 can traverse up to 30 inches of water without needing a lifeboat.

"People are driving it and are just in awe of how smooth it is," says Nelson. "They just all say, 'Wow."


Want space? Third-row seating in packages like the LUX makes putting seven passengers into an LR4 no problem. When not in use, two clicks and the third row stows away, leaving room for at least four sets of golf clubs. Air conditioning all the way back and optional dual controls for DVD and radio give everyone the comfort and control they deserve in the new LR4.

Land Rover wasn't kidding around when it went to rethinking what consumers wanted in a new model.

"Sales are up," Nelson says. "That's pretty amazing in this economy. We know we have a good product."

The LR4 comes in up to five trim packages. The top-of-the-line LUX Plus package retails at \$59,215.

Both polos are \$90. Also for men, the **Abacus** Millwood polo, \$75, has contrast stitching, moisture-wicking properties, a pocket on the left chest and a print on the right sleeve. In bright colors like apple/cactus and lagoon/ Hawaiian ocean, this polo is sporty and fashionable. Stripes are also a huge trend for spring. Seen on everything including accessories like hats and handbags, nautical stripes are especially hot.





FEMININE DRAPING

A look on display at the Academy Awards in March was the fluid lines and draping seen in many of the gowns. In shorter dresses, feminine draping is also popular. **Michael Kors'** Draped Dress, \$1,395 at Neiman Marcus, in Thistle (light lavender) is simple and flattering, yet sexy with an open, draped back and cowl neckline. Look for loose, flowing tops and skirts, and dresses with delicate draping that is a refreshing change from the tight "bandage" dresses that were in last year. Golf dresses in looser shapes are also a great look for the fairways.

RUFFLES

Ruffled tops, jackets, skirts and ruffle accents remain popular. A blouse with subtle ruffles makes a statement under a suit. **Ann Taylor Loft** has a pretty sleeveless tiered ruffle blouse for just \$49.50, a perfect touch under a cardigan or blazer. The **Verdina** golf skirt, \$57.99, has buttons down the center of the skirt accented by a vertical ruffle.

Presidential Watches

One presidential decision anyone can make: which timepiece to wear

It's hard to imagine a world leader without a watch on his or her wrist, not just for style but to ensure that not a minute is missed of those action-packed political schedules. In short, a watch is a necessity for world leaders. While some of them wear watches that cost in the hundreds of thousands of dollars, many wear timepieces that are surprisingly less expensive, while still exuding world-class style.

United States President Barack Obama currently wears a watch given to him as a birthday gift in August 2007 by the Secret Service. It's a custom-made stainless steel **Jorg Gray 6500 Chronograph**, with the Secret Service emblem on the face. Ever since word spread that the president wears this watch, the piece has skyrocketed in popularity and has put Jorg Gray—a relatively new company established in 1998—on the map for fashionable, high-quality timepieces. Jorg Gray has since launched a commemorative edition to mark the inauguration. Priced at \$325, each timepiece comes with an individualized serial number and an inscription laser engraved on the case back. The inscription reads: *The 44th President of the United States, Barack H. Obama, January 20th 2009, Commemorative Edition.*

The watch has an Italian buffalo-leather strap, matte-black face and silver accents, high-precision Japanese chronograph movement, scratch-resistant mineral crystal, a date display and is water-resistant to 100 meters. It is also available in rose gold, \$395; bronze, \$395; bracelet, \$425 and in a lady's version in a range of prices. The company notes that the men's lines are more popular and that many women love wearing the larger, chunkier men's watches like a cuff bracelet. There are five styles specifically designed for women, ranging from \$225 to \$395.

The entire Jorg Gray collection retails between \$200 and \$500, and each watch is engineered with the same components as the president's watch: brushed or polished solid steel cases, scratch-resistant mineral crystal lenses and precision Japanese movements. There are 23 lines in all.

"With more than 120 watches to choose from, Jorg Gray has a watch to fit every style preference and every personality, from linebacker to leading lady," says Trevor Gnesin, president of Jorg Gray. The watches can be purchased online and can be received in as few as two business days. Each timepiece comes in a sharp silver and black box, perfect for gift giving. *jorggray.com*






Before being elected into office, it's been said that President Obama's watch of choice was the popular light-gray face, two-tone Tag Heuer 1500 series, a diver's watch, which he owned for about 15 years. His model had a brown leather strap and contrasting gold-plated sections on the bezel. The company no longer makes the 1500 series, but the **TAG Heuer Aquaracer** resembles it. The 1500 can be found at jewelers who buy and sell vintage watches or on eBay. The company's current models can be seen on *Tagheuer.com*

Another watch line with a strong presidential connection is Rolex, mostly because of the legendary **Rolex Day-Date**, sometimes referred to as the "President watch." The Day-Date debuted in 1956 and became the "President" reportedly after Rolex presented President Dwight Eisenhower with its 6511 model. The 6511 lasted just over a year before being replaced by the externally identical 6611 model. The 6611 featured the new caliber 1055 movement with its Micro-Stella balance, and was the first model to be labeled with the words "Superlative Chronometer Officially Certified" on the dial. This new accuracy standard guaranteed the watch to remain within + 3.0 seconds per day. The name "President" derived from the watch's gold-linked bracelet with a concealed clasp, which Rolex dubbed "the President wristband," and created exclusively for this model.

It became popularly known as the President watch in this country only after Eisenhower wore it. Several other U.S. presidents reportedly favored this model as well, including Franklin D. Roosevelt, John F. Kennedy, Richard Nixon and Gerald Ford. In other countries, however, the watch is strictly known as the Day-Date. Jewelers outside of the United States may be unsure of which model you're asking about if you refer to the "President Watch," but it is called "The Leader's Watch" on the Rolex website. The Day-Date comes in several styles; in 18-karat yellow gold it retails for approximately \$9,500. Arguably, the Day-Date is one of Rolex's most cherished and popular models, and it continues to stand for superior style and class. *Rolex.com*
