





This event brings together two important charitable forces. The One Valley Foundation serves as the philanthropic arm of the Coachella Valley Firebirds, supporting a wide range of community programs across the region. Partnering with them is the Grant Fuhr Foundation, founded by NHL Hall of Famer and five-time Stanley Cup champion Grant Fuhr. Since its establishment in 2019, Fuhr's foundation has directed funds to the Hazelden Betty Ford Foundation's Children's Program, donating more than a quarter of a million dollars. By joining efforts in 2025, the Invitational will expand its focus to include youth sports initiatives in the Coachella Valley, ensuring that the benefits of the tournament are felt directly within the community it serves.

The weekend begins on Saturday evening with a lively reception and pairings party at the JW Marriott Desert Springs Resort & Spa. This gala-style event sets the tone with gourmet food, live entertainment, and spirited bidding through both silent and live auctions. The party not only generates enthusiasm among participants but also provides one of the main fundraising platforms of the weekend. Guests mingle with celebrity athletes and entertainers while eagerly awaiting the team pairings that will shape the following day's competition.

On Sunday morning, the attention shifts to the rolling fairways of Desert Willow Golf Resort, one of the Coachella Valley's premier venues. Registration opens early, with a shotgun start scheduled for 9:30 a.m. The tournament follows a five-player scramble format, where each team is composed of four amateur golfers paired with one celebrity. It is a design that ensures a lively and inclusive atmosphere,






mixing casual players with star athletes and entertainers in a setting that balances competition with camaraderie. The presence of USGA handicaps helps maintain fairness while allowing each participant to contribute meaningfully to the round.

Once play concludes, the day continues with an awards luncheon hosted on the resort's scenic patio. This post-tournament gathering recognizes winning teams, highlights sponsors, and provides another opportunity to raise funds for the causes at the heart of the event. Desert Willow, with its stunning views of the Santa Rosa Mountains and lushly maintained Firecliff and Mountain View courses, offers a setting worthy of the Invitational's blend of luxury and philanthropy.

Participation in the tournament spans several levels, with sponsorships designed to appeal to corporations, local businesses, and individual donors alike. At the highest tier, presenting sponsors receive naming rights and branding across all event materials, along with premium access to receptions and golf spots. Other sponsorship opportunities provide varying levels of access, visibility, and perks, from reception tickets to on-course recognition. Individual golfers can join the action for a significant contribution, while non-golfers are welcomed at the Saturday evening reception, ensuring that community members who wish to support the cause have ways to participate.

The tournament builds on the momentum of the Grant Fuhr Celebrity Invitational, which celebrated its fourth year at Desert Willow in 2024. That event attracted an impressive roster of athletes and celebrities, including former NBA coach Byron Scott, NFL legend Jim McMahon, Heisman Trophy winner Marcus Allen, and World Series champion David Justice. Their presence not only raised the profile of the event but also underscored its mission of rallying influential figures to benefit local causes. With the addition of the

One Valley Foundation as a partner, the 2025 edition is expected to be the most impactful yet.

At its core, the Invitational matters because it bridges the gap between sport and community service. Every dollar raised supports programs that make tangible differences in the lives of young people across the Coachella Valley. The focus on youth sports is particularly meaningful, offering opportunities for children to grow, learn teamwork, and develop confidence through athletic participation. Desert Willow Golf Resort serves as the perfect stage. Known for its pristine conditions, creative layouts, and desert beauty, it has long been a favorite among both locals and visitors. Hosting the Invitational here elevates the prestige of the event while reinforcing the Coachella Valley's reputation as one of the country's premier golf destinations. Combined with the elegance of the JW Marriott's reception facilities, the setting contributes as much to the success of the event as the celebrity draw and philanthropic mission.

As the December 2025 tournament approaches, anticipation continues to build. For participants, it promises two days of unforgettable experiences, from the glamour of the reception to the challenge of competing alongside legends on one of the desert's finest golf courses. For sponsors and supporters, it offers visibility and recognition tied to a cause that resonates deeply in the community. And for the Coachella Valley as a whole, it stands as an opportunity to celebrate the unique blend of sport, charity, and culture that defines the region.

In the end, the One Valley Foundation and Grant Fuhr Foundation Celebrity Invitational will not just be remembered as a golf tournament. It will be remembered as a moment when the community came together—celebrities, athletes, businesses, and residents—to invest in the future of its youth. And that, more than any birdie or trophy, is the true victory the event seeks to achieve.







"The Players Course will become a true championship layout that will test the best players in the game as well as provide a wonderful experience for golfers of all skill levels."

The renovation will see multiple holes rerouted – most notably the ninth, 17th and 18th holes. Currently a par 72, the Players Course will transform to a par 71 and will feature two exciting new finishing holes, the par-3 No. 17 and par-4 No. 18. In the past these were the only two holes on the opposite side of the wash that runs through the property. The new layout will move both holes back across the waterway to join the bulk of the course on the north side adding the final touch in creating a cohesive, free flowing golf course that is more walkable and playable for all ages.

In addition to the finishing holes, the par-5 ninth will be repositioned closer to the clubhouse making it easier for players to enjoy food and beverages at the turn. With so many changes, Fought

hasn't forgotten the bunkers, tee boxes and greens. Each hole will have all of these "refreshed" to ensure an outstanding round of golf.

Caught -up in the excitement is Robin Graf, General Manager of the Indian Wells Golf Resort. "It's been a pleasure working with Fought and his team to realize the incredible possibilities for this project, and we can't wait to welcome our residents and guests from around the world to experience the new design."

At the IWGR guests will not only be welcomed to memorable golf but also memorable dining with the opening of Kestrel. Celebrated chef and TV personality Richard Blais imparts his Left Coast take on American classics, signature cuts and coastal catches in a fresh, California-modern space that evokes the energy of surrounding flora + fauna. Named after the American Kestrel, the smallest and most colorful falcon known for its striking appearance, guests will discover Kestrel's perched atop the entryway stairs of the resort revealing an airy, earth-toned dining room and expansive bar with soaring views of mountain peaks, verdant fairways and ombre sunsets. The outdoor terrace, complete with open-air bar and table seating, frames the perfect social setting to enjoy the region's culinary style and natural allure.



A mother-son duo shapes the future of golf while staying rooted in nature

Cynthia Dye McGarey may be part of the legendary Dye family—her uncle was Pete Dye and her father was Roy Anderson Dye—but she has established herself as a powerful force in golf course architecture. She has proven her mettle and cemented her credibility in a field traditionally dominated by men. As principal golf architect of Dye Designs Group, McGarey founded the firm with her husband, O'Brien McGarey, in 2003.

"Most of my designs are outside of the United States," McGarey said, pointing to successful projects such as West Coast Haikou in Hainan, China; the Ferrum Club in Yeoju-gun, Gyeonggi-do, South Korea; Dreamland Golf Club in Baku, Azerbaijan; Erbil Hills Golf Club in Erbil, Iraq; and Golf de Déva on Grand Terre in New Caledonia.

She understands the global recognition of the Pete Dye name and embraces his legacy as a revered golf course architect. Pete Dye, who was married to fellow designer and amateur champion Alice Dye, is connected to the Coachella Valley through his development of the Mountain Course at PGA West in La Quinta—known for its





dramatic elevation changes, pot bunkers and signature island green on the 16th hole—and the Pete Dye Resort Course at the Westin Rancho Mirage Golf Resort and Spa. He passed away in 2020.

McGarey had the opportunity to work alongside her uncle on the Shenzhen Tycoon Golf Club in Shenzhen, Guangdong Province, China—a course recognized for its sustainability, thanks to her expertise and improvements.

This year, McGarey and her son, Matthew, redesigned all 18 putting surfaces and two practice greens at Woo Jeong Hills Country Club in Cheonan, South Korea. The course, designed by cousin Perry Dye in 1992, has hosted the Kolon Korea Open since 2003. Woo Jeong Hills is owned by Kolon Industries, one of South Korea's leading textile and chemical manufacturers. Dye Designs Group prioritized pin placements by updating the size, contouring and drainage of the greens. The project was especially meaningful, as it was Perry Dye's first design in South Korea—a country where the Dye family has contributed significantly to the recreational landscape.

McGarey's work in 2003 on the San Roque Club in Andalusia, southern Spain, a few miles from Gibraltar, was a true family affair involving collaboration among Cynthia, Pete Dye, Perry Dye and Matthew McGarey.

She began her career studying horticulture at Arizona State University in Tempe, Arizona, and later entered the landscape architecture business, focusing on plants and natural environments.

Her full-time entry into golf design came unexpectedly when cousin Perry Dye invited her to work on landscaping for courses in Asia. That experience sparked her transition into full-scale course design. Today, Dye Designs Group is based in Denver, and she partners with her son, Matthew. Her husband, O'Brien McGarey, serves as president and CEO of the Group.

"On the first golf courses I worked on with my family, I was called the tree lady," she said.

McGarey navigated the challenges of balancing motherhood with a demanding career. She often brought her five children to job sites and relied on a supportive network of family, including nannies who were interested in golf and later worked in the office.

She acknowledged that working on a few U.S.-based courses allowed her to spend more time with her children. Some of her top domestic designs include The Wolf at Las Vegas Paiute Golf Resort and White Horse Golf Club in Kingston, Washington—her first solo design.

She was recognized as the design coordinator for the Promontory Pete Dye Canyon Course in Park City, Utah, in 2002. The American Society of Golf Course Architects welcomed her to its prestigious association in 2012.

"Each project takes a few years out of your life," McGarey said. "But, for instance, with the West Cliffs course in Portugal, it took 12 years to complete, so it's much more than just a building project. It's an entire depth of cultural experience where my husband and I made lots of friends and became really familiar with the lifestyle. We still take vacations there."


West Cliffs Golf Links, on Portugal's Silver Coast about an hour north of Lisbon, is one of the most scenic courses built in Europe in the last decade. Designed by McGarey in 2017, the course plays through sandy coastal terrain with elevated views of the Atlantic Ocean. Built within a UNESCO World Heritage Site, McGarey prioritized minimal earth movement, native habitat restoration and water conservation.

She's been credited with accomplishing less than 16 percent disturbance of the site at West Cliffs during construction. She led efforts to restore over 200 hectares of natural habitat, and she removed invasive species and reintroduced native flora, ensuring the course blended seamlessly with its surroundings.

She doesn't just design on paper or via video. McGarey is a firm believer in spending time on-site, working closely with construction teams, committees, general managers and staff.

"It makes more sense to be hands-on. My uncle Pete was like that, too," she said. "Dye Designs Group actually had an office in China

to manage the multiple courses we were building. I found myself jumping around from city to city a lot. In remote places like Saudi Arabia, Morocco, Portugal and New Caledonia, I schedule myself to stay longer but not visit as frequently. Being on-site really makes a difference in the outcome of the project. I always say, you snooze, you lose."

Her horticultural and landscape architecture background provides enhanced perspective on integrating natural elements into course layouts. Her attention to detail ensures that every course reflects the local climate, vegetation and terrain.

McGarey personally designs planting plans and oversees landscaping on-site, maintaining that courses should be true to their location, with landscaping that reflects regional identity and natural beauty. This philosophy results in courses that feel organic and immersive rather than artificially imposed.

She prefers to build from scratch but also enjoys working with her son, who specializes in remodeling.

"Starting fresh allows for more creativity," she said. "It's tough to do a remodel. There are lots of committees and personalities involved. A clean slate is easier, just like an artist prefers to paint something new as opposed to painting over another artist's work."

She added, "The reality, though, is that every golf course needs to be continually updated because there's a limited life expectancy for every component of the course."







As for being a woman in the industry, McGarey said she doesn't see it as an issue. "Ultimately, it's more about building relationships," she said. "There is still some 'old boys' network' activity, but I am confident that clients hire me because of my exceptional work, references and credibility. And I'm always involved in promoting more women in the field of golf course architecture."

Cynthia McGarey's vision blends artistry with sustainability and continues the Dye tradition while evolving it. She's not only preserving the family legacy but is also redefining what it means to be a golf course architect in the 21st century. Her projects emphasize harmony with nature, strategic design and a deep respect for the land.

She implements her own signature version of the family design philosophy. And perhaps the best part for her is that she gets to work with her son, Matthew, as they take on the world of golf course design together.

Finding the sweet spot with Love and Love Foundation

Tennis legend Rosie Casals leads the way for future generations of tennis enthusiasts



Rosie Casals works magic every day by opening up exciting new worlds for kids and teenagers. Kids who have often never had the opportunity to pick up a tennis racket are able to take part in tennis clinics and experience the excitement of finding that sweet spot in sports and in life, both physically and mentally.

The Love and Love Tennis Foundation, founded by tennis legend Casals and fellow tennis pioneer Tory Fretz in 2015, is a nonprofit organization dedicated to making tennis accessible to youth, especially those in underserved and diverse communities throughout the Coachella Valley. A primary call to action is for volunteers familiar with the game of tennis to sign up to help as well as for donors to support fundraising (lovelovetennisfoundation. com).

Casals, who lives in the Coachella Valley, is a trailblazer in women's tennis and has been a driving force in reshaping the way that women participate in the sport especially in terms of equal representation and compensation. Casals is known for winning 12 Grand Slam Doubles Titles, many alongside Billie Jean King, advocating for equal prize money for women in tennis, and being inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame in 1996, among dozens and dozens of other accolades.

The Love and Love Tennis Foundation reflects her lifelong commitment to equity, opportunity, and the joy of the game.

The Foundation works closely with local schools and tennis clubs in the Coachella Valley, to host free youth clinics and NJTL (National Junior Tennis & Learning) tournaments. These events are designed to teach tennis skills while also fostering confidence, discipline, and community spirit.

During a conversation with Casals, who found time to talk during her attendance at the U.S. Open Tennis Championships in Queens, New York, played ironically at the USTA Billie Jean King National Tennis Center with whom she was attending, she talked about all the programs currently taking place through the Foundation that help kids and teens develop their tennis skills.

Every Saturday, Casals and her team of instructors hold a clinic at Fritz Burns Park in La Quinta, thanks to a partnership with the City of La Quinta. Other partners and program sites include the Boys and Girls Clubs of Coachella Valley and various high schools such as Desert Hot Springs High School, Indio High School and Rancho Mirage High School. The high schools receive grants for \$1,000 each which enables them to offer free clinics to their students. There are numerous clinics opportunities to learn and play in Desert Hot Springs, Indio, Ranco Mirage, La Quinta, Mecca, and other desert cities.

Fundraising is ongoing, and by far the event that galvanizes the most support is the annual Annalee Thurston Awards, named after Annalee Thurston, a passionate supporter of youth tennis and a beloved former WTA marketing executive who passed away in 2007.

The awards celebrate outstanding achievements in tennis and community involvement with past awardees including Billie Jean King, Tracy Austin, Connie Spooner, Ilana Kloss, Micky Lawler, Peachy Kellmeyer, Mary Carillo, Chris Evert and other superstars of the tennis realm.

The award is presented annually each March during the BNP Paribas Open in Indian Wells, now taking place at Palm Valley Country Club in Indian Wells, California and set for March 7, 2026. Casals noted that she's getting very close to announcing the 2026 awardee.

Casals said, "Funds raised from this event make it possible for us to involve more kids and get more people involved as instructors. Keep in mind, often these tennis sessions are for kids who've never played before, and it's a way for them to see the possibilities that lie ahead for them with tennis and sports as the catalyst."

Another significant event — a Tennis Fiesta - will take place Saturday, October 4 at Rancho Mirage High School and will welcome 80 kids from Coachella in celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month. From 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., kids will be able to play tennis as well as enjoy Folklórico dancers, lunch, and a piñata bash.

As for Casals' own tennis activity, she said, "I'm still hitting balls and playing to stay in shape. It's great when Billie Jean [King] and Ilana [Kloss] visit, which they do often, because we all get out on the court together and have a good giggle."

The primary message Casals wishes to impress upon readers is the need for volunteers and donations. Those interested can learn more at lovelovetennisfoundation.com and can contact Casals directly at sportswomn@aol.com.

She said, "Starting this Foundation was truly a labor of love – pun intended – for me. Giving kids the chance to play tennis is so crucial in their lives, both on and off the court. It improves their coordination and endurance while promoting cardiovascular health. It teaches discipline and resilience which is so helpful as they get older and need ways to manage stress. Plus, it's fun and gives them an incredible outlet in terms of sportsmanship and just friendship."

Dinking around with California Black Bears and Coachella Valley Scorpions

Pickleball courts are popping up everywhere, often repurposing tennis courts, with indoor and outdoor facilities making pickleball a robust year-round game and business. The sport has been popular with older adults for years, however after COVID-19, pickleball gained traction with younger players.

Today, pickleball courts welcome players between 10 and 100, making it a multigenerational activity that is easy to learn yet challenging to master. There are two professional leagues: Major League Pickleball (MLP) with 22 teams and the National Pickleball League (NPL) with 12 teams, the latter for players 50 years and older.

According to Kim Jagd, co-owner of the Coachella Valley Scorpions (part of the NPL), "the growth of pickleball is insane, in a good way." She explains that there are Coachella Valley residents who have taken their passion for the sport into professional team ownership.

Jagd is a former college volleyball athlete at UCLA, where she played on the 1984 NCAA National Championship team. She also competed on the Pro Beach Volleyball Tour (WPVA) for three years

and then began coaching at University of Colorado. She returned to her alma mater to coach for another 18 seasons before retiring.

Jagd says, "Most people are not even aware there are professional pickleball leagues, let alone a team called The Coachella Valley Scorpions for pros 50 and older and a young pro team called the California Black Bears." Jagd's fellow co-owners of The Coachella Valley Scorpions include Indian Wells residents Rob Zwemmer and Ruth Ann Poppa (her mother). Also in the ownership group is Don Zuker from McKinney, Texas, and the majority stakeholder is actor Vince Vaughn, an avid sportsman and pickleball player.

The National Pickleball League is in its third year (nplpickleball. com), and the Scorpions joined in the second season of the league. During their first year of competing, they ended up in fifth place due to injuries. Rod Davis, the CEO of the National Pickleball League, happens to live in the Coachella Valley, reinforcing the strong ties to the desert.

Jagd explains that the top players in the indoor league are paid each weekend. There is also prize money for the teams that win





On each of the 12 teams in the NPL, rosters include seven men and seven women with 12 players competing in a team battle divided into pods. As Jagd describes it, "It's very chaotic and exciting! Each team battle includes gender and mixed doubles."

The Scorpions are excited to have the support of sponsors Agua Caliente Casinos and Joola Pickleball (the largest paddle producer in the world, played by top pros). Jagd says, "Agua Caliente has supported us since our inception and has helped to grow visibility for our team and pickleball. In May, ACC planned an exhibition event that was held in their beautiful indoor venue called The Show. As I welcomed the crowd of over 500 people (not bad for off season) I teased with the crowd that the Scorpions were opening for Jason Mraz who was playing later that night to a full house! Our event featured an exhibition game between a pro and Palm Springs police chief Andy Mills playing against another pro and Palm Springs deputy fire chief Jeffrey Van Lierop."

The Scorpions have launched an additional business focused on national camps and clinics, led by professional players and coaches. They will be hosting two camps at Desert Princess Country Club in Cathedral City, California on October 10 and 11 and November 7 and 8, 2025. For more information, visit scorpionpickleballcamps. com.

Shifting gears over to MLP (Major League Pickleball), Jagd's counterpart in ownership is Ritchie Tuazon, a fixed income portfolio manager who lives part time in Indian Wells and is the founding owner of the California Black Bears. This young pro pickleball team just concluded their season in San Diego in mid August.

The MLP format incorporates team matches consisting of four games with women's doubles, men's doubles and mixed doubles (two games). Premier and challenger levels separate top-tier and rising players.

Tuazon is passionate about expanding pickleball's reach and accessibility. He has partnered with other entrepreneurs, including those behind The Picklr, a fast-growing indoor chain of pickleball clubs, to promote the sport at all levels.

Tuazon explains that other prominent MLP team owners include Le Bron James and Tom Brady, adding to pickleball's appeal. His own team currently operates at a loss, primarily due to the lack of





a television deal. However, Tuazon believes that once a TV deal is achieved, the growth will be a "game changer," bringing broader visibility especially for the sport's reach and legitimacy.

He pointed out, "There were 433,000 viewers for the MLP's finals match that recently aired on CBS, outdrawing the LPGA and LIV Golf viewership."

As an owner, Tuazon's desert connection is reinforced by his residency in the region even though he grew up in Pasadena, California and works in Los Angeles. His brother, Lance Tuazon, is a realtor in southern California and the Coachella Valley.


Tuazon said, "Because pickleball is the fastest growing sport in the country, there's a lot of room to grow. With more and more indoor courts being built, this should be really good for the sport."

Jagd sums up the spirit of camaraderie shared by both owners by saying, "I hope the Scorpions and Black Bears can work collaboratively to bring an indoor pickleball facility and events to the Coachella Valley in the future."

Four Seasons Resort Scottsdale at Troon North

(Phoenix/Scottsdale)

If you're chasing peak Sonoran Desert golf with five-star service, the Four Seasons Resort Scottsdale at Troon North is the bull's-eye. Guests play Troon North's two headline courses—Monument and Pinnacle—desert classics conceived by major champion Tom Weiskopf with architect Jay Morrish. Monument (par 72, ~7,039 yards) moves through saguaro forests and granite outcrops, peppering players with strategic angles and risk-reward carries; Pinnacle (par 71, ~7,009 yards) is a leaner, more athletic test that rewards precision off the tee and into subtly contoured greens. The duo has long been a standard-bearer for target-style desert golf, with routing that uses the natural rock drama as both hazard and eye candy.

Back at the resort—a hillside village of adobe-style casitas and suites—comfort comes in layers. There's a bi-level pool complex framed by Pinnacle Peak, a serene spa with desertinspired treatments, and easy shuttle access to the first tees. Casitas lean contemporary Southwest: wood-beamed ceilings, fireplaces, outdoor spaces, and the kind of beds that turn a 7:10 a.m. tee time into a heroic feat of will. Dining is




a genuine highlight. Talavera, the modern Spanish steakhouse, is a sunset magnet with sweeping valley views; Proof is your relaxed American comfort-food roadhouse, complete with a shuffleboard table and milkshakes that make you wonder whether tomorrow's wedge game can forgive tonight's indulgence. Poolside bites at Saguaro Blossom and cocktails at Onyx round things out, and in-casita dining lets you keep the robe on between spa and siesta.

Practice junkies will appreciate Troon North's expansive range and short-game areas, plus the variety you get by alternating Monument and Pinnacle across a long weekend. Off-course, sunrise hikes up Pinnacle Peak Park are practically mandatory, and the resort concierge is dialed for everything from hot-air balloon rides to private desert photography sessions. Families do well here—quiet casita clusters give everyone space; couples do, too—the spa is intimate and the after-dark desert air is tailor-made for patios and wine.

Who it's for: players who want tournament-grade desert golf by two icons (Weiskopf/Morrish) paired with top-tier service and dining, with as much nature as you can handle right outside your casita door. On a golf-only trip, you could play 36 per day and never feel repetitive; on a more indulgent trip, simply pace between course, pool, spa, and Talavera's terrace and call it perfection.


Boulders Resort & Spa Scottsdale


(Phoenix/North Scottsdale)

Boulders is a vibe as much as a resort—a sandstone sculpture garden where fairways weave between prehistoric rock stacks the size of apartment buildings. The Boulders Golf Club features two celebrated layouts by Jay Morrish (North and South), each leaning into the property's humbling topography. Morrish's desert-minimalist sensibility is on full display: centerline boulders that dictate angles, doglegs that flirt with arroyos, and green sites tucked against massive rock faces. It's photogenic, yes, but the strategy is real, with generous landing areas that narrow into demanding approaches and green contours that reward the patient line over the heroic one.

The resort's adobe casitas and villas are scattered thoughtfully across the 1,300-acre property for maximum privacy and views—sunrises wash the boulder piles pink and gold. The spa is a destination in itself, known for open-air spaces, a labyrinth for meditative walks, and desert botanicals folded into therapies. After golf, you're choosing between a cocktail with a rock-wall backdrop and a sunset soak that radiates serenity. Dining is resort-casual with Southwestern

notes; the patios are the prize seats, especially when the evening light ignites the granite. The pool scene stays mellow, and service carries that unfussy, "you're among friends" polish.


Non-golf play is robust: guided desert hikes, rock-climbing introductions, e-bike rides, and stargazing meetups under flawless desert skies. The tennis and pickleball setups keep racquet people happy; fitness facilities are modern; and the pro shop is packed with desert-heat-friendly apparel. The resort also arranges off-property excursions—Old Town Scottsdale gallery crawls, Verde Valley wine tastings, even hot-air balloon dawn patrols if you want the aerial version of those boulder panoramas.

What sets Boulders apart is how deeply the courses feel of the land. You're not playing on a man-made stage; you're threading shots through a natural sculpture park, with Morrish's routing quietly choreographing the drama. It's no surprise the resort repeatedly shows up on "best golf resorts in the Southwest" lists: the on-course scenery is outrageous, the strategy satisfying, and the off-course decompression top-notch. For traveling players, splitting your rounds between North and South keeps the trip balanced—North slightly more forgiving, South a tad tighter and more dramatic near the rocks—while the spa guarantees a reset between 36-hole days.

JW Marriott Phoenix Desert Ridge Resort & Spa

(Phoenix/Desert Ridge)

If you're building a golf-centric getaway where everyone—from the low-capper to the lounge-by-the-lazy-river crowd—leaves happy, Desert Ridge is a cheat code. The on-site Wildfire Golf Club offers 36 holes with signature pedigrees: the Faldo Course channels sand-belt energy with sprawling bunkering and wide, strategic corridors, while the Palmer Course leans into imaginative shot-making and bold green complexes. That architect balance—Nick Faldo's controlled strategy next to Arnold Palmer's more swashbuckling design DNA—keeps multiday itineraries fresh and lets foursomes mix styles across mornings and afternoons.

This is also one of the Valley's most complete bigresort ecosystems. AquaRidge WaterPark delivers a lazy river, slides, and splash zones; Revive Spa is a destination for hydrotherapy circuits and post-round deep-tissue salvation; there's a large fitness center, multiple pools, tennis courts, and a broad slate of daily activities. Dining has stepped up in recent years with marquee concepts like Tía Carmen and Kembara by chef Angelo Sosa, plus casual and poolside options to keep families fueled and golfers

refueled between rounds. If your crew includes non-golfers (or juniors just finding the game), the "something for everyone" quotient here is off the charts.

Rooms and suites are contemporary and spacious, many with balconies overlooking fairways or pools. Mornings begin with sunrise stretches on the event lawn or practice-green roll-outs; afternoons can mean an extra nine, or drifting the lazy river with a post-round beverage. The practice facilities are generous—multiple putting surfaces and a large range—handy if you're dialing in distances for firm desert conditions. The club's pro shop is well-stocked, and the staff is seasoned at handling group trips, from buddy-golf weekends to corporate scrambles.


Location helps, too: you're minutes from North Phoenix and Scottsdale dining/shopping pockets, and logistic-friendly to both TPC Scottsdale and other public tracks if you want to add an off-property round. But there's really no need. A three-day loop of Faldo/Palmer/Faldo, stitched together with spa time, waterpark interludes, and a progressive dinner crawl through the resort's restaurants, is a high-percentage play.

Bottom line: with two high-profile architects (Faldo and Palmer) setting complementary tests and a resort infrastructure that anticipates what mixed groups need, Desert Ridge is a Swiss Army knife for Phoenix golf travel—versatile, polished, and built for repeat visits.


The Ritz-Carlton, Dove Mountain

(Tucson/Marana)

Tucked into the Tortolita Mountains just north of Tucson, The Ritz-Carlton, Dove Mountain feels like a private canyon hideaway with a championship resume. The Golf Club at Dove Mountain features 27 holes of Jack Nicklaus Signature golf (three nine-hole loops that once hosted the WGC-Accenture Match Play), which means fairways defined by natural washes, greens guarded with classic Nicklaus angles, and the sort of muscular par-3s that can flip a match on a single swing. The nines mix and match into 18-hole experiences with different personalities, making a long weekend feel like a mini-rotation rather than repeats.

The resort's architecture blends modern desert luxury with a palpable sense of place—earth-toned stone, fire features, and terraces that frame saguaro-studded vistas. After golf, decelerate at the spa (steam, plunge, and quiet lounges are the norm), or take advantage of the hiking and mountainbiking trails that spool out from the property into Sonoran backcountry. Families find plenty to do-there's a multipool complex with a waterslide and cabanas—and couples


gravitate to sunset hour on the lobby terrace when the mountains go purple and the desert cools.

Dining spans thoughtful Southwest to refined global, with craft-cocktail programs and wine lists that satisfy both post-round casual and celebratory dinner moods. Rooms and suites are generous, many with fire pits or deep terraces, and the Club Level ups the convenience with all-day culinary offerings. Service is classic Ritz-Carlton—anticipatory without being fussy—and golf operations are slick, from staging to on-course hospitality.

On the course, you'll confront Nicklaus hallmarks: elevated greens that insist on precise approaches, fairway bunkering that corrals indecision, and par-5s that tease the go-for-it gene. The desert framing is spectacular but honest—stray too far and you're reloading. Practice facilities are robust, and early-morning tee times repay with wildlife sightings and the kind of air that makes a flushed midiron feel like it might never come down.

For Tucson travelers, Dove Mountain is the most self-contained luxury golf experience in the region—a resort where you can lean fully into golf, or go half-golf/half-wellness and feel equally satisfied. And because the 27-hole setup offers variety without leaving the property, it's tailor-made for three-night itineraries: rotate the nines, change the par-3 yardages, and chase that late-afternoon match with a golden-hour hike to the petroglyphs.

Loews Ventana Canyon Resort


(Tucson)

Few places in the Southwest blend wild canyon drama with resort comfort as naturally as Loews Ventana Canyon. Set against the Santa Catalina Mountains, the resort partners with the Ventana Canyon Golf & Racquet Club to offer 36 holes of Tom Fazio-designed championship golf. Fazio's pair—the Mountain and Canyon courses—are quintessential Tucson: target-style tee shots that skirt arroyos and rock outcrops, eye-popping elevation changes, and greens tucked into amphitheaters of desert stone. The celebrated par-3 3rd on the Mountain Course plays over a deep ravine to a green perched against granite, an only-in-Tucson postcard you'll think about on the flight home.

The resort itself leans into indoor-outdoor living—room balconies and patios are common, and public spaces are oriented to canyon views. After your morning loop, you might detour to the on-property nature trail and small waterfall, or settle into the pool with the mountains looming overhead. Racquet sports are a strength here, with lighted tennis and pickleball courts complementing the golf scene; the fitness center and spa offer the requisite post-round repair. Dining is relaxed and Southwestern-inflected, with patios that make the most of Tucson's blue-sky days and star-heavy nights.

Ventana is also one of those rare places where the practice grounds are as inspiring as the course: long-range views from the range, short-game areas that let you rehearse the tight-lie chips the desert demands, and comfortable




putting greens for match-settling playoffs. Service is warm and unfussy, in the Tucson tradition, and the golf shop crew is used to traveling players fine-tuning itineraries that combine Ventana rounds with nearby public favorites.

What elevates the experience is balance. Golfers get two distinct Fazio rounds—Mountain usually the more dramatic; Canyon the steadier test—while non-golfers can spend days hiking Sabino or Ventana canyons, browsing downtown's food scene, or simply reading by the pool with the Catalina foothills as a backdrop. For couples, the "golf in the morning, hike in the afternoon, patio dinner at dusk" rhythm is hard to beat; for buddies trips, 36 a day is very doable thanks to efficient course flow and proximity right from the lobby.

In short, Loews Ventana Canyon wraps classic Fazio desert golf in a resort that's equal parts outdoorsy and comfortable—close to Tucson's attractions yet cocooned by canyon walls and starry skies. If your golf trip checklist reads "scenery that humbles you, holes you'll replay in your head, and a resort you can live in for a long weekend," this is your Tucson pick.

JW Marriott Tucson Starr Pass Resort & Spa

(Tucson)

For golfers who like their desert rounds intertwined with deep history and modern resort polish, JW Marriott Tucson Starr Pass Resort & Spa is a prime choice. The 27 holes of golf here—designed by the legendary team of Arnold Palmer and Bob Cupp—reimagine a setting once used by stagecoach travelers heading westward. The courses (Roadrunner, Rattler, and Coyote nines) flow across Tucson's western foothills, demanding target-style accuracy in a desert environment but offering fair challenges through wide landing areas and elevated tees that spotlight sweeping valley views. Palmer and Cupp struck a balance: generous enough for the casual player but with enough teeth to have hosted NCAA championships and PGA Tour events in the

The three-nine rotation keeps the experience fresh. The Roadrunner nine is open and scorable; Rattler is tighter, framed by saguaros and desert washes; Coyote mixes dramatic elevation changes with risk-reward par 5s. Practice facilities are expansive, with a full driving range, shortgame zones, and putting greens to warm up or settle bets

after a round. Golf carts are GPS-equipped, and on-course beverage service is consistent—a welcome factor in Tucson's sun-drenched climate.

Beyond golf, the resort unfolds like a desert playground. There's a sprawling multi-tier pool complex with a lazy river and waterslide for families, plus a quieter adults-only pool for more serene afternoons. Hashani Spa incorporates Native American and desert-botanical elements into its therapies, with outdoor relaxation decks that catch Tucson's sunset glow. Fitness seekers will find a well-equipped center and access to trails for hiking, running, and mountain biking directly from the property—Starr Pass borders Tucson Mountain Park, with routes that range from quick morning hikes to serious treks into the saguaro wilderness.

Diningreflects Arizona's melting pot offlavors. Primo specializes in Mediterranean and local farm-to-table cuisine; Signature Grill leans into regional American dishes with an emphasis on Southwest flavors; the poolside Catalina Barbeque Co. & Sports Bar offers hearty post-round plates in a casual setting. Morning golfers can start at Starbucks* Café, located conveniently near the golf staging area. Evening entertainment often centers on the open-air patios, where fire pits and desert views create an easygoing social scene.

Rooms and suites are comfortably modern with Southwest accents—think earth-tone palettes, wood details, and balconies that look out over the city or mountains. For groups, connecting rooms and large suites make the resort an ideal hub for buddy trips or family gatherings. Service is Marriott-polished but relaxed, fitting Tucson's unhurried rhythm.

What separates Starr Pass is how much variety it packs into one destination: 27 Palmer/Cupp golf holes, full-scale spa and pools, desert adventure access, and family-friendly diversions. Whether you're a traveling foursome chasing morning 36s, a couple balancing golf and spa time, or a family blending kids' activities with championship-level golf, Starr Pass delivers.



Like a scene out of "Our Town," the Palm Desert Annual Golf Cart Parade is a slice of Americana right in the midst of the Coachella Valley. This living tableau of unity connects residents, schools, businesses and local organizations in a cheery showcase of community.

Taking place on Sunday, October 26 along the scenic El Paseo corridor, the 61st annual event will again feature colorful and imaginatively conceived golf carts, which individuals or businesses enter into the parade as floats for \$99 each. This year's Golf Cart Parade theme is, "California dreaming —how are you living the dream?!" Float entries are expected to show off California spirit and creativity with depictions of sun-kissed beaches, iconic landmarks, and the laid-back vibe of the Golden State.

Prizes are awarded for the most unique and dazzling floats, which in the past have included "It's a jungle out there" safari float by Loving All Animals in 2017, covered in stuffed animals and which included adoptable dogs; a 30-foot long pirate ship in 2012 by Desert Arc; and the Family YMCA of the Desert's Super Mario Bros. castle float in 2019 that transformed their golf cart into a castle resembling Bowser's lair, with Bowser being the iconic villain.

The Golf Cart Parade is a production of the Palm Desert Area Chamber of Commerce (PDACC) with significant sponsorship support from City of Palm Desert, The Auen Foundation, General Air Conditioning, Mechanic's Bank, The Manor Family Trust, El Paseo Jewelers, Berger Foundation, Fiesta Ford / Fiesta Kia / Palm Springs Motors, La Fe Wine Bar, On the Mark Indoor Digital Advertising, JR Thomas Golf Cars, The Lock Shop, Valley Lock and Safe and numerous others.

Alisa Williams, CEO of the PDACC, said, "The Golf Cart Parade is special because it truly reflects the heart of Palm Desert. It's more than just a parade - it's our community coming together to celebrate culture, tradition, and connection. There's a magical small-town charm mixed with big community pride, and that combination is what makes the parade such a beloved tradition year after year."

This year's Grand Marshal is Tim O'Brien of NBC Palm Springs. He will be joined by VIP guest Hockey Hall of Famer Grant Fuhr, a five-time Stanley Cup Champion with the Edmonton Oilers and widely regarded as one of the greatest goaltenders in NHL history. Fuhr was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in 2003 and is celebrated for breaking barriers as the first black goaltender to achieve superstar status in the league.

Of course, anyone who's been to this joyful celebration knows that the parade is much more than an adoring procession of cleverly and colorfully decorated golf carts. The day starts at 8 a.m. with the Rotary Club Pancake Breakfast, followed by the opening of marketplace booths, food vendors, a lively beer garden, and the Kids and Family Fun Zone at 9 a.m. Guests can also enjoy a dazzling display of classic cars and custom golf carts leading up to the main event. It's free for general attendees, seniors and members of the military, and VIP seating is \$30 per person.

At noon, the sky comes alive with a dramatic flyover by historic aircraft from the Palm Springs Air Museum and parachuters landing right on the parade route, officially kicking off the parade.


Leading the way are vintage automobiles and golf carts, followed by more than 100 spectacular entries—from exceptional floats to marching bands, spirited cheer squads, and high-energy dance troupes—all celebrating Palm Desert's unparalleled community spirit in true California style.

The Golf Cart Parade has been a fixture in the desert since the 1960s, sustaining a beloved tradition that reflects the distinctive charm and history of Palm Desert. It's a nostalgic event that honors the city's identity while evolving with new and exciting design concepts each year.

Evoking a sense of nostalgia while representing the pop culture of our time, the Annual Golf Cart Parade elevates the ordinary into something just a bit more profound and brings all stations and stages of life together.

Modernism Week, the festival that highlights midcentury and modern architecture, art, interior and landscape design, and vintage sensibility in the Palm Springs area held two times each year (a condensed version each October and 11 days each February), once again produces Modernism Week from October 16-19, 2025. There will be more than 50 events staged over four days, including many free and low-cost programs.

The Preview Party for the Palm Springs Modernism Fall Show on October 17 (only \$95 in advance and \$110 at the door) kicks off Modernism Week in style, giving guests a jump start on this early buying opportunity. The festive evening will feature libations and wine, delectable hors d'oeuvres, and first access to an incredible array of design treasures, before the show opens to





the public. The show is an ideal opportunity to mingle with fellow design lovers and snag one-of-a-kind pieces before they disappear into someone else's collection.

The Palm Springs Modernism Fall Show itself will take place October 18 and 19 for only \$25 admission perperson, featuring nearly 50 premier national exhibitors offering vintage furniture, decorative and fine art representing all design movements of 20th and 21st century.

Architectural bus tours are one of the most popular programs. The Premier Double Decker Architectural Bus Tour is the Show's signature, treating guests to the most significant architectural treasures of Palm Springs. Other bus tours include Twilight Architectural, Sinatra's Rat Pack Homes, Band Hangouts, and The Homes That Define Palm Springs, among others.

There are several new activities this year, which include 100 Years of Palm Springs Modernism. Led by top-rated architectural tour guide Trevor O'Donnell, this intimate 22-seat mini-coach tour surveys a full century of fascinating modernist architecture.

The Palm Springs Paradise Home Tour: A Celebration of Bold Design, Color, and Desert Style is an exclusive chance to peek behind the doors of six spectacular residences, each one an unforgettable celebration of bold color, sleek lines, inspired design, and personality-packed interiors.

Vossler Smith said, "Each aspect of the Show speaks to different aspects of modernism — architecture, design, art, and culture, so coming up with a favorite is like trying to choose a favorite child. That said, I've always had a soft spot for the home tours. There's nothing quite like watching visitors step into a preserved or restored midcentury residence and experience firsthand just how these homes were designed for light, landscape, and living."


Other activities of note include:

She continues, "In the coming years, you'll see us deepening our focus on sustainability and adaptive reuse as well as broadening the sociological lens to connect midcentury design with contemporary issues."

She sums up the spirit of this midcentury modern celebration by saying, "At its core, Modernism Week is about joy — the joy of good design, good company, and the desert light that makes it all glow."

Modernism Week is a 501 (c) (3) charitable organization, providing scholarships to local Palm Springs students pursuing college educations in the fields of architecture and design; as well as giving grants to local and state organizations for their efforts to preserve modernist architecture throughout the state of California.




Bar Issi



Safety remains at the core of Tesla's identity, and the 2026 Plaid includes the latest suite of sensors, cameras, and radar systems to support Auto Drive and protect passengers. The car continuously





monitors its environment, capable of reacting faster than any human driver in emergency scenarios. Over-the-air updates, another Tesla hallmark, ensure that the vehicle improves with time, offering new features and enhancements long after it leaves the showroom floor.





The evidence that Oscar Heyman creates heirloom-quality jewelry, both in style and in function, is in the company's storied history.

Founded in 1912 as Oscar Heyman & Brothers, the jewelry house was started by brothers Oscar, Harry, and Nathan Heyman, who brought European jewelry-making techniques to the United States. They launched their stellar reputation as specialists in sourcing only the absolute finest colored gemstones from around the globe, including rubies, emeralds, diamonds, Paraiba tourmalines, and Padparadscha sapphires. Their signature style continues to feature

kaleidoscopic arrangements and invisible settings, showcasing technical advancement and aesthetic grandeur.
